# **TRANSCRIPT OF INTERVIEW OF McDERMOTT VICE PRESIDENT**

4/13/15

1 Nate Wright: This is Nate Wright here from the Office of Congressional Ethics with  
2 Bryson Morgan. We are interviewing McDermott Vice President, and on  
3 the phone, I believe we have Sean Tonolli from Cahill as well as Komal  
4 Patel. I apologize if I mispronounced anyone's name. McDermott Vice  
5 President, what is your current position within McDermott?

6 Witness: I'm currently Vice President of Strategic Relationships. In fact, that's a  
7 position that has recently been made redundant and I'm serving out a  
8 redundancy period, but that is my current position.

9 Nate Wright: How long have you been in that position?

10 Witness: I've been in my current position since May of 2014, so approximately one  
11 year.

12 Nate Wright: Okay. What was your previous position?

13 Witness: Prior to that, I was a senior director of operations for Caspian region based  
14 in Baku in Azerbaijan.

15 Nate Wright: Okay. In that capacity as senior director for operations in the Caspian, who  
16 did you report to within McDermott?

17 Witness: During that period, I reported to the Vice President for Middle East  
18 business unit who was based in the business unit headquarters in Dubai.

19 Bryson Morgan: Okay.

20 Nate Wright: You were based in Baku then?

21 Witness: That's correct. The position I took I moved back to Dubai in October of  
22 2012 and I was resident in Azerbaijan until July of 2014, so I was a  
23 resident there for a period of approximately a year and a half, a little more.

24 Nate Wright: Was your focus then on Azerbaijan, in that position?

25 Witness: Yes it was, my position was called Senior Director of Operations Caspian,  
26 so by nature of the title, it was broader than Azerbaijan, but during my  
27 tenure there, the only active project we had was in Azerbaijan. It was a  
28 single project, so a lot of my remit covered the risk of the Caspian region  
29 as we interpret it which includes Kazakhstan and the Russian sector on the  
30 Caspian Sea. In fact, those areas were dormant and all the focus of my  
31 work during my tenure was in Azerbaijan.

1 Nate Wright: What kind of activities speaking generally because obviously we don't  
2 need the specifics of your interactions day-to-day, but what types of  
3 activities would you do in that position?

4 Witness: We had a single contract for a single project during that period. It was a  
5 large project. It was called COP or C-O-P which was the Chirag oil project  
6 and that was a large marine construction project for the supply and  
7 installation of several pipelines and associated facilities for AIOC, the  
8 Azerbaijan International Operating Company.

9 I returned to Azerbaijan after that project had commenced and really my  
10 role was to see through the execution of that project and to see it  
11 completed. My day-to-day activities were very much associated with the  
12 execution of the substantial marine construction project.

13 Nate Wright: Okay. Are you familiar with SOCAR?

14 Witness: Yes, indeed. SOCAR is the State Oil Company Azerbaijan Republic. For  
15 the project that I went to Azerbaijan for with McDermott, we're in alliance  
16 with SOCAR, so I'm very much familiar with them in a day-to-day  
17 relationship with SOCAR.

18 Nate Wright: Were there any people in particular that you interacted with most  
19 commonly at SOCAR?

20 Witness: Yes, under the nature of the alliance between SOCAR and McDermott,  
21 SOCAR had contractual rights and obligations to provide a small number  
22 of key people in our project team and it was envisioned from the outset  
23 that McDermott would provide the senior manager for the project and for  
24 the operations and SOCAR would provide the deputy. We had a SOCAR  
25 representative in the project team and he was my frequent day-to-day  
26 contact. In addition to that, we had regular but very much occasional  
27 contact with the next or a more senior management level in SOCAR.  
28 Really to explain from the day-to-day point of view, it was the SOCAR  
29 representative embedded in our operations and then on a maybe a monthly  
30 or [indecipherable] bases interaction with the management level in  
31 SOCAR.

32 Nate Wright: How does SOCAR, what is its relationship with the AIOC?

33 Witness: SOCAR actually has several layers of operation. It's a state-government  
34 oil company, but it's vertically integrated. If you like, at level one,  
35 SOCAR is the host government legislator for the industry and the holder  
36 of the production sharing contracts with the international oil companies.  
37 That's level one. At level two, it was actually a member of the consortium

1 that made up AIOC. AIOC is a consortium operation of many or several  
2 different parties of which BP as the operating oil company. Then through  
3 those sort of two types of relationship which is why SOCAR was  
4 connected with AIOC, both as a shareholder in the overall AIOC  
5 company, but also as the state government legislator for the production  
6 sharing contract.

7 Nate Wright: Okay. I want to ask now about US-Azerbaijan convention. Are you  
8 familiar with ... It's an annual convention. Are you familiar with it?

9 Witness: Yes, I am.

10 Nate Wright: What do you understand the purpose of the convention to be?

11 Witness: Well, I became familiar with it when we were invited by SOCAR to  
12 sponsor the event held in 2013 which I then learned was being held in  
13 Azerbaijan on rotation. I understood when I found out that month that  
14 there had been a previous smaller convention held in the United States the  
15 prior year and I thought I understood or I got the impression that it was a  
16 convention that rotated each year between the US and Azerbaijan and  
17 generally the purpose was to improve the understanding in relationships  
18 between stakeholders in the US and Azerbaijan especially stakeholders  
19 involved in the oil industry and some of the associated government  
20 departments.

21 Nate Wright: Let me make sure. You didn't attend the 2012 convention in the Willard,  
22 did you?

23 Witness: No, I did not. No, I was not aware of that convention at that time. In fact,  
24 at that time, I was working in another part of our company and not  
25 involved with our Azerbaijan operations at that time.

26 Nate Wright: Okay. But you later understood that McDermott was a title sponsor to that  
27 convention?

28 Witness: Yes, at that time, we were contacted about participating as a sponsor to the  
29 2013 convention. It came to my attention that we had been a title sponsor  
30 the previous year, yes.

31 Nate Wright: That means that McDermott didn't contribute money to the convention, is  
32 that correct?

33 Witness: That is correct. I didn't know that at that time, but I looked into it and  
34 found that that was the case, so true. Hindsight, looking back as to actually

1 the circumstances of the 2012 convention, yes, I learned that we had been  
2 a title sponsor, but actually not an attendee nor a financial sponsor.

3 Nate Wright: Is that unusual to not be a financial sponsor?

4 Witness: I really don't know. I would have thought it was probably a little unusual,  
5 but it was something I hadn't been aware of until 2013?

6 Nate Wright: Okay. Let me ask about the 2013 convention in Baku. I'd like to direct  
7 your attention to the document page labelled MCD OCE 117.

8 Witness: Yes.

9 Nate Wright: Do you remember this email?

10 Witness: Yes, I do.

11 Nate Wright: Is this the invitation by SOCAR you referenced before?

12 Witness: Yes, it is.

13 Nate Wright: Do you remember any discussions about this convention prior to this  
14 email?

15 Witness: Prior to this email, no. This email was the first information I received  
16 about the convention.

17 Nate Wright: Okay. There weren't any discussions of sponsoring the convention to your  
18 knowledge prior to this email?

19 Witness: That's correct. There are none to my knowledge prior to this email.

20 Nate Wright: Who is the person that it's from? Do you know?

21 Witness: The email comes from a staff member in SOCAR. She signs herself as an  
22 economist in the joint ventures and alliances department investments  
23 division which is the division of SOCAR which handles arrangements like  
24 ours to be an alliance partner so that's where the email is from.

25 Nate Wright: Does that fit into ... You were talking about the layers. Is that in the first  
26 layer where SOCAR is ... She fits into the sort of the first layer where  
27 SOCAR was acting as kind of like a legislator for the industry?

28 Witness: No. I would actually say this is from the third layer. Really SOCAR has  
29 four layers. I explained layer one as the state legislator. Layer two as a

1 shareholder or participant in the production sharing joint venture  
2 company. Layer three then is the layer that we deal in where SOCAR  
3 forms alliances with international contractors to facilitate the presence and  
4 operations in Azerbaijan of contractors with international capabilities and  
5 reputations. Then in fact there's a layer four where SOCAR has  
6 subsidiaries who maybe subcontractors to those prime contractors. I would  
7 characterize the joint ventures and those alliances as a layer three part of  
8 the SOCAR corporation.

9 Nate Wright: Okay.

10 Bryson Morgan: This is Bryson speaking. This person Aynura Ahadova was not a person  
11 who had been deputized to your group? Is that correct?

12 Witness: That's correct. She was not.

13 Bryson Morgan: Okay.

14 Nate Wright: What was your inclination after receiving this email? Did you want to  
15 sponsor the event or not or what was your response to it?

16 Witness: I suppose to explain my response firstly, I perhaps should say that I didn't  
17 know, I don't know the sender of the email, Aynura Ahadova I saw the  
18 title she used to sign it off, but then I saw that the email was addressed to  
19 me and copied to Mehman Orujaliyev To me, that was very significant  
20 because Mehman Orujaliyev is the head of the joint ventures and alliances  
21 department. Mehman Orujaliyev is one of the two SOCAR board  
22 members on our alliance board, and to me, that gave it a lot of authority  
23 and indicated that it was something I should look at and, if you like, take  
24 seriously, so I read it. I tried to find out a little bit about it and I  
25 immediately referred it to our SOCAR representative who was the  
26 SOCAR employee embedded in our operations to inform him that I had  
27 received it and really asked him to look into it and find out what was it  
28 about and what the expectations of us from his management work.

29 Nate Wright: Could you say just one more time just to make sure we have it clear for the  
30 record what this Mehman Orujaliyev was his position was at that time?

31 Witness: Sure. The way we operated at McDermott was in an alliance. There was a  
32 formal agreement which was to form the SOCAR McDermott alliance to  
33 undertake the work at the project and that alliance had a governing  
34 structure and the governing structure provided for two management  
35 representatives from each entity. Two from SOCAR, two from  
36 McDermott. Mehman Orujaliyev was one of the two SOCAR board  
37 members of the alliance.

1 Nate Wright: Were you one of the board members from McDermott?

2 Witness: No, I was not. I was, if you like, the ... Effectively the chief executive  
3 reporting to the board. My job was a day-to-day job, very much, if you  
4 like, hands on. Part of that job was to prepare reports to the board who  
5 would then give direction and take any necessary decisions on the  
6 direction of the alliance. I was not a board member, but I attended board  
7 members ... I'm sorry. I attended board meetings in order to brief the board  
8 and provide progress reports.

9 Nate Wright: You're receiving this because you're one of the chief executives for  
10 McDermott in the region. Was that you're understanding?

11 Witness: That's correct. Very much so. I was the senior McDermott person in the  
12 region, and as I said, when I saw that Mehman Orujaliyev was copied on  
13 this, I realized that it was coming with, if you like, some imprimatur from  
14 our board

15 Nate Wright: You had mentioned that you then sent this or had a conversation with one  
16 of the SOCAR representatives that was embedded in the project team to  
17 ask about expectations and things like that. What, if anything, did that  
18 representative get back to you and say?

19 Witness: Yes. That's quite so what I did. I asked him to find out about it and he  
20 came back within a pretty short time. I'm sure he made some telephone  
21 calls and came back to tell me about the nature of this convention that it  
22 was ... It's a big, quite a large convention, that it was something that  
23 SOCAR was keen to ensure, took place and took place well. It was a  
24 successful event. I supposed in a way, it showed Azerbaijan and its  
25 capabilities well to those attending the convention, and he told me that he  
26 had spoken with his management in SOCAR that they would be pleased if  
27 we, as one of the alliance partners, and he also told me that a number of  
28 other alliance partners were being approached that as really a community  
29 of the international companies who were operating in Azerbaijan  
30 especially those with US parents, if we as a community would be prepared  
31 to provide a little sponsorship to the conference. That was essentially the  
32 nature of it.

33 Nate Wright: I'd like to ask about the second paragraph where it talks about the  
34 organizers. Was it important to you who was organizing the convention?

35 Witness: I suppose it was of interest to me. The way we operate as a company. It  
36 was then a matter of referring this to my colleagues in other parts of my  
37 company to vet these entities and find out about them. I was not especially  
38 familiar with the entities. I certainly am familiar with John Hopkins

1 University and some of the work it does, but I wasn't particularly familiar  
2 with these individual entities. While it was of interest to me, it wasn't so  
3 much important to me as it would have been important to my colleagues.  
4 Then under our process is it was my role to refer this to others.

5 Nate Wright: Okay. Why do you think that SOCAR was asking for sponsorship both  
6 from McDermott? You mentioned that there were a number of other  
7 alliance members being approached. Why do you think SOCAR was  
8 doing this?

9 Witness: I really didn't know. I asked my colleague, the representative embedded in  
10 our project team from SOCAR. Really the background was this ...  
11 Effectively my question was in lieu of the fact that the sponsorship isn't ...  
12 Sorry. The conference isn't exactly being organized by SOCAR itself, it is  
13 something that SOCAR is supporting and, if you like, promoting? And the  
14 answer was yes very much so.

15 Nate Wright: Okay. Now I want to turn to another document.

16 Witness: Okay.

17 Nate Wright: The beginning of the document, there's MCD OCE 232, but I'd like to  
18 direct your attention to page 235.

19 Witness: Just a minute, let me scroll down to that one. 235?

20 Nate Wright: Yes.

21 Witness: Just a minute.235, yes, I have that now.

22 Nate Wright: Okay. I want to start with the bottom email from Bruce Hatton and it  
23 appears that this is two days after the invitation email we just looked at,  
24 but I realize you probably didn't see it until a little bit later when it was  
25 forwarded to you. But what is your reaction to the contents of this email?  
26 It talks about that Hatton had a conversation with representative Poe, that  
27 he plans to attend the convention. Did that make you more inclined to seek  
28 sponsorship from McDermott or what was your reaction to this email?

29 Witness: Yes, if I may, can I just explain some of the names on it. It might just help  
30 you with understanding, but Bruce addressed this to three people in the  
31 company, Stewart Mitchell, Ravisankar Mamidanna, Gulia Taghiyeva in  
32 May of 2013. I explained I think I returned to Azerbaijan. I had worked  
33 there previously. There had been another operations for 5 years or so. I  
34 returned to Azerbaijan operations in October 2012. When I returned, I  
35 actually replaced Ravisankar Mamidanna, so I was reporting to Stewart

1 Mitchell and I was taking the role that Ravisankar Mamidanna previously  
2 held. That kind of explains the names.

3 Your question as to when I did get to see this ... seen that Bruce had  
4 referred to a meeting with a congressman from Texas. No, that didn't  
5 really cause me to think any differently about sponsorship. It did cause me  
6 to think that's why I needed to contact Bruce and find out a bit of  
7 background as to whether there was further information I needed about  
8 Bruce's role, any information Bruce had, anything that Bruce might like  
9 me to do or observe or report on or pick up on for the conference. It was  
10 really, really more that. I suppose my response was more of an operational  
11 response than it was a sponsorship response in terms of seeing that Bruce  
12 had named someone, kind of triggered me that we needed to find out about  
13 that a bit.

14 Nate Wright: Okay. In this email, Bruce references that there's going to be meeting  
15 between Representative Poe and the president of Azerbaijan and he also  
16 references that Representative Poe is going to deliver and address ... Was  
17 there anything that you would want him to say in either of those forums?

18 Witness: No. I don't believe or recall that there's anything that we would want a  
19 congressman to say. It was really from my point of view making sure that  
20 Bruce had the information he needed if he needed to brief Congressman  
21 Poe before he participated in the conference.

22 Nate Wright: Okay. I want to direct your attention now to the top of page 235 and it  
23 might be helpful to flip back over to 234 because I think it shows the top  
24 of the email from Gulia where she sent this chain along to you. It looks  
25 like she sent you the email chain from Bruce and then also attached ... I  
26 think the first email that we looked at is the invitation by SOCAR. Does  
27 that sound correct?

28 Witness: I can't recall the attachment but yes that certainly sounds correct. I think as  
29 I mentioned, Bruce had directed his email to actually my predecessor  
30 rather than to me, but he also copied Gulia so Gulia was playing catch up  
31 and making sure that things that were sent to the person, to the name  
32 rather than the position got to the person now filling the position.

33 Nate Wright: Okay. She mentions we've been invited by SOCAR, but she doesn't  
34 mention the other organizers. Is that because ... Why is that do you think?

35 Witness: Well, I think because the invitation did come from SOCAR. Clearly when  
36 we look at that invitation, they explained that there are other entities  
37 organizing the conference but the fact that the conference was taking place  
38 was brought to our attention by SOCAR and our discussions as to what, if

1 you like, SOCAR's expectations of us and others in the community were  
2 with SOCAR themselves. Maybe rightly or wrongly, we were thinking in  
3 terms of SOCAR's sponsorship, if that's the right word. That's not the right  
4 word. SOCAR is interested in encouragement in the conference rather  
5 than the actual organizers, I would say.

6 Nate Wright: Okay. You were more interested in where the invitation came from than  
7 say that Representative Poe is going to be at the convention? Is that ... Am  
8 I mischaracterizing you?

9 Witness: No, I don't think you are. I think that's correct. I mean my interest if that's  
10 the right word in the convention was really much more what role I should  
11 take being resident in Azerbaijan and what SOCAR might expect with us  
12 rather than who might be attending from the states.

13 Nate Wright: Okay. I want to switch to another document, MCD OCE 129.

14 Witness: 129, yeah?

15 Nate Wright: Yes.

16 Witness: Just a minute. I have it. Yes, 129.

17 Nate Wright: Okay. You can take a minute if you'd like to refresh your recollection and  
18 glance through it.

19 Witness: Yes, go ahead.

20 Nate Wright: Okay. Do you recognize this?

21 Witness: Yes, I do.

22 Nate Wright: Okay. Why is it that the assembly of friends of Azerbaijan is inviting  
23 McDermott to sponsor, it looks like roughly nine days after the initial  
24 invitation from SOCAR?

25 Witness: Yes, that's right. Probably there's a week or so after that and ... When I  
26 first request ... I mean I mentioned that I asked by SOCAR colleague, the  
27 representative who was embedded in our office to kind of find out about it.  
28 Then the next person I contacted was Gulia, our public relations manager,  
29 who had a role in these types of activities to look into it as well. I know  
30 she also followed up with SOCAR to find out more information.

31 Then within the week or so, this document arrived, which was pretty much  
32 consistent with the email we had from SOCAR where it was SOCAR who

1 contacted us, that it's there in their initial invitation or their initial  
2 correspondents that it was other parties who were organizing the  
3 conference. This seemed to be the follow up that next layer of follow up  
4 from the actual organizers to us directly.

5 Nate Wright: What is the assembly of friends of Azerbaijan?

6 Witness: I was not familiar with that at that time and I think as I mentioned earlier  
7 that at this stage then it was kind of my role to talk to this colleague as a  
8 part of that company to look into and to vet the entities who are contacting  
9 us with respect to sponsorship.

10 Nate Wright: Do you know what, I'll refer to it by its acronym of AFAZ. Do you know  
11 what AFAZ's relationship was with SOCAR?

12 Witness: No, I did not.

13 Nate Wright: Okay, when you reached out to SOCAR representatives and you also  
14 mentioned that Gulia may have reached out to representatives with  
15 SOCAR, did they ever articulate their relationship with AFAZ?

16 Witness: Certainly not to me. My discussions were probably pretty brief on that I'm  
17 not aware whether they do it or not with Gulia, but they didn't with me,  
18 no.

19 Nate Wright: Okay. Why would this letter go to Gulia? Would someone have told ...

20 Witness: Probably because it was Gulia who had contacted SOCAR. We got that  
21 email a week or so earlier, I asked my SOCAR embedded colleague to get  
22 a little bit more information which he did and then within a day or so we  
23 passed that on to Gulia and I understood Gulia then got in touched with  
24 people at SOCAR to follow up and to commence the process of  
25 determining whether we would be in a position to sponsor.

26 Nate Wright: Okay. I want to go real quick to the second to the last paragraph on this  
27 first page, 129. It talks about assembly of friends together with the  
28 Turquoise Council will serve as the sole organizers at the convention. Do  
29 you know what happened to the other organizers of the convention  
30 mentioned in that first email we looked at, the USAN, John Hopkins  
31 Caspian Strategies Institute?

32 Witness: No, I do not. I don't know.

33 Nate Wright: Did that raise any questions to you, that the organizers were changing this  
34 close to the time of the convention?

1 Witness: I didn't focus on it. Firstly at that time, what I did do is make sure that this  
2 information was brought on to my colleagues in our internal compliance  
3 organization to look into those issues and to vet the entities that were  
4 involved.

5 Nate Wright: Okay. I want to ask. There is another document provided to us. It is MCD  
6 OCE 473. It's another version ...

7 Witness: 473?

8 Nate Wright: Yes. It's another version of this same letter that was produced to us and it  
9 was produced to us with designating you as the custodian. Do you have  
10 that one in front of you yet?

11 Witness: I have 473 on my screen now, yes.

12 Nate Wright: Okay. This is one that was produced to us at least designating you as the  
13 custodian and you'll see TCAE, that portion was highlighted. Do you  
14 remember highlighting this?

15 Witness: No, I don't. I don't believe I highlighted that.

16 Bryson Morgan: Okay. Could you tell us a little bit about the process that would have been  
17 completed by McDermott to vet the organization's AFAZ or TCAE or  
18 whoever was receiving the money?

19 Witness: Yes, I'll tell you what little I know because in fact the processes are I don't  
20 participate in, but I'm generally aware. Let me first, if I may, just say that  
21 the, in the normal course when we have requests for sponsorship or really  
22 in any form of funds going outside the corporation, we do that on an  
23 annual basis and we do it in the financial year prior to the event date. In  
24 the normal course, had we learned about this event ahead of time being  
25 held in I think it was May 2013, the time to submit the requests for  
26 sponsorship had been vetted and approved or not approved and ruled on  
27 by our corporation would have been approximately 9 months or so earlier,  
28 probably in about the third quarter of the preceding calendar year or  
29 financial year. That's our normal process.

30 From time to time, we do get requests which don't comply with one year's  
31 notice and then we take those as received on an ad-hoc basis and clearly  
32 that was the case. On this occasion, we only had notice of this event  
33 literally a couple of weeks before the event, so it was done on a one-off, if  
34 you like, expedited basis. Really the person most familiar with the process  
35 itself was Gulia, so I asked Gulia to submit an application and see whether  
36 it may or may not be approved by the corporation.

1 I'm aware that the first step of any such request is for vetting to take place,  
2 but I'm really not familiar with the way the vetting takes place. It's done  
3 within our compliance group, and our compliance group has staff to do  
4 these things. Some of those staff are attorneys and they look into these  
5 matters, do whatever vetting may need to do to satisfy themselves, to  
6 know them and make a recommendation for management approval, but  
7 more than that I really can't say because I've not actually participated in  
8 one of those vetting exercises.

9 Nate Wright: Okay. All right. Who is Kemal Oksuz, the author of this letter?

10 Witness: I don't especially know. The only guidance I have there was the way he  
11 signed which was, as the senior officer of AFAZ, but I have no other  
12 information.

13 Nate Wright: Did you know any relationship he may have had with the other organizer  
14 indicated on this document, TCAE?

15 Witness: No, I didn't and I have to say that I mean my kind of role was to pass this  
16 onto my colleagues, but no I had not such information.

17 Nate Wright: What was his relationship with SOCAR?

18 Witness: I don't know. The only thing I knew was that it was SOCAR who  
19 contacted us essentially requesting that we participate as a sponsor in this  
20 event and in explaining who in the first correspondence who the  
21 organizers were, but I don't know of any relationship between either the  
22 individuals or the organizations with SOCAR.

23 Nate Wright: It looks like based on this document, AFAZ is based in Houston. Does it  
24 seem unusual to you that a Houston, like a US-based company is getting  
25 SOCAR to send out invitations to sponsor an event?

26 Witness: Not especially, I suppose. I mean SOCAR certainly has a global footprint  
27 themselves and I suppose at that time I just assumed that SOCAR had  
28 decided that this conference was a worthwhile event and they would like  
29 to assist the organizers in having it take place, but more than that, I don't  
30 know.

31 Bryson Morgan: Was that an unusual thing for SOCAR to be doing in your experience or  
32 were they, on a number of occasions, involved in inviting McDermott or  
33 inviting other companies to sponsor events?

1 Witness: To my recollection, this is the only time we had been approached by  
2 SOCAR to sponsor an event that they weren't, if you like, personally  
3 hosting.

4 Bryson Morgan: Were there other times where you were asked to sponsor events that  
5 SOCAR was hosting?

6 Witness: To an extent, I mean we had been a participant in an annual conference or  
7 industry conferences. We had been asked to sponsor publications in which  
8 they were also involved. At that time, I had returned to Azerbaijan in the  
9 October of 2012. I've been there about perhaps 6 months, 7 months,  
10 something like that. I hadn't in that time had any other request of this  
11 nature, so for me, it was the first time I had a request from SOCAR along  
12 those lines.

13 Nate Wright: Okay. I want to turn to MCD OCE 128.

14 Witness: 128.

15 Nate Wright: Yes.

16 Witness: Mm-hmm (affirmative).

17 Nate Wright: Specifically your email toward the top dated May 17. You write, we are  
18 being strongly encouraged by SOCAR so we need to prepare a  
19 sponsorship request ASAP. What did you mean by that?

20 Witness: Let me just pull it up. One, two ...

21 Nate Wright: Okay.

22 Witness: Yes, I have it. This was within I think a week or so of getting the initial  
23 request. I was on just a little pressure of time because I was leaving  
24 Azerbaijan at that time on a trip and really wanted to make sure that we  
25 did at least get an application for sponsorship for our internal application  
26 for vetting and management approval underway. Actually if I think back I  
27 doubted that we had the lead time available to process an application and  
28 get approval within the very short time frame, a couple of weeks before  
29 the event. As we had been asked by our alliance partner SOCAR to  
30 participate in this event, it was apparently going to be an event that they  
31 thought was important that we at least make the effort to submit an  
32 application. At this particular time I was under a little bit of pressure time  
33 because I was going to be away for a few days so I wanted to see if we  
34 could get the application in before I left.

1 Nate Wright: How was SOCAR strongly encouraging you?

2 Witness: Reading back, that sounds like maybe a little bit of dramatic license  
3 associated with that expression. The encouragement that I was getting was  
4 through our embedded representative, that's all, who had been in touch  
5 with his management and he brought the message back for me from his  
6 management effectively from Mehman Orujaliyev that SOCAR was keen  
7 to see this event take place and keen to see it successful and would be  
8 pleased if we and others with their alliance partners would participate.  
9 That was really, really it. The strong encouragement from SOCAR was  
10 really a few reminders and phone calls and discussions with our SOCAR  
11 representative.

12 Nate Wright: Okay. Did it strike you as odd that SOCAR was, that this convention was  
13 important to SOCAR when SOCAR wasn't personally hosting it?

14 Witness: I suppose in a way it was a little puzzling but given the nature of it and the  
15 size and the logistics, it seemed that SOCAR was, although they weren't  
16 the organizer, SOCAR themselves were putting some resources into  
17 assisting the organizers.

18 Bryson Morgan: Did you have a sense of what the role of the organizers was? Was it I can  
19 think of sort of in one end of a continuum, you would have SOCAR status  
20 of being that that is similar to McDermott and that they are providing  
21 funds as a sponsor but not really involved in the organizing or planning of  
22 the convention. On the other end of this continuum would be a situation in  
23 which SOCAR has essentially hired the organizers to put on the  
24 convention on SOCAR's behalf. Can you give me a sense of where on that  
25 continuum you felt this convention was?

26 Witness: I think that's probably a good question or perceptive question, if you like,  
27 of the way things happened in Azerbaijan because an event of this size or  
28 magnitude with these sorts of participants simply wouldn't happen if  
29 SOCAR weren't, a, supporting it and, b, probably fairly actively involved.  
30 Along that continuum at the one end of SOCAR really just being a  
31 nonparticipating sponsor that really wouldn't see it happen.

32 At the other end of SOCAR engaging someone to organize on their behalf,  
33 I don't think it would go that far. What I would have guessed from an  
34 event like this to happen in Azerbaijan, I would certainly have expected  
35 that SOCAR was firstly supportive of the whole concept and secondly  
36 providing resources to assist with it, with its organization and with it  
37 taking place. Maybe somewhere along the middle of that continuum,  
38 perhaps a little more than the middle towards the end of more involvement  
39 by SOCAR in this. But for an event like this in Azerbaijan, I would have



1 Nate Wright: Then down at the bottom email from Bruce Hatton to yourself and Gulia,  
2 it talks about providing talking points to Representative Poe. Did you  
3 review any talking points that were provided to Poe?

4 Witness: Well, that were provided to Bruce, yes. My correspondence was with  
5 Bruce but Bruce had asked for a little information which I sent back to  
6 him, yes.

7 Nate Wright: Okay. Is that information that's at the bottom 233 over to 234?

8 Witness: That's right. We were able to provide Bruce in pretty short order with a  
9 write-up with some information that had been available to us. Then Bruce  
10 had some questions and we responded to those questions.

11 Nate Wright: Okay. Then in your email in the middle of page 233, you say that you've  
12 given two names provisionally, but you don't know if you could get  
13 approval for sponsorship, so by ... Am I correct? By May 21, you had  
14 made the decision to seek sponsorship?

15 Witness: Well, yes, I think that by then, indeed, because I think we just looked at  
16 the message which was a couple of days earlier on about the, I can't recall,  
17 was it 17th or 18th. We're going have to get with Gulia on the preceding  
18 Friday to get the information together to commence a sponsorship request  
19 and then on the back of that, reading through, if you like, the rules of  
20 sponsorship, the lowest level of sponsorship was a silver sponsor and  
21 that's associated with getting two tickets to an event or some events.

22 On that assumption, that ... Certainly on that basis that basis that we were  
23 submitting an internal application for silver sponsorship. If that were to be  
24 approved, then the other entitlement would be to two tickets ... That means  
25 we needed to get names. I got two names. I asked my colleagues what  
26 their expectation was, who should be attending. Should this be Azerbaijani  
27 staff or expatriate international staff and they made it clear to me that  
28 those involved from SOCAR would be pleased if I attended and then one  
29 of my other senior colleagues ... I nominated one of my senior Azerbaijani  
30 colleagues at government affairs management.

31 Nate Wright: Okay. When you talk about giving two names, those names were given to  
32 SOCAR?

33 Witness: Well, those names were given to Gulia and I'm sure they went through to  
34 SOCAR because it certainly seem to me that SOCAR was doing a ...  
35 compiling a list maybe for the organizers but that was one of the roles they  
36 were taking with SOCAR who was asking us who our attendees would be.

1 Nate Wright: Okay. Then I think MCD OCE 134.

2 Witness: 134. Just a minute. Yes, go ahead.

3 Nate Wright: Is this bottom email where Gulia was supplying the names for the  
4 convention?

5 Witness: Yes.

6 Nate Wright: Okay. These are ...

7 Witness: I think we ... The other correspondence we saw was on the Friday and by  
8 this, this is the next Tuesday by which time I believe we had actually  
9 submitted our application internally. Based on having submitted an  
10 application, we were giving them on a heads-up as to who the attendees  
11 would be if the application came through.

12 Nate Wright: Okay. The people in the to and the CC line, who are these people?

13 Witness: I recognize the last ... There are five names there in the CC line. I  
14 recognize the last 3 there are my colleagues in McDermott. The first two  
15 names in the CC, I believe they are staff within the SOCAR group. I  
16 believe, I don't know, but certainly that was my at least assumption when I  
17 saw this email.

18 Bryson Morgan: Okay. Is Ismailova, he is in SOCAR. Is that correct? I think if you look  
19 over on 135, the email comes from him.

20 Witness: Yes, I believe so, yes.

21 Nate Wright: Is that a person you were familiar with?

22 Witness: No.

23 Nate Wright: Okay.

24 Witness: My dealings with SOCAR were pretty limited in the number of people I  
25 dealt with. We had an embedded representative and I dealt with him and  
26 with three of this management team. He had a staff in SOCAR who did a  
27 lot of transactions my staff dealt with but I didn't know them.

28 Nate Wright: Okay. I want to ask some questions about the sponsorship process to the  
29 extent you know and I realize that you have a more limited role in it, but I  
30 guess I just had some questions that maybe you can help me shed some  
31 light on. Do you have MCD OCE 138?

1 Witness: 138. Mm-hmm (affirmative). Yes, I have that.

2 Nate Wright: He wasn't on this.

3 Bryson Morgan: The 377?

4 Nate Wright: Yeah. The bottom complete email from Susan Smith to Saliba Tawil. She  
5 talks about ... She asked did you happen to vet TCAE? Then up at the top,  
6 the response is, initially she couldn't access the website, but the invitation  
7 letter was from the Assembly of friends of Azerbaijan. Do you remember  
8 anyone asking you about ... asking you to help in vetting these  
9 organizations?

10 Witness: No, I don't and I don't remember it because I don't believe it took place in  
11 that sense. I didn't see these emails until quite recently. I normally  
12 wouldn't. The vetting process is kind of contained within our compliance,  
13 our procedures in our organization, so really, to me, now it will sound  
14 quite normal. I know the people. I know their roles in the company, but I  
15 was not involved at that time.

16 Nate Wright: Okay. All right. You attended the least portions of the convention. Is that  
17 correct?

18 Witness: That's correct. Yes. In fact, I attended two things. I received specific  
19 invitations to the opening dinner and then the next morning to the gala  
20 dinner I suppose it was. Then the next morning to the opening session of  
21 the conference and I attended both, two of them.

22 Nate Wright: The opening dinner was hosted by SOCAR. Is that correct?

23 Witness: Look I don't know. I can't say with certainty who the host was. It was  
24 certainly a big event. In fact, it turned out I was one of the hosts because  
25 when I got there, the seating plan had me listed as a local host for a table,  
26 but yeah, it seem to me that SOCAR was largely involved with that.

27 Nate Wright: Did it seem unusual to you that McDermott was being treated as a sponsor  
28 for the convention even though you hadn't gotten sponsorship approval  
29 yet?

30 Witness: It did. I actually doubted that we would get sponsorship approval in the  
31 time available, and that proved to be the case. There just wasn't enough  
32 turnaround time to both do the vetting and get management approvals. I  
33 actually thought that we will be timed out. By not having confirmed to be  
34 sponsors, we perhaps wouldn't be ... the invitations to attend wouldn't be  
35 extended to us. That proved not to be the case. I was a little bit surprised. I

1 believe it was on the morning of the day at the dinner or it might had been  
2 on the afternoon of the day of the dinner.

3 We, my office had a telephone call from SOCAR. They said they had  
4 invitations ready for us that those invitations, there was a lot of security  
5 involved, associated with the event and that entrance would be strictly  
6 based on having invitation in hand and some coordination was required to  
7 get the invitation to us in time to attend the dinner. It was kind of a little  
8 bit like that. I was a little bit surprised to be invited at short notice when  
9 we hadn't confirmed our sponsorship yet.

10 Bryson Morgan: Do you recall who with SOCAR made that phone call to you?

11 Witness: To my PA. I mean it was a staff in SOCAR calling staff in our office to  
12 say that they had an invitation ready for me. I remember my PA coming to  
13 tell me that she had a call and that was I free to attend this dinner tonight  
14 because there was an invitation being hand carried over to the office or  
15 something to that effect.

16 Nate Wright: Okay. You mentioned that there was a security at the event. Were there  
17 other people there where there were sort of volunteers directing traffic?  
18 Do you remember people helping with logistics for the event?

19 Witness: Yes, there were many people directing traffic and helping with logistics,  
20 but I don't believe they are volunteers. I think that was the Azerbaijan  
21 Police Force. It was a big event and there were roads closed, barricades  
22 up, checkpoints and police officers are pretty much everywhere making  
23 sure that only those people with invitations made it through.

24 Nate Wright: Okay. Is that the same with ...

25 Witness: I'm going to say that that's not unusual in Azerbaijan. Clearly the president  
26 of SOCAR was attending. I suspect the ministry of energy, maybe some  
27 other government ministers, that could be kind of normal for an event with  
28 senior attendees like that.

29 Nate Wright: Who did you interact with at the convention? Did you have interactions  
30 with SOCAR at the convention?

31 Witness: Very, very briefly. I went to the dinner by myself and I saw some people I  
32 knew. I spoke to some people briefly and then I had an assigned seating  
33 plates which I went to and that was pretty much it. I did speak to a couple  
34 of SOCAR people I knew. I mentioned earlier my day-to-day dealings  
35 with an embedded representative and then he had a management team he  
36 reported to which was really ... I mean there were three people I dealt

1 with, the two board members and one other manager in SOCAR and I  
2 certainly recall speaking to one of those three I saw in the evening. I spoke  
3 to him. The rest of it, it was a big event. I mean there were hundreds and  
4 hundreds of people and the rest of it was really just meeting people as you  
5 went at the dinner.

6 The next morning at the convention, it's the same. I went to that by myself  
7 and saw a handful of people I knew from other places and spoke to them. I  
8 didn't particularly spend much time or a long time with SOCAR people  
9 and I did in fact meet a lot of new people at both events.

10 Nate Wright: Were you provided transportation to get to the event or did you provide  
11 your own transportation?

12 Witness: I provided my own transportation. The way we operate in Azerbaijan is  
13 we had at that time some staff cars and some staff drivers and I had our  
14 McDermott car driver who took care of me.

15 Nate Wright: Okay. Did you see what role AFAZ was playing in the convention while  
16 you attended?

17 Witness: Specifically AFAZ probably not particularly. I recall being just a little bit  
18 confused as to who was AFAZ and who was Turquoise and ... but clearly,  
19 those groups were playing a role in introducing speakers. They were  
20 giving some background as to their role as organizations in sponsoring and  
21 facilitating good relationships between the two countries, but not much  
22 more detail in that really.

23 Nate Wright: Okay. Do you remember if it was the same individual speaking on behalf  
24 both organizations?

25 Witness: No, I don't remember.

26 Nate Wright: Do you recall seeing or meeting Mr. Kemal Oksuz while you were at the  
27 convention?

28 Witness: No, I don't recall. I remember meeting one gentleman from Turquoise or  
29 one of the parts of Turquoise at the dinner that I attended, but I don't  
30 remember meeting any of the other.

31 Nate Wright: Okay. Do you recall that individual's name?

32 Witness: I don't recall their name, but I know where to look it up. Yeah, I made a  
33 copy of some business cards of the people who are on our table at the  
34 dinner and sent those through to Bruce. I have a record of that.

1 Nate Wright: Okay. I want to turn back real quick to some questions about the  
2 sponsorship just to get a little bit of an understanding. I realize you have a  
3 limited involvement in it. If you could look at MCD OCE 479.

4 Witness: 479? Just a minute. Yes, I have that.

5 Nate Wright: This was I believe included in some packets that talked about the  
6 convention and sponsorship for the convention. Do you remember anyone  
7 asking you what AFAZ was because as you can see on this document and  
8 we actually looked back at the website for the organization in May 2013,  
9 the only information on it is coming soon. I'm wondering were people  
10 concerned about who the Assembly of friends of Azerbaijan was?

11 Witness: I'm not sure how to answer that other than to say within our organization, I  
12 passed that onto our [inaudible] within our compliance group and sort ...  
13 The way we're set up is kind of part of their responsibility to look into that  
14 and to see whether this was an organization that we felt we were able to  
15 provide sponsorship to.

16 Nate Wright: Okay. I want to turn your attention now to MCD OCE 438.

17 Witness: 438. Just a minute. Yes, I have that.

18 Nate Wright: Okay. This is the request for contribution for the convention and I realize  
19 your role may have just been in signing at the bottom. I believe that's your  
20 signature under originator's manager. Is that correct?

21 Witness: Almost, yeah. I think we looked at a document earlier where I was saying  
22 to Gulia, can we please get this drafted by today because I'm going away  
23 for a few days. In fact, I think that document was on the ... I can't  
24 remember the day of the week. I think that was on a Friday. It may have  
25 been the date is about the 17th. I did work with Gulia to draft the  
26 document but it wasn't ready for signing until I had actually jumped on a  
27 plane, so that document was signed on my behalf by my authorized  
28 deputy.

29 Yes, it was signed for me with my knowledge, but actually that's not  
30 literally my signature, but it was signed under delegation authority, so  
31 sorry to be pedantic but that's, yes, I recognize that, yes.

32 Nate Wright: Okay. I guess what my confusion here is to sort of just ask the question.  
33 You get the invitation from SOCAR, then another invitation from the  
34 assembly of friends to sponsor. This form designates TCAE as the  
35 organization that will receive the funds to be paid, and then there's another  
36 document, MCD OCE 123, and in that document, it looks like it's a wire

1 transfer to the Assembly of friends of Azerbaijan. We're trying to figure  
2 out where did this contribution go. Did it go to ...

3 Witness: Right. If I look at 438, that's actually provided in 438 when we submitted  
4 that to both for compliance review and for management approval. That  
5 document says the name and organization which the funds will be paid is  
6 TCAE. Then in the remarks box which we try to be quite precise in  
7 explaining, we said that we had been invited to sponsor and participate by  
8 SOCAR. It was an unusual set of circumstances. We wanted to make sure  
9 to whom this document is being sent, that it was clear that firstly that, we,  
10 locally in Azerbaijan had been approached by SOCAR to sponsor, but  
11 we've been approached by SOCAR to sponsor someone called TCAE by  
12 the time we're at this point of submitting the document.

13 Bryson Morgan: We're just hoping you can explain to us why then it appears that document  
14 with the number 123, that it appears the wire transfer ultimately went to  
15 AFAZ as opposed to TCAE.

16 Witness: Right. I don't know, but my ... At the time I submitted the sponsorship  
17 request or it was submitted on my behalf, with my approval was we ... At  
18 that time, we had thought we understood that the entity was TCAE and it  
19 appears that, that's changed at some time.

20 Bryson Morgan: Okay. Were you involved in that change? I mean you say it appears it  
21 changed. Is that just what you understand from looking at these  
22 documents?

23 Witness: No, look I don't recall being involved in any change of entity. I don't recall  
24 it, but clearly now that I look into documents, it changed.

25 Bryson Morgan: As between these two documents, so looking at 438 and then 123, which  
26 one ... If you were to say which organization the money actually ended up  
27 going to ... would you say the document, the invoice at 123 would be the  
28 more accurate record as opposed to the request?

29 Witness: Actually the 123 isn't so much an invoice. 123 is an internal McDermott  
30 document. MCCI is the acronym of our operating company in Azerbaijan,  
31 so what is this is invoice back up and it is an internal accounting document  
32 which provides the accounting information, the account covered and the  
33 currency, that sort of thing. This is a document generated internally which  
34 would absolutely match up with our banking records. 123 would be our,  
35 from McDermott's books and records, 123 would be part of our records of  
36 the payment.

1 Nate Wright: That would be a more accurate reflection of where the money likely went  
2 than the document at 438 which is just a request for a contribution?

3 Witness: Well, yeah, I think I would say it's stronger. It's not a record of where the  
4 money likely went. It's our accounting record of the payment.

5 Nate Wright: Okay.

6 Witness: It's later dated and it documents the vendor. To us, the vendor is the entity  
7 to then we take the money. This is an accounting record of a payment that  
8 has been approved to be made to a named entity.

9 Nate Wright: Okay. The amount of your sponsorship, \$10,000, it seems small in  
10 comparison to the overall size of the convention. Did you have a sense of  
11 whether or not other sponsors were providing more funding or where was  
12 the funding for this convention coming from?

13 Witness: You may see that in some of my correspondence with Bruce, but that was  
14 a little bit of a puzzlement to me, whether I just didn't spend enough time  
15 reading the documents so I didn't dig into it deep enough. But until I  
16 actually attended the dinner, I really ... and for that matter, the opening  
17 session the next day, I really had no idea how big this convention was and  
18 it surprised me when I go up to the dinner that the dinner was for so many  
19 people. It surprised me that so many of those people were visitors to  
20 Azerbaijan and it didn't take very much mental arithmetic to work out the  
21 sponsorship we were providing was kind of a proverbial drop in the  
22 bucket.

23 The document we were sent with the invitation, the sponsorship had three  
24 grades of sponsorship. I don't have that in front of me now, but we  
25 deliberately chose the smallest, so if you like ... to be polite, to be  
26 responsive but not to burden ourselves financially more than we, if you  
27 like, needed to. It was a silver sponsorship with \$10,000 and I think there  
28 was gold and platinum and they were a little bit higher, maybe \$20,000,  
29 \$25,000. I can't remember. To be honest, when I saw the size of this  
30 convention, even if all of the alliance companies in Azerbaijan and a  
31 number of other American companies clearly have been approached.

32 We have in Azerbaijan a number of other US-based organizations,  
33 accounting companies, various public accounting firms, various others, I  
34 recall, a number of people in the community. But honestly, all of us that  
35 participated still wouldn't be much more than a couple of drops in the  
36 bucket. Yes, I was a little bit almost taken aback by the size and  
37 sophistication of the event given the amount that we were invited to  
38 sponsor.

1 Nate Wright: Did you have any sense of who was providing the rest of the bucket in  
2 terms of funding?

3 Witness: Not in any demonstrable way other than conjecture and clearly this was an  
4 event that was being supported by, if you like, Azerbaijan Inc. By that, I  
5 mean by the Azerbaijan government through ... especially through  
6 SOCAR and therefore presumably through the ministry of energy and  
7 perhaps other ministries as well. I don't know that, but it appeared to me  
8 that significant funds were, if I just do the mental arithmetic as to how  
9 many attendees times the airfares, times the hotel bills, it runs into the  
10 millions and our sponsorship was in the few thousands. It would strike me  
11 that the entities or the organization with the financial capacity to provide  
12 that sponsorship would likely be government entity.

13 Bryson Morgan: I think those are all the questions we have, but while we're still on the  
14 record, if there's anything else you'd like to add, feel free to speak now.

15 Witness: Thank you. As I reflect, I don't believe there's anything that you haven't  
16 covered that I believe I should add, so I think the response from me is no, I  
17 have nothing to add. No. Thank you.

18 Nate Wright: All right. Well, with that, I think we'll stop the recording right now.



- 1 MS. EISNER: This is April 7, 2015. I am Helen Eisner joined by Omar Ashmawy, our  
2 Chief Counsel for the Office of Congressional Ethics. This is review number 15-2786.  
3 We are joined by Michelle Lujan Grisham.
- 4 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: You did that name pretty well, not perfect, but pretty well.
- 5 MS. EISNER: Well teach me how to do it perfectly.
- 6 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Lujan.
- 7 MS. EISNER: Lujan.
- 8 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: You did it. Very nice.
- 9 MS. EISNER: I will get that right in the future.
- 10 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: You don't even need to worry about it.
- 11 MS. EISNER: We are also joined by Pat Fiori? Is that –
- 12 MS. FIORI: Correct.
- 13 MS. EISNER: Okay. So, we will go ahead and get started with the interview. As Omar  
14 mentioned, we're going to show you some documents and just go through everything. I'll  
15 ask some questions, Omar will ask some questions; hopefully it will just be a  
16 conversation. So are you familiar with the Turquoise Council of Americans and  
17 Eurasians?
- 18 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I am.
- 19 MS. EISNER: And how did you become familiar with them?
- 20 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: When they approached our office with the trip invitation to  
21 visit Turkey and Azerbaijan and that's when I became really familiar with them. I was  
22 aware, but just barely that they existed as a Council in terms of people who work in New  
23 Mexico and participate with some legislative activities here? So, I was aware of them, but  
24 didn't know anything about them.
- 25 MS. EISNER: Okay. So you were aware of them just through your work. Was there any  
26 –
- 27 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: In a way that they had a professional relationship with  
28 policymakers, that they... the first time that I knew anything about them at the federal  
29 level, in any context, was when they came to us and presented us with information about  
30 this potential trip and that's it.

1 MS. EISNER: Do you know what kind of work they do?

2 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: They do the policy work in New Mexico that I'm familiar with  
3 and familiar, again, as I'm aware because there's a title related to their educational event  
4 of some kind, is mostly economic development and also cultural exchange; those would  
5 be the two.

6 MS. EISNER: Okay and is there any particular individual there that you are familiar or  
7 anyone that in your office had worked with?

8 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I had met, it's...Kemal? Is that right? Or Resul?

9 MR. ASHMAWY: It could be either one.

10 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: So, one of them... and I apologize for this, but you'd have to  
11 show me a photo, you'd think as an elected official I'd be better at that, but one of them I  
12 had, was familiar to me by sight in New Mexico. And we have about a small legislative  
13 body and I worked in state government for two decades and so that I could tell you that  
14 that's a person that I've seen at the legislature.

15 MR. ASHMAWY: Does the name Kemal Oksuz, ring a bell?

16 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: The last name's not going to – it's going to be the first two  
17 names, Kemal and Resul. Did I do that right or did I just rhyme them now and make it  
18 even worse?

19 MS. EISNER: I think to the best of our ability, that seems... close –

20 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Let me put that in a more professional context. To the best of  
21 my ability that's all I know. Yeah.

22 MS. EISNER: And so, we're not sure exactly of their last names of these people at this  
23 point.

24 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: And I have no professional, prior relationship with them and  
25 no prior Congressional relationship either.

26 MS. EISNER: So how often did you interact with them?

27 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I would... I can't really say there was any interaction before  
28 going to Congress and then the initial interaction was a visit in our office, introducing  
29 themselves to us. You know a ten minute meeting, maybe? And then making us aware  
30 that this trip and I remember when they made us aware of the invitation for the  
31 educational trip that they identified that they... that this trip was important. One of the  
32 reasons it was important is that they tried to create a parallel track for local policymakers

1 and federal policymakers, so that you're looking at some of the state issues as well as the  
2 federal issues that you could make a comparison about that in a policy making context.

3 MS. EISNER: And when did that meeting happen?

4 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: You know... I would - we would have to look. It would  
5 definitely be on our schedule some place, but it would be within some proximity for them  
6 making a formal request about the trip and then having us, then provide all of that  
7 information and documentation to the House Ethics Committee.

8 MR. ASHMAWY: So it would have had to have happened prior to asking for permission  
9 from Ethics to go on the trip?

10 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Right. So they make us aware that they're working on a trip  
11 through their educational foundation, I'm going to call it that; that's what I refer to  
12 everything, every group, every entity. And then they provided them the specifics, which  
13 is basically how we get invited to most of the trips, educational or codels. I don't know  
14 why I'm distinguishing between the two; we treat them exactly the same. Information  
15 comes to the office about the potential, we then say, "got to get us the documentation",  
16 they give us whatever they believe to be the right stuff and then we give everything that  
17 we've gotten to the House Committee on Ethics.

18 MS. EISNER: So I want to talk to you a little bit more about that process, but before I  
19 do, just one other question. Are you familiar with the Assembly of Friends of Azerbaijan?

20 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. I'm aware by virtue, our conversations now and some of  
21 the stuff that's come up you know, outline, but no familiarity with them at all and nothing  
22 until after there were questions about the trip.

23 MS. EISNER: Okay.

24 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I didn't notice anything about them.

25 MS. EISNER: So, let's get into that process you know when the educational foundation  
26 comes to you and says that they want to bring you on a trip. What is the formal request?  
27 What does that look like?

28 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Well they have to - so that goes to my Chief of Staff. I'm... to  
29 the best of my knowledge, it's the dates of the trip you know, the basic description of the  
30 trip, a reiteration that it's an educational trip and that they are - that they have  
31 independently submitted to the Committee.

32 MS. EISNER: And are those details which they provide or you asked them to provide? Is  
33 that a part of your process?

1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I think it's a combination in our process. You know I've only  
2 been on two trips, so we've... we had an early protocol which is, based on the orientation  
3 for Members of Congress; your office doesn't have the resources to do that due diligence.  
4 You are invited and really highly recommended for – not only trips, but any question  
5 about any ethic activities, you need to come to this Committee and ask us in advance, you  
6 can do that informally or you can do that formally. For any kind of a trip, that's a formal  
7 request; that's in writing from our office, this is what we've been asked, this is what we  
8 have and then we're waiting for you. We don't give any approval to go on any requested  
9 events or trips until we receive permission from the Committee on Ethics. For those two  
10 reasons, right? We don't have the expertise and we don't have the resources; even if we  
11 did to provide that due diligence, so whatever we get goes to the Committee on Ethics  
12 and then we rely on their decision and their review and investigation before we affirm  
13 that we'll participate.

14 MS. EISNER: Sure.

15 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yeah.

16 MS. EISNER: Yeah, no that makes sense. And just –

17 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: And even with this that, will be the protocol moving forward.

18 MS. EISNER: Yeah. Well, so kind of stepping back, just to go through some of the  
19 details of what occurs before it does go to the Committee on the Ethics. You know, it  
20 comes to your staff, you've talked about some of the details that are probably in the  
21 request or maybe you asked for, is there any type of policy or you know, kind of  
22 suggestion for staff about the types of questions they should ask?

23 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No, we ask for the dates, we ask for an affirmation that you've  
24 gone to the Committee, that it's going to be an Ethics approved trip and then we then,  
25 submit everything you've given us back to Ethics saying that we want permission as an  
26 office. Not just that this group says that they can go, right? We also get an affirmation;  
27 it's both. So, that's our process.

28 MS. EISNER: Are there any questions about funding?

29 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No, I don't think we asked. We asked – again, it's just the  
30 dates, the outline of the trip, an affirmation that you went to the Committee on Ethics and  
31 we submit the things you've given us and ... our assumption, which should be a fair  
32 assumption, is they should be doing all of the funding reviews because there's no way we  
33 would have the resources. Even if we asked you for something, how would I know if it  
34 was valid?

35 MR. ASHMAWY: Just to be clear, who should be doing the --

- 1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Committee on Ethics.
- 2 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay, just being clear since we're recording.
- 3 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Which is why we go there.
- 4 MR. ASHMAWY: So, the question is, who should be doing the funding reviews in your  
5 opinion?
- 6 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Well, in my opinion, it's clear that that's a role of the  
7 Committee on Ethics because they have to avoid those trips so they've got the expertise  
8 to do that. I mean for our office, again, not only from the orientation, there is an, I mean  
9 there may be, but I am unaware of any Member of Congress who has the resources or the  
10 staff who have the ability to do this effectively and I wouldn't want to rely to my  
11 detriment that somebody not being able to have the resources and the training to be clear  
12 about who would be an appropriate sponsor or not.
- 13 MR. ASHMAWY: So, did your office have any conversations with any of the people  
14 you interacted with you know, who suggested they were sponsoring this trip about  
15 funding?
- 16 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No.
- 17 MR. ASHMAWY: At all?
- 18 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: To my knowledge, we had no conversations about that.
- 19 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay, how about –
- 20 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Except that, again, and it's not a funding issue, it's... this is an  
21 educational group and you are deemed so by, that's my language, and that you are  
22 deemed so by the Committee on Ethics. That's our litmus test. Go to the Committee, we  
23 know that they're going to do due diligence, we give them everything that we have and  
24 then we wait. And in fact, this trip as I recall, we did not get permission to go until late  
25 and I don't know whether that's, you'd have to tell me, whether that's typical or, or not in  
26 the context of their review process.
- 27 MS. EISNER: Because it seemed kind of late, was there any back and forth with the  
28 Committee about the approval process?
- 29 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: The only thing that I can recall, is that in order to do the  
30 scheduling, it's... do we know? But nothing specific.
- 31 MS. EISNER: Okay.
- 32 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No specific issues.

- 1 MS. EISNER: And I know you already talked about kind of all the details, but just one  
2 more question on that point to cover all my basis, was there any conversation about the  
3 organizations that were involved in this trip?
- 4 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: None. To my knowledge, there was absolute no conversations  
5 except for the educational aspect of the trip and again, basic arrangements: date, time,  
6 place, agenda, all to Ethics.
- 7 MS. EISNER: Okay. So I think we're going to move on to some documents from that  
8 period of time which will hopefully start to jog everyone's memory. So, I am going to  
9 provide THMLG\_0020-22. And I have copies for everyone. If you want to take a second  
10 and look that over.
- 11 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Okay.
- 12 MS. EISNER: So the email address at the top, is that your personal Gmail address? Just  
13 so we're –
- 14 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: That is.
- 15 MS. EISNER: Okay. And on this email, there is – the chain is Resul Oksoy, is that the  
16 Resul we were talking about early on?
- 17 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I'd have to assume that it is. I can't imagine that there's a  
18 second Resul, but I can't confirm that that's the last name because I have no idea.
- 19 MS. EISNER: Sure. And who is Deborah Armstrong?
- 20 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Deborah Armstrong was the Director of the State office.
- 21 MS. EISNER: Okay. So, Deborah forwarded you this email and the email says, towards  
22 the bottom on the first page, "We would make all the flight, hotel arrangements and your  
23 trip is completely covered by Turquoise Council." Did you discuss that statement with  
24 Deborah?
- 25 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No.
- 26 MS. EISNER: Did you discuss any issues related to sponsorship with Deborah?
- 27 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. No and I don't even recall this forwarded email. I mean I  
28 see the chain and I think that's, again, we're trying to get to the scheduling aspects, but  
29 yeah.
- 30 MS. EISNER: Okay. So another document, it's THMLG\_, this is just for the benefit of  
31 the recording of the transcript, 0133-138. And this is a continuation of that same email  
32 chain.

- 1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Okay.
- 2 MS. EISNER: You can see the dates are slightly later here, I think it's April 22<sup>nd</sup> through  
3 24<sup>th</sup>, so it's just kind of following up on this aspect of the trip planning. So, who is  
4 Dominic Gabello?
- 5 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Chief of Staff. Now one thing that you might have to help us  
6 check, I don't know if you checked this, but this is right when I'm changing Chiefs of  
7 Staff. I'm pretty certain that Dominic is the Chief of Staff.
- 8 MS. EISNER: Who was your former Chief of Staff?
- 9 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Just a minute. Letty Mederos. Leticia Mederos, but I think  
10 she's already gone.
- 11 MS. EISNER: Okay.
- 12 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: April...
- 13 MS. EISNER: How do you spell her last name?
- 14 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: M-E-D-E-R-O-S. So, I mean I didn't even think about that  
15 question about who is Dominic, but definitely my employee, definitely an agent of the  
16 office and probably Chief of Staff at the time.
- 17 MS. EISNER: So in this email chain, you can see they're sort of going back and forth  
18 about arranging a time to visit the office and this is an email between Dominic, Resul  
19 Oksoy and Kemal Oksuz. Is Kemal the, Kemal Oksuz, is he the individual you referred to  
20 earlier?
- 21 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I believe he is. Again, I can't confirm the last name, but  
22 I... that's my assumption based with the email chain that those were the two.
- 23 MS. EISENR: Do you know if he did visit the office?
- 24 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Well, I'm going to assume based on this that this is the  
25 meeting that we had in person about the trip. So... a meeting did occur about the trip in  
26 my office.
- 27 MS. EISNER: Okay. And were you present at that meeting?
- 28 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I believe I was.
- 29 MS. EISNER: And what was discussed during that meeting?

1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: So in that ten minute meeting, again, the dates of the trip, I'm  
2 sorry. But the dates of the trip, the basic outline, so you'll go to Turkey, you'll go to  
3 Azerbaijan, here are the policymakers that would be involved, these are the issues that we  
4 want to expose you to, these are the issues that we think are important to you and I think  
5 a clear discussion, this is an educational trip that's going to go to the Committee, we  
6 would also seek individual permission from the Committee before we would determine  
7 whether we could go. I think it's clear, not only based on the emails, but in my earlier  
8 statement about the ten minute meeting, we were interested in the trip, predicated upon  
9 getting permission to go.

10 MS. EISNER: So in addition to talking about approvals and kind of the technical aspects  
11 of the trip, did Kemal talk about the Turquoise Council of Americans and Eurasians?

12 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Nope.

13 MS. EISNER: Did he talk at all about the mission of the convention or the purpose for  
14 the convention?

15 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: The convention and even though I can see that it's identified  
16 here, I was completely unaware of a convention as a separate thing as a parallel to this  
17 trip. So what I have is an agenda, the things that you will do and that might take away  
18 from looking at, maybe not looking at really, but from having a conversation with ... is  
19 that these are meetings with government officials in both Turkey and Azerbaijan and that  
20 it would be Members of Congress and their staff and it would be, or if you took a guest,  
21 they would be participating in those official meetings and local policymakers would be at  
22 a majority of the meetings. And majority is my word, I'm just sort of making the way in  
23 which that conversation occurred, it seemed to me like the local policymakers would be  
24 at the majority, at the trip, they were not in the majority of meetings.

25 MS. EISNER: And who was going to set up these meetings? Who was in charge of  
26 planning?

27 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: The organizations for the trip.

28 MS. EISNER: And that was the Turquoise?

29 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Right and again, without you putting that right in front of me,  
30 it's the educational foundation I'm calling it that, those are, that's my terminology  
31 because I call everyone... that's my taxonomy for who supports these trips – to the  
32 Turkey-Azerbaijan trip, so.

33 MR. ASHMAWY: You were referencing just a moment ago, local policymakers, did  
34 you mean local American policymakers or local –

- 1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No, local American policymakers so legislators primarily, but  
2 not all legislators. And I cannot recall, I apologize, but I am pretty certain from New  
3 Mexico, there were some other local elected officials and when I look on this email  
4 chain, it refers to a former legislator, Al Park and then a James Lewis, who was the State  
5 treasurer and I think... James Lewis was there. Without checking to see who was there, I  
6 don't know that I'm right about that that may just be in my head, but I am certain that in  
7 New Mexico and other states, Texas... and I want to say another state, anyway, but for  
8 sure Texas and New Mexico had legislators and then non-legislators, but other elected  
9 officials on the trip from their state.
- 10 MR. ASHMAWY: Understood. You thought- it was your impression before you had  
11 gone that most of the meetings would have those folks in them? Who would – just out of  
12 curiosity, who ended up being at most of the meetings then?
- 13 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Members of Congress and then government officials.
- 14 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay.
- 15 MS. EISNER: Government officials from?
- 16 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: From Turkey and Azerbaijan.
- 17 MS. EISNER: Okay.
- 18 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: So their parliament, their president, I'm probably going to get  
19 the titles wrong which is bad, the security regime, legislators from Turkey –
- 20 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you remember –
- 21 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: The minority party from Turkey...
- 22 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you remember meeting with anybody from, it's their State  
23 Energy Company, called SOCAR?
- 24 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I do.
- 25 MR. ASHMAWY: What do you remember about that?
- 26 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I remember that it was one of the organized meetings and I  
27 want to say I remember it was a morning meeting. And I -- my take away from that  
28 meeting, same thing, Members of Congress were there, that it was the state person  
29 responsible for that – their energy fund. So, the question that we had that – my question –  
30 this was my take away from that, is, how is that independently audited? And, it is not and  
31 I thought that was an astonishing practice and maybe that's unfair given my American  
32 political background...

- 1 MR. ASHMAWY: Did the SOCAR officials make any specific asks of you guys?
- 2 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. The entire meeting was a presentation about how they do  
3 this fund, how it's a government fund, why that works in that context, how that design  
4 makes a difference, how their energy independence is useful for the region, what that  
5 might look like in energy policy of the future making sure we're dealing with that in the  
6 Middle East and then I was really interested in how do you audit that and who has access  
7 to that information so that it's transparent?
- 8 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you – I mean, recognizing that this was some time ago, do you  
9 recall any conversations about their USA entity, SOCAR-USA?
- 10 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I don't.
- 11 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you recall any conversations about their relationship to the  
12 organization known as AFAZ?
- 13 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No.
- 14 MR. ASHMAWY: Or to –
- 15 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I don't even remember that terminology or that acronym ever  
16 being used. Again, that's the best of my recollection, I mean there's a group of us,  
17 everybody's asking questions and they were very formal and that's what I expected; it  
18 was the... a formal presentation. Good news about that is I expect that they are providing  
19 the same information so that we're looking objectively at the same thing. The bad news  
20 about it is, it's not as organic from a policymaking standpoint that you would desire.  
21 Although we were allowed that, I don't get the sense that we were discouraged from  
22 asking any questions. I mean I thought that the transparency question and could we look  
23 at the – if I requested as the policymaker, your financials come and get those and of  
24 course I don't think I ever asked for that, so we were not discouraged from doing  
25 anything like that.
- 26 MR. ASHMAWY: Did –
- 27 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Not to mention that the international protocol may be why I'm  
28 never invited again.
- 29 MR. ASHMAWY: Did during the conversation or any other time actually during the  
30 conversations, the topic of SOCAR's relationship to the Turquoise Council come up at  
31 all?
- 32 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. I don't, in fact, I am fairly certain, again I appreciate that  
33 disclaimer, hence feeling like it's two years old, I don't think that there was ever a  
34 conversation with any government meeting about the Turquoise Council.

- 1 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay. Sorry, I just went off tangent.
- 2 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No, that's alright.
- 3 MS. EISNER: Do you remember if Kemal or Resul were present at that meeting with  
4 SOCAR?
- 5 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I don't, but I don't think so.
- 6 MS. EISNER: Okay. And then did the SOCAR officials, were people present at that  
7 meeting? Did you see them throughout the convention, the conference in Baku?
- 8 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No, and I'm going to take a, which I probably shouldn't do,  
9 but I'm going to do the same thing you've done, it's very bad pattern and practice you're  
10 creating for me as a witness; the convention you know was, short. There was no  
11 introduction and no meetings with anyone so you picked up the... I think this is right,  
12 breakfast... let me see. Hotel, breakfast at hotel then their convention center which is in a  
13 very interesting architectural, I have to say that was –
- 14 MR. ASHMAWY: We've seen photos.
- 15 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: That was cool.
- 16 MR. ASHMAWY: Looks cool.
- 17 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: It was cool. The outside much better than the inside, inside  
18 like any other convention center, but if you've ever been to Barcelona there's this Gaudi  
19 kind of like, right?
- 20 MR. ASHMAWY: Yes, absolutely.
- 21 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yes, it was Gaudi, so that was for me, interesting. In a badge  
22 and a cup of a coffee and that's always memorable. I can usually tell you when I've had  
23 coffee. And then into the main conference hall and then an announcement that we were  
24 all speaking and that was not on the agenda. I'm usually not happy about that. Even in  
25 my routine and it was all basically kind of introduction, "this is a Member of Congress  
26 from New Mexico" and my name and then you say two minutes, we're delighted to be  
27 invited to visit Baku in Azerbaijan; no idea who's there –
- 28 MR. ASHMAWY: They didn't give you notice ahead of time that they wanted you to  
29 speak?
- 30 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No, none.
- 31 MR. ASHMAWY: Did they reference it afterwards? Did they apologize?

1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No.

2 MR. ASHMAWY: No? Did they offer you guys an honorarium at all? Do you know?

3 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. I mean, they offered me absolutely nothing. That  
4 would've made me nuts by the way, but no. And it was weird in this context, I don't  
5 know how to -- that's probably a poor choice of words, but in the context of the meetings  
6 it was like, this is -- I didn't even notice it was a convention until you're there. Then I  
7 know it's a large educational something; you have no idea who's there and all the  
8 members sat together. We're all on the front row. We all got up and did two minutes, all  
9 introductory based comments. The only substance of stuff I think which I hold as  
10 bragging rights; I want that in the transcript, is the women were a bit tougher about  
11 looking at poverty issues and looking at women's rights and human's rights as we were  
12 on these trips and that we were going to be unabashed on doing that. That was really  
13 mostly the only substance; there might have been a couple introductory remarks by  
14 Members about the energy aspects of visiting Baku and recognizing what that means or  
15 doesn't mean for world energy issues, all valid, but it was quick. So you had every  
16 member do that and then we were back on a van and we went...then I believe the next  
17 thing on the agenda was at the president's house. The president was in that room in that  
18 auditorium. So we're all in a large auditorium.

19 MS. EISNER: So you got this unexpected request to speak, where did the request come  
20 from?

21 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: It's hard to say. I don't even know how to describe it. I mean,  
22 you're like sheep right? You got this approved agenda; they don't let you... you don't get  
23 to go anywhere which is an odd thing. Because I'm new right, at this, so I've been on  
24 government trips and if I'm in a second car, I can stop and get my own coffee or I can do  
25 -- no. You are... you must be at the, you sit together at breakfast, you get marched into the  
26 van, you get marched off the van, you get marched into a place, you get marched off and  
27 so it's not really a request. It's... a door opens, here's your tags, everybody sit down and  
28 someone gets called up to say a few words at this -- in this auditorium. And we all do as  
29 we're, I guess requested... asked. I mean I think it would be impolite to say no and they  
30 weren't asking us to follow a protocol or a series of comments or statements and it was  
31 all introductory. "This is who I am; this is where I represent; thank you for inviting me to  
32 Baku."

33 MR. ASHMAWY: And then did you stay for any of the content of the convention?

34 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. No, they put us right back in the van. Because then we  
35 went to the president's dinner. Or lunch, I called it dinner. Lunch. Which was not at the  
36 same place.

- 1 MS. EISNER: Did it seem like, I know it's kind of hard to tell where the request came  
2 from you know, who was ushering you along as you're going from the van to different  
3 places along the way, but did it seem like there was one organization or any individual  
4 who's responsible?
- 5 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. It really didn't. It just and it seemed just all part of the  
6 same people who were driving and putting you in the vehicles and you know, a company  
7 [indecipherable] a breakfast with the same people in our van. And I think there might  
8 have been enough of us that there were and you'll have to tell me, two vans? Maybe  
9 three? I can't recall. I was always in a vehicle with the Henry Cuellar staff and Hinojosa  
10 and his family? I think that was it. So my sense is that they had three members in their  
11 group plus how were staffed by and I'm going to call it, now I'm going to use your  
12 language which is the Turquoise Council, that they were and it was the same every day. It  
13 didn't switch.
- 14 MR. ASHMAWY: Did you see either Kemal or Resul?
- 15 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I did. It's possible that I saw both that morning, but I can't be  
16 sure. But I – my recollection is that both were at the convention. I do not think both were  
17 at the lunch. I don't think so, but I can't remember exactly.
- 18 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you remember if either one was?
- 19 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I can't remember because they weren't in the van with us.
- 20 MR. ASHMAWY: They were traveling separately?
- 21 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: They were traveling separately, yeah.
- 22 MS. EISNER: So I'm going to backtrack a little bit and go back, just still some of the  
23 initial planning stages and cover a few more documents.
- 24 MR. ASHMAWY: Yeah. Just before we actually do that, just because it occurs to me,  
25 was there any Azerbaijani representative in the van with you guys?
- 26 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No.
- 27 MR. ASHMAWY: So it was just the driver and the Members and their family?
- 28 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yeah and then I don't know how to describe and I don't  
29 remember who it was. There was a person that met us in Turkey? And sort of makes sure  
30 that everything goes the way it's supposed to, keeps you on time and I can't even  
31 remember that person's name. Male, who was with us for the whole trip.
- 32 MR. ASHMAWY: Including the trip to Azerbaijan?

- 1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yes and he was in the van.
- 2 MS. EISNER: Actually let me give you a document and see if this is – this helps –
- 3 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: If you don't have a picture, we might be in trouble.
- 4 MS. EISNER: Unfortunately, no pictures, but we'll see if this helps at all. Okay, so this  
5 is THMLG\_0219.
- 6 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yes. I'm already telling you yes. I recognize Mahmut. Yes,  
7 that's him.
- 8 MS. EISNER: Mahmut. And he was with you during–
- 9 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Always.
- 10 MS. EISNER: Always. Who is he?
- 11 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Well, apparently based on this thing I'm looking at. He is the  
12 president, CEO of Raindrop Foundation so, I mean that's the hard part here, right? Again,  
13 I'll go back to my earlier statement, we have no outline and we have the request and we  
14 have the dates and give that to Ethics and then I just follow what that outline says and  
15 same with the other Members. And it's a bit cheap-like that's how it really works. You go  
16 to the airport and you get on your plane, you get off the plane and this guy who says,  
17 "I'm with the foundation" has a big sign with all your names on it and there's no  
18 introduction about you know, "This is my background, this is who I am, this is why I'm  
19 with you", but clearly, I mean it seemed hard to believe that just a total stranger knew  
20 that we were coming at that appointed time so I don't want to make it sound like we were  
21 completely foolhardy and just somebody could just figure out who we were and go. I  
22 mean they were completely organized, they had all the – they knew who we were; they  
23 knew who were the Members, who were the guests. They had the sign, the vehicles and  
24 he had one or two other people with him, right so that they went in the other vans so  
25 everybody had a type of person. This is how I remember it. In the vehicles, so you got  
26 into the hotel, they were responsible to get you to every meeting and then get you back.
- 27 MR. ASHMAWY: So they kind of kept you guys on track while on the ground in  
28 Turkey and Azerbaijan.
- 29 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yes, both.
- 30 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay, both.
- 31 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yeah. It was not a new group in Azerbaijan; it was the same.

- 1 MS. EISNER: And again, these one or two other people, they seemed like they were  
2 connected to –
- 3 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yes, they all seemed connected and all –
- 4 MS. ESINER: Do you remember their names?
- 5 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I don't and again, if you showed me a picture I could  
6 definitely... I think, at least one and I want to say to the best of my knowledge, he might  
7 have told me he used to be a professor maybe? I don't know? Tall...
- 8 MS. EISNER: Okay.
- 9 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: But I can't remember his name. I apologize. I'm really bad  
10 with names.
- 11 MS. EISNER: A lot of people attended this conference so it's a lot of names. And I think  
12 this goes back to one of the other comments you made, just to clarify who some of  
13 individuals are, but this is THMLG\_0217. And this is an email from April 17, 2013  
14 between you and Dominic Gabello. And he asked who locally was pushing you on the  
15 Turkey trip and your response –
- 16 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Sounds like a Thanksgiving question.
- 17 MS. EISNER: Yeah, it does. So this goes back to April 17, 2013 which is before –
- 18 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Before the other one. Yeah, so and I... you like how I wrote  
19 the Turquoise Turkish group? That shows you I'm clear about the names of people and  
20 very effective at clearly identifying who that is. Al Park would be one of those local, he  
21 was a formal legislator, but still working with legislators and I don't even know if he's a  
22 lawyer, but I worked with him when he was Representative Al Park.
- 23 MR. ASHMAWY: And local to New Mexico?
- 24 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Local to New Mexico, yeah. And I didn't really know which is  
25 fair about this statement, the Turquoise Turkish Group... a little embarrassed; please don't  
26 show me anymore of my emails where my Chief of Staff writes, Turkey trip like  
27 Thanksgiving and I write Turquoise Turkish Group. I'm very now concerned that this is  
28 going to become a public document and someone's going to not take responsibility for  
29 my poor grammar or the fact that I don't use punctuation in any of my texts or capitals.
- 30 MR. ASHMAWY: Nobody does.
- 31 MS. EISNER: Everyone would be in trouble.

- 1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Well my mother would be appalled so please, I ask you, this is  
2 a formal request; do not show these documents to my mother.
- 3 MS. EISNER: So when he says, “who was pushing you”, when he said pushing you,  
4 does he mean—
- 5 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: That’s our local more campaign, familiar, vernacular  
6 taxonomy for who was requesting. You know and I know you’re familiar with this, it’s  
7 something I’m getting more experienced at, on the one hand I work with incredible  
8 young people who have their own way with speaking and sick, hot, mad, weird, I never  
9 know what it all means and are also incredibly smart at the same time...
- 10 MS. EISNER: We’ll try not to use that vernacular –
- 11 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: That’s what it is, yeah. And this is – I would have never read  
12 that as a nefarious or a negative terminology, but yeah. Who’s talking to you? More of a  
13 campaign push, yeah.
- 14 MS. EISNER: Just a few more questions and you know background to the conference.  
15 This is THMLG\_0012-0019. I’m sorry; this is a somewhat long chain.
- 16 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I hope you know now I’m sending Dominic to grammar  
17 school. Yes, professional writing school. I’m pretty sure there is a course in that.
- 18 MR. ASHMAWY: Take a moment to look at that.
- 19 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: May...so it’s after.
- 20 MS. EISNER: This would’ve been right before the conference.
- 21 MS. FIORI: Right before the trip.
- 22 MS. EISNER: Yes.
- 23 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Okay, yeah. This is where I’m trying to understand how come  
24 we’re not in coach and here it’s clear that I’m cheap.
- 25 MS. EISNER: That’s okay; we -- expensive flight there.
- 26 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: It is!
- 27 MS. EISNER: Yeah, no it is.
- 28 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I tried to get out of there and I can’t remember how that all  
29 worked out actually except that it didn’t work out as well as I wanted it to. I was like,  
30 “come on, let us all be in the back of the plane.” I mean we can watch any movies we

1 want, that way. So this looks to me, I'm on page... I don't know what page I'm on; I can't  
2 really tell. 3 out of 8?

3 MR. ASHMAWY: TH –

4 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: We're having conversations about whether or not Ethics has  
5 given us the final okay. We don't know yet, we're not going unless we get it.

6 MR. ASHMAWY: The 3 of 8, is THMLG\_0014.

7 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Okay.

8 MS. EISNER: So, if you had a chance to sort of – I'll give you another second to sort of  
9 look through.

10 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Well I'm now looking at just the flights.

11 MS. EISNER: Yeah.

12 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: If I need something, I'll go back to it.

13 MS. EISNER: Okay. So on the first page, which is page 1 of 8; THMLG\_0012. In the  
14 exchange between Dominic and Kemal, at the end of the exchange, Kemal says, "all is  
15 arranged according to the new Ethics guidelines." Do you know if anyone followed up to  
16 see if it was arranged according to the new Ethics guidelines?

17 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Well, what I know is that, in spite of what they were saying to  
18 us, I was waiting for Ethics approval to come directly to us. So this, to the best of my  
19 recollection, this would not have triggered anyone in my office – and you can ask  
20 Dominic about that – to do anything except, "That's fine. You're getting your Ethics  
21 approval; we have to have a confirmation directly from Ethics." And I think, at least I  
22 read it that way, as soon as we get Ethics, I thought I saw that in here somewhere, we  
23 would let them know, but until we got the Ethics approval that was direct to our office,  
24 we wouldn't confirm that we would be on the trip.

25 MS. EISNER: Right. And then we talked about towards the end of this email exchange,  
26 really from 15 through 19, which is of this stack, 4 through 8; goes through the  
27 arrangements for travel and the –

28 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I think this just goes through the travel.

29 MS. EISNER: It goes to the travel component; it's really the airfare.

30 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Right.

1 MS. EISNER: So, do you know how the airfare was booked? How that part of the travel  
2 was booked?

3 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. My only, as I recall based on, and again, now that I'm  
4 seeing these again, is that I was interested in they identified that you can bring a guest. I  
5 wanted to bring a guest; they offered that their understanding of the Ethics rules is they  
6 could pay for guests and I said I wasn't interested in that. I just... it's a personal issue in  
7 my office and that I wanted as much information so I could make those arrangements if  
8 in fact we were going, based on Ethics approval to my office and so they were trying to  
9 give us information about that.

10 MS. EISNER: Okay. And what information did they provide you?

11 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Well, I know that it's not in here, but at some point, my –  
12 Dominic let me know what the costs for Manuel would be and when I would need to  
13 provide payment because we wanted to make sure we had process to do that and I didn't  
14 know what the process was. Since guests were allowed to come, I didn't even know how  
15 many guests you can bring, but at the time it appeared that I may be the only person  
16 bringing a guest that we were going to pay for and I don't know if that's accurate or not,  
17 but it seemed to us that it may be the case because they... it was easy to get, for them to  
18 cost it out and that's it.

19 MS. EISNER: Did they give you a name of the organization to work with in order to  
20 coordinate that additional part of the ravel?

21 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I don't think so, but I don't know that. At the end, once we got  
22 Ethics approval, we went. I got a final bill; the bill was presented to me by Dominic; I  
23 wrote a check.

24 MS. EISNER: Okay. So some of this we already covered, but just again, who sponsored  
25 your travel to Azerbaijan?

26 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: The group that I keep referring to as the Turquoise  
27 Foundation, is who I was aware was sponsoring the trip or as in an earlier email, the  
28 Turkish Turkey Group or the Turkey Turkish Group. But a group that I believe is, to the  
29 best of my knowledge and according to the House Ethics Committee, is a group that  
30 would meet the educational; I'm calling that broadly, the educational requirements of  
31 folks who can in fact, according to the Ethics Rules, sponsor trips by Members of  
32 Congress. That's who I think they are.

33 MS. EISNER: Any additional conversations that we haven't talked about so far before  
34 the trip about sponsorship or the Turquoise Council and their role in the convention?

35 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: None.

- 1 MS. EISNER: Okay. A few more documents; this is a big stack again. This is THMLG\_-  
2 -
- 3 MS. FIORI: Okay. Either one?
- 4 MR. ASHMAWY: All the same.
- 5 MS. EISNER: All the same, I promise.
- 6 MS. FIORI: Okay.
- 7 MS. EISNER: And this is 0067-0077. These are the traveler forms that you provided to  
8 our office.
- 9 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Okay.
- 10 MS. EISNER: Do you recognize these forms; do they look familiar to you?
- 11 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: They are. That's definitely my signature and I know that we  
12 worked to make sure that we met all the requirements, pre and post trip. And this looks  
13 like you know the final itinerary that we were provided going to the trip. I don't  
14 remember if we had to provide this separately or independently and then it gets reviewed  
15 by compares. And then it looks to me, and I don't know if we provided this as a part of  
16 our post-travel or if you've combined their post-travel disclosure form from the  
17 Turquoise Council. So –
- 18 MS. EISNER: These all came in as a part of the production from your office, so...
- 19 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: So we must have had them, but I don't recall when I was  
20 submitting these to be clear that this was part of the package, but...
- 21 MS. EISNER: Sure.
- 22 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: If that was what was required, we would've downloaded  
23 whatever was required.
- 24 MS. EISNER: Did you review these forms before they were sent to the Committee on  
25 Ethics?
- 26 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: So, I certainly read the stuff that I'm signing and I can't recall  
27 whether or not, because it doesn't say on these, it's number 7 on these forms as I'm  
28 reading it now, says that these things were attached, so I probably made sure that they  
29 were attached and then sent them on their way, but I don't remember.
- 30 MS. EISNER: Did you ever ask anyone at the Turquoise Council, whether other  
31 organizations or sponsors should be listed on these forms?

1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No, because I don't know that there would be anything that  
2 would trigger that request. Again, from our perspective, it's an authorized trip. There was  
3 nothing during the trip that gave me you know any cause for concern, we don't do that  
4 due diligence, but make sure that we file and do everything that we're required to do, pre  
5 and post these trips. And it was our first trip, so... in many ways, I would as I recall, were  
6 learning and having a conversation about did we do everything in the time frame that's  
7 required, did you guys look at the rules again, do we need to call anyone and... but there  
8 was nothing about making sure that this met... I mean this looked like everything we did.

9 MS. EISNER: Once you handed over all these forms to the Committee, did they come  
10 back to you and ask any questions about the forms?

11 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. Not to my knowledge. Nobody's asked me prior to your  
12 communication to us. There was nothing ever again about the trip, except for one thing.  
13 And I just remembered that, there was nothing formal, nothing from a Congressional  
14 group, there was a call at one point from a reporter and I recall one call and it was a de  
15 minimis question, "did you attend?" I think that was basically it. "Can you confirm your  
16 attendance?" and we confirmed.

17 MS. EISNER: Okay.

18 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: And that was it, nothing else.

19 MS. EISNER: So who did you attend the convention with? I know you mentioned  
20 Manuel; did anyone else attend the convention with you?

21 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yes, my director for the Albuquerque, or the district office,  
22 Deborah Armstrong.

23 MS. EISNER: Okay. Do you know who her travel was sponsored by?

24 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: We were all part of the same trip, so she was sponsored by the  
25 very same people I was sponsored by, the Turquoise Turkish Group, the Council  
26 Foundation. I'm worried now, Counsel, that I'm getting everything into my statements. I  
27 apologize and I...

28 MS. EISNER: We talked a little bit about and Manuel, his last name –

29 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Cordova.

30 MS. EISNER: Cordova. Okay. And we talked about how his travel was paid for as far as  
31 the flights and that aspect of it. Other expenses, was there anything else that was covered  
32 that was reimbursed on his behalf?

1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: So again, to the best of my knowledge, we asked that his trip  
2 that... there was a clear separate cost that I wanted to be responsible for every one of  
3 those individual, independent costs. And we let them identify what those costs were,  
4 Dominic reviewed that and then I was asked to write a check so that way I wasn't... I  
5 wasn't deciding what those costs should be. Somebody else did that independently, came  
6 to the office, the office looked at that, gave it to me and I wrote the check.

7 MS. EISNER: Okay. So on – from this packet, this large packet, it's number 77 in this  
8 packet which is, I think the last page here. And this is the traveler form under 5B-2. It  
9 says, "Fiancé (meals only)."

10 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Okay.

11 MS. EISNER: What would that mean?

12 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: It means... will you be accompanied by... let me see. I don't  
13 know why it says, "meals only" actually.

14 MR. ASHMAWY: Is there any chance that was meant to indicate that the only thing that  
15 they were paying for was his meals?

16 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: That can't be accurate. I mean, I realize that that's what that  
17 says, but since I think I paid something around \$4,000.00, he would be a very heavy  
18 eater. So, if I had gotten a bill for... \$1,000.00 or \$800.00, I might've said it can't cover  
19 the flights so the way in which it was described to me, when we were making the  
20 decision about – that he should go, that he'd like to go and that I'd like him to go, that we  
21 had to pay for the airfare and his meals. Yeah. And again, if I received a bill for  
22 something that was far too low, we would've rejected it just out of – that's something I  
23 would definitely be able to, based on my prior travel experience, before being a member  
24 of Congress, that that would be unreasonable.

25 MS. EISNER: Right.

26 MS. FIORI: May I ask a question about this packet? Is it... should it not have the original  
27 Ethics Committee letter and then –

28 MR. ASHMAWY: It should, but this is the series of documents that Representative  
29 Lujan Grisham's office provided so...

30 MS. FIORI: Because I –

31 MR. ASHMAWY: I would assume...

32 MS. FIORI: My... I saw a copy of this and the Ethics Committee's pre-approval in it at  
33 some point, now maybe... the document that I was actually looking at did not have it you

1 know, what... had that attached to it and I didn't realize it, but isn't it supposed to be  
2 included?

3 MR. ASHMAWY: It is and if you refer to the first page, THMLG\_0067, it's indicated  
4 that was included. There's no reason to think it wasn't included, frankly. It's just this was  
5 what was provided to our office; we have no reason to think it wasn't included and if it  
6 wasn't included –

7 MS. FIORI: I think it was.

8 MR. ASHMAWY: The assumption –

9 MS. FIORI: It was included in the original packet.

10 MR. ASHMAWY: Would be that somebody would've kept it back. Frankly. So...

11 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Which I appreciate that question because, again, every rule  
12 that... that we – the requirements in my office and my team and my staff is to be aware of  
13 every rule. If you're confused about a rule, get clarification from the Committee on  
14 Ethics, provide every piece of documentation and make sure that you've got the approval  
15 for any of these activities, which is the standard protocol that we do even today for both  
16 internal issues and I'm going to -- well I'm calling for the purposes of this interview,  
17 external which would be a trip out of district, out of D.C., out of country.

18 MR. ASHMAWY: Yeah. And if there's, frankly, any concern I mean the controlling set  
19 of documents are actually available on the Clerk's website, so...

20 MS. EISNER: And this is just a selection. I mean you were very cooperative and  
21 produced many documents so this is kind of a... it's possible those letters are elsewhere in  
22 the production.

23 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yeah I mean my hope is, is that, as part of this review that if  
24 there needs to be a different due diligence component at the Committee on Ethics, that  
25 that gets included in our recommendation because my office intends because there isn't  
26 an option to continue to rely on that Committee because part of their purpose and  
27 responsibility is to review these requests and to reaffirm and confirm before you actually  
28 step outside of your office, that you are doing so with very, complete authorization  
29 because they believe, based on everything that was submitted and their questions, that it  
30 meets their requirements. Otherwise, I would give advice to new members of Congress if  
31 I was so asked, in an orientation context that it is fool hardy and not good practice to  
32 make individual, independent decisions about these issues without going to the  
33 Committee. That's why they – in addition to their investigatory role, that's why they exist  
34 so that, I hope they're minimizing their investigatory role because members are following

1 the same set of requirements and they are being applied in the same way. That's  
2 definitely how we approach the Committee on Ethics.

3 MS. EISNER: That is definitely understood.

4 MR. ASHMAWY: Just going back real fast to sort of some of the minor logistics of the  
5 convention, of your trip. Do you recall when you were in Azerbaijan, where you stayed?

6 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. A... If you told me the name of the hotel, I might get it?

7 MR. ASHMAWY: There's a couple of options.

8 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Okay.

9 MR. ASHMAWY: It could've been a Radisson, it could've been the Hilton or it  
10 could've been the Four Seasons.

11 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Now, I don't know why I'm saying this, so probably my  
12 counsel will say, "Why did you do that?" I'm so sorry and I'm apologizing to you in  
13 advance. I want to say it was the Four Seasons. I don't know. Again, if you show me a  
14 photo of that hotel... does that mean I have a photographic memory for pictures? I don't  
15 know what that means.

16 MR. ASHMAWY: It does suggest you have a visual memory.

17 MS. EISNER: Yes.

18 MR. ASHMAWY: This is more for us to try to confirm other you know, other  
19 information that we received.

20 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I will say, I'm not aware until your question that there other  
21 places that people were staying. You know my sense was, again, right? You get in the  
22 vehicle, it's the same team; it's with the same people I've been traveling with; we all  
23 went to the hotel and checked in.

24 MS. EISNER: Right.

25 MR. ASHMAWY: To put it more directly, and this is not to read anything into this, this  
26 is just to clarify whether or not other documents we've received from other entities are  
27 you know, correct. We do have a document that shows you and your fellow Members of  
28 Congress likely stayed at the Four Seasons. Is there any reason to think that didn't  
29 happen?

30 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I don't think so and that is the one that sounds familiar to me.  
31 And I again, you know... I'm terrible with that. I can't remember where I ate breakfast  
32 yesterday, but that does sound correct to me. And if you needed to, if you showed me a

1 photo of the inside or the outside of the hotel property, I believe I could confirm that  
2 that's where I was at.

3 MR. ASHMAWY: And while you were there, did you get – and by there, I mean,  
4 specifically Azerbaijan – did you get an impression of who was sort of the overall  
5 organizer, who was handling the logistics, who was sort of making sure that you guys got  
6 to where you needed to go, on time and all of that? Did you get a –

7 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Well for me it was the fellow, whose name I couldn't tell you,  
8 but then I recognized his name from the...one of the email documents that you provided.

9 MR. ASHMAWY: Mahmut. Who is the –

10 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Mahmut, yes.

11 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay.

12 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: So, Mahmut was always present and Mahmut was you know,  
13 there when they dropped us off and I'm not exaggerating that, at 11 o'clock at night. You  
14 are – which is, and I state this because that's now my impression of Ethics approved trips,  
15 you are on a short leash, I get that and you should be. This is the approved trip and you're  
16 all approved to do these activities, so that's the person who's there in the morning at 7:00  
17 or 6:30 when you have to be ready for breakfast; you all sit together; they have a table or  
18 however that... you know, basically it's a table in a hotel restaurant, and then we get into  
19 the vehicle and then we go to those series of meetings for the day, there's usually a lunch,  
20 sometimes dinner was at the hotels, sometimes it wasn't – someplace else. Usually there  
21 was an invited government official, sometimes it was just us and I'm thinking... I'm  
22 adding Turkey to this, not just Azerbaijan. And then when that was done and if there was  
23 any other meeting or because like, one of our meetings was an evening meeting in Turkey  
24 with the minority party and so that one in particular, I remember we got back to the hotel  
25 at like 11 o'clock at night. And you're dropped off and the day starts again, so that's the  
26 only person that I, you know I got a sense about that. Now, I knew that the Kemal and  
27 Razul were around, but I only saw them I think one morning, where we got driven to the  
28 thing that's now, I know as the convention, I didn't realize that at the time. And... I may  
29 have seen Razul; I'd have to look at their pictures again. I may have seen – I think I'm  
30 pretty clear which ones which, I may have seen Razul in Turkey.

31 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay.

32 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: And I don't even remember if it was Ankara or if it was in  
33 Istanbul. Because again, they do, this is your team, here's your team leader, Mahmut. If  
34 you have any problems, this is who you go to. Here's his cell phone number and he's  
35 responsible for making sure that the arrangements that you're aware that you're doing

1 every day occur and he gets you to and from. So we don't worry about getting anywhere  
2 on time or arranging transportation or whether someone's left, everyone's in the van and  
3 all together, ready to go, boom, you go.

4 MR. ASHMAWY: Did you get the impression by any chance – what impression did you  
5 have that you can remember of SOCAR's overall involvement in the convention, in the  
6 trip... you know, in general?

7 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I don't have any sense that they had a larger or a smaller  
8 footprint in any way. I left Azerbaijan thinking they were part of that sort of official,  
9 energy, educational component. I didn't even – I didn't notice it anywhere else really.

10 MR. ASHMAWY: Outside of that one meeting you had with them, were there any other  
11 events with them that they sponsored or they were present at?

12 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yeah, there's nothing in my knowledge, I mean again, and I  
13 know I keep repeating it; I appreciate that you know you want clarification and you need  
14 that. I was with the same group of people every minute of every day. I even got tired of  
15 Manny. So... yeah and the only impression that I had of Azerbaijan is that they didn't  
16 seem to be as an open a government as I expect them to be, right? And now, that was part  
17 of my purpose of the trip... is understanding a little bit more about those countries and  
18 their culture and our relationship with them as a country and... that we were there for  
19 Turkey's demonstration and so you know, that was an interesting thing to witness, being  
20 on the ground and seeing what the reports came out in Turkey. So for me, I didn't notice  
21 any of this.

22 MR. ASHMAWY: If I can take us back to Turkey for a moment. Does – do you have  
23 any awareness of an organization known as Bakiad?

24 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. It's the first I've heard of it.

25 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay.

26 MS. FIORI: Could you –

27 MR. ASHMAWY: Yes. So Bakiad is as far as we understand, is a Turkish, non-profit  
28 that sponsors travel to...

29 MS. FIORI: B-A-K –

30 MR. ASHMAWY: B-A-K-I-A-D.

31 MS. PUARY: I-A-D.

1 MR. ASHMAWY: Yes. Bakiad. You had no – did you have any interaction with an  
2 organization that would've been known as Bakiad while you were in Turkey?

3 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No and again the disclaimer is, I went to the meetings and  
4 there was always a government official at the meeting, could there have been someone  
5 who was sitting in a chair that I would've assumed is an assistant – I mean, there was  
6 nothing that was outward that I'm – occurred at all. I couldn't tell you with 100%  
7 certainty that there couldn't have been an individual that was at a meeting place or  
8 staying at the hotel, but we had no interaction with them. That was direct, right? I mean,  
9 could be... somebody could walk in the room, I can't tell you that they weren't there, but  
10 I can tell you they were not interacting with us as a group. Not in my group.

11 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay.

12 MS. EISNER: Did you attend an event – I mean we talked about the one SOCAR event  
13 that you attended that was on the –

14 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: And I would qualify. I was... for me, it was clearly, it was a  
15 meeting and it looked just like all the other meetings. And that's important for you to  
16 know, that there was nothing that you could've taken away that would've... it was in an  
17 office, it looked like a government building; we talked about the government sponsored  
18 fund and that kind of thing.

19 MS. EISNER: Okay. Well then I should say, did you attend a meeting or an event or  
20 were you invited to attend an event organized by the Azerbaijan – U.S. Inter-  
21 parliamentary Working Group and I'm going to pronounce this incorrect, but the  
22 Milimichliz? Was also sponsored by the American Friends of Azerbaijan.

23 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: What was it?

24 MS. EISNER: We know that other Members were invited to attend this event? And we  
25 know it was sponsored by American Friends of Azerbaijan.

26 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: So I... I'm going to say no. Unless, it's that group sponsored  
27 the meeting and again, there's no way I would've known that, to like this security office,  
28 so in Baku, I was there two days? Does that sound right to you guys?

29 MR. ASHMAWY: I'd have to refer –

30 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I would have to, too. So while you help me confirm, in that  
31 two-day period we went... we did a, I'm going to call it, it was a drive-by almost, a stop-  
32 greet and an exit, the convention which we didn't know it was a convention until  
33 arriving. And I wouldn't even call it a convention. It was a very... and it was part of and  
34 by now you're at the tail end of these trips so you're just going to these meetings. And

1 then we did the lunch and then I think we went to parliament at Baku and then there was  
2 a dinner and I remember there was a Member of the Parliament at my table and then just  
3 Members of Congress and they were lots of New Mexicans; I think there were more New  
4 Mexicans at this series of meetings than any other state. I don't know whether that's a  
5 good thing or a bad thing, but that gives you a sense of that. How we... you know, it was  
6 known that I was going, it was known that many of them were going. And then the next  
7 day, maybe it was that first day too, the energy meeting. And then the second day was  
8 their security? Holy cow... two other meetings and I can't even remember what they  
9 were. And then I think we finished a little bit early, like 5? Or 6? And we were sort of  
10 packing and getting ready to leave in the morning.

11 MR. ASHMAWY: And to put it even more directly, do you recall attending something  
12 called the Azerbaijani – U.S. Inter-parliamentary Working Group?

13 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No.

14 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you recall anything about who may have sponsored the  
15 convention component of this thing?

16 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. I mean, again and I know that... I appreciate that you're  
17 doing your job and I appreciate that you're doing it and you're serious about it, it all  
18 seemed very you know... standards were sort of part of the... I didn't even think about  
19 whether or not there was something else. It was – followed the agenda, got into the  
20 vehicle, did the stuff, they were all very quick. We were introduced to anybody that  
21 directly that I can recall that wasn't part of a government you know, a specific  
22 government component.

23 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you remember meeting by any chance, representatives of like BP  
24 or –

25 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No.

26 MR. ASHMAWY: Conoco Phillips?

27 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No.

28 MS. EISNER: McDermott?

29 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No.

30 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay. KBR?

31 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No.

32 MR. ASHMAWY: Company known as Schlumberger?

1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No.

2 MR. ASHMAWY: In general then, with that understanding, what was the – what was  
3 your sense of the role of the Azerbaijani, the Azeri government with the convention? Or  
4 with the overall trip? I mean were you – is there... in all these meetings, was there  
5 essentially somebody from the government there?

6 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yeah, there was. And I want to kind of qualify this. It's not  
7 like they had a kind of government person in the van who escorted us, but there was  
8 specific meetings, again, that the three that I remember, most specifically was meeting a  
9 few members of the parliament, particularly I remember meeting a woman and going to  
10 their chambers and having them walk us through their election process, their meeting  
11 process, their legislative processes... actually four, the lunch with the president, where we  
12 talked about the president's vision and goals, then the energy fund and the government's  
13 responsibility for a single fund and then the security. And I keep calling him the security  
14 guy; I don't know whether it was the Security Council or the Defense Ministry  
15 or... whatever. And I remember that meeting particularly because people were really tired  
16 and I got a sense from my other members that they wanted me not to ask a question and I  
17 remember I asked another hard question and I don't even remember the question, but it  
18 stumped the security guy and nobody wanted to talk to me. Probably not getting invited  
19 anymore to these trips. And so yeah... there was... so it was always – each meeting in an  
20 official capacity and so I never noticed that that wasn't the case, and the convention in  
21 hindsight, was a little different because it's bigger, lots of people that you couldn't  
22 identify, but we weren't introduced to any of those individuals. We were sort of marched  
23 in and except for the coffee part, which I do recall; I was very happy about it. It was you  
24 know, that Middle Eastern – Turkish coffee was quite delicious.

25 MS. EISNER: Do you know who gave you the coffee?

26 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I pretty much got it myself. I think you could go in, they had it  
27 out and again, we went into the auditorium and then we left.

28 MR. ASHMAWY: So to get into Azerbaijan in the first place, everyone I guess who's  
29 not Azeri, they needed a visa.

30 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yeah, I do remember there was some – some process about a  
31 visa, but I don't remember the specifics.

32 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay. So do you recall who got you a copy of the visa?

33 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: So, Mahmut is the guy that I was sort of – our go-to guy and  
34 he had all that paper, but I do remember in the airport that there was something about  
35 having to do a specific visa Azerbaijan.

- 1 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you know – so it's required that somebody from Azerbaijan  
2 sponsors any foreigner to come in. Do you know off-hand who sponsored you?
- 3 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. And again, the way in which I was participating in the trip  
4 is that it's approved by Ethics and each of those required components have been  
5 evaluated and determined so I didn't even think to question that except that it was done  
6 for all the Members and everybody was treated exactly the same way in the same  
7 standard. If there had been maybe you know uniquely ... I did something and then  
8 somebody else did something, you might have a different reaction, but I didn't at all.
- 9 MR. ASHMAWY: And...one...a little more specific, were you aware that SOCAR was  
10 the sponsor for your visa?
- 11 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No.
- 12 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay.
- 13 MS. EISNER: So you talked about you know, there were a lot of Members in these vans  
14 and you spent a lot of time together as you were going from place to place –
- 15 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Three!
- 16 MS. EISNER: Three. Okay.
- 17 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Sometimes, four. Sometimes, I think that Clarke was with us  
18 maybe once...
- 19 MS. EISNER: Okay, so who were the Members? You said Hinojosa.
- 20 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: So in my team, it was Cuellar's office, I'm including that, but  
21 Henry Cuellar was not there; Hinojosa and myself and members of our offices and or our  
22 guests. So for my van, that was... 1, 2, 3, 4, 5...like about 8 people?
- 23 MS. EISNER: Did you know that not all Members were sponsored by the Turquoise  
24 Council?
- 25 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No.
- 26 MS. EISNER: Did you have any conversations with, you know, the Members throughout  
27 the time about who the real sponsor might be?
- 28 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. The only conversations by Members were, which I think  
29 are appropriate, were reactions to the meetings that we were having.
- 30 MS. EISNER: Sure.

1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: And the only real specific recollection that I have is, I  
2 remember I got into an interesting conversation with Mahmut, I think mostly in... I can't  
3 recall if that was Turkey or Azerbaijan, where he was a bit defensive where I was being  
4 critical about you know, I'm going to assume that they want you to have positive,  
5 productive, no questions...in those building relationships and I'm... I had questions about  
6 government policies. I was curious. And as I was curious about those things, I remember  
7 he seemed you know defensive about the role of women, maybe in Turkey. I think that's  
8 what it was. I think we were having a debate about the number of journalists who were  
9 still jailed in Turkey and that seemed to be kind of a sore spot. Yeah, but there was no  
10 conversations by members that I recall or by anybody in our van or by anybody anywhere  
11 else about sponsors because we were all under a... I'm presuming that, that this is  
12 a... gover-- an ethics approved trip that members are going on so those questions -- there  
13 was no reason to have that conversation. Now it didn't seem to be anything outward.

14 MS. EISNER: And just following that through one step further for the... first document  
15 in that stack, which is -- let's see... it's THMLG\_00067. It's the post-travel disclosure  
16 form. Did you have any reason to question who the sponsor was on that form?

17 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I didn't.

18 MR. ASHMAWY: Changing sort of -- changing topics a little bit. While you were in  
19 Turkey and Azerbaijan did you and your fellow Members of Congress, did you receive  
20 gifts of any kind?

21 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: We did.

22 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay. We have an email, right?

23 MS. EISNER: Yes, we do. It's THMLG\_0103-0105.

24 MR. ASHMAWY: So, take a look at it. Does this look like a fairly... is this a  
25 comprehensive list of the gifts?

26 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yes.

27 MR. ASHMAWY: That you received?

28 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yes.

29 MS. EISNER: So maybe we'll just go through them.

30 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: And the reason that that's so familiar is that I require in my  
31 office, which is not as I understand that the complete requirement, anything that comes to  
32 my office either directly in the office or indirectly in a meeting or a trip, we... I make

- 1    them put on a form that way it can jog all of our memories and we provide it when  
2    requested... or when required.
- 3    MS. EISNER: Is that an internal form created –
- 4    MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: It is. It's something that I did when I was in state government,  
5    so I've just carried the practice forward.
- 6    MR. ASHMAWY: And just to be, you know, just the normal questions to clarify. Who's  
7    Kristen Palmer, again?
- 8    MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Oh. Don't try to trick me. Kristen Palmer was my scheduler  
9    executive assistant at the time.
- 10   MR. ASHMAWY: Okay. And who is Amy Travieso?
- 11   MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Who is Amy?
- 12   MS. FIORI: Here's her title right here on your document.
- 13   MR. ASHMAWY: Did you ever – actually, I should... a more fair question is, did you  
14   know who Amy was?
- 15   MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Oh, Amy! Without looking –
- 16   MR. ASHMAWY: Without looking –
- 17   MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Her last name... Yes. You'd have to cue me. I know that  
18   Henry Cuellar's Chief of Staff is Amy.
- 19   MR. ASHMAWY/MS. EISNER: Okay.
- 20   MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Now you can see that standard, regardless of who you are, I  
21   have no idea what your last name is. You should be highly impressed that I know that it's  
22   Cuellar. I get a 100 points for that.
- 23   MR. ASHMAWY: I like that.
- 24   MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: You like that?
- 25   MR. ASHMAWY: I like that.
- 26   MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: It's too bad this is going to be transcribed because now I have  
27   some explaining to do to both Amy and Henry Cuellar.
- 28   MS. FIORI: Yeah.

- 1 MR. ASHMAWY: If we can actually just go through the list.
- 2 MS. EISNER: Yeah, I think that – you know just get a sense of, did you receive it, the  
3 context for each of these individual... so let's start at the top with the – forgot the main  
4 one, Turkish rug. So did you receive the Turkish rug?
- 5 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I did.
- 6 MS. EISNER: And where did you receive it?
- 7 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: At the hotel in Azerbaijan.
- 8 MS. EISNER: Okay. And what – can you tell us about this rug? You know, was it a big  
9 rug? Was it a nicer rug?
- 10 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. It was a small rug. I don't know anything about Turkish  
11 rugs. It... so it's a small rug and it... I don't know what else to say about it. Kind of –  
12 everybody got kind of a, I noticed that there were two or three different designs, but other  
13 than that, they were all identical and I think it came with an authenticity thing.
- 14 MR. ASHMAWY: Certificate?
- 15 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yeah. I did notice and I don't remember on which thing, I did  
16 notice that one these things said made in China which I thought was fascinating and silly.  
17 And in getting these gifts, and I know you want to go through each one; I know you do  
18 that because it's the souvenir of the country, it's an international courtesy, but yeah  
19 that's... it's not a carpet I would've purchased. How's that?
- 20 MR. ASHMAWY: How was the carpet delivered?
- 21 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Is that a little mean? I didn't mean for it to sound mean.
- 22 MR. ASHMAWY: Not mean at all.
- 23 MS. EISNER: Everyone is allowed to have their own tastes.
- 24 MS. FIORI: [indecipherable]
- 25 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yeah, I actually think that the carpet, if I recall correctly, I  
26 want to say that might've been in my room the evening before we departed with... you  
27 know and a note that it's from so and so. And then I – I remember checking everybody  
28 had one in the morning and then there were also, and again I'm trying to remember, I  
29 think there was somebody you know from who I think is the Turquoise Council, who's  
30 standing at the hotel providing rugs to other folks.

- 1 MS. EISNER: So it looks like there were two rugs because there was a Turkish rug and  
2 then there was a smaller carpet. Are these in any way kind of... going together as far as  
3 your memory?
- 4 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No the small one and I'm kind of interchange-y about this.  
5 The small one I think was given at a meeting?
- 6 MS. EISNER: Okay.
- 7 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: And then the bigger one, which was about like this... was  
8 delivered... it was in my hotel room with an official government looking note, which  
9 we... I bought the whole thing back, all of it back.
- 10 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you remember, so with regard to the note, do you remember what  
11 the note said? Do you remember who it said it was from?
- 12 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: It didn't say anything that would – just as part of the trip from  
13 Azerbaijan.
- 14 MR. ASHMAWY: Did it convey, and you said government official looking note, did  
15 you get the impression... who did you get the impression the rug was from?
- 16 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: The same thing. It was an official government gift, yeah.
- 17 MS. EISNER: Do you have that note still?
- 18 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I hope so. I can't say for sure.
- 19 MS. EISNER: Okay. And then, so you received the rug. Did you keep it? Did you bring  
20 it back with you?
- 21 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Mhmm. I did, I brought all the things identified here are things  
22 that we brought back, listed on our list and make sure that they were under the threshold  
23 of gift limits to the best of our ability to do that, but we did spend time trying to figure  
24 that out so that we could assure – either return something because it didn't meet the gift  
25 threshold or disclose it as such.
- 26 MR. ASHMAWY: How did you ... how'd you value the items?
- 27 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: So, this may be a question you might have to ask Dominic  
28 Gabello? But my expectation of the office based on a protocol, is that they have to find a  
29 confirmable value or check in with other offices about what they know, how they found  
30 that out and try to figure out fair market value.
- 31 MR. ASHMAWY: Are you aware of the Committee on Ethics ever reaching out to your  
32 office to talk about these rugs, specifically?

- 1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I'm not aware.
- 2 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you remember anything more about how what the value of the  
3 rugs may have been? Or...
- 4 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. So I don't remember without looking at our list, without  
5 being – having the opportunity to look at it again whether we thought it was \$275.00 or  
6 we thought it was \$349.00, I have no idea. I didn't get the sense... and again, I don't have  
7 any expertise on Turkish rugs. Maybe on Nemaha rugs a little, but not on Turkish rugs,  
8 that they were particularly expensive or good quality, but the reality is I don't have that  
9 expertise, which is why we tried to – we make every professional effort to identify fair  
10 market value so that we can disclose what we believe those are worth and then we  
11 provide them to the Committee on Ethics because if they disagree with our process for  
12 evaluation or have questions, they can come back to us so that you're getting that due  
13 diligence so that we're meeting the rules appropriately.
- 14 MR. ASHMAWY: Now – do you think your office may still have a document that has  
15 the evaluations?
- 16 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: We should! I mean we keep a list and whatever... if we didn't  
17 provide something to you; we will do everything to get it to you.
- 18 MR. ASHMAWY: I don't doubt that for a second.
- 19 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: You can expect us to cooperate in any way that we can.
- 20 MR. ASHMAWY: Then quickly going through these, so you already said you received –  
21 you in fact received each one of these items?
- 22 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yeah the only one I don't remember, but I don't – this is my  
23 recollection so, I don't remember the purple silk scarf and I don't remember the tea box,  
24 interestingly enough must be in my office in a bookcase somewhere. And I remember the  
25 piece of jewelry, they were small, turquoise earring and the DVD box, I remember  
26 because I did not want that. And I'm going to say it and again you can ground me later; I  
27 don't want any of this stuff. I know and can you do something that gets people in  
28 governments and other individuals to really refrain from wanting to give me things? I  
29 don't want one more plaque, I don't want one more glass thing, I don't want one more  
30 weird... you've seen our offices? There's too small!
- 31 MR. ASHMAWY: As far as I know, I think it may be part of the job.
- 32 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: You know, I live in the state with very intense, beautiful  
33 cultures and gift exchange is a part of those cultures and it is an insult and an affront not to  
34 participate in that and I suppose somebody has the same issue for me when... a tribal

1 leader comes to me or someone and I might provide them with a Mexico fetish as a part  
2 of my hello and they probably say, “please don’t give that to me, I don’t know what to do  
3 with it and now I don’t know how to disclose it” so maybe I’m providing the same  
4 problem, but I have been aware that those are cultural, proper settings, but the truth is,  
5 nobody wants... I guess I can’t say that – I don’t want any of those things, but that’s the  
6 only thing I don’t remember. I’m sure I have it.

7 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay. That’s my follow up question is – you brought everything  
8 back?

9 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I brought everything back; I brought everything to the office.  
10 That’s our process. I bring everything to the office; it gets recorded. You know witnessed  
11 and recorded and it’s not a process that we believe we’re required to do, but it is a  
12 process I brought with me from state government; it’s just something I’ve always done.

13 MR. ASHMAWY: And then what have you – I mean generally, what have you done  
14 with these items?

15 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Most of these items are in my office in D.C. and that’s why I  
16 can’t remember where that scarf is. It must be somewhere in there.

17 MR. ASHMAWY: Which items are not in your office in D.C.?

18 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: The only thing that is not in my office in D.C. is the jewelry.  
19 That is in my D.C. residence and the small carpet because it... I only have Nemaha rugs  
20 as you recall, in my office, is also in my personal residence in D.C.

21 MR. ASHMAWY: Where’s the larger rug?

22 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: That’s the rug I’m talking about.

23 MR. ASHMAWY: Oh, okay. So the –

24 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: So the small carpet and everything else is in my office except  
25 those two things.

26 MR. ASHMAWY: The –

27 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: The larger rug and the turquoise earrings.

28 MR. ASHMAWY: Got it. And then the smaller carpet from the –

29 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Is in my office.

30 MR. ASHMAWY: That’s in your office.

- 1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Everything else – and again I’m going to assume then that the  
2 purple scarf must be there? But I need to double check.
- 3 MR. ASHMAWY: Just real quickly go through these –
- 4 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Actually, I need to go back. The crystal tea set is in my  
5 residence here.
- 6 MR. ASHMAWY: In New Mexico?
- 7 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yes, I apologize. I just remembered that I brought that back  
8 because it just doesn’t fit anywhere.
- 9 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you remember who gave you the silk scarf?
- 10 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No, I don’t even remember the silk scarf.
- 11 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you remember who gave you the crystal tea set?
- 12 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: That was on the last day of the trip. So it’s... again, you know  
13 there’s the same, Mahmut and the Turquoise Council Foundation, Turkish-Turkish  
14 people. And they’re handing it to everyone so there’s no separate meeting where you –  
15 you know, it’s just all part of that routine.
- 16 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you have the impression that it was coming from the Turquoise  
17 Council, the Azeri government or some other organization?
- 18 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Either the Azeri government or the Turquoise Council, but I’m  
19 not – I don’t have any impression at the time that it was from anybody else.
- 20 MR. ASHMAWY: Same question with regard to the two-cup tea set.
- 21 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Right and – that... my answer will be exactly the same for all  
22 of these. They all came in the context of you know, a meeting with one of the  
23 government officials or with the sponsors of the trip who at during the time, and then  
24 until your contact to us, we believed based on work of the Ethics Committee that it’s the  
25 educational foundation. And these are cultural exchange or souvenirs.
- 26 MR. ASHMAWY: And I know it’s a little monotonous, but with regard to the painted  
27 plate, which according to THMLG\_0103, came from in the parenthetical, “the gift from  
28 the host of the dinner and boat ride in Istanbul.” Do you ever – did you get the impression  
29 that that plate was also either from Turquoise Council or the Turkish government?
- 30 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I did.
- 31 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay. Same thing with the herbal, Turkish tea box?

1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Right. There was nothing in the way which these gifts were  
2 provided that I thought it was from somebody separate that would not be allowed to  
3 provide you with the souvenir or a cultural exchange.

4 MR. ASHMAWY: And then the small carpet, that was at the border security meeting  
5 so...

6 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Right.

7 MR. ASHMAWY: I don't want to put words in your mouth – did you get the impression  
8 that –

9 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: The same thing. It wasn't – there wasn't... none of these gifts,  
10 which is why we also wrote about them exactly in the way which they were given to us  
11 because there was nothing in that that deemed... so you – I guess I need to go back.  
12 There's not a document from us that says, we didn't do the evaluation of this because  
13 we're not sure where it came from. Our – my understanding after returning home is that,  
14 each of these gifts were provided in the context that they can be provided. That they  
15 weren't really gifts, they were cultural exchanges even though I identified them as gifts,  
16 because I have a gift log; I don't qualify it as anything else that there's souvenirs and  
17 cultural exchanges and that there's nothing in that that identified itself as being not  
18 appropriate within the rules and then we double checked the value, there's no way to do  
19 that while you're on the trip to make sure that that's the case and then to provide all that  
20 documentation to the Committee on Ethics for their re-review and confirmation that  
21 that's the case.

22 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay. DVD box/set from the president of Turkey – on the President  
23 of Turkey from the SOCAR reps, fair to say that your impression was that came from the  
24 SOCAR – that it came from SOCAR?

25 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: At the time I probably thought that it – yeah. And again,  
26 remember that my impression of SOCAR is I couldn't even tell you what that was except  
27 that I remember there was a meeting with a government person related to their energy  
28 group and I was ... and they kept representing themselves as part of the energy fund. The  
29 government fund.

30 MR. ASHMAWY: And to go back to these rugs –

31 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: They may have said, but I don't recall that. I just recall the  
32 energy fund.

33 MR. ASHMAWY: And to go back to these rugs –

34 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yeah.

- 1 MR. ASHMAWY: Between the Turquoise Council and the Azeri government, do you  
2 have an idea where they came from?
- 3 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Not specifically, no. One or the other.
- 4 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay.
- 5 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: But not specifically, no.
- 6 MS. EISNER: So you kept the document log and then you fill it out separate paper work  
7 and turned it over to the Committee on Ethics based on the information and the  
8 evaluation you did in the document log?
- 9 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Correct.
- 10 MS. EISNER: What was the paper work you turned over to the Committee on Ethics  
11 with regard to the gifts?
- 12 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I don't know what the specific paper work looks like, so I  
13 relied on my Chief of Staff and his communications with other Chiefs of Staff about  
14 Members who went on the trip to make sure we weren't missing anything that was  
15 required or could be identified appropriately as supplemental and then submitted that, but  
16 it was my directive to the office that that all must be done and –
- 17 MR. ASHMAWY: Just for my clarity –
- 18 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yeah.
- 19 MR. ASHMAWY: You submitted a log of gifts to the Committee on Ethics?
- 20 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I don't know whether to actually call it a log of the gifts? We  
21 have a log, but whatever paper work they routinely review as part of your post-trip  
22 requirements, and I wanted to double check that we were following that and we were  
23 verifying that our interpretation in what was required was the same thing that was  
24 required of other offices who have more experience. Now remember this was our first  
25 effort so we were really working hard to check off the right boxes and make sure that we  
26 were doing it right.
- 27 MR. ASHMAWY: Understood. So, I mean... and if you would like, you can reference  
28 the post-travel disclosure form. There's not place on the disclosure form to provide  
29 information on gifts so if you weren't specifically asked for the information by the  
30 Committee on Ethics, would you have turned – would you have given that extra  
31 information to them?

1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: So...I told in this interview, my impression was even – and  
2 my recollection, which is limited two years later, somehow it was part of the post-trip  
3 document. If it's not...I do recall having conversations about the gifts because given  
4 my... acute awareness that gifts are an issues in Congress and that there are ethical rules  
5 about gifts, even though I look at these a little differently (probably shouldn't), I treat  
6 them in terms of logging and evaluations like you would any gift, but since there are kind  
7 of a cultural exchange and a souvenir, I sort of just transposed that in a way in which we  
8 do with our gift logs. I had very specific conversations with my team to make sure that  
9 anything we needed to do about that got done. If there was anything additional that they  
10 thought we should do, we should just do it. And I do remember at one point in a  
11 conversation between Dominic and I that we were the only office that was logging things  
12 in this way, it was keeping maintaining and these are my words, not his, but sort of taking  
13 these extra steps and actually I think he might have said that to me that some offices  
14 weren't very happy about that, that I could go to a document because then maybe I was  
15 creating a standard that may now applied to everyone that they weren't – that they didn't  
16 think wasn't a good idea. I think it's a good idea. It's important for me because I... that's  
17 an odd thing, even if it's a cultural exchange, that if you know if you're getting a trip  
18 approved by our Committee on Ethics and you know that we have pretty strict  
19 requirements about these kind of issues, then my expectation is that the Committee's  
20 providing information to the sponsors of the trip and that they know these rules because  
21 they know – they have to know of the Ethics rules, otherwise they can't get an Ethics  
22 approved trip. But I wanted whatever we should be doing and then some done about these  
23 things.

24 MS. EISNER: You said there was a lot of back and forth between the Chiefs of Staffs or  
25 people who attended the trip about –

26 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I don't know if I said there was a lot of back and forth. I'm  
27 aware that there was some conversations between some of the Chiefs of Staffs, yeah.

28 MS. EISNER: Do you know which Chiefs of Staffs were talking?

29 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: For sure, Amy and the reason for Amy is because this... I  
30 knew based on spending a little time with her in our vehicle going to all the stuff, that this  
31 was not her first trip and then I thought that she could provide Dominic some advice  
32 about making sure that we didn't miss anything, that if he had any questions that he could  
33 go there and I thought that that was a useful exercise in the office.

34 MS. EISNER: Okay.

35 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: And I don't believe that it was limited to just Amy, but I'm –  
36 more than the email, I'm clear that that was something I was aware of that he was  
37 communicating with Amy.

- 1 MS. EISNER: Okay. Do you – so, we’ve talked about the gifts that you received. You  
2 were present, you talked about some of the members who were you know traveling with  
3 you and you – I think you called them your group, or your co –
- 4 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: My team.
- 5 MS. EISNER: Your team, yes.
- 6 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yeah. I’ve used every possible...
- 7 MS. EISNER: Yeah, well a lot of time spent together. Did other members receive the  
8 same gifts? Is there anything –
- 9 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yes.
- 10 MS. EISNER: That was specific to you?
- 11 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Right and that was part of why it also – there was a more  
12 professional standard involved as that, at the same time except for the larger rug and  
13 that’s my recollection, that it was in the hotel, that you know, it had kind of a... it was in  
14 like a carrying case? Or vinyl, carrying case? And then I recall that there was a, you  
15 know, “thank you for participating in the Azerbaijan cultural trip.” This rug... courtesy of  
16 Azerbaijan, something like that and then... other than that, I saw everybody getting  
17 exactly the same thing. I remember, I think I remember this, that the ... one plate might  
18 have been gold, one plate might’ve been color, one plate might’ve been silver, one  
19 might’ve been... folks on the ocean, one might’ve been in the city, but they were all –  
20 everything that was received by my group was exactly the same kind of thing.
- 21 MS. EISNER: I think we just have a few more things to go over. We’re almost –
- 22 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Excellent! Because I have a torn hamstring so you guys are  
23 killing me!
- 24 MR. ASHMAWY: Well we’re just about done.
- 25 MS. EISNER: Gosh, this is a tough week for you.
- 26 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: That’s right, yeah. I’m old; there’s nothing I can do about it. I  
27 can’t fix it.
- 28 MS. EISNER: So this is THMLG\_0225.
- 29 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Are you guys – will you be offended if I just look at this text?
- 30 MR. ASHMAWY: Not at all.

- 1 MS. EISNER: No.
- 2 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: From my daughter who is my partner in care giving for my  
3 mom so we have a strict rule that if – okay, and it’s nothing I need to worry about; that’s  
4 all I cared about.
- 5 MR. ASHMAWY: And like Helen said, we are just about done.
- 6 MS. EISNER: Yeah, we’re almost done.
- 7 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No problem.
- 8 MS. EISNER: So this is an email, greetings from Kemal. Give you a second to look at it.
- 9 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Okay.
- 10 MS. EISNER: So, this is dated July 7, 2013. Says, “I want to visit the Congresswoman  
11 as well, regard to discuss with her about the southern gas corridor and its role in  
12 European energy security.” So, did he visit the office? Do you know if that visit  
13 occurred?
- 14 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I’m going to say that it did occur? I don’t specifically  
15 remember the meeting.
- 16 MS. EISNER: Okay.
- 17 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: And I don’t remember whether I was in the meeting post-trip  
18 or not. I might’ve been.
- 19 MS. EISNER: Do you remember any meetings with Kemal, post-trip?
- 20 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yes. I do.
- 21 MS. EISNER: Okay. What were those meetings?
- 22 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I don’t know that I can remember the specifics, but... I’m  
23 going to say that once he was meeting with staff and I said hello in our reception area and  
24 we had kind of a friendly conversation about how things were in New Mexico and what  
25 some of their economic development ideas were, and partnerships with the local  
26 policymakers and then a second one I remember was specific about looking at what  
27 they’re referring to as, energy security just sort of general. I don’t know if that’s this  
28 meeting or another meeting, is really my point about that.
- 29 MS. EISNER: Do you know when those meetings would’ve occurred?

1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: After the trip, but I can't really tell you exactly when. But if  
2 we didn't provide when those meetings are, we'll go back and look and get that to you.  
3 We're happy to do that.

4 MS. EISNER: And –

5 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: And they should... I'm assuming, that they should be clear  
6 about whether I'm in those meetings or not. The only time that's not clear, is if I'm early  
7 from a committee or early from a vote and a meeting is in progress and I stop in and say  
8 hello specifically and then step out, but I'm not present for the whole meeting.  
9 So... sometimes it's not clear if I was attending a meeting or not. That's the  
10 only... exception to that rule. Otherwise, it's clear on my schedule that those are meetings  
11 with me or meetings with staff.

12 MS. EISNER: Did he make any specific asks? I know you can't remember all the details  
13 of this meeting.

14 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: The only thing I remember that they've ever asked me, is if I  
15 would send the birthday or I can't remember if it was a birthday or a congratulations note  
16 to the president, is that right? For Azerbaijan? I don't think it was Turkey. Was it  
17 Turkey?

18 MR. ASHMAWY: I don't want to put words in your mouth. So... I'm just relying on  
19 your recollection.

20 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: My recollection about a specific asks that was... more of a  
21 professional courtesy that was not policy that we said, sure we're happy to say hello or  
22 congratulations or happy birthday. I don't even remember the context, but I don't  
23 remember ever getting a request from Kemal to take a specific position on anything? He  
24 does on occasion, he hasn't in a long, long time, sent me updates directly to my email,  
25 which that may be also – I can see in the email chain, who they go to in my staff, but says  
26 it's usually a newspaper article somewhere in the United States or somewhere in  
27 Azerbaijan or Turkey about the state of affairs and with no... it's attachment. There's  
28 nothing in it that says, well there might be... a statement that says, "For your information"  
29 or, "thought you might find interesting", but there's nothing that says, "please read,  
30 would really like it if you would introduce legislation that would deal with this problem."  
31 There's nothing like that. And when people try to provide sort of, informal requests like  
32 that, we discourage that; that they need to bring us a proposal in writing, they need to  
33 come to our office, we have a process like I would assume most Members of Congress  
34 too, to determine whether that's a policy that you agree with and that the way in which  
35 they're proposing is exactly the way in which it would be implemented to get voted on in  
36 Congress, that kind of thing.

- 1 MS. EISNER: Okay. One final question on this document; it says, “we’re planning to  
2 organize a reception, which is about July 17<sup>th</sup> or 18<sup>th</sup> in D.C., Mr. Elshad Nasieraf,  
3 SOCAR Vice President, together with a delegation for Azerbaijan will become our  
4 guests.” Do you remember attending this reception?
- 5 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I don’t, but I do remember going to and I don’t know if it’s the  
6 same one. I went to a large...the... Azerbaijan the Ambassador having a large... event like  
7 Azerbaijan Day. I’m going to get this wrong, but a very... a large event and I did go to  
8 that. It was an evening event with music, dancing and speeches.
- 9 MS. EISNER: Was it shortly after the convention? Was it in 2013?
- 10 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: You mean shortly after the trip?
- 11 MS. EISNER: Yes. Yes, after that trip.
- 12 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: And I don’t mean –
- 13 MS. EISNER: Yeah –
- 14 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: For me, I –
- 15 MS. EISNER: The trip, yes.
- 16 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Okay. I don’t know if it was shortly, it was definitely after. So,  
17 I’m going to... to the best of my recollections, six months?
- 18 MS. EISNER: Okay.
- 19 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yeah and again, you don’t have to – I can’t verify without  
20 looking at that information specifically when it was on my calendar.
- 21 MS. EISNER: Sure. This is the final document; I promise. THMLG\_0010.
- 22 MR. ASHMAWY: Here you go.
- 23 MS. EISNER: So this is an email from Mahmut Okmuz, the person who you’d been  
24 referring to.
- 25 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Mhmm.
- 26 MS. EISNER: Do you know how Faruk Taban is? He’s listed on this –
- 27 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No, but remember the guy that I referred to as being tall?
- 28 MS. EISNER: Yes.

- 1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: I think that name sounds familiar to me. That that may be who  
2 that is. Tall person that I have some recollection, I hope it's relevant and valid that he was  
3 a professor at one point in time.
- 4 MS. EISNER: Why do you think he sent this email to you?
- 5 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Well, as I recall, and I don't even remember the email, I mean  
6 I clearly I got it. That when we were learning to drink Turkish tea and Turkish coffee,  
7 which I think I said earlier was both delicious, and it may not be appropriate counselor, to  
8 tell you that was a highlight – this coffee and tea is fabulous. That there's a friendship,  
9 like even a fortune telling type of thing, and I just took it as a... as a nice remembrance  
10 that we spent time together.
- 11 MS. EISNER: Why wouldn't it have been sent to your personal email address?
- 12 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: You know because I am used that address because I get  
13 directly without having it go all the way through and so it's a ... I do it for everyone.
- 14 MS. EISNER: Okay.
- 15 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: And still do unfortunately.
- 16 MS. EISNER: Is it common to receive emails from Okmuz or any of individuals on this  
17 email chain?
- 18 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. I don't get – in fact, it is possible that I get like maybe one  
19 more from Mahmut. I remember I was fascinated also with evil eyes.
- 20 MS. EISNER: Oh, okay.
- 21 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: And I'm – I can't recall whether we did or we didn't, I may  
22 have asked him you know, if I was going to get to do internet shopping to give a  
23 suggestion about that because there's no real opportunity to do that while you're on these  
24 trips, which I understand is – there's a good reason for that. And he may have sent me  
25 one? I don't recall. We tried to give you as I remember, any email from any of these  
26 parties as you requested, so if you didn't get it then I'm wrong. He is fired and never  
27 helping me figure that out. So you know, I'm stuck with eBay. I mentioned that from  
28 Kemal, I get emails there. I don't get nearly as many as I did that first six months or eight  
29 months, maybe it's because it was fresh from the trip or maybe because there was more  
30 going on, but the latest one I recall and it does come, they still come to my – they go to  
31 Dominic and go to the official office and they also come to, "Mlujangrisham." Which I  
32 see every day and I check into my government email when I'm there, I just get online  
33 instead of having to go through the server. It's just easier. He may have given me  
34 something about Ukraine? In the last year, but they're infrequent.

- 1 MS. EISNER: Okay.
- 2 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Yeah. And then nothing from Mahmut or any of these other  
3 people since right after the trip.
- 4 MS. EISNER: And beyond email, any other recent communication with Mr. Oksuz –  
5 Kemal, Razul?
- 6 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No. Again you know, if they were at the Azerbaijan large  
7 reception that I referred to, they may – they probably were there. I don't have a specific  
8 recollection of meeting them, but it would not be – that could have occurred and I've  
9 seen them in the halls of Congress or you know in my office before a meeting and I say  
10 hello.
- 11 MS. EISNER: Has anyone tried to contact you recently regarding this trip or the Ethics  
12 investigation?
- 13 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No, except for you. No one.
- 14 MS. EISNER: Okay. Is there anything else we haven't covered that you think we should  
15 know?
- 16 MS. FIORI: I would like to just point one thing out. This email cuts off I think the –
- 17 MS. EISNER: Yeah, you're right.
- 18 MS. FIORI: So it's not a complete document. I'm just pointing that out; no big deal.
- 19 MS. EISNER: Yeah, I apologize for that. I think it's a blank page or possibly the rest of  
20 the email signatures so that's true, this 0010 is not a complete document.
- 21 MS. FIORI: I just wanted to point that out.
- 22 MR. ASHMAWY: Yeah, she's referencing the – actually the margin. Which...
- 23 MS. EISNER: Oh, the margin.
- 24 MS. FIORI: Yeah.
- 25 MS. EISNER: Okay, I see.
- 26 MS. FIORI: Yeah, yeah. I'm sorry. I didn't realize you didn't – yeah.
- 27 MR. ASHMAWY: That's noted, thank you. Is there anything else you know that we  
28 need to touch on that you know, you ...

- 1 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: No, I mean I don't think so. Again, I appreciate the job that  
2 you have. Thank you for spending time. There isn't anything about this trip that I thought  
3 was particularly odd or unique. Otherwise, we would've reported it. And we relied on the  
4 information that we got from Ethics and provided everything that these folks gave us to  
5 the Ethics Committee and predicated the actual acceptance of the trip until we received  
6 confirmation and direct approval from the Committee on Ethics.
- 7 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay. Well thank you very much for your time.
- 8 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Sure!
- 9 MR. ASHMAWY: I appreciate it.
- 10 MS. LUJAN GRISHAM: Sure, sure!

1 MS. EISNER: There we go, okay. This is Investigative Counsel Helen Eisner joined by Bryson  
2 Morgan we are her on April 13<sup>th</sup>, 2015 with Congressman Danny K Davis. This is Review  
3 number 156646 we have given the congressman a copy of 18 USC 1001 and he has provided us  
4 with the acknowledgement form. I think with that we will go ahead and get started. So are you  
5 familiar with the Turkish American Federation of the Midwest?  
6 REP. DAVIS: I am yes.  
7 MS. EISNER: What is that organization?  
8 REP. DAVIS: Well I guess. It's an organization that provides [buzzing sound on recorder]  
9 interests of Turkey in the United States and it also Attempts to bridge the gap between the  
10 citizens of the United States and Turkey. And kind of put together things I have attended, events  
11 that they have had, they actually also operate a charter school in an area that's a part of my  
12 congressional district I have visited the school and I have actually gone out to their headquarters  
13 in Mt. Prospect and given a speech and talked to....  
14 MS. EISNER: Where is Mount Prospect? Is that in Illinois?  
15 REP. DAVIS: It's in Illinois. It's a suburban community not too far from Chicago.  
16 MS. EISNER: And it seems you are very familiar with the organization. Do you remember when  
17 you first became aware of them and what that first interaction was?  
18 REP. DAVIS: It's been some time ago actually, not so far the organization itself I remember but  
19 Turkish individuals I remember meeting and knowing and interacting with oh before I ever came  
20 to congress back when I was a member of the Cook County board of commissioners. And also I  
21 have friends who are Armenians and they always have something to say about Turkey that isn't  
22 necessarily so nice but...  
23 MS. EISNER: Okay I see. You know. Do you know who you normally interact with at that  
24 organization?  
25 REP. DAVIS: Yes, Suleyman Turhan  
26 MS. EISNER: And what is his role?  
27 REP. DAVIS: He's the President or the Chief Executive or the head honcho. The guy that I've  
28 always known as the person in charge.  
29 MS. EISNER: How often would you say you interact with him?  
30 REP. DAVIS: Maybe a couple of times a year or so, maybe. The interaction would probably be  
31 no more than a question or a "can we get you out to our meeting or will you come and speak at  
32 something that we're having?" or "we've got something going on will you attend?"  
33 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall when you first met Mr. Turhan?  
34 REP. DAVIS: I really don't other than to say that it's been several years ago. And it was just  
35 kind of a normal course of interaction the same as I guess we would do with any representatives  
36 of various countries or ethnic groups or whatever so. I don't ... I can't pinpoint when that might  
37 have been.  
38 MS. EISNER: Do you know who might have introduced you to Turhan? It sounds like you do  
39 have a lot of friends in that community.

1 REP. DAVIS: I don't recall anybody in particular introducing me to them. I mean it was  
2 probably coming to a meeting or being some place but I don't recall anybody that I know saying  
3 "hey let me introduce you to this gentleman or to Suleyman" or that kind of thing. I don't recall  
4 anything of that nature.

5 MS. EISNER: Are you familiar with an organization called the Turquoise Council of Americans  
6 and Eurasians?

7 REP. DAVIS: Not really, no.

8 MR. MORGAN: Or TCAE they may be referred to by that name TCAE.

9 REP. DAVIS: Not really, no.

10 MS. EISNER: Not really. Had you heard the name before?

11 REP. DAVIS: I've heard the name but only just heard the name as information sort of started to  
12 surface about this trip that the Turkish group does and that sort of thing. But I really know  
13 nothing about them.

14 MS. EISNER: Are you familiar with an organization called the Assembly of Friends of  
15 Azerbaijan?

16 REP. DAVIS: Not really

17 MS. EISNER: Sometimes they're called AFAZ, A-F-A-Z.

18 REP. DAVIS: Not really

19 MS. EISNER: No? When you say not really is it the same kind of thing? Recently?

20 REP. DAVIS: Same thing. My basic interaction has really been with Suleyman Turhan. That's  
21 basically the individual that I've know that I've had real contact with.

22 MR. MORGAN: Has he ever talked to you about his sister organizations or other regional based  
23 organizations that are sort of similar in mission and purpose to his organization?

24 REP. DAVIS: No

25 MS. EISNER: Have you heard the name Kemal Oksuz?

26 REP. DAVIS: Not that I recall.

27 MS. EISNER: Have you heard it mentioned in connection to any organizations, the Turquoise  
28 Council or AFAZ the Assembly of Friends of Azerbaijan?

29 REP. DAVIS: No.

30 MS. EISNER: No? Okay.

31 MR. MORGAN: Has Mr. Turhan ever talked to you about a sort of Houston organization similar  
32 to his?

33 REP. DAVIS: Yeah he mentioned actually that they were doing this trip together. That they both  
34 did the same thing and they were putting together this trip.

35 MS. EISNER: When did he mention that? Was that in...

36 REP. DAVIS: I think that was mentioned in the invitation to come.

37 MS. EISNER: We'll get into some details but I just want to keep going through some procedural  
38 things. What's the process in your office when someone receives an invitation for privately  
39 sponsored travel? How do you approach that?

1 REP. DAVIS: They usually will send in the notification or they will talk to Yul Edwards who is  
2 the chief of staff.

3 MS. EISNER: And are those requests for you to travel or for your staff to travel as well? Is it the  
4 same process?

5 REP. DAVIS: It's both.

6 MS. EISNER: And when someone like Yul Edwards handles that request what types of things is  
7 he doing to get into the details of the request and the travel? What's the process?

8 REP. DAVIS: I think he just will tell me about it and just say you know, there's a trip coming up  
9 and we've been invited to participate and staff member so and so is interested in going, what do  
10 you think, do you think he should go or...

11 MS. EISNER: Does he go back and ask any questions about funding or sponsorship?

12 REP. DAVIS: Not really other than to suggest the name of the entity of that is issuing the  
13 invitation.

14 MS. EISNER: And that's in conversations with you he'll tell you the name of the entity?

15 REP. DAVIS: Yes.

16 MS. EISNER: AS far as going back to that entity is there any conversation he would usually  
17 have...?

18 REP. DAVIS: I don't think we do that much in the way of vetting organizations that might invite  
19 us. If it's someplace where it seems to be conflict taking place or we know there's conflict, then  
20 we may have some conversation relative to do we really want to do this? Do we really want to go  
21 there?

22 MS. EISNER: That makes sense.

23 MR. MORGAN: So would this be a conversation you would have with Mr. Edwards in person?

24 REP. DAVIS: Yes.

25 MR. MORGAN: Or would it be like via email or...

26 REP. DAVIS: No I don't really do much in the way of emailing staff or emailing anybody for  
27 that matter I'm far more direct in terms of conversation. Either direct or telephone, I don't do  
28 much emailing.

29 MR. MORGAN: And then is it ultimately your decision do you have to approve travel, not only  
30 for yourself but also for staff?

31 REP. DAVIS: Yes.

32 MR. MORGAN: Have there been any times when you or a member of your staff received an  
33 invitation from a group that you simply didn't recognize? You're kind of wondering who is this  
34 group? Who are these people?

35 REP. DAVIS: Yeah, I would say yes. I mean we kind of would look them up and do a little bit of  
36 research and see who they are but we probably wouldn't necessarily participate with them  
37 anyway if we knew nothing about them. If we didn't have any felling about whatever the country  
38 is or the reason for going then we just probably let that slide.

1 MR. MORGAN: And as you're thinking whether or not to go on a trip or authorize a staff to go  
2 on a trip. What are some of the factors that are going through your mind? What are you  
3 interested in?

4 REP. DAVIS: Well usually it's of what value is there to establishing a different level of  
5 relationship with this country or with this group representing the country? Or how does it  
6 broaden our understanding of world situations and world issues? And does it provide us with  
7 information that would be useful as we go about our daily work. It's that kind thinking that we  
8 would more than likely inject into conversation.

9 MS. EISNER: And then, as a part of this process, is there any discussion with the Ethics  
10 Committee about the travel?

11 REP. DAVIS: I think we've only maybe had, you know, if it involves a country like Syria or  
12 Citizens of Iran or the Middle East or Pakistan or countries where there is conflict taking place.  
13 There may have been occasion where we would call the State Department and really get a read  
14 from the State Department as to whether or not they think this is some travel that would be okay.  
15 Whether it ought to be done.

16 MS. EISNER: That makes sense. But as far as funding and sponsorship no?

17 REP. DAVIS: No we've never had any relationship with any funders or anything of that nature  
18 so...

19 MS. EISNER: Right. And no reason to go to the Ethics Committee, usually?

20 REP. DAVIS: No.

21 MS. EISNER: So let's get into the convention in Baku. What did you understand the purpose of  
22 the convention to be?

23 REP. DAVIS: Well I thought it was to foster a different set of relationships with the people who  
24 were going and with the country itself. And also provide education and information that  
25 ultimately could become useful for trade and business relationships or knowledge of the country,  
26 knowledge of the environment.

27 MS. EISNER: Had you attended, I think there was another convention similar to this Azerbaijan  
28 Convention in 2012 in Washington DC. Did you attend that convention?

29 REP. DAVIS: I may have stopped by an event or something but I've never attended any kind of  
30 convention as such other than maybe there was an event that I may have gone to and said a few  
31 words. You know, we are delighted to be here and to welcome you to...

32 MS. EISNER: Was that at the 2012 event?

33 REP. DAVIS: I think that was. It seems like I remember doing something like that one evening.

34 MS. EISNER: And you spoke at this event that we're talking about?

35 REP. DAVIS: Yes.

36 MS. EISNER: Do you remember who invited you to speak?

37 REP. DAVIS: That would've been I believe Suleyman Turhan.

38 MS. EISNER: No this is going back a bit but do you remember what you spoke about?

39 REP. DAVIS: The thing that I usually speak about is, you know, we're always pleased to make  
40 relationships and interact with individuals from other places throughout the world. Gain

1 knowledge and a greater awareness and understanding of what the country is like and how we  
2 can develop friendships and relationships. That's generally.

3 MS. EISNER: Do you... again just one more question about 2012 about that event. So it sounds  
4 like Turhan... Mr. Turhan invited you to speak. Where there other Turkic organizations present  
5 at the event that you attended? Any other organizations?

6 REP. DAVIS: I go the impression that there may have been others but I didn't know who they  
7 were or what their reasons were, none of that. Usually I go make a three or four minute speech  
8 and then get out of dodge.

9 MS. EISNER: Sure. So now, I guess, jumping to the 2013 convention that was in Baku. Who did  
10 you attend the convention with?

11 REP. DAVIS: With?

12 MS. EISNER: Yeah it was... were you with your staff?

13 REP. DAVIS: My wife went on that.

14 MS. EISNER: Did any staff attend?

15 REP. DAVIS: Well staff had they didn't go with me per-se. My wife and I traveled because we  
16 only spent, I think, like a couple of days. So...

17 MS. EISNER: So you were there, I think you know as we understand this trip there were some  
18 elements that were in Turkey and there were some elements in Azerbaijan. Were you there for  
19 both Turkey and Azerbaijan?

20 REP. DAVIS: No I have never been to Turkey.

21 MS. EISNER: So you were in Baku for... do you know how long was it?

22 REP. DAVIS: I think it was like 2 days. 2-3 days I usually don't be away from by district much  
23 more than that. Because we obviously have things that are scheduled. Trying to find a time to  
24 take a trip is not an easy thing for us to do.

25 MS. EISNER: So I guess staff did not go on the trip with you, you were traveling with your wife.  
26 Do you know if you... did you have staff who attended?

27 REP. DAVIS: I think there were two... Lavell Brown, I believe, went to that and so did Yul  
28 Edwards.

29 MS. EISNER: And who was Lavell Brown? What is he... is he a... what is his title?

30 REP. DAVIS: I think his title is probably staff assistant. What he does is he interfaces with  
31 different constituent groups and works on different issues.

32 MS. EISNER: Did he go to Baku and Turkey?

33 REP. DAVIS: I think he went to both I believe.

34 MS. EISNER: And do you know who he was sponsored by to attend?

35 REP. DAVIS: Well I think that the whole interaction was through someone in the Midwest.

36 MS. EISNER: And you also said Yul Edwards, your chief of staff, that's

37 REP. DAVIS: Yeah I think he went... I think he stayed one day or something.

38 MS. EISNER: One day in, was he in Baku?

39 REP. DAVIS: I think he was in Baku.

40 MS. EISNER: So he was just there one day? He didn't go to Turkey?

1 REP. DAVIS: I think that's what happened.  
2 MS. EISNER: And his sponsor ship?  
3 REP. DAVIS: I think it would've been the same.  
4 MR. MORGAN: Did they... during the Baku portion did they stay at the same hotel as you?  
5 REP. DAVIS: No I never saw them other than walking from... so I'm not sure they stayed the  
6 same hotel but if they did I didn't come in contact with them.  
7 MR. MORGAN: You were on the same flights?  
8 REP. DAVIS: No  
9 MS. EISNER: Did they attend the same events?  
10 REP. DAVIS: No  
11 MS. EISNER: No different? Okay.  
12 REP. DAVIS: I think there was one which was the opening kind of session. I do recall seeing  
13 Lavell coming from that.  
14 MS. EISNER: So how did the conversation begin as far as when you first became aware of this  
15 2013 convention and got the invite to attend?  
16 REP. DAVIS: Well we had been invited to something 2 or 3 times before that. I mean, you  
17 know, we'd been invited to come to Turkey and we just couldn't figure out a time and that kind  
18 of thing. Plus there was no great compelling reason to be going. I mean but...  
19 MR. MORGAN: When you say you'd been invited 2 or 3 times invited by who?  
20 REP. DAVIS: Invited by Suleyman to, I mean, this wasn't the first conversation that we had had  
21 about going to Turkey or going to some Turkish sponsored event or activity or trip.  
22 MS. EISNER: And how would he what form would these invitations take?  
23 REP. DAVIS: Well by the time that you know with this happening we had a conversation I  
24 mentioned the fact that we'd gone to Mount Prospect. We've spoken to the group kind of. We've  
25 gone to events downtown in the Chicago loop and spoken at those events or luncheons or  
26 meetings or whatever. And so we knew each other by now in conversation basis.  
27 MS. EISNER: So did you have the type of relationship where he would pick of the phone and  
28 call Yul or call you and say there's an event and I want you to attend?  
29 REP. DAVIS: Yeah but I also think he formalized it. I mean it was formalized in written  
30 communication but yeah we've talked. He would be comfortable enough to pick up the phone  
31 and say congressman you know we've been talking about going to Turkey of going to  
32 Azerbaijan. We've... can you look to do it or...? And I'd probably say well let's look at our  
33 scheduler and have our scheduler look at and see what window might exist and if we find a  
34 window then we'll consider doing it.  
35 MS. EISNER: Did that happen in this case?  
36 REP. DAVIS: Yeah.  
37 MS. EISNER: So he called and then what was the process?  
38 REP. DAVIS: The process was to talk to Yul and really talk to Jenell Brown to see what the  
39 schedule looked like.  
40 MS. EISNER: Is Jenell Brown the scheduler.

1 REP. DAVIS: Yes, in the DC office.

2 MS. EISNER: So he called... so he... for this convention Mr. Turhan called you and then you  
3 got in touch with Yul.

4 REP. DAVIS: I think he may have even been in touch with Yul before he even talked to about it  
5 to me. I'm not sure how it happened. He may have already been talking to Yul.

6 MS. EISNER: Did you have any conversations about sponsorship?

7 REP. DAVIS: No, no more than it was sponsored by his organization.

8 MS. EISNER: So who did you understand would be paying for the travel?

9 REP. DAVIS: The Midwest Turkish organization that he was the head of.

10 MS. EISNER: Did you have... I guess was there any reason to question whether or not Midwest  
11 was paying for the travel?

12 REP. DAVIS: No there really wasn't in my mind. It appeared to be just like many trips where  
13 you go and you meet and you talk and you interact and you... so I really have no reason to  
14 question.

15 MS. EISNER: Let's... I guess we can start to get into some of the documents and we can go  
16 through some of the details and talk about that. So...

17 MR. MORGAN: We have some documents here that we can show you. Take your time to look  
18 at them and refresh your memory.

19 MS. EISNER: So I am going to provide its THDKD 0039-0041 most of these are documents that  
20 you produced to our office. You can take a second and look that over. So let's just make sure we  
21 get the identity of all these people on this email chain correct. So we talked about Jenell Brown,  
22 she's the scheduler, Yul Edwards is also on this email. I see a Tumia Romero, do you know who  
23 that is? This is on page...

24 REP. DAVIS: Tumia Romero is a woman who used to work for me and was one of my senior  
25 staff persons. But she had... was actually... left to go work for the governor.

26 MS. EISNER: And then, I also see an email address s [REDACTED] which says it's on behalf of  
27 Suleyman Turhan. So, on that second page of that stack here on page 40. In the last paragraph in  
28 the email exchange from Suleyman Turhan it says, and this is discussing this trip. It says it is  
29 organized by our sister organization in Texas. Do you know what organization he might have  
30 been referring to?

31 REP. DAVIS: I think he was... I mean at the time, other than a similar organization that did the  
32 same thing that he did, that his organization did but they were located in Texas and they  
33 would've been I guess a representative of a different region like if he was the Midwest then  
34 something Texas would be representing Texas and areas, you know, in close proximity to Texas.

35 MR. MORGAN: Is that something that Mr. Turhan mentioned to you in the phone call he made  
36 to you about the trip?

37 REP. DAVIS: I don't recall. I do think that I recall there was a mention of a joint effort on the  
38 part of the two of them that the two organizations...

39 MR. MORGAN: When you say the two of them, the Midwest as well as a Texas based one?

40 REP. DAVIS: A Texas based organization.

1 MS. EISNER: So, a little further up on page 40 in this response from Jenell Brown, the second  
2 page of that stack there. Jenell responds to Mr. Turhan, Can you provide me with the specifics of  
3 what you want the congressman to speak on. So it seems like she's trying to follow up on  
4 something and figure out a little more information. And then on the first page this response  
5 comes from Mr. Kemal Oksuz it looks like a sort of long summary of information that might be  
6 useful. Do you know who Mr. Oksuz was and why he would've then forwarded this  
7 information?

8 REP. DAVIS: No I assume that he was part of the group doing the planning and the he would've  
9 been associated with the sister organization or the comparable organization in Texas. And was  
10 just simply passing on information to Suleyman.

11 MS. EISNER: Let me give you another document to look at which is THDKD 0005. So this  
12 looks like, you know, an invitation for this Baku trip, the convention. And it's signed by this  
13 person we keep talking about Kemal Oksuz and it says he's president of the Turquoise Council  
14 of Americans and Eurasians. And in the second to last paragraph there I says, "Turquoise  
15 Council of Americans and Eurasians as the sole organizer will cover airfare to and from the  
16 event. Your accommodations, ground transportation, all meals during your travel.

17 Moran: Do you recall receiving this invitation?

18 REP. DAVIS: I'm trying to remember if I really do or if I really read it as I'm reading it now. I  
19 just don't recall having read this same as I'm reading it now.

20 MS. EISNER: Did your staff talk to you about this letter? Were there any conversations about it?

21 REP. DAVIS: No, not in terms of somebody saying, well look this may be two different entities  
22 or this may not be the entity that Suleyman Turhan is the head of or no we didn't have that  
23 conversation.

24 MS. EISNER: So knowing kind of what you know now and based on your experience. Why does  
25 it say that this Turquoise Council of Americans and Eurasians is acting as the sole organizer?

26 REP. DAVIS: It would appear to me that they were overarching entity. Overarching the Midwest  
27 organizations.

28 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall ever reaching out to Mr. Turhan to get clarification from him on  
29 who it was that was extending the invitation to you?

30 REP. DAVIS: No, I don't.

31 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall, you know looking back before you went on the trip, do you  
32 recall being confused about who was inviting you or do your recall some miscommunication or  
33 questions about which organizations it was.

34 REP. DAVIS: No. I just kind of took the position that it was Suleyman Turhan and Suleyman  
35 Turhan's organization.

36 MS. EISNER: Show you another document which is THDKD 0023-0024. Give you another  
37 moment to look that over. So the subject line for this email is we still need the schedule for  
38 Azerbaijan. And this is with, the email is between Yul Edwards, Kemal Oksuz, Mr. Turhan is on  
39 the email chain, a few other individuals with mail.house.gov email addresses. Jenell Brown who  
40 we discussed was Josie Ware a staffer in your office?

1 REP. DAVIS: Yes.

2 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall what her position was at this time?

3 REP. DAVIS: Josie is my scheduler in the district office and my secretary.

4 MS. EISNER: So this schedule it does eventually come through and again it comes from this  
5 Kemal Oksuz who kind of keeps appearing here. I guess we are just trying to figure out what his  
6 role was and who this guy was. And he seems he is interacting with Mr. Turhan from the  
7 Midwest Federation, you know. Do you remember this email or I guess this interaction?

8 REP. DAVIS: I'm sure that I saw it and just took the position that I guess it was another  
9 communication from Suleyman Turhan.

10 MR. MORGAN: Do you have any sense why he would've put the word confidential at the top  
11 there? Do you recall seeing that?

12 REP. DAVIS: No.

13 MR. MORGAN: Then do you recall seeing this itinerary that Kemal sent to Mr. Edwards?

14 REP. DAVIS: Yep I recall seeing the yeah the itinerary.

15 MR. MORGAN: Do you remember seeing this item here. Lunch with President Aliyev --  
16 Congressman and his wife?

17 REP. DAVIS: Yeah.

18 MR. MORGAN: The next item, there it says 3 p.m. meeting with speaker, do you know what  
19 that is referring to?

20 REP. DAVIS: Nope.

21 MS. EISNER: Where would these events have been held? This schedule for this day, do you  
22 remember where the lunch was with the president?

23 REP. DAVIS: Well we went to the convention center I guess which was for the primary opening  
24 session and afterwards, I don't recall exactly where we went for lunch.

25 MS. EISNER: Does this seem like an accurate itinerary? Does this represent the itinerary or were  
26 there any other itineraries that would be more accurate?

27 REP. DAVIS: I don't... I mean I don't recall any meeting with any.... And I don't know what  
28 speaker meant in terms of that.

29 MR. MORGAN: Could this... I mean in terms of it being confidential was it... do you think it  
30 was sensitive because of the lunch with the president? I'm just trying to understand why it is he  
31 put confidential at the top there.

32 REP. DAVIS: I would have no idea at all.

33 MS. EISNER: So it seems like Kemal Oksuz was familiar with the itinerary with all these  
34 different events you were scheduled to attend. Do you know if he was present at these events?  
35 Did you see him there?

36 REP. DAVIS: I don't know. I wouldn't know him.

37 MR. MORGAN: Have you ever met him?

38 REP. DAVIS: I don't recall really meeting him.

39 MS. EISNER: You meet anyone else from that organization that he seems to represent? The  
40 Turquoise Council.

1 REP. DAVIS: Well the only other person whom I recall was the women who they I guess, the  
2 partner, from Houston from Texas. I recall her and I recall meeting her.  
3 MR. MORGAN: Did you meet her while in Azerbaijan?  
4 REP. DAVIS: Yeah  
5 MR. MORGAN: What else do you recall about that event?  
6 REP. DAVIS: Well she was very intimately involved in the discussions and the facilitation of  
7 what was taking place.  
8 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall her name?  
9 REP. DAVIS: I don't recall her name but...  
10 MS. EISNER: Was it Irada, does that sound familiar? Or Akhoundova?  
11 REP. DAVIS: I just don't remember. I don't recall. I just recall her and that she seemed to have  
12 been, you know, seriously in charge of what was taking place.  
13 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall that she was a person with the Turquoise Council?  
14 REP. DAVIS: I don't know if it was the Turquoise Council or not that she was with but she was  
15 as I understand it, the person in charge of the organization in Houston and was very intimately  
16 associated with putting together the events and activities.  
17 MS. EISNER: Did you see her interact with Suleyman Turhan?  
18 REP. DAVIS: No more than they may have said something to each other I may have observed  
19 them communicating or something but I couldn't say there were extensive periods of time that I  
20 would've seen them.  
21 MS. EISNER: She said that she... oh go ahead.  
22 REP. DAVIS: I'm saying I'm sure that I saw them communicate but I couldn't say that it was  
23 over any extensive period of time or that...  
24 MR. MORGAN: So I just want to make sure that I'm clear in my understanding. What gave you  
25 the impression that this particular woman was in charge or was...  
26 REP. DAVIS: Because every time we had a session or something we'd go meet with somebody  
27 she'd always have some things to say.  
28 MR. MORGAN: As in introducing people or...  
29 REP. DAVIS: Introducing people or people introducing themselves to her or people interacting  
30 with her.  
31 MS. EISNER: And you said that she seemed like she was seriously involved, was there anyone  
32 else that seemed like they had that role?  
33 REP. DAVIS: Not that I would've have discerned. I mean, the only other people that I really any  
34 knowledge and knew would've been Suleyman Turhan.  
35 MS. EISNER: Okay and was he present at the convention? Did you see a lot of him?  
36 REP. DAVIS: I didn't see a lot of him. I'm trying to remember I think he was present yes.  
37 MS. EISNER: So as far as getting from place to place and knowing where to go next was there  
38 anyone else involved in that element of the convention?  
39 REP. DAVIS: Not that I'm aware of.

1 MR. MORGAN: So if... while you were at the convention who was your sort of point of contact  
2 with logistics?  
3 REP. DAVIS: Suleyman.  
4 MR. MORGAN: It was Suleyman?  
5 REP. DAVIS: Yeah and I do recall he was there and I do recall meeting his wife.  
6 MR. MORGAN: So if you had a question about getting to a place or a question about your hotel  
7 room that would've been directed to Suleyman.  
8 REP. DAVIS: I would've thought immediately of Suleyman.  
9 MR. MORGAN: Did he have any other staffers or assistants helping him that you recall?  
10 REP. DAVIS: I just don't know.  
11 MS. EISNER: Can you talk about your experience at the convention, your itinerary, what did  
12 you do when you were there?  
13 REP. DAVIS: Well we met with the... lots of, I guess, like chamber of commerce, meetings and  
14 there would be some discussion about things that were taking place and development that was  
15 occurring and progress that was being made.  
16 MS. EISNER: When you say Chamber of Commerce type of people, where they government  
17 officials or...?  
18 REP. DAVIS: I got the impression that they... many of them were not but some were  
19 government officials. But some were business types who were a part of the interaction.  
20 MS. EISNER: What about this lunch with the president that we were talking about. Who was  
21 present for that lunch?  
22 REP. DAVIS: It seemed to me that there were you know a bunch of different people who some  
23 were named individuals that you know who had name and then of course other people that I  
24 would've not had any...  
25 MR. MORGAN: How big of a group was that, for lunch?  
26 REP. DAVIS: I'm trying to remember. It was not a mammoth gallery it...  
27 MR. MORGAN: Would you say less than 50?  
28 REP. DAVIS: I'd say somewhere in the neighborhood of that.  
29 MR. MORGAN: Of 50?  
30 REP. DAVIS: It may have been even more but...  
31 MR. MORGAN: Were other members of congress there?  
32 REP. DAVIS: I think there were two or three members of congress who were there.  
33 MR. MORGAN: Other than the president of Azerbaijan do you recall other Azerbaijani  
34 government officials being present for that lunch.  
35 REP. DAVIS: There were, but I don't recall who they were or what role they may have been  
36 playing in all.  
37 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall any business interests being represented at that lunch? Like  
38 anybody from, I think Azerbaijan has a fairly large state oil company, SOCAR. Do you  
39 remember them?

1 REP. DAVIS: I remember conversations about oil and oil company. I don't remember any  
2 personalities that I could identify or say so and so, this person was from the oil company but  
3 there was a great deal of conversation about oil and energy.  
4 MS. EISNER: Were they... were the conversations with government officials?  
5 REP. DAVIS: Some were and some were not  
6 MR. MORGAN: So did the president speak at the lunch?  
7 REP. DAVIS: Yeah, I believe he did.  
8 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall what he spoke about?  
9 REP. DAVIS: Progress that they were making and how much friendship they wanted to have  
10 with the United States and they were strategic allies and I mean that seemed to be the theme that  
11 I recall.  
12 MR. MORGAN: Was it a long... do you recall if it was a long speech?  
13 REP. DAVIS: It wasn't necessarily all that long. Not long enough to get bored or anything like  
14 that.  
15 MS. EISNER: Did you speak at the convention?  
16 REP. DAVIS: I did at the, you know, a bunch of us did greetings at the primary session and you  
17 know you may have had something to say in some of these gatherings, which would've been a  
18 few minutes or so... you know. But nothing like the 15 minutes that some guy suggested.  
19 MS. EISNER: Okay so it wasn't 15 minutes?  
20 REP. DAVIS: No  
21 MS. EISNER: Do you know who asked you to speak?  
22 REP. DAVIS: All of the communication that I recall or had in terms of any prep or movement  
23 would've been Suleyman Turhan.  
24 MS. EISNER: I guess just being present at the convention did it seem like there was one  
25 organization that was coordinating the whole thing?  
26 REP. DAVIS: I couldn't tell or couldn't determine that, because I think my focus was that  
27 Suleyman and the women from Houston or Suleyman and the organization from Houston were  
28 the facilitators of the whole thing.  
29 MS. EISNER: What about... you know this seems like it was a really big convention there were  
30 a lot of, you know, maybe other staffers were there, maybe some business interests. I think you  
31 said that the opening session seemed like it was a really big session. You know for everyone  
32 else, did it seem like there was a table where you could go and get information or any kind of  
33 central source of organization for the conference? Was there... did you see any kind of, you  
34 know, welcome tables or signs?  
35 REP. DAVIS: I don't think I paid any attention to that... I wasn't going to be... given anything  
36 although I consider myself an avid reader; I had no stuff to read.  
37 MR. MORGAN: Maybe... I'm hoping you can give us a sort of sense of kind of whose  
38 convention this was. And I can... sort of in one scenario I can imagine that Suleyman and the  
39 Houston organization maybe they were your point of contact or sort of in charge of your  
40 participation in the convention. But looking at the convention as a whole, did you have a sense of

1 which organization or which organizations if they were multiple, were in charge of the  
2 convention?

3 REP. DAVIS: Not beyond those two I mean I just kind of felt that these two organizations had  
4 come together and pretty much worked with the authorities in Azerbaijan and brought these  
5 people over to talk and to be briefed and to be educated and to learn and to know. And so in my  
6 mind those were the two entities that were in charge of whatever was going on.

7 MR. MORGAN: And when you say in charge of whatever was going on not just in charge of  
8 your interaction with the convention but with the convention as a whole?

9 REP. DAVIS: Yeah. You know with whoever their local partners would've been to have been  
10 engaged with them.

11 MR. MORGAN: Did you have any sense of who those local partners might have been?

12 REP. DAVIS: No

13 MR. MORGAN: I think you... I mean the President of Azerbaijan spoke at this lunch and you  
14 know from information we've seen it seems like at least the Azerbaijani Government had a fairly  
15 prominent role at the convention. Did you get a sense of what their level of involvement was?

16 REP. DAVIS: That was my feeling. I mean I obviously to me if the president is going to be  
17 somewhere or be a part of something taking place that the government the administration  
18 would've been intimately involved with creating it.

19 MR. MORGAN: Did you see... some of the other witnesses mentioned you know attendance by  
20 a minister of energy other sorts of government ministers from Azerbaijan some people have told  
21 us that it was Azerbaijani or state police running security at the event, do you recall any of that?

22 REP. DAVIS: That I really didn't pay any attention to didn't have any sense of that. Although  
23 you know I would not have been surprised given the fact that the president had been there or was  
24 there whatever time the president was there and whenever members of his cabinet and other  
25 political figures who were there. But I didn't really make any observations relative to that.

26 MS. EISNER: And in some of the itineraries that we've seen there was a lunch on May 30<sup>th</sup> with  
27 and executive team from SOCAR which is the State Oil Company of Azerbaijan. Do you  
28 remember that lunch?

29 REP. DAVIS: It seems like I do and that much of the discussion, you know, was really briefings  
30 about how much oil and how much oil was a big part of what went on. So I got the impression  
31 that the oil company, very much a part of the agenda.

32 MR. MORGAN: When you say, "how much oil was a big part of what went on," can you be a  
33 little bit more specific?

34 REP. DAVIS: Well I think energy was discussed every place that we went and of course energy  
35 to me meant oil and the role that oil played in creating and maintaining the economy of the  
36 environment. And so to me it was a lot of discussion about oil.

37 MR. MORGAN: Did that strike you as unusual?

38 REP. DAVIS: No.

39 MR. MORGAN: Were you... were they pitching something was there an ask?

1 REP. DAVIS: I think there was... no I never got the impression other than friendship,  
2 relationship trade opportunities. That was not necessarily all that specific but that here is the  
3 thing that we are promoting friendship between our country and the United States of America  
4 and you know we're just sharing this information with those of you who are here and you can  
5 help spread the gospel of oil opportunity and so forth.

6 MS. EISNER: Did SOCAR that company... I mean we talked about that lunch did they host any  
7 other events during the convention?

8 REP. DAVIS: I'm not sure or I don't know.

9 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall any discussions about a Southern Gas Corridor project is that  
10 something you're familiar with?

11 REP. DAVIS: I'm not sure it was, but I do recall a project being talked about. Whether it was  
12 something to do with gas or not, I'm not sure about that. But I do recall a project as people talked  
13 about future developments and things that were in the planning stages and development stages  
14 and things that were being planned to be done.

15 MS. EISNER: Did you attend a few other events that we heard about? Did you attend an event  
16 that was held at the Gulustan Palace it was on May 28<sup>th</sup> and it was hosted by the Azerbaijan US  
17 Interparliamentary Working Group, and an organization called the American Friends of  
18 Azerbaijan. Do you remember going to the Gulustan Palace?

19 REP. DAVIS: I'm trying to remember. It seems as though we did go to you know, a kind of  
20 classy event but I'm not sure where it was or if it...

21 MS. EISNER: What do you remember from that event?

22 REP. DAVIS: Well just that it was kind of upscale in terms of the social amenities and that's  
23 about it.

24 MS. EISNER: Do you remember that organization, the American Friends of Azerbaijan?

25 REP. DAVIS: No.

26 MS. EISNER: If they played any role in that event? Okay.

27 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall if Mr. Turhan went to that event with you?

28 REP. DAVIS: I don't know, but I do know that I saw him from time to time in the whole scheme  
29 of things.

30 MS. EISNER: What about that woman we've been talking about who's connected to Houston,  
31 do you know if she was there?

32 REP. DAVIS: I don't recall whether or not she was there or not. Although most of the things that  
33 I went to... we went to she was pretty much front and center.

34 MS. EISNER: Did the convention have any corporate sponsors?

35 REP. DAVIS: I don't remember.

36 MR. MORGAN: They may have... we've seen some pictures of the main sort of stage at the  
37 convention and there was a large banner behind the stage that listed various entities of being, you  
38 know a couple of entities were listed as main sponsors and there were a couple of identities  
39 identified as organizers and then below that there was a list of sponsors. Do you recall seeing  
40 that?

1 REP. DAVIS: It seems that I do recall seeing a banner of sorts what was on it I cannot say and I  
2 don't recall but I do recall a banner.

3 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall that the banner had company logos on it?

4 REP. DAVIS: Yes.

5 MR. MORGAN: But you don't recall which specific companies?

6 REP. DAVIS: No

7 MS. EISNER: Did you have any interactions with I guess any US based oil companies at the  
8 convention?

9 REP. DAVIS: Not that I'm remembering.

10 MS. EISNER: See if anyone like BP or Conoco Philips?

11 REP. DAVIS: Not that I recall.

12 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall interacting with like state legislators while you were at the  
13 convention? I think we've been told there were a number of state level officials in attendance  
14 from the United States. Do you recall that at all?

15 REP. DAVIS: I do recall that there were some individuals there. There weren't any individuals  
16 that I knew or individuals that I interacted with. I don't think there were any individuals from  
17 Illinois that I recall.

18 MR. MORGAN: So when you.... You know, one of the individuals who went related to us that  
19 he was surprised, he gets to a, you know, dinner and there he is surrounded by New Hampshire  
20 state legislators, do you recall in terms of your and your wife's seating arrangements were you  
21 .... What types of individuals were you seated by?

22 REP. DAVIS: You know I don't recall who may have been at the table or that kind of thing.

23 MR. MORGAN: So I imagine that you would've been put into a little be more of the VIP type  
24 table maybe not state legislators.

25 REP. DAVIS: But I do recall there were state legislators who were there. I do recall but given the  
26 fact they were not from Illinois I didn't necessarily....

27 MS. EISNER: Sure, do you know what the process was through which you received a visa to go  
28 to Azerbaijan?

29 REP. DAVIS: I'm trying to see, I guess we just applied.

30 MS. EISNER: So I guess the way it's been described to us, you know, you need a state sponsor  
31 to come in and get the visa. So you a kind of organization or state entity in Azerbaijan to sponsor  
32 you so you can get the visa and, you know, attend the trip. Did you know that SOCAR, this State  
33 Oil Company, processed your visa for the trip?

34 REP. DAVIS: No

35 MS. EISNER: Do you know why they would've been involved or why they would've you know  
36 taken that level of responsibility?

37 REP. DAVIS: No

38 MS. EISNER: Did it seem like SOCAR had any other presence, physical presence at the  
39 convention, besides, you know, the lunch that we talked about?

1 REP. DAVIS: I don't recall any other than just knowing that much of the discussion and many of  
2 the discussions were associated with oil and energy and you know the extent to which they were  
3 the under girders of that or whatever I don't really know. But I do know that it was about oil.  
4 MS. EISNER: Yeah it certainly seems to be that way. Do you have any knowledge about  
5 whether they provided any funding for the convention, this SOCAR, the State Oil Company?  
6 REP. DAVIS: I wouldn't have any...  
7 MS. EISNER: I'm going to provide you with your traveler form which you gave to our office  
8 which is THDKD 0037. And...  
9 MR. MORGAN: The sponsor post travel disclosure forms.  
10 MS. EISNER: And I think I will also provide you a copy of the forms that we actually pulled  
11 from the Clerks Website. So this is a document that contains the member officer post travel  
12 disclosure form, traveler form, primary trip sponsor form, and it is 1, 2 this is a 5 page packet  
13 and this is available publicly on the Clerks Website.  
14 MR. MORGAN: So who in your congressional office or if it was you yourself, who would've  
15 been involved in putting together these forms and getting approval from the Committee on  
16 Ethics?  
17 REP. DAVIS: If it's in DC it would be Jenell Brown. If it was in Chicago it would be Josie  
18 Ward.  
19 MS. EISNER: And would they talk to you about these forms? Would you have to see these  
20 forms before they were signed and passed along?  
21 REP. DAVIS: Yes.  
22 MS. EISNER: Do you recall these forms specifically?  
23 REP. DAVIS: Yes.  
24 MS. EISNER: So the form lists, all these forms list the Turkish American Federation of the  
25 Midwest as the sponsor. Did you have any reason to question whether this organization was the  
26 sponsor?  
27 REP. DAVIS: I really did not.  
28 MS. EISNER: Did you know that not all members who attended the convention were sponsored  
29 by this group by TAA... by this Midwest organization?  
30 REP. DAVIS: No.  
31 MS. EISNER: Were there any conversations I guess between members at the convention about  
32 who the real sponsor for the convention was?  
33 REP. DAVIS: Not to my knowledge.  
34 MR. MORGAN: Why didn't you also list that Houston based organization as a sponsor?  
35 REP. DAVIS: I guess we just kind of took the position or felt that our part of it was the Midwest  
36 Turkish Federation and that would've been the entity that applied, I mean, to us or to my  
37 participation.  
38 MR. MORGAN: And you said, that's the position you took. Was there a debate or a discussion  
39 in the office over which entity was... ?

1 REP. DAVIS: No we just felt, I mean we just automatically felt, I mean I knew that there had  
2 been some mention of this being a partnership thing that was being done with Suleyman and his  
3 counterpart in Houston but I mean the information that we had just suggested that the Midwest  
4 Turkish Federation was the outfit that related to what we were doing or related to my  
5 involvement.

6 MR. MORGAN: The third page of that packet on top there.

7 MS. EISNER: The primary trip sponsor form.

8 MR. MORGAN: So this is a form, you know correct me if I'm wrong but I think this is a form  
9 that would've been completed by someone outside of your congressional office so probably by  
10 someone at the Midwest or someone else. Do you see there line 2 it says that, "I represent that  
11 the trip will not be financed in whole or in part by..." excuse me line 3 is what I want to ask you  
12 about, "I represent that A) the primary trip sponsor has not accepted from any other source funds  
13 intended directly or indirectly to finance any part of the trip," and you'll notice that they checked  
14 that box there.

15 REP. DAVIS: Yeah

16 MR. MORGAN: Did you have reason to believe that the Houston based organization was  
17 providing financial support for your aspects of the trip?

18 REP. DAVIS: I really did not consider that or think of that. I guess we were just simply relying  
19 on the information that was provided to us by Suleyman Turhan.

20 MR. MORGAN: Okay. Do you recall at some point forms had to be submitted to the committee  
21 on ethics for the committee to approve the trip? What do you recall about that approval process  
22 for this trip? Do you recall Mr. Edwards or someone else in your office giving you updates on  
23 how that was going or asking you questions about it?

24 REP. DAVIS: I think we were just proceeding along the normal course that did not appear to be  
25 any snags and that kind of thing.

26 MR. MORGAN: Yeah.

27 REP. DAVIS: As long as the dates continued to jive with the dates we had set aside in terms of  
28 saying that, "yeah we can do it on those days" then I don't think we had any other...

29 MR. MORGAN: Okay. Well and I just want to be really clear in the questions because what  
30 happens on our end is, Helen and I have to make a presentation to our board of what we've  
31 found, the facts we've found with regard to your travel and so I want to be clear and ask you the  
32 question that I think our board members will likely ask us, which is you know, if you look at this  
33 invitation you received from Mr. Oksuz and it's THDKD\_05, and I... very respectfully  
34 Congressman, I want to post this question to you which is, you know in this one email or letter  
35 from Mr. Oksuz, you're being told that the Turquoise Council will cover all your expenses. And  
36 then what we have sort of later in time is your office and TAFM, Midwest Group, representing to  
37 the Committee on Ethics that the Midwest organization would pay for everything and I just want  
38 to make sure that we understand what could've possibly caused that switch of organization or if  
39 it was a discrepancy? And what the reasons for that might be.

1 REP. DAVIS: And of course I wouldn't have any information related to that or any knowledge  
2 other than we're proceeding with the Turkish ... Midwest Turkish Federation as the sponsors that  
3 we knew of the trip and I think that's what we knew.  
4 MR. MORGAN: Okay. I mean you understand why I'm asking that question about the –  
5 REP. DAVIS: Mhmm.  
6 MR. MORGAN: Okay.  
7 REP. DAVIS: Yeah, I never knew you know, what this Turkish Council of Americans and  
8 Eurasians; I've never known anything about them or who they were, what they do, or anything in  
9 that nature.  
10 MS. EISNER: Okay.  
11 MR. MORGAN: So, is it fair to say that in your mind, at all times, you viewed the Midwest  
12 organization as being the one paying for your participation, the convention?  
13 REP. DAVIS: Yes.  
14 MR. MORGAN: There wasn't a time, there wasn't a point of time in your mind where you  
15 thought it was the Houston based organization and then it switched to the Midwest? It was the  
16 Midwest the entire time? Is that correct?  
17 REP. DAVIS: That's correct.  
18 MR. MORGAN: Okay.  
19 MS. EISNER: Well we want to ask you a few more questions. We're nearing the end here.  
20 We're getting closer. So, going back to the convention, did you receive any gifts at the  
21 convention?  
22 REP. DAVIS: There was a ... yeah, a brief case that individuals were given.  
23 MS. EISNER: Okay. Who was given the briefcase?  
24 REP. DAVIS: I got one. My wife got one.  
25 MS. EISNER: Okay. And what was the context for you know, for getting this briefcase? Was it  
26 a –  
27 REP. DAVIS: I think it was ... I don't know, just a gift. No... matter of fact, I gave mine to one  
28 of the volunteers you know that worked with us, but I think that was ...  
29 MR. MORGAN: Who was it a gift from?  
30 REP. DAVIS: I assumed that it was from the Turkish... Federation of the Midwest. That's who  
31 we –  
32 MS. EISNER: So how did you... I mean was it given to you at a meeting or was it at the end of  
33 the convention?  
34 REP. DAVIS: I think it was ... I think it was in our hotel. I believe.  
35 MS. EISNER: Okay. Do you know if there was a note attached or any type of...?  
36 REP. DAVIS: I think we were just told this was a gift.  
37 MR. MORGAN: Did you thank anyone for it?  
38 REP. DAVIS: Not in terms of any written communication or anything of that sort.  
39 MS. EISNER: So you gave yours to a volunteer in your office? Is that in D.C.?  
40 REP. DAVIS: Yes. Mhmm.

1 MS. EISNER: And did your wife keep the one she got?  
2 REP. DAVIS: I think she kept the one that she got. She still has it.  
3 MR. MORGAN: Could you describe the briefcase?  
4 REP. DAVIS: It's a green looking you know, kind of...  
5 MR. MORGAN: Like a leather –  
6 REP. DAVIS: Slick looking... It looks more like an alligator. At least that's what it looked like  
7 to me.  
8 MR. MORGAN: Okay.  
9 MS. EISNER: When you got back, did you, you know, fill out any paper work related to the  
10 briefcase?  
11 REP. DAVIS: We just filed the post-travel form.  
12 MS. EISNER: Post-travel form. Did you get it valued or any attempt to kind of see what it was  
13 worth?  
14 REP. DAVIS: I didn't because it had no value to me at all. I'm sure it has value, but...  
15 MR. MORGAN: Do you have a sense of what that value might be? Did it strike you as a pretty  
16 nice briefcase or pretty cheap item?  
17 REP. DAVIS: No, I thought it was a pretty nice briefcase, but I'm saying...  
18 MR. MORGAN: Was it a brand-name briefcase?  
19 REP. DAVIS: I didn't...  
20 MR. MORGAN: Did it have a little logo on it or name on it?  
21 REP. DAVIS: I didn't check to see, but it had no value to me as a, you know... it certainly was  
22 something that I could've done without. Not something...  
23 MR. MORGAN: Green not your favorite color?  
24 MS. EISNER: Alligator...  
25 REP. DAVIS: Well everybody rolls everything nowadays and so, if you're going to use it you  
26 have to carry it, but that's...  
27 MS. EISNER: Do you know if anyone else got briefcases?  
28 REP. DAVIS: Oh yeah, I saw briefcases. I'm saying I saw people being given briefcases. Yeah.  
29 MS. EISNER: What about other members of Congress? Was it something that was given to  
30 everyone?  
31 REP. DAVIS: I don't remember if there was any member of Congress around where I may have  
32 been.  
33 MS. EISNER: Any other gifts that –  
34 REP. DAVIS: I think there was also a kind of a rug of some kind that... I don't think it's ever  
35 been opened.  
36 MS. EISNER: Oh, where is it now?  
37 REP. DAVIS: I think it's someplace in my basement.  
38 MS. EISNER: Okay. So you didn't open it up and look at it?  
39 REP. DAVIS: It's in... it's nothing for me to do with it other than...  
40 MR. MORGAN: Was that something that you received in your hotel room as well?

1 REP. DAVIS: I think that was, yeah.  
2 MR. MORGAN: Some people have described to us that the rugs were in a red bag or a maroon  
3 bag? Is that –  
4 REP. DAVIS: Something like that.  
5 MR. MORGAN: Something like that. Do you recall if it was one rug or if there were two?  
6 REP. DAVIS: I think there was one. As a matter of fact the problem was, how do you get this  
7 back?  
8 MS. EISNER: Who did you think this rug came from?  
9 REP. DAVIS: I thought it came from the Turkish Federation of the Midwest. That – that... you  
10 know that everything would've been a part of their trip planning. I mean that... somebody may  
11 have given it to them, I mean...  
12 MS. EISNER: Okay. If it's still in its original package, or I don't know if it is, but still wrapped  
13 up, does it have any you know tags connect to it or notes or anything that would indicate where it  
14 came from?  
15 REP. DAVIS: I don't know. I'd have to try to look and see.  
16 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall receiving any other gifts while you were there?  
17 REP. DAVIS: No.  
18 MR. MORGAN: Any silk scarves? Tea set? Along those lines?  
19 MS. EISNER: How about a DVD box set, from the president of Turkey? Or I guess you weren't  
20 in the Turkey portion so... We've... some people I think received two rugs, but you recall  
21 receiving that one rug? Is that correct?  
22 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall how big it was?  
23 REP. DAVIS: I think it... it was about this size.  
24 MS. EISNER: 2-3 ft...  
25 MR. MORGAN: 2-3 ft wide? What was about its length? Do you recall?  
26 REP. DAVIS: Yeah, I think it's about this... both ways.  
27 MR. MORGAN: 2-3 ft by 2-3 ft?  
28 REP. DAVIS: Yeah.  
29 MR. MORGAN: Okay.  
30 MS. EISNER: Any other gifts that we should know about?  
31 REP. DAVIS: Nope. Nothing that I recall.  
32 MS. EISNER: Did you have any discussions with the Committee on Ethics about the briefcase  
33 or the rug or anything else you received during the trip?  
34 REP. DAVIS: No.  
35 MS. EISNER: Okay.  
36 MR. MORGAN: Was there ever any discussion in your Congressional office between you and  
37 your staff, whether or not it was permissible to keep the rug or keep the briefcases?  
38 REP. DAVIS: No, I don't believe so. Yeah. I think, no... I don't recall having any... I think we  
39 probably assumed a little bit there that if it was being handed out as a part that then it was in all

1 likelihood appropriate because it really had no value to ... well for me it didn't, but... maybe to  
2 some members or some people who...

3 MR. MORGAN: So just to make sure we're clear, your thinking about the rug and about the  
4 briefcases was that because it was given to you as part of the convention, it was permissible for  
5 you to keep or do with them as you saw fit?

6 REP. DAVIS: Yeah.

7 MR. MORGAN: Okay.

8 MS. EISNER: Have you had any conversations with anyone from the Midwest Federation  
9 recently?

10 REP. DAVIS: No.

11 MR. MORGAN: And we say recently like in the past few months?

12 REP. DAVIS: Nope, not that I recall. Certainly not about the trip or... anything.

13 MR. MORGAN: Any attempt by anyone with the Midwest organization or that Houston group  
14 to reach out to talk to you about the trip?

15 REP. DAVIS: No.

16 MS. EISNER: Any efforts to get you to I don't know, follow-up on behalf of the State officials  
17 that you did meet or maybe the president of the country when you returned to help with any you  
18 know, official matters or do anything kind of ceremonial?

19 REP. DAVIS: No, I think before the election I think there was an inquiry as to how I felt about  
20 the president and whether or not I'd make any comment on –

21 MS. EISNER: Okay.

22 MR. MORGAN: How you felt about the president of Azerbaijan?

23 REP. DAVIS: Yeah.

24 MS. EISNER: Who did that –

25 REP. DAVIS: We contacted the State Department and inquired and they said, well it's nothing  
26 that prohibits it me from doing it, but we just assumed that you didn't.

27 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall who made that request of you?

28 REP. DAVIS: Suleyman.

29 MR. MORGAN: Suleyman did?

30 REP. DAVIS: Yeah.

31 MR. MORGAN: And was he hoping you would endorse the current president? Or what was he  
32 going –

33 REP. DAVIS: I don't know if it necessarily would be called an endorsement.

34 MR. MORGAN: Okay. How would you describe it?

35 REP. DAVIS: But just a... any statement relative to how I thought the president was carrying out  
36 his functions and... if he was a good president or...

37 MR. MORGAN: Was Suleyman hoping your comments about the president would be positive?

38 REP. DAVIS: I ... you know I can't say what he was thinking, but I would imagine so. Yeah, I  
39 would imagine...

1 MR. MORGAN: I honestly don't know if he was looking for critical remarks about the  
2 president or positive, you would have a better sense.

3 REP. DAVIS: Because I didn't know that's why we called State Department and we didn't  
4 make any because the State Department just sort of said, there's no prohibition, there's...but we  
5 just assumed that you didn't. That you just may not want to do that in terms of...

6 MS. EISNER: Any other similar contact where they reached out to you, Midwest, and asked you  
7 for anything similar to that?

8 REP. DAVIS: No.

9 MS. EISNER: What about you know any conversations with some of the individuals we've been  
10 talking about, the woman from the Houston organization, is she... have you had any contact with  
11 her in the last –

12 REP. DAVIS: No.

13 MS. EISNER: Okay. What about Kemal Oksuz, the individual we've been talking about; has he  
14 reached out to you or had any conversations with you in the last year or so?

15 REP. DAVIS: No.

16 MS. EISNER: Has anyone contacted you and you know tried to discuss this investigation or the  
17 work of the Office of Congressional Ethics in this review?

18 REP. DAVIS: No.

19 MS. EISNER: Okay.

20 MR. MORGAN: I think you have a sense of what questions we have. Is there – I noticed you  
21 brought some documents in with you, is there anything you'd like to share with us? Anything  
22 else you'd like to say for the record?

23 REP. DAVIS: Well those were just copies of the documents that you had supplied.

24 MR. MORGAN: Oh, okay.

25 REP. DAVIS: And I just brought them for...

26 MR. MORGAN: No, I just asked because I wasn't sure if there was additional documents you  
27 wanted us to see or anything along those lines. You're certainly welcome to offer anything like  
28 that right now if you'd like to.

29 REP. DAVIS: No, we don't – I don't have any... any other documents or communication or  
30 anything beyond what we have discussed.

31 MR. MORGAN: Okay.

32 MS. EISNER: Great. We will go ahead and stop the recording.

1 Helen Eisner: This is Helen Eisner, from the Office of Congressional Ethics, joined by  
2 Omar Ashmawy and we have Jason Rother.

3 Jason Rother: Correct.

4 Helen Eisner: Rob Walker and ConocoPhillips Manager 1. Make sure I'm pronouncing  
5 everything correctly. We are in Houston and we have just given  
6 ConocoPhillips Manager 1 information about 18 U.S.C. § 1001. She has  
7 signed the acknowledgement form. We have told her we will be recording  
8 the interview and I think, at this point, we will go ahead and get started.  
9 What was your position at ConocoPhillips?

10 Witness: I was a Manager of External and Government Affairs.

11 Helen Eisner: Okay. How long were you in that position?

12 Witness: Since 2000.

13 Helen Eisner: Did you have a position at ConocoPhillips before then?

14 Witness: Not like that.

15 Helen Eisner: What was the title of your prior positions at ConocoPhillips?

16 Witness: I don't recall exactly, but like advisor ... director.

17 Helen Eisner: Okay. When did you start working at ConocoPhillips?

18 Witness: In '78.

19 Helen Eisner: Okay. Going directly to the manager position. What were your duties in  
20 that position?

21 Witness: It was different, depending on the different job I held, but mostly it's to  
22 establish and maintain the government relationship with the different  
23 countries where our company operates, in order for them to have a way to  
24 go into the country and negotiate the contracts.

25 Helen Eisner: Okay. How would you do that?

26 Witness: How would I?

27 Helen Eisner: Establish and develop the relationships with different countries.

28 Witness: That's a trade secret. [crosstalk]

1 Helen Eisner: Can you talk generally about the day-to-day work that you did to go about  
2 accomplishing that goal?

3 Witness: A lot of people, say in the Soviet Union or former Soviet Union, I knew  
4 from my time, a long time ago.

5 Helen Eisner: Okay.

6 Witness: Just maintained a relationship. I met a lot of people through the  
7 conferences, through the network events, like through the Embassy  
8 functions.

9 Helen Eisner: Okay. Did you interact with members of Congress in that position?

10 Witness: Not very much.

11 Helen Eisner: What is ...

12 Rob Walker: The U.S. Congress, right?

13 Helen Eisner: With the ... Yes, I'm sorry.

14 Rob Walker: Yeah.

15 Helen Eisner: With the United States Congress. You said 'not very much' as applied to  
16 the United States Congress?

17 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

18 Helen Eisner: When you say 'not very much,' could you categorize that as once a month,  
19 twice a month ... Would any of those apply?

20 Witness: Not that often.

21 Helen Eisner: Not that often. Okay. In that position as manager, did you report to  
22 anyone?

23 Witness: Yes.

24 Helen Eisner: Who did you report to?

25 Witness: Like where in my last job or what?

26 Omar Ashmawy: Yeah, in your last position as Manager of Internal Government Affairs.

1 Witness: I had to do a reporting relationship. Lynn Strickland was Vice President  
2 for Exploration. I reported to her and then Bill Burkett, who was the  
3 manager for the Business Development.

4 Omar Ashmawy: Could you repeat the first name again? Lynn?

5 Witness: Strickland.

6 Omar Ashmawy: Lynn Strickland and Bill Burkett?

7 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

8 Helen Eisner: Were they located in the same office as you?

9 Witness: Correct.

10 Helen Eisner: Okay. Who is Farkhad Kasimov?

11 Witness: Farkhad Kasimov is our local contractor in Azerbaijan.

12 Helen Eisner: Okay. Who is Kay Larcom?

13 Witness: Kay Larcom, she is Manager of International- I think, International  
14 Affairs. I don't know exactly her title, but she is in our Washington office.

15 Helen Eisner: Okay. Do you know the Turkic American Associations. Are you familiar  
16 with the Turkic American Associations?

17 Witness: I know the Turquoise- Something that has a Turquoise name, who is an  
18 organization.

19 Helen Eisner: The Turquoise ...

20 Witness: Something Council or ...

21 Omar Ashmawy: The Turquoise Council of Americans and Eurasians?

22 Witness: Yeah.

23 Omar Ashmawy: TCAE. Is that the organization?

24 Witness: I remember I like the Turquoise, because it was association with a stone.

25 Omar Ashmawy: Was it the Association ... President was- His name was Kemal?

26 Witness: I think so.

1 Omar Ashmawy: Kemal Oksuz?

2 Witness: I think so.

3 Omar Ashmawy: We'll end up talking about the Turquoise Council in a minute, but are you  
4 familiar with organizations that are known as The Turkic American  
5 Federation of the Midwest, Turkic Federation of the Mid-Atlantic?  
6 [crosstalk] of the South ...

7 Witness: Never heard of them.

8 Omar Ashmawy: Never hear of them, okay.

9 Helen Eisner: Okay. Let's just talk a little bit more for a second about The Turquoise  
10 Council of Americans and Eurasians. How did you hear about them? How  
11 did you learn about them?

12 Witness: I honestly cannot recall who- how the connection was made.

13 Helen Eisner: Okay. Do you know what they do?

14 Witness: No.

15 Helen Eisner: Okay. Do you know how they're funded?

16 Witness: No.

17 Helen Eisner: All right. Are you familiar with the State Oil Company of Azerbaijan, also  
18 known as SOCAR?

19 Witness: Correct.

20 Helen Eisner: What is that? What is SOCAR?

21 Witness: SOCAR? It's the State Oil Company of Azerbaijan, it's the abbreviation  
22 for all of those words.

23 Helen Eisner: How did you become familiar with them?

24 Witness: Because I travel in the country and if you want to do business in the  
25 country, that's who you-we're an oil company and that's who I asked  
26 Farkhad to meet. I set up meetings for our business development or for our  
27 upper management to meet with them through Farkhad.

28 Helen Eisner: When you say 'travel in the country,' which country are you referring to?

1 Witness: Azerbaijan.

2 Helen Eisner: Okay. Just want to make that clear for our transcript here.

3 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

4 Helen Eisner: You said you set up meetings. How would you set up the meetings?

5 Witness: Is that okay?

6 Rob Walker: I think so.

7 Witness: No, I mean ...

8 Rob Walker: Would you like to talk with us?

9 Witness: No, I don't want to talk to you, I just like ... You want a long story? You  
10 want a short ... [crosstalk] Let's say I was a message carrier. I would go  
11 and ask for the meeting. Farkhad usually will-since he's a person on the  
12 ground-he will arrange the meeting for me. Here comes ConocoPhillips  
13 Government Affairs Manager. We sit down at the table and I explain,  
14 because I also speak the language. I explain to the management of  
15 SOCAR why somebody is coming, what's the reason, what's the purpose,  
16 what we're trying to accomplish. Based on that information, they either  
17 will say, "Yeah, you know, let's look at the dates. Let's set up a meeting,"  
18 and it will happen.

19 Omar Ashmawy: Do you have anyone at SOCAR that you regularly used to communicate  
20 with?

21 Witness: Depending on who's coming, you match up big people. Depending on who  
22 is coming, if it coming, like our president, then the president wants to talk  
23 to the president of SOCAR. If it's a business development group then it's a  
24 business devel- It wasn't anybody special or particular that I would go and  
25 talk to.

26 Helen Eisner: Okay.

27 Witness: If it's transportation issue, I'll go talk to them. If it's marketing ...

28 Helen Eisner: Do you know Rauf Mammadov?

29 Witness: Ralph? [crosstalk 00:08:49]

30 Helen Eisner: Rauf, Ralph ...

1 Omar Ashmawy: Rauf Mammadov?  
2 Witness: No.  
3 Rob Walker: Can you spell that?  
4 Helen Eisner: It's R-A-U-F M-A-M-M-A-D-O-V.  
5 Witness: No, I don't.  
6 Helen Eisner: Okay. Again, pardon my pronunciation with some of these names.  
7 Another person-do you know Zaur Gahramanov, which is Z-A-U-R G-A-  
8 H-R-A-M-A-N-O-V?  
9 Witness: No.  
10 Omar Ashmawy: How about someone by the name of Kenul Ismailova?  
11 Witness: No. [crosstalk]  
12 Rob Walker: May I ask you to spell that, Omar?  
13 Omar Ashmawy: Sure. First name: K-E-N-U-L. Last name: I-S-M-A-I-L-O-V-A.  
14 Rob Walker: Thanks.  
15 Omar Ashmawy: Not a problem.  
16 Helen Eisner: What is the Assembly of Friends of Azerbaijan?  
17 Witness: I think it's another ... The outfit for the Turquoise organization.  
18 Helen Eisner: Okay.  
19 Witness: Because I believe early in my- or when my first interaction with Kemal, I  
20 ask him what does he have to do with Azerbaijan and he said "Well, you  
21 know, I also represent ... " I think that's what- how he introduced himself-  
22 that Friends of Azerbaijan Foundation or Organization.  
23 Omar Ashmawy: Just to finish-just to give you a moment to finish your sentence, Kemal  
24 said he also represents what? Who?  
25 Witness: The what?

1 Omar Ashmawy: When you asked Kemal what did he have to do with Azerbaijan, you said  
2 that Kemal said to you that he also represents what? Who? Who did  
3 Kemal also represent?

4 Witness: From what my recollection is, because I was wondering what the Turkish  
5 organization, with a color would have to do with Azerbaijan, because I  
6 know they deal a lot with Turkey, because they have the same culture,  
7 same language and so on, but I ask him what does he particularly have to  
8 do- Why is he involved in the programs with Azerbaijan and he said one  
9 of the- or his organization call Friends of Azerbaijan. [crosstalk] I was  
10 under the impression that he runs both of them.

11 Omar Ashmawy: Do you know what the Friends of Azerbaijan, what they do-what their  
12 mission is?

13 Witness: No.

14 Omar Ashmawy: Are you familiar with how they're funded?

15 Witness: No. I believe he told me that this is like 503(c), you know, the  
16 organization. [crosstalk]

17 Omar Ashmawy: No please ...

18 Witness: That is similar to the organization we have here in Houston. It's mostly is  
19 aimed toward develop the culture and understanding for the U.S. citizen,  
20 what Azerbaijan is and where they are and their cultural issue and like  
21 they ... I guess it's a different organization.

22 Rob Walker: This is all from hearing about it or reading about it. You were not part of  
23 that organization, yourself?

24 Witness: No.

25 Omar Ashmawy: Does Kemal talk to you about his relationship with SOCAR?

26 Witness: No.

27 Omar Ashmawy: No? What is the Friends of Azerbaijan's organization relationship with  
28 SOCAR?

29 Witness: I have no idea.

30 Omar Ashmawy: Okay. More generally, then, who is Kemal Oksuz?

31 Witness: Who is he?

1 Omar Ashmawy: Yeah, who is he? How did you meet him? How do you know him? What  
2 kind of work did you do with him?

3 Witness: Like I said, I can only ... I do not recall exactly how-what's the  
4 relationship-came about, but I think-I thought he was working for U.S.  
5 government.

6 Omar Ashmawy: Why?

7 Witness: Why? Because of the name droppings.

8 Omar Ashmawy: Such as? What names would he use?

9 Witness: Obama. For example, when we talk about ... I saw the email when I  
10 couldn't get the program. He wants money. I told him, "No, hell no." I  
11 said, "But I want to know what this about, okay? So give me some  
12 program. Give me some more substance." When I said, "Can I see it? Can  
13 you send me something?"

14 "Oh, I'm busy in Washington. I'm meeting Obama."

15 Helen Eisner: You might actually- I'm not sure that we have the document you're  
16 referring to. Was that part of the production, the back and forth with  
17 Obama?

18 Witness: [crosstalk] Oh, no, no, no ... That was something ... [crosstalk]

19 Helen Eisner: This is just a conversation that you had? [crosstalk]

20 Witness: Yeah. [crosstalk]

21 Helen Eisner: Okay.

22 Witness: It's you say how do I know ...

23 Helen Eisner: Okay.

24 Witness: ... if he's working. I never heard him talking about SOCAR or never  
25 talking that much about the Azerbaijani government, which this is our host  
26 and I'm not interested in the U.S. government.

27 Helen Eisner: Okay.

28 Witness: Sorry.

29 Helen Eisner: Do you know who Irada Akhoundova is?

1 Witness: She runs the Cultural Center.

2 Helen Eisner: The Cultural Center is?

3 Witness: Cultural Center of Azerbaijan, I think is what it's called and that's here in  
4 Houston.

5 Helen Eisner: Does she have a relationship with SOCAR?

6 Witness: I do not know.

7 Helen Eisner: Does she have a relationship with Mr. Oksuz, with Kemal?

8 Witness: You know, I heard her mention whatever the trips like this happen? I  
9 guess she does, because they show up in the same functions, so I guess  
10 they somehow ... But I'm speculating ...

11 Helen Eisner: We're going to talk a little bit about the 2013 U.S-Azerbaijan Convention.  
12 Did you attend the 2012 U.S-Azerbaijan Convention in Washington D.C.?

13 Witness: No, I did not.

14 Helen Eisner: Okay. Were you involved in any sponsorship issues related to that  
15 convention in 2012?

16 Witness: Most likely, I did, but I cannot tell you exactly, but everything that had to  
17 do with Azerbaijan came through me, because I was your filtering device  
18 and that's how we were set up.

19 Helen Eisner: I see. What do you understand the purpose of that 2012 convention to be?

20 Witness: I was not involved and like I said ... I'm sorry. I'm sorry for you because  
21 you represent the U.S. government, but U.S. government does very little  
22 for my job, okay? I concentrate on the host governments, so that's why the  
23 function in Washington did not appeal to me.

24 Helen Eisner: Because you concentrate on the host governments ...

25 Witness: That's where we try to get the project. That's where we try to ...

26 Helen Eisner: Okay.

27 Witness: Wave the flag for ConocoPhillips so they know us-that hopefully, they  
28 give us a project.

29 Helen Eisner: Who did you understand the funder to be for that 2012 conference?

1 Witness: Like I said, I do not know.

2 Helen Eisner: Was SOCAR a funder for that conference, the 2012 conference?

3 Witness: If I were there, I could probably see the signage and tell you who was the  
4 major sponsor. You know how you go and it's like somebody's logo is  
5 bigger than somebody else's. I can't tell you because I was not there.

6 Helen Eisner: Okay.

7 Witness: Okay.

8 Helen Eisner: Even not being there, do you have an understanding of who might have  
9 been the sponsor for that conference? The 2012?

10 Witness: No.

11 Helen Eisner: Okay. All right, so we have a number of documents and we're going to  
12 just go back and forth and show them to you. We'll give you a second to  
13 familiarize yourself with them. As we understand and I think you  
14 mentioned earlier, ConocoPhillips was not initially a sponsor for the 2013  
15 convention in Azerbaijan. Is that correct?

16 Witness: That's correct.

17 Helen Eisner: Okay. I'm going to provide everyone ... I actually- Well, we can share.  
18 [crosstalk]

19 Rob Walker: I have a set. [crosstalk]

20 Helen Eisner: If you can find it quickly, then [crosstalk] we can just share. This is OCE-  
21 COP- lots of zeros here, so 0000 [crosstalk]

22 Witness: What's the last two digit?

23 Helen Eisner: 0005. I think it's five through six. [crosstalk]

24 Rob Walker: Thank you.

25 Helen Eisner: I'll give you a moment to look at that.

26 Witness: Okay.

27 Helen Eisner: The initial sponsorship request was a minimum of \$250,000.

28 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

1 Helen Eisner: This was, just to be clear, you're on this email chain.

2 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

3 Helen Eisner: Kay Larcom and Kemal Oksuz. This was Oksuz asking you for these  
4 amounts. Why did ConocoPhillips decide not to sponsor at that level?

5 Witness: Well, because my party line for everybody-we have no project in the  
6 country. We don't generate any money and \$250,000 is just like totally  
7 outrageous amount. I never paid anybody that kind of amount.

8 Helen Eisner: Okay.

9 Witness: You see this, I said, "Would \$5,000 be sufficient?" Because he said it's  
10 going to be high-level conference and no program attached.

11 Helen Eisner: Okay. Later, ConocoPhillips did decide to sponsor at a different amount.  
12 Were you involved with the discussions that eventually led to that  
13 sponsorship decision?

14 Witness: I'm sure I was involved.

15 Helen Eisner: Okay.

16 Witness: Because all the recommendations come from me.

17 Helen Eisner: Let me show you a document, which is [crosstalk]

18 Omar Ashmawy: It's going to be OCE-COP 0043 through 0046. [crosstalk] If you can  
19 actually draw your attention to the last page, 0046, first.

20 Witness: Okay.

21 Omar Ashmawy: You'll note this now May 13th, 2013.

22 Witness: Okay.

23 Omar Ashmawy: SOCAR is now asking Conoco to sponsor the convention. [crosstalk]  
24 Correct?

25 Witness: According to this email, yes.

26 Omar Ashmawy: How did that happen? How did it go from a \$250,000 ask from Kemal to,  
27 essentially, a \$10,000 ask from SOCAR?

28 Witness: Do you have any comments on that? We discussed it.

1 Jason Rother: Yeah, no, this ... Just to be clear. I don't want you to get confused, because  
2 the email on 46 is clearly from somebody at SOCAR to other people, not  
3 anybody at COP. Nobody on that email is COP. Somehow it gets sent  
4 from SOCAR to Mr. Farkhad and then Mr. Farkhad forwards it on to Mr.  
5 Burkett, so it eventually finds its way to COP.

6 Helen Eisner: Yes. [multiple affirmatives]

7 Jason Rother: But the original email is not directed at COP, it's a pass-on. If that's what  
8 you're wanting to clarify, ConocoPhillips Government Affairs Manager?

9 Witness: Yes. I think we talk about it yesterday. Again, guys, I have nothing to hide  
10 and I want to make this painless ... They do not have somebody like the  
11 Turquoise organization in Azerbaijan. It's a fine line between the State Oil  
12 Company, because they are acting like ... State Oil Company is acting like  
13 they are privately owned company, because I ran into this issue with  
14 [inaudible] in Russia, because they are partners but they are also  
15 government.

16 If you wanted to find out something that is going on or scheduled to  
17 happen on the ground in Baku, the State Oil Company is going to get  
18 involved because they don't want to end up with egg on their face. They  
19 don't have this middleman organization, like Friends of Azerbaijan or the  
20 Turquoise organization, to do all this legwork. I think the reason I don't  
21 recognize any of these people, because they're low staff employees in  
22 SOCAR, just trying to pull things together.

23 Rob Walker: You're referring to the people listed on page 46, right?

24 Witness: I think that's the people that ... Yeah, because I think this is the one that  
25 you asked me if I knew Zaur Gahramanov. They don't mean anything  
26 because I think those are people-staff position-who are trying to put  
27 something together for this conference.

28 Omar Ashmawy: That makes sense. I guess what we're specifically asking about though is,  
29 if you draw your attention to page 0044.

30 Witness: Okay.

31 Omar Ashmawy: The bottom email.

32 Witness: Yep.

33 Omar Ashmawy: It's an email dated May 14th, 2013.

34 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

1 Omar Ashmawy: It's from Lynn Strickland. It's to Bill Burkett, with your C.C. on it, with  
2 additional other people ...

3 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

4 Omar Ashmawy: Including Conoco's representative in Azerbaijan.

5 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

6 Omar Ashmawy: Bill says to Lynn, "On further discussion, ConocoPhillips Manager  
7 1(you), I now understand the importance of the conference and we should  
8 definitely sponsor." We're just wondering what the change- why you guys  
9 changed your mind? Originally, there was an ask from Kemal. You guys  
10 said no to \$250,000. There then was an ask from SOCAR that was  
11 forwarded to you guys for less. You guys said yes. We're just wondering  
12 what changed?

13 Witness: Okay, because you heard me repeating over and over that I wanted to  
14 know the program. I wanted to know who participates, because my job is  
15 to make our company visible and stand there up in the front room and  
16 wave my flag. If I can do it for cheap rather than \$250,000 ... \$250,000 is  
17 totally unjustified. We're not BP. We're not paying billions of dollars into  
18 their tax system, okay? But this amount, they are more in line with any  
19 sponsorship in Russia or Azerbaijan or Turkey or anything like that. It's  
20 basically giving you an opportunity to have your logo displayed and to  
21 have people waving the flag.

22 Helen Eisner: One of the things that you say in this-I'm sorry, not you-that Lynn says in  
23 this exchange is, following the conversation or discussion that she had  
24 with you ...

25 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

26 Helen Eisner: She now understands the importance of this conference, so recognizing  
27 visibility and we talked about waving the red flag. That piece ...

28 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

29 Helen Eisner: Why was this conference important?

30 Witness: Because you can hardly get all the executive people around the board table  
31 unless there's a board meeting or some kind of special event. This is a  
32 special event. You get to see a lot of people who are movers and shakers  
33 from the government and from the State Oil Company, who are your  
34 potential partners, in one place.

1 Rob Walker: It was important because of SOCAR's- of the relationship between  
2 ConocoPhillips and SOCAR?

3 Witness: Not just with SOCAR. It's going to be the forum where the local people  
4 will be represented. They had the guy who is a famous artist. They have  
5 these dignitaries invited to those kind of events. I think it's important, not  
6 just to go after the project. I like to have a variety of contacts within the  
7 country.

8 Helen Eisner: Also on page 44, in this email exchange back and forth.

9 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

10 Helen Eisner: This is the email that you wrote to Lynn and Bill.

11 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

12 Helen Eisner: Regarding the decision to sponsor, you say, "We will need to get an  
13 invoice for this sponsorship, either from AFAZ or the Turquoise Council  
14 to avoid FCPA issues. Why did you say AFAZ or the Turquoise Council?"

15 Witness: Because AFAZ, isn't that the Friends of Azerbaijan?

16 Helen Eisner: Yes.

17 Witness: Okay. [crosstalk]

18 Helen Eisner: I apologize, AFAZ is Friends [crosstalk] the Friends of Azerbaijan.

19 Witness: The thing is that Azerbaijan is a cash country. Very few thing is set up  
20 unless it's like the American-run hotel, set up to take a credit card. I did  
21 not want it to have pay in cash or credit card for something we were doing  
22 there. That's why I said we must have the invoice, so we can properly  
23 document all this.

24 Omar Ashmawy: Why didn't the invoice come from SOCAR?

25 Witness: What do you mean SOCAR?

26 Omar Ashmawy: Why didn't SOCAR send you the invoice to document it?

27 Witness: They didn't organize it.

28 Omar Ashmawy: But they asked you for the money.

29 Witness: They didn't ask for the money.

1 Omar Ashmawy: You referenced the chain. Kemal asked you guys for money. You guys  
2 said no, admittedly, for \$250,000. A request from SOCAR was forwarded  
3 to ConocoPhillips for much less. You guys said yes, but you wanted the  
4 invoice to come from the Turquoise Council or AFAZ, but it's clear the  
5 request, initially, initiated from SOCAR.

6 Witness: No. I don't see. This does not show me that this was a request from them.  
7 Where is- It says, "Dear ConocoPhillips Government Affairs Manager,  
8 We're asking you to sponsor." This is just showing the good work that  
9 Farkhad did because I've been- just like til I'm blue in the face, been trying  
10 to get some kind of a structure and some kind of a program about this  
11 conference, and he said "Well, I haven't seen any," but he said maybe,  
12 because he's working with SOCAR, maybe they will get it. This is how I  
13 got this.

14 Omar Ashmawy: Okay, but then [crosstalk]

15 Rob Walker: Omar, could you look at the actual text of the email on page 46, where it  
16 says the conference is being co-organized by a number of organizations?

17 Omar Ashmawy: Yes, I've seen that.

18 Rob Walker: There can be more than one sponsor of the event.

19 Witness: There definitely was more than one spons- [crosstalk]

20 Omar Ashmawy: My question doesn't include that. [crosstalk]

21 Rob Walker: There can be ... Well, it kind of does.

22 Omar Ashmawy: Actually, Rob, it doesn't and if you would allow me, the question is ... Let  
23 me take a step back, then. Who asked you for the \$10,000 that  
24 ConocoPhillips ultimately gave for the convention?

25 Witness: Kemal? I think he asked me.

26 Omar Ashmawy: What were the circumstances of the request?

27 Witness: What do you mean circumstances?

28 Omar Ashmawy: How did he ask?

29 Witness: Well ...

30 Omar Ashmawy: Did he send an email requesting the \$10,000?

1 Witness: I think that it was a letter.

2 Omar Ashmawy: A letter requesting \$10,000?

3 Witness: Yeah.

4 Omar Ashmawy: You guys didn't turn over a letter from Kemal asking for \$10,000.

5 Witness: Was it a letter?

6 Jason Rother: There's a letter from the Friends of Azerbaijan, sent to COP, I think Mr.  
7 Farkhad Kasimov, saying, "Here are the sponsorship opportunities."  
8 [crosstalk]

9 Rob Walker: 11 and 12? I think there are multiple copies in the production.

10 Omar Ashmawy: Yes. However, it seems, from the emails, that, predating that, the request  
11 came from within SOCAR. In fact, page 0044 indicates that you're going  
12 to have Farkhad inform SOCAR locally and then have Kemal invoice  
13 ConocoPhillips. If the request originated with Kemal and the Turkish  
14 Council-AFAZ, it would seem odd to me why Farkhad is involved at all  
15 and who he has to inform locally in Azerbaijan. I'm not trying to hide the  
16 ball. Keep in mind, we're not investigating you. I want to understand the  
17 relationship between Kemal and SOCAR.

18 Witness: We need to go to Azerbaijan. You will know exactly what I'm talking  
19 about. It's one thing, it's reading the email message. Another thing is trying  
20 to get something out of those guys. [crosstalk]

21 Rob Walker: But we are not Kemal or SOCAR, so how is it that we are to tell you what  
22 their relationship is?

23 Omar Ashmawy: My question to ConocoPhillips Manager 1 is there appears to be a request  
24 that originated from SOCAR for sponsorship for this convention.

25 Witness: It doesn't look to me like it's a request. It looks like, to me, it's an  
26 information, because I absolutely refused to talk to Kemal when he  
27 mentioned \$250,000. I said "You know, you can just forget about that."  
28 Okay?

29 Jason Rother: I think that's borne out by the email on the bottom of 45, where it comes  
30 from SOCAR as an FYI to Mr. Kasimov. FYI-here are the structured  
31 sponsorships. Correct?

32 Omar Ashmawy: Sure, except, ConocoPhillips Government Affairs Manager, what doesn't  
33 make sense to me, though, and continues to confuse me [crosstalk] is if the

1 request came from Kemal, then why wouldn't ... Explain then, this email  
2 on 0044. It would seem to me if the request came from Kemal, there  
3 would be no need to inform anyone locally and you would ... The invoice  
4 would naturally come from Kemal, as opposed to 'You need to get an  
5 invoice for sponsorship from either AFAZ or Turquoise Council to avoid  
6 FCPA issues.'

7 Witness: Trying to get anything out of Kemal is like pulling teeth. It was easier for  
8 me to deal with Farkhad in Azerbaijan than to have somebody locally,  
9 here.

10 Omar Ashmawy: What was Farkhad doing in Azerbaijan to get the invoice for you?

11 Witness: Not an invoice, he was gathering information for me because from what  
12 he understood is that his- that Kemal's organization, working directly with  
13 the staff in SOCAR. Since I couldn't get any information from Kemal,  
14 Farkhad was trying to do his best to provide whatever little information we  
15 got. Okay? I got it kind of through the back door, but I would never paid  
16 an invoice coming from SOCAR on sponsorship, unless it's for technical  
17 work that they're doing or whatever the ...

18 Omar Ashmawy: Why not?

19 Witness: Because we're not paying anything.

20 Omar Ashmawy: Apologize. I'm not in the oil and gas industry, so why wouldn't you make  
21 the contribution directly to SOCAR?

22 Witness: They're a State Oil Company.

23 Omar Ashmawy: Explain that to me. I'm sorry, I don't understand.

24 Witness: Isn't it like a FCPA issue that we're not supposed to make a direct payment  
25 to the government officials or whatever?

26 Omar Ashmawy: Again, I ... That's not my area of expertise. I'm just a congressional  
27 investigator, so I'm just trying to understand why you guys didn't make the  
28 contribution directly to SOCAR.

29 Jason Rother: I think she's answered that, right? [crosstalk] That they weren't sponsoring  
30 it.

31 Omar Ashmawy: Actually, she asked you a question. She didn't answer it.

1 Jason Rother: Okay, so I'll answer her question, and I think we're running a little far-  
2 field. This isn't an FCPA issue. If you want to ask her questions about the  
3 sponsorship and all that ... [crosstalk]

4 Omar Ashmawy: I'm trying to understand the relationship between Kemal and SOCAR and  
5 the Azerbaijani government, and so the quicker we can actually get that  
6 explained, the faster everyone can call it a day. [crosstalk]

7 Rob Walker: Let me just step in with a legal point that ConocoPhillips Manager 1 knows  
8 a lot and knows a lot about FCPA, but I think you can ... The question is to  
9 SOCAR as opposed to a foreign official and so conclusions that people  
10 make about what is or what may or may not be an FCPA issue ...

11 Omar Ashmawy: We're not asking about FCPA issues. I'm asking about the relationship  
12 between Kemal's organizations and SOCAR. Why would we give \$10,000  
13 to one of the organizations of Kemal for- to satisfy a request that  
14 originated with SOCAR?

15 Rob Walker: That's conclusory. The request originated with Kemal, only at a different  
16 level.

17 Omar Ashmawy: ConocoPhillips Government Affairs Manager, if ... Again, my question  
18 stands, which is why would we ask for an invoice from one of Kemal's  
19 organizations for a request for money that originated from SOCAR? What  
20 was Kemal's relationship with SOCAR?

21 Witness: I have no idea what his relationship with SOCAR, like I told you before,  
22 but you see this in the emails. He originally asked for \$250,000, okay? I  
23 told him I was not interested at all. I wasn't going to even write an email to  
24 my superiors and then ... Usually what happens is the people on the  
25 ground- Since he continued to work the issue with-and this is a  
26 speculation-with the people from SOCAR, Farkhad, because he is on the  
27 ground and he knows what's happening, they kept him in the loop. I am  
28 sitting in Houston. I don't know how important or unimportant this  
29 conference is until it start growing meat.

30 Omar Ashmawy: Okay, then let us draw your attention to page 00443, that's the first page.  
31 In it, there's an email now from Mr. Kasimov to you and Lynn Strickland  
32 and Bill Burkett, where he says, "I will check with SOCAR and drop a note  
33 to Kemal Oksuz of Turquoise Council tomorrow on the right structuring  
34 of the sponsorship." Please explain then what the right structuring of the  
35 sponsorship related to?

36 Witness: That I told him that there's no way we're going to be paying \$250,000. No  
37 way.

1 Omar Ashmawy: That's all that refers to?

2 Witness: Yes.

3 Omar Ashmawy: It seems to me, in this email chain, though, that it's already been decided  
4 that the sponsorship was going to be for \$10,000. It seems that that  
5 conversation, the different between \$250,000 and \$10,000 had already  
6 been had and was over.

7 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

8 Omar Ashmawy: What concerns- what did Mr. Kasimov have to- What kind of structuring  
9 had to be made?

10 Witness: I have no idea what he meant by- This is his second language. I don't  
11 know what he means when he writes this.

12 Omar Ashmawy: Okay. Where did this invoice eventually come from?

13 Witness: I think it came from Kemal.

14 Omar Ashmawy: Which organization. [crosstalk]

15 Rob Walker: Is there a particular invoice that you have in mind?

16 Omar Ashmawy: I'm asking ConocoPhillips Manager 1if she recalls where the invoice  
17 eventually came from.

18 Witness: It came, I think, from Kemal. [crosstalk] Which I wouldn't remember  
19 exactly what organization he used for the letterhead.

20 Omar Ashmawy: You know, that's the second time you've referenced the two organizations,  
21 almost as if they were the same organization. What was your  
22 understanding of the relationship between Turquoise Council and AFAZ?

23 Witness: My understanding was it ran by the same person.

24 Omar Ashmawy: Was there a distinction in terms of mission or relationship with your  
25 organization, ConocoPhillips?

26 Witness: With him? No.

27 Helen Eisner: In this email chain, you say you need to get an invoice- I'm sorry, this is  
28 on page 44, 'We need to get an invoice for the sponsorship either from  
29 AFAZ or Turquoise Council.' Why the 'or?' Why could it be either/or?  
30 Were they interchangeable?

1 Witness: I have no idea because he- By that point, he confused me. When he called  
2 the first time, he said he's from Turquoise organization and I asked him  
3 what is that have to do with Azerbaijan? My understanding, like I said,  
4 Azerbaijan is only the small part of the regions that he covers.

5 Helen Eisner: Okay. We'll show you another document. This is OCE-COP 17.

6 Witness: 17.

7 Helen Eisner: This is the wire transfer and it was directed to the Assembly of Friends of  
8 Azerbaijan.

9 Witness: Okay.

10 Helen Eisner: Given that choice between the two, why the Assembly of Friends instead  
11 of the Turquoise Council?

12 Witness: I don't know. Maybe because I ask him why is he not ... What's his  
13 relationship and why is that he is representing Turkey. I don't know why  
14 he did this.

15 Helen Eisner: Okay. Another document: OCE-COP 19. Give you a quick moment. You  
16 say in this email, "We feel that our participation will continue to reinforce  
17 the relationship between SOCAR and ConocoPhillips-CO. Can I assume  
18 CO is ConocoPhillips Co.? [crosstalk 00:43:31]

19 Rob Walker: Right. ConocoPhillips.

20 Witness: I don't know.

21 Rob Walker: I think that's what you meant, by CO.

22 Witness: I don't know. Usually, I don't do like this. I usually put COP or ...  
23 [crosstalk 00:43:48]

24 Helen Eisner: Is there anything else CO it would have been?

25 Witness: Maybe 'company?'

26 Helen Eisner: If it was 'company' can we assume that it was ConocoPhillips?

27 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

28 Helen Eisner: Okay. We talked a little bit earlier about some of the reasons that  
29 ConocoPhillips might have been interested in sponsorship. What was this

1 relationship between SOCAR and ConocoPhillips that you reference here,  
2 that you wanted to reinforce?

3 Witness: Like I said, they are potential partners in the country, so ... For example, I  
4 did lots of personal-well, not a lot-but some personal involvement in  
5 helping her print the brochures about what the cultural things they're going  
6 to be offering, like the language courses, the drawing classes for kids-just  
7 general introduction to Azerbaijan, because people in Houston know  
8 nothing about it.

9 Helen Eisner: That's the relationship? [crosstalk] Cultural introduction.

10 Witness: Yeah, because I do a lot, also because part of my job is like social and  
11 humanitarian aid development and sustainable development. I always  
12 looking-leaving a good mark after we're done.

13 Helen Eisner: Okay. Why was it important to reinforce that part of the relationship?

14 Witness: Because it always shows that whatever we do, here or ... I was going to  
15 Washington at one point and had a great relationship with the Azeri  
16 Chamber of Commerce there and promoted all their events, as well.

17 Helen Eisner: Okay. [crosstalk]

18 Witness: We were the members of the organization. She never hit us for the money.  
19 I just helped her with the kids and find the teacher to do that Saturday  
20 classes and stuff like that.

21 Helen Eisner: Beforehand, we talked about one of the individuals, who this email is  
22 directed to, is Irada Akhoundova, and you mentioned her position at the  
23 Azerbaijan Cultural Center in Houston.

24 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

25 Helen Eisner: Why would she be interested in sponsorship? As you said, she worked for  
26 the Azerbaijan Cultural Center in Houston. Why were you emailing her  
27 about sponsorship?

28 Witness: Because I think that she was also involved. I think she, at that time, told  
29 me that she is going to be in Azerbaijan at the same time the conference is  
30 going to happen.

31 Helen Eisner: What type of involvement did she have?

1 Witness: I do not know what kind of involvement she's having but ... I said that she  
2 needed to talk to Kemal. I was asking, trying to get her to send me the  
3 program for what is going to actually happen.

4 Helen Eisner: Okay, was her involvement related to sponsorship?

5 Witness: Her involvement? No.

6 Helen Eisner: Okay. I guess I'm still just having trouble understanding if her  
7 involvement wasn't related to sponsorship, why this email was directed  
8 towards her, talking about sponsorship.

9 Witness: I don't think she's talking about it. I just-for her information, I was telling  
10 her that we were organizing this celebration with the Mayor's office here  
11 in Houston, in the City Hall, and as a side note, for her information, I said  
12 "Oh, by the way, I'm going to be in Baku and we're going to be the  
13 sponsor."

14 Helen Eisner: Okay. Let's talk about a few other issues. Do you know Representative  
15 Bridenstine?

16 Witness: No.

17 Helen Eisner: Did you ever interact with his office?

18 Witness: No. [crosstalk] Who's that?

19 Helen Eisner: Representative ... He's a member of Congress.

20 Witness: Okay. U.S. Congress?

21 Helen Eisner: Yes.

22 Witness: Okay.

23 Helen Eisner: Clarification-U.S. Congress. Do you know Joe Kaufman-Joseph  
24 Kaufman?

25 Witness: No.

26 Helen Eisner: Let me give you another document, which is OCE-COP 08 through 09.  
27 [crosstalk]

28 Witness: I'm going to get more water. Anybody want some? [crosstalk]

1 Helen Eisner: In this email chain ... You can see Kay Larcom, who you mentioned  
2 earlier.

3 Witness: Yep.

4 Helen Eisner: She asks you for information about ConocoPhillips' role in the trip? She  
5 says, "It is difficult to find out who these host organizations are,"  
6 referencing AFAZ and TCAE.

7 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

8 Helen Eisner: She says, "If this is a cover for either SOCAR or the Azeri government, he  
9 needs to know." When she says 'he,' she's talking about Joe Kaufman and  
10 the office of Representative Bridenstine.

11 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]

12 Helen Eisner: Why did you say in this email that it was difficult to find out who the host  
13 organizations were?

14 Witness: Because I couldn't find out myself.

15 Helen Eisner: Were they a cover for SOCAR or the Azeri government?

16 Witness: I have no idea. I really have no idea. That's why I was asking Farkhad to  
17 try to find out at least from somebody who he's working with or ... I  
18 explained to Jason, because he asked me a question, how did ... [crosstalk]

19 Rob Walker: You should probably not talk about [crosstalk] discussions with council.

20 Jason Rother: Our discussions ...

21 Witness: Okay. [crosstalk]

22 Rob Walker: It will be just as important and interesting if you say fresh this time.

23 Witness: I wanted to make as much clarification because, like I said, I have nothing  
24 to hide. In regards to ... Some of these trips are very important. Since I do  
25 not live in Azerbaijan, I have no idea what is going on. I can't be over  
26 there all the time, waving my flag, or recommending something for my  
27 management.

28 Helen Eisner: Why would somebody think that they could be a cover for SOCAR or the  
29 Azeri government?

30 Witness: I have no idea. Did you ask Kay that, because she was asking the question.

1 Omar Ashmawy: You spend a lot of time in Azerbaijan, though, right, that's your ...  
2 Witness: Yes.  
3 Omar Ashmawy: That's your specialty, yes?  
4 Witness: Uh hm [affirmative]. Azerbaijan is my specialty?  
5 Omar Ashmawy: One of them?  
6 Witness: Yes.  
7 Omar Ashmawy: Do you think it's possible that the Turquoise Council and AFAZ were a  
8 cover for SOCAR?  
9 Rob Walker: Omar, that's speculation. Come on. [crosstalk]  
10 Omar Ashmawy: It's an interview. She's permitted to speculate. This isn't a courtroom. Do  
11 you think they were a cover for the Azerbaijan government and SOCAR?  
12 Witness: Let me turn it the different, and my response, but please see it, because  
13 with a name like yours, I think you go visit and I don't know, I'm  
14 speculating ... There's certain cultural things, where, like I said, the  
15 SOCAR people are very proud of the things that happens in the country  
16 and they do not, at this point, have the little fuzzy organization-facilitators.  
17 In some respect, it's very, very honorable, you know? They try to do the  
18 best to organize the facility, the coffee break, the programs, because  
19 nobody else have a budget to bring the programs, to organize the tours ...  
20 That's why Farkhad told me that that's most likely will be happening and it  
21 will be organized from the U.S. I couldn't get anything out of the- Kemal.  
22 I told Farkhad, "You probably have better chance finding out," because he  
23 must talk to somebody who is organizing it on the ground. The persons on  
24 the ground was apparently SOCAR.  
25 Omar Ashmawy: Okay. [crosstalk]  
26 Witness: You know, one hand ...  
27 Omar Ashmawy: The people on the ground in Azerbaijan that were apparently organizing it,  
28 was SOCAR?  
29 Witness: That's my understanding, because the only information that I could get  
30 that was to me, a program or whatever or levels of participation-was  
31 coming from SOCAR. Where are they getting it from? I have no idea.

1 Omar Ashmawy: Is it fair to say that the relationship between SOCAR and the Azerbaijani  
2 government, the Turquoise Council and AFAZ seem to be a little bit  
3 confusing?

4 Witness: To me, it was very confusing.

5 Omar Ashmawy: Okay.

6 Witness: I still don't know what it is.

7 Helen Eisner: Did you have any conversations with other employees or members of the  
8 United States Congress about this convention-the 2013 convention?

9 Witness: No.

10 Helen Eisner: Okay. Did you attend the convention?

11 Witness: I did. In Azerbaijan.

12 Helen Eisner: You didn't travel to Turkey. You were just in Azerbaijan.

13 Witness: Oh, no, I was not in Turkey.

14 Helen Eisner: Okay. [crosstalk 00:54:19]

15 Rob Walker: Talking about the 2013 ...

16 Helen Eisner: For the 2013 U.S.-Azerbaijan Convention ... [crosstalk 00:54:22]

17 Witness: Yes. There was a program. You probably have the program of that  
18 convention? I actually got the program the day after it started.

19 Helen Eisner: Who did you get the program from?

20 Witness: It was in the hotel, left for me at the hotel.

21 Helen Eisner: What hotel did you stay at?

22 Witness: I don't remember. Marriott, I think, or ... Is that important?

23 Helen Eisner: Were there a lot of attendees from the convention at the hotel?

24 Witness: I'm trying to think and give you the best response, because I do not believe  
25 they stay in the same hotel where I stayed. I think they stay in a different  
26 ... [crosstalk]

1 Omar Ashmawy: Exactly where you stayed isn't really important. What may be a little bit  
2 more important to us just for understanding, again, not as it relates to you  
3 guys, but for us understanding the bigger picture here ... Who paid for  
4 your travel?

5 Witness: My company.

6 Omar Ashmawy: Okay. Talking about the conference real fast, you said that it seemed that  
7 the people on the ground that were planning it were SOCAR.

8 Witness: That's ... Yes.

9 Omar Ashmawy: When you got there, did that seem to be the case?

10 Witness: Truly, I could not tell you. I was not involved from the beginning. Like I  
11 said, I received the program. It was in a hotel and I remember getting a  
12 little bit ticked off because I'm already on the second day and we're not  
13 involved and we're a sponsor. We were supposed to be involved-Farkhad  
14 and I supposed to be out there with our flag, participating in every event  
15 and we were not.

16 Helen Eisner: Who did you travel with? It was Farkhad? Was anyone else from  
17 ConocoPhillips there?

18 Witness: Farkhad lives in Azerbaijan. I travel by myself. [crosstalk]

19 Omar Ashmawy: Did you talk to anyone about the fact that you were unhappy about how  
20 ConocoPhillips was being-or not being portrayed at the event?

21 Witness: No, but even if I did, they'd probably just told Farkhad, because he's the  
22 one was supposed to get the information for me on the ground.

23 Helen Eisner: What other groups sponsored the convention?

24 Witness: BP.

25 Helen Eisner: Okay, anyone else?

26 Witness: I'm sure it's BP ... I don't recall that. If you pull any of the program from  
27 internet or something, there is going to be just like ConocoPhillips logo  
28 display, as a company.

29 Helen Eisner: When you were at the convention, who did you interact with? Did you  
30 interact with government officials?

31 Witness: Which government?

1 Helen Eisner: From the Azeri government?

2 Witness: I was there involved in two functions. One was a reception, where  
3 everybody dressed up, had an adult beverage and looked pretty and  
4 smiling a lot, okay?

5 Helen Eisner: Uh hm [affirmative]

6 Witness: It's kind of like non-event. Them all looking like how you dress and ... The  
7 second time, it was ... You're not from Houston. Pretend you're sitting in a  
8 stadium, because that venues that they picked out?

9 Helen Eisner: Uh hm [affirmative]

10 Witness: It was like an arena for thousands of people and we were sitting way in the  
11 back somewhere and on the stage, they had a table with I think some  
12 Congressman or somebody from the U.S. [crosstalk]

13 Helen Eisner: Those are the two functions you attended as a part of the convention?

14 Witness: That's it.

15 Helen Eisner: You didn't attend any other meetings?

16 Witness: They had a break-out room, also at this big- The building is like a octopus.

17 Helen Eisner: Okay.

18 Witness: Some of the break-out rooms- Where is the program. I saw it somewhere,  
19 somebody had it. There was something on the ... They had a different  
20 topic for on investment and on oil business and maybe on education. I  
21 participate in one of those break-out session.

22 Helen Eisner: Were any of those functions or break-out sessions sponsored/hosted by  
23 SOCAR?

24 Witness: I don't know.

25 Omar Ashmawy: It's our impression that the conference, in general, was SOCAR's  
26 conference and ...

27 Witness: It was a conference from the Azeri government. [crosstalk]

28 Omar Ashmawy: Was SOCAR ...

1 Witness: But do you see, because SOCAR has money, they're the one that get stuck  
2 with the task at hand.

3 Omar Ashmawy: Just to be clear, what would that ... Just for clarity, what do you mean by  
4 'task at hand?'

5 Witness: All the household issue-providing buses for us to get from the hotel to the  
6 ... It was not the hotel doing it. Somebody on the ground had to do it.

7 Omar Ashmawy: That was SOCAR?

8 Witness: My understanding from Farkhad-that's who pays for that.

9 Omar Ashmawy: In addition to the transportation, your understanding from Farkhad ...  
10 What else was SOCAR paying for?

11 Witness: Probably coffee and tea in the ..

12 Omar Ashmawy: What about the conference in general?

13 Witness: The conference building belong to the President. Since President blessed  
14 it, I don't think that ... It was kind of like pre-opening review. Nobody got  
15 to see this building and I think we were the first people ever to have some  
16 kind of a function there.

17 Omar Ashmawy: How about the attendees' hotel rooms and such?

18 Witness: I don't know about attendees' hotel room because, like I said, I stay usually  
19 in a Marriott and there is different hotels. I have no idea where they stayed  
20 because there's the Hilton properties, there's Radisson property, there's  
21 Four Season, I think. I don't remember ...

22 Omar Ashmawy: Over 200 people had their travel paid to go to this conference. Did  
23 SOCAR pay for that travel?

24 Witness: I have no idea. It's not my problem. They didn't ask to pay for mine.

25 Helen Eisner: Did you interact with Kemal Oksuz at the conference?

26 Witness: No.

27 Helen Eisner: Did you see him there?

28 Witness: I think I saw him, kind of far away, but he is always also preoccupied and  
29 busy, so ...

1 Helen Eisner: What was he preoccupied and busy with?

2 Witness: He's always around, surround himself with business.

3 Helen Eisner: Okay. Did you receive any gifts during the convention?

4 Witness: No.

5 Helen Eisner: Okay. Final question here. We're getting towards final questions.

6 Witness: All right!

7 Helen Eisner: Do you remember an event that was hosted by the Assembly of Friends of  
8 Azerbaijan in July, 2013, and this would have been in Washington, at the  
9 Hyatt.

10 Witness: No.

11 Helen Eisner: Did you hear of this event?

12 Witness: No.

13 Helen Eisner: Okay. There was a delegation there from Azerbaijan, including SOCAR  
14 executives. Does that help jog your memory at all?

15 Witness: For me personally? No, I don't. We have very defined border lines. I do  
16 not go to Washington anymore. Kay doesn't come down to Houston  
17 anymore.

18 Helen Eisner: Okay.

19 Omar Ashmawy: Did you ever get a Thank You note for ConocoPhillips's contribution?

20 Witness: Huh?

21 Omar Ashmawy: Did you ever get a Thank You note for ConocoPhillips's sponsorship of  
22 the conference?

23 Witness: I don't think so.

24 Omar Ashmawy: Did you ever get a Thank You phone call or anything?

25 Witness: I don't think so. Knowing Kemal, I doubt I ever got that.

26 Omar Ashmawy: Did anyone from SOCAR thank you?

1 Witness: No. They didn't thank me, either. Our contribution is like a drop in the sea,  
2 compared to the amount of manpower and money that they probably put  
3 out, because, trust me, this is not a ...

4 Omar Ashmawy: The amount of money ... Finish that sentence, the amount of money and  
5 manpower they put out for what?

6 Witness: I'm talking about in general functions that the government doesn't have the  
7 money or organizations to support. That's involved lots of coordination  
8 and planning and so on. I think they were using us in this new palace of  
9 theirs, as a guinea pig, because there was the person walking around  
10 saying "What do you think? It was enough toilet space in there? Do you  
11 think that coffee and tea should be served differently?" Silly stuff like that.

12 Helen Eisner: Have you had any conversations with Kemal Oksuz since the convention?  
13 Since the conference?

14 Witness: I wouldn't know why ... I don't think so.

15 Omar Ashmawy: Have you heard from him in any way? By email or text ... [crosstalk]

16 Witness: Recently?

17 Omar Ashmawy: Talking about this investigation, specifically.

18 Witness: No.

19 Helen Eisner: Is there anything we haven't covered that you think we should know?

20 Witness: No, but leave me your phone number. [crosstalk]

21 Omar Ashmawy: Your attorneys have that ... [crosstalk]

22 Rob Walker: We have that. [crosstalk] You call me first.

23 Witness: Oh, okay.

24 Helen Eisner: I will go ahead and stop the recording.

2 Paul Solis: This is Deputy Chief Counsel, Paul Solis with the Office of Congressional  
3 Ethics. It is April 9th, 2015. I'm joined by Kelly Brewington with the  
4 OCE. Scott Maberry, Roberti + White Employee, and Fatima Merchant.  
5 Roberti + White Employee has signed an acknowledgement form  
6 understanding that 18-USC-1001 applies and that I gave him a copy of the  
7 law. We can begin our interview.

8 Roberti + White Employee, where are you employed currently?

9 Witness: At Roberti White, LLC.

10 Paul Solis: How long have you been there?

11 Witness: Since, actually this week, 2013. Two years.

12 Paul Solis: Two years? What is Roberti and White. What does it do?

13 Witness: We're a boutique government relations and public affairs firm.

14 Paul Solis: How many employees does it have?

15 Witness: We have ... I have to think about this because we're doing some shifting  
16 around and changes. Five? Yeah, five full time.

17 Paul Solis: What's your title with Roberti and White?

18 Witness: Partner.

19 Paul Solis: Have you had that title since the beginning of your employment?

20 Witness: Yes.

21 Paul Solis: What were you doing before you joined Roberti and White?

22 Witness: I was working with Senator Bob Casey.

23 Paul Solis: What did you do for Mr. Casey?

24 Witness: A host of political activities but primarily fundraising.

25 Paul Solis: You weren't on his senatorial staff?

26 Witness: In 2007 I was.

1 Paul Solis: When you were working, doing the host of political activities, were you  
2 with his campaign committee? Were you employed by ... ?

3 Witness: Yes.

4 Paul Solis: You were. Could you sort of generally describe some of your job duties as  
5 a partner at Roberti and White?

6 Witness: We service a host of clients. Every day, frankly, is different than the one  
7 before. We interact with the US government, foreign governments,  
8 corporations, to a degree media entities.

9 Paul Solis: This is to the best of your understanding, I'd like you to answer with your  
10 own experience. Then to the extent that you know other employees at  
11 Roberti and White. Are employees of Roberti and White registered  
12 lobbyists under the Lobbying Disclosure Act?

13 Witness: Yes.

14 Paul Solis: How many are?

15 Witness: Three certainly. I do not know if a fourth is.

16 Paul Solis: Who are the three that are?

17 Witness: Myself, my colleague Steve Irizarry, and Vincent Roberti.

18 Paul Solis: How long have you been registered under the LDA?

19 Witness: My fine council here, I think, is the one who did it. It was either July or  
20 August, I don't recall of 2013.

21 Paul Solis: What about the same sort of set of questions about the Foreign Agents  
22 Registration Act. Are you registered under that law?

23 Witness: I have been. I'd need to defer to these guys. I'm not sure if I still am but I  
24 certainly have been, yes.

25 Paul Solis: Okay, to the extent the time that you knew that you were, what are the  
26 dates that you were registered?

27 Witness: Once again, I apologize. I should know this. It's either late July or early  
28 August of '13 is when that began.

29 Paul Solis: When do you think that you were no longer registered under FARA?

1 Witness: I believe last month.

2 Paul Solis: When you yourself ... Let me ask this same question about the Foreign  
3 Agents Registration Act. Are other employees of Roberti and White  
4 registered under FARA that you're aware of?

5 Witness: Yes.

6 Paul Solis: Who would those be?

7 Witness: The only one I know for certain is my colleague Vincent Roberti.

8 Paul Solis: Under the Lobbying Disclosure Act, since you've been registered in 2013,  
9 are you registered pertaining to your work with one client or more than  
10 one client?

11 Witness: More than one.

12 Paul Solis: What about SOCAR? Do you know what SOCAR is?

13 Witness: I do.

14 Paul Solis: What is SOCAR?

15 Witness: It's the State Oil Company of the Azerbaijan Republic.

16 Paul Solis: What about SOCAR USA?

17 Witness: That's the subsidiary of SOCAR.

18 Paul Solis: Do you know if they're legally distinct? Are they the same company? Do  
19 you have any understanding of that?

20 Witness: I'm not an attorney so I don't know. I do know that the logo is the same,  
21 for example. I know that the reason there is a SOCAR USA is because  
22 SOCAR headquarters said there should be.

23 Paul Solis: Is either SOCAR or SOCAR USA a client of Roberti and White?

24 Witness: They were.

25 Paul Solis: What were the dates of time that they were a client at Roberti and White?

26 Witness: August 2013 until February of this year, '15.

1 Paul Solis: When I asked you questions about whether or not you were registered  
2 under the LDA, you told me the first dates that you were. You said about  
3 July or August of 2013. Did you register because of your engagement with  
4 SOCAR. Was that a result of that?

5 Witness: With the FARA question, yes. With the others, my understanding for these  
6 guys it was because July is maybe some sort of quarterly or semi-annual  
7 period and that's why. At that point, I registered with other clients of the  
8 firm in addition to what we were beginning to do in August.

9 Scott Maberry: That all ought to be publicly available information. I presume that's to the  
10 best of your knowledge or recollection.

11 Witness: Yeah.

12 Paul Solis: Okay.

13 Witness: We have folks like this who assist us and I often say, "I probably should  
14 look at those forms more closely."

15 Paul Solis: As Scott just clarified, to the best of your understanding you believe that  
16 the engagement with SOCAR, the FARA registration was a result of that  
17 engagement.

18 Witness: Yes, yes it was.

19 Paul Solis: The decision to register under the LDA may have been for a host of other  
20 clients?

21 Witness: For a host ... Exactly.

22 Scott Maberry: Just to be clear, as far as we know Roberti & White is a FARA registered  
23 agent as a firm for more than just one client.

24 Witness: That's correct.

25 Paul Solis: The convention in Baku, this US-Azerbaijan: Vision for the Future. Are  
26 you familiar with that?

27 Witness: I am.

28 Paul Solis: Did you attend that convention, Baku?

29 Witness: I did.

30 Paul Solis: Did anybody else from Roberti and White attend that convention?

1     Witness:             No.

2     Paul Solis:           Did anybody else from Roberti and White work on related issues to that  
3                             convention or interact with government officials related to that  
4                             convention?

5     Witness:             I would just respectfully take objection because you said, "else." I did not  
6                             necessarily work on ... I was just a participant. The answer's no.

7     Paul Solis:           What you're telling me is you didn't work on related issues to the  
8                             convention, you were just an attendee? I want to make sure ... Why don't  
9                             you explain to me what your role was with the convention.

10    Witness:             I was on the ground for two days. Before that, significantly before that, I  
11                             was certainly approached to assist in the planning. I did not. Toward as we  
12                             got closer, the opportunity to travel with a colleague of ours who received  
13                             an honorarium did come up about two, three weeks beforehand. We did all  
14                             attend in that capacity.

15    Paul Solis:           You said, "We." Who do you mean by, "We,"?

16    Witness:             Myself, my colleague, and then her colleague.

17    Paul Solis:           Who is your colleague?

18    Witness:             Valerie Owens Biden.

19    Paul Solis:           You said, "her colleague." Who is, "her colleague,"?

20    Witness:             Jay Rouse.

21    Paul Solis:           You said you were approached to assist in the planning and you declined.

22    Witness:             Yes.

23    Paul Solis:           Who approached you to do that?

24    Witness:             Two individuals. Both Turkish-Americans. Although, to be honest, I don't  
25                             know if they're technically Americans. Kemal Oksuz and Furkan Kosar.

26    Paul Solis:           About when did they approach you to assist in planning the convention?

27    Witness:             Either late January, early February. Something in that time frame.

28    Paul Solis:           Had you met those individuals prior to that or spoken with them?

1 Witness: Yes. Furkan more so than Kemal.

2 Paul Solis: About when would have been the first time that you would have come in  
3 contact, either in person, over the phone or email, with both of those  
4 individuals? As best you can with dates.

5 Witness: Furkan, maybe 2009 or '10. Couldn't necessarily give you a month. Kemal,  
6 probably shook his hand. Met him sometime around then. Definitely was  
7 at an event with him at the Democratic National Convention in Charlotte  
8 so September, maybe, of 2012. August of 2012.

9 Paul Solis: In declining to assist in the planning of the convention, why did you  
10 decide not to do that?

11 Witness: I had literally just transitioned out of over eight years work with Senator  
12 Casey. I was figuring out, frankly, what I wanted to do, move on to the  
13 next phase professionally. I didn't see myself as getting into the  
14 conference planning business.

15 Paul Solis: When they asked you, what did they say? Did they provide some context  
16 to the convention? Did they give you some details?

17 Witness: They provided a list of speakers, quite diverse and some quite illustrious.  
18 Speakers who, apparently, were excited about this conference. They  
19 shared that there was going to be hundreds of people there and it was  
20 going to be a great event and I'd be foolish not to be a part of it.

21 Paul Solis: Did they say to you that they were the ones putting it on or organizing it?  
22 Or they were the ones who started the idea for the convention?

23 Witness: I don't recall if they actually said that but, I mean, to use the expression, it  
24 seemed to me in February that they were driving the bus.

25 Paul Solis: Did they mention to you, again at these preliminary discussions, did they  
26 mention to you SOCAR's involvement?

27 Witness: At that point, I honestly did not know what SOCAR stood for. I don't  
28 believe that that was discussed.

29 Paul Solis: I think I know the answer to this based on some of your other answers but  
30 I just want to be clear. At the time of the convention in May of 2013, were  
31 you a registered lobbyist under the LDA?

32 Witness: I was not.

1 Paul Solis: Were you a registered Foreign Agent under the Foreign Agents  
2 Registration Act?

3 Witness: No, I was not.

4 Paul Solis: I want to ask you before we get into the convention, specifically, I want to  
5 ask you about some people and some organizations.

6 Witness: Sure.

7 Paul Solis: To the best you can give me information about that, that would be great.  
8 What is the Turquoise Council of Americans and Eurasians?

9 Witness: To the best of my abilities, it's an organization. I believe a 501(c)(3). I  
10 don't know that for certain. Headquartered in Houston, Texas. Is the  
11 regional chapter affiliate, so to speak, of a greater movement or greater  
12 organization.

13 Paul Solis: What is the greater organization?

14 Witness: Different folks call it different things. The Hizmet movement, the Gülen  
15 Movement, the umbrella organization headquartered here in Washington  
16 is ... There's lots of acronyms. I think it's called T.A.A. Turkic American  
17 Alliance Association. Something to that effect.

18 Paul Solis: I'll refer to the Turquoise Council of Americans and Eurasians as TCAE.

19 Witness: Okay.

20 Paul Solis: Who works for TCAE?

21 Witness: At this point in time, I have no idea. Kemal Oksuz did at one point in time.  
22 I don't know if he currently does.

23 Paul Solis: Do you know anybody else who worked there at any point in time?

24 Witness: No.

25 Paul Solis: How are you aware that Kemal Oksuz worked at the TCAE?

26 Witness: I've seen business cards that have that. I've seen him quoted in the press as  
27 that. I've been to their website.

28 Paul Solis: I can show you this document. This is from the production you provided to  
29 our office. This is 381-382. Yes, R.W.381-382. It's an email. May 25,  
30 2013. At the top you'll see your name. Is that your email address?

1     Witness:             Yes, it is.

2     Paul Solis:            "To: Valerie Owens. CC: Jay Rouse and Arim Ye." The subject is,  
3                            "Conference Background Material." I'll give you a moment to look that  
4                            over. First of all, judging by what you see so far, do you recall this email?

5     Witness:             I do.

6     Paul Solis:            First of all, just generally can you tell me, why you sent this email and  
7                            what is the topic? Other than what I obviously see in the subject line.

8     Witness:             This appears Saturday evening. This is a few days before we're set to fly  
9                            over there for 48 hours. I don't recall if she had called me or had emailed  
10                           and requested that I give the one page back story. As I said, this all came  
11                           about fairly quickly. This was my attempt. I'm doing my homework.

12    Paul Solis:            When you say, "She," is that Valerie Owens?

13    Witness:             Correct.

14    Paul Solis:            If I could draw your attention to, I guess it would be the third paragraph,  
15                            where it starts, "Similar to last year."

16    Witness:             Oh yeah.

17    Paul Solis:            You'll see in that second sentence. It says, "They are the Southern/  
18                            Southwestern member organization of the increasingly politically  
19                            important," and it's a hyperlink there, "turkicamericanalliance.org."

20    Witness:             Yes.

21    Paul Solis:            Why did you characterize the Turquoise Council there as, "increasingly  
22                            politically important,"?

23    Witness:             In March of that year ... Frankly, actually, in March of this year, they have  
24                            these conventions. They're often held in our office building at the  
25                            Woodward. Political meaning that you often see several members of  
26                            Congress there. Politically important, I would characterize that as I saw  
27                            first-hand in my own community in Pennsylvania, how random ... I'll  
28                            stand by the word random ... State Representatives and other local elected  
29                            officials attend similar events and trips. I'll characterize that as politically  
30                            important.

31    Paul Solis:            Then that last sentence of that same paragraph. "The organizations are less  
32                            than a decade old but have quickly come into their own over the last  
33                            election cycle." What do you mean by, "come into their own,"?

1 Witness: As we discussed, I was actively involved in the 2012 election. I had seen,  
2 being that Pennsylvania being a swing state and generally democratic  
3 politics being fairly incestuous, I had heard and had seen various  
4 community members hosting different events. Whether it was rallies,  
5 fundraisers, what have you.

6 Paul Solis: When you say, "community members," do you mean ...

7 Witness: Of this greater Turkish American community.

8 Paul Solis: We'll go down two paragraphs there.

9 Scott Maberry: Paul, if I could just have Witness just briefly clarify. I think your question  
10 asked why he was characterizing the Turquoise Council as politically  
11 important but, in fact, I think the email has him characterizing the Turkic  
12 American Alliance more broadly as politically important.

13 Paul Solis: You're right. You're right, Scott.

14 Scott Maberry: I just wanted to make sure the answers were as to that.

15 Paul Solis: Right.

16 Scott Maberry: It's not a huge difference, but ...

17 Paul Solis: I guess I should ask a question then to clarify.

18 Witness: I'll apologize for spelling Turquoise wrong.

19 Paul Solis: That happens to everybody, I think. Would the same question about  
20 increasingly politically important apply to the Turquoise Council as well  
21 as to the Turkic American Alliance? Would you give the same answer? Is  
22 there a distinction between the two?

23 Witness: I don't want to be taken the wrong way. I don't know a lot about Texas.  
24 I've only been to Houston once. My understanding, what I had seen and  
25 was more aware of in the mid-Atlantic Northeast could very well been a  
26 mirror image to what the Turquoise Council was doing in the Southwest  
27 but I do not know firsthand what politically might have happened there or  
28 what happens there.

29 Paul Solis: When you answered my question about politically important, that was in  
30 reference to the Alliance then.

31 Witness: Exactly.

1 Paul Solis: You say more firsthand what they were doing.

2 Witness: Yes.

3 Scott Maberry: Thanks for clarifying that.

4 Witness: You're welcome.

5 Paul Solis: I guess then I would like to ask, though, "Similar to last year," in that same  
6 paragraph. Did you attend a conference the year before?

7 Witness: I did not. It happened here in Washington. I know that from the website  
8 and from the solicitations that we discussed in that February time frame.

9 Paul Solis: You said that the conference this year has been almost entirely organized  
10 by the Turquoise Council. How did you know that?

11 Witness: As I said, in that kind of February, March time frame, Kemal of the  
12 Turquoise Council and then his colleague, his partner of the Northeast  
13 version of that which doesn't have as unique a name. I'm noticing I  
14 misspelled it there again. Furkan Kosar were the ones who had been  
15 sending me emails. I believe the documents will clarify chronologically at  
16 this point that we'd already accepted the invitation. We were set to go. It  
17 was Kemal who was the point of contact, who was asking for passport  
18 copies. Saying, "Here's your travel itinerary." Etcetera.

19 Paul Solis: I want to go down to two paragraphs down again. "The lead organizer and  
20 director of the Turquoise Council is Kemal Oksuz. He is a member of  
21 DCCC Speaker's Cabinet and by in large a progressive Democrat.  
22 Through his position he has served as the 'lobbyist,' for Turkish Americans  
23 throughout the South and Southwest." Do you know whether or not at any  
24 point he was a lobbyist registered under the Lobby Disclosure Act?

25 Witness: I don't know for certain.

26 Paul Solis: Do you know possibly whether he was?

27 Witness: I'll tell you what I do know. I do know that the activity that I've seen of the  
28 Turquoise Council and of him is similar to many lobbyists that I know. I  
29 have not checked out LDA reports.

30 Paul Solis: The activities that are similar to other lobbyists you know, who I guess  
31 who are registered?

32 Witness: Yes.

1 Paul Solis: What are those activities? Do you mean in the amount of time that they're  
2 spending with members of Congress?

3 Witness: Yes.

4 Paul Solis: That's what you mean? Or the amount of money that's spent in lobbying  
5 activities?

6 Witness: To produce events actually on Capitol grounds or events that have  
7 members of Congress at various hotels in town, letter campaigns and what  
8 have you.

9 Paul Solis: Would it be safe to say, and I don't want to put words in your mouth but  
10 would it be safe to say that there isn't a large distinction or any distinction  
11 between Mr. Oksuz's activities and those people you know in Washington,  
12 D.C. who are registered lobbyists?

13 Witness: I don't know a year ago, or two years ago, at this time know what he does  
14 every day of the week. I do know, for example, when I've attended an  
15 event at the Willard or at the J.W. Marriott and see that level of detail put  
16 into the event, generally what it takes to produce something like that. To  
17 get that level of participation from US government stakeholders. I would  
18 assume that a lot of hours are devoted to it.

19 Paul Solis: Did you ever talk to anybody about that? Any of your friends, any of your  
20 colleagues? Did that question ever come up amongst your circles that,  
21 "Hey, is this guy a registered lobbyist?"

22 Witness: No.

23 Paul Solis: Did you ever overhear anybody talking about that?

24 Witness: I know that the former clients at SOCAR USA certainly inquired to me,  
25 "What is the distinction? What does it take to trigger this? Why are you,  
26 why are the lobbyists that work with our embassy professionals versus  
27 these folks?"

28 Paul Solis: By these folks, you mean...

29 Witness: Kemal, Furkan, others associated with the movement.

30 Paul Solis: Individuals of SOCAR USA asked that distinction between these people  
31 who are associated with the Turkic American Alliance and other registered  
32 lobbyists. Who would have asked you at SOCAR USA about that?

1 Witness: SOCAR USA is more or less one employee. It's Rauf Mammadov. I don't  
2 recall if embassy diplomats may have asked this. It's possible.

3 Paul Solis: After Mr. Mammadov asked you this question, what was your response to  
4 him?

5 Witness: I probably said the same exact thing. That it's public information. I can't  
6 say I spend my evenings looking at the disclosures but I don't believe he  
7 is.

8 Paul Solis: When you use the quotes around lobbyist in this email, why did you do  
9 that? Why did you put the quotes around it?

10 Witness: Because I was almost certain that he wasn't technically registered in the  
11 Washington sense. In the back home in Pennsylvania, anyone else would  
12 use that term but knowing that I was talking with someone that's quite  
13 familiar with Washington, I wanted to be technical.

14 Paul Solis: I'll go to the next paragraph. "This year Kemal and fellow conference  
15 organizers decided to focus on state and local elected officials." Is this  
16 knowledge, again, based on your interactions with Kemal and Furkan  
17 leading up to the convention?

18 Witness: Yes. I believe I had seen at this point I think we shared a list of, quite  
19 frankly, an eclectic list of various elected officials from around the  
20 country.

21 Paul Solis: I asked you earlier generally about your knowledge of SOCAR and at the  
22 time that Kemal and Furkan came to you about potentially your assistance  
23 in planning, right? The convention? I asked you if they mentioned  
24 SOCAR and I believe you said you don't think you remember at that time  
25 whether or not they mentioned it or ... Did you say you did?

26 Witness: I don't recall when they first approached. I mean, I really don't recall if  
27 they mentioned. I do know after the first conversation one of the first thing  
28 I did was go on the website to look at last year's convention. I saw the logo  
29 of SOCAR and others.

30 Paul Solis: In this email, again this May 25th email, you do mention the State Oil  
31 Company of Azerbaijan. You mentioned the State Oil Company, in  
32 reference I believe, to Azerbaijan. Would the knowledge of their  
33 involvement then have come later on as time approached towards the  
34 convention?

35 Witness: Certainly when we had gotten to ... I don't remember the exact dates.  
36 They'll be in there. Mid-May, two weeks out, this kind of last minute

1 development that they wanted us to come came about. We obviously  
2 started doing our due diligence and spending time on the SOCAR website,  
3 using Google, things like this.

4 Paul Solis: Going back to Mr. Oksuz. What is his relationship with SOCAR, if any?

5 Witness: Currently, I don't know.

6 Paul Solis: Did you know at any other time his relationship with SOCAR?

7 Witness: I mean, I've certainly seen him with employees, officials of SOCAR.

8 Paul Solis: To the best you can remember those times, when were those times that  
9 you saw him with employees, representatives of SOCAR?

10 Witness: At the event in question for starters.

11 Paul Solis: 2013 convention?

12 Witness: Yes. I believe, I seem to recall that photos from the 2012 convention also  
13 are him with SOCAR logos and others. There was a ... would have been  
14 July 2013, event immediately off of Capitol Hill that he was there with  
15 leadership of SOCAR. February of '14 there was another event on Capitol  
16 Hill. Actually, in the Rayburn Building, that he was there with officials of  
17 SOCAR. I can definitely distinctly remember those events. I apologize for  
18 not knowing the exact date.

19 Paul Solis: No, that's quite all right. What about to the government of Azerbaijan?  
20 Any members of Parliament, the President, do you know if he has a  
21 relationship with them?

22 Witness: I don't for certain. At some of the events that I mentioned, there certainly  
23 were ... To the extent you're making a distinction between a state owned  
24 company and ...

25 Paul Solis: Yes.

26 Witness: Yes, there certainly were government employees and government officials  
27 at those events.

28 Paul Solis: Where Mr. Oksuz was present?

29 Witness: Correct.

1 Paul Solis: Another email for you. This is RW-558. This is an email March 20th,  
2 2013. There's a series of emails but at the top, that's your email address,  
3 right?

4 Witness: Yes, it is.

5 Paul Solis: It says, "To: Vincent Roberti." "Subject: Pelosi's Turk." Do you recall  
6 these series of emails?

7 Witness: I do, yeah.

8 Paul Solis: If I could draw your attention to the middle section there, where you send  
9 an email to Vincent Roberti at 7:36 PM.

10 Witness: What about this Central/Standard time. Okay.

11 Paul Solis: It says, "This is who you met. You see how they have a lot to learn." Who  
12 is they?

13 Witness: The overall members of this sect of the Turkish American community.

14 Paul Solis: Would that be the Turkic American Alliance, the people affiliated with  
15 that organization?

16 Witness: Sure, and Turquoise, it's that people affiliated.

17 Paul Solis: What do they have to learn?

18 Witness: I'm not sure if it was that week or the week prior, one of these larger  
19 conventions that I've referenced happened. I believe it was at the J.W.  
20 Marriott. We were invited to come. We did. At that point I was in  
21 discussions with Mr. Roberti to join the firm. Being, as I said, our office at  
22 the Willard, we went across the street and we went to that event.

23 I'm sorry. To answer your question, they have a lot to learn. The two of us  
24 seeing lots of events over the years in Washington and elsewhere with  
25 elected officials, I would say it wasn't the most professionally organized in  
26 terms of time keeping, in terms of just logistics of moving.

27 Paul Solis: Then you write, "I still think there's a play with them." Could you provide  
28 further context on what that means?

29 Witness: At the time, I was transitioning into a new role, thinking about potential  
30 clients. At the time I thought that maybe there was an opportunity to  
31 provide professional assistance on proper lobbying for their efforts.

1 Paul Solis: Then I'll direct you to the email above. Again, I assume that you didn't  
2 author this email. This is from Vincent Roberti to you. The one labelled,  
3 "8:38 PM." I assume it's a response to the one I just asked you about.

4 Witness: Yeah, it looks like it's coming from him.

5 Paul Solis: Right. It says, "This guy is nuts. By the way, Pelosi's security team is very  
6 worried about doing anything with him again." Bearing in mind ... I'll just  
7 ask you. Did you write that?

8 Witness: I did not.

9 Paul Solis: Vincent Roberti wrote that?

10 Witness: I can assume so.

11 Paul Solis: You can make that assumption. Do you know what he would have meant,  
12 to the best of your understanding, what he would have meant by, "Pelosi's  
13 security team is very worried about doing anything with him again,"?  
14 Maybe, in just your experience, if this ...

15 Witness: No, I specifically remember what happened. That concerned me too. I  
16 think it concerned a lot of folks there. You had a very small room that was  
17 clearly over capacity at the J.W. Marriott. You had a stage, a temporary  
18 stage. Just one of these things that kind of makes an impression on you.  
19 We really thought that that stage was going to collapse and that the leader,  
20 and frankly other members who were there, could potentially be trampled.

21 Paul Solis: This was in, you believe, it was March?

22 Witness: That, by the way, is what I meant, "they have a lot to learn," when I was  
23 talking about logistics and flow of ... There's back doors and ways to make  
24 these things work.

25 Paul Solis: You believe the event that you're talking about, that these emails  
26 reference, that would have been in February of 2013?

27 Witness: No, no, no. I know for certain it was in March of '13. They just had a  
28 similar event. For whatever reason March tends to be when these events  
29 occur.

30 Paul Solis: I will move onto ... I'll just ask you finally about that March event. Was  
31 that organized by Mr. Oksuz? Was he the person behind putting that  
32 together?

1 Witness: I don't know for certain but he was certainly one of the organizers. I don't  
2 know if he was the lead. He was certainly around and about and a  
3 presence throughout the event.

4 Paul Solis: Another email from your production. It is numbered Roberti and White-  
5 399. I'll just be asking you about the top email. It's from you, Wednesday  
6 May 13th, 2013 to Jay Rouse. Rouse?

7 Witness: Rouse.

8 Paul Solis: Rouse. Do you recall this email?

9 Witness: I do.

10 Paul Solis: I want to ask you about the portion there where it says, "Per Rauf, he will  
11 be consulted for any proposal." Who is, "he,"?

12 Witness: Mr. Oksuz.

13 Paul Solis: Why is he consulted on any proposal?

14 Witness: Just a few months prior, the State Oil Company had opened an office here  
15 and dispatched Rauf and his family to be the first and sole employee. Prior  
16 to that, Kemal had built a rapport. I've since learned after the fact, and was  
17 evident clearly by what, although I didn't attend it, what I saw on the  
18 website in that 2012 US-Azerbaijan Convention that happened here in  
19 Washington. It was clear to me by that point, middle of May, that Kemal,  
20 Mr. Oksuz was regularly going back and forth to Baku. Clearly had deep  
21 relationships throughout the highest levels of Baku.

22 Paul Solis: Why was that clear to you?

23 Witness: He was clearly going back and forth for a reason. Clearly someone had  
24 engendered trust over there to produce or take a large role in producing  
25 this convention. I used my power of deduction there.

26 Paul Solis: When you say you know he's going back and forth, is he telling you that,  
27 or ... ? How do you know he's going back and forth to Baku?

28 Witness: He and Furkan are sharing that.

29 Paul Solis: Are they doing that over the phone or email? In person?

30 Witness: There was a combination of all that, yeah.

1 Paul Solis: You had mentioned that Kemal had built a rapport. With whom did he  
2 build a rapport?

3 Witness: Where did I mention that?

4 Paul Solis: When I asked you ...

5 Witness: Just over now?

6 Paul Solis: Yeah, yeah. Just a minute ago. You said when Mr. Mammadov had come  
7 here. He had been dispatched from Baku to come to the US. Kemal was  
8 already here and he had a rapport built.

9 Witness: Yes.

10 Paul Solis: Who did he have a rapport with?

11 Witness: The highest levels of official Baku.

12 Paul Solis: You use the word, "proposal." What is that referring to? Proposals for the  
13 convention or what?

14 Witness: No, we were in discussions. Per Rauf, it was suggested we should put  
15 together a professional proposal to assist SOCAR USA in their business  
16 development as they were opening this new office.

17 Paul Solis: On any proposals to SOCAR from Roberti and White, you would have to  
18 consult Kemal Oksuz?

19 Witness: No.

20 Paul Solis: No?

21 Witness: No. Our point of contact was actually SOCAR's employee, Rauf.

22 Paul Solis: Then further on, "He's going to claim that they can do everything as  
23 evidenced by putting on this conference." Is, "they," again, a reference to  
24 these Turkic ...

25 Witness: Yes, the greater movements. Yes.

26 Paul Solis: "The conference," is the convention in Baku?

27 Witness: Yes.

1 Paul Solis: Then, "But he will respectfully be told that he is just one component of the  
2 bigger strategy." What do you mean by that statement?

3 Witness: Our understanding at that point from conversations with Rauf is similar to  
4 Washington being very diverse. People having different opinions and  
5 different routes to get to the same objective. Baku, albeit smaller and a  
6 smaller country, had different ideas of how they wanted to strengthen the  
7 Washington, Baku relationship. The role of the oil company, obviously, is  
8 distinct than the role of the embassy. My sense at the time, my sense  
9 certainly afterward was that Mr. Oksuz was only, to use an analogy, one  
10 train going to the same station but not the parallel trains, parallel tracks.

11 Paul Solis: How did you come to understand that?

12 Witness: For example, the Embassy had hired a professional lobbying firm even  
13 though the Ambassador certainly had a rapport evidently with Mr. Oksuz.  
14 The Embassy knew that there was reason to add more artillery, so to  
15 speak.

16 Paul Solis: Was Roberti and White that professional lobbying firm that you're  
17 speaking of?

18 Witness: No. No, we've never worked for the government or the embassy.

19 Paul Solis: Of Azerbaijan?

20 Witness: Correct.

21 Paul Solis: Who would respectfully tell that to Kemal about the overall picture?

22 Witness: I don't have names. Frankly, I have no rapport with any SOCAR  
23 employees beyond Rauf Mammadov and his part-time assistant Sevinj  
24 Mammadova. I certainly did get a sense from Rauf that among the  
25 different Vice Presidents, or the different elements of the leadership, some  
26 felt strongly about Kemal's merits and the greater Turkic merits. Others  
27 realized that there was room to engage professional firms.

28 Paul Solis: In those discussions, were you ... Maybe not discussions but did you get  
29 the sense from Rauf and those other individuals, representatives of  
30 SOCAR, and specifically those people who are talking about Mr. Oksuz's  
31 merits, did you get the sense or is anybody saying about how important he  
32 is in DC to this overall strategy?

33 Witness: I certainly got that sense, yeah.

34 Paul Solis: That he is very important?

1 Witness: Correct.

2 Paul Solis: Do you have a sense of why he is very important?

3 Witness: He was able to generate photos of him with various elected officials. You  
4 can imagine if you're in a foreign capital, especially a capital that doesn't  
5 necessarily have the same kind of access and interaction with their  
6 government leadership. Here's someone who's demonstrating a lot of  
7 access.

8 Paul Solis: You said, "generated photos." Is that the limits of why he would be  
9 important in their eyes?

10 Scott Maberry: To the best of your knowledge.

11 Paul Solis: To the best of your knowledge.

12 Witness: Yeah, I mean, I did not attend the 2012 event but there were members of  
13 Congress there. I believe, photos I've seen, he was the M.C. of that event.  
14 People certainly greeted them on the way in as if they knew him. I would  
15 assume that that would lead someone, even if English isn't their first  
16 language, to say, "Oh, he must know folks."

17 Paul Solis: Another email. Kelly, did you have any questions? Don't want to skip over  
18 anything you have.

19 Kelly Brewington: Yeah. I think I'm okay for right now.

20 Paul Solis: Another email. This is RW-494. It is dated May 13, 2013. That's your  
21 email address at the top from you to Jay Rouse.

22 Witness: Rouse.

23 Paul Solis: Rouse, Rouse. I got to get that right. Do you recall this email?

24 Witness: I do.

25 Paul Solis: That second paragraph. You said, "For tomorrow morning, the important  
26 thing to remember is Rauf is sold." What are you referencing by,  
27 "tomorrow morning"? Is that a meeting?

28 Witness: Yes. I believe we met. I do not honestly recall if it was the first time that  
29 Jay met Rauf in person. We met for breakfast.

30 Paul Solis: Was that in Washington?

1 Witness: Yes, it was.

2 Paul Solis: Mr. Rouse, he's not an employee of Roberti and White, correct?

3 Witness: No, he was the neighbor of a former employee of Roberti and White.

4 Paul Solis: Why would he be coming to meet with Rauf?

5 Witness: Generally, we being a smaller firm, sometimes we contract out or  
6 subcontract out. For what we were proposing, there would be  
7 opportunities to potentially engage Jay. I had met him, for the record,  
8 about two weeks prior.

9 Paul Solis: At this point, and I've shown you a series of emails in May, you've had  
10 some conversations about Rauf Mammadov and certainly discussing him  
11 and about the convention. What is Roberti and White's relationship with  
12 Mr. Mammadov or SOCAR at this point, in May?

13 Witness: At this point in time, there's nothing formal. Nothing official. It's a fellow  
14 my age, recently married, recently a father, in a new city, starting a new  
15 chapter in his professional life. I'm engaged to be married at that time.  
16 Frankly, I'm in a new city. I was living in Philadelphia prior. We're just  
17 kind of going through life changes and we became fast friends in a  
18 personal context.

19 Paul Solis: You and Mr. Mammadov?

20 Witness: Yes.

21 Paul Solis: The first time you met him was it more of a friendly setting or was it a ... ?

22 Witness: Exactly.

23 Paul Solis: Okay. You didn't then reach out to him about the proposition of engaging  
24 in Roberti and White's services to SOCAR?

25 Witness: Certainly when I was hired in April and I came on board, he was happy for  
26 me and excited for me and wanted to learn more. It was at the same time  
27 that I got the sense that he was getting a directive from his leadership,  
28 similar to the Embassy, to seek professional services and proposals. It only  
29 seemed natural to take the relationship to a different level.

30 Paul Solis: That would have been in April of 2013 when you came on?

31 Witness: Yeah, when I came on board with the firm. Yeah.

1 Paul Solis: You had known him prior to that?

2 Witness: Very casually. Maybe four times or so we had gotten a beer prior.

3 Paul Solis: Again, I want to direct you to that second paragraph. "We are providing  
4 him the best ammunition to sell his chairman." Who is, "his chairman"?

5 Witness: The Chairman of SOCAR is a gentleman named Rovnag Abdullayev. My  
6 understanding now is that Rauf is a direct report to him.

7 Paul Solis: What is Rauf sold on?

8 Witness: That a rapport had been built and we certainly could provide a  
9 professional service.

10 Paul Solis: Had an agreement been reached at that point?

11 Witness: No. A formal, written agreement? No.

12 Paul Solis: What about a verbal agreement?

13 Witness: We were told, "We're very intrigued. We want to hire someone. This is the  
14 type we want to hire," but as you see, as we've discussed, that did not  
15 happen until August.

16 Paul Solis: I just want to ... For you to say that Rauf, "is sold," I want to make sure ...

17 Witness: Rauf certainly was sold. Rauf wasn't the sole decision maker. He was sold.  
18 Yeah, I can't recall when but probably at one point he had said, "I'm very  
19 impressed with you guys. I really enjoy working and getting to know you  
20 guys." I'll admit that could very well be a little bit of poetic license and  
21 hyperbole to Jay. Someone I had just met, someone that is certainly older  
22 than me and quite accomplished. I certainly had the sense, in terms of  
23 Rauf, granted he wasn't the sole decision maker, that Rauf was sold.

24 Paul Solis: Who is Brenda in that next paragraph?

25 Witness: Brenda is an Israeli-American, PhD, who has done extensive work on the  
26 energy nexus and geopolitics between Israel and Azerbaijan.

27 Paul Solis: Did she join you at this breakfast?

28 Witness: No, I don't think. No.

29 Paul Solis: I want to move to the next paragraph. "I don't think we dwell much on the  
30 conference as he views it as a cluster ..."

1 Witness: Apologize for my language.

2 Paul Solis: Quite all right.

3 Witness: You see I built a good rapport in a short period with Mr. Rouse.

4 Paul Solis: Right. "But like all of them is grateful so many visitors will come to  
5 Baku." Why did you say that? Why did you say, "he views it," in that  
6 way? I assume, "he," is Rauf, correct?

7 Witness: "He," is Rauf. Rauf's background is as an oil company guy. He doesn't  
8 know about event planning. My sense is and was that he was not actively  
9 engaged in the planning of that. Frankly, was still learning his way around  
10 Washington, geographically, literally. Living in the Ritz Carlton. Still  
11 trying to get his feet wet and as all that's happening, someone else, Kemal  
12 Oksuz is doing something that he's not always fully kept in the loop on.  
13 You can imagine that he's the one giving out business cards, trying to  
14 establish a name for himself in a new town, on behalf of an international  
15 oil company. Here is a lot of things happening and he might not have been  
16 the first to know.

17 Paul Solis: I want to make sure I understand, then. If Rauf is coming from Baku and  
18 he's getting established in the US and he might not be kept in the loop on  
19 everything that Mr. Oksuz is doing ...

20 Witness: Correct.

21 Paul Solis: Is Mr. Oksuz then getting directives back in Baku from SOCAR?

22 Witness: Once again, to the best of my knowledge, I don't know where he was  
23 getting directives from. I do know he was not getting them from Rauf  
24 Mammadov.

25 Paul Solis: Is he doing things, to the best of your knowledge, on behalf of SOCAR,  
26 for SOCAR? Is he doing things that Mr. Mammadov would want to know  
27 about?

28 Witness: He's definitely doing things that Mr. Mammadov, professionally and  
29 personally, would want to know about because whether it was SOCAR,  
30 the government of Azerbaijan, other oil companies working over there, in  
31 the eyes of the people that Rauf was beginning relationships with, it's all  
32 the same boat.

33 Paul Solis: To the best of your understanding and your experience with all this, given  
34 that Mr. Oksuz is affiliated with these organizations, the Turkic American  
35 Alliance, and the Gülen Movement, why is he doing things potentially for

1 the government of Azerbaijan? Why is he doing things potentially for  
2 SOCAR? How do those two align to the best of your understanding?

3 Witness: I think there's very little I know. I honestly don't know. There's the greater  
4 goals of the movement. I only know about from 60 minutes and other  
5 reporting. Their geographical spread. I have no idea.

6 Paul Solis: It's clear to you at this time, as we've discussed, that Mr. Oksuz has a  
7 connection to the government of Azerbaijan and to SOCAR?

8 Witness: Yes.

9 Paul Solis: The next paragraph of the same email, "You will clearly get a sense from  
10 Rauf his dynamic with Kemal." What is the dynamic between Rauf and  
11 Kemal?

12 Witness: I got the sense during that month, as you can imagine if you have several  
13 hundred people coming from overseas, that there was some friction. The  
14 long hours are being worked. There's already a large time difference. It's  
15 nine hour time difference. Rauf's getting all sorts of things. Second wind,  
16 he might be getting certain directives but not knowing the full picture. By  
17 dynamic, you get the sense that some friction at that time was developing.

18 Paul Solis: Was Rauf getting a lot of information at that time about the convention?

19 Witness: I don't know. At that point we weren't professionally engaged. I'd see him  
20 for a meal, for a beer here and there. I did get the sense that he was under a  
21 lot of stress.

22 Paul Solis: About the convention or other things?

23 Witness: I think the combination of brand new city, all of a sudden you've got  
24 hundreds of people going to your small country. This whole maelstrom  
25 coming together.

26 Paul Solis: At that time, did you get a sense of what Rauf's role was with the  
27 convention? What his duties were?

28 Witness: I generally got the sense that he ... How should I say? On the bus but not  
29 driving the bus. As it got closer, as I said, it was Kemal saying, "Here's  
30 your travel agent." Kemal saying, "I need copies of your passport."  
31 Throughout all of it, Rauf wasn't even on those emails.

32 Paul Solis: Did Rauf ever tell you what his job duties were? Let's say, for example,  
33 that representatives from SOCAR asked him to do something to help get  
34 people to Azerbaijan? Did he ever talk to you about that?

1 Witness: No, I don't recall. No. I generally got the sense that he, frankly, did not  
2 know his job duties. That it was everything from, "We just bought a new  
3 office. We need to get handymen to ... " These types of things. "There's an  
4 event happening on energy policy at Brookings. You need to attend."  
5 Every week, I got the sense that he was just under a lot of stress and it was  
6 ever changing what his role was.

7 Paul Solis: The next sentence there, "The SOCAR chair, Parliament Speaker, and  
8 Ambassador value Kemal's opinion and according to Rauf, Kemal will be  
9 consulted after Rauf delivers our proposals." How did you know that the  
10 SOCAR Chair, Parliament Speaker, and Ambassador of, I assume,  
11 Azerbaijan value Kemal's opinion?

12 Witness: The logical thing. I asked Rauf. It takes time, obviously, to put together a  
13 proposal. I asked him point blank. I said, "Is this ... Who is looking at this?  
14 Who is the decision maker? We're going to take time and we're going to  
15 put something together but we want to know that it's not going in the  
16 waste bin or it's just sitting in an inbox."

17 Paul Solis: This, again, is a proposal for potential services.

18 Witness: Professional services, yeah.

19 Paul Solis: Professional services.

20 Witness: To SOCAR USA.

21 Paul Solis: What was his answer when you asked, "Who is going to be looking at  
22 this?"

23 Witness: He explained, more or less, the pecking order of the totem pole.

24 Paul Solis: That would be the SOCAR Chair ...

25 Witness: That he reports to the Chairman. That we have this many Vice Presidents.  
26 Giving me the sense ... If you were to give the sense to a foreigner that we  
27 have three branches of government in this country. What's happening in  
28 this country that, in Azerbaijan, a country that I frankly didn't know much  
29 about at the time and had not been to.

30 Paul Solis: Did he mention that the Parliament Speaker was also involved in that  
31 decision?

32 Witness: I don't recall about that. The Parliament Speaker was someone who had  
33 been in Kemal's presence, who had a relationship there and attending  
34 events in this town. I since have not, frankly, thought about the Parliament

1 Speaker. I don't even know the name of that person. Clearly at the time,  
2 back two full years ago he must of mentioned it.

3 Paul Solis: You mean Rauf mentioned it?

4 Witness: Yes.

5 Paul Solis: Okay. They value Kemal's opinion. You write on, "Kemal will be  
6 consulted." Does that mean that after Rauf delivers your proposals to  
7 engage in professional services, Kemal would be consulted on that?"

8 Witness: It was my understanding that there essentially would be a little bit of a turf  
9 battle. That Kemal wanted to be perceived by all parties involved in Baku  
10 as, "If you need anything." ... "You," meaning anyone from Azerbaijan, "I  
11 am your guy. I'm frustrated that Embassy has a firm. I'm frustrated even  
12 that elements of SOCAR is talking about having a firm. I am your guy."

13 Paul Solis: Is that limited to the universe of the convention or in general?

14 Witness: In general.

15 Paul Solis: By firms you mean ...

16 Witness: Professional, brick and mortar, registered lobbyists.

17 Paul Solis: It was your understanding that Kemal thought he could take on those  
18 roles?

19 Witness: Correct.

20 Paul Solis: For the government and SOCAR?

21 Witness: For any other parties in between. Yup.

22 Paul Solis: Kelly, do you have any questions?

23 Kelly Brewington: You mentioned the turf battle. Beyond the turf battle, or maybe you could  
24 characterize what their relationship was?

25 Witness: Who is ... ?

26 Kelly Brewington: Rauf and Kemal.

27 Witness: Yes.

28 Kelly Brewington: Can you describe what that relationship was like?

1 Scott Maberry: To the best of your knowledge.

2 Witness: To the best of my knowledge, at that point in time, I think we discussed  
3 there was friction.

4 Kelly Brewington: Friction, turf battle, but beyond that.

5 Witness: I can't say that I saw them together, I was privy to any shouting matches,  
6 or even pleasantries across tea. I just got the sense that there was friction  
7 for the reasons we discussed.

8 Paul Solis: What is the Assembly of Friends of Azerbaijan?

9 Witness: I honestly do not know. It's an organization that Kemal was certainly with.  
10 I don't know. I don't know its tax status. I don't know where it's  
11 headquartered. Frankly, I've been very curious but I do not know.

12 Paul Solis: Okay, let's start with how do you know that Kemal Oksuz was affiliated  
13 with that organization?

14 Witness: I don't recall but at a certain point he moved to the Washington area. It  
15 seemed I would see him at some of the events I mentioned, standing in  
16 front of a podium, M.C.'ing events. Rayburn, for example, with that logo  
17 behind him. Things like this.

18 Paul Solis: Do you know what it's mission is or what it does? The organization, it's  
19 general ... ?

20 Witness: I assume it's, like all of us, to bring two countries closer together and  
21 create better understanding.

22 Paul Solis: By that you mean the United States and Azerbaijan?

23 Witness: Correct.

24 Paul Solis: You said you were curious about it. What do you mean by you were  
25 curious about the Assembly of Friends of Azerbaijan?

26 Witness: I'm a naturally curious person. It's a pretty meager website. I was curious.  
27 Is this a subset of the greater TAA, Gülen Movement? The logo looks  
28 quite similar to SOCAR. What is this? By this point in time, we had been  
29 retained. As a professional, it's good to know if we're, in theory, all on the  
30 same team going to the same end zone, who else is on the field.

31 Paul Solis: Did you do some research on, I'll call it AFAZ from here on out ...

1     Witness:             Sure.

2     Paul Solis:          Did you do some research on AFAZ after you had engaged SOCAR in  
3                             professional services?

4     Witness:             I tried but it didn't seem like there was, to use the expression, a lot of  
5                             "there," there.

6     Paul Solis:          Did you ask around? Did you talk to anybody about AFAZ?

7     Witness:             I did.

8     Paul Solis:          Who did you talk to about that?

9     Witness:             I asked Rauf.

10    Paul Solis:          What did he say about AFAZ?

11    Witness:             That it's an organization that's mission is to bring the two countries closer  
12                             together.

13    Paul Solis:          Did he talk about it's relationship to SOCAR?

14    Witness:             No. Now, I will say, at their offices ... I don't recall when I first met him or  
15                             when it ... I thought there was a new SOCAR employee. A fellow who had  
16                             graduated from the University of Delaware, an Azerbaijani national. Rauf  
17                             quickly corrected me, "No. Even though he's here, he's an AFAZ  
18                             employee."

19    Paul Solis:          Did Rauf tell you anything more about AFAZ beyond that?

20    Witness:             I believe he's on the board or was on the board of it along with, I know  
21                             Kemal was on the board of it or is on the board of it, as I said before.

22    Paul Solis:          By, "he," you mean Rauf?

23    Witness:             Yes.

24    Paul Solis:          How did you come to that understanding, that Rauf is on the board of  
25                             AFAZ?

26    Witness:             I think at one point it lists the board members on their website. It was  
27                             interesting. At certain points the website had more content, at certain  
28                             points had less content.

1 Paul Solis: We spoke with Rauf. Rauf told us that there is a relationship and that  
2 SOCAR established AFAZ. Now that I'm telling you that, I don't know if  
3 that helps you conjure up any memories of conversations you might have  
4 had.

5 Witness: Look, I always assumed that. As I said, there's a fellow named Rafig  
6 Gurbanzade, who was sitting just a few meters from Rauf even though he  
7 had different business cards, different email address, different reporting,  
8 so to speak. As I said, it was always peculiar to me that their logo was  
9 almost identical. I always assumed but I never knew for a fact. Is it a  
10 registered non-profit? Where is it incorporated? What is it's exact mission?  
11 How is it ... As I said, we're all kind of trains going to the same station and  
12 are members of the same team, going to the same end zone. What's their  
13 role versus ours versus the Embassy's versus the Embassy's lobbyists? It  
14 just was unclear to me.

15 Paul Solis: Given that you had all those questions about AFAZ, other than Rauf, did  
16 you ask anybody else to answer those questions?

17 Witness: There wasn't really anyone else to ask.

18 Paul Solis: What about Kemal?

19 Witness: I have not had conversations with Kemal since ... After the trip and then  
20 after the signing of our contract, the relationship just ... I did not have  
21 conversations with him. Frankly, I didn't pursue conversations with him  
22 even though countries do this. Certainly Azerbaijan does this. They have a  
23 big national day, kind of their July 4th event. This was, it's always in May.  
24 It was May of '14. He would have been at that event but he saw me, I saw  
25 him across the room. I actually tried to introduce him to my wife. He  
26 never met my wife. She used to work with Turkish Americans. The man  
27 literally, so ...

28 Paul Solis: I asked you previously about TCAE, the Turquoise Council. You said that,  
29 at one point at least, you were aware that Kemal Oksuz was affiliated with  
30 that organization. To your understanding, what is the relationship between  
31 AFAZ and TCAE, the Turquoise Council?

32 Witness: I have no idea. They're really playing in the same sandbox but I have no  
33 idea the relationship.

34 Paul Solis: When you say, "playing in the same sandbox," what do you mean by that?

35 Witness: You have the same principle, it seems to be. Kemal Oksuz is attending  
36 events that have both logos, things like this. Events tend to involve folks  
37 from the Southwestern United States, elected officials.

1 Paul Solis: You have attended more than one event where you've seen both AFAZ  
2 and TCAE's logos together?

3 Witness: Yeah, yeah. As I said, in July of '13 there was an event at the Hyatt, New  
4 Jersey Avenue. We talked about in February of '14, I guess that would  
5 have been, there was an event in the Rayburn Building I distinctly  
6 remember.

7 Paul Solis: Not too much longer. I just wanted to ask you about the convention now.  
8 We're actually going to talk about the convention. You attended ...

9 Scott Maberry: Is there going to be a field trip?

10 Paul Solis: I've heard Baku's nice.

11 Witness: It's not easy to get to.

12 Paul Solis: You attended the convention?

13 Witness: For a whopping day and a half, yeah.

14 Paul Solis: Given that Kemal Oksuz and Furkan Kosar had come to you and asked  
15 you about planning issues and you declined, why did you ultimately  
16 decide to go on this trip to Baku?

17 Witness: I'm intrigued with that part of the world. I think most people are. If  
18 someone offers you a first opportunity to go to a unique place for free, I'm  
19 not going to turn down those airline miles. I was, as I said, in this new  
20 profession. Didn't know who I was going to be able to network with. To  
21 be very honest, at that point it looked liked the date period was going to be  
22 my then fiance's bachelorette party and it just seemed like a no-brainer.

23 Paul Solis: You went with Valerie Owens and Jay Rouse?

24 Witness: Yes.

25 Paul Solis: Did anybody else go with you?

26 Witness: I mean, it was packed Lufthansa flight but ...

27 Paul Solis: I meant ...

28 Witness: Leaving from Philly International airport, although Jay did not leave from  
29 Philly, I did not know anyone on the flight.

1 Paul Solis: Do you know why those two individuals went with you? Or why the three  
2 of you went together? Why did they decide to go on the trip to Baku?

3 Witness: As Jay was getting to know Rauf and Rauf was soliciting our ideas and  
4 opinions to put together a proposal, it became evident that Azerbaijan had  
5 and has a tremendous story to be told about women in the Muslim world.  
6 Jay had done work over the years with Valerie and suggested to Rauf,  
7 would this be someone as you're finalizing your speakers and your panels,  
8 that should attend?

9 Paul Solis: What did Rauf ... What was his response to that?

10 Witness: He said, "This sounds very interesting but the guy you've got to speak with  
11 is Kemal." We know Kemal. Kemal, I think as is evident, leapt at the  
12 opportunity and said, "Sure. We'll create a special panel and we'll fit her  
13 in."

14 Paul Solis: The first actual time you heard about the convention, when would that  
15 have been?

16 Witness: I mean in terms of the dates, in terms of the real kind of meat, I think it  
17 was when this development came up that maybe Valerie and they wanted  
18 to do a women's focus. Earlier, as I said, I think it was February-ish  
19 Furkan and Kemal ... Furkan, since I just knew him better, approached me  
20 and pretty much said, "How can you help? We want you to help organize."

21 Paul Solis: This is prior to your employment with Roberti and White?

22 Witness: Correct.

23 Paul Solis: Had they asked you about Senator Casey doing something for the  
24 convention?

25 Witness: Yeah, they certainly did. The only reason they knew me was because of  
26 him.

27 Paul Solis: What did they ask of him via you?

28 Witness: They were pushing rather aggressively. This may or may not be evident in  
29 black white documents, for his attendance. I told them categorically I did  
30 not feel comfortable doing that. That's not ... I'm not in that business.

31 Paul Solis: What business is that?

1 Witness: A, conference planning and, B, after 8 plus wonderful years, I'm not going  
2 to be making requests of my former boss weeks after leaving and, frankly,  
3 still now.

4 Paul Solis: Who paid for your travel to go to Baku?

5 Witness: I've wondered that a lot during this. I do not know. I know that Kemal put  
6 us in touch with a travel agent based in Brooklyn with Turkish surnames.

7 Paul Solis: Nil Travel or Tursan Travel, does that ring a bell?

8 Witness: I honestly don't recall but I know it will be in these. Maybe Nil sounds  
9 more familiar.

10 Paul Solis: It's N-I-L, spelled N-I-L.

11 Witness: Sure.

12 Paul Solis: Nobody explained to you specifically how your ticket is getting paid for to  
13 go to Baku? Your flight?

14 Witness: No, in retrospect it's kind of crazy because we didn't even know who was  
15 going to be picking us up at the airport on the backend. I did not know.

16 Paul Solis: What about Valerie Owens and Mr. Rouse? What about their tickets? Do  
17 you know how theirs were paid for?

18 Witness: It was the same travel agent but I don't. I have no idea how.

19 Paul Solis: Could you walk me through specifically how that happens? They invite  
20 you to go. You say yes. I can tell you what I would do, I would say, "How  
21 am I going to pay for it?" Does Kemal say to you, "It's all taken care of"?

22 Witness: Yes.

23 Paul Solis: He says, "It's already been paid for"? Okay.

24 Witness: It was maybe wrongfully assumed. They're asking us all these questions.  
25 "Which airport do you want to fly out of? Can we get passport copies? We  
26 need these right away. We need to get you visas." There's never a question  
27 of, "Are we flying this class versus this. Let's go on Kayak and take a  
28 look." It was just kind of assumed that everything was ...

29 Paul Solis: You never got a bill.

30 Witness: We did not get a bill.

1 Paul Solis: Were you talking to anybody else at this time about the logistics of getting  
2 to Baku?

3 Witness: My fiancé.

4 Paul Solis: Besides your family and besides Ms. Owens and besides Mr. Rouse, are  
5 you talking to anybody on that end about ...

6 Witness: That end being ... ?

7 Paul Solis: Mr. Mammadov, Mr. Oksuz, Furkan Kosar, anybody, are you talking to  
8 them, anybody else besides Mr. Oksuz about logistics of getting to Baku?

9 Witness: No, he was the funnel. I mean, I think I even volunteered, "Do I need to go  
10 the Embassy? I've never been to the Embassy." I looked up online we need  
11 a visa. He said, "Don't worry. Don't worry. Just get us passport copies."  
12 He has an associate, a younger fellow, Saim, something like that, that was  
13 sometimes handling these logistics.

14 Paul Solis: Mr. Oksuz did? Or Mr. Kosar?

15 Witness: I got the sense that he was kind of a shared employee.

16 Paul Solis: I believe that individual, his formal employment is with Mr. Kosar's  
17 organization but if he was representing himself as also an assistant to Mr.  
18 Oksuz, I'd like to know too.

19 Witness: I've seen the three of them together quite often. I definitely got the sense  
20 that he was helping in the overall planning.

21 Paul Solis: When you're talking to Mr. Oksuz about the logistics of getting there and  
22 the tickets and all of this, how is he representing himself? Is he sending  
23 emails from his Gmail account, from the Turquoise Council? Is he saying,  
24 "I am with the Turquoise Council?" How is he holding himself out to you?

25 Witness: In terms of which emails, I don't know. It's probably all here. I know I've  
26 seen emails from multiple addresses from him. I'm getting the sense that  
27 Turquoise Council is, yes, taking the lead but it's part of this greater  
28 tapestry of regional organizations. There's the various lieutenants and he's  
29 one of them along with Furkan and others but it seems like he was, for  
30 whatever reason, the lead.

31 Paul Solis: What about AFAZ? Do you think AFAZ at that point had anything to do  
32 with the logistics of getting you there?

1 Witness: I don't remember. I don't think I became curious about AFAZ or even  
2 knew of it until later. Even almost a full year later. Whereas, the  
3 organization that Furkan is associated with, or their Chicago counterparts,  
4 or these other kind of regional Turquoise, those I certainly knew about and  
5 could picture their logos, had been to their websites.

6 Paul Solis: As far as we can tell, I mean publicly AFAZ was a stated "organizer" of  
7 the convention so their logos would have been present at the convention  
8 itself in Baku. I don't know if you recall seeing the AFAZ logos there.

9 Witness: There were a lot of logos. I was ridiculously jet lagged, travelling 16 hours  
10 each way to be on the ground for less than a day and a half. There were  
11 logos I definitely recognized, like a BP logo. Logos that I had seen before  
12 like a Turkic logo. It's very possible that their logo ... But it's not an  
13 acronym or a logo that I'd seen before and didn't really register, I think,  
14 much about ...

15 Paul Solis: When you got to the convention, what was SOCAR USA's role in the  
16 convention? General question.

17 Witness: During my time on the grounds, a small, small fraction of the time, maybe  
18 cumulatively one hour, I saw Rauf Mammadov. The sole employee and  
19 representative of SOCAR USA. To be candid, that kind of frustrated us  
20 because he was the only Azeri, so to speak, that I knew. I thought we were  
21 going to see him more. Just like night life or what have you. SOCAR, we  
22 stayed across the street from their headquarters. We saw their logo many  
23 different places. Many SOCAR employees were clearly there giving  
24 interviews to local media, greeting folks.

25 Paul Solis: Did you get the impression they were working or was this on their free  
26 time?

27 Witness: I don't know if you'd call that work but, I mean, it's during the work day,  
28 during the work week.

29 Paul Solis: The conference was called ... You know, you've done this. You go to  
30 conferences. You know this stuff. The conference was called, "US  
31 Azerbaijan: Vision For the Future." In the promotional materials, a lot of it  
32 is about the relations between the two countries, right? The public  
33 relations.

34 Witness: Yup.

35 Paul Solis: Was this about that? Was it about SOCAR and energy related issues? Was  
36 it about both? What do you think?

1 Witness: I'm not the best person to ask because we arrived 10:00 or so at night. You  
2 can imagine collapsed into bed. The next morning, got on a shuttle bus to  
3 the convention center. There was a big opening session. Had a lot of  
4 speakers, frankly, not really with a coherent message. They had everything  
5 under the sun. War on terror to energy to Israel, what have you. At that  
6 point, then, we broke out. We went to our panel which, unfortunately, was  
7 not very well attended or it seemed like a sideshow.

8 Paul Solis: Were you on a panel?

9 Witness: No, I went with Valerie.

10 Paul Solis: She was on a panel.

11 Witness: Correct.

12 Paul Solis: What did she speak on?

13 Witness: Empowering women. At that point, after her panel was done, about lunch  
14 time, we were, frankly, on our own, the three of us. Part of us felt grateful,  
15 we were pretty exhausted. Still part of us felt pretty confused. That they  
16 had us all the way over here, we felt like maybe there should have been  
17 more activities or something for us to do. Over the course of the rest of the  
18 day, I'm not really sure what happened at the conference and what the  
19 messaging was.

20 Paul Solis: Did you see members of Congress there?

21 Witness: Yes.

22 Paul Solis: Did you talk to any?

23 Witness: On our flight, connecting flight from Frankfurt to ... I was in coach but  
24 there certainly were members on the flight and then when we landed and  
25 were going through the visa check, immigration check, we saw members.  
26 Then when we were waiting and waiting, it was completely unorganized,  
27 at 10:00, 11:00 at night, for the shuttle bus. Figuring out we didn't even  
28 know what hotel we necessarily were going to be checking into. On that  
29 shuttle bus there were members of Congress and other prominent folks  
30 from around town.

31 Paul Solis: Did you have any role whatsoever in getting those members of Congress  
32 to go to Baku? Is Valerie Owens the only person that you had any type of  
33 role at all in coordinating her travel to get to Baku?

34 Witness: Jay Rouse.

1 Paul Solis: Jay Rouse.

2 Witness: Yeah.

3 Paul Solis: Show you a document here. Not too much left. Do you want to take a  
4 break?

5 Witness: I could just use one of those waters if you don't mind?

6 Paul Solis: Okay, you bet. Anybody else?

7 Scott Maberry: All set.

8 Kelly Brewington: Fine, thank you.

9 Witness: Thank you.

10 Paul Solis: You're most welcome.

11 Scott Maberry: This is 160.

12 Paul Solis: Yes, RW160.

13 Witness: Turquoise is spelled correctly this time.

14 Paul Solis: Middle of the way down there, this email. Again, you're CC'd on it. It  
15 doesn't look like you're the author of this email. It says, "Dear Kemal,  
16 thank you for all your great help with this. Who should Val make the  
17 invoice out to? Thanks, Jay." Again, at the top, Mr. Oksuz responds.  
18 You're CC'd. Do you know what the word, "invoice," do you know what  
19 that refers to?

20 Witness: I do. At this point in time, I had never met Valerie. Jay, as I said, had  
21 known her for years and was coordinating. Was essentially the liaison  
22 between me, between Mr. Oksuz, and her.

23 Paul Solis: What's the invoice about?

24 Witness: They had negotiated an honorarium.

25 Paul Solis: For Valerie Owens?

26 Witness: For Valerie's presentation panel.

27 Paul Solis: Where would that honorarium come from? Who was paying for that?

1 Witness: I don't know. I did not receive an honorarium. I assume the invoice was ...  
2 I mean, he replies that it should be made out to the Turquoise Council.

3 Paul Solis: Do you know if anybody else at the convention received an honorarium?

4 Witness: Yes.

5 Paul Solis: Who else did?

6 Witness: I mean, there were other folks such as Jim Messina, David Plouffe. There  
7 was Paul Wolfowitz was on our shuttle bus. Those were all folks on our  
8 shuttle bus. I don't know for certain if ... Former Senator Luger, he was on  
9 our shuttle bus and was there. I believe I saw former Governor Richardson  
10 was there.

11 Paul Solis: How do you know they received honorarium?

12 Witness: There was an article in the Washington Post that suggested as much. I  
13 don't know for certain. I would assume, you know what they say about  
14 assuming but, if they offered her an honorarium, they offered others.

15 Paul Solis: Okay. General discussions, overhearing conversations, do you know at all  
16 whether or not members of Congress received honoraria for speaking at  
17 the convention?

18 Witness: No, I didn't. I mean, there was definitely chit chat on that shuttle bus and  
19 on the backend but there was no talk about that.

20 Paul Solis: Did you see Congressional staff members at the convention? Anybody you  
21 recognized?

22 Witness: Not that I would know names. Actually, come to think of it, on that shuttle  
23 bus I did not ... Not to stereotype but did not see any kind of younger  
24 Americans holding the bags of members. I did not get that sense.

25 Paul Solis: I'm going to read to you a couple names and you tell me if you're familiar  
26 with the names. Turkic American Federation of the Midwest?

27 Witness: Yup.

28 Paul Solis: You've heard of that before?

29 Witness: Yes.

30 Paul Solis: Do you know who heads that organization?

1 Witness: I know that at one point, Kemal lives in Chicago and I believe was the  
2 head of that, but I don't know.

3 Paul Solis: Mid-Atlantic Federation of Turkic American Associations, MAFTAA?

4 Witness: I've heard of it but I don't know much about it.

5 Paul Solis: Do you know who heads that organization?

6 Witness: No.

7 Paul Solis: The Turkic American Federation of the Southeast?

8 Witness: No.

9 Paul Solis: The Council of Turkic American Associations?

10 Witness: Is that the one out of New York?

11 Paul Solis: Yes.

12 Witness: Yes, then yes.

13 Paul Solis: You know who Furkan Kosar is.

14 Witness: Kosar is, yeah, yeah.

15 Paul Solis: You've known him longer than you've known Kemal Oksuz?

16 Witness: His territory includes Pennsylvania.

17 Paul Solis: Did Mr. Kosar attend the convention?

18 Witness: Yeah, he was there.

19 Paul Solis: What did he say beyond those requests of you to plan the convention or  
20 help to organize the convention, what did he say to you about the  
21 convention? I'm specifically asking about Mr. Kosar.

22 Witness: In the lead up?

23 Paul Solis: Yes, the lead up.

24 Witness: "It's going to be the greatest event ever. It's going to be the highlight of my  
25 professional career. Everyone's talking about this. You'd be foolish not to  
26 want to get active." These types of things. "What do you mean you can't

1 reach out to Senator Casey? I know you are so close with him. I'm  
2 saddened that you won't reach out to him." These types of things.

3 Paul Solis: Did he talk about whether or not his organization, this CTAA, would be  
4 sponsoring members of Congress to go to Baku?

5 Witness: I don't recall. I think when I ... I honestly don't recall. I think when I turned  
6 down Casey, he started asking, "Are there other members from  
7 Pennsylvania that you would feel comfortable reaching out to?" Things  
8 like this.

9 Paul Solis: Do you generally know anything, whether it was discussion at the  
10 convention or lead up to the convention, do you generally know anything  
11 about some of these organizations I just listed? The Turkic organizations,  
12 about them sponsoring members of Congress to go to Baku?

13 Witness: I think when you say, "sponsor," it's a technical term. Having never gone  
14 on a staff DEL, as they say in these things, or a CODEL, I'm not  
15 necessarily familiar but if you want to elaborate on that ...

16 Paul Solis: It is, I guess, a technical term that does have a specific meaning to it and a  
17 definition to it. I will ask in a more generalized, maybe colloquial sense  
18 about sponsoring.

19 Witness: I apologize for my ignorance.

20 Paul Solis: No, no, no, no. That's an important distinction to make. Did anybody,  
21 were there any conversations, to your general knowledge leading up to the  
22 convention or at the convention, do you have any understanding of  
23 members of Congress, their relationship to these Turkic associations?

24 Witness: Yes.

25 Paul Solis: Yeah? What did you know about that?

26 Witness: For example, I had cited that March conference. Every year they have  
27 conferences like this. They do similar conferences with the KAZACs, with  
28 the KIRGIs. I knew that members of Congress and their staff had gone to  
29 Turkey with them previously. Including my hometown Congressman, for  
30 example. I knew that they would have community events back in various  
31 ... Like during the month of Ramadan and these types of things. They'd  
32 have these inter-faith dialogue dinners around the country that would have  
33 members of Congress or their staff attend.

34 Paul Solis: Specifically related to the Baku convention in 2013, do you know if any  
35 members of Congress had a connection to these ... ?

1 Witness: I knew that upon chit chat in that shuttle bus and then when we got into  
2 the backend of the airport, that some were going on to Turkey with folks  
3 and others were going back to America. Some might have come from  
4 Turkey on the front end. That employees of these organizations were  
5 essentially chaperoning or tour guides.

6 Paul Solis: For the members?

7 Witness: Yeah.

8 Paul Solis: Did any members say that to you on the shuttle bus or through  
9 conversations with other people?

10 Witness: It's just you're on an 18 passenger bus. You overhear things. Waiting at the  
11 airport. "Which hotel are we going to?" Things like that. I distinctly  
12 remember and it was incredibly painful was a 4:00 AM return flight.  
13 We're waiting, the flight's delayed. You're in an area with a lot of random  
14 State Representatives, members of Congress, others pretty sleep deprived.  
15 You just overhear things as you're milling about getting tea.

16 Paul Solis: I may have already asked this question to you but the hotel you stayed at  
17 in Baku, what hotel was that?

18 Witness: It was the Four Seasons.

19 Paul Solis: You stayed two nights or one night?

20 Witness: Technically two nights. I say technically because we checked in around  
21 midnight and then the following day left at 3 something in the morning.

22 Paul Solis: How was that hotel paid for?

23 Witness: I don't know.

24 Paul Solis: Your hotel room, I should say?

25 Witness: I don't know. I assume the same way that my airfare was but I don't know.

26 Paul Solis: It's all, again, the same way that your airfare was covered, it was paid for  
27 when you got there. You didn't receive an invoice, a bill, and you didn't  
28 ask any questions about ... ?

29 Witness: No, I distinctly remember ... It's somewhat odd, that's why I remember it.  
30 We didn't even go to the front desk and put a credit card down for  
31 incidentals. Kemal and Furkan were in the lobby, giving out room cards.

1 Paul Solis: What about meals in Baku?

2 Witness: I'll just say, I was like, "Oh my God. Thank God. There's someone we  
3 recognize. We flew half way across the world. At least there's someone we  
4 recognize in the middle of the night." Meals? I cannot remember at the  
5 convention when we went for the opening ceremony if there was nuts and  
6 chips and things like that. I assume that there was in that convention hall.  
7 As I said, we were frankly kind of abandoned come lunch time on. We just  
8 went to a private restaurant. Then there was back at the hotel, I learned  
9 about, there was a dinner, a kind of gala. We did go to that. That was at  
10 another hall. There were members of Congress there. I didn't get the sense  
11 it was exactly the same folks. It was kind of a smaller subset of folks who  
12 we had seen in the much larger hall in the morning. I don't know who paid  
13 for that dinner but it's the first decent meal we got.

14 Paul Solis: Did you have a sense, generally, just by the presence of certain  
15 organizations whether it's an American corporation or SOCAR, who is  
16 paying for all this? The lecture halls, the panels, the dais the water, all in  
17 together. Did you have an idea of who ... Did anybody talk about, did you  
18 have a sense of who was paying for this all?

19 Witness: I mean, we've all attended these events. Normally you see like, "Here's the  
20 gold sponsor, the silver sponsor." I don't remember necessarily seeing the  
21 demarcation. Saw all these different logos and printed material on the silk  
22 screens. Things like this. It did strike me to see the BP logo. I wasn't  
23 necessarily hearing lots of American accents or seeing the executives from  
24 BP, for example. I did see people's name badges and didn't see a lot of  
25 people who had those types of affiliations listed.

26 Paul Solis: Did you talk to anybody from BP or ConocoPhillips?

27 Witness: No, and frankly it kind of struck me. I mean, I assume they were there.  
28 There were hundreds of people but I did not see any.

29 Paul Solis: Kelly do you have any questions about the convention at all? About  
30 anything?

31 Kelly Brewington: I was going to move on. I had a question about, you had talked about  
32 honorarium. I wondered if ... You said that Valerie Owens, or Biden  
33 Owens, received an honorarium and others did. Did any of the guests  
34 receive any gifts?

35 Witness: Yeah, there was tea sets. You know, like little tea cups and what have you.  
36 Carpets. The country is known for its handwoven ... It's actually where the  
37 flying carpets come from. I distinctly remember trying to get a shirt. They  
38 had all these volunteers with polo shirts but no one would give me one.

1 Paul Solis: How many carpets did you receive?

2 Witness: Did I receive? Just one.

3 Paul Solis: Just one. Did Mr. Rouse and Valerie Owens receive carpets as well?

4 Witness: Yes.

5 Paul Solis: Tea sets as well?

6 Witness: I don't remember the tea sets. I assume. I mean, I got a tea set. I think a lot  
7 of people must have gotten tea sets. She gave all of hers then to Mr. Rouse  
8 for his children. Yeah, I can't recall about the tea sets.

9 Paul Solis: Do you know what the value of those items are? For example, did you  
10 ever get the carpet appraised? The rug appraised?

11 Witness: No, I never got it appraised.

12 Paul Solis: How big is it? What's the size?

13 Witness: About half the size of this table.

14 Paul Solis: I mean, that's ...

15 Witness: Five feet by ...

16 Paul Solis: Five feet by four feet, three feet? Okay, all right.

17 Witness: When you pack for a two day trip, and then they spring this on you. It  
18 wasn't that easy to ... It was actually, frankly, more frustration.

19 Paul Solis: Did you see other convention attendees carrying rugs and tea sets?

20 Witness: Yes.

21 Paul Solis: About how many?

22 Witness: Attendees? I mean, as we were waiting there at 4:00 AM for the delayed  
23 flight, almost everyone had.

24 Paul Solis: At the airport?

25 Witness: Yeah.

1 Paul Solis: I'll show you one last email on that topic. This is the last one I have. It's  
2 RW40.

3 Scott Maberry: Is this the last one for the interview or ...

4 Paul Solis: Last one for the interview.

5 Scott Maberry: Just quickly before that, you'll see that in a lot of the stuff that we sent  
6 you, we've been over responsive in some ways so a lot of stuff ... We  
7 wanted to make sure you got everything that was ... By the way, we're also  
8 continuing to do that. As you know, we've had a couple more come  
9 through. In connection with those, there was a printing glitch on a few of  
10 them. We've got better print outs of all those for you. We can give you  
11 those before you go. There's nothing new on them except there's a  
12 photograph that didn't come through.

13 Paul Solis: That's what I figured. I had sent you an email asking about that. I figured it  
14 was the printing.

15 Scott Maberry: Sorry for the confusion on that. That was just a glitch in our printing.  
16 We're kind of in your hands on some of the things that we provided to  
17 you. There are probably a lot of stuff in there that's not directly relevant to  
18 the conference and other stuff. I'd hate to see some of that stuff go beyond  
19 you guys.

20 Paul Solis: I've been doing this for awhile.

21 Scott Maberry: So have I.

22 Paul Solis: I do understand when there is sensitive materials that might relate to the  
23 overall context. You've sent us emails and requests that some of the  
24 information that you had at least have a heads up on if we're thinking of  
25 using. That's not a problem for us. We will go to great lengths to make  
26 sure that some of the information that, unless we have to use it to prove,  
27 potentially, something in a referral but that wouldn't be part of the  
28 [crosstalk].

29 Scott Maberry: Appreciate it and we're trusting you guys so thanks a lot.

30 Paul Solis: No problem.

31 Scott Maberry: All right.

32 Paul Solis: This is the last email I wanted to show you.

33 Scott Maberry: This is 0405.

1 Paul Solis: Again, this relates to gifts. I assume at the convention. Valerie writes, "Hi  
2 guys, do either of you know who the appropriate person is to thank for the  
3 gifts? Please advise." Then you write back, "I believe it was entirely  
4 coordinated by Kemal Oksuz," and you give his email address. "He is the  
5 one from Houston who was M.C.'ing most of the day." Do you recall  
6 writing that back to Valerie?

7 Witness: I do.

8 Paul Solis: Why did you believe it was, at least the gifts, were entirely coordinated by  
9 Kemal Oksuz?

10 Witness: As I recall, he physically handed them to us in the lobby. He was handing  
11 them to others.

12 Paul Solis: Was there anything on the rug or the tea set that would denote who it's  
13 from or who's taking credit for the gift?

14 Witness: I think the tea set was in some sort of wrapping paper. In fact, actually,  
15 inside that wrapping paper it had tissue paper and I think the logo for the  
16 conference was the Vision for the Future two flags. I'm just remembering  
17 this in my sleep deprived state because I'm like, I didn't want to check a  
18 bag. I don't have physical luggage. What am I doing with this? I  
19 consolidated all this tissue paper.

20 Paul Solis: Did you notice whether a seal of the government of Azerbaijan was on  
21 anything or SOCAR, Turquoise Council, AFAZ? Did you notice those  
22 logos?

23 Witness: The rug, it's stitched in. It says, "Azerbaijan," on it. The tea set, I don't ... I  
24 didn't keep the tea set. I don't know if had a logo or anything chiseled on  
25 it.

26 Paul Solis: You mentioned that sleep deprived state, waiting for the flight back at the  
27 airport in Baku.

28 Witness: Yes.

29 Paul Solis: You said you saw people with rugs and gifts from the convention.  
30 Convention attendees had these items. Did you recognize any members of  
31 Congress carrying rugs or gifts?

32 Witness: Honestly, not that I recall. I remember having a conversation as we were  
33 sitting there with a State Representative from Indiana, as I'm jogging up,  
34 but I don't remember. I know that on our flight back there were members

1 of Congress but I don't recall seeing them in that waiting zone of the  
2 airport.

3 Paul Solis: Have you spoken to anybody besides your attorneys about our review?

4 Witness: My colleagues at Roberti and White.

5 Scott Maberry: Several people at Roberti and White had to know about this because we  
6 issued the Preservation Notice and we searched their ...

7 Witness: Multiple accounts.

8 Scott Maberry: Email accounts. They had to know.

9 Paul Solis: What about Rauf Mammadov? Have you spoken to him about our review?

10 Witness: Not about the review.

11 Paul Solis: Have you spoken to him about the convention recently?

12 Witness: Recently, no. I went in December with my father to Baku for the Jewish  
13 holiday of Hanukkah. We certainly talked about my last time, my previous  
14 only time in Baku. In that context, it's going to be a much calmer, different  
15 trip. You're going for 8 days versus less than 48 hours.

16 Paul Solis: When's the last time you spoke to Mr. Mammadov?

17 Witness: I don't think I've seen him for three weeks, almost four weeks now.

18 Paul Solis: You know, I asked you the question if you had spoken to Mr. Mammadov  
19 about our review. You said, "Not about the review." Have you spoken to  
20 him at all recently about issues ...

21 Witness: About ending our contract, for example, things like that?

22 Paul Solis: Yes.

23 Witness: Yeah.

24 Paul Solis: Was there a reason?

25 Witness: About his future plans, yeah. As I said, we're friends.

26 Paul Solis: Did the convention have anything to do with the reason the contract ended  
27 between ... ?

1 Witness: No, no. I get the sense that oil at less than \$0.50 a barrel is why. My  
2 understanding is that they're closing their operations in the United States  
3 or suspending.

4 Paul Solis: Meaning the SOCAR USA office may no longer be present?

5 Witness: That's what I was told. I don't have reason to doubt them.

6 Paul Solis: You've seen some of the public reporting about the convention?

7 Witness: I certainly have.

8 Paul Solis: You know, just the document production that your attorneys provided ...

9 Scott Maberry: We sent some of it to you.

10 Paul Solis: Yesterday there was some emails back and forth between you and Rauf  
11 about, for example, the Houston Chronicle article that came out on the  
12 convention. Did you have any conversations after those emails were  
13 exchanged? Did you have any conversations with Rauf over the phone  
14 about that or in person?

15 Witness: About the Houston Chronicle article? Yeah, he was certainly very  
16 frustrated. I was hired to be his counselor, his advisor. That was the term  
17 he always used, advisor. He was quite frustrated. I told him that, as a rule,  
18 I have never talked to the press. I don't talk to the press and I encourage  
19 you to have that same rule.

20 Paul Solis: He was concerned that maybe you had spoken to the press? Is that an issue  
21 for him?

22 Witness: Yeah, he reached out to me beforehand, saying, "Are reporters from the  
23 Houston Chronicle reaching out to you?" I said, "Yeah, they called our  
24 front desk and we never called them back." "Have you heard from  
25 others?" I said, "Yeah, the reporters call our front desk all the time but as a  
26 rule we do not talk to them." I encouraged him to do the same.

27 Paul Solis: Did he talk to you at all about the truthfulness of the article or whether he  
28 thought it was ...

29 Witness: Yeah, he suggested he thought it was biased. He suggested, as do many of  
30 his peers and people from that country, that there's a bias among the  
31 American media.

32 Paul Solis: A biased against ... ?

1 Witness: Against the country.

2 Paul Solis: Against Azerbaijan?

3 Witness: Yeah, against its compatriots, so to speak.

4 Paul Solis: You may have mentioned this before but when's the last time you talked to  
5 Kemal Oksuz? Either verbally or over email?

6 Witness: I think it was when several ... I think we've got those, right?

7 Scott Maberry: Mm-hmm (affirmative).

8 Witness: Several months afterward, he inquired about a W-9 tax form. As I said, I  
9 distinctly remember at their National Day celebrations trying to introduce  
10 my wife to him. Mm-mm (negative). He came across the room trying to  
11 avoid us. We haven't seen or spoken with each other for quite some time.  
12 As I said, that was May of '14.

13 Paul Solis: I guess the last question I just wanted to follow back on. When you  
14 mentioned that there was an employee at SOCAR USA's office who sat  
15 near Rauf Mammadov ... ?

16 Witness: Correct.

17 Paul Solis: University of Delaware graduate.

18 Witness: Yes.

19 Paul Solis: Who was identified by Mr. Mammadov as being an AFAZ employee?

20 Witness: Yes.

21 Paul Solis: When did that occur?

22 Witness: When did I first meet him?

23 Paul Solis: Yeah, when did you first meet him or when did you first talk to Rauf about  
24 him?

25 Witness: Maybe February ... There was an event. It was a tragedy that happened  
26 during their war of independence and there's an event in February. I  
27 believe they did it again ... They being Mr. Oksuz ... this year. February of  
28 '14 was the first time I think that I met Rafig at this event in Rayburn at  
29 this memorial service, so to speak.

1 Paul Solis: Do you know if he's still in those offices? The SOCAR USA offices?  
2 Witness: I don't.  
3 Paul Solis: Do you have any other questions?  
4 Kelly Brewington: I just want to make sure we got the spelling of his name.  
5 Witness: Whose?  
6 Kelly Brewington: You said his name's Rafig?  
7 Witness: Let's see if I got this.  
8 Kelly Brewington: If you know.  
9 Witness: R-A-F-I-G? Last name, G-U-R-D-A-N-Z-A-D, maybe.  
10 Kelly Brewington: Okay, that's good.  
11 Paul Solis: Is there anything you want to tell us about the convention, about anything  
12 else? As your lawyers look at you with dirty looks?  
13 Scott Maberry: And say, "Not if there's not a specific question."  
14 Witness: The amount of time it takes in an airplane is equivalent to the time on the  
15 ground, it's probably not worth it.  
16 Paul Solis: Okay.  
17 Scott Maberry: I hope this was helpful.  
18 Paul Solis: Yes, it was. Thank you very much for your time.  
19 Kelly Brewington: Thank you.

2 MS. EISNER: This is April 8, 2015, I am Helen Eisner from the Office of Congressional Ethics,  
3 joined by Omar Ashmawy. I'm also joined by Congressman Ruben Hinojosa and Mr. Trey  
4 Lewis we have given the Congressman the documents under 18 USC 1001 and have the  
5 acknowledgement form and we will go ahead and get started with the interview. Alright so to  
6 start things off do you know Kemal Oksuz?

7 REP. HINOJOSA: I know him.

8 MS. EISNER: Okay and how do you know him?

9 REP. HINOJOSA: Well, I know that he was somehow connected to the Turkish American  
10 Council which had different social events in Washington D.C. that invited members of the  
11 Congressional Hispanic Caucus, which I was the Chairman and that's how I met him.

12 MS. EISNER: Do you remember when you first met him?

13 REP. HINOJOSA: No, I don't remember when I first met him but my number of contacts with  
14 him were few.

15 MS. EISNER: Do you remember, sort of, an approximate period or year range when you  
16 might've met him, maybe 2012, 2013?

17 REP. HINOJOSA: Honestly I don't remember the date. There were other members who knew  
18 him better like colleagues from Texas and I asked, they said that they knew him and that he was  
19 a good guy. That's about the way that friends of mine that included Congressmen Cuellar, Jane  
20 Green, others that were very, not very but knew him better and gave me comfort that he was  
21 okay.

22 MS. EISNER: How did that come up in conversation with them? Did you... were you not  
23 familiar with who he was and you wanted to know a little bit more so you went to some of your  
24 colleagues?

25 REP. HINOJOSA: They were asking that we write letters of this, letters to that, and I told Connie  
26 I don't want to get involved in that. When they start making a lot of requests of me I just don't  
27 do it.

28 MS. EISNER: Okay and...

29 REP. HINOJOSA: So naturally when that occurs we are members... I am chairman of the Texas  
30 Democratic Caucus and when I haven't been in previous years we meet once a week and we  
31 have an opportunity to eat and talk and ask questions. And bottom line is his name came up, you  
32 know, once in a while.

33 MS. EISNER: Okay and you said you probably had met with him a handful of times. Do you  
34 know what you spoke about generally during those meetings?

35 REP. HINOJOSA: Often times they're wanting to know about the caucus members and how they  
36 participate, they like to travel or they don't. But they put together a group of all 27 to go to their  
37 country and my response was always we've never done it as a group. We just... we have such  
38 busy schedules that we've never been able to do that. But all I can say is that question came up  
39 several times.

1 MS. EISNER: You mentioned that you knew he worked for I think you said the Turkish  
2 American Council.

3 REP. HINOJOSA: Because he told me so.

4 MS. EISNER: And that's the Turquoise Council of Americans and Eurasians is that... does that  
5 sound familiar or is that the organization?

6 REP. HINOJOSA: Yes I didn't pronounce it correctly it is correct.

7 MS. EISNER: They're confusing lots of different names and acronyms. Getting Turquoise and  
8 Turkish, just making sure it's correct. So, what do you know about that organization, the  
9 Turquoise Council?

10 REP. HINOJOSA: Well, that they have a presence in Washington. They were trying to, I guess,  
11 increase the relationship, you know the relationship with the United States, both Turkey and  
12 Azerbaijan. And they would always emphasize how they had some of their soldiers participating  
13 in those two wars. And more importantly their location and how important strategic it was to  
14 land our planes with war supplies to send to Iraq and to Afghanistan. So, having visited the war  
15 front as I did, with CODELs, that were always escorted by either Army or Navy or Air force,  
16 that's very very important to our country.

17 MS. EISNER: SO they... it seemed like they were largely focused on foreign policy issues,  
18 military issues, is there anything else that they were focused on beyond those issues that you can  
19 recall?

20 REP. HINOJOSA: Not that I remember.

21 MS. EISNER: Okay and I think you said that you interacted with Kemal Oksuz, Mr. Oksuz. You  
22 knew he was connected to the Turquoise Council. Was there anyone else that you interacted with  
23 from the Turquoise Council?

24 REP. HINOJOSA: I don't remember the names of some of the other people, cause some were  
25 Turk and some were American working for them. And truthfully I don't remember their names  
26 since we didn't meet often. It was one of many many many meetings that we have with so many  
27 different American and foreign groups that want access through members of Congress. You  
28 know the schedule that we keep and all I can say is that having a family of little ones. I limited  
29 the amount of events that I did so...

30 MR. LEWIS: So Congressman you don't remember their names?

31 REP. HINOJOSA: No

32 MS. EISNER: Okay, are you familiar with a group called the Assembly of Friends of  
33 Azerbaijan?

34 REP. HINOJOSA: Assembly of Friends of Azerbaijan?

35 MS. EISNER: Sometimes they're referred to as AFAZ, A-F-A-Z.

36 REP. HINOJOSA: I don't remember them or haven't been invited to any social with them.

37 MS. EISNER: Okay. So let's talk a little about travel and when you do get these invitations to  
38 attend various events. So, what is the process in your office when someone receives an invitation  
39 for privately sponsored travel?

1 REP. HINOJOSA: Well I had a scheduler by the name of Erin at the time that we are talking  
2 about, worked for me for about 3 years. She receives my mail opens it and if there are invitations  
3 she then goes to her boss which is the Chief of Staff Connie Humphry, and together they look at  
4 them and if they think it has something to do with financial services, which is one of my  
5 committees, or with education and workforce, they then come and bring it to me for my  
6 consideration and I'll probably ask a lot of questions, they have to follow up come back and  
7 report and then we look at the schedule and I make the final decisions on if I want to travel.  
8 MS. EISNER: What kinds of questions would you ask as follow up, once they come to you and  
9 think it's relevant event?

10 REP. HINOJOSA: Has this been approved by the Ethics Committee? I saw a lot of other  
11 members of congress often times having trouble and I've never been... I've never had problems  
12 with the Ethics Committee. By simply asking both in writing and a phone call if there is... first  
13 the phone call if it looks like it has a possibility. I also want to know who is heading it, who is  
14 the CODEL chair. In most cases it would be somebody from the majority. Since I've only had  
15 four years of Democratic Majority during my Tenure I would then just pick of the phone and just  
16 call that particular Democrat and they would answer any questions I might have.

17 MS. EISNER: So in a situation where it's not a CODEL so you can't pick up the phone and call  
18 that person who's maybe responsible.

19 REP. HINOJOSA: There's so few of those... so few of those that I couldn't begin to say that that  
20 was a common occurrence. It just wasn't.

21 MS. EISNER: I know you said that one of your top questions is: Has this....

22 REP. HINOJOSA: Let me give you an example. You get an email from Nancy Pelosi that, would  
23 I like to go to Rome to see the new pope get ordained as our pope? A very few, she and the  
24 Vice-President were heading the group and of course I said yes, on short notice. Those were not  
25 necessarily CODELs we were going to go represent our country for something as important as  
26 this. That's a good example.

27 MS. EISNER: Okay.

28 REP. HINOJOSA: I traveled for that. One other one that was later, Normandy the 75<sup>th</sup> year of or  
29 the 70<sup>th</sup> – 75<sup>th</sup> – 70<sup>th</sup> year, now that I remember, anniversary of D-Day. Very few were invited I  
30 was one of them. And again those are different than the co-dels that I attended.

31 MS. EISNER: So when you're dealing with that type of situation, that it's the unique, you know,  
32 handful of cases where it's not a CODEL

33 REP. HINOJOSA: I always call a Head that I know closely, like Nancy. I never did call the  
34 Vice-President because I knew his plane was going to be taking a few senators and we were  
35 flying commercial.

36 MS. EISNER: So in a situation like the conference that we are talking about, where the invite  
37 came from a private organization, is there somebody you would pick up the phone and call and  
38 talk to about that type of travel?

39 MR. LEWIS: Are you asking generally or specifically?

40 MS. EISNER: Well, let's talk....

1 MR. ASHMAWY: Generally, I mean generally. I guess maybe it is easier to talk specifically  
2 when the request, the invitation came, for this particular trip for Turkey and Azerbaijan. Did...  
3 what kind of questions did you ask your staff? Did you reach out to anybody?  
4 REP. HINOJOSA: I asked my... I asked Connie, can my wife attend? She called they said, your  
5 wife may attend and you may take one of your children. And I said, will they pay for this or will  
6 I pay for this? They said, I will have to pay for that. That's when I made the decision to invite  
7 my senior in high school Kaity Hinojosa. And she attended and I paid for that.  
8 MS. EISNER: Do you know who Connie would've picked up the phone and called to ask those  
9 specific questions about?  
10 REP. HINOJOSA: I gave you her phone number in the responses that I sent you. You can call  
11 her and she can tell you.  
12 MS. EISNER: ... and talk to her about it, okay.  
13 REP. HINOJOSA: But it's more common that my chief of staff would call than a scheduler.  
14 Even though the scheduler filled out a lot of forms because Connie has to oversee three offices  
15 and all the staff so naturally she gets help.  
16 MS. EISNER: Any conversations about funding or sponsorship? Would those be questions you  
17 would ask for this type of trip?  
18 REP. HINOJOSA: Well it was clear on the page that it was being done by this council, so I  
19 understood that.  
20 MS. EISNER: Were there any discussions back and forth with the Ethics Committee regarding  
21 this trip?  
22 REP. HINOJOSA: Yeah, there were different phone calls that were made because I wanted  
23 clarification if we were going commercial and I'm taking my daughter for the first time on a trip  
24 like this so naturally I wanted to have clarification.  
25 MS. EISNER: Well let's get into some of the documents and some of the specifics of this trip in  
26 particular and I wanted to ask: How did discussions about you attending this trip begin? When do  
27 you remember this first coming to your attention, the trip to Baku?  
28 REP. HINOJOSA: In my opinion, I think that because I was chairman of the National Hispanic  
29 Caucus and I was a good candidate. Number two they talked about being an educational trip and  
30 that they would have accommodations from the academics higher education and it's spelled  
31 out... well I was at that time, I was chairman of the Higher Education. So I figured I was a very  
32 good candidate for that.  
33 MR. LEWIS: So the question was: How did the trip come to your attention?  
34 REP. HINOJOSA: Well it was in an email, first started out.  
35 MS. EISNER: Okay, well actually let's take a look at a few of those emails and talk them  
36 through. I'm going to provide MCRH 0301. I'm just going to say the numbers for the benefit of  
37 our transcript here so we know what we are referring to.  
38 REP. HINOJOSA: What was the date of that one?  
39 MS. EISNER: I actually have documents for both of you.  
40 MR. LEWIS: She has a copy for us... Thank you so much.

1 MS. EISNER: Take a moment and look these over.  
2 REP. HINOJOSA: I remember this.  
3 MS. EISNER: So I guess I'll just first confirm that Erin who's on this email is the Erin you  
4 were....  
5 REP. HINOJOSA: Erin was our scheduler.  
6 MS. EISNER: So Erin Dominguez is the scheduler, okay. So in the second part of this page, the  
7 second paragraph here, there's an email between Erin and Mr. Oksuz, where it says: You came  
8 by the office in February and my boss is really interested. And this is all with regards to the trip.  
9 Do you remember that meeting when he came by the office, when Mr. Oksuz came?  
10 REP. HINOJOSA: It's been too long I don't remember.  
11 MR. LEWIS: And that's Kemal right?  
12 MS. EISNER: This is Kemal Oksuz yes, that's who... and I think he is... yes he's referred to in  
13 the subject line of this email. And do you know if Erin met with him in this initial?  
14 REP. HINOJOSA: In a meeting like this, the most likely to be there would be my chief of staff  
15 because her office is adjacent to mine and I trust her to be able to make sure that we comply with  
16 everything that ethics requires.  
17 MS. EISNER: Okay and this is around, I guess April 2013 do you remember them mentioning  
18 this meeting to you or any discussions with Kemal Oksuz relevant to this meeting?  
19 REP. HINOJOSA: I don't remember.  
20 MS. EISNER: Okay, and then in the first part of that email he says, should I stop by tomorrow  
21 Tuesday to brief you about the details? This is a follow up referring to a later email... or sorry a  
22 later meeting that would've occurred in April rather than the first meeting which seems to have  
23 occurred in February. Do you know if this meeting in April happened if he did stop by as he was  
24 planning to?  
25 REP. HINOJOSA: Whenever I was involved in voting at the capitol or in a committee where I  
26 was chairman, like education, my chief of staff would have to step in and represent me, and  
27 that's very common.  
28 MS. EISNER: So I guess then you don't remember this particular...?  
29 REP. HINOJOSA: I don't  
30 MS. EISNER: With this kind of background, understanding there was this going back and forth  
31 going on about the convention, at that time did you know what the primary purpose of the  
32 convention was, or the convention trip?  
33 REP. HINOJOSA: It was in the first document that we received and...  
34 MR. LEWIS: And I think he's referring to the formal invitation letter.  
35 MS. EISNER: Okay. Was... So your understanding of the convention was based on that formal  
36 invitation?  
37 REP. HINOJOSA: I'm looking for....  
38 MR. LEWIS: She'll have the documents Congressman.  
39 REP. HINOJOSA: Well it's this one I remember reading very specifically and that it talks about  
40 what the trip... what the mission statement and the purpose.

1 MR. LEWIS: Do you all have a copy of this?

2 MS. EISNER: I just want to make sure we are referring... I'm sure we do as a part of the  
3 production. Your production was quite comprehensive but I just want to make sure we are  
4 looking at the same document which is an invitation from the Turquoise Council to the  
5 Representative, signed by Alpyara Danakul. I'll just spell that for the record A-L-P-Y-A-R-A -  
6 D-A-N-A-K-U-L. Who's the Regional Director for the Turquoise Council, and this letter says,  
7 all trip related expenses will be paid for by TCAE and all aspects of the trip will be in full  
8 conformity with the House Ethics Rules. Okay so, you know....

9 MR. LEWIS: And it also has a statement or purpose of the trip I believe, at the top.

10 MS. EISNER: Yes it does at the top it says the trip will explore critical foreign policy and it goes  
11 on to describe the ... some of the aspects of the trip. This document is actually not a part of the  
12 documents we have here today.

13 REP. HINOJOSA: We can give you a copy of that.

14 MS. EISNER: Yeah that might be helpful. I don't recall this from the production it's possible  
15 that it was in there but this... I'm not sure if this is familiar to you.

16 MR. ASHMAWY: I don't recollect it either so yeah if it's possible to get a copy, that would be  
17 helpful.

18 MS. EISNER: That would be great to get a copy.

19 MR. LEWIS: Absolutely

20 MS. EISNER: SO our understanding of the trip was based on this invitation?

21 REP. HINOJOSA: Well you'll notice what caught my attention, I underlined it, because as I've  
22 explained earlier, I made CODEL trips with bipartisan members to the war front. I knew because  
23 the generals would tell us about our allies and in some cases Turkey always came up as one of  
24 the bases, I mean the countries that have bases that allow our planes to come in and drop off  
25 supplies, and they were very very very important. So, having been to Iraq and having been to  
26 Afghanistan and Kuwait, and Pakistan on CODELs with other as I said members of both parties.  
27 I had very good briefings by the generals in charge of the bases where we went to. And I wanted  
28 to be informed.

29 MS. EISNER: Do you... So this individual and I'm sure I'm pronouncing this incorrectly,  
30 Alpyara Danakul. Do you remember him? Do you remember this?

31 REP. HINOJOSA: No I don't, whoever signed that letter I don't remember him.

32 MS. EISNER: Okay so this is February 28<sup>th</sup> 2013, did you... do you know... did you follow up  
33 at all about the substance about this letter to see you know who TCAE was, any further than  
34 what....

35 REP. HINOJOSA: I trusted what they put in writing and signed was truthful. My staff did what  
36 they have to do in terms of checking it through ethics on the House floor knowing some  
37 members who were going to be on that trip. I would ask them and they all felt that it was a  
38 legitimate and that it... a legitimate trip and that I didn't have anything to fear.

1 MS. EISNER: Were you concerned? Yeah I know it seems like you did talk to some members  
2 and you had your staff talk to the Committee on Ethics, was there a concern that you were  
3 following through with?

4 REP. HINOJOSA: No I didn't have concerns otherwise I would not have taken my wife and I  
5 wouldn't have taken my child 18 years old. As I said earlier knowing that there were three  
6 different groups one that had mostly US Senators, our had all members of congress, an then a  
7 third on that had government officials and the fact that we were going to meet with the president  
8 of each of the two countries and we did. We met with the President of Azerbaijan twice and with  
9 the heads of the parliament in each of the two countries. That was common in CODELs that we  
10 went to different countries that we would meet the equivalent of a congressman or the equivalent  
11 of a Senator and ministers like our cabinet members.

12 MR. LEWIS: I assume you all have a copy of the itinerary.

13 MS. EISNER: Yes we do have... we were actually... we've got a few documents including that  
14 to go through.

15 MR. LEWIS: To keep going through... okay

16 REP. HINOJOSA: We didn't have concerns.

17 MS. EISNER: Had you attended a 2012 US Azerbaijan Conference that was held in  
18 Washington?

19 REP. HINOJOSA: Before that trip there was one that we were invited to my wife and I attended.

20 MS. EISNER: Where was that?

21 REP. HINOJOSA: It was in a big hotel, a big ball room and it included dinner, speakers and a  
22 singer and dancers of their country.

23 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you remember what city? Was that...

24 REP. HINOJOSA: It was in Washington DC.

25 MR. ASHMAWY: It was Washington.

26 REP. HINOJOSA: And there were lots of members there.

27 MS. EISNER: Lots of members. Do you remember if that was a US-Azerbaijan Convention or  
28 was that a separate event?

29 REP. HINOJOSA: Well at that time I was a little confused about the different groups that were  
30 saying that they were all connected to the Azerbaijan government. And one that I trusted a great  
31 deal on the Department of Defense Committee, Congressman Ortiz, is somebody I would go to  
32 and say, I didn't quite understand this event that I got invited and you weren't there. And he says  
33 well this was a different group. So to me that was confusing but I just let it go he was very high  
34 ranking on the department of defense he knew them, he said they were okay.

35 MS. EISNER: It does seem to be like there's this very complicated web of many different  
36 organizations who are connected and you sort of mentioned that there were a number of  
37 different...

38 REP. HINOJOSA: At least I know of those two because when I went to that event in 2012 in DC  
39 I met with lots of other members who were there members of congress and it was a dinner and  
40 the speaker. Very young person who was supposed to be the... I don't know what his title was

1 supposed to be but let's call him Chairman or President of the organization. And he was like the  
2 MC, he was the... maybe not MC would be the word but ... he spoke. He was like the welcome  
3 everybody there.

4 MS. EISNER: What were some of the other Turkish organizations that were present in 2012,  
5 some other ones that were...?

6 REP. HINOJOSA: I remember the... I was trying to think if the Azerbaijan Ambassador to the  
7 United States if he was there.

8 MR. LEWIS: Congressman she asked about organizations.

9 REP. HINOJOSA: I see organizations... no.

10 MR. LEWIS: I mean if you can recall their names.

11 REP. HINOJOSA: No I know it was a big attendance if I had to guess, I'd say, probably 350-400  
12 people but I don't know the organizations who were invited.

13 MS. EISNER: Well I think we'll just kind of keep moving on and keep moving through the  
14 documents and of course let us know if you need to stand up and take a break at any point.

15 MR. LEWIS: Can we take a break and I'll make a copy of the paper for you. I actually need to  
16 run to the bathroom.

17 MR. ASHMAWY: Sure

18 MS. EISNER: Yeah we can do that.

19 REP. HINOJOSA: That would help me.

20 MS. EISNER: Okay the recording is back. And I am going to show you another series of emails  
21 which is MCRH 0317-0321 and give you a moment to look these over.

22 MR. LEWIS: Thank you.

23 MS. EISNER: So what we are really focused on is the first page of the whole... I didn't want to  
24 cut off the chain and not give you context.

25 MR. LEWIS: Okay.

26 MS. EISNER: And my question is really on the first page of this email exchange, which is  
27 between Kemal Oksuz and Erin Dominguez. Kemal writes, "I saw the congressman on Thursday  
28 at the members dining room and talked with him to encourage their daughter." So this is April  
29 2013 do you remember speaking with Kemal in the members dining room?

30 REP. HINOJOSA: It's possible. I usually meet with some of the representatives of different  
31 organizations particularly on my committees, in the members dining room and on this particular  
32 trip it's very possible that we ate there. My wife was uncertain if she and our daughter would  
33 travel. She was just against uncertainties of travel like this, which are very different than the  
34 CODELs, and I guess he must have come figuring that if she didn't go I probably wouldn't go.

35 MS. EISNER: So you think he probably came to the dining room?

36 REP. HINOJOSA: It's possible. I can't tell you because we eat there often times.

37 MS. EISNER: I mean if you don't remember, maybe this specific one do you remember any  
38 other conversations with Kemal Oksuz before the trip leading up to the trip?

39 REP. HINOJOSA: I'm sorry I just don't remember.

40 MS. EISNER: It's okay.

1 REP. HINOJOSA: We meet with so many people our schedules are hectic So many different  
2 sectors and all I can say is I cannot remember what conversation other than questions that my  
3 wife might've had about this trip and to be sure that my daughter would be protected.  
4 MS. EISNER: Any other conversations, maybe not with Mr. Oksuz but with anyone else that you  
5 can remember, related to the trip before you actually traveled to Azerbaijan and Turkey?  
6 REP. HINOJOSA: No  
7 MR. LEWIS: Aside from staff or both?  
8 MS. EISNER: Aside from... well I guess I should ask; any conversations with staff that you  
9 recall related to the trip or sponsorship of the trip?  
10 REP. HINOJOSA: I may have asked them some questions that my wife might've had like; what  
11 dress attire? And how you know what was expected? Questions like that.  
12 MS. EISNER: Do you know who they would've gone to, to ask those questions?  
13 REP. HINOJOSA: Well they would ask me and then I would transfer those on to Connie or to  
14 Erin to get answers as to how she should pack for a trip like that.  
15 MS. EISNER: And without, you know, speaking directly to Erin and Connie right now, do you  
16 know who they asked those questions to?  
17 REP. HINOJOSA: I couldn't tell you, no.  
18 MS. EISNER: So continuing on with documents here we have MCRH 0036 -0041 and these are  
19 the traveler forms that you provided to our office. I'll give you each a copy of these.  
20 REP. HINOJOSA: Well this is... one of many documents that you're showing us that staff is  
21 responsible for trying to help them... I mean help me get them filled out properly and approved  
22 by chief of staff, and then released. And I can say that in the first document that I underlined it  
23 talks about what was in my committee, education and universities, and exchange student, study  
24 abroad and forth. I was not a member of the energy committee, energy and commerce, and on  
25 number 8 of this traveler form, as a member from an energy producing state. Yes I am. We have  
26 eagle ford shale very important to me and my district four counties that are big like Carnes  
27 County producing and eagle percept. Naturally there's interest in knowing about something that  
28 produces a lot of jobs in my district. But I'm not in the committee. Others were, other member of  
29 the team that traveled were commerce, were energy and commerce. So I could speak very much  
30 whenever maybe we got into a discussion on that.  
31 MS. EISNER: I think you said, you know, this is one of the many forms that your staff would  
32 look at and be responsible for, would this form come to you? Would you look at it before it was  
33 filed with the Ethics Committee?  
34 REP. HINOJOSA: Well this was filled out by Erin and signed by Erin so I just cannot tell you  
35 that I questioned it. If they filled it out and my chief of staff had reviewed it they did their job.  
36 They were very well informed about my interest in meeting Ethic's requirements. So if they've  
37 gone and done that as they have for other trips that I made on CODELs I had no problem. I trust  
38 my staff.

1 MS. EISNER: So just to clarify do you think you would've seen these forms before they were  
2 sent to the committee or was that something that was... that you chief of staff would've looked  
3 at?  
4 MR. LEWIS: Or you don't remember.  
5 REP. HINOJOSA: I don't remember. I can only tell you my chief of staff is very thorough and  
6 I'm sure that she, even those it was signed by Erin, that she reviewed it before it went out to the  
7 committee.  
8 MS. EISNER: So these forms list the Turquoise Council of Americans and Eurasians as the  
9 sponsor. Did you raise any issues, were there any conversations about sponsorship with regards  
10 to these forms?  
11 REP. HINOJOSA: When we first started like February 28<sup>th</sup> I thoroughly had to study this  
12 because that was going to determine whether I would make the trip or not. But once the decision  
13 was made and we had to fill out travel forms and so forth. I had to depend on my staff because  
14 we have so much work to do and so many meetings to run to and buildings to go to and so forth.  
15 Speak in so many places that I have to trust my staff.  
16 MS. EISNER: And I know we've gone through a lot of these questions but just for further  
17 clarification, and kind of thinking of these forms, but also generally with regards to this trip and  
18 the convention. Who did you understand was paying for the travel?  
19 REP. HINOJOSA: The Turquoise Council. It says so here in this, join us for an educational trip  
20 to be sponsored by Turquoise Council of Americans and Eurasians. That's who I thought was  
21 paying for it.  
22 MS. EISNER: Any conversations about the travel specifically any reason to question the  
23 Turquoise Council was paying for the travel?  
24 REP. HINOJOSA: I didn't question it. I thought that much of what they had given me was  
25 already seen by the Ethics Committee that if they say something that was questionable they  
26 would've alerted us because we have a good relationship with the Ethics Committee. I've never  
27 had a problem, you know, this is the first time.  
28 MR. ASHMAWY: You've talked to Mr.... to Kemal a couple of times. Did you ever have a  
29 conversation with him about where his organization got its money from?  
30 REP. HINOJOSA: No  
31 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you recall who arranged the logistics for going on this trip?  
32 REP. HINOJOSA: From my office? It would have to be Erin and Connie.  
33 MR. ASHMAWY: And from the Turquoise Council side do you know who arranged any of the  
34 logistics?  
35 REP. HINOJOSA: No I don't know.  
36 MR. ASHMAWY: You said that you went with your wife and daughter correct?  
37 REP. HINOJOSA: Yes they went... they traveled with me.  
38 MR. ASHMAWY: Who paid for your wife? Do you remember?  
39 REP. HINOJOSA: I think they did.  
40 MR. ASHMAWY: And your daughter?

1 REP. HINOJOSA: I did. We were very specific because we questioned the cause and all that and  
2 they gave me a pretty good estimate and it turned as they told me because they called the  
3 airlines.

4 MR. ASHMAWY: For your daughter was that just for the flight or is that flight and  
5 accommodations? What did you pay for, for your daughter?

6 REP. HINOJOSA: They billed me and we paid what I was supposed to pay.

7 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you remember where you stayed in Baku in Azerbaijan?

8 REP. HINOJOSA: In the schedule it's exactly the schedule, the name of the hotel like one time it  
9 was the Four Seasons, and in different countries there was a different name. But we followed  
10 that schedule to the T.

11 MR. ASHMAWY: Alright so that schedule that, you know, that you provided us that is, you  
12 know, that is part of you know MCRH 0036-MCRH0041 that schedule is to the best of your  
13 recollection, that's what you followed.

14 REP. HINOJOSA: I think that I went through it a few days ago and the only variation that I  
15 remember seeing here was on Wednesday after the big meeting in that auditorium that had a  
16 thousand people and the president of Azerbaijan Addressed us. All the American delegation was  
17 there. We were going to eat, I think a box lunch or something there. And then somebody from  
18 their hosting, the hosts group said there are 30 of the American delegation that have been invited  
19 by the president to have lunch with him at his venue. And so that was... but it did not include my  
20 wife or daughter it was just members and we were either congressman or former officials. I  
21 remember sitting next to me was Bill former Secretary of energy, Bill Richardson, Governor of  
22 New Mexico. To my left was the director of the export import bank. And it was a... a very  
23 causal diner where he addressed us and he allowed members to ask questions of him. It was very  
24 informal. That was not here and evidently he and the American Ambassador took... I'm sorry  
25 Azerbaijan Ambassador to the United States decided who to invite it included I remember  
26 Michelle, from New Mexico, Lujan Grisham, and Shelia Jackson Lee, Greg Meeks. Some of us  
27 were in that group of 30, that was the only thing that I didn't see that was in the first program  
28 that they gave us and that was a little deviation for two hours and then we came back.

29 MR. ASHMAWY: The program says that you spoke at the Convention on that Wednesday, did  
30 you in fact speak?

31 REP. HINOJOSA: I spoke.

32 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you remember what you spoke about?

33 REP. HINOJOSA: They told us a minute and a half and it was that we appreciated the  
34 relationship that we had with Azerbaijan and that they were our allies and that they had always,  
35 you know, were ready to help President Bush in the war that we were involved in. That was just  
36 thanking them for being our partners.

37 MR. ASHMAWY: After you spoke do you remember who invited you to the president's venue?

38 REP. HINOJOSA: No

39 MR. ASHMAWY: Did you get an impression while you were there what organization was  
40 running the convention or...?

1 REP. HINOJOSA: Excuse me you should know that at the Auditorium because there was limited  
2 seating and so many countries represented it was their 15<sup>th</sup> anniversary of their breaking away  
3 from the Russian Empire. That my wife and child did not go. They didn't have room for them.  
4 So they didn't... they were not there and they did not go to eat... no spouses and no children or  
5 you know were invited to that.

6 MR. ASHMAWY: Did you get an impression of who was in charge of the convention? What  
7 organization or entity?

8 REP. HINOJOSA: I didn't question it, I figured that the people who invited us had something to  
9 do with it. But it's interesting though that we met with so many of their parliament and that, for  
10 example I requested to meet the Minister of Education and sure enough they took me to the  
11 building where he was. So I just never questioned I knew that they were Azerbaijanis and  
12 Turkish People that were hosting us. I didn't question it.

13 MR. ASHMAWY: We've got another email to show you.

14 MS. EISNER: This is actually... this is an invitation.

15 MR. ASHMAWY: Yeah that one, not an email my apologies.

16 MS. EISNER: This was part of the production. And this is MCRH 0003. There's your copy.

17 REP. HINOJOSA: I remember that we were in a hotel and we accepted to go to this program it  
18 was supposed to have dancing and music and dinner. And we attended we travelled maybe a  
19 half-hour to the hotel of this particular place and they had a nice program of dancers singers and  
20 a good meal. I remember this.

21 MS. EISNER: And the invitation came from this group, the American Friend of Azerbaijan.  
22 Were they present at that event?

23 REP. HINOJOSA: I don't know who they are.

24 MS. EISNER: Who else was present at that... were there Azeri Officials at this event at the  
25 Gulustan Palace?

26 REP. HINOJOSA: They always have...

27 MR. LEWIS: What kind of officials I'm sorry?

28 MS. EISNER: Azeri officials or Azeri... Members of the Azeri Government.

29 MR. LEWIS: Members of the Azerbaijani Government for clarification?

30 MS. EISNER: Yes

31 REP. HINOJOSA: I'll tell you there were so many folks that all said represented the president  
32 and their parliament. That I just never questioned it.

33 MS. EISNER: Are you familiar with a group called the well... The State Oil Company of  
34 Azerbaijan?

35 REP. HINOJOSA: No

36 MS. EISNER: They are kind of, commonly referred to as SOCAR. Are you familiar with them  
37 and that SOCAR?

38 REP. HINOJOSA: I've heard the term SOCAR but not being on the committee I just don't have  
39 that much knowledge of these oil companies.

40 MR. ASHMAWY: Did you have any knowledge of Kemal's relationship with SOCAR?

1 REP. HINOJOSA: I just assumed that he was like a representative of the organization and that...  
2 MR. LEWIS: Of the SOCARs organization?  
3 REP. HINOJOSA: No not SOCAR. I figured that he represented the ones who invited us.  
4 MR. LEWIS: The Turquoise...  
5 REP. HINOJOSA: Yeah.  
6 MR. ASHMAWY: Speaking only of SOCAR did you have any knowledge of their involvement  
7 in paying for the convention?  
8 REP. HINOJOSA: No the answer is no  
9 MR. ASHMAWY: In organizing the convention?  
10 REP. HINOJOSA: No.  
11 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you remember seeing sort of SOCAR officials around the hotels helping  
12 with logistics?  
13 REP. HINOJOSA: I don't remember that.  
14 MR. ASHMAWY: Fair enough.  
15 MS. EISNER: In one of the documents that I think, not his invite but the one before, which is all  
16 the travel documents, including the itinerary. So let's make sure you get the right one. I think it's  
17 the one your hand is on right there, on the top.  
18 REP. HINOJOSA: Oh yeah this one right here.  
19 MS. EISNER: According to I think it's...  
20 MR. LEWIS: Let's see what page number.  
21 MS. EISNER: Yeah it's page 40 of the documents which is the second to last page.  
22 MR. LEWIS: Congressman I'll show it to you. She's talking about... yeah.  
23 MR. ASHMAWY: MCRH 0040  
24 MS. EISNER: So this is May 30<sup>th</sup>, Thursday it says at 1 PM lunch with SOCAR Exec...  
25 Sorry... Executive team. Do you remember that lunch?  
26 REP. HINOJOSA: No.  
27 MS. EISNER: Do you know if you attended?  
28 REP. HINOJOSA: I don't think I attended because I remember having breakfast at the hotel and  
29 a former congressman and former member of the committee, Dan Burden, said Ruben I'm taking  
30 my wife, bring your wife so we can have breakfast. And it was a small group for breakfast I  
31 remember that but no lunch.  
32 MS. EISNER: Was there any presence, and we've talked about Mr. Kemal Oksuz, any other  
33 Turquoise Council officials or officials or you know staff from the Turkish organizations of the  
34 United States that was presence?  
35 REP. HINOJOSA: I don't know them. So I couldn't even begin to say that I recognize them  
36 because I just didn't know them.  
37 MS. EISNER: Did the convention have any corporate sponsors, evidence of corporate  
38 sponsorship?  
39 REP. HINOJOSA: Excuse me just a minute. Yes?  
40 [Someone speaks]: I'm sorry to interrupt...

1 MS. EISNER: Back on the record.  
2 MR. ASHMAWY: So the question was just simply, did you... as far as you know did the  
3 convention have any corporate sponsors?  
4 REP. HINOJOSA: I didn't pay attention if they were listed or if they were named I just don't... I  
5 can't tell you because I don't know.  
6 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you recall needing a visa to enter the country of Azerbaijan?  
7 REP. HINOJOSA: We must have had one.  
8 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you know how you obtained one or who obtained one for you?  
9 REP. HINOJOSA: I would have to ask my chief of staff ho that was handled but every time we  
10 did co-dels we always had a visa. And of course we always updated our passport so I'm sure that  
11 was handled through my office staff.  
12 MR. ASHMAWY: Now I know you've already said that you don't have any recollection really  
13 of SOCAR but it turns out that your visa was sponsored by SOCAR. Did you know that at the  
14 time?  
15 REP. HINOJOSA: I didn't know that.  
16 MR. ASHMAWY: One more document, this is going to be MCRH 0035 it's just the post travel  
17 disclosure form.  
18 REP. HINOJOSA: The date is 31<sup>st</sup> of May no that's the date of the trip. When was this... oh here  
19 it is. June the 7<sup>th</sup> it was much later. Okay. What about this?  
20 MS. EISNER: So did you review this form before it was filed?  
21 REP. HINOJOSA: I was in the district. That has to have been filled out by the staff which is  
22 common. We always have to do, all CODELS, forms like this. And this was done by my staff.  
23 MS. EISNER: Okay, so the form it also lists the Turquoise Council as the sponsor. You know  
24 when you came back did you have any reason to question whether the Turquoise Council was the  
25 sponsor?  
26 REP. HINOJOSA: No. No reason for me to question it.  
27 MS. EISNER: Did you know that not all the members, who went on the trip, who went to the  
28 convention, were not sponsored by the Turquoise Council?  
29 REP. HINOJOSA: I didn't ask so I didn't know.  
30 MS. EISNER: What other members were you traveling with?  
31 REP. HINOJOSA: Since we went commercial, many went at different times and we met up  
32 there at the hotel. At the hotel I remember some of the republican members like Stockman, Ted  
33 Poe, I remember Al Greene and Shelia. I remember Amy the chief of staff for Henry Cuellar. I  
34 remember Michelle Grisham, Greg Meeks, and the former Congressman Dan Burton. Those  
35 were among the names I would see often at gathering places at the hotel or getting ready to go on  
36 the bus, yeah.  
37 MS. EISNER: And who was... you say go on the bus and the bus would take you, you know the  
38 itinerary was very long, so to go from one place to the next, that's how you got around.  
39 REP. HINOJOSA: You have to know that members of congress choose what they want to attend  
40 so that doesn't mean that everybody went to all the events that are listed here. I followed what

1 was of interest to me. And I would get on the bus that would take me to say the Ministry of  
2 Education or possibly to go see the building where the parliament met. Thinks that were of  
3 interest.

4 MS. EISNER: Who was driving the bus?

5 REP. HINOJOSA: I didn't pay attention to that.

6 MS. EISNER: Did they introduce themselves to you or do you know if they were connected to  
7 the convention in any way?

8 REP. HINOJOSA: The answer is I didn't pay attention to that. Get into the bus and you're  
9 talking to all these members who are on and what they're learning and so forth. I just didn't pay  
10 attention to who's driving.

11 MS. EISNER: So in these conversations with the other members did you talk about, you know,  
12 who the sponsor was for this conference or you know the involvement of any other  
13 organizations?

14 REP. HINOJOSA: That was not subject of conversation.

15 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you recall getting a rug at the convention on the last day?

16 REP. HINOJOSA: Not there. They gave us a little one that came in a box about 3 or 4 weeks  
17 after.

18 MR. ASHMAWY: After the convention?

19 REP. HINOJOSA: It came to the... to my office. After the trip.

20 MR. ASHMAWY: Did you receive a rug in your room on the last day of the convention the  
21 night before you left?

22 REP. HINOJOSA: If I got something in my room, there was one that they said they use to kneel  
23 in prayer and if I had to guess I would say it's maybe 20 inches by 20 inches and ....

24 MR. ASHMAWY: It looks like members may have gotten two rugs one in their room, which  
25 was maybe delivered to you instead, and another one at a briefing with boarder security. Do you  
26 remember receiving a rug with the border security officials, on your last day in Baku?

27 REP. HINOJOSA: No

28 MR. ASHMAWY: The rug that got delivered to you, was there a note attached to it? Was there  
29 like a thank you note or anything like that?

30 REP. HINOJOSA: Honestly I don't remember that there was a note but I knew that it came from  
31 them because it said something about Azerbaijan.

32 MR. ASHMAWY: When you say them just to clarify who do you mean?

33 REP. HINOJOSA: People who invited us.

34 MR. ASHMAWY: Would that be, again just to be specific, cause there are a couple of possible  
35 entities here. Do you think the rug... was it your impression that rug came from the Turquoise  
36 Council, the Government of Azerbaijan, or some other entity?

37 REP. HINOJOSA: I don't remember.

38 MR. ASHMAWY: What did you do with the rug?

1 REP. HINOJOSA: We still have it in Washington, it's about the length of this sofa, it's a small  
2 one and it's not an expensive rug. I have bought rugs on trips like to China and a few places and  
3 they don't come anywhere close to the quality of what I bought.  
4 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you know if everyone else got a rug also, all the other members?  
5 REP. HINOJOSA: I didn't ask.  
6 MR. ASHMAWY: Did you ever have... so when you said the rug's in Washington, is it in your  
7 office, your house, is it...?  
8 REP. HINOJOSA: Well we were living in Mclean in a leased home and Marty had it stored  
9 there. Then we did not renew that. We moved to a one room apartment close to the... where I  
10 work and it's stored there.  
11 MR. ASHMAWY: Did you ever have the rug formally appraised or talk to the ethics committee  
12 about it?  
13 REP. HINOJOSA: Never. I never discussed it with them but when it was called to my attention  
14 by my staff I said well lets amend it, let's declare. If they want me to give it back to them, we  
15 have the container in which it came, and we'll be glad to give it back.  
16 MR. ASHMAWY: Did... do you know if your staff... I mean when you said that to your staff do  
17 you know if they did anything. I mean did...  
18 REP. HINOJOSA: I have to ask my chief of staff.  
19 MR. ASHMAWY: Fair enough. Moving past the rugs it seems like members, especially the ones  
20 that went to Turkey and Azerbaijan, may have also gotten some other gifts at these events. Do  
21 you remember anything about that?  
22 REP. HINOJOSA: I remember that they gave me a little box that has some tea cups... tea  
23 glasses. I have those in my office in Washington.  
24 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you remember things like being given any kind of jewelry or silk scarves  
25 or anything like that?  
26 REP. HINOJOSA: No, I do not.  
27 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you remember a DVD Box set on the president of Turkey?  
28 REP. HINOJOSA: A DVD box set?  
29 MR. ASHMAWY: Box set about the president of Turkey?  
30 REP. HINOJOSA: What would be a DVD Box set?  
31 MR. ASHMAWY: Basically a set of DVDs...  
32 MR. LEWIS: Like videos.  
33 MR. ASHMAWY: Yeah, on the President of Turkey.  
34 REP. HINOJOSA: No  
35 MR. ASHMAWY: Any other gifts that you recall while you were attending?  
36 REP. HINOJOSA: I have a couple of books that the ministry of education gave me while we  
37 visited him, and it's about the President and that he traveled to Houston and lived there for  
38 several months right after breaking off from the Russian Empire and because they were treated  
39 so well there in Houston that they set up a city to city relationship. So anyway he was showing us

1 how in his books it talks about the father of the now president and the president. I have those  
2 books in my office in Washington. There's two of them.

3 MR. ASHMAWY: We have only two documents left to show you. This one's going to be  
4 marked THYC 0187 it's basically a congratulations birthday letter to the President of Azerbaijan  
5 from your office.

6 REP. HINOJOSA: I remember this letter and this was discussed with Elin the ambassador. He  
7 was on that trip being that I was the chairman of that committee when the president said that he  
8 wanted to expand that, he called it person to person study abroad program. They talked about  
9 their interest in agriculture. I said that in my district in Weslaco we have a Kika De La Garza the  
10 agriculture research center. We invite them to come and anyway... They... he asked for a letter  
11 congratulating them for the birthday and I asked Connie.... So often times I'm asked to do this  
12 and that for other countries and I don't do it. The fact that there was the president both when he  
13 addressed audience and when he invited us to lunch and I was across the table he said, I want to  
14 be able to feed my country and the region around us. I am interested in agricultural research to  
15 get better yields. Well we have it in my district, when he spoke about education and study abroad  
16 particularly in petroleum I said that we have Texas A&M who has both agriculture and  
17 petroleum. So I mentioned that to the president and the Ambassador knows that because he was  
18 there. It's mentioned in the last paragraph.

19 MS. EISNER: That's really helpful, you know, that same paragraph at the beginning you say,  
20 your ambassador and Kemal Oksuz as well as Irada Akhoundova of Houston, Texas and I are  
21 working together on your goals.

22 REP. HINOJOSA: Yeah but notice the second sentence from the last on the first paragraph. Our  
23 nations are tested allies. Remember that I talked about that. And they wanted to make a stronger  
24 friendship with us. That's mentioned here because that was always....

25 MR. LEWIS: Let Helen... I think she had a question to ask you specifically about one of these  
26 sentences.

27 MS. EISNER: That's helpful background. Just so I know because we've talked about Kemal,  
28 we've talked about Elin. It says "as well Irada Akhoundova of Houston", do you know who that  
29 is?

30 REP. HINOJOSA: That lady is the director of the sister city relationship between Houston and  
31 what's the name of their capital?

32 MR. LEWIS: Baku.

33 REP. HINOJOSA: Baku. She was there, she was on the trip and she actually went to Texas  
34 A&M college station and nothing ever happened because I don't think they had room for  
35 bringing their... I mean accepting them in the petroleum engineering program.

36 MS. EISNER: Was she on the trip with the Houston sister city foundation or was she  
37 representing any organization when she was there?

38 REP. HINOJOSA: Well I don't know how that sister city relationship is set up. You could  
39 probably find out from them but she was on that trip. When I went to see the minister of  
40 education she was in the bus that took several of us.

1 MS. EISNER: And the letter also says kind of this ongoing work with both Irada Akhoundova  
2 and Kemal Oksuz. How you know....

3 REP. HINOJOSA: She's in Houston she lives there, she works there in that facility. And it  
4 makes sense that she be the one that took a group a small group of people to College Station to  
5 see if indeed there was a way that their students could go study there.

6 MS. EISNER: And how was Kemal Oksuz connected to that effort then?

7 REP. HINOJOSA: Which one?

8 MS. EISNER: The second one who's listed in this first sentence.

9 MR. LEWIS: She's talking about that first sentence.

10 REP. HINOJOSA: Irada? Oh that's the lady who runs the program for Azerbaijan.

11 MR. LEWIS: I think her question congressman is about Kemal. See his name is listed here,  
12 Ambassador Elin and Kemal Oksuz as well as Irada.

13 REP. HINOJOSA: I guess I just threw those names because they were involved in that trip but  
14 the one asking for this letter was Elin. What relationship there is Kemal and Irada I don't know.

15 MS. EISNER: Do you know what relationship Kemal has with the Ambassador?

16 REP. HINOJOSA: I never asked. I just assumed they were all tied to the parliament and the  
17 government of Azerbaijan. Those were assumptions on my part and excuse my lack of  
18 knowledge about those relationships.

19 MS. EISNER: Okay I think we just have one more document so we are very close to the end  
20 here. This is THMLG 0010.

21 REP. HINOJOSA: It's got Michelle Lujans' name at the top. I don't recognize this.

22 MR. ASHMAWY: Yeah we're just showing it to you because if you look at the address....

23 REP. HINOJOSA: It say's Rain Drop Foundation.

24 MR. ASHMAWY: Yeah and if you look at the top though you'll see a number of emails at the  
25 top it includes an email that looks like it includes....

26 REP. HINOJOSA: Ruben and Marty.

27 MR. ASHMAWY: Yes, and then another one that looks like it's for your daughter.

28 REP. HINOJOSA: Amy is the first one and she works for Henry Cuellar. I'm second and Marty,  
29 so, evidently we're being invited all of us that got this email invited to something. I don't know  
30 where we are being invited to.

31 MS. EISNER: Do you know the person who sent the email is, the Mehmet Okumus?

32 MR. LEWIS: Up here at the top Congressman she's asking.

33 MR. ASHMAWY: Or at the bottom you'll notice a signature block the bottom the name on the  
34 signature block is, Mehmet Okumus.

35 REP. HINOJOSA: I don't know the name.

36 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you know the Rain Drop Foundation? Do you know what that is?

37 REP. HINOJOSA: No

38 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you know why he may have been emailing your personal email?

1 REP. HINOJOSA: I would assume that I'm still chairman of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus  
2 at that time. I ended it December 2014 and that's the only thing that I can imagine that I'm  
3 included.

4 MR. ASHMAWY: Any idea why it would've gone to a personal email account as a opposed to  
5 your house email account?

6 REP. HINOJOSA: That's a good question. I can only imagine that if it went to this personal...  
7 that I would get it. Cause that's my wife's business [REDACTED] com is my wife's  
8 personal email.

9 MS. EISNER: Do you know who, there's one other person on this chain, Faruk Taban it's  
10 F [REDACTED] m it's on the second line. Do you know who that is?

11 MR. LEWIS: Congressman she's asking right there.

12 REP. HINOJOSA: I have no idea I don't know that person.

13 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you recall receiving emails from, on your personal email account, from  
14 any of these people?

15 REP. HINOJOSA: In most cases it'll be thrown out because my wife's an architect and she gets,  
16 this is her business, and I don't like to have to be answering so I don't give out my email. I can  
17 only imagine it was dealt with as trash.

18 MS. EISNER: Have you had any communications with Kemal Oksuz recently or anyone related  
19 to the Turquoise Council?

20 REP. HINOJOSA: Regarding this no.

21 MS. EISNER: Regarding anything?

22 REP. HINOJOSA: No

23 MS. EISNER: And anyone else from any of the Turquoise or Turkish...

24 REP. HINOJOSA: Remember I've been recuperating from the knee surgery for two months and  
25 I just have not contacted.

26 MS. EISNER: Just one more question on that line. Has anyone contacted you to talk about the  
27 trip besides our office?

28 REP. HINOJOSA: Nobody

29 MS. EISNER: Anything else that you, you know, we haven't covered that you think we should  
30 know?

31 REP. HINOJOSA: I think that closing comments would be that we wanted to always abide by  
32 the rules of the Ethics Committee. I've never had problems with Ethics Committee. It's amazing  
33 how many times we write them a letter or in an inquiry to see if it's ethical if it's acceptable by  
34 the rules and they give us back a written response. My staff knows the importance to me to  
35 comply and being in my 19<sup>th</sup> year I'm pleased to say that my staff has done exactly what I said,  
36 that we be ethical and that we not do thinks that would be violating the rules of the house, the  
37 ethics committee. So I'm glad you came here I appreciate it very much because I haven't been  
38 able to travel. I couldn't drive for 7 weeks. I have to be dependent on somebody to take me and  
39 bring me and so your coming here certainly is greatly appreciated.

1 MR. ASHMAWY: You're welcome we also equally grateful for your offices cooperation and for  
2 your time. Thank you guys very much we really appreciate it sincerely.  
3 REP. HINOJOSA: Are you okay with... Something that could be presented for that meeting the  
4 22<sup>nd</sup> and that I am personally requesting an opportunity to address them.  
5 MR. ASHMAWY: As we explained in the letter you guys can... your office can prepare any  
6 kind of written statement you want and you are welcome to appear personally before the board  
7 so that is no problem. If in addition to letting us know here today if you can just respond even  
8 briefly in writing to the letter just so that we have a record of it.  
9 MR. LEWIS: To you all?  
10 MR. ASHMAWY: Yeah I think the letter specifically says how to contact on the letter.  
11 MS. EISNER: Does it list me?  
12 MR. ASHMAWY: Helen so...  
13 MS. EISNER: You can just respond to my email so we have that.  
14 MR. LEWIS: Okay  
15 MR. ASHMAWY: That'll be it  
16 REP. HINOJOSA: Today is Thursday; you'll have it next week.  
17 MR. ASHMAWY: Excellent Thank you very much we're going to end the recording now.

# **TRANSCRIPT OF INTERVIEW OF SOCAR USA DIRECTOR**

**4/1/2015**

1 MR. SOLIS: This is Investigative –oh sorry, Deputy Chief Counsel, Paul Solis with the  
2 Office of Congressional Ethics. I'm joined by Helen Eisner, John Missner, SOCAR USA  
3 Director and Ed Meyers. SOCAR USA Director has signed an acknowledgement that he  
4 understands that 18 U.S.C. 1001 applies to our discussion today. It is April 1, 2015. And  
5 we will begin the interview with SOCAR USA Director. SOCAR USA Director, where  
6 are you employed right now?

7 WITNESS: State Oil Company of Azerbaijan.

8 MR. SOLIS: I'll just ask you to speak up as best as you can so we can –

9 WITNESS: State Oil Company of Azerbaijan.

10 MR. SOLIS: Is that commonly referred to as SOCAR?

11 WITNESS: Yes.

12 MR. SOLIS: How long have you been employed there?

13 WITNESS: 8 years, 8 months.

14 MR. SOLIS: And what is your title?

15 WITNESS: I'm currently representative for SOCAR in United States.

16 MR. SOLIS: Is that your actual title, Representative for SOCAR in the United States? Or  
17 is there a different title?

18 WITNESS: Director for the Representative Office of SOCAR in United States.

19 MR. SOLIS: What are some of your duties as director?

20 WITNESS: Managing the representative office.

21 MR. SOLIS: Could you go on a little further and give us some generalized duties you  
22 have there and some of your roles?

23 WITNESS: It's another representative office for Oil Company located in Washington  
24 D.C. It's...my duties is to represent the company it's same from the name of the title and  
25 to... there's a business side of it, there's a government side of it – government liaison side  
26 of it. As it's the only office of SOCAR in United States, unlike the other engineer  
27 companies who also have offices in Houston, we do the business side of it as well; we  
28 haven't opened any business... we haven't created any business relations yet, but we  
29 have... we have tried to find the business opportunities in the United States.

30 MR. SOLIS: I think you mentioned government liaison work? Is that correct?

1 WITNESS: Yes.

2 MR. SOLIS: What are some of the duties you have in that capacity? Are you meeting  
3 with the Executive Branch people, Congress?

4 WITNESS: Yeah, we... usually in the events, like think-tank events, we meet with the  
5 government officials, legislators if they're present there and the main, one of the main  
6 responsibilities is to get as much as information about the current status of the  
7 international projects going on because SOCAR is involved with international projects,  
8 so politics are involved in that and there's educational part of it as well, to inform the  
9 legislators and the government officials about the current status of the projects and you  
10 know our position mainly these kinds of issues.

11 MR. SOLIS: Are you a lobbyist? Do you register under the lobbying disclosure act?

12 WITNESS: No. No.

13 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Do you have meetings with members of Congress or staff on the Hill  
14 in their offices?

15 WITNESS: I have been in meetings with staffers and the Congressmen.

16 MR. SOLIS: Okay. How often do you do them?

17 WITNESS: Probably... once a month, sometimes, every other month.

18 MR. SOLIS: Who else works at SOCAR-USA or the division office here in Washington,  
19 D.C.?

20 WITNESS: Well there are... currently there are three more employees and we have hired  
21 and then people left for another job, currently there are three of them and there's a  
22 manager, there's a part-time assistant and then there's a driver.

23 MR. SOLIS: A driver?

24 WITNESS: Yeah.

25 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Do they all report to you?

26 WITNESS: Yes.

27 MR. SOLIS: Who do you report to at SOCAR?

28 WITNESS: I report directly to the CEO of the company and that's the president of the  
29 company in that position.

30 MR. SOLIS: There's nobody in between?

- 1 WITNESS: There are vice presidents, but officially I report to the president of the  
2 company.
- 3 MS. EISNER: And who is the president of the company?
- 4 WITNESS: Rovnag Adbullayev.
- 5 MR. SOLIS: Could you spell that for us?
- 6 WITNESS: R-O-V-N-A-G A-B-D-U-L-L
- 7 MR. SOLIS: You got that?
- 8 WITNESS: A-Y-E-V
- 9 MS. EISNER: Oh, there's ...
- 10 WITNESS: Abdullayev.
- 11 MR. SOLIS: Abdullayev. Okay. What is the relationship with your office here in D.C. to  
12 the barren company in Baku? Is there a division between the two offices? Is there a  
13 subsidiary?
- 14 WITNESS: It's representative office. We're not incorporated in United States.
- 15 MR. SOLIS: So it's just an office of SOCAR in Baku placed in Washington, D.C.?
- 16 WITNESS: Yes.
- 17 MR. SOLIS: Okay. What is the relationship between SOCAR and the government of  
18 Azerbaijan to the best of your understanding?
- 19 WITNESS: It's 100% state owned company.
- 20 MR. SOLIS: Does SOCAR hire lobbyists to represent the company in Washington, D.C.  
21 or anywhere in the United States?
- 22 WITNESS: SOCAR-USA... has hired a PR company and being extension of SOCAR,  
23 we can consider SOCAR as hired the company, Roberti & White in July 2013 and there  
24 was a two month contract with Epcott, but that was only for... more for PR activity,  
25 media activities actually.
- 26 MR. SOLIS: And you said Epcott?
- 27 WITNESS: Yeah and this was in 2014, April.

- 1 MR. SOLIS: Do you know if Roberti & White, if they registered as lobbyists on your  
2 behalf?
- 3 WITNESS: I know that Arie Mittleman was registered right after the contract.
- 4 MS. EISNER: You said you attend meetings on Capitol Hill, would Ari Mittleman have  
5 been present at those meetings?
- 6 WITNESS: In some cases, he was there; in some cases he was not.
- 7 MS. EISNER: Anyone else from Roberti & White present at those meetings?
- 8 WITNESS: No.
- 9 MS. EISNER: Or from APCO?
- 10 WITNESS: No.
- 11 MR. SOLIS: What about foreign agents; does SOCAR hire foreign agents registered  
12 under, again to the best of your understanding, registered under the foreign agents  
13 registration act? Do they hire anybody to represent on their behalf?
- 14 WITNESS: I don't know.
- 15 MR. SOLIS: I want to talk about some individuals and some entities that you may be  
16 familiar with next and get some background on them. Do you know Kemal Oksuz is?
- 17 WITNESS: Yes, I do.
- 18 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Do you know him personally?
- 19 WITNESS: This is based on professional relations.
- 20 MR. SOLIS: How long have you known him?
- 21 WITNESS: Since 2011, November.
- 22 MR. SOLIS: What does he do for a living? Where is he employed?
- 23 WITNESS: I think he's employed at Turquoise Council. He's also CEO of AFAZ.
- 24 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Is Turquoise Council the Turquoise Council of Americans and  
25 Eurasians?
- 26 WITNESS: I think that's the name.
- 27 MR. SOLIS: And AFAZ is the Assembly of Friends of Azerbaijan?

- 1 WITNESS: That's correct.
- 2 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Do you know what his title is at those organizations?
- 3 WITNESS: For AFAZ, it's CEO and the president; for Turquoise Council I think it's  
4 CEO. I'm not sure.
- 5 MR. SOLIS: Do you know if he's still in those roles with those two organizations today?
- 6 WITNESS: For AFAZ I know that he is; I don't know about Turquoise Council.
- 7 MR. SOLIS: You mentioned you have a professional relationship with him, do you have  
8 a, you know, personal friendship with him at all?
- 9 WITNESS: No, I don't.
- 10 MR. SOLIS: Okay.
- 11 MS. EISNER: Where was that professional relationship developed?
- 12 WITNESS: I'm also in the board of AFAZ.
- 13 MR. SOLIS: We'll get to that in a moment. How often would you say you speak with  
14 Kemal Oksuz?
- 15 WITNESS: Uhm...
- 16 MR. SOLIS: Or communicate with him?
- 17 WITNESS: Recently, I see him only in the events. For example, the last time I saw him  
18 in March... March 21<sup>st</sup>? 20<sup>th</sup> in the event; I don't communicate with him on a regular  
19 basis.
- 20 MR. SOLIS: And March, you meant March of 2015?
- 21 WITNESS: Yes.
- 22 MR. SOLIS: And what event?
- 23 WITNESS: It was a national holiday in Azerbaijan, organized by AFAZ.
- 24 MR. SOLIS: Okay.
- 25 MS. EISNER: And you said that was your recent communication and not very much,  
26 what about in 2014, the last year?
- 27 WITNESS: Usually, very rarely.

- 1 MS. EISNER: And 2013?
- 2 WITNESS: 2013... little bit more than 2014, but I cannot quantify.
- 3 MR. SOLIS: Is Kemal Oksuz from Azerbaijan?
- 4 WITNESS: No.
- 5 MR. SOLIS: Do you know where he's from?
- 6 WITNESS: He's from Turkey.
- 7 MR. SOLIS: What is Mr. Oksuz's relationship to SOCAR?
- 8 WITNESS: SOCAR is a founder of AFAZ and he's the CEO of AFAZ.
- 9 MR. SOLIS: Do you know what his relationship is to the country of Azerbaijan? Does  
10 he have family there? Does he have business interests there?
- 11 WITNESS: I don't know.
- 12 MR. SOLIS: You mentioned that SOCAR founded AFAZ, right? Can you talk more  
13 about that, when did that happen or how did that happen?
- 14 WITNESS: Officially, it was established in 2013, April, just prior to the event. It was  
15 established in Houston, Texas. And –
- 16 MR. SOLIS: And the event you're speaking of, is this the convention in Baku?
- 17 WITNESS: Yes. And the goal, as it's seen from the title, is to create as many friends in  
18 Azerbaijan and to kids, United States about Azerbaijan, the society and that was the goal  
19 of Friends of Azerbaijan. That's when it was established.
- 20 MR. SOLIS: Were you part of the decision to establish the organization?
- 21 WITNESS: No.
- 22 MR. SOLIS: Who was part of that decision?
- 23 WITNESS: The leadership of SOCAR.
- 24 MR. SOLIS: So the CEO, you know, the executives of the company, they were... the  
25 leadership of the company?
- 26 WITNESS: That's correct.
- 27 MR. SOLIS: Why did they choose, well was Kemal Oksuz chosen to lead AFAZ?

- 1 WITNESS: Yes.
- 2 MR. SOLIS: And who made the decision to choose him to lead the organization?
- 3 WITNESS: I don't know exactly.
- 4 MR. SOLIS: So he didn't volunteer to do it, or apply for an open position?
- 5 WITNESS: I don't know the process.
- 6 MS. EISNER: Who would've had the authority to select him?
- 7 WITNESS: It could be anyone in the management; vice president, president of the  
8 company.
- 9 MR. SOLIS: You mentioned that one of the goals was to you know, get friends of  
10 Azerbaijan to strengthen awareness, things like that. Was the convention – was it in the  
11 founding of AFAZ, was there an eye towards the convention? Was that part of the goal to  
12 put this convention together?
- 13 WITNESS: I don't have that knowledge.
- 14 MR. SOLIS: You said that AFAZ is based in Houston?
- 15 WITNESS: It was established in Houston. Since I'm not following AFAZ works, to my  
16 knowledge it has moved to D.C. I don't know if it has been registered officially in D.C.
- 17 MR. SOLIS: Who works there? Who's employed by AFAZ?
- 18 WITNESS: Currently to my knowledge, there isn't any employee of AFAZ.
- 19 MR. SOLIS: Kemal though, is the CEO?
- 20 WITNESS: Yes.
- 21 MR. SOLIS: The president?
- 22 WITNESS: Yes.
- 23 MR. SOLIS: So he does that on a volunteer basis?
- 24 WITNESS: I'm not sure, but he was doing it on a volunteer basis. I'm not sure whether  
25 he's being paid at the moment.
- 26 MR. SOLIS: Okay and you are affiliated with AFAZ as well?
- 27 WITNESS: I'm in the board of AFAZ.

- 1 MR. SOLIS: You're on the board. Okay. Is Kemal on the board?
- 2 WITNESS: Yes.
- 3 MR. SOLIS: Who else is on the board?
- 4 WITNESS: Irada Akhoundova, forgot the last names of two other people, me, Kemal...  
5 I'll have to get that information to you; I don't exactly remember two other people.
- 6 MR. SOLIS: Well I have the 990 here and I think there are some names on this, so  
7 maybe that will refresh your recollection. Given that there's no current employees at  
8 AFAZ, you know what is the organization doing right now?
- 9 WITNESS: I'm not following the exact activities of AFAZ in terms of organizing or  
10 doing events, but one of the last events was the Novruz holiday, which is a national  
11 holiday of Azerbaijan. It's called Novruz – spring holiday, established by and organized  
12 by AFAZ, but these kinds of events. And then prior to that, there was [indecipherable]  
13 event, which is... there was a massacre back in 1992 and to commemorate that, there was  
14 an event held in Rayburn building, I think at the end of February.
- 15 MR. SOLIS: How many events would you say, since the creation of AFAZ, has AFAZ  
16 taken a part in?
- 17 WITNESS: I don't know the exact number.
- 18 MR. SOLIS: Would you say, less than 5 maybe?
- 19 WITNESS: More than 5.
- 20 MR. SOLIS: More than 5, less than 10?
- 21 WITNESS: I would say around 10-15?
- 22 MR. SOLIS: Just a second, we have a train passing by.
- 23 MS. EISNER: It happens occasionally here. Was there a time when AFAZ had more  
24 employees?
- 25 MR. SOLIS: That was my next question.
- 26 WITNESS: No.
- 27 MR. SOLIS: No?
- 28 WITNESS: Not to my knowledge.
- 29 MR. SOLIS: So AFAZ has only had a board basically?

- 1 WITNESS: That's correct.
- 2 MR. SOLIS: And has the board members always been the same?
- 3 WITNESS: Yes.
- 4 MR. SOLIS: Given that you're a board member, do you have any other title with AFAZ  
5 besides board member?
- 6 WITNESS: Treasurer.
- 7 MR. SOLIS: Treasurer? What are some of your duties as treasurer?
- 8 WITNESS: The by-law effects...it's all written in the by-law. I don't recall the exact  
9 activities, but –
- 10 MR. SOLIS: Well just based on your experience, of being the treasurer there, you know  
11 –
- 12 WITNESS: I haven't done anything as a treasurer being in the board of AFAZ so...my  
13 activity as treasurer in the board was zero.
- 14 MR. SOLIS: I mean have you done anything related?
- 15 WITNESS: I have voted for decisions and...I think that was in April, 2013.
- 16 MR. SOLIS: And what are the decisions you voted on?
- 17 WITNESS: As I recall, there was a voting on spending almost \$450,000.00 on the  
18 expenses of the trip - of this trip.
- 19 MR. SOLIS: This convention in Baku?
- 20 WITNESS: Yes. For the guests.
- 21 MR. SOLIS: You said \$450 –
- 22 WITNESS: \$450, around \$450 I don't recall the exact number.
- 23 MR. SOLIS: And what are those expenses related to?
- 24 WITNESS: The motion was introduced by Kemal Oksuz to cover the expenses for the  
25 guests. And it was done by email and the response was verbal.
- 26 MR. SOLIS: And by expenses, would that include airfare?
- 27 WITNESS: It wasn't indicated there.

1 MR. SOLIS: It wasn't indicated?

2 WITNESS: No.

3 MR. SOLIS: Then who would Kemal have carried out you know, sending the money to  
4 the travelers for whatever expenses they might need?

5 WITNESS: I don't know.

6 MR. SOLIS: And who are the travelers that those expenses would be applied to?

7 WITNESS: I don't know exactly whose expenses were covered by that amount.

8 MS. EISNER: You don't exactly know the individuals, but do you know the types of  
9 people of that the expenses would've covered?

10 WITNESS: I don't know.

11 MR. SOLIS: And you said it was an email to the board members of AFAZ and from  
12 Kemal?

13 WITNESS: Yes.

14 MR. SOLIS: What did the email say exactly to the best of your recollection?

15 WITNESS: I think it's said, "we are close to the convention" I think... and you know,  
16 "we have certain amount of money that's in the budget and if you approve, we want to  
17 allocate \$450,000.00" I think almost \$450,000.00 to the expenses of the guests – didn't  
18 specify any guests.

19 MR. SOLIS: Where does AFAZ get its money?

20 WITNESS: There's a knowledge that I have collected that I knew, very limited  
21 knowledge, prior to the event and during the event, I wasn't actively involved in the  
22 organizing of the event. And there's a knowledge that I have come throughout the process  
23 by helping SOCAR main office, providing with information.

24 MR. SOLIS: So let's start with the limited knowledge you have in 2013. What did you  
25 know about how AFAZ was funded?

26 WITNESS: I had no idea how – I knew that SOCAR was the founder and SOCAR was  
27 supposed to finance AFAZ activities.

28 MR. SOLIS: Why do you know that? How do you know that?

- 1 WITNESS: Being a founder, I assumed that it will finance AFAZ activities, but I had no  
2 idea how much was transferred and on the time I had learned that was from that email  
3 that this amount is there and this amount is proposed to be allocated for expenses.
- 4 MR. SOLIS: And what -- did Kemal say in the email where that money came from?
- 5 WITNESS: I don't recall that.
- 6 MR. SOLIS: I think I'll show you this Form 990. Can you guys share that one?
- 7 MR. MISSNER: Yeah, that's fine. And we're -- I know this, we're obviously here  
8 representing SOCAR, not AFAZ so... you know. I don't know if AFAZ have attorneys, I  
9 don't know what you're doing with AFAZ, but just... I know you know this, but just want  
10 to make sure that we're here in that capacity... yeah as I said.
- 11 MR. SOLIS: Right. And you know, because WITNESS has a role with AFAZ you know,  
12 I'm asking him questions based on that, but I totally understand where you're coming  
13 from. So what I'm showing WITNESS right now and his attorneys, is a Form 990 an IRS  
14 Form 990, 2013 covering calendar year 2013, regarding the Assembly of Friends of  
15 Azerbaijan. WITNESS if you'll look on page 7, is that your name under number 4 there?
- 16 WITNESS: Mhmm.
- 17 MR. SOLIS: That's you?
- 18 WITNESS: Yes.
- 19 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Before, when I asked you who else was on the board, you mentioned  
20 Irada and Kemal.
- 21 WITNESS: Yes.
- 22 MR. SOLIS: Those are the other two names there --
- 23 WITNESS: That's correct.
- 24 MR. SOLIS: Milla Perry Jones?
- 25 WITNESS: That's correct.
- 26 MR. SOLIS: And Mary Susan Savage?
- 27 WITNESS: Yes.
- 28 MR. SOLIS: Who are those individuals? Do you know them?
- 29 WITNESS: I saw them only in that board event and I've never seen them after that.

1 MR. SOLIS: You saw them at a board event?

2 WITNESS: There was only one... with the board of directors. It was in April, it was held  
3 in April. I don't recall the exact date and that's the first time I saw these people.

4 MR. SOLIS: What was discussed at that board event, the meeting?

5 WITNESS: I don't recall the exact discussion in that meeting. It was years ago, I don't  
6 exactly recall, but that was the first like ground-breaking event for AFAZ.

7 MR. SOLIS: That was the first board meeting?

8 WITNESS: Yes.

9 MR. SOLIS: Was anyone else there besides these, the five people who were listed on  
10 page 7 of this form?

11 WITNESS: There were two other people that I don't know the names of before the  
12 official start of the board meeting, but we had asked them to leave and they left.

13 MR. SOLIS: Do you know who those people were?

14 WITNESS: I don't remember their names.

15 MR. SOLIS: At that board meeting, did the subject of the convention get brought up?

16 WITNESS: No.

17 MR. SOLIS: No? And so the only time then there would've been board action or board  
18 discussion about the convention was that email that Kemal sent you?

19 WITNESS: There's one other meeting that I was involved in the discussion in the  
20 organization of the event.

21 MR. SOLIS: And when did that happen?

22 WITNESS: I don't exactly remember the time; I'm assuming... I'm guessing it was also  
23 the beginning of 2013.

24 MR. SOLIS: Prior to the convention?

25 WITNESS: Prior to the convention. And the participants were me, Kemal Oksuz,  
26 Ambassador of Azerbaijan and Vice President of SOCAR.

27 MR. SOLIS: Were – was Milla Perry Jones present?

28 WITNESS: Those were the only people that were present there.

1 MR. SOLIS: Only people? Why would've... why would those people have been there for  
2 that meeting if they weren't affiliated with AFAZ?

3 WITNESS: Can you repeat the question?

4 MR. SOLIS: I'm... so. These are the five people who are you know affiliated at least, or  
5 disclosed as affiliated with AFAZ, you mentioned that a Vice President of SOCAR was  
6 at that meeting and also the Ambassador to Azerbaijan, from Azerbaijan, was also at that  
7 meeting with you and Kemal Oksuz?

8 WITNESS: That's correct.

9 MR. SOLIS: Why would have those two people, the Vice President from SOCAR and  
10 the Ambassador, why would they be there?

11 WITNESS: There was a convention to be held in Azerbaijan; one of the main sponsors  
12 of the convention was SOCAR and there were Americans coming from the United States  
13 and being Ambassador to United States, I think it made sense for Ambassador to be there.

14 MR. SOLIS: Did you invite them to the meeting?

15 WITNESS: No.

16 MR. SOLIS: How did they know about the meeting?

17 WITNESS: They invited me to the meeting.

18 MR. SOLIS: Okay, fair enough. What, specific as you can be, what was discussed?

19 WITNESS: It... there was discussion about the certain people to be invited to the event. I  
20 recall several names; I don't recall any Congressmen to be discussed whether to be  
21 invited or not, but I recall Jim Messina, David Plouffe, Bill White, the former energy  
22 Secretary... forgot his name, he was there. I mean his name was mentioned and we were  
23 discussing whether to... I was very passive; I didn't know those people. I was very fresh  
24 in the United States for 4-5 months, but the discussion was whether to invite these  
25 people, whether they had any history with Azerbaijan, whether it's good idea to invite  
26 them or not; that was the discussion.

27 MR. SOLIS: You said, you didn't think any specific names of Congressmen was  
28 discussed.

29 WITNESS: I recall that Congressmen were not discussed in the event.

30 MR. SOLIS: Were they generally discussed? Did somebody say for example, you know,  
31 "we've got members of Congress coming"?

- 1 WITNESS: I don't recall that.
- 2 MR. SOLIS: Were staff members, employees of the House discussed at all?
- 3 WITNESS: I don't recall that.
- 4 MR. SOLIS: I want to go back to this form. And I want to ask you about Irada?
- 5 WITNESS: Sure.
- 6 MR. SOLIS: Who is Irada?
- 7 WITNESS: Irada is the head of the Baku sister association and she's also head of the  
8 Azerbaijan Center, cultural center, in Houston.
- 9 MR. SOLIS: Does she work for SOCAR?
- 10 WITNESS: Recently, Azerbaijan center in Houston, I signed a contract with SOCAR-  
11 USA office and they're being funded by SOCAR-USA office, but this happened the  
12 second half of 2014.
- 13 MR. SOLIS: Okay. So right now, Irada is employed by SOCAR-USA?
- 14 WITNESS: I don't know whether legally she is employed by SOCAR-USA. She's not  
15 employee of SOCAR-USA; I know that for sure, but I don't know... the only official  
16 relation is the contract between SOCAR-USA and Azerbaijan Center.
- 17 MR. SOLIS: So the Azerbaijan Center and SOCAR-USA have an agreement, have a  
18 contract or agreement?
- 19 WITNESS: If I recall correctly, yes.
- 20 MR. SOLIS: And what does Azerbaijan Center do?
- 21 WITNESS: It mainly holds cultural events to raise awareness about Azerbaijan in  
22 Houston, to collect – to make sure the community of Azerbaijanis mainly expense  
23 working for oil companies, they come to the events and you know they integrate... that's  
24 the main goal.
- 25 MR. SOLIS: Is there a community of Azerbaijanis in Houston?
- 26 WITNESS: Yes. There's a good community of Azerbaijanis – a fair community of  
27 Azerbaijanis in Houston.
- 28 MR. SOLIS: Would you have an estimate of how many Azerbaijanis live in Houston?

- 1 WITNESS: I don't know an exact number, but I know that there's a long standing  
2 relation between Houston and Baku being both oil... oil related cities.
- 3 MR. SOLIS: How does the Azerbaijan Center – how is it funded?
- 4 WITNESS: Currently, it's being funded by SOCAR-USA.
- 5 MR. SOLIS: Alright, do you have a position there at the Azerbaijan Center?
- 6 WITNESS: I'm the president of the Azerbaijan Center.
- 7 MR. SOLIS: Does Kemal Oksuz have a relationship with the Azerbaijan Center?
- 8 WITNESS: I don't think they have any professional relation. He's not... related to the  
9 center.
- 10 MR. SOLIS: I want to draw your attention to page 9 of the Form 990. There's a section  
11 there near the top, it's called program service revenue.
- 12 WITNESS: Mhmm.
- 13 MR. SOLIS: And it's \$840,000.00. Well first of all I guess, I should ask, did you have  
14 any part in filling out this form?
- 15 WITNESS: No, I haven't.
- 16 MR. SOLIS: Okay did you ever see the form?
- 17 WITNESS: No, I haven't.
- 18 MR. SOLIS: Do you know what the \$840,000.00 number represents? What is that?
- 19 WITNESS: I don't... acknowledge that I have about that number is again. There's a prior  
20 to the investigation, there's an after the investigation.
- 21 MR. SOLIS: Okay, so let's do both.
- 22 WITNESS: Okay. Prior, was that email saying that there's 700 something thousand  
23 dollars of amount in the budget of AFAZ and that's how I know there was that amount of  
24 number and then after the investigation, I recently was checking AFAZ' account and I  
25 saw that there was an entry, I think around \$750,000.00 coming from SOCAR to AFAZ  
26 bank account and there was another, I don't exactly recall the number, there was another  
27 entry transfer coming from... I think it was MI Drilling or Caspian Drilling Company. So,  
28 I'm assuming that's them.
- 29 MR. SOLIS: What is MI Drilling?

- 1 WITNESS: I don't remember the exact name. I think Caspian or MI Drilling; it's a  
2 drilling company contractor of SOCAR in Azerbaijan.
- 3 MR. SOLIS: And Caspian Drilling, is that also a contractor with SOCAR?
- 4 WITNESS: Well, I might confuse the names. I'm not sure.
- 5 MR. SOLIS: So, you know you mentioned that, going back after you know, we had  
6 contacted you, you had taken a look at the numbers and you saw a \$750,000.00 amount  
7 from SCOAR to AFAZ. Is that correct?
- 8 WITNESS: That's correct.
- 9 MR. SOLIS: Do you know what that \$840,000.00 number represents?
- 10 WITNESS: I don't know the exact – the remaining of that number. I mean, apparently  
11 there's \$750,000.00 then there's \$9,000.00 difference, but I don't know where that  
12 \$9,000.00 came from.
- 13 MR. SOLIS: Okay. I want to draw your attention to the next page, page 10. And if you  
14 look at line 19 there...
- 15 WITNESS: Yes.
- 16 MR. SOLIS: You'll see, it's called, "Conferences, conventions, and meetings:  
17 \$504,400.00 in total expenses". Would you know what that – do you know what that  
18 figure represents?
- 19 WITNESS: Uhm...
- 20 MR. SOLIS: Again, based on your prior knowledge and then after the fact.
- 21 WITNESS: All my knowledge about the number, or approximate number, is based on  
22 that email from Kemal Oksuz about covering the expenses of guests.
- 23 MR. SOLIS: And you believe he said \$450,000.00, roughly?
- 24 WITNESS: I don't recall the exact number; almost \$450,000.00.
- 25 MR. SOLIS: This says \$504,400.00; would that be the expense related to that  
26 convention? Just the best as you can recollect?
- 27 WITNESS: All my knowledge was based on that email and it said that the convention is  
28 almost there and should... the motion was to spend \$450,000.00 to cover the expense of  
29 guests. That's all my knowledge about it.
- 30 MR. SOLIS: So that number... you're not aware of that number, \$504,400.00?

1 WITNESS: No.

2 MR. SOLIS: Does AFAZ hire lobbyist to work on its behalf in Washington, D.C. or  
3 elsewhere in the United States?

4 WITNESS: Correction, the contract with APCO was signed with AFAZ, not with  
5 SOCAR.

6 MR. SOLIS: Oh, okay.

7 WITNESS: That was the only PR Company that, to my knowledge, signed a contract  
8 with AFAZ.

9 MR. SOLIS: Do you know when that happened?

10 WITNESS: April, 2014.

11 MR. SOLIS: So, just so I'm clear. APCO has a relationship with AFAZ and Roberti &  
12 White has a relationship with SOCAR.

13 WITNESS: That's correct. Yes.

14 MR. SOLIS: Okay. What about foreign agents? Do you know if AFAZ is registered  
15 under the foreign agents registration act?

16 WITNESS: I don't know.

17 MR. SOLIS: Do you know if they hired anybody?

18 WITNESS: Not to my knowledge.

19 MR. SOLIS: To you know, act on their behalf in the capacity as a foreign principle?

20 WITNESS: The only contract that I was involved with was AFAZ-APCO contract in  
21 2014 to do the media work for 2014 convention, similar convention held in Washington,  
22 D.C.

23 MR. SOLIS: Did AFAZ hire anybody to do that work at 2013 for the conference in  
24 Baku?

25 WITNESS: Not to my knowledge.

26 MS. EISNER: Do you the names of any individuals at APCO that you worked with  
27 that's a part of that contract?

28 WITNESS: I don't recall any names.

1 MR. SOLIS: I want to talk about the Turquoise Council of Americans and Eurasians. I  
2 understand, you know, you have no role there. Is that correct?

3 WITNESS: That's correct.

4 MR. SOLIS: Okay. This is just going to be based on your general knowledge and  
5 experience and understanding of dealing with Kemal or anybody else who works there,  
6 okay?

7 WITNESS: Okay.

8 MR. SOLIS: So, what is the Turquoise Council? I'm going to refer to it as TCAE. So  
9 what is TCAE?

10 WITNESS: I don't have enough knowledge about TCAE, but from the name it says  
11 Turquoise Council of Americans and Eurasians; that's the only knowledge I have.

12 MR. SOLIS: Do you know what they do?

13 WITNESS: I don't.

14 MR. SOLIS: Do you know what the organization's mission is?

15 WITNESS: I don't. I don't know.

16 MR. SOLIS: When's the first time you heard that name?

17 WITNESS: I don't recall exactly; I mean again, this is a prior-after issue and I did know  
18 the name of the organization –

19 MR. SOLIS: This is prior to the convention?

20 WITNESS: Prior to the convention.

21 MR. SOLIS: And how did you come to know the name?

22 WITNESS: I don't recall exactly, but it was probably because of Kemal? I don't know  
23 the details.

24 MR. SOLIS: And now, since our review has commenced, what do you know about  
25 TCAE now?

26 WITNESS: I know that TCAE was involved in the organization and the assigning of the  
27 pre-trip documents for the trip of the Congressmen.

28 MR. SOLIS: Okay. How are – how is AFAZ and TCAE related? Do they have a  
29 relationship?

- 1 WITNESS: There wasn't any discussion about the cooperation between AFAZ and  
2 TCAE to my knowledge. The only relation is Kemal Oksuz is both CEO of TCAE and  
3 AFAZ.
- 4 MR. SOLIS: Would he ever talk to you about TCAE?
- 5 WITNESS: No.
- 6 MR. SOLIS: Never mentioned it to you at all?
- 7 WITNESS: No. The first board meeting was held in TCAE office.
- 8 MR. SOLIS: The first AFAZ board meeting?
- 9 WITNESS: Yes.
- 10 MR. SOLIS: And that's in Houston?
- 11 WITNESS: That's in Houston.
- 12 MR. SOLIS: How is TCAE funded?
- 13 WITNESS: I don't know.
- 14 MR. SOLIS: Do AFAZ and TCAE share a bank account?
- 15 WITNESS: I don't know.
- 16 MR. SOLIS: And your capacity as treasure of AFAZ, do you have any understanding of  
17 any sharing of money between the two organizations?
- 18 WITNESS: The only time that I accessed AFAZ's bank account was recently to check  
19 the expenses of 2013 and I didn't see TCAE name or title there.
- 20 MR. SOLIS: Did Kemal have access to AFAZ's bank account?
- 21 WITNESS: Yes, he did.
- 22 MR. SOLIS: And this is back in 2013?
- 23 WITNESS: Yes.
- 24 MR. SOLIS: What bank does AFAZ use?
- 25 WITNESS: Wells Fargo.
- 26 MR. SOLIS: Do you know what bank TCAE uses?
- 27 WITNESS: I don't know.

1 MR. SOLIS: I want to talk about Roberti & White, Ari Mittleman.

2 WITNESS: Sure.

3 MR. SOLIS: How long have you known Mr. Mittleman?

4 WITNESS: I think early 2013.

5 MR. SOLIS: Did you meet him in person or was he introduced to you by somebody?  
6 How did you come to meet him?

7 WITNESS: I don't recall how I met him, but I knew him before he work – started  
8 working for Roberti & White.

9 MR. SOLIS: And how did you know him before?

10 WITNESS: I met him in the event. We created friendship; we established a friendship.

11 MR. SOLIS: What event?

12 WITNESS: I don't remember.

13 MR. SOLIS: Do you know what Roberti & White – what they do? What the organization  
14 does?

15 WITNESS: It's a company, it's a PR company located in Washington, D.C.

16 MR. SOLIS: Do you know if they conduct lobbying work or registered lobbyists in any  
17 capacity?

18 WITNESS: I know that Ari is registered lobbyist.

19 MR. SOLIS: And how do you know that? Because he told you?

20 WITNESS: No, I checked it through the website, our website.

21 MR. SOLIS: Okay. The FARA website or the lobbying disclosure website?

22 WITNESS: I think it was FARA website.

23 MR. SOLIS: What was Ari's role in helping out with the convention?

24 WITNESS: He was, if you see – if you look at the emails, his job was to coordinate  
25 Valerie Biden Owen's trip to Azerbaijan. Jay Rouse from the Roberti & White introduced  
26 me to Valerie Biden. I think we had breakfast prior to those emails. She expressed  
27 intention to go to the event and speak about the women leadership; I think that's what she  
28 does. I then introduced her to Ari Mittleman and said that he will be coordinating the trip,

1 her logistics, to Azerbaijan and then later on, Kemal Oksuz was also involved in directly  
2 arranging the logistics of the trip, the tickets and the hotel.

3 MR. SOLIS: I'll show you that right now. I think that's directly on point to a document I  
4 wanted to show you. This is numbered SOCAR-USA\_00000005. It's an email and is that  
5 your email address?

6 WITNESS: That's correct.

7 MR. SOLIS: Do you recall this email?

8 WITNESS: I pulled it out when I was asked... requested to provide the documentation  
9 regarding the conference.

10 MR. SOLIS: And as I think you just mentioned, you said, "Dear Valerie, I would like to  
11 introduce you to Arie Mittleman. Arie will be helping us with coordinating our trip" and  
12 is that trip to the convention in Baku?

13 WITNESS: That's correct.

14 MR. SOLIS: "As well as providing information of the convention." So, when you say,  
15 "helping us with coordinating our trip" could you explain what coordinating means?

16 WITNESS: Coordinating the logistics of her going to Azerbaijan.

17 MR. SOLIS: Did Mr. Mittleman coordinate anybody else's logistics?

18 WITNESS: No.

19 MR. SOLIS: Solely...

20 WITNESS: That's correct.

21 MR. SOLIS: Valerie?

22 WITNESS: That's correct.

23 MR. SOLIS: And you also say, "providing information about the convention." What  
24 information would he provide about the convention?

25 WITNESS: General information, public information about what the convention is about,  
26 that's it.

27 MR. SOLIS: The actual, contractual relationship between SOCAR and Roberti & White  
28 occurred after the convention?

29 WITNESS: That's correct.

1 MR. SOLIS: Why was there no contractual relationship around this time?

2 WITNESS: We... this was based on the relation, friendship-relation created... established  
3 by me and him and there wasn't any contract.

4 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Did you hear from the people you report to that they wanted Valerie  
5 to attend the convention?

6 WITNESS: I reported to them as I recall that's she's interested in speaking there.

7 MR. SOLIS: And what did they say?

8 WITNESS: They said yes.

9 MR. SOLIS: And these are... this is the CEO of SOCAR –

10 WITNESS: I don't recall exactly who was it; I don't think it was CEO of the company. I  
11 think it was... one of the VP's or heads of department.

12 MS. EISNER: Did Mr. Mittleman get paid for the coordination that he provided?

13 WITNESS: No, he wasn't.

14 MR. SOLIS: Did he go on the trip to Baku?

15 WITNESS: Yes, he did.

16 MR. SOLIS: What do you know about Mr. Mittleman helping out with getting people  
17 visas to travel to Azerbaijan?

18 WITNESS: Mr. Mittleman's involvement about the trip was solely regarding Valerie  
19 Biden's trip to Azerbaijan. If I recall... I mean... I don't remember what the visas  
20 provisions back then, it has changed to Azerbaijan, what is required visa, but I think there  
21 was invitation to be provided and I don't recall exactly, but he might be involved in the  
22 process for getting visa for himself. I think Jay Rouse was there for Jay and Valerie  
23 Biden.

24 MR. SOLIS: Alright. I want to move onto the actual convention and talk about that.  
25 When did you first hear about the idea of the convention?

26 WITNESS: The same convention was held in 2012 in D.C. I think it was April... at the  
27 end of April. And that's what the notion of the convention was clear to me and it was  
28 supposed to be annual. I don't recall exactly when the decision was made or by whom the  
29 decision was made to be held in Baku, but the general knowledge about the convention  
30 itself and the location was from that 2012 event.

1 MR. SOLIS: So why, again I'll ask sort of the same question about 2012 then, you  
2 know, how did that come to be you know, to actually have a convention in D.C., I mean  
3 who's idea was that and why did that happen?

4 WITNESS: I don't recall whose idea was that. I wasn't a representative of SOCAR to  
5 United States. I had different responsibilities back then. I was a participant in the event.

6 MR. SOLIS: Was there an office in D.C. back then for SOCAR?

7 WITNESS: No.

8 MR. SOLIS: So... I should've asked this at the beginning, but how old is the office in –  
9 how long has it been in existence?

10 WITNESS: I was official appointed as representative of SCOAR to United States on July  
11 2012. We... I moved with my family to United States in August 26... or 25<sup>th</sup>. That's how I  
12 started.

13 MR. SOLIS: So the office, SOCAR-USA presence, has been around since that time?

14 WITNESS: Yes.

15 MR. SOLIS: What's the purpose of the convention?

16 WITNESS: If you see from the title, it's about U.S.-Azerbaijan relations. It's a cultivated  
17 relation to raise awareness about Azerbaijan. The same, you know ideas about educating  
18 Americans about Azerbaijan.

19 MR. SOLIS: Is the government of Azerbaijan involved in helping to formulate the plan  
20 for the convention?

21 WITNESS: The certain entities of government of Azerbaijan, namely immigration  
22 department or immigration industry was involved in providing documentation invitation  
23 for the... that's the only knowledge that I have about participation of any government  
24 extension in the process, besides SOCAR. SOCAR is 100%.

25 MR. SOLIS: Okay. That was going to be my next question. You know, what's generally  
26 SOCAR's role in this convention?

27 WITNESS: SOCAR was a sponsor; the gold sponsor for the event and so we... if you see  
28 from the emails, the protocol department of SOCAR, which you will be interviewing,  
29 they were responsible for providing invitations, so this kind of actual work for... to  
30 facilitate the visits of Americans to Azerbaijan.

31 MR. SOLIS: You said, providing invitations?

1 WITNESS: Invitations for the visa.

2 MR. SOLIS: Okay.

3 WITNESS: Official letters from the immigration department to facilitate provision of  
4 immigration letters to the Americans... to acquire these.

5 MR. SOLIS: Does Azerbaijan require a sponsorship to enter the country?

6 WITNESS: The rules have changed, I don't remember when exactly the rules have  
7 changed, but it requires an invitation for certain person or certain entity to  
8 invite... person, foreigner to Azerbaijan. This is true for Americans... United States.

9 MR. SOLIS: So, SOCAR filled that role as the entity that invited people to come?

10 WITNESS: There was a certain person working for SOCAR. Dehyar Mammadov and  
11 he's mentioned in the emails; he was facilitating together with the protocol department of  
12 SOCAR doing provision of invitations for the visa for the Americans.

13 MR. SOLIS: And that's for all Americans coming for this convention?

14 WITNESS: To my knowledge, yes.

15 MR. SOLIS: Was there anyone else providing invitations to your knowledge for  
16 Americans to come to –

17 WITNESS: No. I don't have any knowledge about that and all the knowledge that I  
18 know is through the provision of the documents to cooperate with OCE; I didn't have any  
19 knowledge about that before the event.

20 MS. EISNER: You said that SOCAR acted as a gold sponsor. What is a gold sponsor?

21 WITNESS: It's a certain criteria. I don't know exactly the details or requirements for  
22 becoming gold sponsor, but that was the title for the sponsorship.

23 MR. SOLIS: Who developed the criteria?

24 WITNESS: I don't know.

25 MS. EISNER: Were there other gold sponsors?

26 WITNESS: I don't know.

27 MR. SOLIS: Is there a person or a set of people who are really in charge of developing  
28 how the convention works and setting the agenda and plan?

1 WITNESS: All my knowledge about the facilitation or arrangement of logistics were  
2 based on the emails that we provided to you and from that I can see that the protocol  
3 department, the investment department was involved in the process and the legal  
4 department, of course.

5 MR. SOLIS: Of SOCAR.

6 WITNESS: Of SOCAR.

7 MR. SOLIS: Okay. I'm just trying to get a sense of you know, when I go to a convention  
8 or I go somewhere, I kind of know who the people are, who – basically it was their idea  
9 to have it, they make the phone calls and secure the funding and kind of make it all  
10 happen. And I'm wondering if there's anybody like that you can identify about this  
11 convention; a person or a set of people who you felt to be the people who put the – made  
12 the convention go.

13 WITNESS: I don't have any knowledge about the exact responsible person for like  
14 decision maker or for the main focal point for the event. I see that, and again this is based  
15 on my knowledge that I obtained after looking through all these emails, I see certain  
16 entities of departments of SOCAR involved in the process.

17 MS. EISNER: What about, you know, you mentioned you had attended the convention,  
18 correct?

19 WITNESS: Yes.

20 MS. EISNER: What about your knowledge from just being at the convention? Did you  
21 have a sense that there was somebody was responsible for the logistics, day to day?

22 WITNESS: I was there very shortly and I don't have any ... I didn't see any... I did not  
23 see anyone solely responsible being a focal point for the convention.

24 MR. SOLIS: I mean, as an employee of SOCAR during that convention, I mean did you  
25 have job responsibilities or duties at the convention?

26 WITNESS: I was participant only. I was solely participant in the event.

27 MR. SOLIS: And what did you do as a participant?

28 WITNESS: I attended the opening event and I think I was late for the event; that was the  
29 only thing. And then... if I recall correctly, there was a luncheon or dinner that I attended.

30 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Do you know if any of your friends who work at SOCAR or  
31 anybody else you know at SOCAR, do they have job duties at the convention? Did they

1 have you know, job requirements that made them have to be there or they had to do  
2 certain things at the convention?

3 WITNESS: I worked for the company for 9 years and 6 years I worked in the main office  
4 so I know all those people involved. I didn't see them actively being, visually active in  
5 organizing the event. It was a big event. I recognized them from the emails that they were  
6 involved in the process, but my knowledge about their involvement in the process was  
7 minimal.

8 MS. EISNER: You went to an opening event, a luncheon, how did you know to go to  
9 events? Did you receive an itinerary?

10 WITNESS: Yes, I did.

11 MS. ESINER: Who did the itinerary come from?

12 WITNESS: The Vice President of SOCAR.

13 MR. SOLIS: Did anybody from the government, either the national assembly or the  
14 president, somebody, speak at the convention?

15 WITNESS: As I remember, president of the country speak in the convention.

16 MR. SOLIS: Anybody else from the legislative side?

17 WITNESS: I don't recall any.

18 MR. SOLIS: Did you speak to the president at the convention?

19 WITNESS: President of the country?

20 MR. SOLIS: Yes.

21 WITNESS: No, I didn't.

22 MR. SOLIS: Just wondering. Did you – given that there's going to be these Americans  
23 coming to Baku, did you reach out to the State Department, the United States State  
24 Department in any way about the convention beforehand?

25 WITNESS: I wasn't involved in any aspect of the event besides... making the  
26 introduction for Valerie Biden and the only meeting that I had that I mentioned with the  
27 Ambassador, Kemal Oksuz and Vice President. That was the only affiliation with me  
28 about the event.

29 MR. SOLIS: Alright. Do you know anyone else at SOCAR; either they told you or you  
30 just have awareness that they reached out to the State Department prior to the event?

1 WITNESS: I don't know.

2 MR. SOLIS: What about your understanding about Kemal's role at the convention?  
3 What was his role?

4 WITNESS: He was the exact focal point, or contact person from his side, from United  
5 States in organizing the event.

6 MR. SOLIS: How do you know that?

7 WITNESS: From my observations, from that meeting... he was referred as a main person  
8 who's organizing it.

9 MR. SOLIS: And that's the meeting – that was the meeting with the Vice President of  
10 SOCAR and the Ambassador

11 WITNESS: That's correct.

12 MR. SOLIS: I think I might have asked you this, but again now that we're talking about  
13 it, to the best you could sort of recollect about that meeting, specifically what was  
14 discussed at that meeting? Was financing the convention or how to get people there at all  
15 discussed at the meeting?

16 WITNESS: I don't recall any finance issues to be discussed/was discussed there. What  
17 do you mean how to get there?

18 MR. SOLIS: The logistics of getting Americans to Baku.

19 WITNESS: That's... the only way is plane.

20 MR. SOLIS: Alright, was... were planes discussed? Was travel discussed? Was  
21 visas... was – were those issues discussed?

22 WITNESS: I don't remember any logistic, technical issues discussed that was – that  
23 wouldn't be the subject of that discussion. The only thing that I recollect, I recall that was  
24 the names of people that was presented by Kemal Oksuz, the initial draft of people that I  
25 mentioned the names of Jim Messina, Plouffe, White and many other non-legislative  
26 people that were discussed there and the Ambassador was making his own  
27 recommendations being invested.

28 MR. SOLIS: You said non-legislative. How did you know it was non-legislative?

29 WITNESS: Because they were... I was asking or they were mentioning that this person is  
30 and that's how I recall that. They mentioned their positions like I don't really know those  
31 people as well.

1 MR. SOLIS: Did anybody say you know, we're talking about inviting these people there,  
2 not members of Congress or Senators, did – was there a discussion about the fact that  
3 they weren't?

4 WITNESS: I don't recall anyone making the distinction.

5 MR. SOLIS: We'll go back to – I had asked you about Kemal's role at the convention,  
6 you said he was the point person, was... is it your understanding he was the sole person  
7 who was responsible for the logistics of getting everybody to Baku? All the Americans?

8 WITNESS: He was the only person that I know was responsible for coordinating the trip.

9 MR. SOLIS: Who attended the convention, now I know a lot of people did so you don't  
10 have to name them all, but generally who was there?

11 WITNESS: There were legislators, Congressmen and Congresswomen from United  
12 States Congress, there were State Senators and State Representatives. There were think-  
13 tank people; I don't recall anyone specifically, but experts on Azerbaijan, on energy  
14 issues, on Eurasian energy issues and then the names that I mentioned that was discussed  
15 in that meeting.

16 MR. SOLIS: Who organized the convention to the best of your understanding? Was it  
17 like a stated organizer, someone who was helping themselves out to be the organizer of  
18 the convention?

19 WITNESS: I don't exactly know who was the, whether there was only sole organizer of  
20 the event; I know that SOCAR contributed by providing some of the facilitation and  
21 being the gold sponsor. That's my only knowledge about the event.

22 MR. SOLIS: Do you know if SOCAR pitched in for you know hotels, or for  
23 transportation between meetings in Baku, do you know if SOCAR spent any money on  
24 the invitees, the Americans, to move them around in Baku at all?

25 WITNESS: I don't have any knowledge about SOCAR spending money on those  
26 expenses because I wasn't involved in the process.

27 MR. SOLIS: If I... read off some names of some organizations here, sort of business  
28 entities or non-profit entities who I think may have attended, just tell me whether they  
29 attended and what you know about them.

30 WITNESS: Okay.

31 MR. SOLIS: The Turkic-American Federation of Midwest? Do you know what that is?

- 1 WITNESS: I've heard the name; I don't recall whether they... someone from the  
2 organization has attended.
- 3 MR. SOLIS: Okay, well what do you recall about the name or how did you come to  
4 know the name?
- 5 WITNESS: There are similar organizations mentioned in there; mainly Turkic  
6 Federation of Americans and Eurasians and it just rings a bell that you know there were  
7 several organizations and you know my knowledge about those organizations are based  
8 again, post-inquiry period where I actually tried to understand what is the relation and I  
9 understand to my knowledge they were the trip sponsors. This was organization who  
10 signed documents for pre-trip and post-trip.
- 11 MR. SOLIS: But at the time of the convention, you were aware of their name, but didn't  
12 know what role they had?
- 13 WITNESS: I had very blurred information about them besides I knew the name of the  
14 names of these organizations, some of them actually.
- 15 MR. SOLIS: Do you know who Suleyman Turhan is?
- 16 WITNESS: Suleyman?
- 17 MR. SOLIS: Suleyman Turhan?
- 18 WITNESS: I don't know who the person is.
- 19 MR. SOLIS: Okay. The Turkic-American Federation of the Southeast?
- 20 WITNESS: No. Again, this is knowledge based on the after trip.
- 21 MS. ESINER: Do you know who Cemil Teber is?
- 22 WITNESS: Cemil Teber? Yes. Cemil... I knew him... almost as the same time as I know  
23 Kemal. As to my knowledge, they used to work together in Houston.
- 24 MR. SOLIS: In what capacity did they work together?
- 25 WITNESS: I don't exactly know, but I've seen them together and I'm assuming that he  
26 might worked for TCAE.
- 27 MS. EISNER: Did you see him at the convention?
- 28 WITNESS: I don't recall exactly, but I know him personally.
- 29 MR. SOLIS: Does he come to Baku often, Mr. Teber?

- 1 WITNESS: I recall seeing him in Baku, I don't exactly recall whether it was in 2013  
2 event.
- 3 MR. SOLIS: The Council of Turkic-American Associations? Do you know what that is?
- 4 WITNESS: Again, it rings a bell and again it's post-inquiry period knowledge.
- 5 MR. SOLIS: Mr. Kosar? Furkan Kosar?
- 6 WITNESS: Furkan Kosar, yes, I know him.
- 7 MR. SOLIS: You know him? How long have you known him?
- 8 WITNESS: Maybe two years? Two-three years?
- 9 MR. SOLIS: How are you – how did you come to know him?
- 10 WITNESS: I know him through Kemal.
- 11 MR. SOLIS: Through Kemal? And you met him in Baku or the United States?
- 12 WITNESS: I met him in the United States.
- 13 MR. SOLIS: The Mid-Atlantic Federation of Turkic-American Associations?
- 14 WITNESS: Again, didn't know exactly about the organization before the convention.  
15 My knowledge is based on the after-inquiry.
- 16 MR. SOLIS: Mahmut Yeter? Does that name –
- 17 WITNESS: I know him.
- 18 MR. SOLIS: You know him?
- 19 WITNESS: Yes.
- 20 MR. SOLIS: How long have you known him?
- 21 WITNESS: Since I got to the United States.
- 22 MR. SOLIS: And how did you come to know him?
- 23 WITNESS: He was with Kemal Oksuz... when I first landed in United States as in the  
24 capacity of SOCAR representative and he helped me out with accommodation.
- 25 MR. SOLIS: With documentation?
- 26 WITNESS: Accommodation.

- 1 MR. SOLIS: Oh, accommodation.
- 2 WITNESS: Finding the place to stay – I think he’s based in this area, in Virginia area so  
3 that’s how I know him.
- 4 MS. EISNER: Do you know what the purpose is of the organizations, the four  
5 organizations that Paul just listed?
- 6 WITNESS: I don’t know exactly their function or purpose.
- 7 MR. SOLIS: I mean they all have Turkic in the names and you know we’ve spoken to  
8 these people and you know they have interest in Turkey and representing Turkish-  
9 Americans here and people from Turkey who are not living in the United States, you  
10 know, why would these organizations focus on Turkey, why would they have a... why  
11 would they be coming to Baku in Azerbaijan, do you know?
- 12 WITNESS: Turkic actually means Turkic nations, not the Turkey itself so that’s... that  
13 would be their... their logic probably. You probably interrogated them and they would  
14 give comprehensive answer about their activities or about their functions, but you know  
15 being from a Turkic nation, speaking the Turkic language, I can tell you that this you  
16 know, the name Turkic means actually the Turkic nations and there are many of them.
- 17 MR. SOLIS: Turkic people?
- 18 WITNESS: Yes. There’s Azerbaijan, there’s Central-Asian countries, they speak the  
19 different dialogue of Turkish language.
- 20 MS. EISNER: Do you have any sense of how they’re funded, these organizations?
- 21 WITNESS: I don’t know.
- 22 MS. EISNER: Do they have members?
- 23 WITNESS: Members as...
- 24 MS. EISNER: Anyone who’s a member of the organization, people who pay dues to be  
25 members of the organizations?
- 26 WITNESS: I don’t know.
- 27 MR. SOLIS: We touched upon Caspian Drilling. I believe it’s Caspian Drilling  
28 Company Limited? A little bit earlier, you know, what do you know about that entity?
- 29 WITNESS: The involvement of that entity, indirect involvement of that entity in AFAZ  
30 or direct involvement of that entity was AFAZ, but my knowledge about it was again, at  
31 the end of the March, I was checking the bank account of AFAZ and that was only time I

1 checked it and I saw their transfer from Caspian Drilling to AFAZ and I saw logo of  
2 Caspian Drilling on AFAZ along with many other oil, gas companies in the event.

3 MR. SOLIS: So, after you took a look at the bank statements, after our review began you  
4 know, you said you noticed a transfer to AFAZ from SOCAR, you know a transfer of  
5 money, and you also noticed a transfer of money from Caspian?

6 WITNESS: That's true. Caspian Drilling.

7 MR. SOLIS: Caspian Drilling Company. What amount was that?

8 WITNESS: As I mentioned before, the amount from SOCAR was almost around  
9 \$750,000.00. I don't recall exact number from Caspian Drilling.

10 MR. SOLIS: And there was another entity who had supplied funds as well, correct?

11 WITNESS: Those were the two I remember from my –

12 MR. SOLIS: You mentioned MI Drilling.

13 WITNESS: MI Drilling, yeah.

14 MR. SOLIS: Is that – is Azeri MI Drilling?

15 WITNESS: I guess it's... that was Azeri MI Drilling.

16 MR. SOLIS: Okay. And they also had contributed some money around that time to  
17 AFAZ?

18 WITNESS: I know both these companies working in Azerbaijan. I don't exactly  
19 remember which one was there that I noticed so; I'm almost confused on those two  
20 companies so that's basically my big confusion. My inclination it was Caspian Drilling.

21 MR. SOLIS: Does Caspian Drilling Company have a relationship with SOCAR?

22 WITNESS: SOCAR main office, yes. They're contractors and they always guest projects  
23 in Azerbaijan and SOCAR is the participant of those projects.

24 MR. SOLIS: BP? Was BP at the convention? Or representatives of BP at the  
25 convention?

26 WITNESS: I didn't see any representative of BP. I saw the logo BP.

27 MR. SOLIS: What about McDermott?

28 WITNESS: Again, I didn't see any representative of McDermott, but I saw the logo.

- 1 MR. SOLIS: KBR?
- 2 WITNESS: The same thing.
- 3 MR. SOLIS: MI-SWACO? Same?
- 4 WITNESS: MI-SWACO. Yeah.
- 5 MR. SOLIS: MI-SWACO. Conoco-Phillips?
- 6 WITNESS: Same.
- 7 MR. SOLIS: Chevron?
- 8 WITNESS: Same.
- 9 MR. SOLIS: You saw Chevron's logo?
- 10 WITNESS: If I recall correctly, I saw those logos there.
- 11 MR. SOLIS: Okay. I ask you that because you know, we've been looking into this stuff  
12 for a while and there's some doubt as to whether or not Chevron actually was there or  
13 whether their logo was present and whether they actually took a place in sponsoring so,  
14 just wondering if you recall at all...
- 15 WITNESS: I don't possess the exact knowledge, whether Chevron was actually there. I  
16 remember BP, I remember McDermott, MI-SWACO, and Caspian Drilling, I'm not even  
17 sure about KBR, but I... if my memory doesn't tell me wrong I mean, I think KBR's logo  
18 was there and this is based on the initial observation which took place two years ago.
- 19 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Who paid for the convention? You know, generally.
- 20 WITNESS: Who paid for... exactly for what?
- 21 MR. SOLIS: You know, the food, the drinks that were there, the space where the  
22 convention was held –
- 23 WITNESS: I wasn't involved in the process of the financing of the convention.
- 24 MR. SOLIS: Do you generally know either before or after how it was paid for?
- 25 WITNESS: Generally about the convention?
- 26 MR. SOLIS: Yeah, the convention.
- 27 WITNESS: I don't... I don't really know. I'm not involved in the process.

1 MR. SOLIS: But since you've had the chance to since our review and you've had a  
2 chance to look at documents and all that, have you come to be aware of how it was paid  
3 for?

4 WITNESS: I remember that there was a contract between SOCAR and AFAZ. That's the  
5 only contract I remember that took place.

6 MS. EISNER: In your capacity as treasurer of AFAZ, did you get a sense of how the  
7 convention was paid for?

8 WITNESS: I wasn't active as a treasurer of AFAZ. My... my affiliation would-- in that  
9 responsibility, my only activity and responsibility was voting for... for the allocation of  
10 those expenses and I think there was one more, probably voting, I don't recall exactly  
11 what was the content and my activity about AFAZ as treasurer, in the capacity of  
12 treasurer, was almost close as zero.

13 MR. SOLIS: And you just referenced this, this should be a familiar document then. Do  
14 you recognize this? This is SOCAR\_0000001.

15 WITNESS: This document, I first acquaint -- got acquainted with this document when we  
16 were in the process of provision this document.

17 MR. SOLIS: Okay. You never heard about this agreement or saw this agreement during  
18 the time of the convention or before the convention?

19 WITNESS: No, I haven't.

20 MR. SOLIS: If I can draw your attention to this article 1... 1.2 at the bottom.

21 WITNESS: Okay.

22 MR. SOLIS: It says, "the total cost of the convention is \$750,000.00 U.S. dollars; the  
23 funding should cover accommodation, traveling expenses, venue rental and all other  
24 expenses and fees" you know, that \$750,000.00 is that... does that represent... do you  
25 think that amount that you saw in the AFAZ bank account?

26 WITNESS: It's exactly the same amount of \$750,000.00 that I recall seeing in the bank  
27 account of AFAZ which I checked maybe 15-20 days ago.

28 MR. SOLIS: And again, this is an agreement entered into as of May 6, 2013 between  
29 SOCAR and AFAZ. I probably already know the answer to this, but I'll ask anyway. At  
30 the bottom of the section I just read, "Accommodation, traveling expenses, venue rental  
31 and all other expenses and fees" do you know what accommodation means in the context  
32 of how it's used here?

1 WITNESS: I wasn't involved in the process of signing this contract. The contract was  
2 signed, as you see, by... between CEO of the company of SOCAR and the CEO of...  
3 president of SOCAR and president of AFAZ. I wasn't involved in this signing process; I  
4 was not aware of the contract before... before the inquiry. The only time I saw the  
5 contract was when our legal department send me and told me about the existence of the  
6 contract.

7 MR. SOLIS: Okay. If I could just draw your attention to he last page. It's an attachment.  
8 It's SOCAR\_5. Again bear in your mind, you didn't have anything to do with the  
9 creation of this agreement, but you know it reads, "Proposed budget for the convention"  
10 and then the bottom it says, "Total" and that is \$1,500,000.00; I assume it's U.S. dollars.  
11 Either bef... either at the time of the convention or now, since our review, do you – have  
12 you come to understand why there's a difference between that \$750,000.00 that was set  
13 to be given to AFAZ and this \$1.5 million for the budget, do you know if those numbers  
14 – why those numbers are different?

15 WITNESS: I don't know.

16 MR. SOLIS: Have you come to know later on since we've, since you've taken part of  
17 this review?

18 WITNESS: I haven't learned anything new.

19 MS. EISNER: You mentioned that you became familiar with this document during your  
20 review and this is a document that was produced by SOCAR, and you know we also got a  
21 separate production from SOCAR-USA for the purposes of our request, did you, you  
22 know, how did you become familiar with this document, if these documents were  
23 produced separately?

24 WITNESS: I was helping SOCAR main office in coordinating as... stand admissible are  
25 represents SOCAR and SOCAR-USA being the same entity as SOCAR, it's not a  
26 different entity, but since the inquiry was sent to other addresses, we felt like we should  
27 cooperate and since my involvement was different from SOCAR's involvement, so we  
28 provided our documents first and then... since the document, this letter, reached to Baku  
29 in Azerbaijan very late, we... I corresp – in the process of coordinating the provision of  
30 the documents from the legal department of SOCAR.

31 MR. MISSNER: And we asked them to review them.

32 WITNESS: Yeah and then I went through and reviewed them. There was some  
33 documents in Azerbaijani local language, I was helping... given the shortest of time.

1 MR. SOLIS: I have another document here. This is SOCAR\_00001356. Same set of  
2 questions you know, do you have an understanding of where this document comes from  
3 or what it is?

4 WITNESS: I recall seeing this document after the inquiry throughout the process of  
5 provision the document.

6 MR. SOLIS: And you hadn't seen this at the time of the convention in 2013?

7 WITNESS: No, I haven't.

8 MR. SOLIS: Okay, this is the International Bank of Azerbaijan Republic. There is, if  
9 you'll see a little bit way down there on the right hand side, this \$750,000.00, which and  
10 it looks like to be a transfer from SOCAR to the Assembly of Friends of  
11 Azerbaijan... dated May 13, 2013. Do you believe that this \$750,000.00 – do you believe  
12 this is the actual transfer from the bank of Azerbaijan? The government bank to AFAZ?

13 WITNESS: The only thing that I can mention about this, this is the exact same number  
14 that I saw in the bank account of AFAZ, about the transfer from SOCAR to AFAZ.

15 MR. SOLIS: And you'll see that next to the number 57 there is Wells Fargo Bank.  
16 Would that be the same bank that you referenced earlier about that AFAZ has?

17 WITNESS: That's correct.

18 MR. SOLIS: And because you know, because the State Oil Company of Azerbaijan  
19 Republic is mentioned here, but at the top this is the International Bank of Azerbaijan  
20 Republic; I can assume that you know the government of Azerbaijan is making this  
21 expenditure on behalf of SOCAR or in SOCAR's name. I mean is that... would that be a  
22 fair characterization?

23 MR. MISSNER: That's a bank.

24 WITNESS: It's just a bank.

25 MR. MISSNER: It's where... SOCAR banks.

26 MR. SOLIS: Okay.

27 WITNESS: It has private share –

28 MR. MISSNER: It's like saying Bank of America.

29 MR. SOLIS: Okay, so it's not a government's bank. It's just a private bank?

1 WITNESS: It's 50%...50 point some percent belongs to government, but it has private  
2 share holders. It's another bank that government has a share of. It's just another bank we  
3 use among other banks.

4 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Good to know, I didn't know that. Alright. I want to show you  
5 this... this is also from the production that you provided to our office. This is  
6 SOCAR\_0000007 through –

7 MR. MISSNER: I'm waiting for you to stop saying 0. You're getting there.

8 MR. SOLIS: I decided to just give it up. From 7 to 12. Do you recall this document;  
9 what can you tell me about this document?

10 WITNESS: The only time I saw that document was – throughout the provision of the  
11 documents for the inquiry, for the review.

12 MR. SOLIS: You didn't take part in the creation of this agreement?

13 WITNESS: No, I wasn't.

14 MR. SOLIS: Okay. What is Practical Solutions Group?

15 WITNESS: My knowledge about Practical Solutions Group is very limited. I saw their  
16 name here throughout the process and I recall seeing their logo in the event as well.

17 MR. SOLIS: Do you know people who work there, or affiliated with Practical Solutions  
18 Group?

19 WITNESS: Uhm... I know that Irada Akhoundova is also manager of Practical Solutions  
20 Group, United States. That's the only person I know that works for Practical Solutions  
21 Group.

22 MR. SOLIS: And what does that company do?

23 WITNESS: I don't know.

24 MR. SOLIS: You don't know? Given that – I mean how long have you know Irada?

25 WITNESS: I've known Irada for almost... the same... 2-3 years, but in the capacity of the  
26 head of the Azerbaijan Center and Baku sister-cities.

27 MR. SOLIS: And also, she sits on the board of AFAZ, correct?

28 WITNESS: And the board of AFAZ, yes.

29 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Given all those circumstances where you would come to interact  
30 with her, has she ever talked about Practical Solutions Group?

1 WITNESS: What I recall... I don't recall exactly before the inquiry, the after the inquiry  
2 I recall her mentioning that she has received this same letter from the OCE.

3 MR. SOLIS: I mean... does she ever say what the company does?

4 WITNESS: We have never discussed what Practical Solutions Group from United States  
5 was doing.

6 MR. SOLIS: Do you have any understanding, any awareness either at the time of the  
7 convention or now based on publicly available information or any type of information, do  
8 you have any awareness of what Practical Solutions Group in Azerbaijan or United  
9 States, what they do?

10 WITNESS: The only information that I have about Practical Solutions Group regarding  
11 to this event is based on this contract and... as I see from the contract, they have provided  
12 some services.

13 MR. SOLIS: Do you know if they were paid by SOCAR?

14 WITNESS: I don't exactly have the information about that.

15 MS. EISNER: For the services that they were asked to provide, was there any discussion  
16 at the meeting that you had, I guess it was in April of 2013, of those services and who  
17 would be providing them?

18 WITNESS: Are you referring to the board direc –

19 MS. EISNER: I'm referring to the meeting with –

20 WITNESS: Ambassador?

21 MS. EISNER: With the Ambassador, yes.

22 WITNESS: For the record, I don't exactly remember the month of the event, so I don't  
23 know whether it was in April, but... I don't recall Practical Solutions Group  
24 mentioning... being mentioned in that event.

25 MS. EISNER: Were the services that Practical Solutions Group was contracted to  
26 provide mentioned at the event?

27 WITNESS: I don't recall.

28 MR. SOLIS: We're nearing the end here. I'll give you a copy of that. This is also a  
29 document that you produced to our office; it is SOCAR\_some 0's 1209. It's an email  
30 chain. And if you look at the bottom there, you see your name about three lines down  
31 there?

- 1 WITNESS: That's correct.
- 2 MR. SOLIS: And that's your Gmail address?
- 3 WITNESS: That's correct.
- 4 MR. SOLIS: And this is an email, April 10, 2013.
- 5 WITNESS: That's correct.
- 6 MR. SOLIS: Who is aes@azembassy.us?
- 7 WITNESS: That's a uhm... the email for the embassy... I can only assume from the  
8 abbreviation, it could be Ambassador Elin Suleymanov from AES. I don't know exactly  
9 whose email is that.
- 10 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Could that be the Ambassador? That could've been an email from  
11 him?
- 12 WITNESS: That's what I said. AES might be Ambassador Elin Suleymanov who is the  
13 current Ambassador.
- 14 MR. SOLIS: Do you recall receiving this email back then in April?
- 15 WITNESS: I don't recall it, but I was aware of the email when I was... throughout the  
16 provision of the documents.
- 17 MR. SOLIS: And I'm not familiar with the language there next to your name. Is that a  
18 CC?
- 19 WITNESS: Which one?
- 20 MR. MISSNER: He wants to know what that means.
- 21 WITNESS: That's CC.
- 22 MR. MISSNER: That's copy.
- 23 WITNESS: CC.
- 24 MR. SOLIS: Okay.
- 25 WITNESS: That's in Russian, CC.
- 26 MR. SOLIS: In Russian?
- 27 WITNESS: Yes.

- 1 MR. SOLIS: Okay. So that's from aes@azembassy.us to Kemal Oksuz and then you are  
2 CC'ed?
- 3 WITNESS: That's correct.
- 4 MR. SOLIS: I want to make sure I get this name right; is this Xalik?
- 5 WITNESS: Xalik.
- 6 MR. SOLIS: Xalik Mammadov?
- 7 WITNESS: That's correct.
- 8 MR. SOLIS: Who is that?
- 9 WITNESS: That's the Vice – he's Vice President of SOCAR.
- 10 MR. SOLIS: Was he the person who was at that meeting?
- 11 WITNESS: That's correct.
- 12 MR. SOLIS: With Kemal, you and the Ambassador?
- 13 WITNESS: That's correct.
- 14 MR. SOLIS: And Elshad Mesarauf?
- 15 WITNESS: He's also Vice President.
- 16 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Was he at that meeting?
- 17 WITNESS: He was not.
- 18 MR. SOLIS: Okay. It says, "Kemal Bae" – what does Bae mean?
- 19 WITNESS: Mister.
- 20 MR. SOLIS: Mister? "I spoke to Congressman Fortenberry – NE, Bustani – LA, and  
21 Mark Meadow – NC. AESP Bustani are interested in visiting Azerbaijan, can you extend  
22 an invitation to them for the convention?" Do you know if Kemal extended an invitation  
23 to these people?
- 24 WITNESS: As you can see from the thread, I was not CC'ed in the email. The following  
25 emails, I don't recall what happened to the fate of this email, whether they were  
26 eventually invited, where... I don't even recall whether they attended the event.
- 27 MR. SOLIS: Did you follow up with a phone call to any of the individuals on this email?

- 1 WITNESS: I did not.
- 2 MR. SOLIS: So you got this email and...you were copied so you didn't make any follow  
3 ups on it?
- 4 WITNESS: Ambassadors sending email to Kemal Oksuz, copying me and  
5 then... copying the two vice presidents, that was the... this email was the only email that I  
6 received, I recall receiving from them.
- 7 MR. SOLIS: If you wouldn't mind, the email up above that, I know you're not on it, but  
8 if you could translate that for me.
- 9 WITNESS: Oh, okay. So it's from Vice President Mammadov sent to Tamer  
10 Mammadov who's the person responsible was responsible for immigration invitations,  
11 liaison with immigration department of Azerbaijan. And Rufat Zamanov who you will be  
12 interviewing, he's now the head of the protocol department. I don't recall exact his  
13 position back then.
- 14 MR. MISSNER: He doesn't want to be on the phone?
- 15 WITNESS: Yes. And it means consider... and rush...? I don't know... wait. Yeah,  
16 consider and rush it. Expedite. Expedite would be the correct translation.
- 17 MR. SOLIS: Okay. And that's, "best regards KH.M" is that an abbreviation for his  
18 name?
- 19 WITNESS: Yeah. The pronunciation of Xalik is KH.
- 20 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Xalik Mammadov... best regards, Xalik Mammadov. Okay.
- 21 WITNESS: Then Tamer Mammadov goes on with the email, follow up email to Kemal  
22 and that's all English.
- 23 MR. SOLIS: Yes. Okay. The you know, your recollection of around that time in getting  
24 people together, you know you mentioned that there was this meeting at AFAZ's office  
25 with the Ambassador and Vice President –
- 26 WITNESS: I don't recall the exact location of that meeting.
- 27 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Generally speaking, was the Ambassador involved in asking about  
28 the convention, you know recommending invitations, things like that?
- 29 WITNESS: Like I said, I wasn't involved in the process of the organization or planning  
30 of the event.
- 31 MS. EISNER: How would the Ambassador have had your email address?

1 WITNESS: We communicate... he's the Ambassador of the country; I'm the  
2 representative for the company... of the biggest company in the country, so we  
3 communicate. And he does have my email; he has had it since I came to United States.

4 MR. SOLIS: Other than this email and that meeting that I've been referring to, are there  
5 any other circum – any other times that you can recall where the Ambassador was talking  
6 about the convention, or in any way referencing the convention?

7 WITNESS: I recall only that event and I didn't even recall... remembering this email  
8 when I saw it when we were providing the documents. That's the only time that... that  
9 rings a bell.

10 MR. SOLIS: Let me show you the last document here. This is not a production from you.  
11 It is labeled NIL\_0075. If you look at the top there, you'll see Tursan Travel Corp. Do  
12 you see that name?

13 WITNESS: That's correct.

14 MR. SOLIS: Do you know what Tursan Travel Corp. is?

15 WITNESS: My only knowledge about Tursan Travel Corp. that I acquired was... again,  
16 when I was checking the bank account and checking whether and when I saw that... that  
17 transfer from SOCAR and then below that line, it was another transfer... probably was  
18 next day transfer from AFAZ to Tursan Travel. That was the – I don't exactly remember  
19 the number, I think it was almost \$450,000.00 and that was the only time... first time that  
20 I saw the name and I googled it and it turned out to be travel company.

21 MR. SOLIS: Have you ever spoken with anybody who works there?

22 WITNESS: No.

23 MR. SOLIS: So I'll draw your attention to... let's see 1, 2, 3...

24 WITNESS: What date?

25 MR. SOLIS: Yeah the 5/16... the... yeah 5 lines down. There's a figure of \$378,452.00  
26 and that's Wells Fargo Bank, Assembly of Friends of Azerba - Houston, Texas. Does that  
27 figure mean anything to you? That \$378,000.00?

28 WITNESS: I don't recall the exact number, but the... after when I was checking the  
29 inquiries and checking the numbers and there was only time that this bank account  
30 AFAZ, I saw the name Tursan Travel and that was probably one or two days after the  
31 transfer from SOCAR to AFAZ and the number was almost the... around that number, I  
32 don't exactly remember the exact number.

- 1 MR. SOLIS: So you didn't make the expenditure?
- 2 WITNESS: I personally was not involved in that.
- 3 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Who would have made the expenditure then?
- 4 WITNESS: The only person that has an access besides me is Kemal Oksuz.
- 5 MR. SOLIS: But you would've been part of the vote to make the expenditure.
- 6 WITNESS: According to the by-law I was supposed to be aware and there was supposed  
7 to be a signature of me for that transition.
- 8 MR. SOLIS: And did you provide a signature?
- 9 WITNESS: I did vote for travel expenses based on that email, I did not have my  
10 signature. In fact, I Never had the... I don't recall having a signature of me for the AFAZ  
11 payments more than \$25,000.00.
- 12 MR. SOLIS: Did that bother you that you didn't have a sign – that you didn't provide  
13 your signature?
- 14 WITNESS: First of all I had no idea about that transition so...
- 15 MR. SOLIS: The transition or transaction?
- 16 WITNESS: The transaction, sorry.
- 17 MR. SOLIS: I mean did that bother you that you had no idea about the transaction? Were  
18 you upset by that?
- 19 WITNESS: I'm a professional... I don't get upset by those stuff, but it was surprising.
- 20 MR. SOLIS: Why was it surprising?
- 21 WITNESS: Because I didn't know about it.
- 22 MR SOLIS: So what I'm trying – what I'm understanding is that Kemal made this  
23 transfer of money without your signature...
- 24 WITNESS: Without my signature.
- 25 MR. SOLIS: Did you talk to him about that?
- 26 WITNESS: No, I haven't. In fact... Kemal wrote us email, by us, I mean... I remember  
27 me and Irada in the beginning of 2015 about dissolution of board of directors of AFAZ.
- 28 MR. SOLIS: I'm sorry and when was that?

- 1 WITNESS: About this – that was 20...I think January 2015.
- 2 MR. SOLIS: Okay.
- 3 WITNESS: And when I checked it in February, I asked him about the document when I  
4 received that inquiry to provide the exact correct information about my current status in  
5 AFAZ, I asked about the document of dissolution about AFAZ; he failed to provide that,  
6 so officially I'm still on the board of AFAZ.
- 7 MR. SOLIS: Okay. So...you haven't seen any documentation about the dissolution?
- 8 WITNESS: I have not.
- 9 MR. SOLIS: But is it possible that there is dissolution of the board?
- 10 WITNESS: In our email chain, and the reason because we didn't provide that email  
11 chain is because it was irrelevant to the convention, he said that he actually said that...that  
12 the AFAZ board was not dissolved.
- 13 MR. SOLIS: Okay.
- 14 MS. EISNER: Did he give a reason for wanting to dissolve the board?
- 15 WITNESS: To form a new board.
- 16 MR. SOLIS: And did he say who he wanted to put on the board?
- 17 WITNESS: He did not mention any names.
- 18 MR. SOLIS: Okay. So...you had no conversation at all, any time with Kemal about your  
19 lack of signature on that expenditure?
- 20 WITNESS: I have not had any conversation with Kemal in that regard.
- 21 MR. SOLIS: Either in email, phone, in person?
- 22 WITNESS: I don't recall talking about this particular issue with Kemal.
- 23 MR. SOLIS: Did you talk to anybody else either at AFAZ or anybody about Kemal  
24 making this expenditure without your signature?
- 25 WITNESS: I recall talking to my... to SOCAR, to legal department of SOCAR, let them  
26 know that I'm still in the board of AFAZ.
- 27 MR. MISSNER: That was recent? This discussion?
- 28 WITNESS: Yes. And I had no idea about that transaction.

1 MR. SOLIS: Okay. So that recent conversation you talked about not knowing about this  
2 transaction?

3 WITNESS: Yes, with my colleagues in legal department of SOCAR that you will be  
4 interviewing.

5 MR. SOLIS: And why did you – why did you talk to the legal department of SOCAR  
6 about this issue?

7 WITNESS: First of all, they're... they were also assuming that I was in the board of  
8 SOCAR, of AFAZ and to let them know that I am not ... I'm still in the board of AFAZ  
9 and also going through the documents and...

10 MR. MISSNER: Did you mean to say that you were no longer on the board of AFAZ  
11 and then you were telling them that you thought you were off, but in fact you were not?

12 WITNESS: Yes. That's correct. And... and then I accessed the bank account and was  
13 informing them that there was a transaction of the amount that you have mentioned so it  
14 was informative call.

15 MR. SOLIS: When you went and checked the bank account after our review had began,  
16 did you talk to Kemal about going into the bank account?

17 WITNESS: I have not.

18 MR. SOLIS: Okay. So you... just the two of you have access to the account?

19 WITNESS: To my knowledge, yes.

20 MR. SOLIS: So you went and checked it and you didn't speak with him about that?

21 WITNESS: No, I have not.

22 MS. EISNER: In your review of the bank account, did you uncover any other instances  
23 where expenditures were made without your signature?

24 WITNESS: This particular time frame was not in our line bank account so I had to  
25 access through the bank itself and I had requested specially, 2013, May. I think there was  
26 like April to June time frame to look at the... maybe there are other expenses; these were  
27 the only that I recall.

28 MR. SOLIS: And that's sort of along the lines of the next question is, when you went  
29 and took a look at it, were there any other expenditures you know, I'll say it this way.  
30 Was there any other activity in the bank account besides the money coming from SOCAR  
31 and then the money going out to NIL travel? Was there any other activity? On any AFAZ  
32 bank account?

- 1 WITNESS: What travel? Did you say NIL?
- 2 MR. SOLIS: Yeah, I'm sorry. The Tursan Travel Group.
- 3 WITNESS: Uhm...I don't recall anything else. There were like \$150 something...I don't  
4 exactly know the exact name in front of it, but the big numbers were SOCAR transfer to  
5 AFAZ and AFAZ transfer to Tursan.
- 6 MR. SOLIS: That remaining amount of money then, there would've been there, roughly  
7 maybe \$300,000.00? Right? \$750,000.00 in, \$400 and some thousand dollars out?
- 8 WITNESS: Again, there was another transaction that I'm confused whether it was  
9 Caspian Drilling or MI Drilling, so... that was the only...that was two transactions in and  
10 the one I remember out, was Tursan Travel.
- 11 MR. SOLIS: So to date, at least as far as you know, the last time you checked the  
12 account, which would've been this year after our review had started, there's still a few  
13 hundred thousand dollars left in the account?
- 14 WITNESS: I don't recall... again, that was the only time I checked it. First time, only  
15 time I checked it and I don't exactly recall what amount is left still there.
- 16 MR. SOLIS: Last series of questions. Did guests of the convention receive gifts?
- 17 WITNESS: I don't have any knowledge about that.
- 18 MR. SOLIS: Did you receive a gift for attending the convention?
- 19 WITNESS: I did not.
- 20 MR. SOLIS: Did you overhear anybody saying they got a gift in any capacity?
- 21 WITNESS: I don't have that knowledge.
- 22 MR. SOLIS: It's come to our attention that a lot of attendees received rugs, Azerbaijani  
23 rugs, so I don't know if that... does that help jog your memory as to whether or not you  
24 recall somebody saying they got a rug or you saw rugs at the convention?
- 25 WITNESS: There are Azerbaijani rugs for this convention...I see them everywhere. I  
26 don't recall anyone giving as a gift, a rug to any person.
- 27 MR. SOLIS: What about honorarium or giving people money to speak at the  
28 convention? Do you know if that happened?

1 WITNESS: I don't recall. I don't even recall about Valerie Biden, whether she has  
2 received or not. Because that was the only person who I was... somehow affiliated with  
3 coordinating, partially.

4 MR. SOLIS: You mentioned you got an email in January of 2015 from Kemal talking  
5 about dissolution of the AFAZ board, right?

6 WITNESS: That's correct.

7 MR. SOLIS: Did you respond to that email?

8 WITNESS: Uh... I don't recall. I might respond as noted or okay. I don't exactly recall  
9 whether I responded or not.

10 MR. SOLIS: And then you received... you did not receive any other communication  
11 informing you that the board had been dissolved.

12 WITNESS: Not -- I haven't received any communication; I don't recall any  
13 communication regarding the dissolution of AFAZ board and the only conversation... that  
14 I recall was initiated by me when I asked about the dissolution, official documentation for  
15 dissolution of the board after I received inquiry from OCE.

16 MR. SOLIS: And when did that happen?

17 WITNESS: Uhm... it was February... 20... around 20's, maybe before that. Maybe  
18 sometime between February 10<sup>th</sup> and February 20<sup>th</sup>.

19 MR. SOLIS: Of this year?

20 WITNESS: 2015.

21 MR. SOLIS: And that was an email to Kemal?

22 WITNESS: That's correct.

23 MR. SOLIS: And then you said you saw him in March.

24 WITNESS: I saw him in February 25<sup>th</sup> in the event in the Congress organized by AFAZ  
25 and I also saw him in the event in March 20<sup>th</sup> again in the event organized by AFAZ.

26 MR. SOLIS: And that event in March was that in D.C.?

27 WITNESS: That was in Mayflower Hotel in D.C. The March event.

28 MR. SOLIS: And when you say organized by AFAZ, did you have any role in that?

29 WITNESS: I have not been involved in any of these two projects... events.

- 1 MR. SOLIS: But you attended the event?
- 2 WITNESS: I did attend the event.
- 3 MR. SOLIS: Both events?
- 4 WITNESS: Yes.
- 5 MR. SOLIS: So who would've been responsible for getting that together? Kemal?
- 6 WITNESS: Kemal Oksuz.
- 7 MR. SOLIS: Okay. So... January 15<sup>th</sup> email, February roughly between 10<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> of  
8 February email back asking about documentation, February 25<sup>th</sup> event and then in March  
9 event... are those the only four times this year that you've communicated with Kemal  
10 Oksuz?
- 11 WITNESS: These are the ones that I recall... exactly that I communicated in the content  
12 of communication.
- 13 MR. SOLIS: The February 25<sup>th</sup> event that you saw him at, did you talk to him?
- 14 WITNESS: It was... everybody was just standing there watching. I came late; I said... I  
15 remember saying hi. I don't remember discussing anything particular with him.
- 16 MR. SOLIS: What about the March event?
- 17 WITNESS: I just said hi and he... I didn't talk to him at all.
- 18 MR. SOLIS: Have you ever discussed with him the OCE's review?
- 19 WITNESS: I have not.
- 20 MR. SOLIS: Have you ever discussed with him... any issues related to AFAZ's role in  
21 regards to the convention since the convention happened?
- 22 WITNESS: I don't recall anything particular.
- 23 MR. SOLIS: Okay. Do you recall anything in general?
- 24 WITNESS: No.
- 25 MR. SOLIS: Okay. I think that's all the questions we have for you, WITNESS. Thank  
26 you very much.
- 27 WITNESS: I hope I was helpful.
- 28 MR. SOLIS: Yes, very much.

# **TRANSCRIPT OF INTERVIEW OF SOCAR LEGAL COUNSEL 1**

4/13/15

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Solis: This is Deputy Chief Counsel Paul Solis with the Office of Congressional Ethics. It is April 13, 2015. I'm joined by Omar Ashmawy, John Missner, Ed Myers and SOCAR Legal Counsel 1. Close enough. SOCAR Legal Counsel 1 has signed an acknowledgement that I've provided him with a copy of 18 U.S.C. § 1001. We can begin the interview. SOCAR Legal Counsel 1, where is your current employment?

Witness: I am Senior Legal Counsel at legal department of State Oil Company of the Azerbaijan Republic. My major work is focused on international projects of SOCAR, providing legal support of various kind of international projects. I've been at SOCAR for the last four years.

Solis: Who do you report to?

Witness: Reporting system in our company has several layers. First person to report is head of legal department, [inaudible] is also with us. Part of our litigation. We also report on different areas to vice presidents of SOCAR based on areas they are responsible for. SOCAR has up to ten vice presidents. Based on the specification of projects and area and field, we report to them as well. We also have CEO of SOCAR, president, who is in charge of overall governance, but there is no direct reporting to him. We are reporting to head of legal and then to vice president.

Solis: You said international projects is where you work?

Witness: Yeah.

Solis: Could you describe a little bit more about what that means? The types of things that you do working in that-

Witness: SOCAR, five or six years ago, adopted a policy of expansion of its activities in Europe and other countries with an objective becoming international company. As a part of this objective, there have been different divisions set up within SOCAR responsible for supporting of this objective.

As part of this, SOCAR is currently involved in different kind of oil and gas related activities like refinery industry, retail, sale of petroleum in Europe. I can count up to ten or fifteen countries where SOCAR is dealing with refinery, retail, sale of petroleum products. As part of this, legal department, supporting let's say, representatives of SOCAR or subsidiaries of SOCAR in all its jurisdictions, with contracts, with any kind of documents needed from Baku ... We are like back office support of local offices all over the world. Major focus is Europe and some Asian countries.

1 Solis: The convention in 2013, this US-Azerbaijan vision for the future, it was called,  
2 that SOCAR was a sponsor of, would that fit into this category of international  
3 projects?

4 Witness: It's a part of missions that SOCAR has according to its charter. SOCAR has a duty  
5 not only to contribute to development of petroleum industry in Azerbaijan, but  
6 also has some social oriented duties and tasks.

7 Solis: Would you say that again? Social ...

8 Witness: Social oriented. Because SOCAR is state owned company, by the nature of its  
9 governance, SOCAR always interested and engaged in social projects, cultural  
10 projects, educational projects aimed at spreading the realities, truth about  
11 Azerbaijan. Promoting its culture, it's history. It includes supporting of events,  
12 both in Azerbaijan and all over the world. It's a part of social overall mission as a  
13 state-owned company.

14 SOCAR is the biggest company in Azerbaijan. It's the biggest player in Azerbaijan  
15 economy. It has this kind of duty to promote overall policy of Azerbaijan  
16 government to increase, to enhance social welfare in Azerbaijan, education,  
17 culture, to promote our history all over the world. Coming back to your question,  
18 this fits with the mission that's put in SOCAR's charter.

19 Solis: On that point, what is the relationship between SOCAR and the Azerbaijani  
20 government?

21 Witness: SOCAR is owned by state of Azerbaijan, so it's 100% state owned company.  
22 Unlike other commercial companies, SOCAR has not disclosing or distributing any  
23 dividends to the state. Instead, SOCAR is investing its revenues into this kind of  
24 social projects in Azerbaijan. SOCAR has been active in all major social projects,  
25 cultural projects in Azerbaijan, starting from sports events, concerts, cultural  
26 events. SOCAR is a major sponsor, supporter of all kinds of these projects in  
27 Azerbaijan. Again, I say SOCAR's status is a bit like sui generis status within in the  
28 corporate law of Azerbaijan because it's not commercial entity, not like state  
29 body. It's a commercial entity owned by state which engage in a lot of social  
30 projects and the like, trying to cooperate with the state. It contributes to state's  
31 mission.

32 Solis: When there's a decision made by the company, does the government have  
33 decision-making capabilities? Does the president weigh in on decisions by  
34 SOCAR?

35 Witness: No. SOCAR has a clear-cut governance structure, set out in its charter. Decision-  
36 making is always made within SOCAR. It's by president of SOCAR. It's vice

1                   presidents. SOCAR has different parties within SOCAR like counsel of SOCAR,  
2                   comprising of vice presidents plus president. It has different sub-committees  
3                   within SOCAR responsible for different kind of issues. Decision-making is always  
4                   internal issue of SOCAR.

5   Ashmawy:       Who appoints the president of SOCAR?

6   Witness:        President of Azerbaijan.

7   Ashmawy:        Does the President of Azerbaijan appoint any of the other officials?

8   Witness:        Yes, both president and all vice presidents.

9   Ashmawy:        All the vice presidents?

10   Witness:        Yes. They are appointed by decree of Azerbaijan, which are all public documents,  
11                   available on website.

12   Solis:           Do you know if there's anybody, any executives or any employees who currently  
13                   work at SOCAR who also serve in government currently? Who have dual roles?

14   Witness:        SOCAR's president also holds position of member of parliament in Azerbaijan.  
15                   Because of the regulation, according to our constitution, member of parliament  
16                   cannot hold another paid job. That's why the president of SOCAR, he's not  
17                   getting any kind of remuneration. Again, his position is member of parliament  
18                   and CEO of SOCAR.

19   Solis:           Do you know if SOCAR has currently any US based entities conducting lobbying  
20                   activities in the United States that engage them in any kind of contractual  
21                   agreement?

22   Witness:        Not to me. SOCAR has a representative office in USA, which is active from 2012.  
23                   In relation to being ... Nothing.

24   Solis:           What about a foreign agent? Do you know what a foreign agent is?

25   Witness:        Better-

26   Solis:           Okay. We have a law in the United States whereby certain activities, people  
27                   would have to register as a foreign agent of a foreign principal. Meaning a  
28                   foreign principal is engaging in activities, and they want to have somebody that  
29                   represents their interests to members of Congress and the executive branch. I'm  
30                   wondering if you know if SOCAR has engaged anybody in a contractual  
31                   agreement to conduct those types of activities in the United States.

1 Witness: I'm not sure that ... SOCAR has a non-profit organization in the USA called AFAZ.

2 Solis: We'll get to that in a moment.

3 Witness: A founding member, but in terms of contractual arrangements for conducting  
4 government activities, I cannot recollect anything.

5 Solis: The next thing I wanted to do is actually discuss AFAZ and some other  
6 organizations that maybe you're aware of. First I want to ask you about an  
7 individual, Kemal Oksuz. Do you know who that person is?

8 Witness: Yes.

9 Solis: How long have you known Mr. Oksuz?

10 Witness: From 2013.

11 Solis: 2013?

12 Witness: Yeah.

13 Solis: When is the last time you had a communication with Mr. Oksuz?

14 Witness: I'm trying to recollect. It was not recently. It was maybe a year ago, but I'm not  
15 sure of exact day. In recent months we have no-

16 Solis: Have you met him in person?

17 Witness: No, never.

18 Solis: Again, to the best of your understanding and experience, what does Mr. Oksuz  
19 do for a living? What is his job?

20 Witness: To the extent that ... Back in 2013, actually, when we first communicate with  
21 him, I had no knowledge about him. I think he's like ... that he's chairman or  
22 president at AFAZ, non-profit organization which SOCAR founded in USA. Also,  
23 he's chairman or I don't know, CEO or something, key person in company, in  
24 some Turkish organizations, I think, active in the USA with different kind of-

25 Solis: You said a Turkish organization?

26 Missner: Turkic or Turkish? Turkish would be the country of Turkey. Turkic would be the  
27 region.

1 Witness: Honestly, I'm not sure about the exact affiliation, but I think they have some kind  
2 of Turkey-related element. A lot of knowledge about his, let's say, most of  
3 knowledge about his activities came known to me in the course of collection of  
4 all these documents for submission to your office. It's been known to me that he  
5 was the key person responsible for organization of this convention.

6 Also, he holds a position in AFAZ. In this capacity, SOCAR is founding member of  
7 AFAZ. We found out a letter from him addressed to SOCAR requesting support  
8 for this convention. What he is doing for a living, I don't have whole information  
9 about it. I think he's engaged in a kind of event organizations, holding different  
10 kinds of events. Professionally doing it I assume.

11 Solis: Back in 2013 when you first became aware of him, did anybody at SOCAR talk to  
12 you about who he was and what he did?

13 Witness: No, because of SOCAR's internal structure, all the assignments, tasks and  
14 instructions came down to the legal department for execution, for  
15 implementation. It was a chance to review the background about why it's done  
16 and what's rational and who is this. We have been given instruction to draft the  
17 contract sponsorship agreement between SOCAR and AFAZ. That's the only  
18 context that I knew about him and his role in this convention.

19 Solis: Either back in 2013, all the way out to now, based on the submission of  
20 documents you provided our office and the information you've become aware of  
21 as you've helped produce information to us, what is Mr. Oksuz's relationship to  
22 SOCAR? Does he have a formal relationship? An informal relationship?

23 Witness: There is nothing known to me which would allow me to state that he's somehow  
24 formally or anyhow dealing directly with SOCAR. As I said, he's a CEO, a president  
25 of a non-profit organization, which SOCAR is the only founding member. In his  
26 capacity as per charter of AFAZ, he's responsible for reporting AFAZ activities and  
27 so on. Also again, in the context of this convention, I see he send a request to  
28 SOCAR for providing sponsorship to AFAZ, but nothing besides this that would  
29 allow me to assume any kind of formal relationship with SOCAR like official  
30 relationship.

31 Solis: Do you know how he became to be the CEO or president of AFAZ? Was he  
32 appointed?

33 Witness: I think when AFAZ was first set up in 2012, I think, the decision was ... How the  
34 decision was made, but as per AFAZ charter, it would be six or seven board  
35 members which all in parallel hold the position of different officers of the  
36 company. He was appointed to board and concurrently he was holding position

1 of officers, chief executive officer alongside with other board members also  
2 holding different offices.

3 Ashmawy: Just for my clarity, for the charter for AFAZ has, that its officers have to be  
4 officers of SOCAR?

5 Witness: No.

6 Ashmawy: No?

7 Witness: Not as far as I remember, there's no such kind of requirements that only SOCAR  
8 officers should hold position in AFAZ.

9 Solis: You mentioned that the board members at AFAZ are appointed. Who are they  
10 appointed by?

11 Witness: The founding member.

12 Solis: By SOCAR?

13 Witness: I think there was a kind of resolution on foundation or board resolution which  
14 was made back in 2012. That was kind of appointments were made or 2013.  
15 Because I remember that the duration of their responsibilities is two years. They  
16 should expire in 2015. It takes me back to 2013 I think when they were  
17 appointed. Honestly, I don't remember exactly the name of the resolution,  
18 whether it was board resolution or resolution of founding member. All the  
19 appointments were made at the time of formation of this organization.

20 Solis: Who appointed the board members?

21 Witness: I think it was founding member, SOCAR.

22 Solis: Did you take part in the establishment of AFAZ?

23 Witness: Not me, no.

24 Solis: No?

25 Witness: I was not engaged in how any kind of documentation from SOCAR's side for AFAZ  
26 resolution.

27 Solis: What is the mission of AFAZ? What does it do? What is it supposed to do?

1 Witness: AFAZ was established to promote the kind of friendship and cooperation  
2 between Azerbaijan and USA, contributing to the promotion of cultural,  
3 educational relationships and promoting Azerbaijan in USA and USA in  
4 Azerbaijan. It's kind of contributing to USA's interest in Azerbaijan, and  
5 Azerbaijan's interest in USA. It's kind of, as its name suggests, it's simply friends  
6 of Azerbaijan and USA. The mission is part of SOCAR's, as I say, general social  
7 mission to spread the reality, truth of Azerbaijan: history, culture, education  
8 abroad.

9 Solis: How are decisions made at AFAZ? When there is a decision to be made to help  
10 promote the cultural connection between the US and Azerbaijan, who takes part  
11 in those decisions? Does SOCAR have a –

12 Witness: As far as I remember, AFAZ board is independent by their... has very broad tasks  
13 to decide on. All their limited issues are left for founding members, decisions like  
14 discretion. Most decisions are made by board of AFAZ.

15 Solis: Okay. You said there's limited times that the founding member, which is SOCAR,  
16 gets to make a decision. That does happen?

17 Witness: I think there have been no decision between formation and now of SOCAR as a  
18 founding member of AFAZ. As far as I reviewed AFAZ documents available to us,  
19 and developed our records, there's been no such decisions. I reviewed AFAZ's  
20 charter. It puts very limited powers on founding members, such kind of change  
21 to amendments to charter, appointment of new board members after expiration  
22 of their duty, and general types of power, like two to three major power. All the  
23 ongoing daily activities and decision-making shall be made the board.

24 Solis: Who works at AFAZ besides the board? Does it have employees?

25 Witness: I don't have information about it.

26 Ashmawy: You said that you had some AFAZ documents related to AFAZ available to you.  
27 Which documents were you able to review?

28 Witness: I reviewed its charter, certificate of registration, and the documents about first  
29 appointments of board members.

30 Ashmawy: What else?

31 Witness: In terms of documents I think that's all which are available at SOCAR in Baku  
32 which had been provided at that time because we were founding this company.  
33 After 2013 and up to now there have been no documents coming out from AFAZ  
34 to us. That was a lack of information.

1 Ashmawy: You said that you don't think there had been a decision made so far by the  
2 founding member, by SOCAR. What documents did you review that gives you  
3 that opinion?

4 Witness: What gives me this opinion is actually the lack of documentation because I have  
5 not found anything suggesting that SOCAR made any kind of decision in the  
6 meantime.

7 Solis: How does AFAZ get its funding? How does it receive money to do its work?

8 Witness: I think as per charter it's entitled to member dues and so on. I know that back in  
9 2013 there had been some sponsorship contributions, sponsorship requests  
10 from AFAZ. SOCAR, among other companies, provided sponsorship to AFAZ. How  
11 it's been financed in the meantime, 2014 or 2015, is not known to me.

12 Ashmawy: I understand that SOCAR was the founding member. SOCAR is currently the only  
13 member?

14 Witness: Yeah.

15 Solis: Do you know who Rauf Mammadov is?

16 Witness: Yeah, he's the director of SOCAR's representative office in Washington, D.C.

17 Solis: Does he have a role at AFAZ?

18 Witness: Actually, yes. I revealed this recently when I started reviewing AFAZ documents. I  
19 think he's the treasurer at AFAZ.

20 Solis: Do you ever talk to him about AFAZ?

21 Witness: I talked to him in 2013 when we were in the process of providing sponsorship,  
22 logistics of sponsorship and so on. There have been no formal, official  
23 communication about AFAZ and so on.

24 Solis: I want to show you a document here. [inaudible] This is SOCAR 16. Have you  
25 seen this document before?

26 Witness: Yeah. Actually, I found out this document during this document collection  
27 process for submission.

28 Solis: Had you seen this back in 2013?

1 Witness: Back in 2013, I don't actually remember whether it was a part of the assignment  
2 for drafting this sponsorship agreement. I think it was just an assignment as  
3 such, because when these kinds of requests are made to SOCAR, it goes directly  
4 to SOCAR so-called sponsorship committee, which is responsible for making  
5 decisions on sponsorship, material aid, financial aid or other kind of aid to  
6 requesting parties. I think it went directly to this committee.

7 Solis: I want to point you to the bottom there where it says, "Assembly of Friends of  
8 Azerbaijan, together with the Turquoise Council of Americans and Eurasians will  
9 serve as the sole organizer at the convention." Do you know what the Turquoise  
10 Council of Americans and Eurasians is?

11 Witness: I think back in 2013 my knowledge was limited to the fact that it's the co-  
12 organizer of the event. During the last two or three months, after your request  
13 for providing information and documents, I reviewed and apparently this was  
14 one of the key organizers, key parties engaged in organization of this convention.  
15 Also known to me, is it's a council, organization established in USA. It's engaged  
16 in different kinds of social, cultural event organizations.

17 Solis: Bearing in mind that you don't think you saw this letter at the time it was  
18 written, correct? You think it went to a sponsorship committee?

19 Witness: I'm trying to memorize it. As I told back in 2013 there was an instruction to us,  
20 the legal department, to draft a contract. When we need to start, when we can  
21 draft a contract, we need to see a kind of internal approval of SOCAR, which is  
22 approval of sponsorship committee because it comes to us. Probably it was a  
23 part of package of approval sponsorship committee, but I don't clearly memorize  
24 it, but most probably it was part of our supporting, package supporting  
25 instruction to draft a contract.

26 Solis: Do you know who works at Turquoise Council? Who is affiliated with that  
27 organization?

28 Witness: No. I know that Kemal Oksuz is involved in key positions there, but besides this, I  
29 don't know anyone or anything about them.

30 Solis: Again, given that you may have seen this document back in 2013 when it was  
31 presented as part of the instruction to draft an agreement between AFAZ and  
32 SOCAR, what was your understanding, to the best that you can recall, of the  
33 difference between AFAZ and TCAE, if there was one?

34 Witness: I'm trying to remember what would be the difference. Because again, when the  
35 instructions came to our department to draft some kind of sponsorship  
36 agreement, it's supported by all kinds of internal approvals. We are not in a

1 position and not always engaged in making any kind of background check or who  
2 are these guys receiving money and requesting money. Because it's something  
3 improved internally by committee, there is nothing to be suspicious about  
4 anything. We just go ahead and draft contract.

5 Solis: Do you know if AFAZ and TCAE, Turquoise Council, are related in any way?

6 Witness: To the extent known to me, not, because if AFAZ would be somehow related  
7 with them, it would be reflected in documents of AFAZ. To the extent known to  
8 me, they are not have formal affiliation.

9 Solis: Do you know if they share the same bank account or share finances?

10 Witness: Honestly, I have no information about financial issues of AFAZ.

11 Solis: Do you know what Tursan Travel Corporation is?

12 Witness: Tursan Travel?

13 Solis: Yes, it's T-U-R-S-A-N, Tursan Travel. Also, it goes by the NIL, N-I-L, NIL Travel.

14 Witness: No. Honestly ... It says nothing to me.

15 Solis: Never heard of the names?

16 Witness: In the context of ... Is it somehow related to AFAZ?

17 Solis: Well, it's not in that document. I'm just asking you generally if you've ever heard  
18 of those names?

19 Witness: I think Tursan Travel Agency is ... I heard it somewhere, but I don't remember. Is  
20 it somehow related to AFAZ in the context of convention or after this ... Is it a  
21 travel agency in USA, maybe Turkey?

22 Solis: Why do you say that?

23 Witness: Tursan, they are very like limited ... I cannot recollect clearly anything about  
24 Tursan Agency as being in the USA or in Turkey, but I think it's the travel agency  
25 who maybe somehow works with Turquoise or AFAZ. I don't know. Honestly, I  
26 don't have any documents or evidence which would suggest me or allow me to  
27 support it.

28 Solis: Okay. Then, I understand you don't have any documents or evidence. You said  
29 you think it might be-

1 Witness: Because Tursan is such a generic Turkish word, you know? It's translated like  
2 Turkish benefit, something like this. That's why I assume it may be somehow in  
3 this context it's affiliated. I don't have any clear information about their  
4 involvement in all this stuff.

5 Solis: Okay. You don't have a clear-

6 Witness: I'm sorry to interrupt-

7 Solis: Let me ask the question. You don't have a clear understanding of how they relate  
8 to AFAZ or to the convention. But do you have some idea, based on  
9 conversations you overheard or have been a part of, on what Tursan Travel  
10 does?

11 Witness: No, because it's a problem of providing this information is that AFAZ has not  
12 provided any kind of reports to its founding member from 2013 and up to now.  
13 When we started collecting this kind of information, in your request there was a  
14 mentioning of AFAZ also and its role in convention and interaction with other  
15 organization. When we started reviewing AFAZ folder in SOCAR, we found out  
16 it's very, very, very limited information, reports on its activities, on its function,  
17 what it's engaged in. Whether it was engaged in a kind of other events after  
18 2013 or up to now. That's why we are short of clear information and knowledge  
19 about AFAZ.

20 After these issues all came out, we probably conduct internal review of AFAZ in  
21 the future, auditing of its activities for information up to now. What was  
22 revealed at the time of collection of information was very limited knowledge  
23 about AFAZ activities. AFAZ's role in other organizations, maybe it was organized  
24 another event, another problematic event or something.

25 Coming back to your question, honestly, I don't recollect any clear discussion or  
26 any indication to Tursan. Something, you know, that I heard somewhere, but I  
27 don't clearly recollect whether it was in this context or in other context.

28 Solis: Well, at least as it seems to us, we think, you know we've talked to lots of people  
29 and we've gotten lots of documents from different organizations. The Turquoise  
30 Council and AFAZ seem to have paid a certain amount of money to Tursan Travel  
31 to then purchase airfare for many travelers to the convention in Baku. Now that I  
32 tell you that, does that help possibly, does it help you recall whether or not they  
33 had a role? Or a conversation you might have overheard where they were  
34 involved in that conversation?

35 Witness: No. Paying for all tickets to-

1 Solis: Yeah, for a lot of travelers. State, local, federal, government.

2 Witness: I have no information about any, about this, which this organization paid for this  
3 travel or what the amount or for whom. Honestly, I don't have any information  
4 about it.

5 Solis: Well, let's move on to the convention in 2013. When did you first hear about the  
6 convention?

7 Witness: Actually, at the time when we started drafting this sponsorship agreement.

8 Solis: Who would have talked to you about it? Who would have given you the  
9 instructions to draft the sponsorship?

10 Witness: The instructions come from head of legal department. When instructions come  
11 we're all looking for internal approval, as I told. It's important, internal approval  
12 of this support was made by sponsorship committee of SOCAR based on the  
13 request.

14 Solis: Did you attend the conference, the convention?

15 Witness: No.

16 Solis: You didn't?

17 Witness: No.

18 Solis: What was SOCAR's role at the convention?

19 Witness: At the time, in 2013 actually, I had no information about it, but recently when we  
20 get this request from you, we started reviewing. Actually, we sent this document  
21 preservation office internally, and we started talking to our protocol department  
22 which is a major unit within SOCAR responsible for supporting event  
23 organizations and so on. It came out that support of SOCAR's big role in  
24 Azerbaijan and society, in industry and so on, SOCAR was always and is always  
25 ready to assist any party who is holding an event, organizing anything as  
26 Azerbaijan or outside of Azerbaijan, but which is serving to Azerbaijan's interest  
27 and which corresponds to the mission set out in SOCAR's charter.

28 It came to my knowledge that SOCAR's protocol department assisted event  
29 organizers in different manners in order to facilitate, assist the organization of  
30 events for example with visa support, support of SOCAR's policy to provide visa  
31 support to any party, both in industrial issues, partners or in social projects

1 coming to Azerbaijan. SOCAR sends a request to migration service in Azerbaijan  
2 for provision of fast track visa authorizations for parties at the airport in Baku.

3 SOCAR sent a lot of letters to this migration authority in Azerbaijan, requesting  
4 the support people coming to Azerbaijan. Also, I think SOCAR assisted event  
5 organization. That's what we revealed again in the course of document collection  
6 or production. SOCAR coordinated activities with other sponsors of events, also  
7 another big players in oil and gas industry in Azerbaijan, like BP and others, and  
8 encouraged them to support financially also, to join SOCAR in sponsoring the  
9 event.

10 The protocol department was active in assisting and was ready to assist in any  
11 manner that they could event organizers, knowing that these guys are based in  
12 the USA they may not be informed the whereabouts local immigration, visa,  
13 migration regulations or any other applicable regulations.

14 Solis: Do you know whose idea it was to start the convention and the person or group  
15 of people who first came up with the idea to have the convention?

16 Witness: To the extent that can I can judge based on all the production, all the documents  
17 available to me, it was the joint idea of the event organizers, Turquoise and  
18 AFAZ. I can't see any kind of, again, internal document of AFAZ or anything which  
19 would support that AFAZ board made this decision or founding member made  
20 this decision. What's seen for me, based on the available documents, it was AFAZ  
21 and Turquoise's initiative which again was supported by SOCAR because it  
22 perfectly fit SOCAR's social mission.

23 Solis: We've talked about AFAZ, and as far as you know, we've said there's only one  
24 employee. It seems to be Kemal Oksuz.

25 Witness: Also I can say now is Rauf is the treasurer.

26 Solis: Right. He's on the board, and he's treasurer. That's correct. Turquoise Council,  
27 you said, correct me if I'm wrong, you said you thought that Kemal Oksuz had a  
28 role with Turquoise Council. You didn't know if anybody else worked there,  
29 right?

30 Witness: No, I don't know anyone back in 2013. Even now, I don't know anyone from  
31 Turquoise. At this stage, to the extent known to me that he was key person and  
32 president or CEO of Turquoise Council. He has like dual position in AFAZ and  
33 Turquoise.

34 Solis: I asked you whose idea was it, about a person or a group of people. You said it's  
35 a joint decision of AFAZ and Turquoise Council.

1 Witness: It's not like my knowledge of the facts that it's a joint decision. What I can  
2 assume based on the fact that they are mentioned in all requests for sponsorship  
3 as event organizers. Also I reviewed the convention on internet and so on. Main  
4 organizers are AFAZ and Turquoise.

5 Solis: Is this Kemal Oksuz's idea to have this convention?

6 Witness: I don't know how in Turquoise decision-making is made, but within AFAZ there  
7 was no other decision or no other approval of the event. Perhaps within AFAZ he  
8 was the only person active or involved from AFAZ side. Not sure about Turquoise  
9 Council side.

10 Solis: Would he have just come to SOCAR and said, "I'm going to have this convention.  
11 I want to have this convention in Baku. Would you like to sponsor it?" How  
12 would SOCAR become first engaged?

13 Witness: SOCAR, as I told, is very, very interested in supporting this kind of event. He was  
14 supporting before this event and continued doing it all over the world,  
15 supporting this kind of events, conventions, seminars and so on. Would Kemal  
16 request any kind of support, I mean, assistance where corporation provides  
17 financial support and also organizational support in terms of visa and so on.  
18 SOCAR was ready and prepared to assist in any manner possible to make this  
19 convention happen.

20 Solis: Did you know at the time in 2013 that members of Congress from the United  
21 States House of Representatives, United States Senate would be present at the  
22 convention?

23 Witness: Not in 2013. Of course, of recent months, yes. Now I know that, but not in 2013.

24 Solis: What is the Turkic American Federation of the Midwest? You heard of that name  
25 before?

26 Witness: Midwest?

27 Solis: No, never heard the name?

28 Witness: I don't know.

29 Solis: Turkic American Federation of the Southeast?

30 Witness: Same.

31 Solis: Council of Turkic American Associations?

1 Witness: [inaudible].

2 Solis: Mid Atlantic Federation of Turkic American Associations?

3 Witness: [inaudible].

4 Solis: What about Furkan Kosar? You heard of that name?

5 Witness: Once again?

6 Solis: Furkan Kosar.

7 Witness: No. That's the first time I heard this name.

8 Solis: You mentioned that SOCAR reached out to some other sponsors, companies for  
9 potential sponsorship. Who would that have been? Would that have been BP?

10 Witness: It would have been, at the time, again, I'm just always noting this. At the time I  
11 didn't know exact list of companies. What I found out recently is that there was  
12 BP, I think KBR, ConocoPhillips, McDermott, I guess, and Chevron. If I'm not  
13 mistaken, because all these companies are active in Azerbaijan. They have joint  
14 ventures and partnership with SOCAR. SOCAR is in position to coordinate with  
15 them, joint support of this kind of events. SOCAR's partnership with these  
16 companies also include always provision saying that partners will be jointly  
17 supporting.

18 Solis: Be as specific as you can be. What payments did SOCAR make for this  
19 convention? We're going to get into the amount of money that documents seem  
20 to show that was transferred from SOCAR to AFAZ. Outside of that, what other  
21 payments did SOCAR make for of the convention?

22 Witness: What our internal investigation revealed is that the only actual financial, let's  
23 say, contribution of SOCAR, where it went, was this direct sponsorship. Besides  
24 this, again, we sent all these requests internally to our financial department, our  
25 protocol department. Nothing was revealed allowing us to assume that SOCAR  
26 made any other kind of direct payments to any party engaged in this event  
27 organization. SOCAR's dealing, in terms of financial support, was AFAZ only.

28 Solis: What about hotels for convention attendees?

29 Witness: Yes. That issue which came became known to us recently when requesting our  
30 protocol department, and head of protocol department also I think will have a  
31 chat with you. He told us that they found out some contracts with two hotels, I  
32 think. It was Hilton and either Four Seasons or Park Inn in Azerbaijan. I think he'll

1 know better, which are main, let's say, partners, main partners which SOCAR has  
2 worked with in the context of big events.

3 SOCAR has discounted rate agreements with these hotels. Apparently in 2013,  
4 May, SOCAR also had this kind of contract with either both of them or one. I  
5 think it was Hilton definitely, but I'm not sure about the second one, about  
6 discounted tariff.

7 This contract, when reviewed by us, revealed nothing saying about convention. It  
8 was not made for supporting event organization of convention. Apparently it  
9 was made in order to have an arrangement with SOCAR hotel, which might be  
10 needed. How it works in fact that SOCAR makes this arrangement with hotels. If  
11 these rooms are used, SOCAR pays for them and makes settlement at the end of  
12 event.

13 In May, because SOCAR had three major events, its oil and gas exhibition, this  
14 convention and a public statement in May 28th, which also events with big  
15 representation. We made a request to our financial department. Apparently no  
16 payment was made under this contract specifically for this convention. No  
17 payment made from SOCAR under this agreement was made for the rooms used  
18 for the convention.

19 Solis: You can say that for certain that you know for certain that there's been no  
20 payments for the hotels?

21 Witness: There has been payment to hotels, but on the report saying with hotel and  
22 SOCAR saying that why is this payment made, there was no payments made  
23 specifically for the convention. The rooms used for delegations of –

24 Solis: It doesn't say specifically that a payment was made for the convention, but that  
25 doesn't mean that the money may not have been spent to house people in  
26 hotels for the convention?

27 Witness: That's exactly the point that I'm trying to make is that money spent on the hotels  
28 for housing people, they're not for people attending the convention. That was  
29 for people attending other events.

30 Ashmawy: Were those events held at the same time as the convention?

31 Witness: Exactly. Republic's Day event was 28th of May, I think, which directly coincides  
32 with this convention. Another event was the start of June. It was oil and gas  
33 exhibition, attending up to 500 people in Baku. Settlement with hotels was in the  
34 middle of June after all the events had completely finished. When revealed is  
35 report or statement, settlement with hotels, we found out that the payments got

1 from SOCAR were not allocated to support, to house people attending the  
2 convention. It was for other two events.

3 Ashmawy: The other two events were before and after the convention?

4 Witness: Yeah.

5 Solis: They both would have been after the convention.

6 Ashmawy: National Day.

7 Witness: National Day, Republic Day is 28th of May.

8 Solis: Right. This happened around the 23rd, 24th of May, this convention.

9 Ashmawy: There was a National Day celebration held.

10 Witness: I think the convention was 28th and 29th.

11 Solis: 28th and 29th? I'm mistaken.

12 Ashmawy: Here's ... More direct in my question, did the people attending the National Day  
13 and the exhibition also attend the conference?

14 Witness: I can't say it for sure because the number is very high.

15 Ashmawy: About many hotel rooms were paid for?

16 Witness: I don't remember the figures, the figures and amounts. I remember, let's say, the  
17 explanation of payments, seeing the delegation for exhibition, delegation for  
18 Republic Day, but nothing paid for delegation attending the convention.

19 Solis: In the production that you gave to our office, we have a lengthy list of Excel  
20 spreadsheets with many, many convention attendees, and specifics about hotel  
21 rooms. That came from SOCAR. We think at least that there was at least  
22 knowledge of the types of rooms people wanted, about preferences and  
23 specifics, the days that they were going to be staying. That came from SOCAR.

24 Witness: My understanding why SOCAR was in this distribution list and was informed  
25 about this kind of hotels because, as I told, SOCAR was active in assisting event  
26 organizers in logistics, for example, and maybe exactly numbers, where these  
27 people will stay would be needed maybe for visa purposes or the purpose of  
28 taking people from hotel to event, venue of event, or making all kind of other

1 formalities, but not for sure SOCAR paid exact, that this spreadsheet was made  
2 in order for SOCAR pay each of the room.

3 It's for sure what was confirmed by our internal review saying that SOCAR's  
4 contract with Hilton was type of another contract with hotels which we always  
5 do before big events. We always do before sports events or cultural events in  
6 Azerbaijan. We just give them the arrangement. Once needed, these rooms are  
7 used, and then paid for.

8 Ashmawy: I know you said that you don't know exactly how many rooms or the precise  
9 numbers. More than 200?

10 Witness: I can't say this.

11 Ashmawy: Again, to be direct, it seems to me the National Day celebration was part of the  
12 agenda for the conference. It seems to me that it's very possible that people who  
13 had attended the National Day celebration also attended the conference.  
14 Perhaps the internal designation saying that the hotel rooms were for National  
15 Day may not be entirely accurate. They may also have been for the conference.

16 Witness: I can't say anything for sure about it. Even after this convention, 2014 and not in  
17 2015, we held this National Republic Day event in Baku. We always do this. We  
18 did this before the event. We kept doing it after this event. I cannot say that it  
19 was designated to be part of this convention. It's definitely separate event which  
20 always supported by SOCAR, by state office of Azerbaijan. I think back in 2013,  
21 even it was anniversary 85 years. Now, numbers like 85, 90 years always are paid  
22 more attention.

23 Solis: Would members of the protocol department who we're going to speak with  
24 today, would they know about that issue about spending money for hotels?

25 Witness: I think yes, yes.

26 Solis: They would?

27 Witness: Actually, they came to us with the information that this maybe raises an issue  
28 because it coincides in time with this convention. This definitely made us to  
29 review all these contracts to make sure that we provided correct information to  
30 you in terms of how SOCAR supported this. As I told, SOCAR is very much  
31 interesting in assisting in any manner possible, both you and other parties, to  
32 make sure that this kind of events are proper organized and nothing, no breach  
33 of regulation is made.

1 Solis: I want to show you this. This is numbered SOCAR 1 through 5. I think this is the  
2 agreement that you spoke about earlier, right? That you took a role in drafting?

3 Witness: Yeah.

4 Solis: You do remember. You've not only seen this before, you actually took a part in  
5 the creation of this document.

6 Witness: Yes, I did.

7 Solis: Was it you alone or did other people assist you?

8 Witness: A colleague of mine from legal department was also present.

9 Solis: Elvin?

10 Witness: Yeah.

11 Solis: The two of you drafted this.

12 Witness: Yes, we did.

13 Solis: I want to direct your attention to the bottom: Article 1, 1.2. "Based on the  
14 agreed budget, incorporated here as attachment I, for this project by the parties,  
15 the total cost of the convention is 750,000 US dollars." Do you know where that  
16 figure came from, that \$750,000?

17 Witness: I think it's based on the request of SOCAR. The instruction which came to legal  
18 department was to draft contract with this amount. This is the amount approved  
19 by the mentioned internal sponsorship committee at SOCAR.

20 Solis: Then it says the funding shall cover accommodation, traveling expenses, venue  
21 rental and all other related expenses and fees. Given that you and your  
22 colleague, the ones who drafted this, you should definitely be able to tell me  
23 what does accommodation mean in this agreement?

24 Witness: It's obviously the accommodation for members of delegation coming from USA,  
25 so it's probably for housing, for hotel expenses of the guests of the event. I'm not  
26 sure whether it was only for guests coming from USA or other guests, but my  
27 understanding is guests attending the convention.

28 Solis: Going back to our questions a moment ago about hotels. Does that clear up any  
29 missing information that you might have or does this help give you a better  
30 picture of whether SOCAR appropriated money specifically for hotel expenses?

1 Witness: Actually, the idea of SOCAR, how the sponsorship agreement was in SOCAR  
2 works like there should be some kind of indication and knowledge of what this  
3 sponsorship money goes for. It's in accordance with SOCAR anti-corruption and  
4 transparency rules saying that if you provide sponsorship to anyone there should  
5 be some indications in the agreement. It's a contract saying, showing the  
6 spending, how this money will be allocated.

7 I think that that's in line with this requirement, but obviously there was no kind  
8 of reporting or any kind of knowledge after this agreement how actually the  
9 money was used, it was used and allocated. That's again, big problem coming  
10 from the lack of reporting from AFAZ to SOCAR. Which does not allow us to say  
11 how this money was actually used by AFAZ. In order to be in line with our  
12 internal regulation, we always made this and are making this provision in  
13 material and financial aid and sponsorship agreement saying that it's made for  
14 the purpose of this and that.

15 Solis: This language is similar to language you've used in other agreements?

16 Witness: It's similar to language that we used in all sponsorship agreements and financial  
17 aid agreements. Also, in the course of production and overall submission of  
18 documents, our knowledge was that hotels for the guests were paid by event  
19 organizers. That's our assumption, let's say.

20 Solis: Wait for the train to go. What about traveling expenses? What does that mean  
21 on the first page?

22 Witness: Sorry. Tickets and probably transportation to Azerbaijan, I assume.

23 Ashmawy: To be clear, tickets you mean airfare?

24 Witness: Yeah.

25 Solis: Did you view this as ... What type of agreement would you view this as? Is this a  
26 contract where AFAZ gets to provide some sort of service to SOCAR in order to  
27 get the money? Or is it more like a grant?

28 Witness: It's obviously how it's qualified within SOCAR and how it views sponsorship and  
29 financial aid agreement based on the request and made to support this event,  
30 which is in line, as I told, with SOCAR's overall mission and objectives in  
31 Azerbaijan. It's a financial support agreement.

32 Solis: Can I direct you to the next page: Article 3, 3.2, under responsibilities of the  
33 beneficiary. "The beneficiary shall regularly consult and engage in discussions

1 with selected representatives of the sponsor throughout the duration of the  
2 convention.” Who are the selected representatives of the sponsor?

3 Witness: Majorly it is protocol department who was, again, engaged in supporting. Also I  
4 think division for supporting is migration services. Visa support within  
5 investment department at SOCAR also was assisting in this specific area of visa  
6 support. Majorly who is in charge from SOCAR side is the protocol department.

7 Solis: When that “responsibilities of the beneficiary” section is added, again, judging by  
8 your experience drafting these types of agreements, does that mean that AFAZ  
9 had to do this, to regularly consult and engage in discussions with  
10 representatives of SOCAR in order to get the money? Was there a condition that  
11 they satisfied before they got the money?

12 Witness: No. If you go online on SOCAR's website, you will see this contract as a template.  
13 This contract was made a small change change the template contracts used  
14 within SOCAR. When making sponsorship contributions we try to make sure in  
15 advance that, just in case, we keep for ourselves some degree of possibility or  
16 controls that if something wrong arise, to request the recipient to provide report  
17 or consult with us. Again, it was not specifically made for this contract. This is a  
18 general type of provision that we always use, both for logo and for consulting  
19 with the sponsor.

20 Solis: I'm going to show you the last page of attachments. Did you draft this  
21 attachment as well?

22 Witness: No. It's something which came to us as part of, let's say, information on how the  
23 convention will go on and the financing breakdown. I think just told us now that  
24 the overall cost of convention is higher than [inaudible] sponsor.

25 Solis: Do you know if this document was created at SOCAR, if this attachment was  
26 created at SOCAR?

27 Witness: No. I don't know whether it was created within SOCAR or came from event  
28 organizers. I assume maybe it can be attached to this request letter, but I'm not  
29 sure. It says nothing about it.

30 Solis: Okay. Move on to this. This is SOCAR 7 through 12. Do you recognize this  
31 document?

32 Witness: Yes, I do.

33 Solis: Did you help to create this document?

1 Witness: No. Actually, I was in the tender procedure within SOCAR. It's a procurement of  
2 services within SOCAR. It's a long procedure after this in specific companies  
3 selected and contract is made, for procurement of services. I was in charge of  
4 this procedure, but exact drafting of this contract was not my work.

5 Solis: What is Practical Solutions Group?

6 Witness: Practical Solution Groups, let's say, obviously the biggest and major partner of  
7 SOCAR in Azerbaijan, which cooperates with SOCAR in very broad areas, starting  
8 from legal consulting, event organization, auditing, financial services and so on.  
9 This company was selected as a result of tender procedures, as a result of  
10 procurement of services. So far we cooperated with them in so many occasions  
11 that I can't remember the number of them.

12 They are company with many office worldwide and have very solid background  
13 and knowledge of event organization and legal consulting and other services that  
14 SOCAR may need outsourcing services. How the arrangement between SOCAR  
15 and PSG works, we'll make this kind of agreement. Now we have organizational  
16 services. We have similar kinds of agreements in other areas, like a framework  
17 agreement, broad scope of services. If need arises, just extend this service order  
18 to make sure that they are ready to assist if and once we need it.

19 Solis: Do they have an office in the United States?

20 Witness: Yes, they do have an office in Houston.

21 Solis: Who works in that office?

22 Witness: Director's name, her name is Irada Akhoundova. She's director of PSG in USA.

23 Solis: Do you know if she has a role at AFAZ?

24 Witness: Yes, I think she's on the board. She's on the board.

25 Solis: What specific role did Practical Solutions Group play in organizing and planning  
26 of the convention?

27 Witness: Specifically at this convention, we made kind of request to this company to see,  
28 because their name also was on the sponsorship list of the event. It as very  
29 interesting which kinds of contributions they made and how they assisted.  
30 Apparently they also being sponsor of event, but figures were not disclosed to us  
31 how they supported this event, but they also been sponsor of event, like  
32 provided financial support to event organizers. That was what was confirmed by  
33 PSG, Practical Solutions Group.

1 Solis: They would have provided financial support to organizers?

2 Witness: Yes. They, being the same level of sponsor as SOCAR, similar to SOCAR and other  
3 companies in Baku.

4 Solis: Turquoise Council and AFAZ, they would have provided money to.

5 Witness: That's the point where I'm not sure whether it was made to any of this or to both  
6 of them. Again, because we will make internal review of AFAZ and will review  
7 financials to see whether the money given to AFAZ [inaudible]. They said that  
8 they supported the event organizers.

9 Ashmawy: You don't know how?

10 Witness: I don't know. They support financially, but I don't know whether the money went  
11 to Turquoise or AFAZ.

12 Solis: Did money go from AFAZ to Practical Solutions Group?

13 Witness: No, that's something that I can clearly confirm. In the context of event, there has  
14 been no payment from SOCAR to PSG. That was one of our spots where we  
15 suspicious, there had been some payment. We requested from both PSG and our  
16 financial department to see was there any dedicated payment on the convention  
17 went. There has been no information.

18 Solis: PSG ventured into this agreement for free?

19 Witness: This agreement, as I say, is a framework agreement. Used after this and being  
20 used now for other ones. As I tried to explain previously, it's kind of umbrella  
21 agreement like framework under which we provide service orders and use it.  
22 This agreement is not made specifically for the convention. It's made for event  
23 organization support.

24 Solis: Was there a fee associated with it?

25 Witness: Sorry?

26 Solis: Was there money associated with it?

27 Witness: With?

28 Solis: Was there a payment from SOCAR associated with this agreement, the umbrella  
29 agreement?

1 Witness: Not on the convention.

2 Solis: I understand.

3 Witness: But, after this, yes, there have been a lot of payments from SOCAR to PSG for  
4 other events, other contracts in Azerbaijan, in other countries where they  
5 assisted with event organization.

6 Ashmawy: How about a general payment to them? Was there something, maybe we call it a  
7 retainer? Was there a payment to Practical Solutions Group around the time this  
8 contract was signed?

9 Witness: Around the time the contract was signed? Actually, our review was based on  
10 whether the payment was made in relation to convention because there have  
11 been service order under this agreement to PSG to assist us in organization of  
12 convention. Our request was, "was there any payment was made under that  
13 service order?" And their response was "No". In terms of timing, I'm not sure  
14 whether I can provide clearly, say clearly that around this time because there are  
15 a lot payments going out from SOCAR to PSG under different service orders and  
16 different categories.

17 Ashmawy: Let me ask you something else. You said that you were told that Practical  
18 Solutions Group supported the conference financially. At the same amount as  
19 SOCAR?

20 Witness: Amounts are not known to me.

21 Ashmawy: I thought you said you were told it was a similar dollar amount in support?

22 Witness: Honestly, I have no knowledge whether it was similar or comparable or less or  
23 more amount. I don't know anything about it. PSG's internal issue which duty I  
24 see in commercial sensitivity or conditional [inaudible] disclosed to us.

25 Ashmawy: There were payments to Practical Solutions Group, but they were not designated  
26 for the conference.

27 Witness: Yeah.

28 Ashmawy: Do you know if those payments were made near in time to the conference?

29 Witness: I don't know whether around this May 2013 there were any payments from  
30 SOCAR going to PSG. I don't have information on this. Again, as I told, there has  
31 been no payment under that specific. Payments are going to process our retainer  
32 and after the events. How we work with PSG can be advanced payments or

1 payments after the event. Time is not essential in our payments to PSG. What is  
2 essential is the category of service order under which it goes. When reviewing  
3 the, requesting the information requested under the specific service order from  
4 SOCAR to PSG whether we paid anything, any payment went from SOCAR to PSG  
5 under the service order, there was confirmation that there was no payment.

6 Ashmawy: Were you a part of the process to hire Practical Solutions Group?

7 Witness: Yeah, yeah, I was.

8 Solis: When did that process take place?

9 Witness: For event organizations, this process was held in January or February of 2013.  
10 Actually, it was in January, and after the result of this process, we made this  
11 contract in February.

12 Solis: This is an email, two copies there. It's numbered SOCAR 385. It's an email,  
13 Monday May 6, 2013. Is that your name at the top?

14 Witness: Yeah.

15 Solis: Do you recall this email?

16 Witness: Yeah. We'd been coordinating this payment issue with Kemal Oksuz because we  
17 need a lot of formalities for the payment to go through, and invoice to be  
18 stamped, signed and original hard copy. Also bank requisites on it. It was in the  
19 course of getting these formalities done.

20 Solis: You said, "Please urgently advise on your bank requisites." What bank  
21 requisites?

22 Witness: Bank account information because we were requested by our accounting  
23 department to provide bank account information of AFAZ to make this payment  
24 as a party to sponsorship agreement.

25 Solis: What bank did AFAZ use?

26 Witness: I recollect it was Chase or something. I think it was Chase Bank, but I don't  
27 recollect it clearly. His information was received and immediately forward to our  
28 accounting department, so it's information that we don't use.

29 Solis: You said, "We need it. The bank is awaiting." What bank are you referring to?

1 Witness: The local bank in Azerbaijan, SOCAR's international bank in Azerbaijan. Because  
2 the invoice that we are provided by Kemal Oksuz at AFAZ, we're missing this  
3 information. We made the sponsorship agreement, attached invoice, gave to our  
4 accounting department to make the payment. Then the response from the bank  
5 that the information was incomplete, so a bank requisite shall be provided.

6 Solis: Another one here for you. It is numbered SOCAR 377 to 378. I'll show you down  
7 at the bottom, is that your email? May 8th, 2013?

8 Witness: Yes. This one, right?

9 Solis: Let me make sure [inaudible]. "Kemal, could you please double check with your  
10 bank and confirm whether the payment has been received?" Did Kemal provide  
11 you with the information you needed after you emailed him that the information  
12 was incomplete?

13 Witness: Actually, I don't remember whether it was confirmed to me or ... Because I think  
14 he was in contact with protocol department of SOCAR as part of their general  
15 coordination. Most of communications were going through them. We had been  
16 also pressed because time limits and a rush. We had been pressed also by  
17 protocol department to make sure that payment went through and to keep this  
18 issue under control. That was the course of this communication, but I'm not sure  
19 whether it was email confirmation or confirmation from our protocol  
20 department that we are set and everything is done. Again, it was a formality  
21 issue.

22 Solis: The next email, "Please also ..." He responded, then the one above that, "Please  
23 also try to, at your earliest convenience, sign and return back the agreement of  
24 AFAZ sent earlier to you by my colleague, Elvin Hatamzade. What is the  
25 agreement you're referring to there?"

26 Witness: It's the sponsorship agreement. Because of bank regulations, the hard copy shall  
27 be presented, the hard copy of the counter-signed agreement shall be presented  
28 for the payment to go through. That was in the context of this. Because I think  
29 first he sent us scanned copy of signed agreement when we first talked to bank  
30 whether they will be able to make this payment in anticipation of hard copy.  
31 Later, we were obliged to request hard copy of the agreement. I think it was sent  
32 by courier to me and then presented to our accounting department.

33 Solis: More for you. It is SOCAR 178-180. Just want to direct you to the bottom there.  
34 That's your email as well?

35 Witness: Yeah.

1 Solis: Tuesday, May 14th, 2013?

2 Witness: Yeah.

3 Solis: You write about sponsorship issues. You say, "After initial discussions with these  
4 companies, it has been agreed that an official letter from AFAZ (or T-C-A-E,  
5 whichever you think fits more), shall be address to these companies with the  
6 below explanation of request/indication for sponsorship." What initial  
7 discussions are you referring to there?

8 Witness: This is the initial discussions were not held by me but our investment  
9 department within SOCAR is responsible for coordination and work with our  
10 partners. In Azerbaijan, there is all these companies that have all these contacts  
11 with them. When SOCAR was just coordinating with this company, they've been,  
12 explanation from this company, we need a kind of official request to  
13 substantiate our sponsorship, why we are making this.

14 That's why I been told to as a person at this time in contact with Kemal, the  
15 context of our agreement. To ask them to make this formal request to the  
16 company in order to make payment because of some kind of internal stuff or  
17 regulations of this company. They were not in position to extend this  
18 sponsorship without getting request, informal discussion. I think this was helped  
19 by our investment department in a formal-

20 Solis: Why would SOCAR have anything to say about letters from AFAZ or TCAE  
21 requesting sponsorship? Why would SOCAR be part of those discussions?

22 Witness: Why SOCAR is there is because, as I told, part of SOCAR's engagement and  
23 partnership with major companies in Azerbaijan. We are trying to somehow put  
24 some kind of duty and task on these companies to contribute to the mission that  
25 SOCAR is after. These companies always supported SOCAR, maybe in an amount  
26 less than SOCAR does, but they do it. In this context SOCAR was very much  
27 interested in making this convention happen. I'm not sure how the amount were  
28 defined and why the amounts were different from SOCAR's, but SOCAR was  
29 interested in bringing more sponsors to the event which was so significant for  
30 SOCAR and Azerbaijan.

31 Ashmawy: Why was the event significant for SOCAR and Azerbaijan?

32 Witness: Because it's [inaudible] and fits well together with SOCAR's mission, SOCAR's  
33 objective, SOCAR's duties as per its charters.

34 Ashmawy: Did it also have something to do with the fact that members of Congress were  
35 going to be in attendance?

1 Witness: Sorry?

2 Ashmawy: Did it also have something to do with the fact that members of Congress were  
3 coming?

4 Witness: You mean SOCAR or these companies? I'm not sure that I understood the  
5 question.

6 Ashmawy: Did the reason why this event was very important to SOCAR and Azerbaijan, was  
7 it partly because members of Congress were going to be there?

8 Witness: No, I think SOCAR would anyways sponsor and support this event regardless of  
9 the nature of representation or names of representation. SOCAR did and in  
10 much more amounts other events with maybe less important representatives  
11 from other governments, from other officials. It has nothing to do ... There was  
12 definitely no indication or understanding within SOCAR about need to support  
13 this event because members of Congress were there.

14 Solis: I want to ask you about this part where it says, "an official letter from AFAZ or  
15 TCAE, whichever you think fits more." Why did you say that?

16 Witness: Because what had been known to me and also revealed later is that AFAZ and  
17 TCAE are organizers of the event. Kemal holds position both at AFAZ and TCAE.  
18 SOCAR's sponsorship was to AFAZ based on the request. Knowing this, we just  
19 want to make sure that the request was made from proper organization, just  
20 how the event organizer seems to fit. It was just a matter of coordination to  
21 make sure that this proper event organizer is involved. Again, it was related to  
22 Kemal's roles in both of them, and both of them being event organizers.

23 Solis: This is the last stuff that I have to show you. The SOCAR 183 through 185. I don't  
24 see your name on the first page there. You are on the very last page from Kemal  
25 Oksuz. Tuesday, May 14th. I don't see your name in any of the emails that occur  
26 after that. But I just wanted to show you this first page. To the extent that you're  
27 aware, does this look like the full list of sponsors?

28 Witness: It also misses SOCAR, but besides SOCAR, yeah. I think it miss also PSG. I think  
29 this is the list of companies that SOCAR was assisting in coordination with  
30 making this payment go through.

31 Solis: Do you know about sponsorship categories. I see there's a silver sponsor.  
32 Caspian Drilling is the main sponsor. What are the sponsorship categories?

33 Witness: I think they are based on the amounts. I don't know how they are differentiated,  
34 but SOCAR was obviously the main sponsor. I don't know whether it's golden

1 sponsor. Most probably Caspian Drilling Company also made something  
2 comparable to SOCAR's amount to qualify as a main sponsor.

3 Solis: How much money did SOCAR end up paying to the organizers for this  
4 convention?

5 Witness: SOCAR's payment was limited to this sponsorship agreement. It was 750,000 US  
6 dollars.

7 Solis: Did anybody else on this list, that you're aware of, contribute that amount of  
8 money?

9 Witness: To the extent that I know, this money ranged between 50,000 and 10,000, not  
10 more. That's why it's interesting why CDC is a main sponsor. I think they were  
11 less than SOCAR, significantly less than SOCAR's amount.

12 Solis: Is Caspian Drilling Company owned by SOCAR?

13 Witness: I think it's joint venture. Joint venture between SOCAR and ... I don't know the  
14 second partner. I think it's joint venture where SOCAR holds some shares. The  
15 same as Azeri M-I Drilling . That's it.

16 Solis: Azeri M-I Drilling is also a venture of SOCAR or SOCAR has a stake in the  
17 company?

18 Witness: Yes, it does.

19 Solis: Do you know if it's 51%? If it's the majority?

20 Witness: In general, SOCAR's policy is to keep 51 plus shares in joint venture. It's SOCAR's  
21 general corporate policy. Honestly, there are some very limited number of  
22 companies where SOCAR is a minor share holder. I don't know which categories  
23 these two falls.

24 Solis: Did guests of the convention, did the convention attendees receive gifts?

25 Witness: I can't say anything about it.

26 Solis: You can't say?

27 Witness: Because I neither attended this or was anyhow in interaction with. I can't say  
28 anything about it.

1 Ashmawy: Did your internal investigation uncover anything about gifts of rugs to people  
2 who attended?

3 Witness: Gifts of what? Sorry?

4 Ashmawy: Gifts of rugs?

5 Witness: Rugs?

6 Ashmawy: Rugs.

7 Witness: From SOCAR's side, our request to protocol department was to list exactly what  
8 SOCAR contributed. It said nothing about any kind of gifts or other presents,  
9 anything about somehow assisting event organizers in this particular context.  
10 No, SOCAR didn't.

11 Solis: Any questions?

12 Ashmawy: There was a meeting during the conference between SOCAR officials and  
13 members of Congress. Do you know who arranged that meeting?

14 Witness: I don't know, but I think it's the protocol department. They are generally in  
15 charge of all of this kind of formal event organizations, meeting organizations  
16 and logistics of this type of meetings. I assume that it's protocol department, but  
17 I think they can confirm it. I don't know.

18 Ashmawy: Were you aware of that meeting?

19 Witness: No.

20 Solis: Do you know if the board of AFAZ, if there was an attempt to dissolve the board  
21 of AFAZ earlier this year?

22 Witness: Earlier this year? No. I think AFAZ board's duty expires in April 15 this year, in  
23 two or three days. SOCAR is expected to make decision on formation, as per it's  
24 charter it's two years. SOCAR is expected to make decision on who will be on  
25 board and how AFAZ will be structured. I'm not aware about early attempts to  
26 dissolve. There's nothing known to me on this particular issue.

27 Solis: Who at SOCAR would be the person or group of people who have the most  
28 contact with AFAZ and Kemal Oksuz?

29 Witness: You mean in the convention or general?

1 Solis: General.

2 Witness: General, it's legal department. Actually, ideally it should be reports coming from  
3 AFAZ to legal department, and legal department distributing internal to financial  
4 department and so on. Because it never happened, and there was no reports  
5 coming from AFAZ to SOCAR, the communication and interaction with AFAZ was  
6 very limited. I think it's only legal department, we, who have folder of  
7 documents related to AFAZ only. Other groups within SOCAR like protocol  
8 department, financials, they only have knowledge about existing AFAZ, existence  
9 of AFAZ. I don't know ... I think there have been no direct contact between them  
10 and AFAZ in the meantime. Rauf is holding positions there, but I don't know to  
11 which extent he is engaged in daily activities of AFAZ.

12 Solis: I think that's all the questions we have for you. Thank you very much.

13 Witness: Thank you.


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

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

# **TRANSCRIPT OF INTERVIEW OF CONOCOPHILLIPS MANAGER 2**

**3/25/2015**

1 WRIGHT: This is Nate Wright here from the OCE. I'm joined by Bryson Morgan; we also have  
2 Rob Walker, here in person; Jason Rother on the phone; and this is an interview of  
3 ConocoPhillips Manager 2.

4 MORGAN: On March 25<sup>th</sup> 2015

5 WRIGHT: ConocoPhillips Manager 2, what is your current title?

6 WITNESS: Manager of Federal Affairs International.

7 WRIGHT: And what are your general duties in that position?

8 WITNESS: I've worked with our... I do international government relations and work on with  
9 our business units in various countries around the world to help them with government relations  
10 issues and help on engagement plans. Represent them here in Washington.

11 WRIGHT: How long have you been in this position?

12 WITNESS: 15 years.

13 WRIGHT: Does this... does your position normally include interacting with members of  
14 congress?

15 WITNESS: Not very much

16 WRIGHT: Who is Bill Ichord?

17 WITNESS: Bill Ichord is... was the Vice-President for International and Government Affairs  
18 and he left the company at the end of February.

19 WRIGHT: Who is Luda Orelup?

20 WITNESS: Luda also left the company a year ago maybe, and she was Manager of Government  
21 Rel... I'm hesitating because I'm not sure what her final title was.

22 MORGAN: So who did... did Luda report to you?

23 WITNESS: No she was in Houston and reported to Bill Burkett.

24 MORGAN: Who do you report to directly?

25 WITNESS: Andrew Lundquist, who is the head of the Washington Office, Senior Vice-President  
26 for Government Relations.

27 MORGAN: And do you have anyone who reports directly to you?

1 WITNESS: No

2 MORGAN: Okay

3 WRIGHT: Who is Farkhad Kasimov.

4 WITNESS: He was and maybe still is but I don't know that for sure. He was our consultant in  
5 Baku. We did not have a separate office he ran our ConocoPhillips Office in Baku. We had at  
6 one time had a staff but at that time he was our representative in Baku.

7 WRIGHT: Who is Audrey Stutchman?

8 WITNESS: She is the receptionist here.

9 MORGAN: So let me... Mr. Kasimov he was a, you said he was a consultant?

10 WITNESS: I think

11 MORGAN: You think so?

12 WITNESS: I don't know what the exact...

13 MORGAN: But he's not a ConocoPhillips employee?

14 WITNESS: No.

15 MORGAN: Does he have his own Company?

16 WITNESS: He may.

17 MORGAN: He may. Okay and you say he was running the ConocoPhillips Office in Baku?

18 WITNESS: He was our representative in Baku. Yeah I say running the office I...

19 MORGAN: What kind of things would he do on ConocoPhillips' behalf in Baku?

20 WITNESS: He would report what... I don't know, I don't know all of the details of what his  
21 responsibilities were but he was the face of ConocoPhillips in Baku and working with the  
22 Houston business development. And not through here.

23 WRIGHT: So he reported to Houston?

24 WITNESS: Yes.

25 WRIGHT: Do you know the Turkish American Association?

26 WITNESS: Turkish American Association....

27 WRIGHT and MORGAN: or Turkic American Association.

1 WITNESS: I know of it.

2 WRIGHT: Do you know SOCAR?

3 WITNESS: Yes

4 WRIGHT: Do you communicate regularly with employees of SOCAR?

5 WITNESS: No not regularly. I know the person who represents SOCAR in Washington, D.C.  
6 and occasionally see him at meetings

7 WRIGHT: And is that Rauf Mammadov

8 WITNESS: Yes

9 WRIGHT: Do you know and I'm sure I'm going to mispronounce it its Zaur Gahramanov

10 WITNESS: No.

11 WRIGHT: It's spelled Z-A-U-R G-A-H-R-A-M-A-N-O-V

12 WITNESS: Is he a SOCAR person?

13 WRIGHT: Yes I think he is in country.

14 WITNESS: No then. I won't tell you that I've never met him but I don't know him

15 WRIGHT: Do you know the Turquoise Council of Americans and Eurasians?

16 WITNESS: I know that it exists. I don't know what it is.

17 WRIGHT: Do you know generally what they do?

18 WITNESS: What I think they do is they promote larger issues of Eurasia but from an Azerbaijan  
19 stand-point perhaps Turkey. I think of them as more of a cultural people to people organization  
20 not so much about business relations but about larger.

21 MORGAN: How did you become familiar with the Turquoise council? Do you recall when you  
22 first heard about them or interacted with them?

23 WITNESS: No but it think I've seen, I must have seen their literature and maybe other people  
24 mentioned them.

25 MORGAN: Have you ever attended... Well who do you know on the Turquoise Council? Do  
26 you know any individuals there?

27 WITNESS: No I don't. as far as I know.

1 WRIGHT: Do you have any sense how they are funded?

2 WITNESS: Do you want me to speculate?

3 WALKER: If you're asking me, No.

4 WITNESS: But I mean I don't know.

5 MORGAN: You don't know?

6 WITNESS: No

7 MORGAN: Have you heard other people talk about it?

8 WITNESS: No

9 MORGAN: Have you ever been a part of conversations where people talked about their funding?

10 WITNESS: No

11 MORGAN: Okay

12 WRIGHT: Do you know the Assembly of Friends of Azerbaijan?

13 WITNESS: I know the name.

14 WRIGHT: Also known as AFAZ

15 WITNESS: I know the name.

16 WRIGHT: And do you remember how you came to know AFAZ or hear about AFAZ?

17 WITNESS: Through their literature, through conversations with other business people and...

18 MORGAN: What is your understanding of what AFAZ does? What their role is?

19 WITNESS: The same thing, the promotion of Azerbaijan and more cultural less business.

20 WRIGHT: Do you know anything about their relationship with SOCAR?

21 WITNESS: No

22 WRIGHT: Do you know Kemal Okuz?

23 WITNESS: I know the name related to the ... to that group.

24 MORGAN: To AFAZ?

25 WITNESS: Yes

1 MORGAN: Okay

2 WITNESS: Right?

3 MORGAN: Well you tell me which groups are you familiar with Oksuz?

4 WITNESS: I don't know the people involved. I think that's the name associated with the second  
5 one.

6 WALKER: With the Assembly of Friends of Azerbaijan.

7 MORGAN: Okay.

8 WALKER: Is that what you meant?

9 WITNESS: Yeah.

10 WALKER: Okay.

11 WRIGHT: Do you know his relationship at all with SOCAR?

12 WITNESS: No

13 MORGAN: Are you aware of him having any relationship with SOCAR?

14 WITNESS: No

15 MORGAN: Have you met Mr. Oksuz?

16 WITNESS: I don't think... well maybe I don't know.

17 MORGAN: You don't recall ever?

18 WITNESS: No I don't... well yeah I don't recall.

19 MORGAN: Okay

20 WRIGHT: Do you know an I'm just going to spell this out cause I'm not going to be able to  
21 pronounce it correctly, first name IRADA last name AKHOUNDOVA, I think it's Irada  
22 Akhoundova.

23 WITNESS: No

24 WRIGHT: Okay I want to ask a few questions just specific to the convention are you familiar  
25 with the US – Azerbaijan Convention?

26 WITNESS: Yes

27 WRIGHT: It's an annual event in May

1 WITNESS: Yes

2 WRIGHT: Did you attend the first event in DC in 2012 I believe it was in the Willard that year?

3 WITNESS: I did.

4 WRIGHT: Do you remember anything generally about the convention? I believe ConocoPhillips  
5 was a sponsor for that convention?

6 WITNESS: I think so.

7 MORGAN: What do you recall about that 2012 convention? You said that you attended?

8 WITNESS: I did not all of it just some of it.

9 MORGAN: Just some of it... was it a multi-day... do you remember if it was a multi-day  
10 convention?

11 WITNESS: I think two days

12 MORGAN: Two days.

13 WITNESS: and a series of panels and different people who are involved in Caspian issues,  
14 speaking on you know different subjects.

15 MORGAN: How did you .... How did ConocoPhillips become involved with that convention?  
16 Do you recall how that was? I think we.... I think from what we've seen ConocoPhillips was a  
17 sponsor of that 2012 Convention is that correct?

18 WITNESS: Yes.

19 MORGAN: Do you recall how that sponsorship came about?

20 WITNESS: No

21 MORGAN: Is that something you would've been involved with? Determining whether or not  
22 ConocoPhillips would be a sponsor? Or conversations about sponsorship levels?

23 WITNESS: Sometimes a request for sponsorship, and this is the bigger picture, might come  
24 through to me.

25 MORGAN: Sometimes it might come through to you?

26 WITNESS: Yeah

27 MORGAN: But sometimes it might not?

28 WITNESS: Sometimes it doesn't

1 WALKER: It does not – sometimes you said?

2 WITNESS: Sometimes it does not. In this case for Azerbaijan, it did not or does not.

3 WALKER: And are you talking about the 2012 convention now or...? Cause that's what we are  
4 focusing on. Yeah.

5 WITNESS: Yeah

6 MORGAN: So do you... so the 2012 sponsorship that was not something that was handled by  
7 you or that you were involved with. But do you know who did handle that for ConocoPhillips, do  
8 you have any sense who that may have been?

9 WITNESS: It was probably Bill Burkett or I'm sorry...

10 WALKER: Do you know that for a fact?

11 WITNESS: No

12 MORGAN: That's just your speculation that it was probably Bill?

13 WITNESS: Yeah.

14 WRIGHT: What did you understand the purpose of the convention to be? The 2012 convention.

15 WITNESS: To promote Azerbaijan and to promote the US-Azeri relationship government to  
16 government relationship and the business opportunities and other opportunities in Azerbaijan  
17 but....

18 MORGAN: And what was your role in attending the convention? What did you do while you  
19 were there?

20 WITNESS: Just attended some of the panels, lunch.

21 WRIGHT: Do you remember who organized that convention?

22 WITNESS: No

23 WRIGHT: Did you have any sense of how the convention was being funded?

24 WITNESS: I... well-funded by different interested parties, sponsorships.

25 WRIGHT: Did you have any sense that one sponsor may paying more for the convention than  
26 others?

27 WITNESS: My own sense was that was likely SOCAR that was the primary platinum sponsor or  
28 whatever that would be called.

1 MORGAN: Do you remember what gave you that sense?

2 WITNESS: It's not very unusual in a situation, not just Azerbaijan but in a meeting like that, that  
3 there would be one large sponsor. In this case it made sense it was going to be SOCAR or  
4 perhaps BP but I don't really remember.

5 WALKER: You say that it's your sense... excuse me....

6 WRIGHT: Go ahead

7 WALKER: You say that's your sense about SOCAR? Is that something you know for a fact?

8 WITNESS: No

9 WALKER: So that's speculation

10 WITNESS: Yes

11 MORGAN: Is that based on signage maybe you saw at the convention or conversations you had  
12 there do you recall?

13 WITNESS: I think SOCAR was prominently featured on the program in bigger letters than  
14 anybody else might have been.

15 WRIGHT: Now I want to turn our focus to the 2013 convention in Baku I understand that you  
16 didn't attend the convention.

17 WITNESS: I did not.

18 WRIGHT: But I want to ask about some of the discussions leading into the convention. So  
19 ConocoPhillips was not initially going to be a sponsor for that convention was it?

20 WITNESS: No

21 MORGAN: We'll take you through some documents here to refresh your recollection we are  
22 hoping that you can help sort of the context of some of these emails and....

23 WRIGHT: So I've handed Ms. WITNESS a document bates labeled OCE-COP-05 and 06

24 MORGAN: Take as much time as you'd like to review these emails here.

25 WITNESS: Okay

26 WRIGHT: So this is beginning of April 2013 and Oksuz is asking Ms. Orelup for sponsorship.  
27 Whether or not they are interested in sponsorship. Oksuz says it will cost a minimum of  
28 \$250,000 and COP decided not to sponsor is that a fair summary of the emails? Do you

1 remember any of the conversations about this specific sponsorship level, why... any  
2 conversations why COP wasn't going to sponsor it at this level?

3 WITNESS: I wasn't involved in any conversations. Only what I knew from reading the email.

4 MORGAN: So let me go through this a little bit. So it appears that Mr. Oksuz first reached out to  
5 Ms. Orelup on 06 that second page. She suggested or asked if \$5,000 would be sufficient? He  
6 then responds saying that the minimum is \$250,000 and that conversation gets... it looks like it  
7 is forwarded on to you by Ms. Orelup. And she says "for the obvious reasons we are not in the  
8 position to participate." How did you? What were those obvious reasons? Just the amount  
9 \$250,000 or are there other reasons that you interpreted her to be referring to in that email?

10 WITNESS: The amount.

11 MORGAN: Just the amount? But you weren't.... were you aware that... I mean the email from  
12 Kemal the first one.... Or excuse me the email to you from Ms. Orelup the sponsorship this year  
13 is at \$250,000 but you weren't aware of the sponsorship of ConocoPhillips was the year before?

14 WITNESS: No

15 WRIGHT: Orlep asks "Would \$5,000 be sufficient?" is that more typical of the types of  
16 sponsorship levels for conventions like these or?

17 WITNESS: Yes.

18 MORGAN: So why.... Do you have any sense of why all of the sudden the asked jumped to  
19 \$250,000 did that catch you off guard or raise any red flags with you?

20 WITNESS: No I just thought it was silly.

21 WRIGHT: Latter ConocoPhillips did decide to sponsor the event at a much lower amount, do  
22 you remember that?

23 WITNESS: I was not involved in that decision and I did not know about it.

24 WRIGHT: Okay so no one mentioned to you later on that we have in fact decided to sponsor this  
25 convention.

26 WALKER: When you say later on what time frame are you talking about?

27 WRIGHT: I'm going to show you a document bates label OCE-COP- 43 through 46. Take a look  
28 at these and I realize that you are not listed on this but on the last page you'll see there's a  
29 different invite for the... for this convention.

30 MORGAN: So take your time to review these especially since these were emails that you  
31 weren't on. Take as much time as you need to look at those.

1 WITNESS: [inaudible] still reading these backwards.

2 WRIGHT: Yeah

3 MORGAN: It does help if you start on the last page....

4 WALKER: and go forward.

5 WITNESS: Okay

6 WRIGHT: Let's start from the last page. With 46 at the bottom. So this is SOCAR asking  
7 ConocoPhillips to sponsor the convention and the amount at which they are asking people to  
8 sponsor has changed. Does this seem unusual to you at all that the request for sponsorship of the  
9 convention is coming from SOCAR.

10 WALKER: When you say "did it seem unusual?"

11 WRIGHT: Yes

12 WALKER: What do you mean? Do you mean now does it seem?

13 MORGAN: Let's get a little more context. So the previous salutation from Kemal Oksuz in April  
14 of 2013. You know we talked about these emails and it looks like the \$250,000 request was  
15 denied. Were you... were you aware of any other conversations about potential sponsorship or  
16 ConocoPhillips being solicited for sponsorships after this you know April 3 email exchange

17 WITNESS: No

18 MORGAN: So as far as you are concerned that ended the issue?

19 WITNESS: Yes.

20 MORGAN: And you weren't aware... were you aware before today that SOCAR had  
21 subsequently solicited sponsorship from ConocoPhillips?

22 WITNESS: I didn't know that until...

23 MORGAN: until right now...

24 WITNESS: Well until I read the documents.

25 WALKER: and let's just say, other than today in preparation for the interview for today. Can we  
26 put it in that context?

27 MORGAN and WRIGHT: That's fine.

28 WALKER: Is that fair to say?

1 WITNESS: yes

2 MORGAN: So does that strike you as unusual, that after this initial request had been denied that  
3 there was a second request directly from SOCAR to ConocoPhillips?

4 WITNESS: It doesn't strike me as unusual that you know people start out at \$250,000 and when  
5 they find out that no one wants to sponsor those events that amount they bring it down to more  
6 normal sponsorship levels.

7 MORGAN: Are... Do you know why this solicitation from SOCAR wasn't forwarded on to  
8 you? Why you weren't part of this conversation? Any sense of why that might have been?

9 WITNESS: No I don't. It was an internal Houston decision about the business.

10 WRIGHT: Is this one of those things in that bucket where sometimes you might be involved in  
11 discussions or is this in the bucket where you might not? Or both?

12 WITNESS: Yes, it's one of those... It's one of those times when I was not involved or was not  
13 included in this decision making process through here.

14 MORGAN: Were you. And you weren't aware of the solicitation?

15 WITNESS: I was not aware.

16 MORGAN: Okay so nobody called you to ask you about it or gave you input on this solicitation  
17 from SOCAR?

18 WITNESS: Yes... No one.

19 MORGAN: No one touched based. Okay.

20 WALKER: And I know the documents show it but just for the record we are talking about an  
21 email chain back in May 13 and 14 2013 right?

22 WRIGHT: Yes

23 WALKER: Just to make sure we set the...

24 MORGAN: Yes it is bates labeled OCE-COP 046 that's the solicitation we're referring to.

25 WALKER: Right.

26 WRIGHT: And you can see in the subsequent emails that there are discussions about whether or  
27 not COP should sponsor the event, you don't remember being included in any sort of discussions  
28 about whether ConocoPhillips should sponsor or attend this convention?

29 WITNESS: I do not remember being included in any of those discussions.

1 MORGAN: I want to ask you about its page bates labeled OCE-COP 044. Let's see if you can  
2 help us understand an email here. It appears to be about the email. It starts on 43 from Ms.  
3 Orelup to Lynn Strickland William Burkett on Tuesday May 14, 2013 and she writes to  
4 Strickland and Bill I'll go ahead and respond locally about COP participation in the Convention  
5 with SOCAR. However we need to get an invoice for the sponsorship from AFAZ or Turquoise  
6 Council to avoid FCPA issues.

7 WRIGHT: It also goes on to say it would be nice to include a congratulatory paragraph in our  
8 response to SOCAR and Kemal.

9 WITNESS: Okay right

10 MORGAN: Do you have any sense as to why... why it was that Ms. Orelup preferred to receive  
11 a receipt from AFAZ or Turquoise Council as opposed to SOCAR? I know it says here to avoid  
12 FCPA issues, do you have a sense of what those potential issues might have been? Was there a  
13 concern on being invoiced directly from SOCAR?

14 WITNESS: I don't other that...

15 MORGAN: Do think you have any sense of what that might be? Is that a standard practice for  
16 ConocoPhillips?

17 WITNESS: Anything we sponsor like this it's always under the aegis of the membership  
18 organization or a non-government organization. Not a business but a...

19 WRIGHT: Based on 2012 convention

20 WALKER 2012 or 2013

21 WRIGHT: 2012 convention does it surprise all in 2013 that there seemed to be a discussions  
22 about whether or not an invoice might come from either AFAZ, TCAE or SOCAR mentioned in  
23 the 2013 Convention?

24 WITNESS: I don't know how the May 2012 sponsorship was done. Is that what you are asking?

25 WRIGHT: Yeah. Okay I want to ask you...

26 WALKER: Hold one second. Do you have a question?

27 WITNESS: No I guess not.

28 WALKER: Okay, you can take a minute if you want to and step out

29 WITNESS: Yeah

30 WALKER: Do you mind if we just cut that for a moment?

1 MORGAN: Sure that's fine

2 WITNESS: Just one I...

3 MORGAN: Pause that recording

4 WRIGHT: Yep

5 WITNESS: Sorry I just want to ....

6 PART 2

7 MORGAN: Be sure to move that.

8 WRIGHT: Yep, Alright

9 WALKER: And can we be put on the record just thanks for letting us step out briefly. It was  
10 largely just I think that... I wanted to respond a little to Mr. Wright's last question.

11 WITNESS: Do you want to repeat that question?

12 WALKER: Why don't you go ahead?

13 WRIGHT: Yeah

14 WITNESS: This goes to this why was SOCAR contacting us and so forth and what does that  
15 mean. It doesn't surprise me that SOCAR who was a big booster in doing this meeting having  
16 their partners in country to also sponsor that's all. It's not a surprise that they would do that.

17 MORGAN: Just so that you know sometimes things that are completely standard practice in the  
18 business world and completely the norm sometimes given the sort of strange and somewhat  
19 counterintuitive box of congressional ethics rules means that when we are asking about  
20 something it's relevant for our purposes doesn't mean to suggest in any way that there was some  
21 unusual practice on ConocoPhillips hand. I hope there's not a disconnect there. So sometimes the  
22 questions can come across suggesting that you or someone in ConocoPhillips did something  
23 wrong. That's not what we mean to suggest at all it's just relevant to the ethics rules. You know  
24 Mr. WALKER knows that the ethics rules can be a bit... you know they are a bit different than  
25 in the business world.

26 WITNESS: Thanks

27 WALKER: I think the work that is often used is counter- intuitive. But not all of it.

28 MORGAN: Not all of it

29 WITNESS: Sorry go ahead.

1 MORGAN: I think now we have some questions for you about your interaction with  
2 Representative Bridenstine's office.

3 WRIGHT: Do you know Representative Bridenstine?

4 WITNESS: No

5 WRIGHT: Do you know his Chief of Staff, Joe Kaufman?

6 WITNESS: Only by email.

7 WRIGHT: I'm going to show you a document it's OCE-COP 01.

8 WITNESS: Okay

9 WRIGHT: Now I want to direct your attention to the bottom of that page an email from Joe  
10 Kaufman to Ms. Stuchman. Do you remember having subsequent conversations with Mr.  
11 Kaufman about this question the nature of ConocoPhillips sponsorship of the convention in  
12 Baku?

13 WITNESS: Yes

14 WRIGHT: What did you talk to him about? Was there... you know, what was he concerned  
15 about? What did he ask about? What did you tell him?

16 WITNESS: That I didn't think we were sponsoring.

17 MORGAN: So this gets forwarded on to you, you know, this is March 28 2013 I think that's if I  
18 recall from the other email this is, you know before I think Ms. Orelup had forwarded on to you  
19 the solicitation from Oksuz.

20 WITNESS: Right

21 MORGAN: So this may have been... do you recall if maybe this was the first time you learned  
22 of ConocoPhillips sponsorship of the convention, of the 2013 Convention? Or at least that  
23 someone was making that representation?

24 WITNESS: Yes

25 MORGAN: Okay did that catch you off-guard was that a surprise to you?

26 WITNESS: I guess it was a surprise.

27 MORGAN: Do you want to go through 8 now or....

28 WRIGHT: couple of files

1 MORGAN: Okay we have a couple of emails that will help refresh recollection.

2 WALKER: Guys when you say surprised, you mean that it was news to you or...?

3 WRIGHT: Yes

4 WITNESS: Okay it was news to me that we were listed as a sponsor on a meeting being held in  
5 Baku. And because I had not been involved in any decision about sponsorship in a meeting in  
6 Baku. And in this not knowing what meeting even was being talked about.

7 WRIGHT: And then I'm showing you a document marked OCE-COP-07. You'll see you're  
8 having... it looks like an exchange of emails and potentially some conversations with Mr.  
9 Kaufman and then real quick... I'm showing you a document marked THJE 12 and 13. Is this do  
10 you remember... it this the document that Mr. Kaufman sent to you as part of your discussions?

11 WITNESS: I don't remember it may have been.

12 MORGAN So looking at this 07 OCE COP 07 there's the email in the middle there from Joe  
13 Kaufman to you he says, document attached, citing COP is sponsoring, bottom of page. So do  
14 you recall that he did send you a document that you know listed ConocoPhillips as a sponsor of  
15 the Convention?

16 WITNESS: Yeah, I mean it says here that there was an attachment.

17 MORGAN: Yeah do you recall seeing that attachment? You don't know if this is specifically a  
18 copy of that attachment?

19 WITNESS: No

20 WALKER: And by this it is the THJB Document you are referring too?

21 WRIGHT: 12 Yeah

22 MORGAN: and then you responded to him on April 3 basically saying that ConocoPhillips....  
23 Well saying that ConocoPhillips is not sponsoring the Baku event?

24 WITNESS: Right

25 MORGAN: And you said "I'm happy to discuss further." Do you recall if there was a subsequent  
26 conversation with Joe Kaufman about it?

27 WITNESS: I don't recall.

28 MORGAN: You don't recall.

1 WRIGHT: Do you remember any discussion that you may have had with the Houston office  
2 about whether or not ConocoPhillips was going to sponsor other than that email exchange that  
3 we looked at in the beginning?

4 WITNESS: Only that email exchange is my... is what I recall on... our sponsoring that meeting.

5 WRIGHT: One more document before we... it's OCE COP 08 and 09.

6 WITNESS: Okay

7 WRIGHT: And at the bottom of 08 you talk about being listed as sponsors at the bottom of the  
8 program and presuming this is in response to the document that Mr. Kaufman had sent.

9 WITNESS: Right

10 WRIGHT: and then you say "along with Chevron, BP, and of course SOCAR." It there a reason  
11 you said "of course SOCAR?"

12 WITNESS: It was being held in Azerbaijan and they are the national oil company for Azerbaijan.

13 WRIGHT: and then up at the top. So it looks like Kaufman was looking for assurances about  
14 ConocoPhillips role in the conference and maybe about the conference more generally. And up  
15 at the top you talked about his being invited as your guest to the meeting. He would go for free.  
16 They have to be able to say who was paying since we are listed as sponsors he wants to know  
17 what our role is and whether we would be paying for his trip. It's difficult to find out who these  
18 hosts are. AFAZ and TCAE and whether this is a cover for SOCAR or the Azeri Government he  
19 needs to know. Were these concerns that Kaufman raised with you?

20 WITNESS: As far as I recall.

21 WRIGHT: Okay so this wasn't a... he was asking you about these organizations AFAZ and  
22 TCAE in addition to ConocoPhillips role in the convention.

23 WITNESS: Right

24 MORGAN: Do you remember how he asked you about those?

27 And when you say "this is the same group" do you know which group you're referring to?

28 WITNESS: AFAZ

29 MORGAN: AFAZ okay.

1 WRIGHT: You also said “and I’m happy to discuss further” did he ever call to ask or inquire  
2 further about the 2012 convention or about AFAZ and TCAE?

3 WITNESS: 2012 or 2013?

4 WRIGHT: In 2013 did Kaufman... so at the end of this email OCE COP 07 after you say “ this  
5 is the same group who hosted a similar meeting last April.” You say “does this info help I’m  
6 happy to discuss further” did you have any further discussions with him did he ever ask what  
7 was the nature of the sponsorship in 2012 or anything, anything further on that?

8 WITNESS: I don’t remember having another conversation.

9 WRIGHT: Do you remember an event that was hosted by AFAZ in July 2013 in the Hyatt on  
10 Capitol Hill?

11 WITNESS: No I haven’t no.

**ENGAGEMENT AGREEMENT  
BY AND BETWEEN  
APCO WORLDWIDE INC.  
AND  
ASSEMBLY OF THE FRIENDS OF AZERBAIJAN**

THIS ENGAGEMENT AGREEMENT ("Agreement"), made and entered into as of April 7, 2014 ("Effective Date"), by and between APCO Worldwide Inc., with offices located at 700 12<sup>th</sup> Street, NW, Suite 800, Washington, DC 20005 ("APCO") and Assembly of the Friends of Azerbaijan, with offices located at Galleria Tower 1, 2700 Post Oak Blvd., Suite 1750, Houston, TX 77056 ("Client"), sets forth the parties' understanding pursuant to which APCO shall be engaged by Client.

**I. SCOPE OF WORK**

The scope of work of APCO's present assignment is set out in Annex 1 (the "Services"). Annex 1 is by this reference incorporated in and made part of this Agreement. Should the Services as described in Annex 1 change in any material way, an adjustment to APCO's fees and promised delivery dates may be required. APCO undertakes to advise Client promptly should any such adjustment be necessary and to negotiate with Client in good faith to arrive at a mutually acceptable revision to the Agreement.

**II. STAFFING**

APCO shall assign staff members to assist in the performance of the Services.

Should any of the staff members be unable to perform the Services, APCO may substitute another similarly qualified staff member. APCO may, from time to time and in its discretion, augment the staff members performing the Services as needed to perform the Services.

In connection with the Services, APCO may employ the services of third-party consultants including, without limitation, attorneys, intellectual property search firms, accountants, vendors, subcontractors and suppliers (collectively, "Consultants").

**III. FEES AND DISBURSEMENTS**

APCO shall provide the Services on a time and materials basis, charging a fee based on its usual and customary hourly rates for matters of this type, as such rates may change from time to time, but subject to a cap of USD \$46,375 unless APCO obtains Client's prior written approval to exceed such cap.

Prior to APCO's commencement of work, Client shall pay APCO an advance payment in the amount of USD \$46,375 upon execution of this Agreement.

In addition, Client shall reimburse APCO for actual, reasonable out-of-pocket expenses ("OOBs") incurred in APCO's performance of this Agreement, including, without limitation, expenses for Consultants, delivery services, external duplications and printing, special periodicals or other materials, media, advertising placement, production of collateral, filing fees, pay-for-use databases, travel, parking and meals. All such OOBs paid by APCO to third parties shall be subject to a mark-up of 17.65%. APCO shall submit monthly invoices to Client for OOBs after such OOBs have been incurred.

If any taxes are required to be deducted or withheld from any payments made by Client to APCO hereunder, then Client shall (i) withhold or deduct the required amount and promptly pay such taxes to the applicable tax authority, and (ii) pay additional amounts to APCO so that the net amount actually received by APCO after such withholding or deduction or tax is equal to the amount that APCO would have received had no such withholding or deduction been required or tax been imposed.

All invoices submitted by APCO to Client shall be due and payable upon receipt. APCO reserves the right to impose an interest charge equal to one and one-half percent (1.5%) per month in respect of any invoice which is outstanding for more than thirty (30) days.

#### **IV. TERM AND TERMINATION**

This Agreement shall be effective on the Effective Date and shall terminate on May 30, 2014 ("Termination Date"); provided, however, that either party shall have the right to terminate this Agreement in advance of the Termination Date, but only upon the giving of fifteen (15) days' prior written notice to the other party. In the event that this Agreement is so terminated in advance of its scheduled completion, Client shall pay to APCO, upon receipt of an invoice, any and all proper charges earned and/or incurred by APCO in connection with the Services pursuant to this Agreement up to the time of its termination and shall indemnify APCO as provided in Section V.A. below.

#### **V. GENERAL PROVISIONS**

##### **A. Modification, Cancellation or Suspension of Work**

Upon consultation with APCO, Client shall have the right to modify, cancel or suspend any and all plans, schedules or work in progress under this Agreement, and, in such event, APCO shall immediately take proper steps to carry out such instructions. However, in such an event Client shall: (i) assume APCO's liability for commitments made to Consultants in respect of such work; (ii) pay APCO, in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Agreement, any and all proper charges earned and incurred by APCO in connection with such work up to the time of its discontinuance, cancellation or modification; and (iii) indemnify APCO for all claims and/or actions by third parties for damages in consequence of APCO's carrying out Client's instructions, except for claims or actions that result from APCO's negligence or wilful misconduct.

**B. General Indemnification**

Client shall indemnify APCO and its present and former officers, directors, employees and agents (collectively, "Indemnitees") against any loss or expense (including, without limitation, attorneys' fees) which any Indemnitee may incur as the result of any claim, suit or proceeding made or brought against such Indemnitee or in which such Indemnitee is asked to participate, based upon any materials APCO prepares, publishes or disseminates for Client and based upon information provided or approved by Client prior to its preparation, publication or dissemination, as well as any claim or suit arising out of the nature or use of Client's products or services or any Indemnitee's relationship with Client, except for losses or expenses that result from any Indemnitee's negligence or wilful misconduct.

**C. Confidentiality**

APCO shall maintain in confidence all information and data relating to Client, its services, products, business affairs, marketing and promotion plans or other operations and its associated companies which are disclosed to APCO by or on behalf of Client (whether orally or in writing and whether before, on or after the date of this Agreement) or which are otherwise directly or indirectly acquired by APCO from Client, or any of its affiliated companies, or created in the course of this Agreement.

APCO shall ensure that it, its officers, employees and agents only use such confidential information in order to perform the Services, and shall not without Client's prior written consent, disclose such information to any third-party nor use it for any other purpose; provided, however, that APCO shall have the right to disclose Client's name and the general nature of APCO's work for Client in pitches and business proposals.

The above obligations of confidentiality shall not apply to the extent that APCO can show that the relevant information:

- (i) was at the time of receipt already in APCO's possession;
- (ii) is, or becomes in the future, public knowledge through no fault or omission of APCO;
- (iii) was received from a third-party having the right to disclose it; or
- (iv) is required to be disclosed by law.

Client acknowledges that APCO will file a copy of this Agreement with the U.S. Department of Justice in accordance with the Foreign Agents Registration Act, 22 U.S.C. § 611 et seq, ("FARA") and will make all filings and disclosures as are necessary under FARA.

**D. Non-Solicitation**

Until the first anniversary of the termination of this Agreement, Client shall not, without APCO's prior written consent, hire, engage or solicit the employment or services of any person who is or was during the term of this Agreement employed by or an independent director of APCO. Client acknowledges that the specialized nature of APCO's

proprietary information, trade secrets and other intellectual property are such that a breach of the foregoing covenant would necessarily and inevitably result in disclosure, misappropriation and/or misuse of such proprietary information, trade secrets and other intellectual property and, accordingly, Client acknowledges and agrees that such breach would impose unique and irreparable harm upon APCO and that APCO shall be entitled, in addition to its other rights and remedies, to require, by injunction or decree of specific performance, satisfaction in full of Client's obligations hereunder.

**E. Limitation of Liability**

Neither party will be liable for consequential, indirect or punitive damages (including lost profits or savings) for any cause of action, whether in contract, tort or otherwise, even if the party was or should have been aware of the possibility of these damages. For the avoidance of doubt, the limitation of liability in this paragraph does not apply to the indemnity obligations in this Agreement.

**F. Force Majeure**

Neither party shall be liable to the other party for any loss or damage of any kind or for any default or delay in the performance of its obligations under this Agreement (except for payment obligations) if and to the extent that the same is caused, directly or indirectly, by fire, flood, earthquake, elements of nature, epidemics, pandemics, quarantines, acts of God, acts of war, terrorism, civil unrest or political, religious, civil or economic strife or any other cause beyond a party's reasonable control.

**G. Performance of Third-Party Consultants, Subcontractors and Suppliers**

APCO shall endeavour in good faith to guard against any loss to Client through the failure of Consultants to execute properly their commitments under this Agreement. However, APCO shall not be held liable or responsible for any such failure on the part of such Consultants.

**H. Exclusion of Liability caused by Political or Regulatory Decisions**

While Client may engage APCO to assist it in dealing with certain regulatory or political decisions or actions that may adversely affect Client's business, and while APCO may agree to provide such assistance, APCO cannot be held responsible for and cannot be held liable to Client for any loss, damage, or other adverse consequence that may result from any regulatory or political decision or action being rendered against Client or Client's interests.

**I. Governing Law, Submission to Jurisdiction and Consent to Suit**

THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE GOVERNED BY AND CONSTRUED AND INTERPRETED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAWS OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK (IRRESPECTIVE OF THE CHOICE OF LAWS PRINCIPLES OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK) AS TO ALL MATTERS, INCLUDING MATTERS OF VALIDITY, CONSTRUCTION, EFFECT, ENFORCEABILITY, PERFORMANCE AND REMEDIES. CLIENT SUBMITS ITSELF AND ITS PROPERTY IN ANY LEGAL

ACTION OR PROCEEDING RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT TO THE NONEXCLUSIVE JURISDICTION OF ANY STATE OR FEDERAL COURT OF COMPETENT JURISDICTION IN THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, AND ANY OTHER JURISDICTION WHERE IT OR ANY OF ITS PROPERTY MAY BE FOUND, AND CLIENT HEREBY ACCEPTS VENUE IN EACH SUCH COURT.

**J. Dispute Resolution Procedure**

In the event of a dispute, controversy or claim by and between Client and APCO arising out of or relating to this Agreement or matters related to this Agreement, the parties will first attempt in good faith to resolve through negotiation any such dispute, controversy or claim. Either party may initiate negotiations by providing written notice in letter form to the other party setting forth the subject of the dispute and the relief requested. The recipient of such notice will respond in writing within five (5) business days with a statement of its position on, and recommended solution to, the dispute. If the dispute is not resolved by this exchange of correspondence, then senior management representatives of each party with full settlement authority will meet at a mutually agreeable time and place within fifteen (15) business days of the date of the initial notice in order to exchange relevant information and perspectives and to attempt to resolve the dispute. If the dispute is not resolved by these negotiations, the matter will be submitted to a mutually agreeable retired judge or JAMS for mediation. The mediation shall take place in Washington, D.C.

Except as provided herein, no civil action with respect to any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of or relating to this Agreement may be commenced until the matter has been submitted for mediation. Either party may commence mediation by providing to the other party a written request for mediation, setting forth the subject of the dispute and the relief requested. The parties will cooperate in selecting a mediator and in scheduling the mediation proceedings. The parties will participate in the mediation in good faith and will share equally in its costs. All offers, promises, conduct and statements, whether oral or written, made in the course of the mediation by either of the parties, their agents, employees, experts or attorneys, or by the mediator, are confidential, privileged and inadmissible for any purpose, including impeachment, in any litigation or other proceeding involving the parties; provided, however, that evidence that is otherwise admissible or discoverable shall not be rendered inadmissible or non-discoverable as a result of its use in the mediation. Either party may seek equitable relief prior to the mediation to preserve the *status quo* pending the completion of that process. Except for such an action to obtain equitable relief, neither party may commence a civil action with respect to the matters submitted to mediation until after the completion of the initial mediation session. Mediation may continue after the commencement of a civil action, if the parties so desire. The provisions of this clause may be enforced by any court of competent jurisdiction, and the party seeking enforcement shall be entitled to an award of all reasonable costs, fees and expenses, including legal fees, to be paid by the party against whom enforcement is ordered. In addition, should the dispute under this Agreement involve the failure to pay fees and/or Disbursements under Section III hereof, and the matter is not resolved through negotiation or mediation, Client shall pay all costs

of collection, including, but not limited to, APCO's legal fees and costs should APCO prevail.

**K. Assignment**

Neither party may assign any of its rights or delegate any of its duties or obligations under this Agreement without the express written consent of the other party. Notwithstanding the foregoing, APCO, or its permitted successive assignees or transferees, may assign or transfer this Agreement or delegate any rights or obligations hereunder without consent: (i) to any entity controlled by, or under common control with, APCO, or its permitted successive assignees or transferees; or (2) in connection with a merger, reorganization, transfer, sale of assets or change of control or ownership of APCO, or its permitted successive assignees or transferees.

**L. Partial Invalidity**

In the event that any provision of this Agreement shall be declared illegal or invalid for any reason, said illegality or invalidity shall not affect the remaining provisions hereof, but such illegal or invalid provision shall be fully severable and this Agreement shall be interpreted and enforced as if such illegal or invalid provision had never been included herein.

**M. Notices**

All notices required or permitted to be given pursuant to this Agreement shall be deemed given, if and when personally delivered, delivered by fax, with receipt confirmed, or courier or by overnight mail delivery, in writing to the party or its designated agent or representative at the address stated in the first paragraph of this Agreement or at another address designated by the party.

**N. Counterparts and Execution**

This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which when so executed shall be deemed an original and all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument. The counterparts of this Agreement may be executed by electronic signature and delivered by facsimile, scanned signature, or other electronic means by any of the parties to any other party and the receiving party may rely on the receipt of this Agreement so executed and delivered as if the original had been received.

**O. Survival**

Section III, Section IV and Section V shall continue notwithstanding the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

**P. Entire Agreement**

This Agreement and attached Annex(es) constitute the entire and only agreement between the parties respecting the subject matter hereof. Each party acknowledges that in entering into this Agreement it has not relied on any representation or undertaking, whether oral or in writing, save such as are expressly incorporated herein. Further, this

Agreement may be changed or varied only by a written agreement signed by the parties. Any purchase order provided by the Client will be limited by, and subject to, the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Additional or contrary terms, whether in the form of a purchase order, invoice, acknowledgement, confirmation or otherwise, will be inapplicable, and the terms of this Agreement will control in the event of any conflict between such terms and this Agreement.

**4/10/2015**

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Nate: This is Nate Wright here with Omar Ashmawy from the Office of Congressional Ethics. We are interviewing the CTAA Program Director ...

Witness: [Name of Witness].

Nate: [Name of Witness]. I apologize if I mispronounce that in the future. It's April 10th, 2015. What is your current employment?

Witness: Council of Turkic American Associations.

Nate: How long have you been with CTAA? Do you mind if I use the acronym CTAA?

Witness: Yeah, no problem. Since the end of 2011.

Omar: What's your title?

Witness: Program director.

Omar: Generally, what does that . . . What do you do?

Witness: We have a lot of cultural events outside that we also have member organizations in the nine states. They host a lot of events. I try to coordinate that with their office and our headquarters in New York. We also do a lot of state capital day events so we send out a lot of invitations. We invite our member organizations in the local area to attend. That's about it. We also organize trips of course like this one to Turkey, Azerbaijan, Kazakhstan. I do a lot of the coordinating and planning.

Nate: Who do you report to?

Witness: Mr. Furkan Kosar, our president.

Omar: Do you have any . . . program director your only role for the organization?

Witness: Yeah.

Nate: Are you employed with any other organizations?

Witness: No, only the council.

Nate: A few questions generally about the council. How is the council funded? How do you raise money?

1 Witness: They do a lot of fundraising activities with our local member organizations, with  
2 businessmen. That's one of the details but Mr. Furkan takes care of all the  
3 donation-collecting activities, but mostly fundraising events with Turkish-  
4 American businessmen.

5 Nate: Okay. Do you know generally how he does? Is it putting together events, with  
6 people coming in?

7 Witness: Yeah. Also a lot of people attend our events that we host throughout the year.

23 Witness: No. Their event was a convention. Yeah, a convention. They had their US-  
24 Azerbaijan convention at the Willard. That's when I became familiar with the

1 Witness: No. Turquoise hosted that event, and then in 2014 AFAZ, Assembly hosted that  
2 event.

3 Nate: Do you know when they changed from Turquoise in 2012 to AFAZ in 2014?

4 Witness: I have no idea. I guess they formed a new organization and that organization  
5 took over a lot of details.

6 Nate: When you say took over, what do you mean by that?

7 Witness: They started hosting the event. I'm sure about the details but I'm just assuming.

8 Nate: Okay. Do you have any reason why one was . . . Any knowledge of why one  
9 would be switched out for the other?

10 Witness: I have no idea.

11 Nate: Any idea of who would be in a position to make that decision?

12 Witness: Probably their board. Maybe they thought that it was better to host it with . . .  
13 Azerbaijan name under it, but I don't know much details because we don't share

15 Omar: Do you know Kemal Oksuz?

16 Witness: Yeah, I know Kemal.

17 Omar: He is president of both organizations, or at least he was.

18 Witness: I guess he left Turquoise. I guess Bilal is the new president, but I don't know

20 Nate: Was it around the same time that AFAZ took over the convention?

21 Witness: AFAZ I learned about them during the convention but after . . . It was in the

23 Witness: I would assume that all the events were done by Mr. Oksuz and Rafig . . . I know  
24 Rafig too. I guess Rafig is helping Mr. Oksuz. I don't know his official title in the  
25 organization. He just said he works for AFAZ.

26 Nate: Does Resul ever help with AFAZ? Resul Aksoy.

1 Witness: Resul? I only saw him at the Turquoise event and then I see him at the Turkey  
2 event, but I didn't see him at the AFAZ event.

3 Nate: At least for the AFAZ events that you have been to, is SOCAR also at these  
4 events, the state-owned oil company of Azerbaijan?

5 Witness: The one at the convention that they host in D.C.? Yeah, they were there.

6 Nate: What was their role?

7 Witness: They had a banner. They were one of the sponsors of the event in D.C.

8 Nate: They had previously sponsored the US-Azerbaijan convention and it was done  
9 through the Turquoise Council. Do you remember that?

10 Witness: I am not sure about that one. I know because at the reception there was a huge  
11 banner at the one in D.C. that they had the sponsors on the right side, but the  
12 one in Azerbaijan I didn't see any flyers. I just saw a huge sign that said US-  
13 Azerbaijan convention and it just had the date on it, but I didn't see the  
14 sponsors. I don't remember.

15 Nate: Let's talk about the convention itself, the 2013 convention of Azerbaijan. How  
16 did the council, CTAA, become involved in the convention?

17 Witness: Kemal Oksuz under the TAA umbrella they meet once a month. I guess it was  
18 brought up there and then Mr. Furkan when we have our annual meetings he  
19 said we're going to be planning, taking electoral officials to Azerbaijan and  
20 Turkey like we always do. That's how we got involved.

21 Nate: Were you a part of that initial discussion at the TAA meeting?

22 Witness: No, I wasn't in that meeting.

23 Nate: You first found out about it from Mr. Kosar.

24 Witness: Yes.

25 Nate: Okay. What was your role in helping to put together . . . get these elected  
26 officials over to the convention?

27 Witness: I shared the information. We had the itinerary information about Turkey and  
28 Azerbaijan. We were planning the booklet that we were going to give out to the

1 members' office, so I sent a lot of emails. I met with staffers in D.C. I shared  
2 information regarding the trip.

3 Nate: What was the primary purpose of the convention?

4 Witness: The convention was that, if I'm not mistaken, three or four panels regarding each  
5 topic, but I don't remember the topics. Most are related to US-Azerbaijan  
6 relations. One was I think regarding energy. The other one was trade I think, but  
7 if you want I can look it up and send that to you later. They had different panels  
8 and they had one reception.

9 Nate: Aside from the council and Kemal Oksuz, who else was involved in organizing the  
10 convention and trying to help get elected officials traveling to the convention?

11 Witness: You mean outside our organization?

12 Omar: Yeah. We know Kemal obviously was involved. You guys were involved. Who else  
13 was helping put this thing together, both here and on the ground in Azerbaijan?

14 Witness: In the ground, it was Resul and Kemal Oksuz and our organization. We were  
15 contacting with their office for the details.

16 Omar: What about an organization called Practical Solutions Group?

17 Witness: I have no . . . It's the first time I am hearing that name of the organization.

18 Nate: Do you know Irada . . . I think it's pronounced Akhoundova in Houston?

19 Witness: No. Irada?

20 Omar: From the United States side, who else was involved other than you guys and the  
21 Turquoise Council and Kemal?

22 Witness: Our member organizations, they were all there too. The TAA members, they  
23 were there.

24 Nate: The other sister federations?

25 Witness: The other sister federations. They were at Baku.

26 Nate: How did you decide who was going to reach out to which travelers? What kinds  
27 of discussions led up to figuring out who you were going to invite to attend?

1 Witness: We also have different local events. Our largest Turkish-American community  
2 lives in Brooklyn, in Queens, in Sunnyside, so Congressman Gregory Meeks used  
3 to attend our local events. We had him over here for a couple of meetings  
4 before. We even invited him to come to Turkey in the years before. He couldn't  
5 travel to Turkey. I guess during that week he had another arrangement so he just  
6 came to the Baku part of the event.

7 Congressman Leonard Lance from New Jersey, he also came to our center  
8 numerous times, and then we invited him and he said he's willing to attend the  
9 event. I guess one of his close friends was also attending the event but from  
10 another state, I forgot which member, so we invited him.

11 Also Congresswoman Clarke, she is also from Brooklyn, she came to our member  
12 organization. There's a Brooklyn school. She gave a speech to the students.  
13 These are members that have been attending our events and visiting our center  
14 who are close to our community so we invited them.

15 Nate: You said initially that it was Kemal's idea that he brought up at the TAA event.  
16 Was there any discussion about why wasn't Kemal just sponsoring all of the  
17 members of Congress traveling?

18 Witness: Why was it Kemal sponsoring?

19 Nate: Yeah. Why wasn't Kemal reaching out to Meeks, Lance, and Clarke directly?

20 Witness: No, because we organize trips to Turkey and Azerbaijan so he said . . . We always  
21 do it at the end of March during the area in March, June, August because we do  
22 our . . . The weathers are nice and it's a better time to travel. If I'm going to host  
23 the event, the convention, during that time too so when we are doing our  
24 normal Turkey trip we also added Azerbaijan. We met with some of the  
25 organizations there and also attend the convention. We went to Turkey and then  
26 back to the U.S.

27 Nate: Kemal was trying to leverage that there were already discussions of hosting trips  
28 around that time frame?

29 Witness: Yeah. That's when we usually host our trips.

30 Omar: Were you guys going to host a trip in 2013 regardless?

31 Witness: Yeah.

1 Omar: What trip did you guys have planned for this timeframe?

2 Witness: Turkey.

3 Omar: Turkey?

4 Witness: Yeah.

5 Omar: Had you already sent out any invitations yet for it?

6 Witness: We sent out invitations before that trip. I'm not sure if it falls in that time frame  
7 but we sent out a couple of invitations before, but these didn't work.

8 Omar: Normally how many members would you take over, or how many staff and  
9 members would you take over?

10 Witness: If it's a member, if it's just one we still take the member, but if we're going to do  
11 a staff trip we try to get a minimum of five.

12 Nate: Normally your trips are to Turkey. Had you taken trips, members or staff, to  
13 Azerbaijan in the past?

14 Witness: No. That was the first time we hosted Azerbaijan for the staff, but we also  
15 organized our trips for local elected officials down to Turkey and Kyrgyzstan for  
16 example.

17 Nate: What convinced you to add Azerbaijan onto your normal trips?

18 Witness: We always had the plan to add Azerbaijan, Kazakhstan and Kyrgyzstan because  
19 we're not just Turkish but Turkic-Americans, so we try to improve the relations  
20 between the Turkic countries and not just Turkey.

21 Omar: Why 2013 as opposed to any other time? What about 2013 made you guys say,  
22 "Yes, let's send people over to Azerbaijan"?

23 Witness: I guess Kemal was the one who came up with the idea let's do the convention. It  
24 might be a nice start. We have made business before like with Mr. Furkan and  
25 other organizations, our local organizations. They have been doing trips to  
26 Turkey and Azerbaijan but not federal trips, smaller trips with local teachers or  
27 students. They have been doing those types of activities so we have been  
28 familiar with Azerbaijan, and we were hosting smaller Azerbaijani events

1 throughout the area with the community members. I guess it was time to put  
2 that convention and this was a start.

3 Nate: You were familiar with how to arrange for things in Baku, how to arrange for  
4 hotels and transportation and visas and all the rest of it, because you had done  
5 the smaller events beforehand?

6 Witness: Those smaller events they were usually staying at local campuses in the schools,  
7 but with the planning I was talking with Resul with the convention logistic-wise.

8 Nate: It was in terms of transportation on the ground, hotels and the rest. Did Resul  
9 also travel to Azerbaijan previously?

10 Witness: I am not sure if he traveled, but he was at the convention in Baku. He was there.  
11 I don't know about his past travel.

12 Nate: Okay.

13 Omar: How involved were you in the organizing of the conference and the travel?

14 Witness: I was only dealing with the invitation ones, sending invitations to electoral  
15 officials, meeting with the staff members to talk the details about the itinerary  
16 and how the events can be broken down. That's about it.

17 Omar: Mr. Wright asked you about the other organizations and you referenced these  
18 sister organizations or the organizations that make up TAA.

19 Witness: Yeah.

20 Omar: What role did they have in planning this?

21 Witness: I don't know if they played a role. I guess they invited people who are familiar  
22 with their organization.

23 Omar: Did you see when . . . In the things you said you worked on the agenda, you  
24 worked on certain other aspects of this. Did any of these other organizations like  
25 the Turkic Federation of the Midwest or the South or the mid-Atlantic, did any of  
26 them have any . . . Did you see anything that they were doing as part of the  
27 organizing of the event?

28 Witness: No, because we were only together with the other federations for the  
29 convention. In Turkey, in our local visits I didn't see any of them so we had a

1 different agenda so I don't know how their trips or how their members reacted  
2 during the trip, but when we were on the trip we were with the ones that we  
3 invited. I didn't really interact with the other organizations in Baku.

4 Omar: There's something we didn't ask before, I'm sorry, which was . . . We talked  
5 about your role here. Do you get a regular salary?

6 Witness: Yeah, a regular salary.

7 Omar: It's set. It's standard.

8 Witness: Yes.

9 Omar: Roughly even, about how much do you get paid a week or so? Do you get paid  
10 weekly or monthly?

11 Witness: Monthly.

12 Omar: About how much a month?

13 Witness: Two thousand, before taxes.

14 Omar: Is that your sole income?

15 Witness: Yes, sole income.

16 Nate: Do you have other sources of . . . Like family money and other things like that?

17 Witness: No, but I stay with my parents if that counts as a . . .

18 Nate: It does. It certainly helps with New York rents.

19 Witness: Yeah.

20 Omar: Do you know if . . . Does everybody who works for the council receive a set  
21 income, or does it depend?

22 Witness: I don't know the detail. I guess the only ones that will get paid is me and Mr.  
23 Kosar but I don't know if there is anyone else on the payroll. We are the only  
24 ones in the office. I don't know how the breakdown works.

25 Omar: Do you know what his salary his?

1 Witness: I have no idea.

2 Nate: Are there ever months where you are told to delay depositing your salary or  
3 things like that because there isn't enough money in the account?

4 Witness: No, I never ran into that.

5 Nate: Do you know if Mr. Kosar ever did?

6 Witness: I guess when he sends me the checks that you guys were asking for [inaudible] I  
7 guess he said that he deposited them late, but I'm not sure if he received them  
8 late or not. I don't know the details.

9 Nate: We want to ask you a few questions leading into the council's decision to  
10 sponsor travelers to the convention. We spoke with Mr. Kosar and he told us  
11 that the council didn't have enough money in its account when it first began to  
12 consider whether or not it would sponsor travelers. Does that sound accurate?  
13 Do you remember any discussions about we need to make sure we have enough  
14 money before we decide to take travelers over to Turkey and . . .

15 Witness: I'm not really involved in the decision making. Mr. Furkan and the board decides  
16 the funding or giving approval for the travel, so I don't know anything about that.

17 Nate: When you're reaching out to members and inviting them to come, is there any  
18 limitation that Mr. Kosar has placed on you like, "Only invite three people right  
19 now because we may not have enough money to pay for five"?

20 Witness: For this trip?

21 Nate: Yes.

22 Witness: For this trip our initial goal was to bring three people yes, but I think we invited  
23 more than three because we knew that not everyone was going to accept to  
24 travel.

25 Nate: That's three members but you also invited . . . I think you mentioned before that  
26 you invited a lot of other local officials, not members of Congress but it might be  
27 maybe state-elected officials and local people.

28 Witness: State-wise it's easier to fund because they pay for their own flight. They also give  
29 a certain amount of money. Our local organizations do those trips like our  
30 member organization in Queens, TCC Queens, Turkish Cultural Center of Queens,

1 they invite some local officials. Funding those trips are . . . It funds itself because  
2 they pay for their own flight. Also they give a certain amount of money to fund  
3 the activities that are done in Turkey and in Baku.

4 Nate: Do you remember Kosar doing any sort of fundraising leading up to this to make  
5 sure that there was enough money?

6 Witness: No. Like I said the planning of this trip I didn't speak with Mr. Kemar at all but I  
7 spoke with Resul getting close to the date to get more information, and I saw  
8 Mr. Kemal in Baku so I don't know if he did any fundraising.

9 Nate: Did Mr. Kosar do any fundraising?

10 Witness: No. For our trip or for the convention?

11 Nate: For your trips. You said your goal was to get-

12 Witness: Yes, for our trip we did do fundraising.

13 Nate: Okay. Do you know how you went about the fundraising, like what he was  
14 doing?

15 Witness: He met with local businessmen that come to our event. We gave them  
16 information about the trip.

17 Nate: He said like, "We're trying to get this convention together and we need enough  
18 money to take three people."

19 Witness: Yes.

20 Nate: Was there a budget about how much it would cost to take these three people  
21 over?

22 Witness: From . . . did I come up with a budget or . . .

23 Nate: Did he have an estimate in his mind?

24 Witness: I'm not sure.

25 Nate: When you're going through the process of finding flights and when you're talking  
26 with Resul about the itinerary and what's been happening in the country, is there  
27 any discussion about, "We only have X amount of money to pay on this trip so

1 we need to be conscious of making sure that we don't spend more money than  
2 we have"?

3 Witness: I never got into money details with Resul. Mr. Furkan was taking care of all the  
4 funding. The only things that I spoke with Resul was how the itinerary was and  
5 what was going to happen, how the convention was going to happen and who's  
6 going to be on the panels to share with our guests that were coming.

7 Nate: You didn't talk with him about arranging travel to and from the airport, the  
8 hotels and things like that?

9 Witness: No.

10 Nate: Did you arrange that?

11 Witness: No, I didn't arrange it.

12 Nate: Who arranged for the transportation and the hotels in Baku?

13 Witness: In Baku we didn't have any flights. There was only hotel.

14 Nate: No I know, but once you get out of the hotel how do you get . . . Or you get out  
15 of the airport, travel in . . .

16 Witness: You're talking about from New York to Istanbul to Baku?

17 Omar: No. I think what Mr. Wright is asking is who arranged for ground transportation  
18 in Azerbaijan?

19 Witness: The Turquoise.

20 Nate: Okay.

21 Omar: Who arranged for hotels in Azerbaijan?

22 Witness: Turquoise.

23 Omar: All right. Who handled . . . Basically it's other than . . . It sounds like you guys  
24 handled some of the travel from here to Turkey and Azerbaijan, but beyond that  
25 who handled the other aspects of the travel? It sounds to me like other than the  
26 flights everything else was handled by Kemal.

1 Witness: In Baku.

2 Omar: In Baku.

3 Witness: Yes. The Turquoise arranged the hotels and the transportation.

4 Omar: What role did you personally have in helping Kemal arrange those details?

5 Witness: I just sent them our guests, our flight information. That's it.

6 Omar: Anything else?

7 Witness: That's it. Not to Kemal personally, but to Resul. I just saw Kemal at the  
8 convention but I didn't really have an interaction with him.

9 Nate: Did you have any discussions with anyone in the Turquoise Council about making  
10 sure that those in-country expenses wouldn't be high that the council couldn't  
11 pay for them?

12 Witness: No. Like I said, I never had any money discussions. Mr. Furkan took care of all  
13 those.

14 Omar: You guys didn't pay for the hotels in Baku. Correct?

15 Witness: I don't know if they paid for it but I guess Mr. Kosar he told me that they made a  
16 wire transfer to Turquoise for the fees for the hotels and transportation in Baku.

17 Omar: Do you know when that wire transfer was made?

18 Witness: I guess he said recently, a couple of days.

19 Omar: Did you have any conversations with Resul or anyone at the Turquoise Council  
20 about the hotels? Were you concerned about arranging where your guests were  
21 going to sleep and spend the night in Azerbaijan?

22 Witness: No.

23 Omar: How did that work out? You just left it to them to-

24 Witness: No. They had two hotels, the Four Seasons and the Hilton, that was reserved for  
25 the convention so everyone was staying at those two hotels. That's why it didn't  
26 come up.

1 Omar: I guess maybe I'm being a little unclear in my question. You're flying members of  
2 state house representatives and you're flying members of Congress over to  
3 Azerbaijan. Did you have a conversation about where they were going to sleep?

4 Witness: No, I knew where they were going to sleep.

5 Omar: Did at some point someone from the Turquoise Council say, "Don't worry about  
6 that. We'll handle the hotels"?

7 Witness: No, because Mr. Furkan . . . we itinerary, we knew where they were going to  
8 stay, so I was just speaking with Resul on the dates and how many rooms. That's  
9 it.

10 Omar: Is there, then, just an understanding that the Turquoise Council is handling the  
11 hotels?

12 Witness: Yeah.

13 Omar: Okay. That makes sense.

14 Nate: I want to just walk through to make sure I understand the process here, if you  
15 won't mind indulging me. This is a document, NIL 1333. It's an email from Resul  
16 to Tursan Travel or Nil Travel.

17 Witness: Yeah.

18 Nate: The flights were organized through Nil Travel. Is that correct?

19 Witness: Yes.

20 Nate: This here . . . There is a spreadsheet that's attached to this email. This email says  
21 Council of Turkic-American Association's travel info, so these are the listed  
22 people that your . . . Is this what you pulled together? Is this something that  
23 Resul put together?

24 Witness: These are the only ones that I've put together. I know a couple of these names.  
25 These are local organizations in Vermont and New Hampshire. These were done  
26 to our local events. They sent this information to Resul. These are the only ones  
27 that I took care of.

28 Nate: Okay.

1 Omar: What does K.O. mean in column H?

2 Witness: I have no idea. I didn't prepare this list so I'm not sure.

3 Omar: Just to be clear, this spreadsheet was prepared by who?

4 Witness: I have no idea. This is the first time I am seeing this sheet.

5 Omar: Okay.

6 Nate: This is CTAA 0021.

7 Witness: Yeah, this . . . I've seen this before.

8 Nate: How was payment arranged for these flights?

9 Witness: For this one, recently I was told that we had a balance that we didn't pay with  
10 them. Mr. Kosar also said that this was paid recently too, so this is all I know  
11 about this one.

12 Nate: Who told you that you still had an unpaid balance?

13 Witness: Mr. Kosar.

14 Nate: Did you know beforehand that you had this balance?

15 Witness: No.

16 Nate: Did anyone from Tursan Travel reach out to you and say, "Hey, you have this  
17 balance that was standing"?

18 Witness: Not to me.

19 Omar: Can I see this? Yeah. One second. My Turkish isn't too good but we do have two  
20 documents to show you that we received today, from Tursan Travel.

21 Witness: Yeah.

22 Omar: It looks like according to the owner of Tursan Travel that they were reminders to  
23 you for balances owed for the tickets.

24 Witness: Yeah. This was in 2013.

1 Omar: Yes.

2 Witness: Yeah.

3 Omar: This is just for clarity. You just said that no one ever told you that you guys owed  
4 money for those tickets, but it looks like actually somebody did.

5 Witness: No. They did but we sent the check. I was told at this stage that we sent the  
6 check, that we made the payment.

7 Omar: Who told you that?

8 Witness: I'm talking about recently. I got this email and during this time I thought the  
9 payment was made, but recently . . . When I mean recently, after Mr. Kosar had  
10 interviewed with you guys, he said that we have a due balance with Nil Travel  
11 and we need to pay them. That's when I knew that we still owe them so this is  
12 new.

13 Nate: You believed after receiving that email that the balance was paid?

14 Witness: That it was paid, that they sent the payment. They said they sent the check to  
15 them.

16 Nate: How would that payment have been handled from the council? Does that go  
17 through the accountant or does that go through Mr. Kosar?

18 Witness: Mr. Kosar and the accountant.

19 Nate: Okay. What would you have done when you received this invoice?

20 Witness: I forward this to Mr. Kosar, but he was CC on this too.

21 Omar: If we can just retrieve those. If I can back up just a minute, back to the document  
22 marked NIL 1334 which is just this spreadsheet, I just wanted you to ... You had  
23 mentioned something and I just want to clarify. I know you said this is the first  
24 time you saw this. Correct?

25 Witness: Yeah.

26 Omar: You said that the only three individuals that you were responsible for were  
27 Congresswoman Clarke, Congressman Meeks and Congressman Lance.

1 Witness: Lance, yeah.

2 Omar: How did the other ones get involved? Specifically, how did the other ones get  
3 invited?

4 Witness: Our member organizations.

5 Omar: Okay, but you didn't have anything to do with that?

6 Witness: No.

7 Omar: By your member organizations, can you be a little more specific? Are they the  
8 safe-

9 Witness: We have 45 member organizations in nine states, mostly cultural centers,  
10 business associations and three private schools who are our member  
11 organizations. They do a lot of events. We also help them with their events so  
12 they do a lot of trips themselves to Turkey with electoral officials. They were also  
13 invited to the convention and I guess they invited some of the elected officials  
14 who are close to the organization.

15 Omar: They provided those names directly to Resul?

16 Witness: I think so.

17 Omar: Okay. Just out of curiosity, why didn't they provide them to you? Why didn't all  
18 that information go through you?

19 Witness: Maybe they did provide to Mr. Furkan but like I said, I didn't provide any of these  
20 names to Resul.

21 Omar: Because they're your member organizations, it would seem to me that they  
22 would involve you in the process.

23 Witness: No, I knew that they were inviting people but I didn't know which names they  
24 invited or who did they send it to? That's what I'm saying. I'm assuming that they  
25 sent it to Resul.

26 Omar: Okay.

27 Nate: What would be the conversation that would happen before these three would  
28 end up on this spreadsheet?

1 Witness: You mean how they added the composition?

2 Nate: Yeah.

3 Witness: Whose list is this?

4 Nate: It's a list that appears to have been created by Resul that was sent to Tursan  
5 Travel, so I'm presuming that you had some sort of communications with Resul  
6 saying these are three people.

7 Witness: Yeah.

8 Nate: What would that have entailed?

9 Witness: We invited these three people. They will be at the convention so I told them that  
10 they were going to be at the convention and I sent them three names.

11 Nate: Okay. Did you tell him anything about how those particular individuals' flights  
12 and travel were going to be paid?

13 Witness: They were going to be paid to our organization.

14 Nate: Would you have told that to Resul beforehand or would you have assumed that  
15 he understood that?

16 Witness: No, I told him beforehand.

17 Nate: Okay. Why did you tell it to him and not just assume that he would understand  
18 you were paying for them?

19 Witness: Because the state reps had tickets that were being paid by their organizations.  
20 They were also paying for our member organizations, the Turkish guys, to go on  
21 the trip. They were also paid by their organizations too. I told him that because  
22 of the ethics rule we were going to pay for three elected officials that we invited.

23 Nate: Okay. You understood that the Turquoise Council was paying for everyone else's  
24 flights-

25 Witness: Yes.

26 Nate: You realized that would be a problem with the ethics committee if they also paid  
27 for these three, so you would have said, "Treat these three differently too."

1     Witness:     Yes.

2     Nate:         Okay. Really quick and in terms of process, when we spoke with Mr. Kosar he  
3                   indicated that the process for putting the travel together was a little different.  
4                   He said that he would have reached out to his accountant and told his  
5                   accountant to book the flights and pay for the flights. Is that something that he  
6                   would have done? It appears like based on these documents that it was Resul  
7                   and Tursan Travel that were organizing the flights?

8     Witness:     No. We spoke with Tursan to arrange the flights and we were going to make the  
9                   payments to Tursan.

10    Nate:         You communicated that to Resul?

11    Witness:     No. Not to Resul, to Bahri.

12    Nate:         Okay. What was . . . That was before the flights were booked?

13    Witness:     That was before the flights were booked, yes.

14    Nate:         Who was it that had the conversation with Bahri?

15    Witness:     I spoke to Bahri. Mr. Furkan, I think, spoke to Bahri also.

16    Nate:         What did you tell him?

17    Witness:     I told him the dates, the times and the locations where they want to flight out  
18                   from.

19    Nate:         What did you tell him about payment?

20    Witness:     I told him that Mr. Furkan is going to make the payment.

21    Omar:         Out of curiosity, why was part of Representative Lance's travel booked through  
22                   World of Travel?

23    Witness:     Because it wasn't Turkish Airlines. It was United. He wanted to fly off from New  
24                   Jersey and Turkish Airlines doesn't fly out from-

25    Omar:         From Newark.

26    Witness:     From Newark.

1 Omar: Okay.

2 Nate: Tursan Travel wasn't going to book it through United?

3 Witness: I thought they were only working with Turkish Airlines because there we book  
4 Turkish Airline flights. I'm not even sure if they do book United.

5 Nate: Okay. Was that a . . . We have seen that they do book, they did book United  
6 flights for this, so I am just wondering if that was a conversation that you had  
7 with Bahri or is that just something you assumed?

8 Witness: No. I spoke to him about the Turkish Airline flights, and then we also presented  
9 Congressman Lance with the same itinerary with Turkish Airlines when he said  
10 he wanted to fly from United so we booked it through World of Travel.

11 Nate: Okay. A couple of quick questions about . . . I had a hard time trying to wrap my  
12 head about the timeline here. This is CTAA 0022.

13 Witness: Yeah.

14 Omar: This is the . . . It looks like it's an invoice for Lance from World of Travel for the  
15 leg of the trip from Newark to-

16 Witness: Newark to Istanbul. From Istanbul to Newark.

17 Nate: This is dated May 15, 2013 and it shows that there is no balance due. Am I  
18 reading that correctly?

19 Witness: Yeah.

20 Nate: Okay, and then I don't . . . This is CTAA 0137. This is a copy of the bank statement  
21 from May. Here on the 29th, a check ending in two-one is the \$6,100 payment  
22 for the flights. I am just wondering . . . Here is the actual check. It's CTAA 0174.  
23 The check here is dated May 23rd for \$6,100 to World of Travel, and then it  
24 looks like they cashed it on the 28th.

25 Witness: Yeah.

26 Nate: It looks like it hit the bank account on the 29th. Why does the invoice for the  
27 15th show there isn't a balance due?

28 Witness: I have no idea.

1 Nate: While I have the bank records out, just a quick question. I switch to the page  
2 marked CTAA 0139. These are the balance available in the account. You saw  
3 from this email before at the beginning, May 3rd at least Resul had included on  
4 his list the three members that you were sponsoring.

5 Witness: Yeah.

6 Nate: It looks like around that time that the bank account did not have enough money  
7 to have supported the travel. Do you remember any conversations about we  
8 need to fundraise, we don't have enough money to do this, we need to take this  
9 as balances?

10 Witness: No.

11 Nate: You see here it looks like you may have done the fundraising so on the 9th there  
12 is a deposit, \$25,000. That might have been the fundraising amount possibly. Do  
13 you have any knowledge of whether or not that was?

14 Witness: Yeah. This was the amount from fundraising activities.

15 Nate: That was the fundraising activities, which would have been enough money to  
16 cover the-

17 Witness: This was the one that we were talking about to cover.

18 Nate: That would have been enough money to cover the flights. My question though is  
19 that what we don't see is payments for . . . We don't see any payments for the  
20 flights in this record other than the check here for Representative Lance's leg of  
21 the trip. Instead it looks like here you produce these checks to us. Instead it looks  
22 like Mr. Kosar was taking money in salary.

23 Witness: Yeah.

24 Nate: Help me understand why that is. He is raising money for this convention, knows  
25 that he is going to be spending. He probably thinks he is going to be spending  
26 somewhere maybe above \$20,000 on travel and trips, knows he's going to have  
27 balances coming due. Why is he suddenly taking salary instead of paying for  
28 those expenses?

29 Witness: I don't know. Recently I was told that these were deposited after you actually  
30 asked for the copies of the checks. That's when I . . . For the first time I saw that

1 these were deposited, that he placed these checks. I was aware that from this  
2 we were going to use this to pay for the trips so that's all I know about that.

3 Nate: Okay. One more quick question just in case you know, 5/13 there is a deposit for  
4 \$6,100.

5 Witness: Yes.

6 Nate: Do you know where that came from? It seems to me a little odd that it seems to  
7 match up exactly with the amount of money that was used to pay for a leg of  
8 Representative Lance's trip.

9 Witness: He might know better.

10 Nate: Okay.

11 Witness: The bookkeeper.

12 Nate: You don't know?

13 Witness: No, I don't know who deposited.

14 Nate: Okay.

15 Witness: I know it's a donation but I don't know the name of who donated it or why the  
16 amount is . . .

17 Nate: Yeah, so you don't remember any discussions . . .

18 Witness: No.

19 Nate: We need to get someone to give us this particular amount for that portion of  
20 Representative . . .

21 Witness: The trip, we knew how much money we needed for the trip. I don't know why  
22 they came up to the exact number.

23 Omar: You did say you know it's a donation. You just don't know . . . You just . . .

24 Witness: Yeah, I know it's a donation because you guys requested for the images] of the  
25 check, and then when I was speaking with him I asked him the one on 13 what is  
26 that? It matches the same amount as the ticket. I was saying, "Is that the charge

1 for the ticket?" and he said it was a donation. That's when I found out it was a  
2 donation. All I know is it's a donation.

3 Omar: Okay.

4 Nate: Okay.

5 Omar: Just speak for the record, when you say him, you're talking about the  
6 accountant?

7 Witness: The bookkeeper.

8 Nate: The bookkeeper.

9 Witness: Yeah, Mr. Arican

10 Nate: Mr. Kosar told us that for the Turkey portion of the trip that an organization  
11 called BAKIAD covered the expenses for the hotel. What is the council's  
12 arrangement with BAKIAD?

13 Witness: We have an agreement with them. I don't know the exact details. Once we plan  
14 the itinerary I send them our emails. I tell them, "This is the hotel that we want  
15 to stay. This is the place they're going to visit," so they make the arrangements  
16 accordingly to the trip.

17 Omar: Do you know who runs the organization in Turkey, BAKIAD?

18 Witness: The head? I know a guy named [Levent]. He takes care of logistics. I don't know  
19 who runs the organization.

20 Omar: Is Levent your point of contact over there?

21 Witness: Yes, Levent is my point of contact.

22 Omar: Do you know how BAKIAD raises their money?

23 Witness: I have no idea.

24 Omar: They're a Turkish organization, right? They're a local-

25 Witness: Yeah, Turkish organization.

1 Omar: They're a Turkish organization?

2 Witness: Yeah.

3 Omar: Okay.

4 Nate: This is document CTAA 071. This is what was sent to us as the agreement  
5 between CTAA and BAKIAD. Obviously I am not able to read in Turkish. I don't  
6 know if you are able to look through and if that helps provide any details on the  
7 arrangement. I guess what we're looking for is what was the agreement in terms  
8 of how BAKIAD would arrange for travel and how payments would be handled.

9 Omar: While you look that over just to clarify for the record, the document is CTAA  
10 0171.

11 Witness: In the beginning it just said this is an agreement. The purpose of this agreement  
12 is to show the cultural, social, theater, business aspects to form a friendship  
13 bridge with dialogue. These are the goals of BAKIAD. We're an organization to  
14 show the hospitality. It's pickup and drop off to the airport from point A to point  
15 B where they want to go. Make the reservations beforehand, before the guests  
16 come to ... If there's going to be in-flight travel, make the reservation. If phone  
17 calls need to be made, if they need to have money transfer, U.S. money to  
18 Turkish money, we will be helping with that. Security, health insurance for  
19 tourists if they're going to have sightseeing or plan a guide. At the end of the  
20 trip, take them back to the airport.

21 Omar: Paragraph three, does that say . . .

22 Witness: We don't ask for payment for the things that we provide, but their  
23 transportation has to be paid from their end.

24 Omar: From . . .

25 Witness: The organization that is coming to visit.

26 Nate: Okay, so from-

27 Witness: From us.

28 Nate: The U.S. to Turkey that transportation has to be covered.

29 Omar: Paragraph four, seems to relate to hotels. Is that correct?

1 Witness: We will consider the hotels, the locations, the guide and the companies that you  
2 guys ask for.

3 Omar: Is there a priority or limits to them paying for the hotels?

4 Witness: Let me read over. It's just saying 15 days before, you have to send the  
5 information. Paragraph five ... Yeah, it's right here.

6 Omar: Which paragraph?

7 Witness: It's not a paragraph, you know, the one with dots?

8 Omar: Oh yes, on the first page.

9 Witness: On the first page, one, two, three ... The fourth one.

10 Nate: What does it say?

11 Witness: It says if there is going to be travel inside the country they will pay for the ticket.

12 Nate: Okay, and that's part of . . . I think you said paragraph three talks about they  
13 don't ask, they won't ask for repayment but you are required to cover the cost of  
14 travel to get to the country.

15 Witness: Yes, to get to the country. Outside that . . . Here it doesn't say payment but that  
16 they will take care of, they will arrange for the airport pickup. Organization-wise  
17 BAKIAD will take care of those aspects of the trips, last dot.

18 Nate: Okay, thank you. Do you know who signed this for . . . The individual who signed  
19 this for BAKIAD?

20 Witness: Irfan?

21 Nate: Yeah.

22 Witness: I don't know Irfan.

23 Nate: Okay. You don't know what role he might play in BAKIAD?

24 Witness: He is the Bogazici means president so I'm assuming he's the president, his title  
25 under his name.

1 Nate: Okay, and then really quick if you flip over to the next page this is CTAA 0179.  
2 This is a letter that we received recently discussing outstanding balances. Who  
3 drafted the letter?

4 Witness: Mr. Ismail Arican. He told me what happened so I wrote this for him.

5 Nate: Okay.

6 Witness: He told me this is what happened. Mr. Kosar told me to ask him certain  
7 questions and he gave me his information, so I drafted it for him.

8 Nate: Okay. The second bullet point talks about travel-related costs to BAKIAD.

9 Witness: This one?

10 Nate: Yeah.

11 Witness: Yes.

12 Nate: How did you calculate the travel-related costs for BAKIAD?

13 Witness: The hotel expenses which also includes the transportation that the hotel  
14 provides, and also \$45 per day meal for each member.

15 Nate: How did you know what the hotel cost was?

16 Witness: From Mr. Furkan Kosar. It was on the form that we actually sent to the  
17 committee to.

18 Nate: Okay. He told us that the way that he calculated the hotels in Turkey and in Baku  
19 was that he would look up what the going rate was for a hotel. Does that sound  
20 familiar to you?

21 Witness: Yeah. We usually do that before the trip.

22 Nate: Okay, but even on the post-travel disclosure forms he said that that's how we  
23 know because he didn't ... There wasn't an invoice from TCAE or from BAKIAD?

24 Witness: Yeah, there wasn't any invoice.

25 Nate: Down the third bullet point here, the \$950 balance to TCAE, is that the same  
26 calculation?

1 Witness: The same calculation.

2 Nate: It's looking up what the going rate was for a hotel room.

3 Witness: Yeah.

4 Nate: There was no invoice generated from BAKIAD or TCAE?

5 Witness: No, not that I'm aware of.

6 Nate: Did either BAKIAD or TCAE expect payment from CTAA?

7 Witness: Not that I'm aware of.

8 Nate: I want to ask some questions about the actual convention. You traveled to the  
9 convention.

10 Witness: Yes, I traveled to the convention.

11 Nate: We understand that SOCAR played a rather large role in the convention. They  
12 were a very large sponsor of the convention. What did you perceive their role to  
13 be in the convention?

14 Witness: At the convention I didn't really . . . There was a reception where the president  
15 of SOCAR attended. That's where I heard of SOCAR. I also previously visited  
16 Azerbaijan for the Eurovision contest and there, there was a lot of advertising  
17 with SOCAR, so convention-wise there was a lot of members of SOCAR who were  
18 at the event but I don't know exactly what role they played.

19 Omar: What about when you arrived? Was there a table for check-in with the SOCAR  
20 people at the table?

21 Witness: There was a check-in table but I don't know if there was a SOCAR logo on it. I  
22 don't remember.

23 Nate: Were there SOCAR officials in the lobby of the hotel as volunteers for the  
24 travelers?

25 Witness: No. Everyone had the US-Azerbaijan tags that was provided. There was a lot of  
26 ones that had volunteers on it but I don't know if they work for SOCAR or not.

27 Omar: Do you remember what hotel you stayed in?

1 Witness: Hilton.

2 Nate: Do you know who provided the travel from the airport to the hotel?

3 Witness: It was a bus that picked up all the guests.

4 Nate: They tried to arrange who was coming in on which flights to be able to take them  
5 over to the hotels?

6 Witness: I guess so.

7 Nate: Do you know who was involved in doing that? How did you know which bus to  
8 take?

9 Witness: There was a bus that said "Hilton". There was a bus that said "Four Seasons" so  
10 everyone got on accordingly in the buses.

11 Nate: Were those the normal airport pickup buses for the Hilton and the Four Seasons,  
12 or were they-

13 Witness: They were with us the whole time so the hotel and back maybe they were, but  
14 I'm not sure. That's how we distinguish which bus was going where.

15 Nate: It had "Hilton" in the window-

16 Witness: Yes, and "Four Seasons" in the other window.

17 Nate: And "Four Seasons" in the other window. Okay. How did you arrange for the  
18 visas for Lance, Meeks and Clarke?

19 Witness: The embassy took care of it. We sent it to Resul.

20 Nate: Did you have any knowledge of SOCAR's involvement in-

21 Witness: No.

22 Nate: The visas? When you were at the convention did you receive any gifts?

23 Witness: No.

24 Nate: No rugs in your hotel room?

1 Witness: Just one suitcase. It was like a small hand-held case. It just had flyers. It had a  
2 map. It had a US-Azerbaijan convention pencil and a USB.

3 Nate: Were you aware of other convention attendees receiving gifts, rugs, tea sets,  
4 DVDs and things like that?

5 Witness: There was little bags but I don't know what people there was like, Azerbaijan. I  
6 had the Azerbaijan flag and the U.S. flag and the convention bags, but I don't  
7 know what people got.

8 Nate: Do you remember what color they were?

9 Witness: It was white. Do you know those gift bags? It was white. It just had the  
10 convention, the U.S. and Azerbaijan flag. They already had that outside in the  
11 lobby so when people land they would pick it up.

12 Nate: Do you remember any red bags, maroon-colored bags?

13 Witness: No.

14 Nate: Did any of the members that you sponsored on the trip ever ask you, say, "I  
15 received this rug in my hotel room," or, "Someone handed me this tea set while I  
16 was departing" or anything like that?

17 Witness: Yes. Congressman Lance's office contacted our office. They said that they  
18 received a gift and they were going to send it back, and they gave it back.

19 Omar: Do you know what it was?

20 Witness: I'm not sure but I could check the email.

21 Omar: Who did they give it back to?

22 Witness: They sent it to our organization.

23 Omar: To CTAA?

24 Witness: Yeah.

25 Nate: What did you do with it?

26 Witness: We sent it back to AFAZ.

1 Nate: To AFAZ?

2 Witness: Yeah, to Mr. Kemal.

3 Nate: Okay, I'm a bit confused now. Maybe you can help me understand. When we  
4 started this interview you said you didn't know about AFAZ until 2013.

5 Witness: Not to AFAZ but to Kemal Oksuz at the time so that's where it came out of my  
6 mouth as AFAZ.

7 Omar: Let me ask, where did Representative Lance's office contact you?

8 Witness: When we returned, I think a week after.

9 Omar: You don't know what object it was?

10 Witness: I could check. It was probably a rug.

11 Nate: Did you contact Kemal or Resul or anyone with the Turquoise Council and ask  
12 them where this is from, say "Lance received this gift. He wants to return it.  
13 Where do I send it"?

14 Witness: Yeah, I spoke to Resul.

15 Nate: What did Resul say? Did he say it was from the Turquoise Council?

16 Witness: No. I just said, "Congressman Lance wants to send this back. Where do you want  
17 me to send it"?

18 Nate: What did he say?

19 Witness: "To our office."

20 Nate: Okay. You didn't have any conversation about who had donated the gift?

21 Witness: No. I was just told that he received a gift while he was at the hotel and he wants  
22 to know how much it is. If it's over the limit he wants to send it back, and I told  
23 him . . . I forgot the amount that he said what it's worth. He said, "I want to send  
24 this back because it's over the limits that I accept it or not."

25 Nate: You initially had a conversation with Resul to see if it was over the limit.

1 Witness: Yes, because they requested to see how much it's worth.

2 Nate: Okay, and so then Resul said it's worth however much.

3 Witness: Yeah.

4 Nate: Do you remember what was the nature of the limit? Were they talking about it  
5 has to be under, say, \$350?

6 Witness: For the office they said it has to be very small, I think \$45 or something like \$25.

7 Omar: Do you know how much the rug was worth?

8 Witness: I'm not sure but I think 10-something, \$10,000.

9 Omar: Ten thousand dollars?

10 Witness: Yeah, or maybe more. I'm not sure.

11 Nate: Did it surprise you at all that there was a large dollar amount rug provided to at  
12 least some of the attendees at the convention? When Lance called you up and  
13 said, "I received this rug at the convention," did that surprise you in any way?

14 Witness: In Turkish culture, giving a gift is a culture but I was surprised when I found out  
15 the amount. It was expensive.

16 Nate: Was it surprising . . . Did you have any sense about who might provide a gift like  
17 that during the convention? What organization might provide gifts like that?

18 Witness: No. They were meeting with a lot of people in Azerbaijan. They were meeting  
19 with businessmen, electoral officials. Mr. Furkan was actually with Congressman  
20 Lance, Meeks, and Clarke. I'm not sure who gave him the gift. Maybe they gave it  
21 and he accepted it at that time because he didn't want to be disrespectful, but  
22 when he came back he asked for how much it is.

23 Omar: Who do you think gave him the gift?

24 Witness: It could be anyone, but I don't know.

25 Omar: Everything we have seen, nothing suggests that the Turquoise Council or AFAZ  
26 had enough money to be giving out \$10,000 rugs, so where do you think the rug  
27 came from?

1 Witness: I don't think the Turquoise Council gave the gifts. It was probably one of the  
2 people that they met with because when I asked what it is, it was something that  
3 was made in Azerbaijan. I'm assuming it was probably one of the businessmen  
4 that they met when they were having their meetings.

5 Omar: Representative Lance did send the rug back to you?

6 Witness: Yes.

7 Omar: Okay, and you did return it to Resul?

8 Witness: Yes.

9 Nate: When you had your initial conversations with Resul about whether or not it was  
10 over the amount, did Lance's say depending on who it's from the amount might  
11 be this, or if it's from someone else it might be this, so we need to know who it's  
12 from?

13 Witness: No. His staff member said he received a gift. Can you find out how much it is. If it  
14 is over the limit, we can't accept it or we have to pay for it? When I told them  
15 how much it is he says, "We're going to return this back."

16 Nate: When you reached out to Resul, you were just focused on whatever the dollar  
17 amount was to figure out and let them decide?

18 Witness: Yeah, if they could accept it or not.

19 Omar: Let me a little more direct. Did anything . . . Your conversation with Lance  
20 suggests that they thought that it was from the government of Azerbaijan?

21 Witness: No. They didn't ask me who the rug was from because I guess he knew who gave  
22 it to him.

23 Omar: Okay.

24 Witness: The only thing he asked me was, "He received a gift. Do you know how much it's  
25 worth?" and I said, "Let me check," and I asked.

26 Omar: Was that the only gift he referenced?

27 Witness: We also gave his wife an earring, in Turkey but not in Azerbaijan.

1 Omar: Did he . . .

2 Witness: Yeah, he paid that back to our organization.

3 Omar: He did?

4 Witness: Yes. I think it was \$50 or \$60. He wrote us a check Congressman Lance's office.

5 Nate: No discussion of tea sets, silk scarves ...

6 Witness: No, just the earring and the rug.

7 Nate: With any of these other organizations, have you talked to anyone recently about  
8 the convention outside of ... Obviously within the council itself we understand  
9 you had conversations with Bahri about the outstanding balance. Have you had  
10 conversations with anyone else?

11 Witness: Recently?

12 Nate: Yeah in the last three, four months.

13 Witness: After you guys requested information just with Mr. Furkan Kosar.

14 Nate: Okay. No contact from Kemal or anyone else, or Resul?

15 Witness: No. I had seen Resul at our last event in D.C. but just hi, hi, not in the convention.

16 Nate: Just checking our notes to make sure that we're done with some of the  
17 questions we have ... This was in August and September. Did you reach out to  
18 the members who had traveled to this convention about drafting a letter and  
19 putting together a video message for the president of Azerbaijan?

20 Witness: Video or letter?

21 Nate: Either. I think they suggested either.

22 Witness: Yes.

23 Nate: How did that conversation begin, to decide to reach out?

24 Witness: Mr. Furkan Kosar.

1 Nate: Did he say why he wanted to put this together?

2 Witness: He said we had the convention. A lot of members we met took the trip and he  
3 said we were thinking about doing something like this, so he sent some email  
4 requesting if they could do something like this.

5 Nate: He asked you to send emails to see if-

6 Witness: Yeah.

7 Nate: Did he talk about coordinating with the sister federations to get these messages  
8 over there or anything like that?

9 Witness: No.

10 Nate: What kind of conversations did you have with each of the offices about putting  
11 them together? Was there any emails?

12 Witness: I told them . . . One of the members, I forgot which member, he actually had a  
13 letter that he already sent that Mr. Kosar gave me, so I sent them as a reference  
14 that he could use.

15 Nate: Do you know where he got those letters?

16 Witness: No.

17 Nate: Did he ever say, "These letters are from . . ."?

18 Witness: No. He just said there is already a member who actually sent the letter.

19 Nate: Once you got letters or video messages back from the members, what did you do  
20 with them?

21 Witness: I guess he sent them to the president. That's what it was for.

22 Nate: It was your understanding that Mr. Kosar sent them directly to some official in  
23 the Azerbaijani government.

24 Witness: To most likely the ambassador, I'm assuming.

25 Nate: Okay. Would it surprise you at all if he told us that he sent them to Kemal?

1 Witness: They are close so it won't surprise me but-

2 Nate: Kosar and Kemal are close?

3 Witness: Yeah.

4 Nate: Okay. Close in they work together on projects, close in that they were friends  
5 before getting involved in these organizations?

6 Witness: No, work together because for a year they were in the same board meetings in  
7 D.C.

8 Nate: What was Kemal's relationship with the Azerbaijani government during the  
9 convention? Did you get any sense of how close he was with people in the  
10 Azerbaijani government?

11 Witness: No. The convention was packed. There was a lot of people. He was speaking with  
12 a lot of people. I don't know who was working where or who they are, so I  
13 cannot say anything.

14 Nate: Okay. I want to make sure I understand, you didn't think that AFAZ was at all  
15 involved in organizing the 2013 convention.

16 Witness: Yeah.

17 Nate: Okay, even though they were listed as organizers on the website.

18 Witness: From the convention there was the Turquoise logo everywhere but AFAZ ...

19 Nate: Was it next to the Turquoise Council?

20 Witness: Not that I remember. Like I said, AFAZ took over hosting the convention last year  
21 while in D.C. That's when I got familiar with it. Maybe it was there. Maybe it was  
22 just . . . I didn't know what it was. Maybe it didn't track my idea of it.

23 Nate: Okay. Similar to the letter to the president, I think beforehand you had asked  
24 members to bring a certificate of recognition to the event. Do you remember  
25 that?

26 Witness: Yes.

1 Nate: In that certificate of recognition you asked them to recognize CTAA, TCAE and  
2 AFAZ. Does that sound familiar?

3 Witness: For the video message?

4 Nate: No. Prior to going to the convention, you had asked members of Congress to  
5 bring a certificate of recognition thanking the people who-

6 Witness: Yes. I remember Resul gave us a sample but I don't remember the text.

7 Nate: You don't remember them describing AFAZ as one of the organizations to be  
8 thanked?

9 Witness: No I don't remember, because they brought it in a little envelope and they gave  
10 it to the ambassador at the welcome reception of the convention, but it wasn't  
11 read out loud.

12 Nate: In terms of beforehand so when you were saying it would be great if you could  
13 bring a certificate of recognition. We would like you to recognize obviously CTAA  
14 responsible for your travel, TCAE they are helping you organize the connection,  
15 but there was also AFAZ that was listed as an organizer. You don't remember  
16 seeing it?

17 Witness: I don't remember.

18 Nate: You don't remember following up with the Turquoise Council and getting more  
19 information about AFAZ and then sending that information on to members?

20 Witness: I remember reading it, skimming through it, and then I sent it to the office. They  
21 were asking for this information. "Would you guys be interested in doing this?"  
22 and they said, "Okay," but I don't remember AFAZ included in that letter.

23 Nate: Do you remember any of them asking you about each of the organizations and  
24 asking why they wanted the certificate of recognition to include AFAZ?

25 Witness: No, they didn't. They didn't ask.

26 Nate: I think you've answered all my questions. Do you have any questions?

27 Omar: No.

28 Nate: Okay, thank you. Let's stop there.

1 Solis: This is Deputy Chief Counsel, Paul Solis with the Office of Congressional Ethics.  
2 I'm joined by Omar Ashmawy, John Missner, Ed Myers, and SOCAR Legal Counsel  
3 2. It is April 13th, 2015. Witness has signed an acknowledgement that I provided  
4 him a copy of 18 USC 1001. We can begin our interview. Is it okay if I call you  
5 SOCAR Legal Counsel 2?

6 Witness: Yeah.

7 Solis: Okay. Witness, where are you currently employed?

8 Witness: I'm currently employed at the State Oil Company of the Republic of Azerbaijan.  
9 I'll call it SOCAR from here on out.

10 Solis: I'll ask you to speak up as best you can.

11 Witness: Okay.

12 Solis: Because we're recording. Thank you.

13 Witness: I'm an in-house legal counsel. I've been employed at SOCAR since September  
14 2012.

15 Solis: What are some of your duties there?

16 Witness: I provide legal support for international projects of SOCAR, mainly in Europe. We  
17 deal with oil and gas projects. My main expertise is in natural gas sector.

18 Solis: Okay. Who do you report to?

19 Witness: We have a legal department as an umbrella, a tree that we report through.  
20 Obviously then the president, the legal department reports to the president  
21 directly.

22 Solis: You said you deal with international projects?

23 Witness: Correct.

24 Solis: This convention of 2013, in May of 2013 that took place in Baku, do you recall  
25 that convention?

26 Witness: In 2013? I was not personally involved in that, but obviously since then I've  
27 familiarized myself with that.

1 Solis: Is that the type of thing that you would cover in, that would fall into the category  
2 of international projects?

3 Witness: Yeah. It's a broad spectrum of activities. It's probably peripheral to what we do in  
4 the legal department.

5 Solis: Have you taken part in, in anyway in your duties at SOCAR, other convention  
6 financing, planning, sponsorship, or anything?

7 Witness: Yeah.

8 Solis: Like that?

9 Witness: Yeah.

10 Solis: Have you taken part in ...

11 Witness: Yeah, we have actually. One was in Turkey, one was in the UK, a similar type of  
12 engagement. I think in 2014, a similar convention in D.C, we've had sponsorship  
13 as well of that event.

14 Solis: Why don't you tell me what your role was then, in May 2013 convention at  
15 Baku? What did you do?

16 Witness: Yeah. Back then, actually, it was not very extensive, it was very limited. We were  
17 charged with drafting the agreement based on the template that was approved  
18 internally that would allow us to give funding to AFAZ, one of the non-profit  
19 organizations that is established in the state of Texas.

20 Solis: Okay. What is AFAZ?

21 Witness: AFAZ is, like I said, a non-profit organization primarily established to strengthen  
22 the relationship between the two countries, the United States and Azerbaijan  
23 and to do anything that would serve that mission, from educational visits and  
24 trips, any humanitarian, social projects, and conventions is obviously one of  
25 them.

26 Solis: Did you take part in AFAZ's creation or formation?

27 Witness: Yeah, I was part actually was helping one of the legal counsel in the state of  
28 Texas with the drafting of their organizational documents.

29 Solis: Who is the legal counsel in the state of Texas?

1 Witness: If I remember correctly it was Erin. I'll have to double check on that.

2 Solis: Was it a law firm?

3 Witness: No, it was, I think, a sole practitioner.

4 Solis: Okay.

5 Witness: She was dealing with non-profits, drafting the organizational documents.

6 Solis: Okay. Do you know if AFAZ is registered with the IRS as a 501(c)(3)?

7 Witness: No, it's not. It's registered under 501(c)(6). It's a business linked type of entity.

8 Solis: Okay.

9 Witness: It fosters the business type of interest of the broader, I guess, interests.

10 Solis: Do you know if it files Form 990s with the IRS?

11 Witness: To my knowledge, yes, they do.

12 Solis: Okay. If you took part in the creation, the formation of AFAZ, you'd be a good  
13 person to ask what was the background on it. I'll wait for the train to go by.  
14 When was it formed? When was AFAZ created?

15 Witness: If I'm not mistaken it was the end of 2013, actually, that we drafted the  
16 documents and I think it was filed the end of 2013.

17 Solis: The end of 2013. You talked a little bit about its mission. What's the  
18 organizational structure of AFAZ?

19 Witness: The structure, at least originally, was planned to have members that would  
20 contribute their annual dues or membership dues to AFAZ or donations of a  
21 similar kind. The organizational structure, the primary governing structure is the  
22 board of directors, and it consists of six members, which the number can go up  
23 and then down.

24 Solis: SOCAR is the sole entity who created AFAZ? There wasn't anybody else who had  
25 a role in it?

26 Witness: Yes, correct. It is the only one. Initially they tried to expand the members, not as  
27 the founding members, maybe as regular members to have a board of the  
28 organization.

1 Solis: Okay. So there's a governing board.

2 Witness: Correct.

3 Solis: How are those board members selected?

4 Witness: The board of directors, it was pretty much given to SOCAR that it will have to  
5 select the number of directors. At that point I think it was decided will it have six.  
6 I think it was our committee, internal, approving the structure of it and the  
7 composition, who will fill what roles.

8 Male: What committee is that?

9 Witness: We call it Sponsorship Social Committee, it's an internal committee dealing with  
10 any type of our engagement in non-profits, even in broader context social  
11 projects.

12 Solis: Other than just the number of board members, I'm asking about the specific  
13 people, like who actually was selected, how were they selected.

14 Witness: Yeah, like I said, they were provided by the committee itself, that those people  
15 will be attributed to AFAZ.

16 Solis: Other than those board members, is there anybody that's an employee there?

17 Witness: That was not known to me back then, but since we were here we are doing some  
18 auditing and we've actually encountered that there have been some employee  
19 agreements signed with AFAZ.

20 Solis: Who took part in those employment agreements [crosstalk 00:07:20]?

21 Witness: To the best of my knowledge it was Kemal Oksuz and may have been one or two  
22 staff members, but their application may have been still pending to get their visa  
23 approvals.

24 Solis: Do you know if Kemal Oksuz is still employed with AFAZ?

25 Witness: Yes. To the best of my knowledge he is still employed.

26 Solis: Does he draw a salary?

27 Witness: To the best of my knowledge, yeah, he does.

28 Solis: How does AFAZ get its funding to continue and to operate?

1 Witness: The initial plan was to operate under ... They would get annual dues from the  
2 members, initially with SOCAR, but the plan was to expand them, to have more  
3 regular members and then they would operate under that, either get grants or  
4 aids or donation.

5 Solis: At this point, though, there are no other members besides SOCAR?

6 Witness: Correct.

7 Solis: So at this point the funding plan is for SOCAR to provide money to AFAZ.

8 Witness: Correct, they [inaudible] yeah.

9 Solis: Okay, and that's still ongoing to date?

10 Witness: To date, yes.

11 Solis: Okay. Does SOCAR give AFAZ yearly amounts of money or by project? How does  
12 that work?

13 Witness: The organizational structure, or the by-laws require annual dues to be given by  
14 the members, but so far, as far as I know, the only one donation that was given  
15 was back in 2013.

16 Solis: And that is for the convention?

17 Witness: Yeah, it was for the convention.

18 Solis: Okay, that total is?

19 Witness: It was in the amount of 750,000.

20 Solis: Okay. Do you know what The Turquoise Council is?

21 Witness: I did not know, obviously, back in 2013, but from our document recollection, as I  
22 mentioned to you, I think they were one of another non-profit that actually  
23 organized the convention.

24 Solis: Okay. Do you know who is the president of that organization?

25 Witness: Again back from the document recollection, it was Kemal Oksuz to my  
26 knowledge.

1 Solis: Do you know if there's any relation between AFAZ and the Turquoise Council  
2 besides Kemal Oksuz?

3 Witness: Not to my knowledge.

4 Male: During your review ... You said you were doing some audits?

5 Witness: Correct and it's still ongoing.

6 Male: Were those audits also into the accounting practices of AFAZ?

7 Witness: Correct, yes.

8 Male: Have you seen evidence of a single, shared bank account between the Turquoise  
9 Council and AFAZ?

10 Witness: It's actually done by our financial guy and it's still pending, he's doing that  
11 simultaneously. Not that I have seen it. We were just checking the corporate  
12 structure and the resolutions.

13 Solis: If we could show you this.

14 Witness: Yeah.

15 Solis: I think this is what you were referring to earlier. This the agreement, SOCAR 1  
16 through 5, it's the Bates number. Have you seen this agreement?

17 Witness: Yeah, I was the person actually drafting this.

18 Solis: Okay.

19 Witness: We have a template approved by the internal as a policy, but then you actually  
20 customize it for your ...

21 Solis: The language that's used throughout this agreement is not, you didn't create it  
22 just for AFAZ?

23 Witness: No, it's a template agreement we use in similar undertakings, we have for other  
24 social projects, like I said, in Turkey and the UK.

25 Solis: We spoke a little bit with Eldar and he talked about some of the differences  
26 between a sponsorship agreement or a grant agreement and how SOCAR treats  
27 different types of expenditures for their social projects. Is this a sponsorship  
28 agreement?

1 Witness: It is called a sponsorship agreement. As I think our law understands or at least  
2 according to applicable legislation of Azerbaijan this would be considered a  
3 sponsorship because it's earmarked to a certain event, in this case with the US-  
4 Azerbaijan Convention. Grant would be more of a non-earmarked, general  
5 donation to a non-profit.

6 Solis: Okay. I see. I see. So the thing to take away about that would be that this is  
7 event specific.

8 Witness: Correct.

9 Solis: ... about the convention as opposed to something where you're just giving to an  
10 organization and they're operating with those funds how they choose under  
11 their discretion.

12 Witness: Originally we have received the letter asking for a specific type of assistance for  
13 this convention so we acted based on that letter that they want a lump sum  
14 amount to do their business.

15 Solis: Okay. I just want to draw your attention to the very bottom, there.

16 Witness: Yeah, 212?

17 Solis: Yeah. 1.2, "The funding shall cover accommodation, traveling, expenses, venue  
18 rental, and all other related expenses and fees." Given that this is template  
19 language that you've used before in other sponsorship agreements, what does  
20 accommodation mean when you use it in this context?

21 Witness: We try to be as broad ... Again it's a template agreement to use for different  
22 types of events, but usually we limit it to the discretion of the event organizer to  
23 come up with whatever they need, what fees they will cover. They provide that  
24 usually as part of appendix or a different schedule and we give them a lump sum  
25 at their own discretion of how to be spent, rental of venues or hotel  
26 accommodation.

27 Solis: Okay. The same with traveling expenses?

28 Witness: Correct, yeah.

29 Solis: It's up to AFAZ to decide what that means?

30 Witness: We usually just give a lump sum of money to a specific entity and then it will be  
31 up to them how to disburse that and they will decide ...

1 Solis: Did you know personally at this time what types of things AFAZ would be doing  
2 to meet some of these terms as far as accommodation and traveling expenses?  
3 Did you know if they would be buying airfare for people or buying hotels for  
4 people?

5 Witness: No, I did not know. They just provided a broad category and we went with that.

6 Solis: Okay. Did SOCAR expend any other funds beyond this \$750,000 that you've  
7 come across?

8 Witness: Not to my knowledge. We have an internal policy that we usually submit one  
9 lump sum payment to an entity, then they'll disburse that. The sum is large  
10 compared to others so we did not anticipate to actually use a different,  
11 additional sources of funds for other purposes.

12 Solis: Okay.

13 Ashmawy: I'm sorry, how did you characterize this amount of money?

14 Witness: A lump sum of money.

15 Ashmawy: Yeah, you say it's very large ...

16 Witness: Yeah.

17 Ashmawy: ... in comparison to other sponsorships.

18 Witness: It is. Yeah.

19 Solis: Specifically now that you've ... You've taken part in the review of these  
20 documents in giving them to our office and you've come to understand a little bit  
21 more about what transpired, right?

22 Witness: Yeah.

23 Solis: Is that a fair ...

24 Witness: I think that's fair.

25 Solis: ... characterization? What about hotels for conference convention attendees? Do  
26 you know if SOCAR paid any amount of money for hotel expenses?

27 Witness: Even back then, even during our re-submission of documents to you guys, we  
28 have not seen any evidence indicating that, although we were being warned

1 internally there may have been contracts with different hotels for different  
2 arraignments we had at that time. One of them I think was the Republic Day that  
3 is usually celebrated on the 28th of May, then another was the Oil and Gas  
4 Exhibit that happened in June, it happens yearly.

5 Solis: Did you attend the convention?

6 Witness: No, I did not.

7 Solis: Okay. I'm going to show you a document here. It is numbered SOCAR 377 to 378.  
8 You are not on the first couple of emails at the bottom, but you'll see you're  
9 mentioned in this May 8th email from Mammad Nazaraliyev to Kemal Oksuz. Do  
10 you see that?

11 Witness: Yeah, I see that second one, 8-37.

12 Solis: It says, "Please also try at your earliest convenience to sign and return back the  
13 agreement AFAZ sent earlier to you by my colleague, Witness Witness. We won't  
14 be able to transfer these sums without such an agreement." Do you know what  
15 Mammad is referring to?

16 Witness: He's referring to the agreement you supplied to us earlier, the sponsorship  
17 agreement, May 6th, 2013.

18 Solis: By saying, "We won't be able to transfer these sums without such an  
19 agreement," is he referring to that 750,000?

20 Witness: Correct. It's internal banking regulation, you have to have a contractual  
21 arrangement or agreement to wire any money internally or abroad.

22 Solis: That's an Azerbaijani regulation?

23 Witness: In this bank, yeah.

24 Solis: Okay. Legislated by the government? Or is that an internal, SOCAR regulation?

25 Witness: No, that's not, that's actually internal banking ... There's a banking governing  
26 body that regulates that matter and that's their own, internal policies.

27 Solis: The next email you are CCed on that, right?

28 Witness: Which one?

29 Solis: Above.

1 Witness: Above, yes.

2 Solis: From Kemal Oksuz to Mammad you're CCed. It says, "Attached are the signed  
3 agreements are the signed agreements, sealed invoice. Please let me know if  
4 these are fine, anything else I'm supposed to do." Do you recall receiving that  
5 attachment of the agreement from Kemal?

6 Witness: The attachment? You're referring to?

7 Solis: Attached are the signed agreement and sealed invoice.

8 Witness: Yeah, yeah, we have received that.

9 Solis: Okay. Sealed invoice, do you know what that refers to?

10 Witness: I think what he's trying to refer to ... because in Azerbaijan you can't just blankly  
11 show an invoice that is not signed and sealed to make a payment so that's why  
12 we have requested him actually to sign and seal it, that's what he means by that.

13 Male: Is that invoice represented in the document production to our office?

14 Witness: Yeah, I think so.

15 Male: Is that the attachment, is that the last page of the agreement?

16 Witness: That's the attachment. I think we also had an invoice. I'm not sure how it was  
17 appended to the agreement, but we have provided that.

18 Male: We pulled it out, I think, in the first interview.

19 Solis: Yeah, I know there is an invoice, that might be that one, but I do think we have  
20 received that invoice.

21 Missner: Yeah, I know you definitely have.

22 Solis: Okay. The money was then, after this series of communications with Mr. Oksuz  
23 the money was then transferred to AFAZ?

24 Witness: It was, yeah.

25 Solis: Okay. Did you actually take part in that transfer of funds?

26 Witness: Actually that was what I was going to say. We have not even confirmed the  
27 receipt of that funds by Kemal, but during our submission to you of the

1 documents we actually got the bank payment order, and at that point we've  
2 actually confirmed that it was wired.

3 Solis: Okay. I want to be clear. At the time, and then during the convention and after  
4 2013 you had not yet known whether or not AFAZ received that sum of money?

5 Witness: It's a standard practice at our company to have the agreement signed or have it  
6 facilitated to be signed by our department and then provide all of the documents  
7 to the accounting department, at that point we lose track of if it's actually been  
8 wired or paid until there's an email asking for the confirmation if that has been  
9 wired or not.

10 Solis: I think actually we've seen the, it's the International Bank ...

11 Witness: Correct.

12 Solis: ... at the top there. We had spoken about that earlier, Jon and I had, that  
13 confirmed the actual transfer of funds.

14 Witness: Correct.

15 Solis: Do you know what bank AFAZ uses?

16 Witness: To the best of my knowledge it's Wells Fargo.

17 Solis: Other than these series of emails here, had you heard anything from Kemal  
18 Oksuz either in person or over the phone or email about the money getting to  
19 AFAZ? Did he say anything about it? Whether it was enough or he wanted more?

20 Witness: No, we have not received anything other than that.

21 Solis: Are you familiar with the categories of sponsorship at the convention? It's silver,  
22 gold designation, things like that?

23 Witness: I have a vague understanding.

24 Solis: Did you take part in the creation ...

25 Witness: No, I did not.

26 Solis: ... of those categories?

27 Witness: No, I was not ...

1 Solis: What can you tell me about the categories?

2 Witness: To the best of my knowledge they were categorized, there is a gold member,  
3 maybe silver member, different for the amount given to the event organizer. If  
4 I'm not mistaken the maximum amount for the gold member is 50,000 and silver  
5 25 or 10,000, something in that range.

6 Solis: Where is the money, in those categories, who is that going to?

7 Witness: That goes to the event organizers.

8 Solis: Okay. So that would go to Turquoise Council and AFAZ?

9 Witness: AFAZ.

10 Solis: Is there any distinction about who gets what? Whether or not a sponsor would  
11 decide to give money to Turquoise Council as opposed to AFAZ?

12 Witness: It depends on the letter we sent to different sponsors or different categories of  
13 sponsors asking to which type of entity to transfer the funds.

14 Solis: Okay. So SOCAR would send a letter to, for example, ConocoPhillips requesting  
15 that funds be expended to either AFAZ or Turquoise Council for sponsorship  
16 purposes?

17 Witness: Correct. To the best of my knowledge it was just to AFAZ, not to Turquoise  
18 Council. It's actually normal practice in us to ... We have about 50 joint ventures  
19 or more, affiliated companies. Once we have big type of events we try to pull  
20 them in and see who is profitable, who can actually afford sponsoring such  
21 events, and then send out the courtesy letter, if they can share some of the  
22 burden.

23 Ashmawy: Through your review can you confirm that SOCAR in fact asked ConocoPhillips  
24 for sponsorship on the convention?

25 Witness: Yeah, I've seen their email going to one of the representatives, I think, of  
26 ConocoPhillips asking for their financial assistance.

27 Solis: Also through your review would you be able to confirm whether or not SOCAR  
28 asked all of the corporate sponsors whether they would contribute or not?

29 Witness: I can't really attest to each of them, but I know that there's at least six or seven  
30 entities. I think a mass email on an individual basis was sent to them, having  
31 similar content.

1 Ashmawy: Can you more generally explain why the request for sponsorship is coming from  
2 SOCAR, but then they're getting invoiced by AFAZ or TCAE?

3 Witness: Again to make a payment, like I was saying earlier, the invoice has to come from  
4 a direct beneficiary of the amount. In this case it would be AFAZ or a different  
5 even organizer.

6 Solis: AFAZ and Turquoise Council are out there saying, "We're the organizer of the  
7 convention," and they're requesting funds of you, that makes sense to me, I  
8 suppose. Why then is SOCAR asking funds of BP, Conoco, and other conference  
9 sponsors?

10 Witness: Like I said earlier, we do partner with them on different many ventures. When  
11 we have big events of such type we usually send out courtesy emails or mails to  
12 see if they can contribute to that.

13 Solis: Are you then asking TCAE and AFAZ to send an additional letter to confirm that,  
14 asking for the funds?

15 Witness: No, not to my knowledge. It's just one letter and then if they are interested then  
16 they get in touch with the proper entity.

17 Solis: With the proper entity, what do you mean by that?

18 Witness: You said TCAE, but it's in this case with AFAZ because we were asking to donate  
19 to AFAZ.

20 Ashmawy: Would it surprise you if there were communications from the sponsors that  
21 conflated AFAZ and TCAE?

22 Witness: Yeah, that would surprise me because they're separate entities, although chaired  
23 by the same person. There is distinct legal personalities of those two.

24 Solis: Are you aware if Turquoise Council, TCAE has any other employees besides  
25 Kemal Oksuz?

26 Witness: No, I do not know that.

27 Solis: Did you ever interact with anybody or through your audit do you know if SOCAR  
28 interacted with any other employee of Turquoise Council?

29 Witness: I do not have sufficient information to answer that.

30 Solis: Okay. Do you know what Practical Solutions Group is?

1 Witness: It is our general service provider for different multitude activities that we are  
2 engaged in. Usually it's service type of engagements.

3 Solis: Did they engage in services related to this convention in 2013?

4 Witness: Yeah, we gave out a specific order for this convention by SOCAR.

5 Solis: Do you know if they collected a fee for that?

6 Witness: The fee as in for charge?

7 Solis: If you put out an order for them and they performed services related to the  
8 convention, do you know if they received money for that?

9 Witness: Even through our recollection or compilation of the documents we have not  
10 seen any documents coming from PSG asking for any reimbursement of the  
11 actual expenses.

12 Ashmawy: Okay.

13 Solis: Okay. What about any funds being transferred from SOCAR to PSG for their  
14 services?

15 Witness: No, we have not received anything up to this point. They usually come up as a  
16 deliverable report when they actually are incurred.

17 Ashmawy: Are you familiar with a SOCAR employee by the name of Rafiq Gurbanzade?

18 Witness: No. He's a SOCAR employee?

19 Ashmawy: Yeah. Based on your review or your previous knowledge, could you explain why  
20 there seems to be examples of SOCAR employees making requests for  
21 sponsorship from organizations like ConocoPhillips or BP or representing  
22 themselves as also employees of AFAZ?

23 Witness: I don't think I'm in a position to answer to that question, what they were  
24 thinking about when they were actually sending emails.

25 Ashmawy: If the solicitation for sponsorship is coming from SOCAR, why not just have the  
26 money go to SOCAR?

27 Witness: Because we, like I said earlier, we have a corporate policy to allocate all of the  
28 money from ourselves and from different sponsors to an event organizer and we  
29 leave it up to their discretion how to disburse them and not be involved. Our

1 main focus in oil and gas energy field. It's not to have social projects. As a  
2 peripheral we do that, but we do not want to allocate our resources fully to that.

3 Solis: Do you know if Chevron was a sponsor of the convention?

4 Witness: I can attest that they were at least one of the entities that we sent an email to,  
5 but I'm not sure if they have actually wired money to the event.

6 Ashmawy: Was the convention essentially a SOCAR event?

7 Witness: No, I wouldn't say it's a SOCAR event. It's a Republic of Azerbaijan's indeed U.S.  
8 bilateral event, trying to illustrate the friendship or the bilateral relation  
9 between the countries. SOCAR is one, small piece of that big puzzle.

10 Solis: Would you call it a government event?

11 Witness: I would call it the people's event, to commemorate the people of Azerbaijan's  
12 and Americans' knowledge of each other.

13 Ashmawy: What kind of logistical support did SOCAR provide for the convention?

14 Witness: Besides the actual drafting of the documents and the invoicing we have  
15 provided, through my review of the documents, invitation letters to some of the  
16 guests that were coming as part of the convention.

17 Ashmawy: How about logistical arrangements for hotel rooms?

18 Witness: No, we were not primarily responsible for that.

19 Solis: Okay.

20 Witness: That was up to the event organizers ...

21 Solis: Why then, in the production if you reviewed all the documents you would have  
22 seen a long list of spreadsheets generated from SOCAR as far as I can tell with  
23 lots of detailed specifics about hotel rooms in it.

24 Meyers: Paul, do you have that document? The one that you sent was generated by  
25 somebody outside of SOCAR. So if you're referring to a different document, I  
26 think we'd like to see that because we haven't seen that.

27 Solis: Yeah, it's part of the production that was given, it was a set of Excel  
28 spreadsheets.

1 Missner: By SOCAR? Is it the one you sent Saturday?

2 Solis: No, the Bates range I sent to you on Saturday would have been the ones I asked  
3 Mr. Zamanov about. I could pull those up. They came as native files. When I  
4 searched through the documents the image just says "Native file," then when I  
5 go to the TIFF image that we have logged in our concordance database it's a  
6 series of 20 to 30 Excel spreadsheets. If you look at them through concordance  
7 just based on images you're not going to see them. You actually have to go to  
8 the actual big base file to find them. I can tell you that they're there. Do you  
9 know if SOCAR developed lists of hotel preferences for attendees and things like  
10 that?

11 Witness: As you correctly pointed out during my review process we have seen some of  
12 those email trails but as you've seen yourself it's for informational purposes to  
13 give a heads up to SOCAR that if there may be a need for your logistical  
14 secondary support for this type of thing, "Please have that in mind. If needed,  
15 we'll call on your assistance."

16 Solis: Who would that information have come from then?

17 Witness: In this case it would be the event organizer, AFAZ I think.

18 Solis: So secondary support?

19 Witness: Yeah, that would be if needed, perhaps greeting certain people.

20 Ashmawy: More broadly, just to be clear, from your perspective the event organizer was  
21 AFAZ, correct?

22 Witness: Correct.

23 Ashmawy: Not the Turquoise Council?

24 Witness: It was co-chaired with other event organizers.

25 Male: But all the money went to AFAZ?

26 Witness: From SOCAR's perspective it was AFAZ, correct.

27 Male: When SOCAR requested sponsorship from other third parties, it's your  
28 understanding that that was directed to AFAZ?

29 Witness: Correct, yes, that is my understanding.

1 Solis: Do you know what Tursan Travel Corp. is?

2 Witness: I did not know, actually, back in 2013, but during auditing and the review of the  
3 documents we've noticed that it's a travel agency they used.

4 Solis: That ...

5 Witness: It was a travel agency. It's a Tursan travel agency.

6 Solis: Okay. What have you come to understand about it since you've looked at these

8 Witness: I assume that the event organizers used their services to book some of the flights

PRESIDENT OF TAA**

*3/20/2015*

1 MR. MORGAN: This is Bryson Morgan, Investigative Counsel, with the Office of  
2 Congressional Ethics accompanied by Omar Ashmawy, Chief Counsel and Staff Director  
3 of the Office of Congressional Ethics. And it is March 20, 2015 and we are here at the  
4 OCE with President of TAA. President of TAA, you know as we explained before the  
5 interview began, the federal false statements act applies to everything that we talk about  
6 here today and everything you say to us. We just want to make sure – make certain for  
7 the record that you understand that the false statements act applies. So first I want to get  
8 some background about you. What's your current employment?

9 WITNESS: I'm the president of the Turkic-American Alliance.

10 MR. MORGAN: Okay, how long have you been in that position?

11 WITNESS: Since 2010.

12 MR. MORGAN: Have you always been president?

13 WITNESS: Always, yeah.

14 MR. MORGAN: Okay. When did the Turkic-American Alliance – when was it formed?

15 WITNESS: 2010. I was the founder. I came here in 2009 from Denver then formed this  
16 organization. So it was formally found in 2010.

17 MR. MORGAN: Okay. What brought about its founding?

18 WITNESS: That was... we have – this is an umbrella organization, nationwide, with over  
19 240 member organizations from Seattle to Miami. And it started like late 90's, mid 90's,  
20 late 90's, individual cultural and [indecipherable] organizations in various parts of the  
21 world. I was a PhD student then, so we were helping the community, Turkey – Turkish-  
22 Americans stand and helping them to get together and do like the celebration, the  
23 festivals, to interact with each other you know weekend schools, Turkish schools, cultural  
24 schools, things like that. Those are really beginning at that time; then as we go on, then  
25 community grew with other communities. We did outreach to mayors, to the media  
26 people, to academicians at the universities we worked with the presidents and deans and  
27 the provosts and everything.

28 MR. MORGAN: Which groups fall within the Alliance? Is it an umbrella organization  
29 for other associations?

30 WITNESS: This is umbrella organization for other associations, yes.

31 MR. MORGAN: What associations fall within that umbrella?

1 WITNESS: Then after that like then formed the cultural organization, then after that the  
2 [indecipherable] organization because of the needs of the society, so we thought we had  
3 to reach to other people, other communities, so then the [indecipherable] organization  
4 formed. Then after the main organizations, like when the most in the west coast in  
5 California, Nevada and Colorado... I know how they form like from in Seattle, the  
6 Portland, the Phoenix so they all established organization. Then, there was a need mostly  
7 in Los Angeles and Orange County; we were going to organize a festival, the full  
8 cultural, the Anatolia festival. So there was a kind of conversation how, "why don't we  
9 get together and make a big... form like a federation from Salt Lake and... to Los Angeles  
10 and San Diego and then that's how we formed the WATC, West-American Turkic  
11 Council and MAFTAA in D.C. and CTAA in New York and TAFS in the Atlanta and  
12 TFAC in Chicago and Houston. So we have six federations. Then, there was a need for  
13 the another level, broader umbrella organization in the capitol D.C. to oversee all the  
14 organizations. That's how the structure – individual organizations and federation and  
15 TAA at the top.

16 MR. MORGAN: Okay so the TAA was formed sort of after the regional organizations  
17 were formed?

18 WITNESS: Yes. Then after that original – answering your questions, not just the  
19 dialogue and cultural [indecipherable] business organization, [indecipherable]  
20 organization is part of the states. And also like the Turkic because the name is Turkic not  
21 just the Turkish meaning Central Asia, Azeri-American, Turkic-American and Kazakh-  
22 American, Kirgiz-American organizations; so joined us so... we have about as I said  
23 about [inaudible] plus.

24 MR. MORGAN: What did you do prior to forming the Alliance?

25 WITNESS: I'm an academician so after I get my PhD I taught the college and university;  
26 I was researcher and instructor. Before coming here, I was at the faculty at University of  
27 Denver in Engineering Department.

28 MR. MORGAN: And when did you move to D.C.? Was that in --

29 WITNESS: 2009.

30 MR. MORGAN: 2009. Okay. Now I want to talk a little bit about you know the Alliance  
31 and how they receive funding. What are its... the Alliance's sources of funding?

32 WITNESS: We have three sources: donations, membership dues and the convention  
33 sponsorship.

34 MR. MORGAN: And which convention are you referring to?

35 WITNESS: Turkic-American conventions, annual convention, just finished the 5<sup>th</sup>  
36 annual yesterday.

37 MR. MORGAN: Is that held here in Washington, D.C.?

38 WITNESS: It's always in Washington, D.C.

39 MR. MORGAN: Okay so first, donations. Who are your donors? Which types of --

- 1 WITNESS: Individual donors from the individual cities like from Los Angeles to  
2 Houston to Chicago to New York, Atlanta... so they... we... ask for donations, you know.  
3 We communicate with them during the meetings, mostly Turkish business people  
4 so... because they know what we do and they work with their kids and their communities,  
5 those kind of things so they're willing to help our organizations so... especially like past  
6 couple of days they've seen the huge turnout in Congress, so they were pleased. The  
7 community really engaged.
- 8 MR. MORGAN: And then you said dues? Are those -- Who pays dues to the Alliance?  
9 WITNESS: The member organization mostly federations.
- 10 MR. MORGAN: How much are their dues? Is it monthly? Or is it annually?  
11 WITNESS: It's usually monthly, but some of them are behind. They cannot pay; some  
12 are not steady because those are our sister organization so I try to push as much as I can  
13 to get them to pay on time but sometimes they are fall behind... sometimes they pay  
14 more.
- 15 MR. MORGAN: You called them sister organizations. Is there any -- what is the legal  
16 relationship between the Alliance and those organizations? Are they legally separate or  
17 are they for example, under your umbrella for tax purposes?  
18 WITNESS: No, those are completely different. I don't oversee for the filing, the budget  
19 personnel, all their individual boards, their chairmans, so what we do... the board, the  
20 federation president in my board, so all the federation presidents --
- 21 MR. MORGAN: The presidents are on the board of the Alliance?  
22 WITNESS: Yeah in my board. So technically they are basically helping us to you know  
23 in that... in the end other board members too.
- 24 MR. MORGAN: And you have a... looks like a fairly limited staff, of yourself and then a  
25 deputy program director, Kristen Sicarski? Program assistant -- about three program  
26 assistants?  
27 WITNESS: Yes. We have volunteers like as we did many organizations so we are really  
28 depending on many volunteers not full-time employees, but they are helping as... Like  
29 myself, I started this with a PhD student, I was helping them after hours things like  
30 that... So yeah depending on that.
- 31 MR. MORGAN: So who has the authority to disburse funds from the Alliance?  
32 WITNESS: From TAA?  
33 MR. MOGRAN: Yes.  
34 WITNESS: I'm... authorize to disburse and we have accountant also. Jamshid.  
35 MR. MORGAN: Jamshid?  
36 WITNESS: Yeah... he's in charge of all the finance QuickBooks so...  
37 MR. MORGAN: So he also has the ability to disburse funds?  
38 WITNESS: Yes.  
39 MR. MORGAN: Does anybody else have access or control of the bank accounts?  
40 WITNESS: No, no, no.

1 MR. MORGAN: Okay. And how many bank accounts does TAA have?  
2 WITNESS: Only one.  
3 MR. MORGAN: Just one? Is that the Bank of America account?  
4 WITNESS: Bank of America. Yeah, only. We have savings also, but most mostly  
5 checking.  
6 MR. MORGAN: Is that savings account also through Bank of America?  
7 WITNESS: Yes, Bank of America. Yes. TAA Bank of America, yes.  
8 MR. MORGAN: And has that always been the case that you just had the Bank of  
9 America account –  
10 WITNESS: Always been the case. No other bank account. The savings account because  
11 the owner required for us to like... the security fund for first three months and we open a  
12 CBA account or LC credit account, so that's how [inaudible].  
13 MR. MORGAN: Okay. That's helpful. So now I want to ask you some questions about  
14 the U.S.-Azerbaijan convention in 2013. Are you familiar with that convention?  
15 WITNESS: Sure. I was there.  
16 MR. MORGAN: You attended?  
17 WITNESS: Mhmm.  
18 MR. MORGAN: What role did TAA play in that convention?  
19 WITNESS: Our role was just to help because our main mission first build relationships,  
20 making bridges on the communities, you know Azeri communities, one of the big one  
21 there in the United States. They have the states here, that's why we like to create a kind  
22 of like venue.... To enhance the relationship with the U.S. and Azeri, that's why we have  
23 the first U.S.-Azeri convention in D.C. and then was 2013, that was the second U.S.-  
24 Azeri convention in Baku. So usually we stagger, one year and one in respective  
25 countries take the whoever we have from the United States to bring to those countries to  
26 make sure they are... their counterparts go there and make connections for business and  
27 cultural and social and educational initiatives.  
28 MR. MORGAN: So that –  
29 WITNESS: So we have time... you know we take some staffers.  
30 MR. MORGAN: Who was the main organizer of the convention in Baku in 2013?  
31 WITNESS: Convention is the... our Houston based federation.  
32 MR. MORGAN: Okay what is the name?  
33 WITNESS: TCAE, Turquoise Council.  
34 MR. MORGAN: Okay. Who runs the Turquoise Council?  
35 WITNESS: Turquoise Council? At that time – right now it's my uh the board member,  
36 Bilal actually. But then that was Kemal Oksuz.  
37 MR. MORGAN: Okay.  
38 WITNESS: He was the president of TCAE. Turquoise Council.  
39 MR. MORGAN: It appears that Mr. Oksuz was also on your board at one point. Is that  
40 correct?

1 WITNESS: He was on our board, yeah. As I said all the president – so since the  
2 beginning I think out of six we had only one or maybe three board presidents still the  
3 same. And other people change.

4 MR. MORGAN: Okay. Whose idea was it to do the convention? I guess, so you said  
5 there was the one in Azerbaijan in 2013, in 2012 there was one here in the United States,  
6 is that correct? Was the 2012 convention the first?

7 WITNESS: First one. Yes. Because 2012... we formed in 2010 and we had one  
8 convention 2010 and then the second one 2011. So after the 2011, we were discussing  
9 how should we help the Turkic countries: Kyrgyzstan, Kazakhstan. So that's idea. The  
10 board meeting came up you know, maybe we should come up with kind of meeting to  
11 help them in D.C. In D.C. to invite the... the uh... the American... the friendship caucus or  
12 American caucus from Azerbaijan to come over here so we are going to introduce them  
13 or the delegation to members of Congress here to make sure they are continuing relation  
14 because they... usually that's the problem for the embassies, since they are here for a  
15 certain amount of year the time, limited period and they come and it takes time to make  
16 relationship with the members of Congress and other stakeholders, but since we are kind  
17 of permanent here and we are NGO, we always tell them we have a great network so why  
18 don't we collaborate and we'll introduce you to your, you know Congress, think-tanks,  
19 agencies...

20 MR. MORGAN: Who's – you know which embassies are you specifically referring to?

21 WITNESS: Since we are Turkic organization, are immediate emphasis is Turkey,  
22 Azerbaijan, Turkmenistan, Tajikistan, Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan. Turkic, I mean.

23 MR. MORGAN: So when you were coming up with the idea for the U.S.-Azerbaijan  
24 convention in 2012, were representatives of those embassies or representatives of those  
25 governments involved in that conversation?

26 WITNESS: No.

27 MR. MORGAN: No?

28 WITNESS: So usually we try to be very sensitive about the relationships with the  
29 embassies and ambassadors because being an NGO that's why... not always endorse  
30 policies and you know their agenda so that's why we try to make sure we are independent  
31 and just whatever the board decides follow... our own agenda so definitely not involved  
32 in our process. That was not their suggestion; we came up with the idea.

33 MR. MORGAN: So if you all – you came up with the idea, at some point did you loop  
34 them into the conversation, the embassies in? Did you let them know about the  
35 convention?

36 WITNESS: Yeah. Because usually at the first we start with the Turkish embassy. So  
37 when you take members of Congress or staffer or anybody from here because we are  
38 aggressively inviting nationwide people to Turkey not just the federal level, the local  
39 level, so time to time they go to the embassy, they ask for the names, they contact us you  
40 know we are taking such and such people, you requested that from the president, the

1 prime minister, so go through us. They said no we don't want to go through you, but time  
2 to time depending on the situation, they indirectly involve you know the embassy or  
3 maybe ask for Turkish president meeting, they ask embassy what your suggestion is. So  
4 indirectly they are involved, eventually involved.

5 MR. MORGAN: Who was – so obviously this U.S.-Azerbaijan convention cost some  
6 money, like a lot of money, who was involved in funding? Let's start in 2012 or when the  
7 idea came up, were there any conversations about who might be willing to pay for that  
8 type of convention?

9 WITNESS: For funding, there was – the reason Houston – our Houston federation taking  
10 the lead, there were some reasons. First, Houston-Baku, sister city relationship and Baku  
11 you know all-rich city and Houston same. So lot of... especially we are involved in sister-  
12 city international organization also, so we initiate those kind of sister-city engagement so  
13 we always look for best competitor for cities, so Houston was the best so that's why we  
14 set it in a meeting, how about you know you guys initiation this country specifically,  
15 country specifically mentioned so I start with Azerbaijan. So and then we did the  
16 Kyrgyzstan and we picked the Chicago, our TFAC one because there's one Kyrgyz  
17 community in Chicago. And you know Kyrgyzstan is probably not really their GDP is  
18 lower than Azerbaijan so that was a different... you know... because in the Kyrgyz  
19 community we picked Chicago because of the community relationship. For Houston  
20 because of the oil relations so that was a different starting point.

21 MR. MORGAN: So you selected TCAE –

22 WITNESS: We discussed we just opened who would like to volunteer... for kind of  
23 match-making. So that was the starting point. And Kemal Oksuz was really eager showed  
24 interests you know we are relationship with the oil... in terms of oil in Baku so why don't  
25 we start with that and then everybody agreed so we said you know since you are taking  
26 the... you are going to take the lead for that initiative so we are going to help. Help  
27 meaning taking other delegations, state legislatures and federal level and --

28 MR. MORGAN: So you – Mr. Oksuz mentioned his relationship with oil interests?

29 WITNESS: No, not oil interests because Baku is rich city and Houston same thing and  
30 processing. So that was the old business people and the other stakeholders are interest in  
31 this, how you start the connection --

32 MR. MORGAN: What are some of the major – you said business interests – what are  
33 some of the major Baku or Azerbaijan business interest that Kemal was referring to?

34 WITNESS: Since we are not a business organization you know being an NGO, we  
35 consider ourselves just the... creating that kind of venue you know, invite people here and  
36 people there, they just get together like Congress people from Houston to like the  
37 [indecipherable] and vice versa. So they are going to come up with their own agenda or  
38 whatever they are talking about in their committee assignments, their specific interests so  
39 we don't really go much beyond that. You know what's the business level interest, are we  
40 going to connect you guys and get business or something like that you know we... our

- 1 emphasis is culture and dialogue – when you look at 240, 60% of our member  
2 organizations composed of culture and dialogue We start business this very first year. We  
3 put the business... submit business we invite the business people so...
- 4 MR. MORGAN: So what was discussed about how you all you know, TCAE, TAA, all  
5 these groups would fund the convention? How was it to be paid for?
- 6 WITNESS: Okay so when we discussed that and decided okay, Kemal Oksuz leading  
7 that initiative, we discussed to make that event a success so we need more people from  
8 the other part of the nation. So we discussed and maybe since we have such a great  
9 relationship with state legislature because we did State House reception in 48 states out of  
10 50. In some of the capitals like many times, 7-8 times in certain states, so that's why they  
11 come and they enjoy these --
- 12 MR. ASHMAWY: I apologize for interrupting I just want to... I understand what you're  
13 saying. The question that Mr. Morgan asked is, how did – what was the discussion about  
14 who's going to pay for it?
- 15 WITNESS: Okay discussion. The starting point as I said the state legislature invite them  
16 you know, for example in Midwest, when they invite the members of the state  
17 legislatures so basically they are going to be responsible, how they are going to pay the  
18 airfare and all the costs. You know we just... you know we are not going to be... I  
19 personally don't have all the expenses or [indecipherable] so we invite the individuals. In  
20 my case, we took... we didn't take as a TAA... we didn't take any uh... Congress person  
21 but we took staffers.
- 22 MR. MORGAN: Right.
- 23 WITNESS: That expenses, you know we said we covered all the expenses, airfare, and  
24 all the expenses in Baku, you know transportation --
- 25 MR. ASHMAWY: You guys covered it all?
- 26 WITNESS: We claimed we covered it all. But as you see the bank statements we didn't  
27 pay.
- 28 MR. ASHMAWY: I recognize the... you know what was submitted to the committee, but  
29 just so we're clear, in reality you guys didn't pay for the airfare, correct?
- 30 WITNESS: Correct. We haven't paid.
- 31 MR. ASHMAWY: You didn't pay for the hotels?
- 32 WITNESS: We didn't pay for the hotels. So... we didn't pay through our Council,  
33 basically when Kemal Oksuz was organizing this, he was helping us to get the specifics.  
34 Basically his initiative, we decided that we just assign him to help us to take the groups;  
35 so he-- we supposed to pay him back for the airfare and all the expenses. And because we  
36 are very close relationship with all the members, member federations, so that was kind of  
37 the understanding you know being and joining the nation capital you know having the  
38 huge space so we barely --
- 39 MR. ASHMAWY: It can be difficult. No, of course.

- 1 WITNESS: This is difficult. So we don't have huge... when you look at bank accounts  
2 we barely survive the expenses so –
- 3 MR. ASHMAWY: Let me just be – let me just take you through one or two of these  
4 things real quick. Just so it's clear. TAA didn't pay for the airfare, correct?
- 5 WITNESS: Yes.
- 6 MR. ASHMAWY: TAA didn't pay for the hotels, correct?
- 7 WITNESS: Yes.
- 8 MR. ASHMAWY: TAA didn't pay for the food?
- 9 WITNESS: Food? From the hotel that was a charge we didn't pay, but the “food, food”  
10 you know compared to other expenses kind of a minor because the cultural issues and if  
11 you pay... if you say we are going to pay then kind of rude concept for the Turkey also so  
12 food kind of complimented which –
- 13 MR. ASHMAWY: I understand and to be clear, it was Kemal and Kemal's organization  
14 that paid for all of these things?
- 15 WITNESS: Yes.
- 16 MR. ASHMAWY: That's true for TAA?
- 17 WITNESS: That's for TAA.
- 18 MR. ASHMAWY: Is that true for the other federations also?
- 19 WITNESS: I'm not sure I didn't look at their accounts. I wasn't you know– because we  
20 took about 200 something state legislatures so...
- 21 MR. ASHMAWY: What is your understanding?
- 22 WITNESS: My understanding is some pay, some haven't paid; it's kind of mixed. But  
23 before the hotel and food, I think all was paid... was the host you know we met Gupta  
24 Palace at one point so whoever organized like the Chamber of Commerce or the  
25 Chairman of U.S.-Friendship Caucus, if they hosted that they covered all the expenses so  
26 that's... so that's my understanding. For the food nobody paid that's my understanding,  
27 but for the airfare, I think the major expenses, airfare and hotel, the food as I said, and  
28 transportation.
- 29 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you know which federation paid for the airfare?
- 30 WITNESS: I don't know.
- 31 MR. MORGAN: Do you know if any did?
- 32 WITNESS: Uhm... There was a discussion you know, we would like to pay because for  
33 them to pay... their finances... I knew some trying to pay the airfare from their own bank  
34 account.
- 35 MR. MORGAN: So you said that you were supposed to pay Kemal back?
- 36 WITNESS: We're supposed to pay Kemal back.
- 37 MR. MORGAN: When did you that conversation with him about you needing to pay  
38 him back?
- 39 WITNESS: At the very beginning.
- 40 MR. MORGAN: And what's the beginning? Is that 2012? 2013?

- 1 WITNESS: I don't remember. But when you look at the emails so...by the way, I didn't  
2 submit all the Turkish email conversation.
- 3 MR. MORGAN: You did not?
- 4 WITNESS: No I did not.
- 5 MR. MORGAN: Okay.
- 6 WITNESS: I don't know why because I just picked the English ones so.
- 7 MR. MORGAN: Okay.
- 8 WITNESS: It's still there.
- 9 MR. MORGAN: Well we need to get those from you.
- 10 WITNESS: Turkish also?
- 11 MR. MORGAN: Yes.
- 12 WITNESS: Okay.
- 13 MR. MORGAN: So the conversation with Kemal in which you talked about paying him  
14 back...
- 15 WITNESS: Conversation... I don't remember that email if we decide...you know the  
16 conversation --
- 17 MR. MORGAN: Was it before the 2013 convention?
- 18 WITNESS: Before the convention yeah we discussed it. Basically he was asking us.  
19 Basically all the email conversation so far...because we were constantly meeting at that  
20 time so most of the stuff we kind of resolved through not through official correspondence  
21 or the letters, by either email or by talking. So mostly the conversation based on excel  
22 sheet you know exchanging who are we bringing, oh they accepted, they passed ethics  
23 and I remember some...uh...I said you know can we invite them or they say it's too late  
24 you know passed the deadline. So that kind of conversation, but regard to your question,  
25 so when we confirm the list like the staffers in our TAA specifically, then we confirmed  
26 the TAA so I remember discussing who's going to pay so we don't have any funding, so  
27 can you help us?
- 28 MR. MORGAN: You discussed this with Kemal?
- 29 WITNESS: With Kemal. Yeah. Is there any way to help us out in that so he said, "I can  
30 help" so that's how he paid for our staffers' airfare.
- 31 MR. MORGAN: Okay. And when you say he paid for it, you mean TCAE?
- 32 WITNESS: TCAE. Yes.
- 33 MR. MORGAN: And are you – do you have knowledge of exactly how it was paid for?
- 34 WITNESS: I didn't see the paperwork or the bank statement, but that's my  
35 understanding so I assumed he paid for it with TCAE.
- 36 MR. ASHMAWY: And you had an agreement with Kemal that he would pay?
- 37 WITNESS: Yes, orally.
- 38 MR. ASHMAWY: And when was the first time you discussed who would pay for the  
39 airfare?
- 40 WITNESS: Right after I think we confirmed the list of staffers who agreed to come –

1 MR. ASHMAWY: Was that before submitting the forms to the committee?

2 WITNESS: I'm not sure. Usually you know, we would like to – usually for the  
3 international airfare we have to reserve ahead of time to get a better deal, but before the  
4 ethics you only reserve and stay like couple of days and you give the airline info... extend  
5 like 24 hours I can't remember, but on that line so I think they were comfortable to get  
6 pass through ethics. And we've taken staff before. I think ... once they said that they're  
7 most comfortable to past the ethics then I think at that time we said you know we need to  
8 purchase the tickets.

9 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you know if Kemal had the same agreement with any of the other  
10 Turkic organizations?

11 WITNESS: I assume so because that was at our board we discussed that, the federation.

12 MR. ASHMAWY: So you discussed that Kemal would–

13 WITNESS: No, no we... Okay. What specifically we discussed that he is organizing it so  
14 that everybody kind of participating in term of arranging groups --

15 MR. MORGAN: When did that discussion happen?

16 WITNESS: That I think just maybe a month... maybe one month... month or two months  
17 end of the actual trip.

18 MR. MORGAN: Okay.

19 WITNESS: We said that you know... that I think... in our case as I said before actual  
20 discussion about who's going to pay for it, you know either TAA or TCAE. I think along  
21 the same time frame all the other federations because I wasn't handling that, Kemal was  
22 communicating with federation president, individually.

23 MR. ASHMAWY: But it is your understanding, because this was discussed at a TAA  
24 board meeting that Kemal had a similar arrangement with other federations?

25 WITNESS: I don't remember he say that, "okay, I'll purchase the tickets you don't need  
26 to pay", I don't remember any kind discussion so one on one base, we discussed the  
27 general outline you know, we... he's organizing it so we need to get... because at that time  
28 we are really excited that everything that when we get the turnout that that many  
29 members, we are so happy so we were just getting more people other than–

30 MR. MORGAN: I'm having a hard time wrapping my head around that. You were  
31 extending invitations, you were planning it, but yet you had no clear idea of who was  
32 going to pay for it? You didn't know if you were? It seems like more specific and  
33 detailed conversations about how it would be paid for would have occurred and you seem  
34 to be saying that that's not the case. So can you please think about that, think that  
35 through, how –

36 WITNESS: So in the... in our... I'm Turkish background, so in my Turkish culture you  
37 know, things happening just like that, really last minute. I think that's where our cultural  
38 difference is. We don't usually... it's a big event, I understand it's a lot of expenses, lot of  
39 things involved, lot of arrangement so... we needed to be arranged like a month ahead of  
40 the event, but uh... usually like the convention, so I can't give you more detail, everything

1 kind of last minute detail. I just get my accountant, “are we going to pay this, do we have  
2 enough balance”, you know then I’m calling people getting more funds, things like that –  
3 MR. MORGAN: And you didn’t have enough money to pay for the staffer, the  
4 congressional staffers. At what point did you realize that you didn’t have enough money?  
5 WITNESS: Okay. I think that just... we were discussing that... I mean those time frame  
6 you know, we were checking if we have enough money you know any funding coming  
7 in... or any sponsorship or any membership dues who are you know, fighting with the  
8 donors to get paid on time. So it didn’t happen.  
9 MR. MORGAN: Were you trying to raise money to pay for this congressional staffers’  
10 travel?  
11 WITNESS: Usually for... no. usually for... we don’t do that kind of fundraising.  
12 Basically it’s hard to get that kind of funding. Based on individual people really believe  
13 in us and so we try to reach out to those like the usual suspects for the donors.  
14 MR. MORGAN: Did you ever have any intention to pay for the congressional travel?  
15 WITNESS: I mean legally we have to. In previous –  
16 MR. MORGAN: When you say legally we have to –  
17 WITNESS: No we have to. I mean we have to pay them. We have to pay TCAE.  
18 MR. MORGAN: You owe TCAE for that payment?  
19 WITNESS: Yes.  
20 WITNESS: Have they ever sent you an invoice?  
21 WITNESS: Invoice? No.  
22 MR. MORGAN: Do you know how much you owe?  
23 WITNESS: For airfare? Yeah we had an oral discussion.  
24 MR. MORGAN: When did that discussion take place?  
25 WITNESS: Right after they purchased the tickets. They said... you know we asked them  
26 how much they pay was it too expensive or something so we have 11 or 12 staffers you  
27 know from Istanbul to Baku, so they... they let us know that we pay that much money.  
28 MR. MORGAN: Who let you know?  
29 WITNESS: Kemal.  
30 MR. MORGAN: Let you know that he had paid –  
31 WITNESS: Yeah, that he had paid. Yeah.  
32 MR. MORGAN: Okay. So why did Kemal – where did TCAE come up with all the  
33 money to pay for it?  
34 WITNESS: For you know... as I said those are all the independent organizations. Their  
35 finances, the members you know, they take membership dues from their member  
36 organizations also. As I said the [indecipherable] level, relationship.  
37 MR. MORGAN: But practically speaking where does TCAE’s money come from?  
38 WITNESS: Sponsors, sponsors.  
39 MR. MORGAN: Sponsorship of the convention?  
40 WITNESS: No, no, TCAE. Overall sponsor –

1 MR. MORGAN: Overall sponsorship  
2 WITNESS: We don't raise any individual event fundraising. You know we are going to  
3 raise funds –  
4 MR. ASHMAWY: Let me ask you a question. So we've been doing this for a while now  
5 and talked to a lot of the federations. None of you guys have a lot of money.  
6 WITNESS: Yes.  
7 MR. ASHMAWY: Kemal all of a sudden shows up with hundreds of hundreds of  
8 hundreds of thousands of dollars to pay for a convention and fly 200+ people over and  
9 nobody asks him where the money comes from?  
10 WITNESS: We didn't ask.  
11 MR. ASHMAWY: Yeah.  
12 WITNESS: I mean for the members of Congress, it might be expensive but for the  
13 staffers, the airfare it wasn't hundreds and hundreds of thousands of dollars. It's kind of –  
14 MR. ASHMAWY: Did he get the money from the government of Azerbaijan?  
15 WITNESS: I don't think so. I'm not sure, I don't think so.  
16 MR. ASHMAWY: Did he get the money from SOCAR?  
17 WITNESS: SOCAR? Yeah. SOCAR is... the main you know, like the government, the  
18 oil company so they uh... their relationship, we know that being non-government, non-  
19 profit so our relationship is really sensitive with the government. So... as far as I know,  
20 they didn't... get you know funding directly from SOCAR. Because TCAE is different,  
21 mostly from the local.  
22 MR. MORGAN: Were you aware that SOCAR was identified as a main sponsor of the  
23 convention in Baku on the signage for the convention?  
24 WITNESS: There were... the others... I saw the SOCAR on the banner as well as other  
25 companies.  
26 MR. MORGAN: Right. There were two listed as main sponsors, SOCAR and I believe  
27 Caspian Drilling.  
28 WITNESS: Caspian...  
29 MR. MORGAN: But you're saying you're not aware of any money going from SOCAR?  
30 WITNESS: No.  
31 MR. MORGAN: So ... why were they listed as a main sponsor?  
32 WITNESS: Uhm you know we... you know this week our convention, we listed the  
33 companies also. They are not necessarily some like the media sponsors. Some just name  
34 recognition for the companies so I'm not sure why they put... because we not really  
35 involve with the relationship is totally... Kemal is... you know this is beyond my  
36 jurisdiction to ask you know what's the relationship, I never looked at their business. We  
37 never had conversation. And he truly... he didn't tell us anything about that. This is really  
38 kind of written... each federation is unique and they do their finances. So we don't have  
39 those kind of conversations.

- 1 MR. ASHMAWY: What I find a little difficult though is that there were people who  
2 attended the convention who publicly acknowledged that it was their understanding that  
3 SOCAR paid for them and they don't know Kemal at all. And Kemal though, is part of  
4 TAA and everyone that we've talked to knows Kemal pretty well, how is it that strangers  
5 know that SOCAR paid for this, but the people closest to him don't?
- 6 WITNESS: Yeah, I understand that. You know SOCAR... you know we... they came  
7 over here several times, SOCAR president and vice president and meeting at the embassy  
8 and visited members of Congress and visited Houston and other state. They've been in  
9 the... uh... before that... they uh... you know before, as I mentioned the relationship  
10 started as I said, the oil... the Houston and Baku, sister-city, and also Kemal invited the  
11 Azerbaijan, like the member of parliament to some state reception that's how we build it  
12 you know. Suleyman Turhan, you know invited the Kyrgyz... the members of parliament  
13 to Midwest State House reception to build a kind of... the length the bridge between those  
14 states and the countries so that's really how. You know SOCAR staff, and the president  
15 and vice president came to those functions and they also help to... for them to come here,  
16 the importance of United States because Azerbaijan is really unique --
- 17 MR. ASHMAWY: Have they helped financially?
- 18 WITNESS: I'm not sure. I don't know.
- 19 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you know an organization known as AFAZ? A-F-A-Z?
- 20 WITNESS: Yeah, AFAZ I know AFAZ.
- 21 MR. ASHMAWY: What is that organization?
- 22 WITNESS: That's... So Kemal left us and is working at AFAZ as far as I know.
- 23 MR. MORGAN: When you say he left us, you mean he left TCAE?
- 24 WITNESS: TCAE, yeah. He's not in our board anymore.
- 25 MR. MORGAN: Why did he leave?
- 26 WITNESS: I'm not sure. I think he's going to spend more time with the Azeri relation  
27 because with the TCAE he had many other activities and other states so he wanted to  
28 work on like this specific Azeri organization... friendship organization so...
- 29 MR. ASHMAWY: So AFAZ... they helped plan the conference?
- 30 WITNESS: First you know... AFAZ established as recently a new organization so  
31 we... as far as I know we organi – we helped organized TAA, the member organization  
32 and specifically for TCAE the first two conventions in 2012 and 2013. After that, AFAZ  
33 established so they took the lead basically. So... they were organized because ... U.S. –  
34 Azeri convention held in D.C. also. So... AFAZ was solely organized that event.
- 35 MR. ASHMAWY: And then... so as I understand, AFAZ wasn't -- didn't really exist  
36 until about 2013?
- 37 WITNESS: Yes, yes. Something like that.
- 38 MR. ASHMAWY: Do you know in that same year, they received a contract from  
39 SOCAR to plan the Azerbaijani-Baku conference?
- 40 WITNESS: 2013? U.S.-Azeri?

1 MR. ASHMAWY: Mhmm.  
2 WITNESS: I don't know.  
3 MR. ASHMAWY: You don't know? You never heard about that?  
4 WITNESS: Can you repeat the question?  
5 MR. ASHMAWY: That there was a contract between SOCAR and AFAZ to plan the  
6 Baku conference.  
7 WITNESS: No, I didn't know that relationship with AFAZ and SOCAR.  
8 MR. ASHMAWY: Kemal never mentioned it to you?  
9 WITNESS: I know they are working together, I know that. But as I said, Kemal didn't  
10 tell us anything about established -- SOCAR and AFAZ established a contract you  
11 know... and office or something so I didn't...he didn't mention.  
12 MR. ASHMAWY: And you just said you knew that SOCAR and AFAZ were working  
13 together. In what way were they working together?  
14 WITNESS: They you know, I know that the AFAZ organized the events. They organized  
15 like ton of Trans-Anatolian projects and they organized like the Azerbaijan activities,  
16 constitution... they organized many others events. I know that SOCAR always come and  
17 be present and always involved with those events so—  
18 MR. MORGAN: Kemal was on your board in 2013? Is that right?  
19 WITNESS: Yes.  
20 MR. MORGAN: So at the time AFAZ was formed, he was a board member of your  
21 organization?  
22 WITNESS: So... as far as I know, just after AFAZ established and when Kemal want to  
23 help that organization form, he left—  
24 MR. MORGAN: He left TAA.  
25 WITNESS: TAA. Because of the conference –  
26 MR. MORGAN: But I just find it -- you know as Omar said, there's a very large value  
27 contract between SOCAR and AFAZ to run the convention. You are the president of the  
28 umbrella association for a lot of the regional groups who took people to that convention.  
29 Kemal was on your board, at the time AFAZ was formed and yet you have no knowledge  
30 of that contract between SOCAR and AFAZ?  
31 WITNESS: Because you know... Technically for the... our individual members – board  
32 members, they could be sitting and hanging out at the board –  
33 MR. MORGAN: I know that technically AFAZ is a separate organization, but I'm just  
34 finding it, frankly, hard to believe that even in chit-chat or in passing conversation, or  
35 during board meetings that large you know, hundreds of thousands of dollars sources of  
36 financial support are not discussed, even as in sharing great news with sister  
37 organizations that a big chunk of money came in. I find it very hard to believe that wasn't  
38 discussed.  
39 WITNESS: I mean Kemal... he's not hiding, but he doesn't like those kind of  
40 conversations, sharing with other people because that's really confidential so you know,

1 even for small amounts we can discuss okay, we got this, but when you talk about I don't  
2 know. I truly don't know the exact amount or contract, but they didn't tell us about it. So  
3 that's his personal or his kind of confidentiality rules.

4 MR. MORGAN: Well I want to run through some documents here real quickly. This is  
5 BM\_0017; this is an invitation to Brandon Mooney it appears, from you?

6 WITNESS: Who is Brandon Mooney?

7 MR. MORGAN: He's a congressional staffer who traveled to the 2013 convention.

8 WITNESS: Oh, he's a staffer. Yeah, yeah. We... this is one of those 11 or 12 that we --

9 MR. MORGAN: That you invited?

10 WITNESS: Yeah.

11 MR. MORGAN: Who drafted this invitation?

12 WITNESS: This one?

13 MR. MORGAN: Yeah

14 WITNESS: Me. I drafted -- our staff. Because in the... we took many delegations to  
15 Turkey and... so we... this is kind of really general.

16 MR. MORGAN: So moving on, now you have there, the primary trip sponsor form; this  
17 is MB\_0051 through 53, submitted by TAA to the Committee on Ethics. Did you fill out  
18 this form?

19 WITNESS: Yeah. My staff filled it and I reviewed and I signed.

20 MR. MORGAN: Who is on your staff that would've been involved in preparing this  
21 form?

22 WITNESS: I'm not sure one of the...

23 MR. MORGAN: Is it Marrut Okuz? Is that --

24 WITNESS: Marrut, he's not here. He was... he helped at that time. He was a PhD student  
25 at that time, he was helping us as many others --

26 MR. MORGAN: And Nadir Shaffiah? Does that --

27 WITNESS: No. Marrut helped me on this one.

28 MR. MORGAN: And you see there on the first page, at the top, it says, "willful or  
29 knowing misrepresentations on this form may be subject to criminal prosecution"--

30 WITNESS: Yes.

31 MR. MORGAN: And then down on line 3 -- 3a, it says, "the primary trip sponsors not  
32 accepted any other source of funds intended directly or indirectly to finance any aspect of  
33 the trip" and you checked that box, but that was not correct was it?

34 WITNESS: Yes... it wasn't correct. We said we are going to pay, but you know we  
35 haven't.

36 MR. MORGAN: So moving on to the third page, MB\_0053, where we have the travel  
37 expenses estimated? How did you --

38 WITNESS: 18, right?

1 MR. MORGAN: Yes, line 18. How did you come up with that number? \$2,475 for  
2 airfare, \$300 for ground, \$2,775 for lodging, \$360 for meals, how did you come up with  
3 those amounts?  
4 WITNESS: This is the best estimate based on our knowledge you know we checked the  
5 airfare and the transportation –  
6 MR. MORGAN: Who did you check the airfare with? How did you check that?  
7 WITNESS: We just checked the you know online, how much they cost?  
8 MR. MORGAN: Online? Like just a Travelocity, Kayak or website something like that?  
9 WITNESS: Expedia.  
10 MR. MORGAN: Expedia? And you came up with the estimate?  
11 WITNESS: Yeah we came up with the estimate figure.  
12 MR. ASHMAWY: Can I just clarify something you've already said? So you submitted  
13 these after you had a list of staffers that were going to attend.  
14 WITNESS: Yes.  
15 MR. ASHMAWY: And at the time you had a list of staffers, you had a conversation with  
16 Kemal that you didn't have enough money to pay for them?  
17 WITNESS: Mhmm. Yes.  
18 MR. ASHMAWY: So when you filled out this form, you already knew that Kemal was  
19 going to pay for the travel?  
20 WITNESS: Yes.  
21 MR. ASHMAWY: Yes?  
22 WITNESS: Yes.  
23 MR. ASHMAWY: Okay.  
24 MR. MORGAN: Was there any conversation with Kemal about this form? Did you feel  
25 at all uncomfortable about listing TAA as the sole sponsor?  
26 WITNESS: We tried to show good faith; we kind of expecting to pay on time, but  
27 because of the shortage and we didn't want to cancel the trip, we are very well aware of  
28 this and it's not right. You know? You check this box. This is –  
29 MR. ASHMAWY: To Mr. Morgan's question though, I guess I too, have a little bit of  
30 confusion. I mean you knew that this wasn't true, why did you fill it out? Kemal could've  
31 filled these forms out.  
32 MR. MORGAN: Were you pressured?  
33 WITNESS: No, not at all.  
34 MR. MORGAN: To fill it out?  
35 WITNESS: No, not at all. So we... I mean basic discussion... you know... we get the real  
36 motivational business, so we are really... not the personal gain, this is rewarding  
37 experience because when you are taking people you are really connecting those  
38 communities so that's... I mean... when you look at the other interview, so you will see  
39 that we had a really committed and dedicated staff. They really want to make it happen

1 you know, we knew this not right, we cannot cancel – and in a short amount of time we  
2 are going to pay back or --

3 MR. MORGAN: Was there any conversation about having Kemal and TCAE send in all  
4 the forms with TCAE's name on it since they were paying for the travel?

5 WITNESS: No. I think this is our staff. We put together these staffers; drew our... you  
6 knew, we are dealing with all members all the staffers but we cannot have close  
7 relationship with everyone so we just took our responsible, we are responsible to take.. I  
8 mean we discuss, we cannot take Congressperson too expensive, maybe just take staffer.

9 MR. MORGAN: Okay so was there a discussion in which it was sort of divided up who  
10 – which organization would at least on paper, invite and sponsor different people?

11 WITNESS: No you know, bottom line we want to get more people.

12 MR. MORGAN: But how did you come up with your list of travelers?

13 WITNESS: Travelers? You know we discuss in our staff. You know with the TAA staff.  
14 How can we get – how many we can get, we discussed... we said... because our budget  
15 issue we cannot take any Congress people, but staffers, we can you know throughout the  
16 event so we have a relationship. For example, Brandon Mooney from which state? Let's  
17 say Illinois, they have a relationship with them, but looks like we know Brandon from  
18 our organization. Let's say we invite Brandon through TAA not through the Midwest  
19 organization. –

20 MR. MORGAN: Was there any collaboration between TCAE, TAA, you know Midwest,  
21 Southeast about whom was taking whom so that there wasn't overlapping invitations or --  
22 ?

23 WITNESS: Good question. I don't think it was kind of overlapping so... everybody reach  
24 out their database. We are taking... normally that's how. Naturally happens. Nobody told  
25 me just put TAA.

26 MR. MORGAN: So when you had come up with your list of invitees and you had that  
27 list set, how was their travel booked? How was their airfare booked, for example did you  
28 handle their airfare or did you just pass their names on to Kemal? How did it work?

29 WITNESS: My staff helped because Kemal didn't deal with those individual so we dealt  
30 with them and we said okay this is your travel... uh... I think that was a travel agency in  
31 New York.

32 MR. MORGAN: Ok. NIL travel?

33 WITNESS: NIL travel, yeah.

34 MR. MORGAN: You're familiar with that?

35 WITNESS: Yeah, NIL travel. NIL travel organized that and then so we put our  
36 reservation because we did orientation meeting

37 MR. MORGAN: Yeah I saw. There was an orientation meeting?

38 WITNESS: There was an orientation meeting.

39 MR. MORGAN: But that orientation meeting was for more than just your travelers,  
40 correct? It was also for other travelers?

- 1 WITNESS: No orientation was in restaurant. Some in our office.
- 2 MR. MORGAN: Did you do the orientation for the Midwest association travelers?
- 3 WITNESS: You know we held a lot of orientation for their travelers. I'm not specific
- 4 about that one.
- 5 MR. MORGAN: So, their travel was booked through NIL. And then who paid NIL for
- 6 that travel?
- 7 WITNESS: And then after the last minute after we confirmed this, the list, we told
- 8 Kemal these are the people come, NIL travel, when it comes to paying, we look at our the
- 9 balance –
- 10 MR. MORGAN: So NIL didn't actually send you an invoice?
- 11 WITNESS: NIL...uh...NIL maybe didn't send us invoice. We haven't reached our
- 12 discussion with Kemal...so after that point, we basically let NIL travel work with Kemal
- 13 directly so that they paid.
- 14 MR. MORGAN: So that TCAE paid?
- 15 WITNESS: TCAE paid.
- 16 MR. MORGAN: To your knowledge, was it in fact TCAE that paid? It wasn't AFAZ
- 17 potentially or –
- 18 WITNESS: No.
- 19 MR. MORGAN: Okay. But you don't know specifically who paid NIL for your travel?
- 20 WITNESS: I didn't see the bank statements, but you know...not 100% sure.
- 21 MR. MORGAN: That was your understanding.
- 22 WITNESS: My understanding, yeah.
- 23 MR. MORGAN: Okay.
- 24 MR. ASHMAWY: So other than giving Kemal a list of staffers who said, "yes I would
- 25 love to go" you guys didn't really have anything else to do with planning the trip or the
- 26 conference?
- 27 WITNESS: For the planning trip, we, I think AFAZ and we did the itinerary for the trip.
- 28 We did those kind of planning. Because of...the you know if you are taking 200 people,
- 29 not every group has a completely different idea. So we had to have couple place to come
- 30 together so a lot of overlapping. Myself organizing all the staffers and get together in the
- 31 hotel
- 32 MR. ASHMAWY: So IN Baku, you accompanied the staffers?
- 33 WITNESS: Yes, I accompanied the staffers.
- 34 MR. ASHMAWY: Did you draft the agenda?
- 35 WITNESS: Yeah we drafted the agenda.
- 36 MR. MORGAN: So what we're looking at right now is BM\_0010 through 0013. We just
- 37 want to make sure all correctly –
- 38 WITNESS: We did that.
- 39 MR. MORGAN: You planned these –

- 1 WITNESS: I'm pretty sensitive about the issues. Who are we taking, who are we going  
2 to meet?
- 3 MR. MORGAN: So you planned these specific events?
- 4 WITNESS: Yes.
- 5 MR. MORGAN: So it looks like the first two days there, May 25 and 26 are in Istanbul –
- 6 WITNESS: Istanbul, yeah.
- 7 MR. MORGAN: And you were there—
- 8 WITNESS: Since we are going all the way to Baku so we thought it was worthwhile to  
9 stay like two days or something in Istanbul.
- 10 MR. MORGAN: Who covered the expenses for Istanbul?
- 11 WITNESS: For Istanbul? That's another story. For Istanbul, that was –
- 12 MR. MORGAN: Baki –
- 13 MR. ASHMAWY: Bakiad?
- 14 MR. MORGAN: Bakiad?
- 15 WITNESS: Yeah or most likely Nisan travel. Nisan travel.
- 16 MR. MORGAN: How do you spell that?
- 17 WITNESS: N-I-S-A-N.
- 18 MR. MORGAN: N-I-S-A-N?
- 19 WITNESS: I think they work with Bakiad.
- 20 MR. MORGAN: Okay are they a travel agency?
- 21 WITNESS: Travel agency. You know for the –
- 22 MR. MORGAN: What is Bakiad?
- 23 WITNESS: Bakiad is a non-profit organization basically is our... kind of our sister  
24 organization. We work with them so they know yes they hosted several delegations  
25 before 2013. Since we started early on the Dialag organization we took so many  
26 delegations to turkey.
- 27 MR. MORGAN: Is Bakiad are they a U.S. organization or a Turkic organization?
- 28 WITNESS: Turkish organization.
- 29 MR. MORGAN: Do you know what their status is in Turkey? Are they government  
30 entity or are they a company or non-profit?
- 31 WITNESS: No, not at all. They are non-profit. They are non-profit just they helping the  
32 delegations to make a smooth transition from one place to another. They are doing the  
33 hotel arrangement, transportation and...
- 34 MR. MORGAN: So they paid for the hotels?
- 35 WITNESS: Same thing with the Kemal they supposedly... we supposed to pay them.

- 1 MR. MORGAN: You were supposed to pay them?
- 2 WITNESS: We were supposed to pay them. We haven't paid.
- 3 MR. MORGAN: How was that established that you were supposed to pay them? Did  
4 you have a conversation with them?
- 5 WITNESS: Yeah we had a conversation with them so we said you know we are bringing  
6 this specific delegation to Baku you know, so they organize it. In this case there is no  
7 domestic --
- 8 MR. MORGAN: Have you ever... has TAA ever paid Bakiad?
- 9 WITNESS: The hotel?
- 10 MR. MORGAN: Yeah.
- 11 WITNESS: Since the beginning no, we haven't I think.
- 12 MR. MORGAN: How many times have you worked with Bakiad for trips to Turkey?
- 13 WITNESS: TAA with re --
- 14 MR. MORGAN: Please don't interrupt me.
- 15 WITNESS: Okay.
- 16 MR. MORGAN: Please wait until I finish the question.
- 17 WITNESS: Okay.
- 18 MR. MORGAN: This wasn't the first time you took people to Turkey?
- 19 WITNESS: Took people to Turkey....
- 20 MR. MORGAN: Was Bakiad also involved in those other instances?
- 21 WITNESS: Other yeah ... they're involved. They're our main contacts to....
- 22 MR. MORGAN: Do they always pay for the Turkey portions of the travel?
- 23 WITNESS: They paid, yeah.
- 24 MR. MORGAN: Have you ever reimbursed them or paid them back?
- 25 WITNESS: No.
- 26 MR. MORGAN: You never have? How many times would you say you've gone --

- 1 WITNESS: I think before this we had maybe 2 or 4 times.
- 2 MR. MORGAN: And then after this?
- 3 WITNESS: After this...
- 4 MR. MORGAN: After the 2013 trip.
- 5 WITNESS: Maybe 1 or 2.
- 6 MR. MORGAN: So you're looking at 5, 6 times or so...
- 7 WITNESS: 5, 6, yeah.
- 8 MR. MORGAN: Times that you've taken groups through Turkey; Bakiad has paid for  
9 those expenses in Turkey? And you have never once paid them back for those expenses?
- 10 WITNESS: No we never... we haven't paid.
- 11 MR. MORGAN: Okay.
- 12 MR. ASHMAWY: You actually have a contract with Bakiad though, don't you?
- 13 WITNESS: We have some agreement. Yeah we have some agreement. But an agreement  
14 not for them to pay everything you know. Helping us like a travel agent, helping us to  
15 organize ... so we send a list for example that many people you know the whole capacity  
16 of the hotel arrangement, they do all the domestic air fare, they do all the organize, you  
17 know. They pay.
- 18 MR. ASHMAWY: Can we... we are going to.... When you get a chance to get back to  
19 your office and everything ... Can we get a copy of that agreement?
- 20 WITNESS: Okay.
- 21 MR. ASHMAWY: Between TAA and Bakiad?
- 22 WITNESS: Okay. They... okay.
- 23 MR. ASHMAWY: I would appreciate that.
- 24 WITNESS: Okay.
- 25 MR. MORGAN: So why was Bakiad paying for those expenses for your group, what's  
26 their motivation?
- 27 WITNESS: The motivation I think is the same I mean look at the real... the purpose of  
28 this foundation. So they get cultural, social, and economic ties and cultural ties between

1 Turkey and US. So they establish that organization to help us out. And we establish the  
2 organization here to help our... you know... audience here so they were helping since the  
3 beginning.

4 MR. MORGAN: Where do they get their money from?

5 WITNESS: They have donors, donations. But specifically no government involved at all.

6 MR. MORGAN: Do you know that for a fact?

7 WITNESS: Yeah I know that for a fact.

8 MR. MORGAN: How do you know that?

9 WITNESS: I have good friends; I communicate with them, you know, throughout the  
10 years. So, because of our festivity...

11 MR. MORGAN: So if you know that they don't get money from the government, you  
12 must know where they do get their money from. If you are that close to them that you  
13 know for a fact that they don't have government funds then where... who are some of  
14 these big sources?

15 WITNESS: Not 100% but I have personal confidence with them so they don't get the  
16 money from the government because of the problem right now in the moment with the  
17 government. So

18 MR. MORGAN: And you say movement... You mean --

19 WITNESS: Gülen Movement

20 MR. MORGAN: Gülen Movement, do they get money from the Gülen Movement?

21 WITNESS: No I mean the current because we are mostly Gülen and sympathizers. So

22 MR. MORGAN: Is Bakiad a Gülen sympathetic organization?

23 WITNESS: They are sympathetic organization yeah. That's usually... that's how we  
24 work with them we knew [unintelligible] at the beginning. So we basically because of  
25 inspired by him to start that Dialag organization reaching out to other communities and  
26 everything so that's they were doing similar activities in Turkey in that regard.

27 MR. MORGAN: Okay so moving on. On the agenda here, on the 28<sup>th</sup> we go over to  
28 Baku. Did you arrange the Baku events, aside from the convention? Like this meeting  
29 with the ambassador of the United States on Tuesday, May 28<sup>th</sup>?

- 1 WITNESS: Okay. So we... I think we for that specific meeting, so I know the Chairman  
2 of the foreign relations committee, Somet Saido. I don't know that specific requesting ....  
3 So I don't know how many people attended that meeting because it came out to like 200  
4 so it looks like this is just for the staffers. So this is all staffers went to that meeting....  
5 We had requested all together from Somet Saido to have that meeting.
- 6 MR. MORGAN: Okay
- 7 WITNESS: From under federation we took all the staffers there.
- 8 MR. MORGAN: So I want to you know move on from the itinerary now well first at  
9 looking at that itinerary is that correct? Is that what did happen?
- 10 WITNESS: Yeah in the times could be different, but as far as I can remember we met  
11 with the president. Lunch in there you know foreign affairs committee. And we had a  
12 dinner.
- 13 MR. ASHMAWY: So I understand that you accompanied people to all these events, but  
14 did you... but you guys didn't plan these events, correct? This was all planned by Kemal?
- 15 WITNESS: We collaborated with those events. We discussed you know, because as I  
16 said I wrote that itinerary based on the itineraries we had before. Usually you know when  
17 we take the Turkey trip, we have kind of traditional 7-8 days itinerary. So we shorten that  
18 on Istanbul, so we put 3 days in Baku and we asked you know what are the options that  
19 we have you know, can we take people here and there? So we collect information the  
20 possible meaningful and feasible, doable program so we came up with what we thought  
21 was the best itinerary from, you know going places....
- 22 MR. MORGAN: When you say you came up with it you mean?
- 23 WITNESS: Our staff
- 24 MR. MORGAN: Oh TAA?
- 25 WITNESS: Our staff, yeah.
- 26 MR. MORGAN: Okay so now following the trip this is BM\_0009. This is the sponsor  
27 post travel disclosure form.
- 28 WITNESS: Yes.
- 29 MR. MORGAN: That was submitted to the Clerk of the House following the travel.
- 30 WITNESS: Yes.
- 31 MR. MORGAN: Your signature is on this?

- 1 WITNESS: Yeah.
- 2 MR. MORGAN: The expenses here listed \$27.85 for total transportation expenses, \$925  
3 for lodging, \$345 for meals. How did you come up with those numbers?
- 4 WITNESS: Based on the... as I said Kemal... we couldn't pay those and Kemal paid  
5 those... TCAE.
- 6 MR. MORGAN: Did you.... I mean is this...
- 7 WITNESS: Some of this so I think we did the best estimate how much we were  
8 supposed to pay to Kemal. We haven't paid this figure because this was supposed to be  
9 solid figure right? Whatever you paid.
- 10 MR. MORGAN: What you actually paid right?
- 11 WITNESS: At that time we haven't paid so we were kind of expecting that much of  
12 invoice from Kemal to pay to cover the expenses.
- 13 MR. MORGAN: You were expecting an invoice of this amount from Kemal?
- 14 WITNESS: Yeah.
- 15 MR. MORGAN: Did you have a conversation with Kemal about these figures?
- 16 WITNESS: At that time I'm not sure. I don't remember.
- 17 MR. MORGAN: Okay. Did you ever receive an invoice from Kemal?
- 18 WITNESS: No we did not.
- 19 MR. MORGAN: Did you ever have any conversation with him about the money being  
20 due?
- 21 WITNESS: Yeah money being due and you know on the one hand they were there's  
22 membership fee that also cost so that was kind of they had to pay us, we had to pay them  
23 so that's... we were kind of delayed.
- 24 MR. MORGAN: Did you honestly expect that you would pay this back?
- 25 WITNESS: Good question. Eventually we had to pay... we have to pay, but I don't know  
26 when and since it's...
- 27 MR. MORGAN: But you haven't yet?
- 28 WITNESS: We haven't yet.

1 MR. MORGAN: When was the last time you had any conversation with Kemal about  
2 this amount being due?

3 WITNESS: Last time we discussed I think after the event. I don't think we have  
4 discussed after that.

5 MR. MORGAN: After the event?

6 WITNESS: Yeah.

7 MR. MORGAN: So did you honestly expect to have to pay this back?

8 WITNESS: As I said we have to pay back.

9 MR. MORGAN: Why do you... What do you have to pay it back?

10 WITNESS: Because I picked this column I mean this is a serious issue; I think we have  
11 to pay back.

12 MR. MORGAN: Did you ever on your 990s with the IRS disclose that as a debt or as an  
13 obligation owed?

14 WITNESS: We are... I mean... I don't think so. No.

15 MR. MORGAN: Does the – Does TAA incur debts? I mean you have credit cards...or  
16 you don't have a credit card, I suppose?

17 WITNESS: We have a... you mean personal or TAA?

18 MR. MORGAN: Do you have a regular accounting process for your debt?

19 WITNESS: Yes, yeah.

20 MR. MORGAN: And but this amount was not included in that?

21 WITNESS: Not included.

22 MR. MORGAN: Why is that?

23 WITNESS: So that's our fault, we are supposed to include that.

24 MR. MORGAN: So I'm going to ask you again knowing that what you say to us here in  
25 this interview is subject to the false statements act. Did you have an honest belief at the  
26 time you submitted this post travel form that you would in fact repay that amount?

27 WITNESS: I.. I knew we were not going to be able to pay that amount at the time but we  
28 were planning to pay later date but it's three years since the event we haven't paid back

1 but... I think we are... after the whole thing started we are I'm thinking of, you know  
2 plan this, and pay back to TCAE.

3 MR. MORGAN: I want to ask you some, if I can sort of gather these up. I want to ask  
4 you about... the bank records you submitted to us... this is a copy here.

5 WITNESS: Okay.

6 MR. MORGAN: I was wondering if you could first turn over to the TAA\_24. There's a  
7 deposit there on August 8<sup>th</sup> of 2012 for \$39,778. From it appears it's from a Camsari  
8 Yunus or Yunus Camsari?

9 WITNESS: Yes.

10 MR. MORGAN: Who is -- what does this amount look like?

11 WITNESS: That's 2012...

12 MR. MORGAN: Is Yunus Camsari ... is that a person or what is that?

13 WITNESS: Yeah it's a person.

14 MR. MORGAN: It's a person

15 WITNESS: One of the, I think we have the large amounts you know \$50,000, \$100,000  
16 you know those are commission sponsors for TAA.

17 MR. MORGAN: What is this specifically?

18 WITNESS: Turkic American Convention .

19 MR. MORGAN: This \$39,000 was for the convention?

20 WITNESS: Yeah

21 MR. MORGAN: From Yunus Camsari?

22 WITNESS: Yes

23 MR. MORGAN: And who is he or she?

24 WITNESS: He is a business person such this is true you know we solicit from Turkey  
25 people we know individual business owners to get some funding for our convention so  
26 that was, we like to pay....

27 MR. MORGAN: Okay so moving on to Page TAA\_34

28 WITNESS: Okay

- 1 MR. MORGAN: I'm wondering there's this one on the top for \$34,000.00?
- 2 WITNESS: Okay that's from CD that's a lot of money.
- 3 MR. MORGAN: What is it?
- 4 WITNESS: This is the CD account like a letter of credit account so we transfer from the  
5 savings to our account.
- 6 MR. MORGAN: This is from your savings account?
- 7 WITNESS: Yeah.
- 8 MR. MORGAN: I don't think you provided records from your savings account. Were  
9 those....
- 10 WITNESS: Savings account? This is not this is... when like I said at the beginning when  
11 we lease our current space they said they required 5 months deposit. So that our rent was  
12 like \$25 something sometimes 5 we located that money to... not to the owner, but to a  
13 mutually agreed account so we asked Bank of America, how this worked they said they  
14 going to open an LOC account a credit account. So the money is in the Bank of America  
15 so nobody can touch this, so if there's a dispute then we going to go to a mediator you  
16 know to get that and this is the determine on the lease so on the first...
- 17 MR. MORGAN: Is that what this payment is, this \$34,000 is your lease?
- 18 WITNESS: Yeah. They released like every year a certain amount.
- 19 MR. MORGAN: Okay.
- 20 WITNESS: That was it. Not really savings so LOC account.
- 21 MR. MORGAN: Okay let's go to 46 next TAA\_46.
- 22 WITNESS: 6 okay.
- 23 MR. MORGAN: There's a \$19,819... deposit there. I was wondering if you could tell me  
24 what that is?
- 25 WITNESS: That's... I think that's also donation from Fatih Zengin
- 26 MR. MORGAN: Who is Fatih Zengin?
- 27 WITNESS: Fatih Zengin is a business person. Business person. The amount is after  
28 converted from Turkish lira to dollar amount and they deducted some amount for the fees  
29 that's why it's not \$20,000

- 1 MR. MORGAN: And moving on to TAA\_54. This is in February of 2013.
- 2 WITNESS: Yes. Those are the....
- 3 MR. MORGAN: And there are a few very large, there's \$125,000 deposit on the 21<sup>st</sup> of  
4 February, I'm wondering if you could tell me where those came from.
- 5 WITNESS: Yeah Sure those are... Halkbank we got the -- we applied a sponsorship at  
6 for our convention 2013.
- 7 MR. MORGAN: For the 2013 Convention?
- 8 WITNESS: 2013 Turkic-American Convention, not country specific Turkic-American  
9 Convention.
- 10 MR. MORGAN: Okay.
- 11 WITNESS: So that's \$125,112...
- 12 MR. MORGAN: From who? From which... you said it was a bank?
- 13 WITNESS: Halkbank.
- 14 MR. MORGAN: Halkbank.
- 15 WITNESS: Halkbank yeah. So we...
- 16 MR. MORGAN: Where is that bank located?
- 17 WITNESS: The bank located in Turkey it's a Turkish bank. And they have a branch in  
18 New York. So do you know why there representative to do the keynote they were and  
19 also this \$112,000....
- 20 MR. MORGAN: \$112,000
- 21 WITNESS: Ziraat Bank same thing... bank of Ziraat.
- 22 MR. MORGAN: And that's a Turkish bank as well?
- 23 WITNESS: Turkish bank yes.
- 24 MR. MORGAN: And that's a sponsorship for the Turkic American Convention?
- 25 WITNESS: Yes for the Turkic-American Convention.
- 26 MR. MORGAN: Not the Azerbaijan?
- 27 WITNESS: Not the Azerbaijan.

- 1 MR. MORGAN: Okay and the \$50,000....
- 2 WITNESS: We put their logos in our banners. And \$50,000 is a business... an  
3 independent business; Summa that's their name.
- 4 MR. MORGAN: Okay
- 5 WITNESS: The company name Summa \$50,000 I remember.
- 6 MR. MORGAN: What was that for?
- 7 WITNESS: So those were the life savers for the.... What was that?
- 8 MR. MORGAN: What were those for? What was the \$50,000 for?
- 9 WITNESS: Turkic American Convention.
- 10 MR. MORGAN: Same thing?
- 11 WITNESS: Yes.
- 12 MR. MORGAN: Okay. Let's go to page 60 now. TAA\_60.
- 13 WITNESS: Okay 60.
- 14 MR. MORGAN: There are also some large... this is March 2013 there's a \$50,000 wire  
15 transfer, or if you could tell what that was for?
- 16 WITNESS: Yes, sure. Yeah we mentioned 3, this is number 4. Konya Seker Sanayi this  
17 is another Sanayi means sugar Konya is a city. Konya Sugar Company, it's a private  
18 business number 4. And number 5, \$100,000 Yildiz holding. That's the... another  
19 holding.
- 20 MR. MORGAN: Were those convention sponsorships?
- 21 WITNESS: All convention sponsorships.
- 22 MR. MORGAN: The Turkish American sponsorships.
- 23 WITNESS: Yeah. 5 and the...
- 24 MR. MORGAN: What about the 99,000?
- 25 WITNESS: The 99 also [indecipherable] means newspaper, newspaper that's one of the  
26 newspaper, Feza. So we put their logos also so those they are all logos in our banner.
- 27 MR. MORGAN: Page 77. At the very top there on June 6<sup>th</sup> of 2013 there's a counter-  
28 credit for \$40,000, do you recall what that is?

1 WITNESS: Yes, that's... I'm sure this is a donation, but I can't point it out specifically  
2 the names. I think this should be in our quick-books.

3 MR. MORGAN: I mean at this time at you know May of 2013 on the records you gave  
4 us it appears you had you started that month with \$203,000 in your account you started  
5 June with \$171,000 it appears that you had enough money in the account to pay back  
6 Kemal, if that was your desire to do so. Is that correct, or was this money already  
7 obligated?

8 WITNESS: Just for the Baku... yeah this was specifically for the Turkic-American  
9 Convention.

10 MR. MORGAN: Even this \$40,000 as well?

11 WITNESS: Yes, those are all dedicated I mean those. Supposed to pay that much in that  
12 time because this year we kind of made it smaller even. We didn't have a sit down dinner  
13 and everything so no... at that time because of the donations that we had, we had you  
14 know, panels and everything. We had like a two and half day convention. So those are all  
15 paid just for these events.

16 MR. MORGAN: So I just want to come back a little bit to, TCAE and AFAZ and the  
17 source of funds that they used to pay for the convention. It looks to us from the people we  
18 talked to the documents we've reviewed that it was a massive undertaking. You know  
19 hundreds of people traveling to Baku. Very large convention, a lot of hotel nights, do you  
20 have any knowledge of the source of that money used to pay for all of those expenses?

21 WITNESS: No, I don't as I said I didn't ask. I know it's a big event and... but I... I was  
22 under the impression that so... that Kemal Oksuz handled through TCAE to cover and get  
23 the funding for this.

24 MR. MORGAN: So if... you know we went through your bank accounts here and you  
25 received sponsorship funding from some of these groups from your Turkic-American  
26 Convention. And I can tell you the signage at the U.S.-Azerbaijan Convention listed  
27 Caspian Drilling and SOCAR as main sponsors. It listed TCAE and AFAZ as the  
28 organizers and then it listed a number of other companies as sponsors as well. Would it  
29 be TCAE and AFAZ's standard practice to receive money from those entities and list  
30 them as sponsors for the event?

31 WITNESS: As I said... I really don't have the information the direct relation. Because as  
32 I said the Kemal Oksuz...

33 MR. MORGAN: But you saw the sign they had at the convention, behind the speakers  
34 and stands?

- 1 WITNESS: Yeah I saw the sign.
- 2 MR. MORGAN: And did you recall seeing SOCAR's logo there?
- 3 WITNESS: Yeah I saw SOCAR and some other I remember there are other... the logos  
4 there.
- 5 MR. MORGAN: Yeah. Do you recall interacting or seeing any representatives from  
6 SOCAR at the convention?
- 7 WITNESS: SOCAR representative at the convention...? So I see the Vice President; I  
8 remember he was on the picture and everything.
- 9 MR. MORGAN: Did they... were they on any panels? Do you recall SOCAR  
10 sponsoring any events related to the convention, VIP rooms?
- 11 WITNESS: No, I don't recall any specific reception just for SOCAR. Everything  
12 like... the [indecipherable] center.
- 13 MR. MORGAN: Were you involved in providing the staff or members with rugs while  
14 they were there?
- 15 WITNESS: No.
- 16 MR. MORGAN: Or are you aware that they received rugs in their hotel rooms during  
17 their convention?
- 18 WITNESS: I don't... you know individual members I don't know who received it. This  
19 was just, as I said, for hospitality they just received. No, we gave the gifts to  
20 [indecipherable] cheaper, but usually they afford all the parts, but they want to show the  
21 culture and value so they throw in something small like the gifts.
- 22 MR. MORGAN: What gifts? What specific gifts do you recall being provided to the  
23 congressional travelers?
- 24 WITNESS: Like I think the bad. I got one.
- 25 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall a tea set? Do you recall there being a tea set?
- 26 WITNESS: No.
- 27 MR. MORGAN: No?
- 28 WITNESS: Tea? No, I don't recall I heard of the rugs, but I don't know the details.
- 29 MR. MORGAN: You heard of the rugs?

- 1 WITNESS: Yeah I heard of the rugs.
- 2 MR. MORGAN: Did you receive one?
- 3 WITNESS: No I represent...
- 4 MR. MORGAN: Did the congressional travelers you were taking, did they receive them?
- 5 WITNESS: No, I don't recall. The one when I entered the room, there was one in the  
6 room.
- 7 MR. MORGAN: When you entered which room?
- 8 WITNESS: My room.
- 9 MR. MORGAN: Your room? There was a rug in your room?
- 10 WITNESS: Not the rug, I mean the bag.
- 11 MR. MORGAN: The bag was in the room?
- 12 WITNESS: The gift bag.
- 13 MR. MORGAN: Okay, do you recall seeing any rugs any gifted rugs?
- 14 WITNESS: No, I haven't seen any rugs.
- 15 MR. MORGAN: You know I can tell you that several of the staff who went, have told us  
16 that they received rugs while they were there and that they were under the impression that  
17 it was a gift from SOCAR. Why would that be?
- 18 WITNESS: Usually for those, you know when they deliver the rugs to individual room  
19 you know usually if they don't tell us or we will know they will usually...
- 20 MR. MORGAN: But how do they know who's in what room? They are just dropping  
21 rugs off at rooms? I don't get it.
- 22 WITNESS: Yeah I don't know who organized that and how you know if they received  
23 rugs so we didn't... maybe they look at the name on the hotel... the guest list from the  
24 hotel? So... you know I understand is like the gift bag for everybody, but you know rugs  
25 it could be hundred dollars could be like much higher. So you know there are a lot of  
26 ethic rules here in providing gifts, so I think... but I don't have that information. Who  
27 organized, and who received and who claimed...
- 28 MR. MORGAN: Did anybody ask you --
- 29 WITNESS: No, nobody asked me anything.

1 MR. MORGAN: For information about your travelers so they can give them gifts?

2 WITNESS: No.

3 MR. MORGAN: Was it apart of the convention were there... were those gifts given to  
4 all convention attendees? Do you have any sense of what it was?

5 WITNESS: You know I mean... no for the convention you know like Wednesday, we  
6 distributed one like the brochure like the pen or something like that. So we tried to do that  
7 you know to showing our appreciation for the participants. But not really very valuable  
8 gifts obviously we can't provide.

9 MR. MORGAN: Let's just look at our notes for a moment.

10 WITNESS: Okay.

11 MR. ASHMAWY: I have... yeah I do have question actually. So Kemal is no longer part  
12 of the Turquoise Council. Is he still part of TAA?

13 WITNESS: No.

14 MR. ASHMAWY: Why not?

15 WITNESS: Why not? He left... usually for our board members, we have board members  
16 I would say are presidents of federations and we added some members from at large.  
17 Representatives from Turkey like one Turkman, one Azeri. So Kemal... I think, I didn't  
18 invite him so he didn't want to be part of this since he left so he's... he wants to just  
19 specifically focus...

20 MR. ASHMAWY: Why isn't AFAZ part of TAA?

21 WITNESS: Because that's C4, I believe. All other organizations C3.

22 MR. MORGAN: Why would that have... I mean that wouldn't preclude it from being  
23 part of your alliance? So can you explain that?

24 WITNESS: Yeah, our first discussion with our lawyers when we established our  
25 organization, we asked specifically you know, what are our... Because of our  
26 individual... when I was in the west coast all five of us C3. So I didn't know C4, C6 so  
27 they explain us. C4 is requirements, C6 is pros and cons. You know you can do this or  
28 that. So we decided to stick on C6 to you know and he said that you know a lot of  
29 organizations here not C3, but C4 and C6. But we want to keep that kind of tradition  
30 being C3 and don't have any kind of... other than cultural education and social issues .  
31 So I think best way to keep that tradition is keep C3 away from other issues and....

32 MR. MORGAN: When was the last time you spoke to Kemal?

- 1 WITNESS: Kemal? Last time he came to our convention Wednesday and stopped by.
- 2 MR. MORGAN: This past Wednesday?
- 3 WITNESS: Yeah.
- 4 MR. MORGAN: That was two days ago?
- 5 WITNESS: Yeah, two days ago. He stopped by I saw him briefly.
- 6 MR. MORGAN: Did you talk to him about the OCE's Review?
- 7 WITNESS: No.
- 8 MR. MORGAN: Did he know that you were speaking to us today?
- 9 WITNESS: No.
- 10 MR. MORGAN: He didn't mention it at all?
- 11 WITNESS: No.
- 12 MR. MORGAN: He didn't ask you anything about it?
- 13 WITNESS: You know the sensitivity because you even though it's our board, we have...  
14 we are really sensitive about... we believe and trust that this should be a kind of  
15 independent so no shared document or conversation, so we haven't discussed with  
16 anybody else you know in my staff only in all document, I only shared with the one  
17 person to help me to the writing and the collecting information.
- 18 MR. ASHMAWY: Has Kemal sent you any documents? Invoices? Any information  
19 from the 2013 trip recently?
- 20 WITNESS: No.
- 21 MR. ASHMAWY: No?
- 22 MR. MORGAN: Have you had any... when was the last time you had any  
23 communication with NIL Travel?
- 24 WITNESS: Not recently, back in 2012.
- 25 MR. MORGAN: Okay, what about SOCAR? Any representative from SOCAR?
- 26 WITNESS: No.
- 27 MR. MORGAN: Have you discussed our review with anyone outside of your  
28 organization?

1 WITNESS: No, never. So this is the first time we are experiencing this. You know all  
2 kind of, you know, accusations you know people asking you know detail and banking and  
3 all the like. Very private as you know, sharing those information but I understand the  
4 seriousness of the issues, you know. I appreciate for taking quick look and I know that as  
5 we discussed, there are certain issues we need to make up you know all the payments and  
6 everything, so I really honestly in our organization, our member organization so we need  
7 your recommendations suggestions so that for the upcoming next trip so we would take a  
8 right, proper from beginning to end. So I will value your evaluation or report on  
9 whatever.

10 MR. ASHMAWY: Yes and we appreciate your time and your honesty today so, thank  
11 you very much.

12 WITNESS: Thank you.

1 MS. EISNER: This is Helen Eisner from the Office of Congressional Ethics. I'm joined  
2 by Bryson Morgan on April 3, 2015. We are interviewing TAFS President. This is – well  
3 I'm not going to list all the numbers of the review and we have given TAFS President the  
4 statement under 18 U.S.C. 1001; he has signed the form and acknowledged it. We also  
5 have let him know that the interview will be recorded. Okay, so why don't you tell us a  
6 little bit about where you're currently employed?

7 WITNESS: At Turkic-American Federation of Southeast, Atlanta based in Georgia base  
8 and...

9 MS. EISNER: And is it okay if we from this point on, refer to the Turkic-American  
10 Federation – sorry, of Southeast –

11 WITNESS: TFS.

12 MS. EISNER: TFS, is okay?

13 WITNESS: It's okay.

14 MS. EISNER: Okay, so and your position there is?

15 WITNESS: President.

16 MS. EISNER: President. And how long have you been employed there?

17 WITNESS: Started '13... probably end of March? Yes.

18 MS. EISNER: March, 2013?

19 WITNESS: Yes. First payroll I remember, March or April. Yeah.

20 MS. EISNER: Okay. And where were you working before then?

21 WITNESS: There was a maintenance company in Texas, Crystal Solutions.

22 MS. EISNER: Okay. And you were hired in March, 2013. Who hired you at that point?

23 WITNESS: I mean the board of directors of Turkic-American Federation offered me  
24 position and I decided to move.

25 MR. MORGAN: So where in Texas were you with Crystal Solutions?

26 WITNESS: It was in Houston, Texas.

27 MR. MORGAN: Houston, Texas.

28 MS. EISNER: Okay.

- 1 MR. MORGAN: Were you on the TFS board prior to being president?
- 2 WITNESS: TFS? No. After I moved, I become familiar all the organizations in  
3 Southeast area.
- 4 MR. MORGAN: Okay.
- 5 MS. EISNER: Is there any other employment that we should know about?
- 6 WITNESS: No...just...it was the only thing that I was making money in Crystal  
7 Solutions.
- 8 MS. EISNER: I meant currently, any other positions?
- 9 WITNESS: Currently, no.
- 10 MS. EISNER: Okay.
- 11 MR. MORGAN: Are you on the board of any other organizations? Board of directors  
12 or...
- 13 WITNESS: Okay. I had membership like Congress-club, like Capitol Hill club and...but  
14 the membership, in terms of membership... I don't know if this is considered, I'm the  
15 Honorary Council of Tanzania. I don't know.
- 16 MR. MORGAN: Okay, yeah.
- 17 MS. EISNER: What does that involve? Honorary Council?
- 18 WITNESS: Honorary Consulate of Tanzania.
- 19 MR. MORGAN: Consulate?
- 20 WITNESS: Yeah, Honorary Consulate.
- 21 MR. MORGAN: Okay.
- 22 WITNESS: And also, I'm the member, if I'm still...I'm not sure. The sister-city  
23 organization in Houston, Istanbul.
- 24 MS. EISNER: It's the sister –
- 25 WITNESS: Sisters organization under Mayor of Houston. You know, sister-city?
- 26 MR. MORGAN: Yeah. So –
- 27 WITNESS: If I'm still because I don't know after I moved, maybe...

1 MR. MORGAN: Okay.

2 MS. EISNER: So, you started at TFS in 2013, how long had TFS existed prior to that?

3 WITNESS: I served... actually, I'm the first guy, I mean initiating technically TFS.  
4 October '12 actually, they registered for the state of Georgia and applied for the non-  
5 profit things.

6 MR. MORGAN: In 2013, October –

7 WITNESS: '12.

8 MR. MORGAN: Oh, '12.

9 WITNESS: '12. Just established, but not run you know. It was just an organization and  
10 most probably last... I don't remember when we became the tax exempt whatever, but  
11 '12, October application I remember, from paper works that I provide you guys as well.

12 MS. EISNER: Sure. And who would have registered that paper work? Who would have  
13 filed that?

14 WITNESS: There was a president, Mustafa Godhen Sahin and Yasin Bagel.

15 MR. MORGAN: Could you write those two names down for us? Just so we have it for  
16 transcript?

17 WITNESS: These are all in the files as well and first establishment; I provide and printed  
18 all information to you guys.

19 MR. MORGAN: Great.

20 WITNESS: That's my first contact and second contact.

21 MS. EISNER: So why was TFS created?

22 WITNESS: Excuse me?

23 MS. EISNER: Why was TFS created?

24 WITNESS: Turks... mostly immigrated United States for educational purposes. We have  
25 very stable community in nationwide and they started establishing non-profits actually in  
26 different periods of time; cultural center, dialogue centers... all basically just to be able to  
27 in the community, you know? Then we started being familiar with the Central-Asian and  
28 East-European nations because culturally they are very close to us. As in diaspora, we  
29 decided and told we can move together to be able to behave as a community. It was the  
30 first... reason at least in carrying that mission you know?

1 MS. EISNER: And we have a sense of you know, I think there are a lot of Turkic  
2 cultural organizations throughout the country –

3 WITNESS: Correct.

4 MS. EISNER: For this one in particular, was there a reason this one was created?

5 WITNESS: It's a similar idea. Even if you do not have any...Central-Asian or East-  
6 European members, but individually people are all time together with us, moving  
7 together you know? Yeah, that's it.

8 MS. EISNER: Okay.

9 WITNESS: Is that kind of...in old time, we get advice from the friends, you know,  
10 American friends, hey, you guys are... doing great job in cultural areas and everything,  
11 but to be able to behave as a community and recognize and you can also... establish an  
12 umbrella you know, it can kind of be liaison for you guys and you know... that's why,  
13 basically established that.

14 MS. EISNER: And does TFS have a staff besides you?

15 WITNESS: Yeah. One assistant we have right now.

16 MS. EISNER: What is his position?

17 WITNESS: Assistant. Executive assistant.

18 MS. EISNER: Assistant, okay.

19 WITNESS: Kind of scheduler for us and...

20 MS. EISENR: What is his name?

21 WITNESS: You want to write it? Zinaida Vugdelic is his name.

22 MS. EISNER: Yeah.

23 MR. MORGAN: You said the board of directors offered you the position?

24 WITNESS: Yes sir.

25 MR. MORGAN: Who was your main contact on the board of directors?

26 WITNESS: Yasin Bagel. I already mentioned him.

27 MR. MORGAN: Okay.

28 MS. EISNER: And does TFS have a treasurer?

- 1 WITNESS: Yes. And we have a Chamber of Commerce, he's president... Omer  
2 Casuvluz is president. Let me write. He's the treasurer.
- 3 MS. EISNER: Is he a board member as well?
- 4 WITNESS: Yes.
- 5 MS. EISNER: Okay. How does TFS receive funding?
- 6 WITNESS: Let me think. Mostly... mostly donations and also... we are organizing trips  
7 to overseas and most of the participants you know, other than their airfare and their costs,  
8 they are participating as fee. For example, right now everybody is participating with  
9 \$700.00 fee, you know, those are we are bringing Turkey and... it's kind of a little bit of  
10 money as well, you know... funding as well, plus donations. We can consider those as  
11 donations as well because they are just donating basically you know.
- 12 MS. EISNER: What other types of donations do you receive?
- 13 WITNESS: Regular individuals, you know? People are you know, sometimes comes and  
14 give the checks you know or I have some people give their credit card yearly, we  
15 charge... they say specific amount money you know, those type of... donations.
- 16 MS. EISNER: Any donations from any other types of entities, companies, businesses?
- 17 WITNESS: Two now... as well as I remember from the accounting or individuals, you  
18 know?
- 19 MS. EISNER: Okay.
- 20 WITNESS: As far as I remember.
- 21 MR. MORGAN: Are those individuals, are they people who live here in the United  
22 States?
- 23 WITNESS: Yeah, from the community basically. Mostly from Atlanta, Georgia, but I do  
24 receive sometimes because I have jurisdiction in Tennessee, you know Florida and  
25 sometimes I'm receiving you know from them as well.
- 26 MR. MORGAN: Okay. Who are some of your big donors? Do you have any certain  
27 individuals who provide larger checks, larger amounts of money?
- 28 WITNESS: No. I mean... we can just diversify, you know? I cannot say 90% is coming  
29 from this individual, but the rest 10% is coming from you know... it's kind of  
30 combination, you know. And last year, I had a construction guy here, he moved to United  
31 States, he write checks, but maybe no more than \$30 - \$40,000.00 I guess if I can tell you  
32 know, but not specifically... one person you know.

1 MS. EISNER: I think you said donations come from mostly individuals. Are there any  
2 companies that donations come from?

3 WITNESS: I should look at it you know because sometimes individuals are telling me,  
4 “okay, we’re going to donate,” but when they send their company checks...I should  
5 know it you know to look at it and I can understand and tell you guys yes, this is an  
6 individual, but he write check from his company that I should figure it out, you know.

7 MS. EISNER: Would there be any documentation of that? You could go back and look  
8 at them?

9 WITNESS: Of course. All our accountings is in quick books in one click, all the  
10 donations stuff we can provide you guys.

11 MR. MORGAN: That would be great.

12 MS. EISNER: So let’s go on and talk a little bit about the convention that you know,  
13 we’re here to talk about. So, what was the 2013 U.S.-Azerbaijan convention?

14 WITNESS: ’13? As I said, I took the office... March or April and in our time, you know  
15 the mission was, as I mentioned before, Turkish based, Central-Asian based or East-  
16 European based individuals... they do live here. They’re American, basically and... we  
17 provide them you know, cultural services, similar things and... emotionally we have a tie  
18 with those people and we have individuals in the community from those nations. Every  
19 time they do see... before we actually, I don’t remember the TAA conventions when it  
20 started, I don’t remember, should be prior you know, but maybe it’s... it was the first  
21 sample for the convention types. It was a kind of community gathering, every year you  
22 know and everybody coming together in Washington and you know, celebrating and  
23 everybody’s visiting their elected officials. After that, individuals in the community  
24 started telling, this okay, TAA is umbrella you know... and representing us as well, can  
25 we do the similar things, you know? Most probably start to like this because I have the  
26 same feeling right now because you know all time, I have individuals in the community  
27 from different backgrounds take in similar things, that’s why I’m just referring. And  
28 then... the Kazakhs, Azeris and Kirgiz, and all others who wanted to represent you know,  
29 the same way. When I came to office, already you know... all my other sister-  
30 organizations and leaders, “hey you know we are organizing, especially Texas one, a  
31 convention, the same purpose you know... the individuals who want that, they want to be  
32 represented you know... because after ’13 when you guys inquire, I just did research and  
33 it seems before that they did the same thing in Washington, you know? And –

34 MS. EISNER: Yeah, let’s unpack all of this a little bit because I know you have a lot of  
35 information to provide, which is great. We really do appreciate that, but just so I can

1 break it out and understand a few of the things that you said. So you said, “especially the  
2 Texas one”, which organization are you referring to there?

3 WITNESS: Turquoise Council because as well as I understand, they have a specific  
4 number of community members in Texas... they you know all time, very active and want  
5 to be you know, represented as a country as well, you know? And then... when I come to  
6 office, “hey you know what, a month later we are organizing such trip” and this is for the  
7 convention you know just to be able to... both sides actually, they explain me, “okay it’s  
8 mutually, on our side, American side, we will see interest to American individuals you  
9 know, Iran and Russia is there”... these are philosophical conversation, I’m sorry about  
10 this.

11 MS. EISNER: No, it’s okay.

12 WITNESS: And that we should teach at this of leaders, what American interests you  
13 know overseas and the mission –

14 MR. MORGAN: Was this a meeting? Was it a conversation you were having with  
15 someone else?

16 WITNESS: In Washington, I mean we are having... the board meeting you know, with  
17 TAA because –

18 MR. MORGAN: With TAA?

19 WITNESS: Eventually I’m the board member for TAA, but at that point, it was just a  
20 month right after I take – took the office, it was not the proper meeting for me because I  
21 received an all time cost, you know?

22 MR. MORGAN: Okay.

23 WITNESS: From Kemal, you know. Mostly focused on because he was in the center for  
24 that convention as well as I understand, that’s why he just direct me you know, “could  
25 you please invite you know, the people” and things like that and I was –

26 MS. EISNER: So you’re referring to a Kemal Oksuz? Is that who you are –

27 WITNESS: Yeah. He was the CEO or the president is whatever or president, I guess.

28 MR. MORGAN: Of Turquoise Council?

29 WITNESS: Turquoise Council and then, I was very fresh at the office and yeah, it was a  
30 good opportunity for me to work on the field, you know? Then I just... invite people.

31 MS. EISNER: Okay.

1 MR. MORGAN: So you Kemal asked you to invite people?

2 WITNESS: Yes.

3 MR. MORGAN: Okay. What – which people did he ask you to invite? Was it the people  
4 in your region or was it –

5 WITNESS: Actually, the people representing my region, but were in Washington like  
6 staffers you know... that's why I communicate with the staffers.

7 MR. MORGAN: So did he give you a list?

8 WITNESS: No, basically in my jurisdiction, I have six to five members of Congress and  
9 ten Senators. Basically, when you go their office web page, you can just send the  
10 invitation. And whenever you understand is enough, you just cut it off, it's working like  
11 this.

12 MR. MORGAN: Whenever you have enough people who have accepted the invitation –

13 WITNESS: Then I'm just done, you know. I didn't go further.

14 MS. EISNER: So there was some limits, thresholds, for how many people –

15 WITNESS: I was very new people. I was very new and I was not sure for the  
16 manageable things and it was seven or eight people... most probably accepted them.

17 MS. EISNER: So we'll get into some of the –

18 WITNESS: Then, you know, I'm done with that.

19 MR. MORGAN: So how did you know how many people you could take?

20 WITNESS: That's what I'm saying. I was very new, for me to be able to you know, the  
21 manage people, seven, eight people is enough for me you know in my part.

22 MR. MORGAN: Oh, to manage the logistics of it?

23 WITNESS: Yeah. In my mind, I mean... if I am seven, eight people, how... what is the  
24 purpose of that trip, you know? How can we communicate with those people?

25 MR. MORGAN: So you've done – have you done trips to Turkey and Azerbaijan before,  
26 with Congressional staff?

27 WITNESS: No.

28 MR. MORGAN: Or with other – with non... with other people though? So how did you  
29 know that seven or eight was about the right number?

- 1 WITNESS: Can you say again?
- 2 MR. MORGAN: How did – did you have some experience in taking people on these  
3 trips?
- 4 WITNESS: I was participating in trips to overseas, not to Azerbaijan, but also to  
5 Turkey... would the different inter-faith groups you know.
- 6 MR. MORGAN: Okay, yeah. So you've done a similar –
- 7 WITNESS: I know what is the nature of the trips in three, four days... I mean for twenty  
8 people, but I mean what can you do it.
- 9 MS. EISNER: Were these trips to Turkey, were they with Congressional staff as well?  
10 The Turkey trips?
- 11 WITNESS: No. It was just... as I said... diversified. Kind of mixed and different parts of  
12 life and it was, as I said, after that I did that, you know? Fourteen, most probably, but I'm  
13 just in here, that's why...
- 14 MS. EISNER: Okay. And you were – as you've said, you're kind of new to this; this was  
15 March 2013, when you started the job, the new job at TFS, how did you know how to  
16 reach out to Congressional staffers? You hadn't done that in the past, how did you know  
17 prior to this?
- 18 WITNESS: I was volunteering in the non-profits and when I was in Texas, you know.  
19 Not just from Congress delegation, any people... when we are inviting people, I know  
20 how to reach them, you know? Just call them, their office and send the invitation. The  
21 same process, I guess. Everybody is the same people, you know?
- 22 MS. EISNER: Was anyone walking you through the specifics of reaching out to  
23 Congressional staff and anything that might be different there?
- 24 WITNESS: No. It was the same thing, that's why if I did mistake it's just because of  
25 that... I... you know I'm not sure about...
- 26 MS. EISNER: So, kind of stepping back. We talked about TAA at first; you're familiar  
27 with them and their sort of role in previous conventions –
- 28 WITNESS: Right now, I'm familiar more because it was first time at that time, I started  
29 their meetings and right now I'm attending, you know?
- 30 MS. EISNER: Okay. But at that time and you were getting to know them at the time and  
31 you were attending their meetings?

- 1 WITNESS: Right, last two years, I'm familiar right now. The mission, the field works  
2 and everything.
- 3 MS. EISNER: Okay.
- 4 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall when you first heard about that 2013 convention?
- 5 WITNESS: Can you say again?
- 6 MR. MORGAN: When did you first hear about it?
- 7 WITNESS: Uh... whenever I deploy here, you know, whenever I come here, I rent my  
8 house and at that point you know, I started to work on it you know. Even if I didn't know  
9 that there was going to be a convention or whatever, because I'm not in that planning  
10 committee or whatever if there is a planning committee, you know?
- 11 MR. MORGAN: Yeah, so who was on that planning committee?
- 12 WITNESS: If there was a planning committee.
- 13 MR. MORGAN: Was there –
- 14 WITNESS: I'm not familiar, that's what I'm saying. If Kemal has a team, it is his team,  
15 but I... he just called me. That's it. Other than that –
- 16 MR. MORGAN: Oh, okay. I just wanted to get this specific; he called you? Was it a  
17 phone call?
- 18 WITNESS: That's what I'm saying. From the beginning, he called me, “could you  
19 please invite people and we are having you know, the convention overseas” –
- 20 MR. MORGAN: Did he send you materials to look over?
- 21 WITNESS: Should be because... I did research in my email accounts and everything, I  
22 printed all the things... maybe more than sixty or seventy emails... but... his assistant,  
23 Razul, the only thing I received emails from him is here because you know he just call  
24 me, Razul sent me documentation.
- 25 MS. EISNER: And who is Razul?
- 26 WITNESS: Razul is in Kemal's team. Most probably, vice president of Turquoise.
- 27 MS. EISNER: And his team is for the Turquoise Council?
- 28 WITNESS: Turquoise Council. And then Razul sent me you know, directions you know,  
29 the invitations, hotel recommendations and everything.

- 1 MS. EISNER: Oh, he sent you – so... when you say, he sent that to you, was it  
2 information about that for the travelers?
- 3 WITNESS: Actually, first, how... what type about the nature of the convention.
- 4 MS. EISNER: Yeah, what's the nature?
- 5 WITNESS: Material.
- 6 MS. EISNER: Okay.
- 7 WITNESS: And then I invite people and whenever they accepted, they direct me how to  
8 run the process you know because I'm not as familiar. After that point, when the Ethics  
9 approve, that point Razul start to send me the confirmations and others as well.
- 10 MS. EISNER: Well we're going to get into a lot of this stuff, but just to kind of... I'll  
11 bring it back a little bit before we dive into the next thing. So, I mean, you mentioned  
12 reaching out to these seven or eight people and inviting them to the convention, what role  
13 did TFS play in the convention?
- 14 WITNESS: Actually, TFS was just participant. I mean because I was only person,  
15 there's no TFS back then, just me and I invited and with those people –
- 16 MR. MORGAN: Did you go to it?
- 17 WITNESS: Yeah. That's what I'm saying. I was the one who traveled with them and  
18 then come back. That's it.
- 19 MR. MORGAN: Did you travel with them on their Turkey portion of their trip as well?
- 20 WITNESS: I should remember that because we've very focused on... maybe Istanbul  
21 because I don't remember exactly what the schedule was. Some of them wanted to extend  
22 their trips; they were on their own private rides, they did it. According to the tickets  
23 purchased, I remember that part, yeah. I was together with them whole time, but other  
24 than Istanbul, I don't remember anything because Istanbul was kind of a hop for people  
25 to transfer to go all over the world.
- 26 MR MORGAN: Okay.
- 27 MS. EISNER: And during those initial board meetings, when you were just sort of being  
28 approved as new president of TFS, was the convention mentioned? Was there any  
29 anticipation of the convention?
- 30 WITNESS: No, they're not familiar with it. I mean, if right now, I mean... the... I  
31 mean... just they gave me the right to do things and... yeah.

- 1 MS. EISNER: Okay. So, we've –
- 2 WITNESS: Nobody participated from my board members.
- 3 MS. EISNER: Nobody attended?
- 4 WITNESS: Yeah. Even just in Washington as well... you know.
- 5 MS. EISNER: Were they familiar with the convention?
- 6 WITNESS: They don't know about it. I mean... I'm very honest about that; they don't  
7 know what the convention is.
- 8 MS. EISNER: Okay.
- 9 WITNESS: Yeah.
- 10 MR. MORGAN: Who else was on – you referred to Kemal's team?
- 11 WITNESS: Razul. Razul was –
- 12 MR. MORGAN: Anybody else on that?
- 13 WITNESS: I really don't know because Razul was the person who was contacting me  
14 with email most probably Kemal was busy that's why he was calling me. Razul was  
15 running the system.
- 16 MS. EISNER: Okay. Was Kemal and Razul, anyone else, maybe not on Kemal's team,  
17 but you would mention who was a part of this on going, planning and information on  
18 anyone else you were getting, sort of planning information from, about the convention?
- 19 WITNESS: They don't have secret ideas and if they would have, they would  
20 make... communication with me just for [indecipherable]. I'm just trying to remember  
21 and also I look at the emails, only person I saw was Razul, that's why I'm just  
22 mentioning right now, you know.
- 23 MR. MORGAN: Okay.
- 24 MS. EISNER: Do you know how the logistics were decided for the convention? You  
25 know, the time, when it would be held?
- 26 WITNESS: I really know... the information about that because I was one invited like  
27 participant, you know? I was guest as well. Even if... if you ask the question, what was  
28 the panels, even if I don't remember you know... those things –
- 29 MS. EISNER: How do you think those decisions were made? How do you think the  
30 decisions were made?

- 1 WITNESS: Okay. Most probably Kemal decided you know? Because it was his  
2 convention, you know?
- 3 MS. EISNER: Yeah. Why do you say that? I mean we keep going back to sort of Kemal  
4 being the center of this, why did it seem like it was his convention?
- 5 WITNESS: Because he communicate with me you know, Tafari didn't communicate with  
6 me about the convention, I mean Kemal communicated with me, that's why it was his  
7 project I guess. Because I know my projects you know, with a group of people I'm  
8 having Turkey; I'm arranging everything you know... I know everything, if you ask the  
9 question to me, I mean every single second I can tell you everything, you know. If I am a  
10 guest, I participate different groups as a guest and even I don't remember as a guest those  
11 type of things as well. It's the same thing for as well you know.
- 12 MS. EISNER: Okay. Did convention attendees need visas to enter Azerbaijan to get into  
13 the country?
- 14 WITNESS: Yes because they provide us and they sent us the visas, the papers you know.
- 15 MS. EISNER: How did you get those papers? How would you –
- 16 WITNESS: When we sent the pictures and passport copies to Kemal or Razul, whatever,  
17 and then they communicate with the Ambassadors, they send all the information and  
18 everything to the embassy. And whenever they receive the approval visas, they send us.  
19 This is what I know about that.
- 20 MS. EISNER: So you would be in contact with the staff and the staff would send you the  
21 passport information and then you would forward it to Razul?
- 22 WITNESS: Forward it to them, correct.
- 23 MS. EISNER: I don't want to put words in your mouth, just want to make sure I'm  
24 getting it.
- 25 WITNESS: No, no. It is. You know because individually, nobody... applied for the visas  
26 as Azeri member because I remember the paper work or the approval came in one page, I  
27 remember keep these visas... I remember those details, you know.
- 28 MS. EISNER: Okay. So we've been talking about TFS sponsoring Congressional  
29 travelers. How many travelers was it? How many Congressional travelers did TFS  
30 sponsor?
- 31 WITNESS: [indecipherable], you mean?
- 32 MS. EISNER: TFS. How many –

- 1 WITNESS: At that time?
- 2 MS. EISNER: To the convention. Yeah, how many Congressional travelers to the 2013  
3 convention?
- 4 WITNESS: As far as I remember, seven or eight, as I said.
- 5 MS. EISNER: Seven or eight?
- 6 WITNESS: Yeah, no more than that. And there was no... there weren't any Members,  
7 just the staffers.
- 8 MS. EISNER: No Members?
- 9 WITNESS: Yeah.
- 10 MR. MORGAN: Did you invite Members?
- 11 WITNESS: Most, probably, but generally how it works is, the Members, if I know  
12 people from the first-hand, I can invite. I mean, other than that... it's just sending email,  
13 that's it. For the Member's level, staffers they are very open, they are all time, but for the  
14 members, I mean you should know him personally and knowing anybody here.
- 15 MR. MORGAN: Did Kemal want Members, you to invite Members?
- 16 WITNESS: He... generally wanted me to invite people from Washington, but... I mean I  
17 was very new you know, and even if I talked to people from other districts, they were not  
18 that much in contact with Members, that's why... it was meaningless for us to invite you  
19 know... Members.
- 20 MR. MORGAN: Okay.
- 21 WITNESS: Not specifically all the Members, but from Washington people you know  
22 that's it.
- 23 MS. EISNER: How did he communicate that to you that he wanted people from  
24 Washington?
- 25 WITNESS: Can you say again?
- 26 MS. EISNER: How did he communicate to you that he wanted people from  
27 Washington?
- 28 WITNESS: He called me.
- 29 MS. EISNER: He called you? Phone conversation?

1 WITNESS: It was very limited time, you know. Just think about it, I'm moving  
2 here... late March or early April and a month or two months later, there's a big event –

3 MS. EISNER: Fast turnaround.

4 WITNESS: Also, I really didn't care about this stuff. I was moving you know, it was  
5 kind of stressful things for me. I just invite people, that's it.

6 MR. MORGAN: Did you know Kemal when you were in Houston?

7 WITNESS: Yeah, Kemal... everybody knows him.

8 MR. MORGAN: Okay. You know, it's one of the things we're trying to get a sense of in  
9 our investigation, is Mr. Oksuz. Just tell me a little bit – what is he like? How did you  
10 meet him?

11 WITNESS: What he's like?

12 MR. MORGAN: You said everybody knows Kemal. What is he – is he really out going?

13 WITNESS: He's a very important guy, you know in the leadership level. If you are new  
14 community, for example in my community in Georgia, everybody knows me now. Why?  
15 Because I'm communicating with people that need help, you know? That's why it's the  
16 only thing you know, that I can tell you. It's similar things you know. If there is a leader  
17 and everybody knows him, at least we know everybody should know him, you know.

18 MR. MORGAN: So is that what Kemal was in Houston? He was the leader in that area?

19 WITNESS: Yeah, for the TFS...

20 MR. MORGAN: TC --

21 WITNESS: TCA –

22 MR. MORGAN: Turquoise Council?

23 WITNESS: Turquoise Council, that's why... you know... at least we are thinking that  
24 everybody should know him, you know.

25 MR. MORGAN: Okay. Did he help you get your position at TFS? Was he involved in  
26 that?

27 WITNESS: Most probably, he can offer people if, you know, people from here, but... I  
28 really didn't you know... yes, he was knowing me and they wanted TFS... to activate it,  
29 you know that's why and they were most probably asking people from all states, not just  
30 from there and... Houston... was kind of tired to me; it's hot, humid you know...

1 MR. MORGAN: Well –

2 MS. EISNER: When did you – oh...

3 MR. MORGAN: Oh, I was just going to say, the sense we have is that the Turquoise  
4 Council was a really active organization.

5 WITNESS: Yeah, I was volunteering as well. Not only just the sister-cities, every  
6 relative organizations, our Raindrop center... IID dialogue center... you  
7 know... Turquoise... and we people were you know all time volunteering, whenever they  
8 needed, that's why... yeah, go ahead please.

9 MR. MORGAN: So among the – and the way we understand it is, there's sort of –  
10 there's TAA, which is the umbrella organization –

11 WITNESS: Yeah, for nationwide.

12 MR. MORGAN: And there are the regional, sister organizations. Was Turquoise Council  
13 more active than the other sister organizations? Was it sort of the most prominent one?  
14 The most well-financed one?

15 WITNESS: You mean more than TAA, then yes because... Texas people are very you  
16 know stable. I mean, individuals I mean and they have enough funds you know, enough  
17 staff and enough centers; they very well established organization.

18 MR. MORGAN: Why is that?

19 WITNESS: I don't know, I mean years and years... it's a long-term question, you know,  
20 maybe 15 years ago, they start to create community and here, we have just one cultural  
21 center in Moralfreda, I have office in Midtown and because, maybe because of  
22 universities, I don't know. When people receive and I mean when the cities receive  
23 community members, then community we active it. If you ask me why you guys are this  
24 much lazy here in Georgia, I cannot say anything because it's community members and  
25 the image people, that's it.

26 MS. EISNER: Has Turquoise council been established for that you know, longer period  
27 of time? You mentioned a long period of time of funding in Houston –

28 WITNESS: I'm not referring Turquoise, I'm referring to all non-profits.

29 MS. EISNER: All non-profits.

30 WITNESS: Because, even in 2003, there were cultural center, you know? And before  
31 Turquoise...

- 1 MS. EISNER: I just want to go back and confirm some of the travelers you had  
2 mentioned, seven or eight. We've pulled the public filings, so we have a sense of you  
3 know exactly, who they are on behalf of TFS. So, I'm just going to go through the names  
4 and if you could confirm that they were part of the trip?
- 5 WITNESS: Okay.
- 6 MS. EISNER: Matthew Hodge?
- 7 WITNESS: Yes.
- 8 MS. EISNER: Jessica Carter?
- 9 WITNESS: Yes.
- 10 MS. EISNER: David Black?
- 11 WITNESS: Yes.
- 12 MS. EISNER: James Wiley Deck?
- 13 WITNESS: Yes.
- 14 MS. EISNER: Glen Miles?
- 15 WITNESS: Miles... yes.
- 16 MS. EISNER: Julian Johnson?
- 17 WITNESS: Yes.
- 18 MS. EISNER: Erica Strable?
- 19 WITNESS: Erica Strable... yes.
- 20 MS. EISNER: And Christopher Shell?
- 21 WITNESS: Yes.
- 22 MS. EISNER: Okay. So that –
- 23 MR. MORGAN: Anybody else that wasn't on that list?
- 24 WITNESS: I remember one name, but she was in this group or... Courtney Tidus. I don't  
25 – I was not sure because Courtney Tidus.
- 26 MS. EISNER: Courtney?

1 WITNESS: Courtney Tidus, yes. Courtney. As well as I remember, maybe... I'm not  
2 sure.

3 MS. EISNER: Is it possible they were Senate staff?

4 WITNESS: Huh... no. Courtney is a Congregational – she's at South Carolina? Tom  
5 Rice's office. Congressman Tom Rice's office, but I don't know. I mean she attended  
6 another because she is a good friend in old time; every time I see her, whenever I  
7 see... people... I just... guessing she was in the group as well; that's why, I don't know.  
8 You maybe just check it professionally, that's better.

9 MS. EISNER: Okay, we will follow up on that. And were you the primary point of  
10 contact for these travelers that I just mentioned?

11 WITNESS: Yes ma'am.

12 MS. EISNER: Okay.

13 MR. MORGAN: Did you ever – if they ever had any logistical questions, did you ever  
14 ask any of those travelers to speak directly to Kemal or Razul? Do you recall that ever  
15 happening?

16 WITNESS: I'm just trying to remember... because my conclusion that they  
17 should... maybe a few times? A few staffers name on the ticket was wrong, at that point I  
18 just directed them to Razul just to handle it. At the point, they communicated. Yeah.

19 MS. EISNER: What is the Assembly of Friends of Azerbaijan?

20 WITNESS: Assembly of?

21 MS. EISNER: Assembly of Friends of Azerbaijan?

22 WITNESS: I was in Houston... that's why I was hearing things because I'm not in that  
23 board. Whenever this representation started and continued, most probably strong  
24 community members, Azeri community members, wanted to establish their own... you  
25 know. Most probably just because of that... either the establish other than Turquoise  
26 because Turquoise kind of Turkish... still you know and they didn't want any big brother  
27 and they wanted to establish such organizations, probably.

28 MR. MORGAN: You're saying – who was at the... who would've been in charge of –

29 WITNESS: Members are very strong because of the oil industry in Houston. I  
30 mean... they were considering themselves in the community, but after that most  
31 probably... because right now they have a cultural center separately, that's why I can just

1 tell you guys... individuals from Azeri community and I cannot tell you this and this, who  
2 wanted to do that.

3 MR. MORGAN: So were you involved in the Assembly of Friends of Azerbaijan  
4 forming?

5 WITNESS: No. No.

6 MR. MORGAN: Do you know when they formed? Do you have a sense of what it was?

7 WITNESS: I was in Texas. It should be two years you know, because I was  
8 hearing... because it was kind of disturbing things for the community because the  
9 Turks... you know when the community started here you know, the leadership and the... I  
10 was hearing they didn't want it and they wanted to just get their own leadership and –

11 MR. MORGAN: Were there sort of disagreements between them and Kemal or  
12 Turquoise Council –

13 WITNESS: No! Because Kemal was in their board as far as I know, that's why you  
14 know –

15 MR. MORGAN: Oh, okay.

16 WITNESS: And that's why –

17 MS. EISNER: Whose board is he on?

18 WITNESS: Can you say again?

19 MS. EISNER: Kemal's on whose board? You said he's on their board?

20 MR. MORGAN: [inaudible]

21 WITNESS: Yeah, he should be because they were running together, you know and they  
22 were moving together and then the community itself, the grass root I mean, because there  
23 was one organization when you guys were talking establishing another organization,  
24 things like that... is that disturbing for the community, you know.

25 MS. EISNER: So there was this kind of, you mentioned an oil interest or in the area–

26 WITNESS: Area. That's why I talk of engineers you know... education purposes, other  
27 PhD from Azerbaijan, Kazakhstan... people working in Houston industry eventually, you  
28 know.

1 MS. EISNER: Would there have been an oil interest or in that general industry, you  
2 know, that was interested in the Azeri kind of interests as opposed to the Turkish  
3 interests?

4 WITNESS: It was different thing; you know...I'm mentioning the people of Houston  
5 mostly working in the oil industry. They can be working for other industry as well, it's  
6 just because of you know...they know the best, you know? It's not related with that.  
7 Turkish community very diverse I mean the professors, business people and whatever I  
8 cannot specifically one type of group of people, but mostly they have an interest to come  
9 to United States for the PhD programs for their future, you know.

10 MS. EISNER: So you were hearing about this, we're going to I think refer to it as A-F-  
11 A-Z or AFAZ? Assembly of Friends of Azerbaijan.

12 WITNESS: AFAZ, you said?

13 MR. MORGAN: People have told us that that's what –

14 WITNESS: Azerbaijan... friends?

15 MR. MORGAN: It's called Assembly of the Friends of Azerbaijan.

16 WITNESS: AFAZ, if you just... like TFS.

17 MR. MORGAN: Yeah, the acronym.

18 MS. EISNER: Yeah, AFAZ. I mean you were hearing about it, you heard about kind of  
19 the formation, have you become familiar with AFAZ since? You learned about AFAZ, do  
20 you know – have you, you've been now at TFS for two years, have you heard about  
21 AFAZ?

22 WITNESS: When I was in Atlanta?

23 MS. EISNER: Just over the last two years, have you come to know...

24 WITNESS: When I was in Houston, I was familiar because we had friends from  
25 Azerbaijani community. They were talking, "okay, we are going to do this things, and we  
26 are going to open culture center, is whatever, but after that point, I have no recollection.

27 MS. EISNER: Okay. I think we're going to start to show you some documents and try to  
28 kind of work through them with you. So...

29 MR. MORGAN: So if at any point you need to take a restroom break, let us know.

30 WITNESS: No, I'm okay. Let's finish this up it's better for me, you know.

- 1 MS. EISNER: Sure.
- 2 WITNESS: First time ever I'm facing this type of thing, you know. Even if I'm not first  
3 or second partner on the Turk party.
- 4 MS. EISNER: So I'm going to hand you MH\_0050. And –
- 5 MR. MORGAN: And what we're doing is reading the number at the bottom there so the  
6 transcript knows –
- 7 WITNESS: Okay, what should I do this... should I read? Or just what...
- 8 MR. MORGAN: Take a look at it for as long as you would like.
- 9 MS. EISNER: You know, familiarize yourself with it.
- 10 WITNESS: Okay.
- 11 MS. EISNER: I'm just going to direct you towards some language, which is towards the  
12 bottom, it says, "our organization as the sole organizer, will cover airfare to and from the  
13 event; hotel accommodation, ground transportation as well as meals during your travel."
- 14 WITNESS: Yes. Our organization refers to Kemal's organization, here if you are asking  
15 this question.
- 16 MS. EISNER: So... okay. Let me show you –
- 17 MR. MORGAN: Who drafted this invitation? Did you write this?
- 18 WITNESS: No, no. As I said, Razul sent me and then I used the same sample even if you  
19 know... I'm not familiar with detail. So whatever I receive, I just provide it to the people.
- 20 MR. MORGAN: This is text that Razul sent to you to send to them?
- 21 WITNESS: Yes sir. Correct.
- 22 MS. EISNER: So, you sent this to them... with just so I'm clear, with your signature here  
23 so it's TFS, but this was on behalf of the Turquoise Council?
- 24 WITNESS: Definitely, yeah. Because as I mentioned I was not familiar in detail, this is  
25 the detail that you should, they should, provide me and I should just extend the people,  
26 you know, that's it.
- 27 MS. EISNER: Did you have other conversations with staff where you mentioned you  
28 were TFS and you would be sponsoring them, and that you would be their lead point of  
29 contact for the convention? Did you talk to...

- 1 WITNESS: Can you say again?
- 2 MS. EISNER: Did you have conversations with the staff when you were inviting them to  
3 explain to them that you were not TCAE you were TFS and that you would be acting as  
4 their sponsor for the convention?
- 5 WITNESS: I'm just trying to understand what ... sorry
- 6 MS. EISNER: You know this so... did you have discussions with... we talked about  
7 these eight staffers...
- 8 WITNESS: Basically we did the staffers, we met them you know, at the... the only  
9 conversation we had is emails.
- 10 MS. EISNER: Did you explain to them who you were, that you were TFS?
- 11 WITNESS: Yeah I mean I was telling them, you know, TFS is the regional organization,  
12 you know, in the south, and we are invite you guys, but that's it. Because of... that's why  
13 I haven't seen initial and my business card. You can see it you know.
- 14 MS. EISNER: Just another document which is TAFS\_0269. Let you familiarize yourself  
15 with that.
- 16 WITNESS: Yes ma'am.
- 17 MS. EISNER: So here you say, "I personally will lead our group, but at the same time,  
18 just in Azerbaijan in the Azerbaijan part TCAE will be hosting 370 American Politicians"  
19 and you go on from there to describe who will be attending.
- 20 WITNESS: Yes.
- 21 MS. EISNER: So, in one, it kind of represents sole organizer, you were referring to the  
22 sole organizer in the first document I showed you as TCAE. Here it seems like you will  
23 be leading the group, but TCAE will be playing the role of host in the country.
- 24 WITNESS: Yes, correct.
- 25 MS. EISNER: Why was there sort of this division -- there was some work you were  
26 doing and there was some work TCAE was doing?
- 27 WITNESS: Actually, they were the main, you know the counterpart and if something  
28 missing they are the responsible part because I'm just, you know, I'm not technically in  
29 the loop, you know. And that's why I associated everyone to the people because you are  
30 bringing them overseas not to the next neighborhood. It was the reason.

- 1 MS. EISNER: So let's get into funding for the convention, how was the Convention  
2 funded?
- 3 WITNESS: As I said to you I was a kind of participant and in overall convention I have  
4 no idea. And I just know, you know, I just invited a few people but other than it is a huge,  
5 you know, complex and I was not any part of it. That's why I'm not familiar with it.
- 6 MR. MORGAN: How as your travel paid for? You went and used hotels, how was that  
7 paid for?
- 8 WITNESS: I'm in the same thing, you know, TCAE... TCAE right? Turquoise...
- 9 MR. MORGAN: Turquoise Council?
- 10 WITNESS: Yeah, they paid for me as well, the same thing.
- 11 MR. MORGAN: You say in addition to the staffers, that you were accompanying?
- 12 WITNESS: Yeah the Staffers plus me.
- 13 MR. MORGAN: They paid... okay they paid for you as a group?
- 14 WITNESS: Yes sir.
- 15 MS. EISNER: And how did that work? How did they, you know, how did....
- 16 WITNESS: TCAE the plan was I mean eventually I'm invited people, you know, and I  
17 should have paid the costs to Turquoise still it is open you know. That I should paid, but  
18 is not paid and normally they did all the arrangement everything the payments and our,  
19 you know, discussion with them was, you know, I should pay the amount.... How much  
20 that owed them, you know, to Turquoise.
- 21 MS. EISNER: So you're saying that the discussion was that you would pay TCAE at  
22 another point in time?
- 23 WITNESS: That is correct, because you see I didn't want to involve, one by one, you  
24 know, because I didn't have that much, you know, budget. And I told them, you should  
25 handle everything and one invoice that I should handle everything.
- 26 MS. EISNER: So how....
- 27 MR. MORGAN: But I thought you were, you've got to help me understand this...
- 28 WITNESS: Yes sir.
- 29 MR. MORGAN: I thought you told them in this initial invitation email, MH\_50, that  
30 TCAE would be funding it?

- 1 WITNESS: TCAE is funding, you know, the main... the whole organization I don't  
2 know, how much they spend for the whole organization, but for our hotels and  
3 everything, yes TCAE paid. But the discussion was as I said they told me you should pay  
4 us at the end you know.
- 5 MR. MORGAN: Who was that discussion with?
- 6 WITNESS: Kemal.
- 7 MS. EISNER: When did that discussion happen?
- 8 WITNESS: When first he initiated I asked him how it would work, you know what  
9 should I do? And it was a conversation we had, and he told us let's wrap up everything  
10 and at the end of you guys pay us this but I ask him, you know what the cost for hotels,  
11 what will be the transportation, that's why I mentioned those numbers in the Ethics  
12 forms. Whatever I get comes from him, you know that I was responsible to pay to him  
13 and I not personally deal with the logistic or hotel, I just called them or I didn't reserve  
14 anything from them you know.
- 15 MS. EISNER: You said you didn't personally call the hotels...
- 16 WITNESS: No I can't because I don't know, that familiar with, you know, that region.
- 17 MS. EISNER: Did you personally you know call the Travel agency or anything?
- 18 WITNESS: No just the travel agency part is the correction of the tickets I said. Other than  
19 that the Razul they sent me everything you know.
- 20 MS. EISNER: Razul [inaudible]?
- 21 WITNESS: Yeah, Razul.
- 22 MS. EISNER: You said, "he told us, Kemal told us", who is us?
- 23 WITNESS: Me. I mean us means the group, you know, and because I'm responsible to  
24 the group because I am telling them I am going to lead the group and I should know the  
25 rules and everything that's why Kemal just directed me. You know we're going to handle  
26 everything, then you guys will pay us a debt.
- 27 MR. MORGAN: So did he ever send you an invoice for those amounts? That you owed?
- 28 WITNESS: In all time he told me, but I told him whenever we have the budget we are  
29 going to pay off. You know, and it should be... I don't remember... I should remember  
30 the numbers, whatever I disclosed, you know.
- 31 MR. MORGAN: Did he send you those numbers?

1 WITNESS: Whatever I disclosed for the staffers for the trip, I responsible for that  
2 number that I should pay to Turquoise, you know because after that reason I want that  
3 invoice from them, they send me, you know, just the invoice of the hotels, I mean I didn't  
4 want it because I sold the numbers, numbers is not matching that I had mentioned, you  
5 know.

6 MR. MORGAN: Let me get into that a little bit. Which numbers were not matching?

7 WITNESS: Recently the, to be able to collect all of the information I requested the  
8 invoices from them.

9 MR. MORGAN: From the hotels or from... ?

10 WITNESS: From hotels and they just send me the numbers and numbers are not  
11 matching with the numbers that I mentioned in the disclosure form

12 MR. MORGAN: Where did you get... okay so the numbers you put down on the  
13 disclosure form, where did you get those numbers?

14 WITNESS: I asked Kemal first how much I'm going to responsible for the hotels, airfare  
15 and everything that I should know because it was from it that I should write it down and  
16 everything you know. Because I was not in contact with the hotels I couldn't get the real  
17 information and everything, whatever they gave me it was information that I just  
18 disclosed.

19 MR. MORGAN: Okay, and then so you weren't in contact with the hotels to make the  
20 reservation?

21 WITNESS: I was not the contact person, Razul was.

22 MR. MORGAN: But then you recently reached out to the hotels?

23 WITNESS: No I recently reached out to Razul, and send me I'm preparing, you know,  
24 some recommendation I will need some, whatever recommendations you have, you  
25 know, and then he send me hotel invoices. But the invoice and the disclosure form even if  
26 I don't have the disclosure form but I don't... I do remember the numbers should not be  
27 that much higher you know because there is a specific numbers it should be in the gap,  
28 you know. That's why I'm mentioning this.

29 MR. MORGAN: So the more recent information you got from Razul....

30 WITNESS: Just the invoice for the hotels...

31 MR. MORGAN: The hotels...

32 WITNESS: And a few restaurants.

1 MR. MORGAN: Those amounts are higher than what you have on the forms.

2 WITNESS: Higher than it should have been, yeah. Correct that's why I'm not responsible  
3 to pay to Turquoise those amounts because we agree with them whatever they mentioned  
4 the numbers that I am responsible to pay off, you know. Even if they sent me the invoice  
5 of the hotels, I don't care about that because they told me whatever the numbers in the  
6 disclosure form that I am responsible to pay off to them, you know, like I said. This is  
7 another internal discussion I'm sorry.

8 MR. MORGAN: So if we... you know however you do your accounting for TFS, does  
9 that reflect this debt that you owe to Turquoise Council?

10 WITNESS: No.

11 MR. MORGAN: No, Did you... cause all, you know, I'll be straight up with you. This  
12 idea that you owed that money to Turquoise Council seems far-fetched.

13 WITNESS: I understand.

14 MR. MORGAN: So I want you to help me understand –

15 WITNESS: No, Bryson, no.

16 MR. MORGAN: We've talked to a lot of people that've told us something different that  
17 there was no agreement to pay back. So I want you to help me, what evidence do you  
18 have that...

19 WITNESS: Let me explain, when I got the first inquiry from you guys and I didn't want  
20 to touch anything you know. Whatever is there is as is, you know, we don't have  
21 anything in our accounting system showing because, as I mentioned, it should be belongs  
22 to that time of period, you know, in '13 our accounting maybe if you look at the  
23 statements you know starting very later on I mean it was in the establishment of you  
24 know system. And as I mentioned you guys are teaching me right now and verbally when  
25 I told to Kemal, you owe this one is meaningless, and whatever you say, you are right, I  
26 cannot convince you of this.

27 MS. EISNER: Did your board know about this agreement, this loan agreement?

28 WITNESS: They know that we are going to pay to them, but as I said it is not in  
29 accounting system.

30 MS. EISNER: Does TFS have funds to pay them back; is this something that you're  
31 planning on doing?

1 WITNESS: Actually this year is not a good year for us in terms of funding. We are just  
2 handling the basics. If you can get, you know, donations for next year then we should. At  
3 least officially we should have because I promised them that the staffers, you know, this  
4 is a disclosure this is my responsibility. That's why the end of the story somehow I  
5 should do it, you know. And I should ask, but....

6 MR. MORGAN: So I understand that. At the time that you went on the trip to  
7 Azerbaijan, went to the convention, did you at that time intend to pay Turquoise Council?

8 WITNESS: We talked about that, but I told them that we have very new establishment,  
9 you know, whenever we have money then we can pay, you know, even if right now we  
10 just started to establish the system. That's why they know I really cannot pay off  
11 immediately, you know, that's why if you agree with this I can invite people. If not I have  
12 no budget for this you know.

13 MR. MORGAN: So you told them that you didn't have the budget?

14 WITNESS: Of course, I mean, even if... for the salary just mainly we've just recently  
15 we've started receiving donations from the people, how I can you know invite that much  
16 people, you know, they spend that much money, I can't.

17 MR. MORGAN: Okay, when was the last time you had a conversation with anybody at  
18 the Turquoise Council or Kemal or Razul –

19 WITNESS: For the invoice deal, when I inquired for the documentations and everything,  
20 you know at that point I asked him we need some recommendations even if I didn't know  
21 what recommendations I should provide I searched my email and everything. Whatever I  
22 find I tried to put together you know.

23 MS. EISNER: Yeah, how did you receive those documents?

24 WITNESS: Email.

25 MS. EISNER: And did they say, did they communicate anything to you in the email?  
26 What did they say in the email when they sent the documents?

27 WITNESS: They just send me the email, I mean, attached documentation that's it.

28 MS. EISNER: Okay, they didn't explain the differences?

29 WITNESS: Not just attached. No there is no explanation. I can print it and send it to you  
30 if you wish.

31 MR. MORGAN: Did anybody tell you to tell us that you plan to pay them back?

32 WITNESS: No sir. Definitely no

1 MR. MORGAN: Was that Kemal's idea?

2 WITNESS: No definitely because I know my responsibility at least I learn the last two  
3 years my responsibilities that's why that I should do that you know. With Kemal, you  
4 know, I have no, I mean, warm relation with him in these days because he is far away I'm  
5 far away. I mean, things happen, things on going and also I see this situation, you know,  
6 why I this you know.

7 MS. EISNER: Was there a time when you had a warm relationship with him, when you  
8 were in DC?

9 WITNESS: I mean usually everybody knows each other and everybody as I said I was  
10 volunteering for him, for the cultural center, for everyone, you know. And a warm  
11 relation is the relation I mean.

12 MR. MORGAN: Okay so, the money at least, you know setting aside the issue of  
13 whether or not you intended to pay that back or will pay that back, where did TCAE get  
14 the money, the Turquoise council where did they get the money, to pay for all of that  
15 travel?

16 WITNESS: I mean in generally you mean or generally how to generate the money right  
17 now? Because normally....

18 MR. MORGAN: Generally what are their... what are Turquoise Council's source of  
19 fund?

20 WITNESS: Normally it is the same thing as the donations, you know, from all over they  
21 have member organizations individuals and I mean [indecipherable], you know. Yeah.

22 MS. EISNER: Let's go a little deeper into TCAE I think. I'm going to give you a  
23 document this is TCAE's tax Form 990 from 2013. It doesn't have a bates number so I'm  
24 just going to describe it for our recording; here is the return organization exempt from  
25 income tax form.

26 MR. MORGAN: For 2013.

27 MS. EISNER: For 2013, just going to...

28 MR. MORGAN: Is this a document you are familiar with?

29 WITNESS: It looks familiar even if right now my accountant for my organization doing  
30 you know tax referrals I'm just signing documentation you know.

31 MS. EISNER: Just let you look at it for a second, if you could turn to page 7 when you  
32 have the opportunity.

1 WITNESS: Yes, ma'am.

2 MS. EISNER: So on page 7 you'll see under number 2, it lists you as an officer of the  
3 Turquoise Council.

4 WITNESS: Yes, voluntarily the board members.

5 MS. EISNER: It says, well it lists here as an officer, yes and it says you spend an  
6 average of 15 hours per week.

7 WITNESS: It is voluntary, but not a paid position as I said as for different, you know,  
8 the non-profits I am in. Even if right now I'm not familiar or not you know.

9 MS. EISNER: Right, well you just hadn't mentioned this to us before when we asked  
10 you about positions so we're trying to get a sense of your involvement.

11 WITNESS: I said I volunteer for all the non-profit I said.

12 MR. MORGAN: So this said officer here was that incorrect, were you just a board  
13 member?

14 WITNESS: I mean board members classifications or describe I don't know how do they  
15 describe, whenever for example, I am a member or board member in sister or Raindrop or  
16 other non-profits' but I don't know what it means you know. The officers to me I'm an  
17 officer right now because is a paid position you know. I mean I'm responsible for that not  
18 responsible for the organization. That's why in our minds, the meaning of board member,  
19 if it is officer it is officer, but as I mentioned, just to me is a paid position officer.

20 MR. MORGAN: You weren't paid by Turquoise Council?

21 WITNESS: No.

22 MR. MORGAN: Did you have any ability to direct its activities or control its activities?

23 WITNESS: They had member organizations like cultural centers, Raindrop for example,  
24 I was you know establishing cultural programs; you know, at the center, you know,  
25 things like that. But generally this is directed by the board members of the Raindrop  
26 organization, you know, and I don't know their responsibility each other.

27 MS. EISNER: So Raindrop is a separate entity though?

28 WITNESS: It is a cultural center.

29 MS. EISNER: A cultural center.

1 WITNESS: And it is a member organization of actually, Turquoise is the member of  
2 umbrella for non-profits that's why when I am acting in sister-city, you know, Raindrop  
3 or IID organizing things there is on behalf of Raindrop or Turquoise, we really don't  
4 know that. That's what I'm saying.

5 MS. EISNER: So this was an unpaid position...

6 WITNESS: An unpaid position.

7 MS. EISNER: As a board member for the Turquoise Council. And it says you spend 15  
8 hours a week, is that correct?

9 WITNESS: I mean 15 hours voluntary spending in cultural center, for example, I do  
10 consider spending time for Turquoise as well, you know. Because they are the member  
11 organization, that's why my 15 hours as a volunteer for all.

12 MS. EISNER: For the umbrella organization?

13 WITNESS: Yeah that's what I'm saying; standing for 15 hours for Raindrop or IID is for  
14 me, to me, is a concentration of spending 15 hours for Turquoise as well.

15 MS. EISNER: And, you know as a board member did you attend board meetings?

16 WITNESS: Some, but I was not that much familiar in, you know, what is maybe few,  
17 you know.

18 MS. EISNER: So you attended some. How many?

19 WITNESS: I mean...

20 MS. EISNER: Would you say five?

21 WITNESS: No I cannot say.

22 MS. EISNER: 10?

23 MR. MORGAN: Would they have board meetings without you?

24 WITNESS: They did yeah. And I attended few times as I said. Really even if not just  
25 Turquoise, I mean, for the Raindrop, if you are officer there, I mean, if you are paid you  
26 generally the responsible officer. That's why we really don't you know...Raindrop the  
27 same thing you know. I mean the, is responsible just for attending and for me, you know.  
28 Because I'm just promising that okay I can spend some times 15 hours but in all the  
29 areas, you know. That's why really, technically, whatever they give you the title they can  
30 give you the chairman even, you know. And my dedication of time, you know, giving  
31 them, I mean is limited amount of time. Because I have...

1 MR. MORGAN: Are you still a board member or officer of Turquoise Council?

2 WITNESS: Not just Turquoise, for Sister, for Raindrop, I mean... I really don't know,  
3 for Turquoise, most probably not. But whenever I search and go back to Raindrop  
4 webpage I do still see my name there. That's why you know I have a confusion about that  
5 because of they decide how they, you know. If I say to you right now I'm the board  
6 member or not honestly I don't know because I'm not the member for Raindrop, but my  
7 names there you know.

8 MS. EISNER: You mentioned to that you did attend some board meetings did you attend  
9 board meetings for the Turquoise Council in 2013, any board meetings?

10 WITNESS: No, ma'am no.

11 MS. EISNER: In 2014?

12 WITNESS: Not '14, '15 or...

13 MS. EISNER: What about in 2012?

14 WITNESS: No, oh '12 maybe because I was there and I should just look at the records,  
15 you know. Because there was 1 or 2 times that I remember, that I attended. As I said  
16 being a board member to me was not kind of the full responsibility because I was doing  
17 something in cultural center it can be considered for me to me is something for Turquoise  
18 council, you know.

19 MS. EISNER: Did you work closely with Kemal Oksuz, when you were, you know, on  
20 the board to the Turquoise council?

21 WITNESS: Actually in the field I was mostly in the cultural center you know area. But  
22 Kemal eventually you see and he, you know, whenever he has a program at the cultural  
23 center eventually you should be there, you know. And the, when you said closely, I  
24 closely worked with Kemal, with Mahmut, you know different board chairman's there.  
25 Because everybody and all volunteers works closely, you know, I mean closely means  
26 this much.

27 MS. EISNER: Okay so let's talk about funding for the Turquoise Council. How does the  
28 Turquoise Council get its funding?

29 WITNESS: As I mentioned again the donations from whole region I mean it was  
30 covering seven or eight states I guess and the members, individuals that I familiar with  
31 this much, you know.

32 MS. EISNER: Donations from companies?

- 1 WITNESS: Mostly individuals again as I said individuals generally, considering but  
2 people are business owners when they are donating never ever I'm experiencing, you  
3 know, their bank account that's why I really cannot say to you guys, "hey this individual  
4 donate money with his company." I really cannot say that.
- 5 MS. EISNER: Who would experience their bank account, who would have access?
- 6 WITNESS: Kemal should have, you know.
- 7 MS. EISNER: Anyone else?
- 8 WITNESS: Other than Kemal I'm not sure who was the treasurer, maybe the treasurer  
9 but I don't know who has access for that.
- 10 MS. EISNER: So let's go to page 2 of that same document if that's okay. And page 2-  
11 4A describes the US-Azerbaijan Conference; says it generated \$2,147,112.00 in revenue.  
12 Where did that come from?
- 13 WITNESS: I don't know.
- 14 MR. MORGAN: Does that figure seem right, in terms of how much it cost to put on the  
15 convention and the travel?
- 16 WITNESS: Can you say again?
- 17 MR. MORGAN: Does 2 million a little over 2 million, does that seem about right?
- 18 WITNESS: I have no idea because I really cannot manage the whole operation it is a big  
19 operation it can be 2 million, 1 million, 3 million. I 'm not part of it you know.
- 20 MR. MORGAN: So, that's a lot of money, 2 million's quite a bit. Where did Kemal get  
21 that money?
- 22 WITNESS: I don't know.
- 23 MR. MORGAN: Where did Turquoise Council get the money?
- 24 WITNESS: Honestly I have no idea.
- 25 MR. MORGAN: We have a sense of where some of that money came from. So, you  
26 know, you went to the convention there were... I think you saw on the banner behind the  
27 speakers at the main conference sign; there were a lot of companies listed. So, I think  
28 you're aware for example, you know McDermott was a sponsor, Conoco Philipps, BP, a  
29 lot of entities listed as sponsors.

1 MS. EISNER: Maybe we'll go through a list of those entities and you can tell us how  
2 much money came from those entities?

3 WITNESS: I really cannot tell because I don't know it, you know, if I know... believe  
4 me if I know I can share with you guys, but I really don't know you know. If you tell me,  
5 "hey President of TAFS, these names these"... I have no idea about that. Kemal is a kind  
6 of street guy I mean even if you just volunteer to work with him you are just volunteer no  
7 more than that.

8 MR. MORGAN: Explain that a little bit "street" guy?

9 WITNESS: I mean...

10 MR. MORGAN: That's not a term I'm super familiar with do you mean... I just... can  
11 you explain what that means?

12 WITNESS: Okay I mean I can ask you the questions as friends and you can tell me  
13 right? And you tell me everything, but I don't tell you anything.

14 MR. MORGAN: Okay, so is that what Kemal is like, he doesn't share information?

15 WITNESS: That's his nature, you know, that's why even if I didn't ask any time to  
16 about this question to him, but I'm talking about normal life, you know. In normal life  
17 it's his lifestyle and I can't blame him you know maybe it's the nature, but at the point is  
18 not my business to ask Kemal, you know, how much it will cost, who is sponsoring how  
19 you guys are doing. I don't care about it because I was the time of moving and I didn't  
20 really care about that, you know.

21 MS. EISNER: So he's a street guy he's hiding some information, he's not disclosing  
22 some information?

23 WITNESS: I didn't... because he... I'm not that position to... for him to share that  
24 information because I'm just a man, third party inviting people, that's it. They should  
25 have, you know, discussion with him.

26 MS. EISNER: So you didn't know necessarily where he was getting it, getting the funds  
27 or where they were coming from. Where did you think they were coming from?

28 WITNESS: I didn't think about that, honestly, why should I think about that? The  
29 convention is not the only biggest organizations he did you know. A festival, the  
30 community is familiar things going on in the region you know. And that's why, I mean,  
31 it's not a new thing you know for the community to ask him how do you do that.

32 MS. EISNER: Here we were talking about 2 million dollars specifically for this  
33 convention so I mean if we give you an opportunity now to just think about it for...

1 WITNESS: If I will know the 2 million dollars I will think about that you know and is  
2 the first time I'm hearing that number right now.

3 MS. EISNER: So when you hear 2 million dollars where does... where do you think he  
4 got the two million dollars in revenue came from?

5 WITNESS: I mean, the answer can be kind of emotional comment it's not technically  
6 thing, but I should think about that you know. And at that point I should think everything.  
7 "Hey Kemal how did you organize this festival, How did you organize this and this?" I  
8 don't care about that.

9 MR. MORGAN: Was he offering sponsorship opportunities to companies?

10 WITNESS: I don't know.

11 MR. MORGAN: Do you recall any conversation about soliciting sponsors?

12 WITNESS: No even if I don't know the names that you are mentioning, those  
13 companies, what they do, how they operating you know what is there everyday relation  
14 with this convention.

15 MR. MORGAN: Well some of it, you know, at the convention a couple of companies  
16 were identified near the top of the banner as main sponsors.

17 WITNESS: Yes I'm saying what does it mean you know? I don't know what it means.

18 MR. MORGAN: SOCAR and Caspian Drilling, so just based on what you know what  
19 was their role? Were they ....

20 WITNESS: Brother, believe me you are asking a question ignorant guy about this  
21 information. I mean for example if I organize something in Georgia a cultural event, just  
22 to be able to have a good relation with a company even if without any cost, I can ask  
23 them to use their banner as a main sponsor just to warm up the relations even. That's why  
24 I know myself and how he handle if he really got the funding or not, I don't know the  
25 relation. If I know and honestly if I feel something I can share with you and at this point,  
26 I don't know, you know?

27 MS. EISNER: Well why don't we go through some of these organizations and you know  
28 talk about, you know, the potential, but you were at the conference and you saw their  
29 branding, you saw them on the banner, you've seen some of the pictures. It looks like  
30 there's a lot of banners up about the convention. Talking about you know if the funding  
31 came from those sources to the Turquoise Council. From McDermott I think that was  
32 mentioned. Do you know how much came?

33 WITNESS: I don't know I mean even the company wasn't a big part...

- 1 MS. EISNER: How about from Caspian Drilling Company Limited?
- 2 WITNESS: No, ma'am. I don't... I have no idea...they have funding or not.
- 3 MS. EISNER: What about from the State Oil Company of Azerbaijan, SOCAR?
- 4 WITNESS: I have no idea.
- 5 MS. EISNER: Are you familiar with SOCAR?
- 6 WITNESS: SOCAR is the company investing Turkey, they are investing 22 billion  
7 dollars and everybody knows SOCAR in Turkey.
- 8 MS. EISNER: Were they present at the convention?
- 9 WITNESS: What?
- 10 MS. EISNER: Was SOCAR present at the convention?
- 11 WITNESS: I mean what does it mean the presence of SOCAR, I mean anybody from  
12 their leadership level, I mean we had just reading their leadership names from the news  
13 papers in the convention did anybody deliver the speech....
- 14 MR. MORGAN: Yeah
- 15 WITNESS: I don't know I should go out and look at the, you know, the web page, if  
16 they mentioned it.
- 17 MS. EISNER: We've actually talked to quite a few people from SOCAR and we have a  
18 sense of their involvement in the convention and some of the conversations that they've  
19 had with various people who were involved in planning the convention. Did SOCAR  
20 contribute money to the Turquoise Council?
- 21 WITNESS: I don't know.
- 22 MS. EISNER: Did SOCAR contribute money into, you know, any other organizations  
23 that you're familiar with?
- 24 WITNESS: No ma'am
- 25 MS. EISNER: What about SOCAR USA?
- 26 WITNESS: What are you asking?
- 27 MS. EISNER: SOCAR presence in the United States.

1 WITNESS: Officially, they have a presence here, they have an investment here? I don't  
2 know whether they contribute or not. I'm not sure.

3 MS. EISNER: How about the Assembly of Friends of Azerbaijan? Did they contribute  
4 money to the Turquoise Council?

5 WITNESS: I have no idea their relation as well because Kemal is the president, but I  
6 have no idea about that.

7 MR. MORGAN: Are you familiar with the, something like the Turkic or Turkish  
8 American Chamber of Commerce, is that a group you are familiar with?

9 WITNESS: We have a Turkish American Chamber of Commerce here, but it is TACC  
10 whatever.

11 MR. MORGAN: There was one person we talked to stated that he was surprised... well  
12 this person stated that SOCAR hired TCAE and AFAZ to put on the convention.

13 WITNESS: Okay.

14 MR. MORGAN: And stated some surprise that SOCAR had hired those organizations as  
15 opposed to the Turkic American Chamber of Commerce. Does that...?

16 WITNESS: I'm not familiar with this conversation I mean, what does it mean, what is  
17 chamber of commerce trying to say or what it is that... I don't understand you know.  
18 What is...

19 MR. MORGAN: Well speaking hypothetically, if SOCAR let's say, SOCAR had wanted  
20 to put on this convention, would they have gone through the Chamber of Commerce or  
21 when SOCAR wants to do things that are sort of U.S. facing who do they use?

22 WITNESS: I have no idea, I mean, if you are asking me the, what is the Chamber of  
23 Commerce role in the convention, eventually the Turkish American Chamber of  
24 Commerce in Texas member for Kemal, they should work together you know. And...

25 MR. MORGAN: Where they working together? You don't know, or...?

26 WITNESS: Actually for specific projects they were getting together, but I don't know  
27 what it is exactly their responsibility to each other like a cultural center.

28 MR. MORGAN: Is Kemal involved with the Chamber of Commerce, with that chamber  
29 of commerce?

30 WITNESS: In the Texas you mean?

31 MR. MORGAN: Yeah.

- 1 WITNESS: As a friend, but officially I don't remember if it was part of it, you know.
- 2 MR. MORGAN: But they have done some events together you think?
- 3 WITNESS: They should because....
- 4 MR. MORGAN: They should or they have?
- 5 WITNESS: They should because Chamber of Commerce is the member of TCAE.
- 6 MR. MORGAN: Oh, the Chamber is a member of TCAE?
- 7 WITNESS: Yeah. And for the festivals, I mean the main funding that they should find  
8 from the community, this is how we've worked generally in Houston based organization,  
9 that they should work together just by should, you know. Because they are the chamber  
10 of commerce guide knocking doors to individuals to help you know for the events, you  
11 know. Not just For Kemal, if the Raindrop has an event generally they'll generally knock  
12 their doors, you know, to help each other.
- 13 MR. MORGAN: Okay.
- 14 MS. EISNER: Do you know how much funding TCAE receives from the festivals? You  
15 seem familiar with the festivals.
- 16 WITNESS: For the funding part I'm out of it, but it was a big organization as well you  
17 know.
- 18 MS. EISNER: What about... how does the Raindrop foundation receive funding?
- 19 WITNESS: All the non-profits in the region. All... I mean they are all donors, you know  
20 from the members. Mostly the Raindrop is project based. They go and individuals ask we  
21 have this project could you donate? And generally project based you know donations  
22 coming to the Raindrop project by project, you know. Weekend school, cultural activities  
23 and things like that, yeah.
- 24 MR. MORGAN: Sorry I didn't mean...
- 25 MS. EISNER: Oh no, happy to do it. So, let's talk about travel. You told us about you  
26 know you identified a traveler and you provided that information to Razul. What was that  
27 process did you work with any type of travel agencies or did you work with anyone to  
28 organize that part of it?
- 29 WITNESS: Razul worked actually because I received the tickets from the travel agency,  
30 you know, they were in contact with them. And when we first... first of all we invite  
31 people and the Ethic process until approve, we didn't approve the ticket confirmation,

1 excuse me, and the Razul, right after Ethic approve they purchased the tickets. If you are  
2 asking this question if I am understand correctly.

3 MS. EISNER: So Razul purchased the tickets? How did that work? Do you know how  
4 that was handled? How Razul would purchase the tickets?

5 WITNESS: The only thing I am familiar. Razul sent me the tickets what travel agency  
6 purchased and then he just forwarded those emails to me that I printed.

7 MS. EISNER: So how did you figure out how much those cost, the travel tickets?

8 WITNESS: Generally...

9 MR. MORGAN: I mean specifically. I don't want you to speak generally on this.

10 WITNESS: Generally I'm telling you because generally in the first time we discussed  
11 this with them they gave us, "Okay the tickets will be around, for example \$1,000.00 to  
12 \$13,000.00 in this gap and hotels will be in this gap", you know, and this one will be this  
13 gap.

14 MR. MORGAN: So that was an estimate?

15 WITNESS: That's what I'm saying, you know, how I can tell you because I don't know  
16 the agreement with the travel agency. For example, if they purchased a hundred tickets,  
17 okay we will have a special discount to you, you know. I don't know the discussion that's  
18 why what portion applies to ours you know.

19 MR. MORGAN: You said, just to be clear, did you make up that estimate or did Razul?

20 WITNESS: Razul, I don't care about the estimate. What I care is Bryson, whatever they  
21 gave me the number that I should disclose with that number, this is my responsibility.  
22 That's why I'm telling you know, all time, you guys what numbers did I receive from  
23 them. I'm sorry I'm kind of...

24 MR. MORGAN: And then on the... there was a form that also included those numbers  
25 after the trip. Do you recall where you got those?

26 WITNESS: Well of course I mean in 21 days I disclose it and they sent me the numbers  
27 that you should use these numbers. The numbers...

28 MR. MORGAN: Who?

29 WITNESS: Razul.

30 MR. MORGAN: Razul sent you those numbers as well?

1 WITNESS: Yeah and then I'm going to be responsible to pay those numbers to them,  
2 that's what I'm saying.

3 MR. MORGAN: Okay

4 MS. EISNER: Let's actually talk about those forms. So I am going to provide you  
5 ES\_0037-39. Give that to you first and let you take a moment to look it over.

6 WITNESS: Can you send a copy of this to me later on email if possible?

7 MS. EISNER: They're actually all publicly available so these are things that are... you  
8 can find on the website for the Clerk of the House of Representatives.

9 WITNESS: Okay

10 MS. EISNER: They're you know the travel forms that have to be disclosed.

11 WITNESS: How am I going to search it?

12 MS. EISNER: Okay, I'm sorry?

13 WITNESS: How am I going to search it?

14 MS. EISNER: How do you research it? You go to the website for the Clerk of the House  
15 of Representatives and there's a disclosure section and under that there's a travel section  
16 so you can look there.

17 WITNESS: Okay.

18 MS. EISNER: So if you go to page 39, which is the third page.

19 WITNESS: Third page?

20 MS. EISNER: It's ES\_0039 bottom of the page.

21 WITNESS: This one?

22 MS. EISNER: Is that your signature there?

23 WITNESS: Yes it's mine

24 MS. EISNER: I'm also going to give you a WD\_0016. This is the...

25 MR. MORGAN: Post form.

26 MS. EISNER: Yes, the post travel disclosure form.

27 WITNESS: Yeah this is a correct signature.

- 1 MS. EISNER: Okay this is also your signature then?
- 2 WITNESS: Yes.
- 3 MR. MORGAN: Did you get these forms from Razul? Do you recall how it was that  
4 you... the process for filling them out? You told us you got the numbers from Razul...
- 5 WITNESS: Probably from the participants because they were familiar because I wasn't  
6 familiar at that time what is Ethic you know, forms and whatever, most probably the  
7 participants should provide me what I should follow up, but I don't know.
- 8 MS. EISNER: We've gotten a lot of information from different organizations that Kemal  
9 sent them these forms so that they could complete them.
- 10 WITNESS: These forms you mean?
- 11 MS. EISNER: Yes the...
- 12 WITNESS: I really don't remember. If I say something it can be wrong because what I  
13 think most probably from the participants I should have get it you know.
- 14 MR. MORGAN: But the filling out the lines on the forms do you recall doing that?
- 15 WITNESS: No, normally I consultate these with the people who's participating because  
16 I'm not expertise on this I'm telling... I'm asking people how to do this I mean the...  
17 Kemal... actually I don't remember for this no, no. If I tell something like that it should  
18 be wrong.
- 19 MR. MORGAN: So I mean some of it if you look over at page 2 of the first form. I mean  
20 some of it is describing what TAFS is. Who would have written that?
- 21 WITNESS: 2?
- 22 MR. MORGAN: Yeah. Do you see near the top is TAFS is a non-profit...
- 23 WITNESS: Number 12 you mean or?
- 24 MR. MORGAN and MS. EISNER: Yeah number 12.
- 25 WITNESS: And it should be from my mission statement on the webpage, most probably.
- 26 MS. EISNER: Would you have put that in there?
- 27 WITNESS: Yeah generally whenever I need something I copy it from there and I put it  
28 there you know. I mean generally you know.

1 MS. EISNER: Do you see on the first page under number 1 that says sponsor? And it  
2 says TFS; would you have put that in there?

3 WITNESS: Yes ma'am.

4 MS. EISNER: Okay and then under number 3A, it says the, "primary trip sponsor has  
5 not accepted from any other source funds intended directly or indirectly to finance any  
6 aspect of the trip."

7 WITNESS: Yes, ma'am.

8 MS. EISNER: Did you check that box?

9 WITNESS: Yes.

10 MS. EISNER: Okay is that an accurate statement.

11 WITNESS: I mean at this point it seems no. I mean because....

12 MS. EISNER: At the time?

13 WITNESS: Because I said I was on the process of learning what this is what it does,  
14 what does it mean for me. Paying later to a counterpart to me is the thing, but at this point  
15 what this says is, "another source of funds" I mean at the time it seems that it shows me  
16 that I should have used my own sources, but it's to me, you know, using that source later  
17 on paying back is the same thing to me, but is wrong, you know.

18 MR. MORGAN: But you had in your invitation email you had told the staff you said this  
19 was on behalf of Turquoise Council. You told the staff there that Turquoise Council was  
20 paying for it?

21 WITNESS: No, I mean, the Turquoise Council whatever is, you know, in the counterpart  
22 in overseas they're responsible. If they don't like hotels they will not accuse me they will  
23 accuse them.

24 MR. MORGAN: What you wrote there is, "our organization as the sole organizer will  
25 cover airfare to and from the event and hotel accommodations, ground transportation, as  
26 well as meals during your travel." And we asked you about this before and you said that  
27 was referring to Turquoise Council.

28 WITNESS: Yes.

29 MR. MORGAN: So I'm just... help me understand how it is that in this email you're  
30 telling the staff that the money is coming from Turquoise Council and in this document  
31 you're telling the staff that it's all from TAFS.

1 WITNESS: Mostly what I refer in that email is it can be mentioned the funding, but to  
2 me I mean they are the main responsible in our culture you know, I mean...

3 MR. MORGAN: Who's the main responsible?

4 WITNESS: The Turquoise Council. I mean whatever is happening you know they are  
5 the first hand complaint party is them. They are organizing everything. I don't know the  
6 hotels and anything. I mean it refers to them, you know.

7 MR. MORGAN: So did you have any... when you checked this box 3A on the form, did  
8 you have reservations when you checked that? Were you worried about that; did you  
9 have any conversations with Razul or Kemal about that?

10 WITNESS: No sir. Because it doesn't make sense to me at the time the source or later it  
11 is not different for me you know. I mean the paying off, to me, is using my own funds  
12 you know, is to me, but it can be wrong.

13 MS. EISNER: Yeah it says, "Funds intended directly or indirectly in any aspect of the  
14 trip." I mean it seems like even you know, did you think that TCAE was paying for the  
15 entire trip?

16 WITNESS: No actually I am learning right now, everything even you know, Ethic rules  
17 change five times. We get emails from the ethics saying even if I know right now the  
18 funding should come from the general funding not specifically for... even if I'm learning  
19 it every day, you know.

20 MS. EISNER: What about... you know, you attended the trip, you know, there were  
21 different lunches; there were dinners sponsored by different entities; there were different  
22 hotels people were staying at. There's a lot going on in this trip there was a lot of  
23 banners; there was a lot of branding that showed a lot of different sponsors for the trip.  
24 Does that, you know, you attended did you see a lot of these banners with different logos  
25 and different companies that were present?

26 WITNESS: Oh yeah.

27 MS. EISNER: So then later you returned and filled out this post travel disclosure form.  
28 Did you think differently when you filled out the post travel?

29 WITNESS: No it was the same thing that I told, because I [indecipherable], you know  
30 because eventually I will pay what I should responsible because... I mean, it's my  
31 responsibility that I know and different I didn't think about that, no.

32 MR. MORGAN: Did Bakiad cover the expenses for the Turkey portion?

33 WITNESS: Can you say again?

- 1 MR. MORGAN: Bakiad. Are you familiar with Bakiad?
- 2 WITNESS: No I'm familiar with the travel agency....
- 3 MR. MORGAN: NIL Travel?
- 4 WITNESS: No.
- 5 MS. EISNER: Tursan Travel Group?
- 6 WITNESS: No, let me just remember.
- 7 MR. MORGAN: Bakiad doesn't ring a bell?
- 8 WITNESS: Can you say again?
- 9 MR. MORGAN: Bakiad that's not an organization you're familiar with?
- 10 WITNESS: No, because Razul told us as a... there's a travel agency you know...
- 11 Nissan Travel, Nissan I can write it down.
- 12 MR. MORGAN: Nissan?
- 13 WITNESS: Yes, Nissan.
- 14 MR. MORGAN: Spelled N-I-S-S-A-N?
- 15 WITNESS: Yeah.
- 16 MR. MORGAN: Were they covering the in country expenses in Turkey?
- 17 WITNESS: No, actually it was the part of the deal with the Turquoise, I mean they were
- 18 going to send us just one invoice they are responsible for the Nissan Travel that I know.
- 19 They should pay them. Then I should pay to Turquoise. I mean it was the thing that we
- 20 talked with them, you know. I don't care what travel agency is a part of it. The same
- 21 thing Azerbaijan and Turkey, no difference for me.
- 22 MS. EISNER: I'm going to skip forward a bit here. I'm just going to talk about a little
- 23 bit more TCAE and Kemal.
- 24 WITNESS: Okay how many more questions could you just tell me? Just at least I can
- 25 be...
- 26 MS. EISNER: We're getting... we're close, we really are.
- 27 WITNESS: Just make me kind of you know, relax.
- 28 MS. EISNER: We're getting there. We're getting closer.

- 1 WITNESS: Okay good. That's good.
- 2 MS. EISNER: What's the relationship between the Turquoise Council and AFAZ?
- 3 WITNESS: What is the relation? Kemal is the president for both I guess. Right? That is  
4 the relation. Because...
- 5 MR. MORGAN: Did they share funding?
- 6 WITNESS: Funding? I'm not sure, but Kemal responsibility was president for Turquoise  
7 and AFAZ, but at that point I don't know their technical relation, you know, I have no  
8 idea.
- 9 MS. EISNER: Did you hear AFAZ mentioned at all when you were in conversations...
- 10 WITNESS: No AFAZ... the only thing that I know about AFAZ is they newly  
11 established a cultural center that's it. Other than that I don't know what they do, you  
12 know.
- 13 MR. MORGAN: So I think you said the invoices you provided for the Park Inn, the Four  
14 Seasons and the Hilton, you got those invoices from Razul, I believe you said, is that  
15 right?
- 16 WITNESS: Razul , Kemal one of them you know.
- 17 MR. MORGAN: Okay.
- 18 WITNESS: That, I can easily check you know.
- 19 MS. EISNER: Okay, was it strange to you that the invoices included travelers who were  
20 not sponsored by TFS?
- 21 WITNESS: Can you say again?
- 22 MS. EISNER: Let me just show it to you; it might be helpful. I'm going to show you  
23 TAFS\_0387. There you go. So there are quite a few travelers on these invoices.
- 24 WITNESS: What was the question about this?
- 25 MS. EISNER: There are a lot of travelers on these invoices who were not sponsored by  
26 TFS.
- 27 WITNESS: Yeah is not related to me. Maybe when they were printing, they just print my  
28 page and send in other names as well.
- 29 MS. EISNER: Do you recognize the names of any of the people who weren't....

- 1 WITNESS: No I have no relation to anybody else.
- 2 MS. EISNER: Do you know why they would've sent you these invoices for people who  
3 weren't part of TFS travel?
- 4 WITNESS: No, if I can be familiar I can just send you guys this part, I just send all you  
5 know. I have no idea about it.
- 6 MR. MORGAN: And do you think these invoices are accurate?
- 7 WITNESS: According to their numbers they gave me that I am responsible, if it is the  
8 question technically, is not.
- 9 MR. MORGAN: These are higher than what was previously discussed?
- 10 WITNESS: Higher of course. Of course. Should be around \$120-\$130 something like  
11 that.
- 12 MR. MORGAN: Did you – when you were on the trip, did you see any bills for your  
13 hotel?
- 14 WITNESS: No sir.
- 15 MR. MORGAN: Like a bill come to your room or when you checked out a bill?
- 16 WITNESS: No.
- 17 MR. MORGAN: You didn't see anything like that?
- 18 WITNESS: No, sir.
- 19 MS. EISNER: What – Thank you, I'll take that – gifts did you receive at the  
20 convention?
- 21 WITNESS: Me?
- 22 MS. EISNER: Yes.
- 23 WITNESS: Me personally, I did not receive any gifts.
- 24 MS. EISNER: Did the attendees receive any gifts?
- 25 WITNESS: I don't know.
- 26 MS. EISNER: We've come across some information that attendees received gifts like  
27 rugs. Do you remember people receiving rugs at the convention?
- 28 WITNESS: Delivery of rugs in the lobby if you're asking? But I have not received any...

- 1 MS. EISNER: What was it? There were rugs in the lobby?
- 2 WITNESS: When we are leaving you know.
- 3 MS. EISNER: They gave... they handed out rugs?
- 4 WITNESS: Already some people were carrying. And you should be given because we  
5 didn't receive anything. That is why I am considering we should be given maybe night or  
6 whatever I don't know. But for my people I don't remember that.
- 7 MR. MORGAN: You don't remember your Congressional travelers receiving rugs?
- 8 WITNESS: I don't remember. If they received maybe later on because at that lobby I  
9 don't remember anybody because we get on the bus together and they were not carrying  
10 anything. If they received maybe it should be sent later on, if they received.
- 11 MR. MORGAN: Were they in red bags? Does that ring a bell if you saw people walking  
12 around with red bags?
- 13 MS. EISNER: If you saw people walking around....
- 14 WITNESS: What was that?
- 15 MS. EISNER: Were they in maroon or red bags? Did you see people walking around  
16 with –
- 17 WITNESS: I don't know.
- 18 MR. MORGAN: Who were the rugs from?
- 19 WITNESS: I don't know, you know, that's what I'm saying I wasn't familiar... I ask  
20 people what was going on and they just told us the hosts... when they say the hosts it  
21 refers to me you know, Kemal and Turquoise, I don't know anybody else host you know.  
22 The only counterpart for me is I know him and other than that I don't know any locals  
23 you know. Maybe it come from locals, I don't know.
- 24 MS. EISNER: What locals would've been –
- 25 WITNESS: I don't know, that's what I'm saying; you know the only person I  
26 communicate was Razul. That's why whatever they direct me I know that portion that's  
27 why. I don't know the locals whatever I don't know.
- 28 MR. MORGAN: Some congressional staff who attended told us the rugs were gifts from  
29 SOCAR.
- 30 WITNESS: SOCAR?

- 1 MR. MORGAN: Is that surprise you?
- 2 WITNESS: It's not surprising me why I'm surprised because –
- 3 MR. MORGAN: Does that refresh your memory?
- 4 WITNESS: No it's not because when you said the local host, generally it is the  
5 counterpart country you know. And I don't know the... SOCAR is not a company, it is  
6 the State for me you know...
- 7 MR. MORGAN: So you sort of view Azerbaijan the government there and SOCAR  
8 there as interchangeable?
- 9 WITNESS: They are Azerbaijan, you know. I mean SOCAR to me is not as a company  
10 it is a state, you know, Azerbaijan itself.
- 11 MR. MORGAN: Where there a lot of Azerbaijani officials involved with the  
12 convention? I mean from what we've read and seen I think the president of Azerbaijan...
- 13 WITNESS: Received, yeah I saw the pictures.
- 14 MR. MORGAN: Yeah, who else from the Azerbaijani Government was there?
- 15 WITNESS: Should be the finance maybe I'm not sure.
- 16 MR. MORGAN: Do you remember members of their parliament being there?
- 17 WITNESS: I'm not familiar with those people, but we visited parliament as I remember.  
18 The counterpart was maybe the Speaker of the House? I don't remember those titles  
19 whatever. We had a tour, you know, in the city, parliament and the different places the  
20 museums, but if you ask officials. I mean you know that part of the world and I mean  
21 other than us everybody is official to me you know. Basically.
- 22 MR. MORGAN: So who is – getting like the President of Azerbaijan to speak at  
23 something, that's kind of a big deal, that's a big accomplishment. Does Kemal have that  
24 type of connections? Is he connected to the Azerbaijani Government?
- 25 WITNESS: Did you look at the board members for AFAZ because I don't know them  
26 and if there's a strong name from Azerbaijani community, that should be the contact for  
27 that.
- 28 MR. MORGAN: Yeah, So you're saying it wouldn't be Kemal that has that connection?
- 29 WITNESS: Kemal work in Turkmenistan 15 years ago. I mean he has no connection in  
30 Azerbaijan. I mean we cannot create that connection, you know, from U.S. Should be an  
31 Azerbaijani know is to me.

- 1 MS. EISNER: You asked us if we looked at the board members of AFAZ to see if they  
2 made the connection.
- 3 WITNESS: That's what I'm saying you know there should be a strong name for that.
- 4 MS. EISNER: Why AFAZ? Why do you mention AFAZ?
- 5 WITNESS: Because his only connection with the Azerbaijan is AFAZ you know. He  
6 became the president for AFAZ and to be able to reach out, for example for Tanzania, it  
7 is easy for me I know what to do you know.
- 8 MR. MORGAN: So wait, help me to understand this.
- 9 WITNESS: Okay, sorry.
- 10 MR. MORGAN: Kemal is the president of AFAZ?
- 11 WITNESS: Yes as you already know right?
- 12 MR. MORGAN: He is the president of an organization representing Azerbaijanis, yet he  
13 would not be the one who would have Azerbaijani connections?
- 14 WITNESS: He can still, but I'm telling you, I mean at least with a person the help of  
15 those people he can create that connection that I am thinking of.
- 16 MR. MORGAN: But he would need someone else to help him?
- 17 WITNESS: Of course I mean the locals, you know, those iron curtain countries. Is one  
18 voice you know, you should have Azerbaijani to be able to be trusted or get connections  
19 or create connections in those...
- 20 MR. MORGAN: So how did Kemal do it? How did he create those connections?
- 21 WITNESS: That's what I'm saying. Did you look at the office board members because  
22 there should be Azerbaijani you know, you know, strong names.
- 23 MR. MORGAN: That's what I'm asking you, do you know?
- 24 WITNESS: I'm sorry, I know. I don't know. I'm just referring, my understanding there  
25 should be a connection in his board, you know. But Azerbaijani not American or Turkish,  
26 you know.
- 27 MS. EISNER: It seems like earlier you weren't very familiar with AFAZ.
- 28 WITNESS: What?

- 1 MS. EISNER: It seemed like earlier when we were discussing AFAZ, you weren't very  
2 familiar with AFAZ, but now it seems like...
- 3 WITNESS: No, AFAZ was a kind of disturbing situation for the community.
- 4 MS. EISNER: It was, but it seems like you know you mentioned them as the group with  
5 board members that would be most likely –
- 6 WITNESS: Should be –
- 7 MS. EISNER: Should be most likely to have a connection to the Azeri.
- 8 WITNESS: Because they were the ones who were trained to create another organization,  
9 you know, other than Turquoise. Turkish people are kind of sensitive, you know, we were  
10 doing things in our...
- 11 MS. EISNER: So you think that the... I mean we talked about the kind of different ties  
12 in the Texas area and Houston that would have resulted in the creation of AFAZ, but you  
13 think that the Azeri Government was involved in the creation of AFAZ?
- 14 WITNESS: Okay that point you should look at the board member of Azeri, who has the  
15 connection with the government. The... you can just understand that way you know. If  
16 the person related with the government you can tell at that point if there is government  
17 involvement. But at the point I really don't know the board members you know.
- 18 MS. EISNER: Okay. Any other gifts that you can think of besides the rugs, that people  
19 might have received?
- 20 WITNESS: No.
- 21 MS. EISNER: Okay.
- 22 MR. MORGAN: Tea sets, DVD sets...
- 23 WITNESS: What?
- 24 MR. MORGAN: Tea sets... Tea? Doesn't ring a bell?
- 25 WITNESS: Yeah maybe we are the last... [inaudible]
- 26 MS. EISNER: Have you had any recent conversations with the eight congressional  
27 staffers that we mentioned earlier that TFS sponsored?
- 28 WITNESS: No.
- 29 MS. EISNER: Did you have any contact with them after the convention?

- 1 WITNESS: Actually every time when I travel to Washington, I mean I do see friends  
2 and we are having lunch or you know seeing them at the office because in all time we are  
3 knocking their doors, okay we have this event; could you please tell the Congressman... is  
4 the nature of our, you know, visits to them.
- 5 MR. MORGAN: How much time your role, with your role at TFS, how much time do  
6 you spend contacting Congressional staff and members of Congress? Is it a big part of  
7 your work?
- 8 WITNESS: No actually it only last one year because of the funding is a problem for me  
9 that I should know more of them. I'm trying to see most of them in the district when they  
10 are in, you know, Atlanta. But I'm a bad president you know.
- 11 MS. EISNER: Have you... so you haven't... so have you had any conversations with  
12 anyone regarding our work?
- 13 WITNESS: About this issue or generally?
- 14 MS. EISNER: Yes, about this issue.
- 15 WITNESS: No.
- 16 MS. EISNER: Anyone about our investigation?
- 17 WITNESS: No.
- 18 MS. EISNER: The Office of Congressional Ethics?
- 19 WITNESS: I didn't talk and also... let me just share with you, I mean our relation them is  
20 still, I mean when I go to Washington, they very warm. It means I don't know if they are  
21 familiar about this investigation or not; if they know maybe they are kind of offended I  
22 don't know.
- 23 MS. EISNER: You are referring to the Congressional staffers right now?
- 24 WITNESS: Yeah because they are at the same office right now, the same...
- 25 MR. MORGAN: So you're saying that you still have a warm relationship with them?
- 26 WITNESS: I mean when I go and knock the doors you know the staffers, I mean  
27 generally they come and how can I help you, you know. At least they are smiling face;  
28 we are sitting and drinking something at their office. It's to me still warm relation you  
29 know.
- 30 MS. EISNER: Besides beyond Congressional staff have you had conversations with  
31 anyone about our investigation?

- 1 WITNESS: No, ma'am. That's why even if I have a problem with my staffers, you  
2 know, here. That's the problem for me right now. Should I, can I talk to them? Explain  
3 them what was this about or not?
- 4 MR. MORGAN: We ask that you keep it as confidential as possible, but if you... I mean  
5 if there is anybody you need to reach out to...
- 6 WITNESS: No, I mean at my office that's it because my staffers they received calls. I  
7 didn't explain anything to them you know, should I tell them, this is the thing.
- 8 MR. MORGAN: Sure, you know we can talk about that a little bit more once we are  
9 done with the recording.
- 10 MS. EISNER: Just checking my notes and making sure we covered everything.
- 11 MR. MORGAN: And we are going to follow up with you. We do want to see that you  
12 know that it's sort of QuickBooks or whatever accounting list is.
- 13 WITNESS: That's fine for all three years, two years, one year, or '13 after '13?
- 14 MR. MORGAN: Ever since TFS started through the end of 2013.
- 15 WITNESS: At this point, can I put that debt in my QuickBooks or not is the question?  
16 My...
- 17 MR. MORGAN: That's not something I would legally give advice with.
- 18 WITNESS: No, officially I'm asking you. If there's a problem still I can touch, you  
19 know that's what I'm saying. You know because you are very strict about confidential  
20 deal. That's why I'm not... if I put the debt there I don't want to put myself in the spot,  
21 you know, that's what I'm saying. If nothing is important, I can just put there. That's it  
22 you know. Or later on you can let me know or after you finish up or whatever you know.
- 23 MR. MORGAN: Yeah, we're just not in a position to advise you on that.
- 24 WITNESS: Okay that's fine.
- 25 MR. MORGAN: If you do end up putting it in there. Make sure that there's a clear  
26 record of when you put it in.
- 27 WITNESS: Okay that's fine.
- 28 MR. MORGAN: I don't think there is anything else.
- 29 MS. EISNER: Yeah that's all, I think we're good. Thank you for your time.



1 Nate Wright: This is Nate Wright here in the OCE with Omar Ashmawy and NIL Travel  
2 Agent. It's April 10, 2015. You are the general manager for NIL Travel is  
3 that correct?

4 Witness: Yes.

5 Nate Wright: You are also the owner?

6 Witness: Tursan Travel.

7 Nate Wright: Tursan Travel?

8 Witness: Yeah. We have two company. The NIL Travel closed 2012, and actually  
9 NIL Travel six years open, then it ... It's non-IATA. You know IATA?

10 Omar Ashmawy: IATA?

11 Witness: IATA.

12 Omar Ashmawy: Yeah.

13 Witness: Non-IATA, then we purchased the Tursan Travel is IATA. We closed NIL  
14 Travel then encounter in it Tursan Travel.

15 Omar Ashmawy: Okay, so NIL Travel ended in 2012 and since then it's been Tursan?

16 Witness: Yes.

17 Nate Wright: Okay. How many employees now and did you have back in 2013?

18 Witness: 2013, I have three. Two is full time, one is part time. Right now, two part  
19 time, two full time.

20 Nate Wright: Okay. Are there any other names or entities that Tursan Travel has used  
21 in the past?

22 Witness: Entity?

23 Nate Wright: NIL or any other names?

24 Witness: Tursan only.

25 Nate Wright: Tursan?

1 Witness: Yeah.

2 Nate Wright: Okay. Do you know World of Travel?

3 Witness: World of Travel. Yeah I know. My . . .

4 Nate Wright: Competitor?

5 Witness: Yes.

6 Nate Wright: Okay. Who're your average customers? Do they tend to be organizations  
7 planning trips, or does it tend to be individuals?

8 Witness: Little. Starts with friends of friends. I open a house, home office 2008,  
9 end of 2008. Friends of friends. We have many customer then we open  
10 the office Manhattan, thirty fourth Street. We think about the  
11 Manhattan, they are not Turkish. Come back to the Turkish community,  
12 back to open this location in 2010.

13 Nate Wright: Most of your customers . . .

14 Witness: Turkish, in-laws, friends.

15 Nate Wright: Individuals, families, people who are looking to take vacation.

16 Witness: Yeah.

17 Nate Wright: Okay.

18 Witness: After I purchased the Tursan Travel, then we connect to the organization.  
19 Before I'm not issued a ticket. We just make a reservation then sent to  
20 the Mavi Travel. My host agency Mavi Travel.

21 Nate Wright: Let me make sure I understood that correct. I'm not as versed in travel.  
22 When you were operating under NIL you would make the reservations for  
23 the customers, but the customers would pay the airlines.

24 Witness: Airline. Mavi Travel. I make reservation, collect the information put the  
25 system then I forward to the Mavi Travel. They issue the ticket.

26 Nate Wright: Okay. When you switched to Tursan Travel then you could . . .

27 Witness: Tursan Travel, I'm host agency.

1 Nate Wright: Okay.

2 Witness: Yeah.

3 Nate Wright: Does that mean that you . . . You put the ticket on hold. Do you then but  
4 the ticket, and then be reimbursed by the customer?

5 Witness: No, because money withdraw from Turkish Airline not company. I'm not  
6 going to withdraw money to my agency.

7 Omar Ashmawy: How does that work? I've never thought about that. If I come to you and I  
8 want a ticket to Istanbul.

9 Witness: Yes.

10 Omar Ashmawy: You'll book my travel.

11 Witness: Yes.

12 Omar Ashmawy: You'll buy the ticket for me?

13 Witness: Yes.

14 Omar Ashmawy: I write you . . . Do I give you the check? I want to pay for it with a check.

15 Witness: If you'll pay the check. We put to bank or we are going to use our credit  
16 card.

17 Omar Ashmawy: You'll put it on your credit card?

18 Witness: That end of the statement we pay it. If you pay your credit card on the  
19 statement, Turkish Airlines withdraw, we receive a commission.

20 Omar Ashmawy: Got it. When Turkish Airlines gets my credit card payment, you get your  
21 commission.

22 Witness: Yes.

23 Omar Ashmawy: If I want to pay . . . Is it possible for me to pay you directly if I wanted to?

24 Witness: If you pay direct to me. We don't have margin account. Also, it has a  
25 margin account they are going to cut 3.5%. We receive by commission

1 from you if you pay credit card 3.5, already cut. That's why we're not  
2 going to withdraw the company.

3 Omar Ashmawy: It's better for you if I use my credit card to pay Turkish Airline directly?

4 Witness: Yeah.

5 Omar Ashmawy: If I want to pay you, you lose 3.5%.

6 Witness: Yes.

7 Omar Ashmawy: Okay. That's interesting. How much of a commission do you get on a  
8 ticket anyway?

9 Witness: We have contract with Turkish Airlines, Azerbaijan Airlines, Ukraine  
10 Airlines, Transaero. All of these airlines we are going to use Picasso  
11 Travel. Picasso Travel has all airlines as a commission, same thing, we  
12 make reservation, put credit card, forward to the Picasso. For example, I  
13 sold five minutes ago Newark to Frankfurt, we forward to the Picasso.  
14 They are going to issue the ticket.

15 Omar Ashmawy: Just an average. What would be the average amount that a travel agency  
16 would get in commission? Is it 5%?

17 Witness: 5% to 6%.

18 Omar Ashmawy: 5% to 6%?

19 Witness: Yeah.

20 Omar Ashmawy: Losing 3 1/2% that's a lot.

21 Witness: Yes.

22 Omar Ashmawy: That's a lot of money.

23 Witness: There is not . . . No, we issue ticket, behalf of the Turkish Airlines. Credit  
24 card, we are not going to . . . Actually we issue the ticket. Turkish Airlines  
25 doesn't do anything. The only assist on everything on the system. If  
26 you're United, I put to United. For example you're going to Frankfurt, you  
27 give all information. I issue ticket, but on the statement United Airlines  
28 on the credit card, they have to regulate relationship.

1 Omar Ashmawy: That makes sense.

2 Witness: They do all things, but with the margin account between to the carrier to  
3 the credit card.

4 Omar Ashmawy: Got it. So, if you're making 5% on a ticket, if I want to pay you directly  
5 then you lose 3 1/2%. That's a lot of money though.

6 Witness: Yeah. We never do like this.

7 Omar Ashmawy: Yeah. That's a lot. Okay. That's interesting.

8 Nate Wright: In what circumstances might you allow for the customer to pay you  
9 directly? If a normal customer. Let's say, I walk in and I want to buy a  
10 ticket and I want to pay you. Is that something you'd normally do? Would  
11 you prefer . . .

12 Witness: Yeah. We receive a lot of cash. We receive a lot of K, we two, three days  
13 cycle, we receive seven thousand dollars and we put to debit card. I issue  
14 the ticket. We use our debit card.

15 Omar Ashmawy: Again, you still lose that 3 1/2% in that circumstance?

16 Witness: No.

17 Omar Ashmawy: No? Why not?

18 Witness: Turkish Airlines responsible to margin account. I'm not going to issue, we  
19 just pay to . . . For example, same thing, if we put credit card . . . On the  
20 statement it say Turkish Airlines. Turkish Airlines responsible. If you on  
21 statement, Tursan Travel, this we losing 3 1/2.

22 Omar Ashmawy: Okay.

23 Nate Wright: Okay.

24 Witness: We mostly use our margin account, service fee. For example, online is for  
25 fifteen hundred. I found to twelve hundred, but Turkish Airlines doesn't .  
26 . . I sold this ticket to fourteen hundred because customer doesn't show  
27 up to . . . Customer showing on the system, fifteen hundred. I have to  
28 make money. Fourteen hundred because we have commission two  
29 hundred dollar gap. They issued twelve hundred charge from Turkish  
30 Airlines two hundred charge from my margin account that's . . . customer

1 has two transactions, twelve hundred from Turkish, two hundred. I lose  
2 to 3.5 from two hundred.

3 Omar Ashmawy: Okay. I see.

4 Nate Wright: Are you familiar with the Turquoise Council of Americans and Eurasians?

5 Witness: I'm member of . . . On the paper I'm not member. I'm not sure, I'm not  
6 member. We have a Turkish called Sons of Brooklyn. I think this is a top  
7 federation. I think Turkish council sons are membered to Turkic  
8 Federation.

9 Omar Ashmawy: When you talk about the one here in Brooklyn. Isn't that . . . Is that a  
10 Turkish Cultural Center?

11 Witness: Brooklyn. Yes.

12 Omar Ashmawy: Brooklyn.

13 Witness: Yes. Yes.

14 Omar Ashmawy: Okay.

15 Nate Wright: That's separate from the Council on Turkic American Association. Which  
16 is also, I think, located in this region?

17 Witness: No. I think it's a . . . They work like this, this local Turkish Cultural Center,  
18 Queens Turkish Council, Sons of Queens, Manhattan. All local member of  
19 the Turkic, or TCAA, or other. Turkish American Agency, my mistake. TAA.

20 Omar Ashmawy: TAA.

21 Nate Wright: Yes.

22 Witness: The member of the TAA not Turkic. Maybe TAA member of the . . .

23 Nate Wright: Turquoise Council.

24 Witness: Turkic, maybe.

25 Nate Wright: The Turkic American Alliance in DC that's the major umbrella of this.

26 Witness: Yes. Umbrella.

1 Nate Wright: The smaller ones in Queens, in Manhattan, in Brooklyn. They all converge  
2 up.

3 Witness: East Coast. All East Coast. Manhattan, Boston, Massachusetts all East  
4 Coast local office.

5 Nate Wright: The Turquoise Council is based down in Houston. Did you have  
6 interactions with them before 2013?

7 Witness: [inaudible] Necip Orhan, Albuquerque. He was both TCC Manhattan,  
8 Turkish Council Center in Manhattan. They moved to Albuquerque, New  
9 Mexico, is close to Houston. They said to . . . We have a planning to  
10 Azerbaijan Convention. You can come and you can talk to the Kemal  
11 Oksuz. You can get big revenue. Big job.

12 Omar Ashmawy: Who is the name of the individual again?

13 Witness: Necip Orhan.

14 Omar Ashmawy: Can you spell his first name?

15 Witness: N-e-c-i-p. Necip Orhan ... Resul Aksoy was before Albuquerque, then  
16 Necip Orhan go, then Resul Aksoy, the second man to Kemal Oksuz that  
17 Resul Aksoy that how we met. Necip Orhan moved to Albuquerque then  
18 they be friends, then Resul Aksoy moved to Houston.

19 Omar Ashmawy: Okay. Resul Aksoy was in Albuquerque first. He moved to Houston. When  
20 he moved to Houston . . .

21 Witness: Before Necip Orhan moved to Albuquerque.

22 Omar Ashmawy: He moved to Houston. Necip Orsam moved to Albuquerque.

23 Witness: Yes. Albuquerque.

24 Omar Ashmawy: The last name is Orsam?

25 Witness: Orhan.

26 Omar Ashmawy: Orhan?

27 Witness: Yes.

1 Omar Ashmawy: All right.

2 Nate Wright: When that meeting was set up with Oksuz. Was that in person? Was that  
3 over the phone? How where you put in touch with Kemal Oksuz?

4 Witness: They call me to morning, then I take a flight, Sunday, and come back to  
5 same night.

6 Nate Wright: Down to Houston?

7 Witness: Yes.

8 Nate Wright: Okay. What was that conversation in Houston?

9 Witness: They said we have a travel agency but same thing non-IATA. I don't know  
10 the name to their travel agency. They said, "We are trying to give this job  
11 to our agency," because Houston, they give job. Normally, they give to  
12 other people but they said, "They are too lazy." They are not answering  
13 our phone and we need to maybe purchase two hundred, three hundred  
14 ticket. We need to answer the sent mail. If you sent . . . Tell you  
15 something, you are to give us quick response. That's why I am here, I can  
16 hear, I can do. If you check to the our email, some email is 3am, 4am. We  
17 won't answer 4am. They need to do faster agency that's why they call me  
18 to Houston.

19 Nate Wright: Was it your understanding that you're booking all the travel to the  
20 convention?

21 Witness: Airline. Yes.

22 Nate Wright: Airline?

23 Witness: Airline.

24 Nate Wright: Was there ever a discussion about hotels? Whether or not you with also  
25 be booking hotels?

26 Witness: I don't have any idea. I think they book in Baku. They are actually in Baku.

27 Nate Wright: Okay.

28 Omar Ashmawy: Just so that I understand. Do you understand that they book the hotels  
29 locally in Baku? Is that what you're saying?

1 Witness: Yes. I'm thinking.

2 Omar Ashmawy: Is it?

3 Witness: Because Azerbaijan government get good . . . This is a government issue,  
4 get good price from hotel I think.

5 Nate Wright: Okay. You normally book hotels right?

6 Witness: Normally yes. I do.

7 Nate Wright: They decided just to use you for flight in this instance.

8 Witness: Yes.

9 Omar Ashmawy: Again, just so I'm clear. I know it's just your understanding, but you think  
10 that, because of the nature of the convention, because of this SOCAR and  
11 everything, that the government probably booked the hotels?

12 Witness: No. I'm telling to . . . This is a government connection. If booked you in  
13 Baku, is government it's cheap.

14 Omar Ashmawy: It's cheaper. Yeah. Right.

15 Witness: They can get any rate. That's what I'm trying to tell.

16 Nate Wright: Better than even you can get?

17 Witness: Yes.

18 Omar Ashmawy: Yes. Okay. Thank you. Have you ever booked travel for . . . I know you've  
19 booked travel for the conference. Have you ever booked travel for  
20 anything else involving an organization called Assembly Friends of  
21 Azerbaijan, AFAZ?

22 Witness: Yeah. They are the same thing, I think.

23 Omar Ashmawy: Okay. That's what I was going to ask.

24 Witness: Yes.

25 Omar Ashmawy: As far as you know, are they the same thing?

1 Witness: Yeah. It's the same person I contact AFAZ, or Turquoise Council, what was  
2 the name?

3 Omar Ashmawy: Turquoise?

4 Witness: Turquoise, yes.

5 Nate Wright: You sent us some invoices. Some of them had Turquoise Council at the  
6 top. Some of them had AFAZ at the top. How did you distinguish the  
7 activity?

8 Witness: They just tell me.

9 Nate Wright: What's that?

10 Witness: They just tell me. They have to put to AFAZ, and they have to put  
11 Turquoise. I'm not going to . . . I don't know even to the person in the  
12 passenger. How can I know?

13 Nate Wright: Resul Aksoy, he was the number two person under Kemal?

14 Witness: Yes.

15 Nate Wright: What was his relationship with TCAE and AFAZ. Did he work for both the  
16 Turquoise Council and the Assembly of Friends?

17 Witness: For emails, they just email to . . . I don't know. Maybe it was. I don't  
18 know. If I tell something. On paper maybe it works to Turquoise, but they  
19 can't arrange the all tickets. It happened like this, I remember . . . For  
20 example, Brooklyn Culture Center send to the senator or congressman,  
21 they give to all information to all USA. All local contact to the Resul, they  
22 collect all information and sent me through email. This connection work  
23 like this.

24 Nate Wright: Okay.

25 Witness: Resul can't contact two hundred congressman.

26 Nate Wright: The organizations across the country that wanted to be involved. Local  
27 people who contact the travelers, and then they would send that  
28 information to Aksoy. He would compile it together and then send it to  
29 you.

1 Witness: Yes.

2 Nate Wright: When you were . . . Just a backup to the trip that you took down to  
3 Houston to talk to Kemal. Was there anyone else involved in that  
4 discussion? Was Resul involved in that discussion?

5 Witness: Me, Resul and Kemal.

6 Nate Wright: Okay. It was your understanding that all of the travelers to the  
7 convention were going to use your agency? Was there . . . Is that correct?

8 Witness: 99% yes.

9 Nate Wright: Okay. Did they talk about what sort of procedures or parameters you  
10 might be under as you're going about booking this travel? Did they say  
11 anything about price restrictions? Any things about classes of tickets?  
12 Things like that.

13 Witness: I think it's business class. They travel average but I'm not . . . There's not  
14 to average, because some tickets can't, so high . . . Can't so high, some  
15 person. Some person. Two years ago and I cannot remember the names.

16 Nate Wright: Sure. Some people, if the ticket price was too high, you were to look for  
17 better tickets.

18 Witness: Better ticket. Yes.

19 Nate Wright: That would be something that Aksoy would tell you, designating these  
20 people, we don't need to get the most expensive ticket. These people we  
21 should go ahead and get better tickets.

22 Witness: Yes.

23 Nate Wright: Okay. Were there any caps on the amounts of tickets that you would pull  
24 together before . . . How does payment arranged? Were there caps on  
25 how much tickets you would get?

26 Witness: I earn around five hundred dollars each ticket. Business one thousand  
27 dollar. Economy five hundred. Around . . . I don't remember.

28 Nate Wright: That's in commission from the airline?

1 Witness: No. Gap, I expense of fourteen hundred, it was online fifteen hundred I  
2 file up to five hundred. This is the gap.

3 Nate Wright: Okay, so the way-

4 Witness: Other than to airline commission. Other than airline commission.

5 Omar Ashmawy: In addition to the airline commission, you also received five hundred  
6 dollars for an economy ticket and one thousand dollars for a business  
7 class ticket.

8 Witness: I can't tell exactly the . . . Some four hundred, three hundreds, some  
9 ticket five hundred is average.

10 Omar Ashmawy: Approximately?

11 Witness: Yes.

12 Omar Ashmawy: Okay.

13 Nate Wright: You said that sometimes people would pay for them directly using a  
14 credit card. Why wasn't that the arrangement here? Why wasn't TCAE or  
15 AFAZ paying for the tickets directly?

16 Witness: Wire transfer. This ticket paid from to Kemal Oksuz. If use the credit card  
17 there are no limitation to the one million dollars. That's why . . . first we  
18 booked, I think five hundred or four hundred then they transfer to me  
19 money, then say, "Okay but four hundred thousand on the system, we  
20 are not going to able to . . . pay some money then we issue the ticket  
21 again."

22 Omar Ashmawy: Okay, say that again. I think I understood what you said. You would book  
23 ... You'd book the tickets.

24 Witness: Yes.

25 Omar Ashmawy: Maybe for five hundred thousand dollars, but then he would send you  
26 four hundred thousand dollars?

27 Witness: No. More than.

28 Omar Ashmawy: He would send you?

1 Witness: Six hundred, six thousand. If you have a paper I can tell you.

2 Omar Ashmawy: Yes, absolutely.

3 Nate Wright: Yes we do. Do you have an extra piece or I can just rip something out  
4 from here.

5 Witness: Because.

6 Nate Wright: This will cut out. Here.

7 Omar Ashmawy: Yeah.

8 Nate Wright: I'll just going to keep this around here. Here you go. You can use that pen  
9 right there.

10 Witness: I mean, I send to you.

11 Omar Ashmawy: Yes, yes. Absolutely.

12 Nate Wright: Is this the paper you were talking about?

13 Omar Ashmawy: Yes.

14 Witness: Yeah. That's what I'm telling. First we issue four hundred something, they  
15 sent me five fifteen, then it will cover to the all ticket then we continue  
16 the book.

17 Nate Wright: Okay. You would start off and buy a certain number of tickets and then at  
18 some point you would reach a cap, or you could really buy anymore  
19 tickets. Kemal would send you wire transfer that would allow you to pay  
20 off your balance and then you'll be able to . . .

21 Witness: Start to ... Yeah.

22 Nate Wright: Okay.

23 Omar Ashmawy: Again, just so that we're on the top of the tickets. The approximate,  
24 average five hundred, one thousand that was extra that Kemal was  
25 paying you per ticket?

26 Witness: Yes.

1 Omar Ashmawy: Okay. You made your commission from the airline and then Kemal, in  
2 order to pay you for your time and your services, paid you approximately  
3 five hundred for an economy and a thousand dollars for . . .

4 Witness: Yes, exactly.

5 Omar Ashmawy: Okay.

6 Nate Wright: Okay. I have a couple of questions on this document that's why we're  
7 here. I noticed down here there was the wire transfer in this first one is  
8 from the Turquoise Council, May 10<sup>th</sup> here. It says US Azerbaijan  
9 convention on it. Was that the normal . . . I guess what was the discussion  
10 leading into the wire transfers? Did Kemal say, "I'm going to send you this  
11 wire transfer put them as US Azerbaijan convention."

12 Witness: I'm not going to interest the who sent, AFAZ or Turquoise because I don't  
13 know the names on it. That I receive the money is important thing for  
14 me.

15 Nate Wright: Do you know by any chance . . . Right here it looks like there's Turquoise  
16 Council and then there's these numbers here.

17 Witness: This is I think their bank number.

18 Nate Wright: Okay. That's what I . . . I thought this might be, maybe a routing number  
19 and this would be an account number.

20 Witness: Yes. Maybe. Exactly. This is ... Routing number should be nine. Can you  
21 count how many numbers there? I think it's nine, it should be.

22 Nate Wright: Yeah. That is nine numbers there.

23 Witness: This is a routing number.

24 Nate Wright: Okay.

25 Witness: It's not mine, their.

26 Nate Wright: Yeah. They were using the same account from the Turquoise Council as  
27 they were from the Assembly of Friends. It's the same routing number.  
28 It's that same account number ending in 1183. They would just designate  
29 as part of the wire transfer . . .

1 Witness: The same bank but you try to exploit . . . Same business, but you put two  
2 different two separate company.

3 Nate Wright: Okay. You could have the same account and-

4 Witness: Right now you're telling me but I was seeing to it first time here.

5 Nate Wright: Yeah, yeah. No, I understand that you probably . . . You worry about  
6 getting the money not necessarily if it was from the same account. I was  
7 just . . . I'm not familiar with seeing these and wanted to know what  
8 discussion might've lead into it.

9 Witness: Yes.

10 Nate Wright: You're saying that he could have done one wire transfer and said let's put  
11 . . . from the same account. One time say, "Let's put Turquoise Council on  
12 the first one. Let's put Assembly of Friends on the second one."

13 Witness: Yes.

14 Nate Wright: Okay. That was when . . . I remember we spoke previously on the phone  
15 and you talked about how you thought that Kemal had paid for all of the  
16 flights. I think you would said, "AFAZ paid for them," but you really  
17 weren't . . . Even though this says Turquoise Council and AFAZ, you really  
18 didn't distinguished between the two. You thought that they were . . . It  
19 was all coming from the same place.

20 Witness: Yes. Yes.

21 Nate Wright: Okay. You understood that Kemal ran both of these organizations?

22 Witness: Yes. I knew. That's why I'm not . . . ignore who is paying, that's it . . .  
23 purchase . . . I'm sending money. This is it.

24 Omar Ashmawy: You've been in Tursan Travel now for a few years?

25 Witness: Yes.

26 Omar Ashmawy: Have you been doing work with other organizations?

27 Witness: Before?

28 Omar Ashmawy: Now.

1 Witness: Right now?

2 Omar Ashmawy: Yeah.

3 Witness: We have consulates, but there's a mission, working turkey foreign  
4 minister.

5 Omar Ashmawy: My question now is this, because I know nothing about booking travel.  
6 Nothing. Is it common to earn an extra five hundred dollars per ticket? Is  
7 that normal or is that unusual?

8 Witness: Unusual.

9 Omar Ashmawy: It seems unusual to me.

10 Witness: Yeah. I know. They need to organize organization May 24<sup>th</sup>, I think, right?

11 Omar Ashmawy: I'm sorry, 24<sup>th</sup>?

12 Witness: May 24<sup>th</sup>?

13 Omar Ashmawy: May 24<sup>th</sup>, yes.

14 Witness: Azerbaijan. They start to ticket to May 10<sup>th</sup>.

15 Omar Ashmawy: I see.

16 Witness: Two weeks. Did they not because ... Also they tell me, they make  
17 reservation, tell me don't book it, we are get to confirm from you, Ethic  
18 Committee, extra. Also, get to confirm from senator. After that you need  
19 to confirm from Ethic Committee. Two weeks we need to purchase all  
20 two hundred tickets.

21 Omar Ashmawy: That's a lot.

22 Witness: Yeah.

23 Nate Wright: Part of it was . . . they were expecting you to book two hundred tickets in  
24 two weeks. Be available at 4am in the morning. Some of those they have  
25 to get . . . They had to run through approval process.

26 Witness: Yes. Exactly.

1 Nate Wright: Okay.

2 Witness: I remember I work 4am a long time. I work 4am. You can't see it at the  
3 email time, if you checked.

4 Omar Ashmawy: I'm sure. I'm sure. That must have been very difficult.

5 Witness: 4am.

6 Nate Wright: I was wondering if we could walk through the process, because I think I  
7 understood from the emails that you sent. I just wanted to make sure I  
8 understand this correctly. I think and you said before that Aksoy was your  
9 point of contact. This is an email, NIL\_1188, and it's an email from Resul  
10 to you. Attached is this spreadsheet . . .

11 Witness: Yes. Exactly. This spreadsheet I will explain to . . . Coming to local. Yeah.  
12 Exactly will work like this.

13 Nate Wright: These were the local TCAE people that were coming.

14 Witness: TCAE or other organization. Yes, exactly.

15 Nate Wright: Okay.

16 Witness: They collect all information then send to me. I make reservation, they  
17 sent to Resul Aksoy. Aksoy send to the local information. They get to  
18 confirmation from the senator or congressman, then we issue ticket.

19 Nate Wright: Okay. Let me see if I . . . He sent you the spreadsheet and then at some  
20 point, and it looks like ... I think if I understand you correctly this comes  
21 later, so this . . . He sent you this spreadsheet. I think it's May 4<sup>th</sup> or  
22 something like that. It's pretty early on.

23 Witness: Yes.

24 Nate Wright: Yeah.

25 Witness: May 4<sup>th</sup>.

26 Nate Wright: Flip over further. This is NIL\_0062. These are the itineraries that you had  
27 sent over to us. There are what the itineraries that you would put  
28 together and send to, . . . Did you send these to Resul?

1 Witness: Yes.

2 Nate Wright: Okay. Some of these here, you can see say, "Confirmed." Does that mean  
3 that the ticket was purchased? Does that mean that . . . Are these just  
4 holds . . .

5 Witness: Just reservation. All sets that say, "Confirmed." It doesn't means book,  
6 issue or not issue.

7 Nate Wright: Okay. At the bottom of a lot of these, there's . . . This is the actual issue  
8 date?

9 Witness: Yes.

10 Nate Wright: That's when the flight was booked?

11 Witness: Issue date. I issued this date, booking to class. She is going to make  
12 target.

13 Nate Wright: Okay. This is the invoice number that goes with it?

14 Witness: Yes.

15 Nate Wright: This is the amount?

16 Witness: Yes.

17 Nate Wright: Okay. I had some questions that I'm trying to match these up with the  
18 invoices here. These are invoices that you had sent to us, it's NIL\_0092.  
19 This is an invoice to the Turquoise Council?

20 Witness: Yes.

21 Nate Wright: It was . . . How would you know who to put up at the top. Was that  
22 something that . . .

23 Witness: Were involved? Yeah. They told me that we have to put this name to  
24 Turquoise, then you have to put this name to AFAZ.

25 Nate Wright: Okay. That was something that Resul would tell you?

26 Witness: Yes.

1 Nate Wright: Okay. Over the phone or is that on emails that I may not be able to . . .

2 Witness: No. Over the phone. Yeah.

3 Nate Wright: Okay. I had a couple of questions about the process here? Just to make  
4 sure that I understand. I think I get what you were saying earlier but I  
5 want to make sure. We have here . . . this is Ted Poe, it's NIL\_0062. Here  
6 it says that it was issued May 13<sup>th</sup>. Invoice number. Amount number.  
7 These numbers don't appear to correlate with these numbers on the  
8 invoice here. I guess . . .

9 Witness: You telling this number, it doesn't match to this number?

10 Nate Wright: Yeah. It doesn't match there and the invoice amount also doesn't match.

11 Witness: [gesturing to the invoice] This number I think I put the numbers. It starts  
12 this number and put them one by one. Maybe it doesn't match that's  
13 why.

14 Nate Wright: Okay. This is a document that you create. Is it . . .

15 Witness: One, two. This number start and the next one, twenty eight, twenty nine,  
16 thirty. That's why I put.

17 Nate Wright: Okay. This is a word document that you just put together with the  
18 numbers in there. You appear you just put whatever the first invoice is  
19 and then however many invoices there are. That's why these-

20 Witness: Doesn't match.

21 Nate Wright: Okay. About the amount, so here's another NIL\_0055, so here this is  
22 Representative Jackson Lee. Again, the issue date, I think they're May  
23 14<sup>th</sup> and amount. It seems to be a lot different. Ted Poe's flight, it looks  
24 like there's about five hundred dollar difference between this [itinerary]  
25 and here [invoice], where you're . . .

26 Witness: Where is it? Yeah, yeah. Twelve hundred to Three hundred seventy six.

27 Nate Wright: Yeah. See how this is \$13,906 and yet his invoice for only 13376.

28 Witness: Five hundred, six hundred less.

29 Nate Wright: Yeah. If we go over to Sheila Jackson Lee's, that flight was \$15,096.

1 Witness: There's \$3,000.

2 Nate Wright: Yeah. You would . . . Help me understand. It looks like, based on these  
3 invoices, you're losing money.

4 Witness: Yeah. There's a time that we put five hundred to one thousand dollars to  
5 gap, just to be put to like this.

6 Nate Wright: Okay, so when you lose money on a tickets . . .

7 Witness: I already earned around a hundred thousand K. That's why we put some  
8 tickets lower price.

9 Nate Wright: Okay. Can you help with . . .

10 Witness: Sure.

11 Nate Wright: Just to match up. With these . . . With the bank account records,  
12 specifically this first one for \$515,000 dollars from TCAE. This is dated  
13 May 10<sup>th</sup>?

14 Witness: May 10<sup>th</sup> yeah.

15 Nate Wright: We actually went through your invoices and pulled together . . . It looks  
16 like, so this one would match the first, I'm presuming would match the  
17 first set of invoices that you had sent to TCAE. Does that sound right?

18 Witness: Say again?

19 Nate Wright: You sent us . . .

20 Witness: Invoices. Yes.

21 Nate Wright: Invoices like this. We actually added together the first . . . I think if we put  
22 together the first six invoices you sent to TCAE . . .

23 Witness: I understand. Yeah. I thought you said it doesn't means to that it's not on  
24 the money but it doesn't go exactly the which passenger name. They just  
25 send me the money. That's why. It can be after . . .

26 Omar Ashmawy: He can pay you after. Why did he send you that amount of money,  
27 because it's a very specific amount of money.

1 Witness: Yes.

2 Omar Ashmawy: Why that much specifically?

3 Witness: I don't know. I just receive money. I'm not going to turn down to . . . You  
4 have to send this money. They just send me the money.

5 Nate Wright: Okay. They sent the money but then the . . . We added up and the first six  
6 invoices that you have to TCAE come out to be the exact same amount of  
7 money that they sent you. How does that match up?

8 Witness: That's why they put Ted Poe less than this amount.

9 Nate Wright: Okay, so it would match with-

10 Witness: You got me? Yes.

11 Nate Wright: Okay.

12 Witness: Maybe. Maybe.

13 Nate Wright: Okay. They're telling you not just what to put up here on the invoices.  
14 They're telling you what to put here in the amount column or the airfare  
15 column?

16 Witness: Yeah.

17 Nate Wright: Okay. Did you create this or did they create the chart?

18 Witness: No. I created.

19 Nate Wright: Okay, but they would say how much to put into-

20 Witness: They have to, yes.

21 Nate Wright: Okay. What they're trying to get out is they want the numbers down here  
22 to match up with the wire transfer. Okay, but they don't necessary match  
23 up . . .

24 Witness: They don't ignore this money.

1 Nate Wright: Okay. That makes more sense. The other thing that I had was based on  
2 this invoice we think was included in this wire transfer, and this wire  
3 transfer is dated May tenth. But, these tickets weren't issued until 14th.

4 Witness: May 14<sup>th</sup>, or 16<sup>th</sup>.

5 Nate Wright: Yeah. 13<sup>th</sup>. I think there's another one that was issued on the 16<sup>th</sup>. That's  
6 why, so the actual . . . They sent you money, they told you to put  
7 together this invoice that would add up to the amount of money that  
8 they sent to you for certain number of passengers. Later, you book the  
9 flights themselves.

10 Witness: Yes. Exactly.

11 Nate Wright: Okay. How did you make sure, other than that there's the difference, the  
12 five hundred dollars for regular airfare and a thousand dollars for  
13 business class. How did you make sure that you weren't going to lose  
14 money on this?

15 Witness: It's not all these, maybe five, six ticket like this. Other one I earn five  
16 hundred or maybe purchase 40, or I think 40 or 35, around 30 to 40, we  
17 issued business class.

18 Nate Wright: Okay.

19 Witness: Actually, panelist should be business class side because they're going to  
20 speak.

21 Nate Wright: Okay.

22 Witness: Span this number I think, thirty five, forty people.

23 Nate Wright: These were all people that probably had to go through the-

24 Witness: Results there.

25 Nate Wright: Yeah. Panelist and they were also, they had to go through . . . I think they  
26 all say business class. They also would've had to go through that process  
27 you talked about with getting approval.

28 Witness: Yes. Yes.

29 Nate Wright: Okay. It's only those that you might end up losing money on.

1 Witness: Yes. Yes.

2 Nate Wright: Okay. Just a quick question while I remember. I think it's . . .

3 Witness: Martha? Sheila?

4 Nate Wright: Down here there's a Mike Turner.

5 Witness: Congressman. Yes.

6 Nate Wright: Do you remember ever booking a ticket for him?

7 Witness: I can check for you.

8 Nate Wright: Okay.

9 Witness: Real quick.

10 Nate Wright: Okay.

11 Witness: I'm not remember any name. I only remember Clarke because she is  
12 here, right? We have recent purchase for her.

13 Nate Wright: Okay. All right. We can check on that later.

14 Witness: Sure.

15 Nate Wright: One of the . . . Ask you a couple of questions about, I think you refer to it  
16 as TCAA, or the Council on Turkic American Association led by Faruk  
17 Kosar or Furkan Kosar?

18 Witness: Furkan Kosar.

19 Nate Wright: Yes. You had supplied us with itineraries for three of the individuals that  
20 they had sponsored, Lance, Clarke and Meeks.

21 Witness: Yes.

22 Nate Wright: You also gave us invoices, but we didn't see on these invoices. Here,  
23 NIL\_0092. We didn't see Lance, Clark or Meeks on these invoices. Do you  
24 know why they weren't included on the invoices that you had sent to us  
25 initially?

1 Witness: Lance, Clarke?

2 Nate Wright: Yeah. The three members that traveled.

3 Witness: I sent you yesterday.

4 Nate Wright: Yeah. Why weren't those in the initial invoices?

5 Witness: I don't know, because they are separate right? I think. That separate  
6 organization, TCAE right?

7 Nate Wright: Yeah. Yeah. CTAA is separate from TCAE. What I'm wondering is why  
8 where those handled differently than the rest?

9 Witness: I think they give you to letter from TCAE that's why they put . . . They  
10 have to purchase from TCAE. I remember. Then they give you the letter  
11 right?

12 Nate Wright: Yes.

13 Witness: That's why they have to pay, TCAE gives the letter to Ethics Committee.  
14 That's they have to pay.

15 Nate Wright: Okay. They talked to you about the letter that they sent to us.

16 Witness: Yes.

17 Nate Wright: Saying that they . . . They said they had to pay?

18 Witness: They have to pay.

19 Nate Wright: Were those tickets ... This way I don't have to try to. Let's see. Should be.

20 Witness: Last one?

21 Nate Wright: Not quite. I will definitely not use a binder in the future to try to carry  
22 these documents.

23 Witness: This one.

24 Nate Wright: Yeah. NIL\_0126. This is the invoice that you had sent us on Wednesday I  
25 believe.

1 Witness: Yeah. Two years ago.

2 Nate Wright: Was it Kosar that talked to you? Who would CTAA have this conversation  
3 with you about the letter to our office?

4 Witness: Furkan.

5 Nate Wright: He called you and said we have to pay for these.

6 Witness: From this TCAA, CTAA I think. CTAA.

7 Nate Wright: Did TCAE or AFAZ already paid for these back in 2013?

8 Witness: No.

9 Nate Wright: These were just an outstanding balance?

10 Witness: Yes. Furkan Kosar worked to Amity, I was worked to Amity also. I emailed  
11 them too many times to send money, send money, because we  
12 understand relationship I'm not going to push off to pay, pay, pay. They  
13 are also still amount four hundred nine dollar. They do not pay this.

14 Nate Wright: He didn't pay his ticket just-

15 Witness: Yes. just guest.

16 Nate Wright: You were sending him emails saying that he needed to pay this balance?

17 Witness: Yes. Saim, his helper. I sent to his helper.

18 Nate Wright: Is that Saim?

19 Witness: Saim Cagirici, yes.

20 Nate Wright: Okay.

21 Omar Ashmawy: Do you still have those emails?

22 Witness: I'll check. Can I check now or later? I'll email to you.

23 Omar Ashmawy: Yeah. If you could email that to us that would be great.

24 Witness: Now or later?

1 Omar Ashmawy: I think it's cool. I don't mind seeing them right now.

2 [BREAK IN RECORDING]

3 Nate Wright: Thank you. You've given us two documents dated July seventh 2013, and  
4 July ninth 2013 from you to Saim.

5 Omar Ashmawy: Translate.

6 Nate Wright: Yeah. Do you mind.

7 Omar Ashmawy: If you could translate. Which one? This.

8 Witness: July 7<sup>th</sup> to Saim, hi. Did you sent my checks? July 9<sup>th</sup>, same headline, Mr.  
9 Saim Osham, did you sent my check yet? Then Mr. Kosar sent me . . .  
10 After two minutes ago, he answer to me. Saim invoice, it was . . . This  
11 says not yet. It means, Saim Osham, We are going to try . . . We try to  
12 issue this, invoice issue to Witness.

13 Omar Ashmawy: Okay.

14 Nate Wright: Thank you. I just have a couple questions about the process with them,  
15 with CTAA. This is NIL\_1333. This is Resul Aksoy sending you a  
16 spreadsheet for the Council for Turkic American Associations, and then  
17 this is the spreadsheet here that Resul sent you. It came from Resul not  
18 from CTAA. Everything went through Resul even . . .

19 Witness: Everything. I don't know TCAE or AFAZ, all information coming from  
20 Resul.

21 Nate Wright: Okay. Here it says you have, Yvette Clarke, Gregory Meeks, Leonard  
22 Lance, and then over here there's this designation K.O.

23 Witness: K.O.

24 Nate Wright: What does that mean?

25 Witness: I think Kemal Oksuz.

26 Nate Wright: Okay. What did that tell you about what to do with those?

1 Witness: Yeah. That says that we're not going to . . . New York. They said we're not  
2 going to pay New York senator. That senator or congressman? That Mr.  
3 Kosar handle all passenger.

4 Nate Wright: Okay.

5 Witness: That's why they have line, I think. Yeah.

6 Nate Wright: Why would it say . . .

7 Witness: Kemal Oksuz.

8 Nate Wright: Kemal Oksuz there?

9 Witness: Interest. Kemal Oksuz interesting this issue. They mark it. It's Resul Aksoy  
10 email to me. I'm not going to handle these three. Kemal Oksuz handle.

11 Nate Wright: Okay.

12 Witness: Means, I think. Yeah.

13 Nate Wright: Okay. Any direction about those three was to come from Kemal, rather  
14 than from Resul.

15 Witness: No. They coming from to Saim.

16 Nate Wright: Okay.

17 Omar Ashmawy: I think I'm a little confused too. I apologize.

18 Witness: Sure.

19 Omar Ashmawy: If they were going to come from Saim why does it say K.O., for Kemal  
20 Oksuz?

21 Witness: Well, that's Kemal Oksuz, I mean, just my opinion. It say K.O., it means  
22 Kemal Oksuz so it's handled to Kemal Oksuz. It mean, I don't know. You  
23 have tell ask who sent on the email.

24 Nate Wright: Okay. The coloring here you think, and I realize this is black and white so  
25 it's hard for me to ask you. The coloring thought might be significant to  
26 say wait on booking the flights or handle the flights differently in some  
27 way?

1 Witness: Yeah. Yeah.

2 Nate Wright: Over NIL\_0098. This is an itinerary and as you see, a lot of these  
3 individuals. Starting here there's Mark Montigny as you can see over  
4 here. He's on the CTAA list. It looks like between Montigny and Kosar that  
5 22 people from CTAA appear on an invoice to TCAE. Why was everyone  
6 else on this spreadsheet being invoiced to TCAE except for those three?

7 Witness: I don't know.

8 Nate Wright: Okay.

9 Witness: You tell me, these sheets only three names difference. This is they mark  
10 it. That's the reason. I don't know. They are not going to turn on the  
11 book. Mr. Resul doesn't tell me the book to all these three names. That's  
12 why they mark it.

13 Nate Wright: Okay. You didn't subsequently bill CTAA, even though these initially  
14 showed up on their spreadsheet for these flights.

15 Omar Ashmawy: All these names. Right on these flights. These were paid for by the  
16 Turquoise Council?

17 Witness: Yes

18 Omar Ashmawy: Okay. Was that what you were . . . ?

19 Nate Wright: Yeah.

20 Omar Ashmawy: Okay. I have a small question just because I'm curious.

21 Witness: Sure. Yeah.

22 Omar Ashmawy: On the list of this invoice 0098. Furkan Kosar's name is there.

23 Witness: Yeah.

24 Omar Ashmawy: It looks like TCAE, the Turquoise Council paid for Mr. Kosar's trip.

25 Witness: Yes.

26 Omar Ashmawy: Then it looks like he was then later . . .

1 Witness: Four hundred nine that, it's an exchange price. Exchange ticket price.  
2 Omar Ashmawy: Exchange ticket price. Okay. There's a cost you needed to change it.  
3 Witness: Change it. Yes. They are changing it up.  
4 Omar Ashmawy: Okay.  
5 Witness: Everything they are changing.  
6 Omar Ashmawy: Okay.  
7 Nate Wright: Showing you NIL\_0018, 067, 042. These are the invoices for Meeks,  
8 Clarke and Lance. Again they show a later issue date. My question here  
9 with these invoices is, so if you look at the invoice and the amount and  
10 then you compare them. Compare them to NIL\_0126, the invoice. What's  
11 odd to me is that these actually match up.  
12 Witness: Yeah.  
13 Nate Wright: You have Meeks matches up here, same amount, same with Clark,  
14 matches up.  
15 Witness: Yeah. Everything that exactly match to the PNR because we receive  
16 commission. There are no . . . Furkan Kosar doesn't give to us same as  
17 other, no gap. Five hundred. We just receive commission from Turkish  
18 Airlines.  
19 Nate Wright: Okay. You weren't getting the extra thousand dollars for business class  
20 for these three individuals that you were for. . .  
21 Witness: Yes. Exactly.  
22 Nate Wright: Okay. You created this invoice and sent it to him, prior to those other two  
23 emails you gave me today. Where you're asking him whether or not he's  
24 paid.  
25 Witness: Yes.  
26 Nate Wright: Okay.  
27 Witness: I print that for you.

1 Nate Wright: It seems like this is . . . This invoice here is different from the other ones,  
2 from the Turquoise Council and AFAZ. Not only do the invoice numbers  
3 roughly match up, the amounts match up. This was something that . . .  
4 Did you used these [gesturing to itineraries] to create this?

5 Witness: No. I can also email to . . . Then I sent two thousand . . . I sent this invoice  
6 exactly 2013. I can print that also here.

7 Nate Wright: Okay.

8 Witness: I'm not going to create this PNR and this invoice two days ago. They  
9 created 2013.

10 Nate Wright: I apologize, my question wasn't clear. With the other invoices you told us  
11 that—TCAE, AFAZ—that you were told what to put into the airfare  
12 column. Here it looks like you put it the actual airfare in the airfare  
13 column.

14 Witness: Yes. Exactly.

15 Nate Wright: Okay.

16 Witness: I receive commission from ... There are no gap for Furkan Kosar.

17 Nate Wright: Okay. You wouldn't allow them to change the amount . . .

18 Witness: Any amount. Yes.

19 Nate Wright: On the invoice because you knew that you are only going to receive-

20 Witness: Commission from Turkish Airlines.

21 Nate Wright: Commission. Okay. How did you account, outside of this invoice, how did  
22 you account for the outstanding balance with . . . ?

23 Witness: This is unpaid. I think my accountant CPA, if it unpaid they are expenses.  
24 We have a lot selling to six million, maybe we have between ten  
25 thousand to hundred thousand dollar charge back. Charge back means  
26 fraud protection. They are all expenses. My accountant should be, this  
27 amount expenses. Unpaid now we receive this is a profit.

28 Omar Ashmawy: Revenue.

1 Nate Wright: Okay. You accounted for them initially as an unpaid expense. It comes  
2 out of your profit margin. Now that they paid most of it, you count that  
3 as profit.

4 Witness: Yes.

5 Nate Wright: This is NIL\_0308.

6 Witness: This the first I think after.

7 Nate Wright: Yeah. This is another email from Resul Aksoy to you with the . . .

8 Witness: Midwest.

9 Nate Wright: Yeah. With the Midwest.

10 Witness: This is local that I explain to you. Midwest is . . .

11 Nate Wright: I think they're based in Chicago. Does that sound right?

12 Witness: Midwest. Yes. I think. Yeah.

13 Nate Wright: Another spreadsheet here with . . . That Resul sent you with their  
14 travelers. Somewhere in here, there is . . . NIL\_0815. There is Danny K.  
15 Davis here listed. This one's also sort of colored in, but then it looks like  
16 you had generated this itinerary for him. Looks like there is an issue date.  
17 May 18<sup>th</sup>. Here NIL\_0103. Invoice. And it has Danny K. Davis here going to  
18 TCAE. I guess my question is, why was Danny K. Davis handled differently  
19 from . . . We went through the Council on Turkic American Associations.  
20 What's different in the paperwork that led you to . . .

21 Witness: This question you have to ask to Res Aksoy, because I'm issuing the ticket.  
22 They send another email, I'm not going to look to . . . You're telling me  
23 that Midwest but Danny Davis is not Midwest, you is telling me. Is it  
24 right?

25 Nate Wright: What's that?

26 Witness: Danny-

27 Omar Ashmawy: Representative Davis. I guess the question we have is, one of the  
28 question we have is, Representative Davis seems to have been handled a

1 little differently. More directly, why . . . What's the static nation here as  
2 reimbursement on 0103.

3 Witness: Yeah. The reimbursement. They purchase tickets. I don't know why we.  
4 Actually they have to tally the reimbursement.

5 Omar Ashmawy: If you add it up. It looks like he's included in the total.

6 Witness: Yes.

7 Omar Ashmawy: Do you remember what reimbursement means?

8 Witness: I don't remember, also I don't reimbursement means. I know what it  
9 means but why we put that as reimbursement. I don't know why. We  
10 have to ask them.

11 Omar Ashmawy: Okay.

12 Nate Wright: Okay. One of my questions, walking through with Davis is . . . is it the  
13 coloring on the spreadsheet? What is it that differentiates the way that  
14 CTAA handled Clarke, Lance and Meeks and Davis was handled by the  
15 Midwest?

16 Witness: By the Midwest. Yeah.

17 Nate Wright: Is it the coloring of the spreadsheet? What tells you that I'm going to  
18 invoice a different organization that I am for every other one. Here it  
19 seems that Danny K. Davis followed the normal process.

20 Witness: Back to that colors name. There are no initial to color his name. They  
21 wouldn't tell the colors name.

22 Nate Wright: It's this page here.

23 Witness: Yeah.

24 Nate Wright: There's no initials next to it that tells you to treat it differently than  
25 anything else?

26 Witness: No. Actually if no . . . Is it black, so is not issuing yet or I don't know how  
27 to means. This spreadsheet I did not prepare . . . I don't know the means,  
28 you have to ask the Resul Aksoy.

1 Nate Wright: Okay. Yeah. I was mostly wondering if there was anything that jumped  
2 out to you as being different that told you with the three from CTAA to  
3 treat them differently other than maybe the initials next to it or the  
4 coloring.

5 Witness: Yes.

6 Nate Wright: Okay.

7 Witness: It doesn't mean to me.

8 Nate Wright: Okay. Have you had conversations . . . I know you had conversations with  
9 CTAA, where they reached out to you and said, "We have to pay this." It  
10 was an invoice that you had . . .

11 Witness: Yeah. Maybe.

12 Nate Wright: That you had written off as an unpaid expense. Has anyone else that was  
13 involved in this convention contacted you about the convention?

14 Witness: No. There are three organization I think, AFAZ, TCAA and Turquoise. After  
15 we purchase everybody call for seat assignment, upgrades with mileage. I  
16 remember three names, Kemal Abi, Saim, Resul and Furkan Abi. Four  
17 names.

18 Omar Ashmawy: Spoken, so it was Taban, Kemal, Resul,

19 Witness: Saim.

20 Omar Ashmawy: and Saim. Okay.

21 Nate Wright: Have you had conversation with any of those individuals recently about  
22 the convention? Other that Saim and Kosar talking to you about the letter  
23 to our office and the outstanding balance.

24 Witness: I think it's [inaudible] said to check their accounting.

25 Omar Ashmawy: Has anyone talked to you about the investigation? Obviously we've been  
26 investigating this, so the questions around this trip. Has anyone talked to  
27 you, or send you an email, or a text about this, or anything?

28 Witness: Just Mr. Nate . . . One lady called me.

1 Nate Wright: Helen Eisner?

2 Witness: I think. Yes.

3 Omar Ashmawy: Have you heard from Mr. Turhan or Kemal, or Resul about this? Have  
4 they talked to you about this?

5 Witness: Yeah. Before or after?

6 Omar Ashmawy: After.

7 Witness: After yeah. Saim was here two days ago, Furkan Abi need pay to his  
8 tickets. I told him I have a meeting with you.

9 Omar Ashmawy: Did he say anything?

10 Witness: No, just regular. They say to . . . We have to an open balance, we have to,  
11 I think it's my understand to check.

12 Omar Ashmawy: Say that one more time.

13 Witness: He said to we are going to open balance and is my office should have sent  
14 the check.

15 Omar Ashmawy: They have an open balance and their account should've sent the check to  
16 you?

17 Witness: Yes. Yes.

18 Omar Ashmawy: Have you heard from Mr. Kemal Oksuz about the investigation?

19 Witness: No.

20 Nate Wright: You have booked travel for him recently. We saw in the emails.

21 Witness: Yes.

22 Nate Wright: You haven't talked about this at all?

23 Witness: No. Say your question one more time.

24 Nate Wright: You booked travel for Mr. Oksuz, recently. I believe in February.

1 Witness: Yes.

2 Nate Wright: No conversation about the convention or about our investigation?

3 Witness: No, because we email then and talk about tickets.

4 Omar Ashmawy: You sure you didn't say . . . For you to say something specific?

5 Witness: I think his accounting lawyer contacted me.

6 Omar Ashmawy: His accountant, lawyer did you say?

7 Witness: Accounting lawyer said ... They sent me, can you sent me some invoices.

8 Omar Ashmawy: Do you remember who that was? Was it a firm?

9 Witness: Firm. Yeah. Firm . . . I can check for you.

10 Omar Ashmawy: Sure. I can't say that you remember, but is the firm called Caplin  
11 Drysdale?

12 Witness: I don't know the name. I can check for you. Also, I use the bathroom.

13 Omar Ashmawy: Sure.

14 Nate Wright: Okay.

15 [BREAK IN RECORDING]

16 Omar Ashmawy: The person that contacted you was Rachel Goldstein?

17 Witness: Yes. Capdale. The company name Capdale.

18 Omar Ashmawy: Capdale?

19 Witness: Capdale. Yes.

20 Omar Ashmawy: Capdale?

21 Witness: Capdale. I can print for you.

22 Nate Wright: Okay.

1 Omar Ashmawy: They just asked you to send them copies of the invoices?  
2 Witness: Yes.  
3 Omar Ashmawy: When was this?  
4 Witness: Two months?  
5 Nate WRight: Did they ask for any other documents? Just the . . .  
6 Witness: No. I can email all, you can read. I do not remember what they want to  
7 from me.  
8 Omar Ashmawy: Okay.  
9 Witness: I can email you, or print for you.  
10 Nate Wright: Okay. I don't have any more questions.  
11 Omar Ashmawy: That's all.  
12 Nate Wright: Is there anything we're missing in our questions?  
13 Witness: No. We'll see. We have many . . . We issue tickets, rush tickets from TCC  
14 movement, RTCC. After two, three years ago, we have to ask same  
15 question.  
16 Omar Ashmawy: Yeah. I understand. Well thank you very much for having us. We  
17 appreciate it.  
18 Nate Wright: Thank you.
